Choose Your Rabbit Hole

As anyone who has spent five minutes on social media can attest, there have been an awful lot of people taking videos of themselves getting dumped with buckets of ice water. Simply dubbed the Ice Bucket Challenge, the craze has been sweeping the nation as thousands of people take the challenge and urge others to do so as well. The impetus for the challenge has been to raise awareness and needed money for ALS research, and if nothing else, people have definitely been talking about the organization which has benefited by the stunt

In a world of fundraising for not-forprofits, it is clearly the organization which can best engage and involve their donors that will see the greatest gains, particularly when social media so often drives masses to learn more. It's no longer enough to host a little party and hope people will open their checkbooks; you have to bring them into the fold and make them want to be part of your mission.

Fort Wayne Dance Collective figured that out more than a year ago, launching a new kind of fundraiser, Choose-Your-Own-Adventure, which provided an interactive evening of dance and art, far more involving than a passive performance or pleading brochure could hope to be. With Star-Crossed, their unique spin on Romeo & Juliet performed throughout the nooks and crannies of the historic Embassy Theatre, Dance Collective allowed a far more intimate and engaging means of introducing new audiences to their craft while providing a thrilling connection to those who have attended their more traditional performances in the past.

With that successful first effort under its belt, Fort Wayne Dance Collective will host its second annual interactive fundraiser, Wonderland, this time with *Alice in Wonderland* filling the slightly eerie surroundings of the Masonic Temple. Choosing the storyline is important for a variety of reasons, and as Alison Gerardot, Dance Collective's Outreach Director, knows, the story needs to be recognizable to really bring people into the fold

"We'll do this in a similar style to last year, but unlike *Romeo & Juliet*, this story won't be as linear," says Gerardot. "Alice in Wonderland provides a great opportunity to have a lot of things going on at the same time, so people can choose what room they want to visit to see part of the story and can move from one room to another and experience it. They can be on their own exploring what's happening."

Gerardot knows that the Masonic Temple will be an interesting change of pace from last year, providing a less familiar venue than the well-known Embassy as well as a slightly more unusual atmosphere. Creepy, is one word she used to describe it – and that should bode well for the slightly unusual tale

of Alice's adventures down the rabbit hole.

Last year's inaugural event drew over 200 people, far exceeding expectations. But, as can often happen when something is made to be that much fun, the initial purpose of the event – to help raise operating capital for the organization – can be lost along the way. Gerardot hopes to make the ultimate goal more clear this year, sharing some of their best and brightest students and some of the dancers who visit area schools as part of the Collective's outreach program.

"We need to make it clearer what the needs of the Dance Collective are, what groups we serve in our community and the costs associated with providing those services. We want to show people what we do and that means bringing in people to see us and bringing in more corporate sponsors and donations."

Currently the Dance Collective is expanding upon its services within its own structure as well as through efforts off-site. Renovations are already underway to add a passenger elevator and make the space inside their offices and studios at the Hall Community Arts Center more accessible to people with disabilities, a strong core of those their outreach program currently assists. There will also be more comfortable areas for parents to watch their young students in class and opportunities for future classes to be more inclusive. Funded partially through a grant from Anthony Wayne Services and help from Arts United, it's this kind of growth which needs friends to sustain. And those friends are invited to see the collective at work during these special fundraising events, and with Wonderland providing round two, it's a good bet that you can expect more of these evenings from the Dance Collective in the future. "We had no idea last year how many

people were going to come until they just showed up," says Gerardot. "We knew that we wanted to do it again this year with more emphasis on the fundraising aspect. There are certain things we have to keep in mind when planning it since we are trying to raise money, including the fact that the story we use has to be in the public domain. If we have to pay for rights to use the story, that wouldn't work. We also need to keep thinking of venues because we want to stay downtown and there aren't a lot of places where we don't have to reconfigure the space for our purpose, which would also be expensive."

The cast for the evening will feature not only many of the collective's students and outreach artists (including Chloe Kersey in the role of Alice) but also some local icons of stage and administration in the local arts scene – among them the collective's artistic director, Liz Monnier, as the White Rabbit and Youtheatre Executive Director Leslie Hormann as the Red Queen. Of course, there will be treats available, this year from Bagel Station, with a special dessert served following the final scene. A cash bar will also be on site, and three bands – Soft 'n Heavy, Metavari and Heaven's Gateway Drug – will be on hand to provide musical accompaniment.

In addition to raising friends and funds, the September 12 event helps the collective kick off yet another year of doing what it does best: providing a special place for learning dance and movement in a caring anxironment.

"As soon as Wonderland is over, we start getting amped up for our season because it really is a kickoff for us," says Gerardot. "From there we move into our fall schedule with classes and visits to our community, to Halloween and then to the holiday season."

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Beauty in the Broken'

Enter the office of Cara Lee Wade and you enter the lair of a multifaceted artist with a vibrant personality crowned by an ever-changing head of hair, this time a bright warm hue hovering between red and flaming orange. Surrounded by a collection of ran-

dom objects (including a miniaturized, obscure Muppet named Janice who has more than a slight resemblance to Wade) that provides hints for the topics rolling through this artist's mind, one can't help but assume Wade's head is stacked with boxes spewing ideas, thoughts and opinions in an abundance that would challenge any singular person to express in one lifetime. She is a powerhouse communicator who is both gracious and daring. Her profession is teacher. Her artistic medium is photography.

