Characters on Canvas

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As a student schlepping drinks to earn her way through college, Alexandra Hall watched her patrons carefully as they slipped into topsy-turvy conversation and sometimes on to sloppy oblivion. Hall entertained herself by attaching a variety of cartoonish traits to hobbling drinkers. Anthropomorphic characters lived in her mind, each one a reflection of a customer. Most became images of juicy, high-society frogs, the first growing from a particularly well-dressed woman adorned with a hat, heels and pearls. Hall collected the images in her mind, then set to work on canvas where she released bold colors with broad brush strokes, capturing the energy of her characters with a sense of humor spiked with

A self-taught artist, Hall studied Russian and biology at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor. She was all set to head to medical school when her own brother threw her a curve ball. Knowing Hall had been a "closet artist

for a very long time," Hall's brother asked if he could purchase all the paintings she had ever produced. When she questioned his motives, she learned that her brother had booked a show for her work at the Dash-In on Calhoun Street.

That was one year ago. Since that first surprise show which pushed Hall out of her closet, her hobby has turned into a full-time operation, and at least for now she has put med school on hold. It seems that when Hall commits, she commits 100 percent, and she has proven that - with thoughtful focus and

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drive – an artist can make it. Hall learned early on that building a network is key to making any business endeavor a success. She joined the Fort Wayne Artist League, a group known for more conservative and seasoned artists, and was quickly swooped up and supported. Hall gleans knowledge from the group's experience and feels supported by them as she works to broaden her client base. In turn, they welcome her youthful spirit and enjoy the knowledge of technology that she shares.

"People from the guild always make a


quirks of their own family members. Many ask for nods

There's lots more, of course, so read on and find yourself some fun stuff to do for Halloween and beyond. Just remember to tell 'em who sent you.

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
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----- Cover Story • Blue Oyster Cult -----'More Cowbell' for Doc

great music. And great music demands a party - which is exactly what is planned to mark the 35th anniversary of Doc's arrival in Fort Wayne. With Blue Oyster Cult taking the stage, it's sure to be a memorable night and one that reflects the affection this city has for its adopted son.

'You know, it really just comes down to how much Doc has affected everyone's lives," says longtime colleague and friend J.J. Fabini who is also WXKE program director. "For me, personally, he's been my second dad for 20 years, and I cannot begin to explain how I feel about him. But for everyone he has worked with, and for music lovers and rockers that he has formed relationships with, whether in person or just by being on the radio in Fort Wayne for 35 years, he has been a positive, nearly spiritual influence. Doc's magic has touched this town in a way that I honestly believe no one else ever has.

Thirty-five years is a long time, but it's been more than 40 years since Blue Oyster Cult came on strong in the music scene, taking over radio airwaves with the ubiquitous hit "Don't Fear the Reaper" along with several other memorable tunes which made them one of the elite bands of the era. At no point in those four decades has the band disappeared, making it possible for BOC to continue to grow their fan base over the years and invite younger generations to the party. Not all of the original band members remain, with Allen Lanier a notable departure. But several additions, including Utopia's Kasim Sulton, have kept the band rolling along.

Donald "Buck Dharma" Roeser is among those who have chosen to stick around, giving the band its distinctive lead guitar. Roeser's better known stage name has endured all these years, providing him an unusual alias within the band.

"During the formative period of de-

velopment when we were first starting the band, we all considered having pseudonyms," he now recalls. "We all came up with names, but I was the only one who liked mine so I decided to continue to be Buck Dharma. It gave me an alter ego. Now I answer to both names, depending on whether I'm wearing my Buck hat or my Don hat."

Roeser admits that when the band first formed, he would never have believed that they'd still be performing together all these years later. He credits the changes in music and the openness of new generations for keeping their sound alive.

"I really credit the internet and the total destruction of the record business for keeping us going. One consequence of music being free and available on the internet is that young people have discovered us and have enjoyed our music. That's really how the classic bands have stayed in business and can continue to play to large audiences. Popular music is so fragmented now, and the younger fans are listening to classic rock n' roll along with new music which now bears no resemblance to our music. But they can have their music and still want to rock out in that manner. Kids will always have new music that their parents don't like, which is pretty much a requirement for any generation, but they will also listen to their parents' music."

