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
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
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

Auburn, Cord, and Duesenberg. Three separate names, just to clari-

As the festival season tapers off around Labor Day and the Auburn, Cord, Duesenberg Festival kicks up, you'll hear those names bandied about quite a bit. I'd never really been sure of what they meant; like the blurry chorus lyrics of "Blinded by the Light," I just ran the words together in my head. I figured they referred to the city of Auburn and a couple of dudes, or else three ladies, or else a company or a landmark or something. But there were cars involved; that much I did know.

But if you peek under the hood of Auburn's small-town charm, what you will find is a very big name with

a rather rich history, and the ACD Festival is just the event to celebrate it.

Auburn was the name of a car company begun in the early 1900s in the city for which it is named. When the company began to fail in the 20s, E.L. Cord, a former

race car driver, took over, and soon

Cord's surname was added to the illustrious cars being produced at the Auburn factory.

> Not long after this, Cord acquired another failing car company from the masterful

Duesenberg brothers and commissioned Fred Duesenberg to build him the world's best automobile.

For a few brief, glorious years, the Auburn Automobile Company produced Duesenbergs, some of the most advanced, luxurious and expensive cars on the market. But the Depression sealed the fate of the company and production shut down in 1937, leaving their art deco headquarters behind. From a dead car company to what is now considered the classic car capital of the world was a journey that would take a few more years.

A meeting of Auburn, Cord and Duesenberg car enthusiasts was the seed from which the festival grew. The annual collector car auction soon brought interested car enthusiasts from all over to the annual gathering, and funds were collected to turn the old Auburn Automobile Company offices into the Auburn Cord Duesenberg Automobile Museum that partners with the festival today. This year marks the 58th annual ACD Festival, one of the most exciting yet.

"The Festival has been going on a very, very long time in Auburn, and it has evolved over the years in many ways. This year is no exception. So

cords. Their move to Stax in 1968 is what finally allowed them to find a home, one which would best suit their uniquely perfect harmonies. The process of joining Stax and finding mainstream success began with the realization that their sound was good enough to take them beyond their church. Mavis Staples shared the story of those origins in a 2011 interview:

"I started singing in 1950. Pops was singing with an all-male group, The Trumpet Jubilees, and they were six guys. These guys - Pops would go to rehearsal, go home and discuss it, there may be two of them there. The whole group just wouldn't show up. Pops got so disgusted.

"He came home one night, went to the closet and pulled out a little guitar he bought at the pawn shop. He called us children into the living room and sat us on the floor in a circle and began giving us voices to sing that he and his sisters and brothers would sing down in Mississippi ... The voices that he would give us were old time. When we first started recording people thought that we were old people - much older people - because of the songs that Pops was teaching

"One night my Aunt Katie came through, and she said, 'You all sound pretty good! there one night from Vee-Jay Records, Vivian Carter. She told Pops that you and those children need to be making records, and he said, 'No, I'm not going to put them on record. I don't know much about the records.' He wouldn't let us record until he learned more about the record business.

"Certain people would talk to him and help him. Sister Mahalia Jackson would give him information ... he would get books to learn. After he thought that he had learned - I guess I was about 13 then - he let us re-

The world is full of people who have been told they can make it if they try, but the Staple Singers actually did. And their impact went beyond just musical fame.

Pops became friends with Martin Luther King Jr., and that relationship led to the Staple Singers becoming the musical voices of the civil rights movement. In commemoration of the seventh anniversary of the Watts riots in Los Angeles, a concert deemed the African-American version of Woodstock brought together the talent of Stax Records for a 1972 performance in which the Staple Singers further established their sound as an integral part of the movement. The concert DVD Wattstax makes it possible for everyone to experience the thrill of seeing the family perform live together.

Although the huge hits weren't to continue beyond the 1970s, the Staple Singers continued performing together for many

years and were inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 1999. Pops died in 2000, and sister Cleotha died just last year. But Mavis continues to work, still in possession of one of the most beautiful, soulful voices in the history of music. Her recent collaboration with Wilco's Jeff Tweedy demonstrates that she still has some surprises up her sleeve, and she talked in a 2010 interview about how their partnership began shortly after they had performed together and shared their common background as residents of Chicago and as

"He called maybe two weeks later, and asked, 'Mavis, would you mind coming to the Wilco loft? I have some songs I've chosen that I'd like you to listen to, to see if you'd like to record them for the CD.' I went over and he surprised me with the first two that he played. I said, 'Where in the world did you get those songs? Those songs are older than me!' These were the Golden Gate Jubilee Singers, and the songs they

> recorded were from the early 30s: 'Wonderful Savior' and 'Creep Along Moses.' I told him that Mom and Pops used to play those songs for us when we were kids. I never thought I'd be singing these.