While she may claim two common titles, ordinary, Wade is not. Her undergrad work earned her an English degree which led to her first teaching job that did nothing to feed her creative spirit.

"I felt like I was in prison," states Wade. Being an artist at heart, she took a photography class during which she

fell under the spell of processing film.

The first time I put a piece of paper in the chemicals and an image emerged, I fell in love with photography." She's been a darkroom mistress ever since, never folding to the pressure to abandon the mechanical, slow process of developing images by hand. The process is what keeps Wade fired up. Manipulating images by hand is what sets her work apart. Her passion for the process is what inspires her students.

During grad school Wade learned a photo process called mordon, a manipulative technique that involves the use of chemicals to liquefy and separate the black lines and shapes of a photograph from the paper, allowing the artist to manually alter and distort the image.

The process lends itself perfectly to the underlying theme that permeates all of Wades work; the study of beauty and even more specifically, comparing beauty to the grotesque. The topic was the core of her thesis work through which she contemplated the debauchery of beauty during the Victorian age by digging up examples of devastating consequences endured as a result of pursuing beauty. Wade quickly rattles off stories of binding and crushing corsets causing victims to suffer from organ failure and death from exposure to lead-based cosmetics.

Those who pursue beauty, specifically

come from a pure place."

Wade looks for beauty in unusual places. She enjoys "taking photos of crap" and challenging viewers to accept what is normally interpreted as ugliness as beauty.

During a recent visit to the Neon Museum in Las Vegas, she shot 15 rolls of film in one hour - not images, but rolls of film, each

> one loaded, wound and shot, then removed from the camera and tucked quickly away before reloading again. She was overtaken by the scene of the nostalgic graveyard and admits she broke a few rules and most likely annoyed a few others on the tour with her exuberant reactions to rust and rot.

> "I had two cameras and broke the rule of only using one by hanging the second around the neck of my boyfriend." Wade goes on to say, "I love finding beauty in the broken. The natural process of decay is beautiful."

> Wade is always armed with a camera. In her office, she is surrounded by a perimeter made up of a collection of antiques and retros. each waiting to be the next to go with Wade into the field. She shoots things that come across her path in daily life. most often armed with a Holga camera, also known as a plastic toy



drag queens, serve as the collective muse for one body of Wade's ongoing work. The series of photos started as class requirement while Wade moved through the master's degree program at the Savannah College of Art and Design.

I always photographed them because they were my friends," says Wade. "The work is not always light because of the stigma attached to the lifestyle."

As her work develops, so do Wade's interpretations of her subjects and themes. While she may have started simply photographing friends, she now thinks of the drag queen series on a deeper level, adding more layers of content the longer she works with the theme.

"These men want to become women because they find women to be amazing and fascinating. We don't criticize men for wanting to be beautiful as much as we do women who want to be beautiful," says Wade. "Women inject our bodies with sh** to become beautiful. That beauty doesn't

"Sometimes things stay in the camera for a while and I forget what is on the film. When I develop it, it's like a gift," she says.

The unexpected and serendipitous moments that sprinkle Wade's life also ignite energy and zeal in her soul. The Holga is Wade's go-to camera because it adds its own mark to her images.

"Some people say 'happy accident.' I call it a gift from the photo universe," says

The lens is easily scratched which adds interesting flaws to images. The entire camera can be thrown into saltwater to incite interesting effects. The cameras can be broken apart to use as pinhole cameras.

"These are things you just can't do with digital. Nothing compares to the creative process of film," says Wade. "[The Holga] makes getting the negatives like opening a

If it's September in Indiana it must be Oktobeerfest in Fort Wayne. And for lovers of craft beer Oktobeerfest in September is better than Christmas in July. A celebration of Indiana brewers, Oktobeerfest has grown to be more than just a way for beer aficionados

to get their kicks on a late summer afternoon. It's a chance for craft brewers from around the state to introduce their delicious products and make new friends. And this year it's also a chance for home brewers to tap with the big boys and see how they measure up.

Now in it's 16th year Mad Anthony Brewing Company's Oktobeerfest happens September 13 at Headwaters Park West. With more than 35 breweries from around the state, some of Fort Wayne's popular food trucks, golf, music, a pub pedal and more, the event has something for everyone.

Through the magic of electronic mail, socalled email, I was able to get answers to some serious questions about this year's happening. Tiffany Cox, from Mad Anthony's marketing wing, managed to solve some mysteries

for me and make me thirsty at the same time.

"Over the years we have learned that craft beer enthusiasts are all looking for different experiences," Cox emailed, "so we have created different packages to address the needs of each of our guests.'