Years ago, young fans of rock were not as generous with their parents' music, and Roeser admits that his generation wasn't very accepting of the music his father, a jazz saxophonist, was playing. But he readily admits that it provides a strong influence in his own playing.

"Definitely as a musician I've been

influenced. My dad is 91 now, and he still plays his sax. And growing up with that jazz and big band music has shaped

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my own style as a guitar soloist." Aside from playing 50-70 shows each year, Blue Oyster Cult have taken the time in recent years to celebrate their longevity with a boxed set, complete with 16 CDs

and one DVD covering their long history of radio hits and fan favorites. Roeser says they contributed to the effort, but they were

also pleased with what Columbia Records put together, including lost

live tracks and a few forgotten gems, to sum up the history of the many years together. He says it surprises even him that they have accomplished so much over the

"It's not as if we planned to

do it this long. When we signed our record contract, I thought we'd do one, two, maybe three records and be done with it. Then it stretched on to one decade, then two, then three. But if you have to work, this is the best kind of work you can do. The travel is the hard part, but the chance to play music is

Roeser has also enjoyed some success on his own turf, notably with his web-based series The Dharmas, a witty takeoff on The Osbornes, a sitcom variation with a somewhat fictionalized version of his own family which he and his wife have enjoyed immensely. The tongue-in-cheek look at family life is just one way that Blue Oyster Cult have become part of popular culture outside of their own musical catalog.



Tears for Fears. Genesis. Spock's Beard. Giraffe. The Mike Keneally Band. Fate Warning. Amaran's Plight. Mystery. Cosmograf. Strattman. Thud. Big Big Train. That's just a short list of the bands Los Angeles native Nick D'Virgilio has played with during his more than two decades-long drumming career. And now the man friends affectionately call "NDV" has landed in Fort Wayne, working as a studio percussionist and web content writer for Sweetwater Sound.

A move to the heartland has, admittedly, proved a major life change for D'Virgilio who, just prior to signing on with Sweetwater, was touring the world as part of Cirque du Soleil's Totem show, but he said he and his family are glad to call Fort Wayne home.

"My kids are happy, my wife's happy, we have land around us," he said in a recent phone interview. "Plus, everyone is so kind and we've discovered some great restaurants and coffee shops. We realized a while ago that L.A. isn't the only place to live, and Fort Wayne's nice. It's between a lot of big cities, so if we need that fix, we can get it. Overall, it's turning out to be pretty comfortable.

D'Virgilio started playing the drums at the tender age of four when his father, apparently tired of his son's habit of pounding on pots and bands, brought him home a drum set and a pair of sticks. A few years later he picked up the guitar, thanks to his older brother, and he also taught himself how to sing. As a teenager he attended the Dick Grove School of Music in L.A. and, like many rockers before and after him, began playing out wherever he could - at weddings,

"I hustled around for a few years," he said. "Then in 1994 I got my big break. I met Kevin Gilbert, just randomly, and everything sort of fell into place from

Gilbert was at the time fronting popular Southern California band Toy Matinee. He was also working as a musician, songwriter and composer and was dating Sheryl Crow. It was through Gilbert that D'Virgilio met the members of the songwriting collective Tuesday Night Music Club, as well as the dudes from Tears for Fears and Genesis. From 1995 to 2008, D'Virgilio worked as drummer for Tears for Fears, and in 1996 he took Phil Collins's much-coveted spot behind the kit to help Genesis record their final studio album, Calling All Stations.

The Genesis gig was a dream come true for D'Virgilio who grew up idolizing Collins. "That was totally surreal," D'Virgilio said. "Phil

Collins was my favorite drummer as a kid, so never in my wildest dreams did I think I'd get a chance to work with Genesis. It was a trippy experience, to say the least, hanging out in the studio with the guys and all their Gold records. And they're all so easy-going and mellow. It was just one of those once in a lifetime surprises you never expect to happen."

Around this same time, D'Virgilio joined the now legendary prog-rock band Spock's Beard and toured and made albums with his mates - Dave and Alan Morse, Ryo Okumoto, Jimmy Keegan and Ted Leonard - for the better part of 20 years. It was a wild, successful and growth-filled ride that came to an end for D'Virgilio in 2010 when he joined Cirque du Soleil, working first as a drummer and later as a frontman and still later as band leader.