> "We pulled about eight songs from

those 12. We narrowed them down once we started the session because we decided to do some of my father's songs, and then Tweedy, of course, well, he didn't start writing his songs until the end of the session. The two songs he wrote were the last two we recorded. And actually, when we met to listen to those songs, he said, 'Mavis, I've had this title in my head, a song I wanna write for you called "You Are Not Alone." He started talking about the meat of the song, and I got goose bumps from that.

"I said, 'Oh, Tweedy, you gotta write this.' And he did. In fact, I watched him try to write it. He couldn't finish it. He said. 'Mavis, I'm gonna give you a disc to get familiar with the melody, and I'll have the true lyrics for you tomorrow when we come in." He did, and the session, it just moved me. you know, and I felt his songs fit really good with the other songs that he'd chosen for me

Now 75, Staples continues to perform with the energy and vitality of someone half her age, and her arrival in Fort Wayne at the Foellinger Theatre is, to my mind, the crown jewel of a very good summer concert series. There aren't many opportunities left to see the true legends of music perform, and this is one you won't want to miss.

Depending on whom you ask, Orgone can either be defined as (a) a hypothetical life force, key in determining a person's physical and sexual health or (b) a band straight out of the San Fernando Valley known for its devotion to down-and-dirty, organic soul.

The former was a concept created by Austrian psychoanalyst Wilhelm Reich and his student, Charles Kelly. While championed by Beat writers William S. Burroughs and Jack Kerouac and other celebrities, Orgone and Orgone Energy Accumlators - the closets constructed in order to infuse patients with greater potency – were debunked by the FDA, and Reich thrown in jail for selling snake oil.

The latter (and the true subject of this article) will play at the Foellinger-Freimann Botanical Conservatory Friday, August 22

as part of the Botanical Roots series, along with show openers, the Fort Wayne Funk Orchestra.

Orgone the eight-piece funkfest – Adryon de Leon (vocals),

Sergio Rios (guitar), Dan Hastie (keys), Sam Halterman (drums), Darren Cardoza (trombone), Devin Williams (trumpet), Tim Glum (bass) and Chuck Prada (percussion) - got their start 15 years ago when Rios and Hastie were introduced by a mutual friend. Rios was 19 at the time, Hastie 14. The friend thought they'd dig each other because they were into the same music.

"I was all about the blues," Rios told me in a recent phone interview. He and his mates were taking a breather after a threeweek cross-country tour that ended in Connecticut with a performance at Gathering of the Vibes. "Dan was more into jazz and Steely Dan, but we found some common ground, and from then on we were in and out of various bands, mostly cover acts."

In 1999 Rios and Hastie decided that, rather than play by other people's rules, they'd start their own band.

"We'd sort of infiltrate groups and pull each other in. Then we'd leave those bands, but we'd always come back together. Orgone was about doing our own thing, finally - about playing what we wanted to play. It's been a very fruitful friendship and relationship. It's pretty amazing to grow musically with someone that way.

Orgone began as an instrumental fourpiece. They put out their self-titled debut in 2001. Six years later they welcomed vocalist Fanny Franklin to the fold and recorded The Killion Fields with Ubiquity records. Since then, they've also released Bacano, Cali Fever, Killion Vaults and New You, some with Franklin and others with an assortment of guest vocalists. Speaking of new, they're in the process of finishing up their latest effort, the first to feature the pipes and talents of de Leon, whom Rios describes as "simply awesome.'

"Her vocal range and style are so wideranging," he said. "She's bringing an incredible amount of diversity and variety to our

That sound is a combination of soul, funk, blues and Afro-disco. To give Orgone

virgins an idea of their aesthetic, they've played with The Roots, Sharon and the Dap Kings and Al Green. Rios said the audience at an Orgone show is sure to sweat, dance and get

down. That is, when they're not getting on

"It's all about the love. It's music that you can lose yourself to, in the best possible way," he said. "Everyone on stage is giving 110 percent. It's very high energy, non-stop really, and it's a good release for everyone. It's a sweaty, fun, high-octane good time."