For instance, never one to be on the cutting edge of understanding, I found the plethora of options and ticket prices for Oktobeerfest 2014 dizzying. She cleared it all up for me. First off there's the Oktobeerfest Golf Outing which happens Friday September 12 at noon at Auburn's Bridgewater Golf Course. I'm not a golfer so the combination of beer and golf baffles me. But the golf thing seems to be popular with craft beer lovers, so I acted like I knew what was going on. For \$300 you and three of your closest friends get to pile into a couple golf carts and chase little white balls around some nicely mowed park-like areas. You also get to drink hand-crafted MadBrew, eat Shigs in Pit barbecue, indulge in a variety of snacks and beverages and spend the day doing something other than work-

Another seemingly incongruous pairing is that of beer and bicycles. Everywhere I go (i.e., brew pubs and bicycle shops) I see bicycles hanging from trees and hear the raucous laughter of the owners of those bicycles as they sip a pint or two of their favorite ale or lager. Well, leave it to the folks at Mad Anthony to unify these disparate activities in their own way. Beginning at 11 a.m. on Saturday September 13, the 2nd Annual Say OK! Gears & Beers Pub Pedal departs from Headwaters Park West for a leisurely tour of

some of downtown's Fort Wayne's favorite watering holes. Led by a MadBrew cyclist, the Pub Pedal combines exercise and beer culture in a safe and delicious way before returning to the park for the official 2 p.m. tapping of the kegs. The Pub Pedal and admission to Oktobeerfest will set you back \$45.

If golfing and beer and bicycling and beer don't

do it for you and you just want to sample some yummy beverages, the main event, the marketplace of mash, the bazaar of brew, the 2014 Oktobeerfest ticket is \$30. For that you get access to the 35 Indiana craft brewers and experts from Brewers Art Supply.

Then there is music and food. Elements of Cosmos, Rogues & Bandits and Desert Train will all be performing hourlong sets. And three of the Fort's most popular food trucks - Bravas, Big John's Ragin' Cajun and Affine - will be on hand as well.

"We will also have a Mad Brewer's Challenge this year," Cox wrote. "Hosted in conjunction with Brewer's Art Supply, the Challenge allows one home brewer the chance of having their beer recipe commercially brewed and served within all four Mad Anthony

Brewing Company brew pubs. The top 10 entries will be served at the festival and voted upon by attend-

For Mad Anthony co-owner Blaine Stuckey, the important thing is promoting craft beer.


"I am happy to see the number of independent craft brewers growing in Indiana to give our customers a better understanding of what craft beer truly is,"

"All of the different perspectives and personalities entering our brewing community are generating beers that connect with a broader audience. People are realizing that beer can be and is delicious. Beer is no longer a one-size fits all experience because of the number of craft brewers entering the scene.'

I had one last question for Cox about Oktobeerfest 2014: Why should I, an average beer drinker, plunk down \$45 to taste a bunch of fancy beers when I can get 90 Hamm's for \$36?

To which she replied, "You can actually attend our festival for less than the cost of 90 Hamm's; our general admission ticket is only \$30. But in all honesty this festival is not about beating the cost of an obscene amount of 'beer water'; it is about promoting Indiana craft beer culture and the amazing things going on in our own community. We encourage people new to the craft beer scene to come down and explore the different flavors showcased at our event. Our beers are brewed locally with traditional methods and a good amount of Hoosier flair."

Sounds good to me.

A lonely and forgotten park bench bathed in the light of a cool January sun is where all for One Productions begins their 2014-15 season, and if you hang on till the end, you'll be in for an endless succession of laughs, tears and insight.

An entire season of area-premiere plays will begin in September with Interval. Whether this show is a murder mystery or

a romantic comedy seems to be debatable, but it is unquestionably a play about relationships and their role in our

Jeannette Clift George is the author of Interval and a prolific playwright and founder of A.D. Players, a Christian theater company founded in the 60s and the first of its kind in the U.S. She brings a subtle message of faith through the characters and their search for fulfillment of spiritual needs.

Interval stars husband and wife Sam and Sarah Ward, two veterans of the all for One stage. The Wards have dabbled in directing and writing for afO over the years, but the stage is where creative director Lauren Nichols wanted to see them, and Interval will be the perfect vehicle for their spark and

Moving into the winter, the holiday season will bring us tales of America's most beloved pioneer girl, Laura Ingalls Wilder, in A Laura Ingalls Wilder Christmas. Playwright Laurie Brooks captures one of the few periods of Wilder's life that she didn't put into

Set in the late 1870s, the death of Laura's nine-month-old brother has cast a pall over

the family. They leave their homestead and move to what was, for them, the big city of Burr Oak, Iowa. While Pa struggles running a hotel, a business he's not cut out for, the family learns to lean on each other for support in an unfamiliar world while

dealing with the fresh pains of loss.

"As children's shows go, it's not quite as light and fluffy." Nichols said. "Laura never leaves the stage, and everything is from her point of view, so it's very much a child's view of things, which softens it somewhat. And there is a good amount of humor, so the humor offsets all of the poignant moments, and it's a big offbeat ending."

The Hearthstone Ensemble will perform throughout the show, adding to the ambiance of the 19th century setting with their early-American style of settlers' music, as well as Christmas carols.

When the snow melts in the spring, the afO season will resume on a somber note.

The Music Lesson is the story of a refugee couple from Bosnia trying to make a new home in the U.S. after moving on from the

who, he freely admits, is a much better musician than he'll ever be.

"She still plays in a little church in northern Georgia," Naish told me in a recent phone interview. "She tried to teach me when I was five, but you know how it is. It can be hard to learn from a parent, so I started taking lessons from various teachers and it worked out. It's been a very cool journey.'