He said his four-and-a-half-year stint with Totem was an incredibly enriching cultural experience for him and his family. He got to take his wife Tiffany and children, Sophia and Anthony, on the road with him, and together they traveled all over the U.S., Canada and Europe.

"It turned out to be a wonderful gig. Cirque schooled my kids and provided us with apartments every time we moved. It was pretty amazing, playing this big rock show and going to work with my family nearby.

"And there were people on the tour from 19 different countries, so my kids had the chance to meet people from very different walks of life and see parts of the world they might not otherwise get to see.

You might think that the transition from L.A. musician and world traveler to resident of Fort Wayne would be a rough one, or at least one filled with culture shock, but D'Virgilio said he's excited to be a part of the Sweetwater family and to throw himself into the recording of a new original album with friends Randy McStine and Jonas Reingold and an all-ukulele project with Bakithi Kumalo, Paul Simon's former bassist and the man behind that now famous bass line on Simon's hit "Call Me Al."

"I'm really glad to be at Sweetwater and grateful to my friend Mark Hornsby for bringing me on board," he said. "I think there's a lot of opportunity for me to grow here along with the company and be creative as well."



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
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Preparing for Bigger Things

Fort Wayne's community of actors continues to grow and excel with every year, thanks in part to the world-class education provided at IPFW Department of Theatre.

One of the university's many star students is Darby LeClear.

Having overcome academic struggle, teenage insecurity and stage fright, LeClear

embodies how the arts – both as a participant and an observer – can improve lives.

"I was a very enthusiastic child," she says. "I loved things that were bright and filled with laughter. My mother would style my long hair into crowns of braids or curls. But I loved to run and play hard and I would come home with my hair an absolute mess."

As much as she loved playing outdoors, she discovered she also loved performing onstage. Her first role was in an elementary school production written by the mother of a classmate. "I can't recall what the show was about," LeClear says, "but I believe it involved space and fairy tale characters."

She enjoyed the attention she received onstage but she also recognized at that early age her own talent for performing.

But then she hit the 'tween years, and she became shy about being in front of people.

Still, determination to perform led her to her first audition early in her sophomore year at North Side High School. She tried out for the role of a feisty Italian woman in the play *Lend Me a Tenor*.

"I have always had a knack for dialects," she says, "so I read well

and had a lot of fun doing it." However, because the cast was small and there were plenty of experienced upperclassmen at auditions, she did not get the part. But even as a young teenager she had no regrets, and the experience gave her the confidence to audition for the school's musical production of *Disney's Beauty and the Beast* later that year

She auditioned for Belle, the lead role, and it marked one of the first times she had ever sung in front of other people. Nerves, coupled with illness that day, hampered her audition.

However, her innate talent and passion for character creation shone through, and the director asked her to read for Babette, the sexy French maid-turned-broom.

"I instantly felt that was the part I should have," she says. "Everything about it, from the dramatics to the French accent, was so much fun and so completely different from who I was at the time."

Nevertheless, she was still suffering from shyness. "I had terrible stage fright," she recalls. "But playing a character so overthe-top helped me begin pushing past it in a way I am thankful for every day."

LeClear would do four more shows at North Side, and with each role she not only grew as an actor, but she grew in maturity as well.

She played the title role in *Hello*, *Dolly!* and calls it one of her most challenging so far. "Dolly is so smart and determined and comfortable with who she is, and at the time



I felt the complete opposite," she explains. "That role taught me how to be confident in many aspects of my life."

By the time she was a junior she realized theater was her calling – "but I didn't really know what to do about that," she says. The following year she "began to panic" as she struggled to find the right path toward higher education. Her drama director, Michael Morris, encouraged her to look into IPFW scholarships with the advice that she work a little harder in her classes and get her attendance up.

"He really pushed me," she says. "I am so thankful he was there to help me, or I would have been completely lost."

She graduated North Side in 2012 and won a scholarship to IPFW. But the old feeling of insecurity reared its head before classes even began. She worried about making friends, about getting cast in shows and about making a good impression on her professors, she says. "I had built it up so much in my head that when I got there and found out that everyone was warm and friendly and extremely welcoming, I felt absolutely

silly [for having worried]."