And how did they happen to settle on the name Orgone? It's no coincidence that these funkadelics were christened for Reich and Kelly's experiment in energy fields gone wrong. In fact, it just might have been fate.

"When we started the band, we were fishing around for a name," Rios told me. "At one point, one of the guys mentioned having seen an HBO documentary about the history of sexuality in the 20th Century, and he told us about Wilhelm Reich and the Orgone Accumulator. We all thought it was pretty interesting. Then, after a really weird show in Fresno, we were staying overnight at a dingy motel, and the guy who told us about the documentary went to the patio to smoke a cigarette. There on the picnic table was a book about Orgone theory. That decided it. The name chose us.

Finger-Pickin' Good

If you can make it to just one bluegrass show this summer, Bluegrass Out Back 2 at the Wagon Wheel Café in Warren is the one to see. There are at least three reasons for this, reasons bluegrass and string music fans across the state already know.

Bluegrass Out Back 2, which is scheduled for Saturday, August 23, will feature the bands Flatland Harmony Experiment, White Lightning Boys and Old Truck Revival, three groups that are riding and helping to create the wave of popularity string music is seeing. The show starts with an open mic jam from 3-5 p.m.

Flatland Harmony Experiment were finalists at the 40th Annual 2013 Telluride Bluegrass Festival band competition. The experience at Telluride is one Flatland bassist Scott Nelson will never forget. Nelson, along with mandolin player Ken Potts and banjo player Plott, Johnny danced around

"I'm a singer and a bass player. With rock I could become a solid bass player or a solid singer. Based on the string band idiom. I can do both. It's a simpler job."

Maybe. Anyone who's spent time watching string band bass players knows it's not that simple. There's a level virtuosity required of string band musicians that is not always present in other types of music.

"These people are not just strummers. There's no gimmick," Nelson said. "There's no pedal. And I'm not just dogging that other music."

In September, Flatland Harmony Experiment takes the stage at the Phases of the Moon Festival where the band will share

their microphone while performing in front of 10,000 people.

We worked really hard for three years to get to that place," Nelson said in a phone interview. "We tailored our sound to be able to compete at Telluride."

The contest requires that bands perform using a single microphone. That's where the dancing comes in. Working with one mic requires constant movement to vary the volume of both the instruments and the vocals.

"It's really engaging for the audience," Nelson said. "It's a show. The whole picture changes. All three of us sing lead and because of that we all change positions. That changes the sound of the band. It gives all different options visually and sonically. It's just another layer of fun.'

Formed at a jam in Indianapolis in 2011, Nelson, Potts and Plott knew right away that they had something special.

"It felt really good immediately," Nelson said. "Once we started we never looked

Nelson grew up playing rock and blues and jam band music but switched to string band and bluegrass when he decided he wanted to put more emphasis on his vocals.



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Sharon Van Etten

Are We There

Have you ever heard an artist's early efforts and just know that their next work was going to bloom, perhaps exponentially? Somehow born fully formed, yet crackling with huge potential? Bon Iver come to mind. Beck, too. And now we have Sharon Van Etten.



Her first couple of efforts hinted at something bigger, while her previous album, *Tramp*, upped the ante. But listening to her latest, *Are We There*, you get a sense of running becoming flying. While *Tramp* was loaded with guest players who sometimes nearly threatened to overwhelm Van Etten and her compositions, *Are We There* presents an artist with complete authority and more confidence. Her compelling voice is no longer at the center of the hurricane; it is the hurricane.

The spacious opener, "Afraid of Nothing," is as graceful as a spinning, forming storm front. When Van Etten sings, "I need you to be afraid of nothing," she's saying something different under the surface than what appears to be obvious. And throughout the album, her deceptively minimalist lyrics paint intimate pictures of longing and loss that her swooping, powerful vocals turn into murals rendered cinematically huge.

The push and pull is palpable on "Your Love Is Killing Me." When she mutters, "Taste blood / Everybody needs to feel," it's impossible not to – especially when she launches skyward again and elevates the song to another height. "Break Me" may be more subtle, as it slow dances atop a steady rhythm and a calming organ, but it's Van Etten's show, and she makes this beautiful tune a cool combination of vintage slow dance and breakdown of the politics of a relationship.