Naish's journey has taken him from southern Florida (he lived in Miami from fifth grade through high school and attended Belmont College) to Nashville and finally to Fort Wayne where he recently settled in as Sweetwater Studios' executive producer.

As a teenager, he dropped the piano for a while in favor of the cello, and his mastery of that instrument


earned him a spot in the South Florida Youth Symphony and the Young Artists Baroque Society of Greater Miami. It also landed him a scholarship to Belmont where he majored in Music Business.

But his love affair with the strings was short lived. A finger injury ended his cello career, and in 1977 he moved to Nashville where he worked for many years as a session keyboardist for such heavy hitters as Dolly Parton, Boz Scaggs and Sandy Patti. He went on the road with Christian musician Scott Wesley Brown, and Naish said that he'll never forget that experience, which included three memorable trips behind the Iron Curtain.

We flew all over the country and the world, too," he said. "We were part of a ministry that brought instruments to people who didn't have access to what we have here keyboards, guitars, you name it. And then to get through customs we'd bring back whatever clunkers we found along the way. It was a really amazing time in my life."

Shortly thereafter, Naish began working as a producer of Christian music artists, a role he was clearly born to play. Wesley Brown had introduced him to Greg Nelson, a well known and respected Nashville producer whose client list includes Amy Grant and Michael W. Smith. Nelson found himself buried in work and tossed some projects Naish's way. It changed the course of his

"Greg opened so many doors for me. That's how I was able to produce Sandy Patti's work and Steve Green's. Then, together, we started working with Steven Curtis Chapman and that was incredible. I'm so grateful for the opportunity to work with someone like Steven who's not only a great writer but a great guy. He writes about things people go through every day and about how God can



touch someone, from the lowest lows to the

With more than 20 albums and 46 No. 1 Christian radio hits to his credit, Curtis Chapman is one of the most successful and prolific American Christian music artists of all time. Naish produced his first seven records, and the awards - both of the Grammy and Dove variety - poured in.

Naish, who took the job at Sweetwater in July at the urging of long-time friend Mark Hornsby, is happy to be living in Fort Wayne with his wife Becky and their two children. Aubrey and Davis. He's already brought a great deal of high-caliber Nashville talent to the Summit City and is excited to continue

The thing all of his clients have in common? They share his faith in a divine power. Unlike many working in the field, Naish does not shy away from the label "Christian

"I have a line I'll draw," he explains. "If the work is too much in conflict with my beliefs, I'll just pass on it. Music is an intuitive thing. It makes an emotional connection, and for me, music about Jesus and the love He brings is uplifting. It's about making a better life for yourself and your family, and I think it really speaks to the heart of people."

Despite the years he spent at the keyboard and with bow in hand, Naish is not anxious to make any albums of his own. He said he's much more comfortable in the producer role, which he likens to that of a general contractor on a house-building project. He loves being in on a project from the

"I'd much rather be in the background," he said. "I love the creative process of building the tracks and working with the musician's vision, but as for being out front, being the person everyone's looking at? Nah. that's not for me."

destruction of their own home, so many miles away.

"It's really perfect since we've heard so much about that part of the world in the news, and I don't know that many of us know as much over here as we ought to," Nichols said. "But I'm really excited to do another piece that will bring home to us, in our isolations over here, a little bit more of reality."

Ivan and Irena take refuge in Pittsburg and must begin again with their new life, taking on new students for music lessons so they can make a living. Irena is not ready to move on though, and her harrowing flashbacks recount the story of their lives in Bosnia.

Their first new students are siblings in the midst of their parent's ugly divorce. While teenager Kat wants as little to do with piano lessons as Irena does with teaching, they find that they are the only people that can help each other.

The season wraps up on an upbeat, comic note as afO audiences are transported not just back in time, but all over the earth in *Around The World in 80 Days*. The comic stage adaptation of the classic Jules Verne story will be directed by all for One veteran Jeff Salis-

bury and will have elements of steampunk in its highly stylized staging.

Though it would seem an impossible task to fit the world on a lone stage, the show is written to accommodate a small cast and makes use of creativity to portray its outlandish setting. Though ships and trains and even an elephant will be used in Phileas Fogg's journey, they will show up on stage in unexpected ways. And it will take creative acting as well as staging to make use of a cast of around 10 to portray more than 30 parts.

Interval plays Friday-Sunday, Sept. 19-21, while A Laura Ingalls Wilder Christmas will play over two weekends Nov. 7-9 and Nov. 14-16. In 2015, The Music Lesson will play Feb. 20-22 and Feb. 27-March 1, and Around the World in 80 Days will be staged April 24-26 and May 1-3.

Wade is currently planning and working to develop a show titled *Travels in Plastic* which will feature her Holga images. The show will run at Artlink from March 13 to April 15, 2015.

The Holga show is just one project on Wade's mind. She recently spent five hours cutting, until her thumb went numb, to free painstakingly intricate paper dolls from the pages that trapped them. Wade plans to use classic Tim Tierney paper dolls as her subjects for an upcoming series.