She is now a junior and just completed her fifth role at IPFW. "The close-knit community of the IPFW theatre department has been incredible," she says. "The department's small size gives its students some unique advantages that bigger programs do not. I don't think I could have found a better place to further my education."

Her education has given her a good ba-

sis for audition prep work, including researching roles and choosing audi-

researching roles and choosing audition material. She chooses her songs or monologues well in advance so she has time to connect with the material, and then she constantly rehearses it. For vocal auditions she begins warming up the moment she wakes up in the morning and in the car she sings along to a playlist of songs in the same range as her audition piece to stretch her voice beyond the song's requirements.

As prepared as she is, she still finds auditions to be nerve-wracking. "Positive thinking goes such a long way for me," she says, "so I try to keep myself in that mind set, reminding myself that 'I can do this."

Once cast, LeClear buys a small notebook that stays with her during the rehearsal process. "I write down things I have questions about or impressions I get of the character and their relationships with other people," she says.

As a theater student she also enjoys the benefit of table work with the other cast members. "We all discuss our opinions and feelings about certain elements of the show," she says. "I love figuring out what a character wants, what they dream of, what they're afraid of, who they love, who they hate. Things like that

make a character feel alive to me."

She says she approaches her character study as if she were getting to know a new friend. "In that way, the characters stay with you for the rest of your life," she says, "be-

cause you have invested so much of yourself in learning who they are."

Her education at IPFW has also included a variety of different performance techniques. "They all influence the way I view rehearsal and performance," she says, "but I'm not sure if my acting style falls neatly into one category or another. I believe it's my job to take a character and tell her story, and I want to do that story as much justice as Lean."

She takes this responsibility more seriously than she did before college. "My interest in theatre has evolved into more of an interest in human emotion," she says. "I am fascinated by the idea that an actor can tell a story in a way that moves an audience into feeling many different things."

She understands that characters suffer

of the process involves sending quality photos of an artist's booth space – quite a task when no such booth exists.

"I put all my energy into everything that I do," says Hall, who set up her first booth in her backyard and filled it with nothing but drinking frogs in order to photograph the setup to send off with her inaugural juried

show application. It was a longshot, but her efforts met with success and she now finds herself turning down invitations to art fairs.

Hall credits her success to family. Five siblings provide a supportive network led by two parents who have coached her along the way. Her mother works in real estate, and since Hall's childhood, has modeled successful business practices that the artist continues to follow today. Hall proudly claims that her mother taught her to set goals in order to move precisely and effectively forward.

"My mom is a realtor, raised five kids and kept us all alive," says Hall. "That required constant organization. When we were younger she made us keep planners for school and helped us make lists for each day. You achieve more when you have things listed."

Hall has lists of where her pieces are and when to pick them up.

"It's a constant juggle when you have a show," says Hall. "You have to shuffle pieces, make sure they will be available for specific shows and keep track of everything in between."

Hall relies heavily on social media to promote her work. Facebook and Twitter have helped her sell pieces.

"To have so many avenues to use, it is difficult to keep track of them all," says Hall who also keeps on top of regular mailings to clients. She claims she would have not thought to do those things if she hadn't seen her mother gain success from them.

While she has a head for business, Hall isn't all work and no play. Her work clearly reflects her high-energy passion for life. She often paints while listening to music, which is evident in her guitar series that directly channels blues and classic rock.

Hall limits her color palate to the primary colors: red, blue, yellow and white. She mixes all her colors as she goes along.

"All my colors are very unique," says Hall as she describes her style as "loose, fun and colorful." Her drinking frog pieces have starry eyes and slack faces. Sizes are large, averaging 30 by 40 inches. Each piece has a personality which she constructed inside her own mind as she daydreamed while handing drinks to patrons.

Whenever possible Hall handdelivers her work to clients. She once presented a painting as a Fathers Day gift to a

"He cried," says Hall. "People are somehow mystified by meeting the artist. I think it is funny.'

Drinking frogs are certainly beyond the traditional barn and sunset paintings that many have come to expect from this region. Luckily for artists, the market is expanding to include a broader range. Hall says there are young people in town who want more out of the art scene.

'Young people want art from a local artist. They are part of what is making downtown different and they are turning things around. It is all very interesting to watch."

Hall is proud to be part of the movement to bring more contemporary and unusual art



to the city. She recently held her first solo show at Northside Galleries and plans to keep moving forward with the momentum she has gained. For now, med school is still on hold.