While she doesn't pander by spelling out every detail in her lyrics, Van Etten nonetheless pulls no punches. On the album-closing "Every Time the Sun Comes Up," she makes a rare allusion to her current ride – a ride of a magnitude she was obviously not expecting, but one that has forced her to keep her eyes wide open. "People say I'm a one-hit wonder," she sings. "What happens when I have two?" She's not cynical, but she's seen enough burst bubbles that she clings to grounded reality like a blanket (if you need any more proof, be sure to listen to the line that follows).

A large part of Van Etten's appeal is the way her force-of-nature vocals work with those words, which nearly always bring a slap of real life to the songs. This may not be easy listening, but it sure is rewarding. (*D.M. Jones*)

Suicide Silence

You Can't Stop Me

There's some sort of strange confluence going on with Suicide Silence's new album, *You Can't Stop Me*. It's the deathcore maestros' first recording with new vocalist Hernan "Eddie" Hermida (All Shall Perish) since the tragic death of previous frontman Mitch Lucker on November 1, 2012. Af-



ter Lucker's death, the band considered breaking up but ultimately decided to soldier on.

Of course, there are those who feel that Suicide Silence should have disbanded after Lucker's death. The band's response to the nay-sayers? You can't stop us – and here's an album that proves it. The strange part is that the title track contains lyrics written by Lucker before his death; it's as if he's sanctioning his band's continuation from the hereafter.

There's also some confluence of guest vocalists on some of the album's stronger tracks. Cannibal Corpse's George "Corpsegrinder" Fisher lends his vocals to early standout "Control," and the Dillinger Escape Plan's Greg Puciato appears on "The Monster Within."

For the most part, You Can't Stop Me finds the band in fine bludgeoning form. One of the things that makes them stand out in the death metal/metalcore crowd is their awareness that, when it comes to heavy metal riffs, faster isn't always better. It's something that great bands from Black Sabbath to Metallica have realized, but it's lost on a lot of bands who put all of their energy into delivering complicated riffs at breakneck speeds, the faster the better. Granted, that

Human League Dare (1981)

The third full-length album from England's premier emo-altnew-wave band was the release that took them out of debt and onto the global airwaves during the winter of 1981. It's an album consisting of lyrical mastery and a synthesized pop sound, and 40 years later it is mixed into dance of the control of



years later it is mixed into dance clubs all over the world.

It starts off with "The Things That Dreams are Made Of," a bright number reminding us that the simple things in life are important. "Open Your Heart," one of the many "relationship songs" that is full-on electronic, features an unpretentious drum machine and bright synthesizer. "Darkness" is one of the slower tracks, and the vocals from Phil Oakey are without the familiar backings from female members Jo Catherall and Susan Sulley (who were just 18 at the time). "Do or Die" has an electronic/reggae vibe in the same vein as The Clash during the same era. Its percussion arrangement reminds me a lot of Talking Heads as well, even though the League used artificial means for drums.

Side two opens with a very brief instrumental and segues into "I Am the Law," a track written from the perspective of law enforcement and is somewhat sympathetic to its subject. "Seconds" is based on the assassination of John F. Kennedy and, though lyrically brooding, still feels like part of the album. Again, these guys were trying to break out of the commercially overproduced "music only" sound and delve into a genre that wasn't as lyric-based during the dance-crazed early 80s. I think they were able to pull it off very well.

The album closes with "Don't You Want Me," their biggest hit and still one of the best-selling singles in England.

approach can yield some high-octane energy that will get a circle pit going, but the songs can move so quickly that they don't linger long enough to make a real impact. Much of Suicide Silence's trademark sound consists of slower, more monumental riffs which have a pulverizing simplicity.

Herrida does a solid job on the vocal duties, with a range from high-pitched shrieks to lower guttural growls. He often sounds similar to Lucker (though perhaps better at the lower registers) which may, in fact, be why they chose him as a replacement.

Album closer "Ouroboros" takes a slightly different approach compared to the rest of the album, alternating lilting spoken word sections with some of their jackhammer riffs. It's nice to hear the band stretching out into some slightly more experimental territory. While they deliver the concussive riffery well, "Ouroboros" offers a little something different from the tried and true, it would be interesting to hear the band stretch out a little bit more.