"I just ordered eight books covering subjects from celebrities to drag queens." The idea is to put the dolls into real situations and have them interact with different eras. For instance, 70s dolls will hang with drag queens and Victorian ladies in waiting. "I'll most likely shoot them in Polaroid," says Wade. "I'd love to set a few up at the Rialto reclamation."

Creativity and thought are the foundation of Wade's work. She is careful to add substance to her photos, as these days the argument goes, "Anyone with an expensive camera can be a photographer."

Teacher Wade pushes her students to think deeply about their work.

"I always ask them why. Because it's cool or pretty isn't enough," says Wade. "Make work about something you are passionate about. Does it make you angry? Does it make you want to research? Does it make you want to learn something else? Substance is important. A good photo must have content."

Those who have seen Wade's work know she follows her own advice. Her images are eerie, quirky, mysterious pieces that whisper beauty in layers. Many show both a focal point along with the hint of an outsider. In one image a nude woman peeks through a window while the foreground reveals a motorcycle's windshield and rearview mirror. The image initiates a story and sparks questions. It shows us where we are, what is in front of us and what is behind.

Wade is an artist who forces viewers to look at their world in a new way and perhaps question what we accept as truth. Wade's work stimulates thought and isn't that what art is all about?

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

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
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James and the Drifters

I can tell you this from witnessing their sets at Battle of the Bands XI



where they are semifinalists
that James and the Drifters can really work a crowd. They take their inspirations (My Morning Jacket, Band of Horses, Coldplay) and make the most of them.

All That Gold is the group's fourth album since its inception in 2010, and the music within is accomplished and explores a variety of musical possibilities. For instance, what if Dave Matthews tinkered around with more electronic-based instruments? What kind of music would Vampire Weekend make if they started wearing cowboy boots (if they haven't done so already)? What if Radiohead were to incorporate subtle shades of country and folk? Over the course of an hour, James and the Drifters attempt to answer a variety of their own musical questions and come away with 13 songs that make for an expansive breadth of sonic wisdom.

"Lucille the Wall" kicks off the album with a steady beat and keyboard part and serves as a compelling beginning before getting into slower acoustic songs like "Morning Light" and the touching "Happy Anniversary, Darlin'," which serve as the calm center of the album. The songs being touted as the singles, "Foxtrot" and "Til I Die," are indeed representative of the colorful tones of the album (as demonstrated by the cover art), and the latter single takes the unusual move of being saved for the climactic finale.

Admittedly, the vinyl version offers a clearer picture than does the CD of what James and the Drifters want to accomplish with *All That Gold*. Cut down to 10 tracks and with a slightly altered arrangement, the music makes a lasting impression and is closer to being a concise statement. Plus, the slight rearrangement of the track listing gives the audience another perspective as to how these songs can fit together.

Having the word "gold" in one's album title tends to hold the music within to a certain standard, and fortunately for James and the Drifters, they have managed to make an album where every song belongs, no matter where you choose to begin or end it. Staci Stork Bad History

If you don't know much about country music, you might think that it's an inhospitable place for women. With all the talk of traditional values and machismo, you might think a strong woman would be too threatening to country music fans. But all you have to do is take a quick look back through country music history to see how wrong you are.



Check out the way that Loretta Lynn ruled her household, or the way that June Carter mocked Johnny Cash's strutting in "Jackson." Strong country women have been around for a long time, and Staci Stork's *Bad History* showcases an even newer model of strong country woman – not just a woman who has her man firmly in hand, but one who doesn't need a man at all.

There's no traditional romance to be found on *Bad History*, not a

There's no traditional romance to be found on *Bad History*, not a single sentimental love song. Instead, there is song after song about love gone wrong and a woman who's going to be just fine on the other side of it. In "Give It Up," there's a woman who puts a gender twist on the masculine wishful thinking of songs like Toby Keith's "A Little Less Talk and A Lot More Action" by telling the goodlooking player at the bar to shut up and take her home already. And in "You Only Live Once" and "Wrong Just Right," there are rabidly

Nazz (1968)

Spins

Nazz were a band that featured a 20-year-old whiz kid named Todd Rundgren. They plied their garage rock/psychedelic sound in the late 60s and may be one of the best bands you have never heard.

The record opens with the lumpy rocker, "Open My



Eyes," which makes you immediately think of a hybrid between the Animals and the Monkees. "Back of Your Mind" brings the tempo down and reminds me of Cream during the same period. "See What You Can Be" is an homage to the British Invasion sound (Nazz were from Philadelphia) and is heavy in harmony while featuring a tight piano arrangement and a jazzy bass.

The original "Hello It's Me" (which Rundgren recorded again as a solo artist in 1972) appeared on this release, and side one closes with the fantastic "Wildwood Blues." Fans of Big Star will recognize the obvious influence Nazz had on them.

Side two opens with the folksy "If That's the Way You Feel" and leads you to think that the record may be slowing down. However, "When I Get My Plane" picks things back up, as does the guitar-driven "Lemming Song." It makes you wonder how this band was frequently passed over, as the musicianship is as equal to many other bands (The Who, Kinks) when the late 60s came to a close.

The album spins to a finish with the classic "She's Going Down," and if you play or enjoy the bass guitar, this funky little number is candy for your ears. There's even a little drum solo.

Nazz released just two more original albums in their brief career, and Rundgren has since enjoyed an outstanding solo career If you happen to like any of the bands mentioned above, go find this album and rediscover the late 60s. (*Dennis Donahue*)

independent young women who are determined to make mistakes and bad decisions simply because they're her decisions to make.

This is country pop in the style of Miranda Lambert, with all the rock guitars and "don't tell me what to do" attitude you'd expect from bar-ready country songs. *Bad History* rarely slows down the tempo, and even when it does, as in the mournful "Stars," there's plenty of fiery regret underneath the crooning to keep things interesting. It's just one more reminder that you need to put away your outdated notions about country music and gender roles. (*Evan Gillespie*)

Thousand Foot Krutch

Oxygen: Inhale

Ontario, Canada's Thousand Foot Krutch are those rarest of creatures: a Christian band that has achieved true crossover success in mainstream culture. Cranking out an amalgam of religious rap-metal since 1997, the band has found a home on active rock radio and in spots on ESPN commercials, movie soundtracks and the like. Their basic nu-metal/rap-metal sound



does sound a bit like an anomaly in contemporary music, not because of its religious content but because it was current circa 1998. Still, while *Oxygen: Inhale* doesn't necessarily tread any new ground the band manages to make it sound fresh, unlike the myriad of robo moshers cranked out on the metal assembly line.

The album kicks off to a raucous start with "Like a Machine," a stomper about being a war machine for their faith. Yes, hard-hitting as the music can be, TFK keep their message on the positive note; they're out to prove that religion and adrenaline aren't necessarily mutually exclusive. Sample lyric: "Yeah we might rock the party but we ain't gonna hurt nobody." The general positivity, which may partially reflect their Canadian origin, is another anomaly in a genre

rife with violent and enmity-filled content being the norm. It may actually account for some of their success, since it sets them apart from the pack and makes them a bit of a breath of fresh air.

Truthfully, though, the album is split almost in two stylistically, with the first half being loaded with the heavy aggro work the band is perhaps most famous for. The second half consists of a series of softer and quieter tracks, ranging from power ballad "I See Red" to the more intimately-rendered "In My Room" which finds the band in a vulnerable admission-offaith mode. Statements of vulnerability may not be unusual for faith-based music, but again, it makes the band stand out in stark contrast to the bluster and braggadocio typically found in aggressive music.

Oddly enough, the album's lead single, "Born This Way," shares its title with a Lady Gaga track. No, it's not a cover - all of the musical and lyrical content here are original – but they do share that tune's basic stance as a pride-filled statement of individuality. Only in this case TFK's statement has more to do with faith than whatever Gaga may have been referring to.

Their sound may make them sound slightly dated, but Oxygen: Inhale demonstrates that TFK can still inject some vitality into both mainstream and Christian musical circles. (Ryan Smith)

Bear in Heaven

Time Is Over One Day Old

Heaven's music creates both icy, blue moments of detachment and bright, technicolor sheets of emotion. Their debut album, Red Bloom of the Boom, was a collection of odd, experimental, industrial-esque



dirges that hinted at what was ahead. Their 2009 masterpiece, Best Rest Forth Mouth, kept some that darkness and translated it into a visceral tribal mix of Suicide and Tangerine Dream with an industrial sheen that mingled desire, loneliness and doomed, hopeless romance. I Love You, It's Cool, released in 2012, lost much of the band's dark tribal punch for jagged synth lines and a dance vibe that worked, but also lost a bit of the bite Bear In Heaven had previously honed.

Two years later, Bear In Heaven have returned with what is a perfect mix of darkness and light. Time Is Over One Day Old is a sparser, leaner album that has the vibe of earlier albums while eschewing the heavy dirges. Bottom line: Bear In Heaven have honed in on their strengths and kept things simple.

"Autumn" opens the album on a robotic beat and a hard-driving bass line that carries this great tune into dark, desolate space. It has everything you've come

to love about Bear In Heaven: strong, driving rhythm; icy synth; and Jon Philpot's distant, yet ghostly, inno-

cent voice carrying you along. This is a great way to

"Time Between" rolls in and takes you back to 2009 all over again. It's reminiscent of Beast Rest Forth Mouth's "You Do You." The tribal drums and big, foreboding synths hang in the air as Phipot humanizes the scene with his vocals. If there was a DNA strand depicting Bear In Heaven's sound, this track would be it. "If I Were To Lie" has a bit of a shuffle to it, giving this song something unique in the Bear In Heaven canon. "They Dream" mixes both the dark and light quite nicely, bringing some of the second half of I Love You, It's Cool into the fold. The synths have more of an ambient feel to them, with some of those

great rolling toms filling in the empty spots. But just

as the song gets going, it melts into this atmospheric, dream-like segment that lulls you into a quieter head space. It's a great moment.

'The Sun and the Moon and the Stars' floats by on a cloud of early 80s Echo and the Bunnymen. "Memory Heart" gets dark with a prominent bass line and some tribal drums reminiscent of early Cure before the chorus opens enough to let just the slightest bit of light in. "Dissolve The Wall" is this great atmospheric track that glides right by your ears, once again with a great bass line and Philpot's vocals hanging in the background in a curtain of reverb. The strangely uplifting "You Don't Need The World" is a perfect song with which to end a great album.