All in all, Suicide Silence show that they still have the passion and the drive to deliver some of the best their genre has to offer on You Can't Stop Me. (Ryan Smith)





The two names most important to my desire to see The Hundred-Foot Journey are Lasse Halstrom and Helen Mirren. The two names aggressively promoting this film in hyperbolic language, Stephen Spielberg and Oprah Winfrey, send me running away from what they promote. The two I like, combined with the theme of food got me to buy a

Like Chocolat, Halstrom's foray into European chocolate wars, The Hundred Foot Journey is pretty, corny, predictable at every turn and very romantic. These sometimes eye-rolling qualities don't mean The Hundred Foot Journey isn't perfectly enjoyable, as long as you are so enchanted by this fairy tale that the huge holes in reason, plot and plausibility just wash over you.

The food war is between two cuisines: Indian and French. The romance is between two young chefs, one French and one Indian and two old chefs, one French and one Indian. The film is also a love letter to both cultures and the bounty and beauty of the French countryside.

The culture clash is exaggerated for the sake of the plot, but at least Johnny Depp isn't wandering through the story as a gypsy with a goofy accent (as in Chocolat). The political strains are vague or detailed, depending upon the fairy tale plot's demands. The food in preparation and presentation is gorgeous, and the characters are charming.

We meet young Hassan Kadam as a boy doing the best he can to keep up with his mother as she shops in the Mumbai markets for the family restaurant. His appreciation of sea urchin wins his mother a whole basket of this delicacy. Years later, as a young man, he has been working alongside her and the rest of the family, absorbing her lessons about all things foodie, especially spices – though he retains a huge fondness for sea urchin. (I love sea urchin as sushi, but that's the only way I've had it. Seeing it added to a stew made me crazy to taste it cooked well.)

Plot-convenient politics wreck this family and its business. "There was an election. Someone won and someone lost." That's all we get as a prelude to a mob storming the gates of the restaurant and smashing everything and burning



the place down. Mama Kadam is killed in the fire, and this tragedy sends the family out of India as refugees.

As they are trying to get through customs from England (where they were granted political asylum) to the Continent, we learn a bit more about the family. As each family member answers questions about why they are where they are and where they want to be, we learn about personalities and fam-

The key players are Papa Kadam, the bereaved patriarch, played with great sympathy by the veteran Om Puri. He is looking for a warmer climate than England to call home and start a new life and restaurant.

As an adolescent and grown-up, Hassan is played by Manish Dayal who moves through his character's experiences and portrays his increasing maturity with wonderful subtlety. When we meet the young man Hassan, he tells the customs officer that he is leaving England because of the bland character of English vegetables. He is in search of vegetables with soul.

On their road trip in a dilapidated vehicle, the "brakes break." And as we are told repeatedly thereafter, "brakes break for a reason." The family is exhausted and breaks down over the car breakdown. Luckily, this happens in the south of France. And who should come to their rescue, but a beautiful, generous young woman, Marguerite (the lovely epitome of a young French woman, Charlotte Le Bon). She stops to help and guides the family and its broken down car to her village and past a structure that catches the eye of Papa

Marguerite offers them a gorgeous table full of simple but beautiful French food - bread she has baked, vegetables fresh picked from the garden, cheeses made from the milk of the cows in the meadow. Of course, they are enchanted. As

have gone to heaven."

The kindness of a stranger, her delicious food and a talk with his deceased wife convince him that he must have the building he passed. Until now we've thought that the family fled their old lives with little of the prosperity they had achieved, but when a big old house in France is available. Papa breaks out the cash. He buys the structure and in no time they are ready to open.

The restaurant is available because the previous owners made the foolish decision to open 100 feet across the street from a Michelin star, classical French restaurant, the best in the region, run by the imperious Madam Mallory, the wonderful Helen Mirren.

And so the dance begins between characters, culture and cuisine. Madame is stuffy and hostile to the music, the smells, the people and any kind of change. She pulls a few truly underhanded stunts, but the Hadam family are resilient. When her snobbery encourages her chef to prompt some local bigots to display ugly racist behavior, she begins to soft-

Hassan, because he is quite infatuated with Marguerite and because his love of food is as deep as the love he feels for his family, negotiates a peace. It takes time, but eventually (only in movie timelines) he is apprenticing and then dominating the French kitchen of Madame.

This allows for a softening of relations between Papa and Madame and a distancing between Marguerite and Hassan. Hassan becomes so successful, he is hired away to one of the best restaurants in Paris where the food is beautiful but as lacking in soul as the vegetables of England he ran from.

I'm guessing you can guess what the happy endings are. If not now, you will as you watch The Hundred-Foot Journey. Movies that let you leave the theater smiling with your mouth watering for truly good food are worth it, even if you have to roll your eyes a few times at the oh-so convenient

It's also time to start watching your mail for the catalog of activities available through Fort Wayne Parks & Rec this fall. Just a few years ago I decided to try my hand at some dance lessons which were available, and I had a great time with them. While there are always an abundance of activities listed for kids, there are some fun options for adults too, many of which provide eclectic ways to stay active and even competitive, if that's what floats your boat.

It's not too late to find activities in the summer catalog, for that matter, and Salomon Farm has activities already booked through October. And the summer brochure also lists a number of great nature treks to do with kids, many aimed at school and day care centers. Lindenwood Field Trips, for example, run through October 31.

The moral of this story is don't throw away the Fort Wayne Parks & Rec brochure when it comes in your mail! There are a surprising number of programs out there, and if you're one of those who thinks there's nothing to do once summer is over, you might be surprised how wrong you are.

we really want to make it new and exciting every single year," said Sarah Payne, the festival's executive director. "There are lots of traditional things that happen at the festival; it has such a rich history, but we're always adding new and exciting things to do."

While on the surface the ACD Festival looks like something meant mostly for automobile enthusiasts, it's also for enthusiasts of whimsy, nostalgia, the roaring 20s, fitness, the mystery of mausoleums, and dare I say it? - much, much more. Just imagine your average festival, then add in large doses of history, charm, cars and fun, and you'll begin to get an idea of what this festival is about these days.

This year's most exciting addition to the schedule is the long list of musical artists performing Friday and Saturday night. While there will be local favorites you've definitely heard of - like Good Night Gracie, Sugar Shot, Joe Justice and Urban Legend – there will also be some acts that are worth getting to know a little better. The Atomic Sharks, featuring local celeb Kenny Taylor, is a duo that makes island-style music for families. Another name to get used to is Influx, a soulful, contemporary group that boasts plenty of local music veterans.

While there's plenty to do outside of ogling cars. it would be silly to miss the Festival's beloved traditions that celebrate the classic Auburns, Cords and Duesenbergs that put this town on the map. Friday night's cruise-in will feature hundreds of cars with enough variety to please the muscle, classic, and rare car fans, while Saturday's Parade of Classics will be exclusive to the cars that gave the festival its name. The parade will host about 200 of them, as well as a special celebrity guest.

"This year's grand marshall is Courtney Hanson. She's really famous for being both beautiful and very car-smart," Payne said. "She hosts a block of TV shows that are automotive-related, called Power Nation on NBC Sports, and she's also hosted TLC's Overhaulin' and Rides. She's very car-focused, so she's a perfect fit for us."

The ACD Festival often plays host to a slew of unscheduled celebrity guests who, like most, come for the fabulous display of classic cars. Jay Leno has been a regular attendee in the past, and just last year Kid Rock was seen around town during the festivities.

Whether you go for the cars, the food, or the slew of exciting and original activities, the Auburn Cord, Duesenberg Festival will give you a great way to spend the last days of summer and go out with a

Arena Dinner Theatre's current musical, Violet, is a powerful blending of two of America's best mythologies: transformation and the road trip. Take at least two Kleenex and your best toe-tapping shoes because you are in for a treat with this fresh, energetic, tuneful story that is hot off Broadway where Tony-nominated Sutton Foster played the title role until it completed its run last Sunday.

Spunky mountain gal Violet Karl has, up until the day she climbs aboard a Greyhound bound for Tulsa, been defined by a disfiguring scar on her face. Her bus is bound for the glory of a televangelist with a healing touch, but it is fueled by a score full of catchy tunes pulled out of the heart of the South. There's a little

Opry here, some Appalachian folk there, blues, an oh-too-commercial "lil darlin" crooner and above all, soaring gospel.

Judging by the high quality of the total production, you might never guess this is a directing debut for both director Jake Wilhelm and music director Rosalie Geller, as well as first Arena roles by almost the

entire glorious cast. Songs are crisply enunciated, accents hold true, characters navigate tight blocking, and singers blend and harmonize, carry simultaneous melodies or soaring descants - all the while moving the story along.

Darby Bixler embodies Violet with a powerful voice and the mixture of emotions that is the core of this girl's story. She is endearing, tough and funny and seizes our attention immediately with one of the best opening songs in a long time, "On My Way." Her "All to Pieces" even includes a little almost-yodeling as she specifies her dream face.