With Time Is Over One Day Old, Bear In Heaven have found their way back to that magic they created on Beast Rest Forth Mouth, this time honing it and making the songs more compact and pop-structured. At times I feel some of these songs could have been even longer and more expansive, but that's just me being difficult. Bear In Heaven have made a great album that gets better with each listen. Caroline Rose

I Will Not Be Afraid

So who is self-proclaimed hobo who lives in her van and writes crackling Americana tunes that get in your face and stay there for the duration? That would be Caroline Rose.



Her new album, I Will Not Be Afraid, brims with a confidence you might not expect from a mid 20-something songwriter who's putting out her first national release. But confidence and attitude are in no short supply here.

It doesn't take long for the opening track, "Blood on Your Bootheels," to spin up to speed and for Rose's take-charge vocals to let you know this is her stage. This song, reportedly inspired by the Trevon Martin shooting case, provides an initial jolt that manages to sustain throughout the album. That's not to say she's not nuanced; I Will Not Be Afraid exhibits plenty of nuance, and Rose isn't afraid to dig deep. "When you go, don't bother to tip your cap," she sings on the tightly wound but understated "When You Go." The sprightly "America Religious" has a bluegrass tempo and stately, restrained melodies. "Shepherd" is a spare, haunting number that, in a perfect world, would define "modern" country. It's a breathtaking performance. "Red Bikini Waltz" brings to mind early Dylan and even Woody Guthrie, with its lyrical juxtaposition of the greedy and the hungry pouring out in a torrent while Rose furiously strums her acoustic guitar. You almost feel she's playing to the back of a roomful of folks, unplugged, making sure to be heard.

By the time you get to the chugging, irresistible title track at the end of the album, you may feel as if you've heard something both shiny new and old as the hills. Sonically, I Will Not Be Afraid hits all the buttons, with a perfect combination of vintage flavor and a tasteful sense of space. Not a note overstays its welcome, which means the vocals (deservedly) remain front and center. Caroline Rose's musical fearlessness plus her dogged determination will definitely make her an artist to watch for. She's made an excellent first impression with this record. (D.M. Jones)

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
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



The Dog's Sad, But Shows How Far We've Come

I was seduced by a movie trailer. The trailer for *The Dog*. the new documentary by Allison Berg and Frank Kerauden, is the story of the life and times of John Wojtowicz. He is the character behind or at the heart of Sidney Lumet's Dog Day Afternoon. The trailer makes the real man seem much more interesting than the guy Al Pacino played. He's funny and colorful in the trailer, but in *The Dog* those colorful qualities take on an ever darker hue. The funny runs out, and the story gets almost impossibly sad.

Yes, this is the man who robbed a bank to pay for a sex change operation for his wife (a man). That's what is portrayed in *Dog Day Afternoon*, but details of the story are too explicit and extreme for a feature film back in the day, even if Sidney Lumet is at the helm.

Who would have believed the true story? Or, rather, how could this man's life be captured in a feature film? Probably the only way was Lumet's way – by focusing on the craziest, most theatrical incident and playing to the crazy of the situa-

By the time John walks into the bank at Avenue P and East Third Street in Brooklyn, he has already lived more life than most people do in their whole lives. The saying is that "youth is wasted on the young."

This is not true in John's case, though few youth or old folks would choose this life.

He was 27 when he robbed the bank, and by that time he had grown up in Brooklyn, served in Vietnam, married a woman (the marriage was almost dissolved on the first night), fathered two children, left that wife, become involved with the Gay Activists Alliance after the Stonewall riots and taken up with his second wife (a man named Ernie Aron).

That is the quick take on these events. In *The Dog* we are treated to wonderful interviews with a range of folks, including John, to flesh out what a bad boy he was. Carmen, his first wife, is the mildest of the crew. There is a nice quote from a neighborhood guy, who calls John "a hell of a pleas-



Mom Terry probably deserves her own film. We don't quite learn why she is the way she is, and that is a shame. She is no longer alive, and there is no wealth of archival material to give us any clues. Terry doesn't tell us much about how John got to be the way he is specifically, but she's proof enough that there is a mad streak of being yourself in this family. What she does give us is lots of stories about John's exploits, before prison and after. She is nonchalant about John bringing home strung-out club kids once he gets home from prison.

In the middle of all of this is John himself, whom the filmmakers met and started interviewing in 2002. In these interviews he is a roly-poly guy with bad teeth, a twinkle in his eye, lots of attitude, a Brooklyn accent that is thick and real and a lot of stories to tell. John died of cancer in 2006, and in later interviews he has lost weight but not much else. He is a dog, talking easily about his libido, but also a romantic, talking about "love at first sight" on a couple of occasions.

In these interviews, John and the film crew visit Brooklyn and Manhattan. John recounts how he joined gay rights organizations mostly to pick up men. We meet people who were his intimates, including his second wife who now goes by the name of Liz Debbie Eden, and his third wife George Heath. There aren't happy endings for people playing outside of normal during these times.