Dana Bixler as Young Violet and their dad, Kent Bixler, make an amazing team, and the play's intriguing device of the simultaneous flashback (Sounds like an oxymoron, doesn't it? Trust me it works very well!)

condenses the narration and shows us the impact of Violet's earlier life effectively. Kent Bixler's best songs, "Luck of the Draw" and "That's What I Could Do," are amazing – and, in the case of the latter, utterly moving.

Violet's two new soldier friends traveling to Fort Smith are brought to life and sung very well by Nick Walters and Mason Hunter as Flick and Monty. While

Hunter's Monty gets some good moments, the really ear-catching songs are for Walters' Flick. As for stealing the show, Fatima Washington and Mary Alberding both have a lot of fun. Washington's Gospel Soloist is fantastic, and Alberding's two Old Ladies both won laughs from the audience. William Andrews seems to be everywhere, including as the

Bus Driver and the Preacher, and gives each good ol' boy the big voice they merit. The show also features a versatile ensemble of Alexis Craighead, Derek Gulley, Maggie Leavell, Bill Craighead and Amanda Simpkins. Onstage musicians Ben Wedler, Ryan Clark, Adam Robison, Gary Toth, Rachel Mossburg all were

In a panic, Selznick fired the movie's director (and his best friend), George Cukor, and put the entire production on hold at a cost of \$50,000 a day. He yanked director

Victor Fleming (mid-way through shooting The Wizard of Oz) in to replace Cukor. Selznick did all of this with the confidence that the celebrated "Shakespeare of Hollywood," Ben Hecht, would be able to produce

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The Musings of a Simple Mind

Living with a Wild God by Barbara Ehrenreich, Twelve, 2014

You'd think that it would be a big deal when a high-profile atheist activist writes a book acknowledging the possibility of the existence of God. It would, no doubt, be some kind of breakthrough if a respected rationalist laid out a carefully considered, philosophically and scientifically sound argument for the existence of spiritual beings. That's why Barbara Ehrenreich's *Living with a Wild God* is so perplexing to her fans and so resoundingly unsatisfying to those who'd like to hear her say she's changed her mind about religion – not because it represents a stunning reversal of her point of view, but because it offers so surprisingly little of substance or consequence.

The inspiration for the book came when Ehrenreich was gathering together her old papers for donation to a library archive. She was facing a battle with cancer at the time, so she was in a frame of mind to contemplate her mortality, and when she stumbled across a journal she'd written over the course of a decade during her adolescence, she began to dredge up parts of her life that she hadn't thought much about in a very long time.

The resulting book consists of a lot of material drawn from that journal, framed by musings about the author's early life. She spent her early years in Montana where her father worked for a mining company. Her parents were intense atheists, hard drinkers and scientific thinkers; they were, consequently, not at all emotionally nurturing, and Ehrenreich casts her childhood as almost entirely devoid of warmth. That's the context in which she wrote the journal, and it consists mostly of adolescent meanderings about philosophy and the social order.

And adolescent it certainly is. Although the young Ehrenreich is linguistically precocious (she started writing the journal when she was 14), the actual con-



tent of her thoughts is hardly sophisticated. Unwilling to accept that the point of existence is limited to the cycle of birth, sex, parenthood, drinking and death that she sees in the hardscrabble lives around her, she sets out to figure out for herself the meaning of life. That's right; she decides that she will uncover the meaning of life, the most vague, meaningless philosophical clichée

here is.

The problem is that the elder Ehrenreich doesn't seem much wiser or deeper in her thought processes. The book's hook is her consideration of a series of "mystical" experiences that she had during the time she was writing the journal. She teases these experiences for quite awhile, but when she finally lays them out, they're anticlimactic, a few instances when she felt some kind of shapeless clarity, a weird connection to the universe.

Given the formless familiarity of these experiences (they sound just like the unspecific thought processes described by mystics of every flavor, from Christians to Buddhists to New Agers), you'd think

a rationalist would have no problem explaining them away. But instead of concluding that they're just normal occurrences – that when people are fatigued or undernourished or ill, chemistry and physiology might start to blur the edges of rational thought – she identifies the experiences as "mystical." To be fair, she doesn't entirely abandon rationality, but her attempt to fit together the rational and the mystical is uneasy and unconvincing.

The bottom line is deeply insulting to believers.

Stupid Turtles Rule the Cineplex

Tops at the Box: Talk about Turtle Power, Jonathan Liebesman's live action *Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles* film took the No. 1 spot at the box office over its first weekend of release, selling \$65 million in the U.S. over its first three days and an additional \$29 million abroad. Reviews, as you would expect for such a film, are very bad. All of them. The trailer is also bad. So is the script. And the idea. But hey, kids love stupid stuff, and there are apparently a whole lot of 20- and 30-something moviegoers who feel very nostalgic about gigantic surfer turtles who can fight and love pizza. Something tells me that exactly zero of ScreenTime's loyal readers contributed to this flick's success. Good job, readers.

Also at the Box: Guardians of the Galaxy took the No. 2 spot at last weekend's box office, selling another \$41 million, bringing the flick's 10-day total to \$176 million in the U.S. and \$313 million worldwide. Oh boy. I predicted that Guardians would bomb, and yikes, was I apparently wrong. I hear it's a good time at the theater, especially if you fancy yourself a big X-Men and/or Marvel fan.

Thriller *Into the Storm* took the No. 3 spot at the box, selling \$18 million in the U.S. over its first three days of release. Add to that another \$8.3 million in

abroad sales, and *Into the Storm* is looking like a surprise hit. Taking the No. 4 spot at last weekend's box office was the Lasse Hallstrom-directed drama *The Hundred-Foot Journey*, starring Helen Mirren. *Journey*, produced by heavy hitters Steven Spielberg and Oprah Winfrey, sold \$11 million over its first three days of release. And finally, at the No. 5 spot, we have Luc Besson's *Lucy* which sold \$9.3 million last weekend, bringing the action romp's 17-day total to \$97 million in the U.S. and \$112 million worldwide. Looks very good to me. And hey, dude, it stars Scarlett Johansson, so there's that.

Also of note, *Hercules* continued to bomb, selling just \$5.7 million last weekend; meanwhile, Richard Linklater's *Boyhood* continued to sell well despite not playing on very many screens, upping the tiny indie's five-week total to just under \$11 million in the U.S.

a new script in lighting fashion. Selznick learned too late that Hecht had never even read the 1,037-page book and had no knowledge of the plot. The producer decided the only solution was for he and Fleming to act out the entire story for Hecht scene-by-scene, playing all the characters. Selznick locked them all in his office for five straight days. They worked 22-hour shifts, and Selznick insisted they eat only peanuts and bananas (since they were "brain food" and anything else would slow down their productivity). To top it off, it's well documented that Selznick was popping amphetamines like Tic Tacs; so while the other two are dropping dead from exhaustion, Selznick is like the energizer bunny. From these ridiculous details, Ron Hutcheson crafted his farce.

The play is an extraordinary challenge. The script pays direct homage to the screwball comedies of which Hecht himself was a master (he wrote *The Front Page* and *Some Like It Hot*) as well as the physical comedy of Marx Brothers. Performing the show is like running marathon, and our cast has embraced it with fearless abandon.

It's amazing how much factual detail

It's amazing how much factual detail Hutcheson manages to share within the framework of such a manic farce. As I dug into research about *Gone with the Wind*, I quickly realized there was little to discover that wasn't already there in his script. The great value of my research was the surprising discovery that even the most absurd elements of the story were based in truth.

Of course we all know that *Gone with the Wind* eventually was completed, and remains the greatest box-office success of all time. The brilliance of Hutcheson's script is how invested the audience becomes in the struggle. Just like a great heist movie, you know the gang will rob the bank at the end of the picture, but watching how it happens is all the fun.

By the way, even if you've never seen *Gone with the Wind*, this show is a hoot. If you have seen it, I promise you'll never think of it the same way again.

even more so than Ehrenreich's life-long discounting of their beliefs. The idea that a strange experience could be interpreted by Ehrenreich to be "mystical" simply because it happened to her and not to someone else is as inexplicable and indefensible as any of the behaviors and conclusions she's spent years decrying in theists.

The worse problem with the book is that it exposes the shallowness of Ehrenreich's philosophical goals. It says a lot that she's seen fit to publish the work of her 14-year-old mind, in which she dresses simple ideas up in excessively fancy language. The much older Ehrenreich doesn't seem much different when she's juxtaposed with her girlish self. Her language is even more obtuse now, her logic more convoluted and repetitive, but her conclusions are equally simple.