We don't hear too much about the actual robbery (for that you can just watch Dog Day Afternoon), but we do hear how John just picked up potential accomplices and drove around Brooklyn looking for banks that looked vulnerable. We meet various locals who were part of the crowd that gathered during the robbery and even one guy who was in the bank at the

time of the robbery. All these folks remember the event fondly, which just

proves New Yorkers, real New Yorkers, are a pretty resilient. unflappable, "seen that, done that" strain in our country. Hey a gun went off before they even got in the bank, and any crime that includes pizza delivery is a real New York event. In language that is both hilarious and titillating (and not

really appropriate here), John describes the arguments he and Ernie had about Ernie's desire for a sex change operation. Ernie's attempted suicide and incarceration in a psych ward is what turns around John's thinking.

Before Stonewall, New York City cops had been using their busts of gay men to shore up their image as crime fighters. After the Stonewall riots, when a much fuller account of what dishonest players the police had been were made public, they couldn't get away with the same level of nonsense. John's declaration that he was gay and would release a hostage when Ernie was released probably helped keep him safe and alive. We get some perspective on the advance of gay rights from talking heads who were more committed to the advancement of rights for homosexuals.

John, post-prison, takes advantage of his celebrity. The photo of John in an "I Robbed This Bank" shirt in front of the bank is pretty funny, but much of the media circus of the day is more grim than today's. Today, celebrity is so much more profitable that the unusual is easily made palatable. Celebrity can be based on nothing other than celebrity (for instance, everything Kardashian).

When a partner in John's crime complains about how he is being treated in the media, the response is "it's only a freak show to them." John didn't let being perceived as a freak get in his way. Bank robbery is a crazy way to get what you need, but since raging homophobia isn't the norm anymore, many fewer lives are being ruined because by desperate behavior. The range of folks who deserve respect and an opportunity for "the pursuit of happiness" has expanded.



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



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Eccentricity Isn't Everything

The Good Inn by Black Francis and Josh Frank, Itbooks, 2014

I've never heard any explanation of the Pixies' significance that wasn't a tautology: the Pixies are great because they're so awesome. If you don't go to the band for the first time with the expectation that you're going to love it, chances are that you're going to come away confused, and no one's going to be able to give you much guidance toward proper appreciation of the music. The same is true, unfortunately, for *The Good Inn*, a new graphic-novel-ish book by Pixies frontman Charles Thompson (who sometimes goes by the nickname "Black Francis") and writer Josh Frank. The book depends on the assump-

tion that its eccentricity is enough to compel readers to enjoy it, and if that's not true, there's not much for the book to fall back on.

The book's premise is anything but simple, and it requires a lengthy introduction by Frank to set the stage. Thompson, Frank explains, had heard of a lost French film from the beginning of the 20th century that had the distinction of being the first pornographic film to feature a narrative plot. Thompson had the idea of writing and recording a soundtrack for the film. The problem was that the film itself no longer existed, and its plot was minimal: a soldier comes to an inn and

has sex with the innkeeper's daughter. There wasn't much (there was, in fact, essentially nothing) to hang a soundtrack on. Since there was no film and no story, it's not easy to say what inspired Thompson to want to write a soundtrack, or even what he was writing a soundtrack for, but for some reason he was intrigued.

Thompson's idea was to enlist Frank, who had written a book about the Pixies and who was currently trying to write a rock musical about puppets, to write a new screenplay based on the old film. The ultimate goal was to create a new film with the Pixies' music



as its score. That didn't happen, or hasn't happened yet. The book *The Good Inn* can be seen as either an intermediate step on the way to the finished film, or as a redirected project that salvages the original idea. Either way, the book is a strange hybrid project that doesn't fit comfortably into any niche.

Since the original film had no plot to speak of, Frank needed to create an elaborate story from scratch. What he comes up with is a surreal tale about a solider who falls in love with an innkeeper's daughter and subsequently gets swept up in a bizarre alternate-reality version of pre-World-War-I Paris. Frank uses nitrocellulose. a combustible material that was once used to make both motion picture film stock and explosives, to draw a metaphorical link between soldiers, war and film, and he populates the story with fictionalized versions of reallife historical figures and events. The structure of the book is

as sketchy as its narrative. The text consists of a screenplay with its dialogue linked together by substantial descriptions of scenes. The text is augmented with illustrations by cartoonist Steven Appleby. The illustrations are loosely and primitively drawn with black ink; some of them are colored with broad watercolor washes.

In his introduction, Frank describes the book as "an illustrated novel, based on an in-the-works sound-track, for a feature-length film that has yet to be made, about the first narrative pornographic movie ever made." It's a giddily self-referential project that relies heavily on its impossible-to-categorize nature. Parts

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Guardians Ruling the Universe

just under \$30 million in the U.S. Supposedly a great flick.

Taking the No. 4 spot at the box was As Above/So Below, a promising-looking high-concept thriller from director John Erick Dowdle. The film sold a respectable \$8.3 million over its first three days of release in the U.S. and another \$2.4 million in tickets abroad. Another surprise hit, buddy cop flick Let's Be Cops, rounded out last weekend's Top 5, selling \$8.2 million while upping the flick's so-far total to a very surprising \$57 million. Dang, sit-com stars Jake Johnson and Damon Wayans Jr., ya'll done right. But really, this is such a pathetic time of the year for movies that just about any heavily promoted flick could probably kick a little box office booty.