"I took a year off to pursue the art thing," she says. "I hit the ground running." With a show schedule packed to capacity, Hall's plans to attend med school may have been permanently derailed by singing guitars and drinking frogs.

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The Lurking Corpses

Workin' for the Devil

The Lurking Corpses have been causing musical havoc for years in the Fort and beyond. As much a theatrical delight as a musical one, they're monsters stalking stages and countrysides, but with point guitars rather than axes and chain saws. They stalk stages like the damned looking for another soul to steal, all the while creating a vile, cursed



noise that's equal parts The Misfits, Iron Maiden and late night creature features. Their newest evil creation, the demonically righteous *Workin' for the Devil*, doesn't disappoint.

Like a cross between Hammer Films, Clive Barker and early Venom, the title track opens this godforsaken horror metal atrocity with equal parts metal fervor and punk rock anarchy. "The Gate" gurgles and spits occult vitriol and howls otherworldly screams that would make King Diamond cower in fear. "The Leech and the Worm" sports some killer (no pun intended) riffing and creepy sound clips. It's like Glen Danzig fronting Diamond Head. "Tonight" could pass for a single – if Satan's henchmen could write such a thing. It's an upbeat song that could even fool the pure at heart to tap their feet to it.

Elsewhere, "Blind Dead Rise," "She's Alone Again" and "Dead F**k" eviscerate ear holes and minds with some blistering speed metal and ritualistic damning. "Lady Frankenstein" sounds like The Ramones reanimated for the sake of destroying the world. "You're Dead" sounds, well, how you'd think it would. "In Hell (I Wait for You)" is almost a love song for the damned, complete with "Palisades Park" organ and some clean guitar in the verses. Of course, this is a love song created by a bunch of monsters who happen to be Satan's henchmen. It's a blood-spattered love song. There's even a "hidden" track in the form of a cover of Slayer's "Tormentor," a fitting tribute to Jeff Hanneman.

Workin' for the Devil is bloody mayhem and demonic aural delights. It's Creature Feature for your ears, a ghoulish, putrid good time. Grab a copy before All Hallows Eve. (John Hubner)

Blonde Redhead

Barragan

Ever since I first listened to Blonde Redhead nearly seven years ago, there seems to be a group of hardcore fans that's equally matched with ardent naysayers who compare this New York trio to the classic "artsy" bands and musicians of yesteryear. I don't hear it, to be honest. I don't think the naysay-



ers have a leg (wooden or otherwise) to stand on. 23 was the album that made me a fan and led me to *Misery Is a Butterfly* and *Melody of Certain Damaged Lemons*. Blonde Redhead do this cool thing where they make melancholy, bittersweet music that doesn't make you melancholy or bittersweet. Theirs is a spacey, dreamy kind of shoegaze that is just as baroque and classicist as it is ragged and modern. *Penny Sparkle*, from 2010, was a pretty downbeat affair, leaning as close to easy listening as Kazu Makino and brothers Amedeo and Simone Pace have ever come, but it still contained some amazing moments of dark pop and mournful sway. *Barragán* is even quieter than *Penny Sparkle* in some ways, but it's also one of their strangest and boldest records in 10 years.

Barragán is a late night record. It aches and yearns to be played after dusk. Makino sounds as great as ever, and the production is dark and breathy, with the idiosyncrasies pulled down to just a subtle nuance. "Lady M" springs and bounces like a clock not quite telling time, while "Dripping" is sleek and sexy and has a great dance floor vibe. "Cat on Tin Roof" is slinky and playful. Simone Pace's vocals have come a long way since the Misery Is a Butterfly days, moving from a slightly awkward stance to sounding really comfortable on the excellent "Mind To Be Had." With a krautrock vibe, the song almost becomes transcendent in its nearly nine-minute length. "Defeatist Anthem (Harry and I)" is sad and absolutely beautiful. Naysayers or not, no one makes beautiful songs quite like Blonde Redhead can.

Roky Erickson & the Aliens

Five Symbols (1980)

Roky Erickson was born in Texas after World War II and is remembered most for his ground-breaking work with the 13th Floor Elevators. A pioneer in the psychrock movement, Erickson was a believer in LSD experimentation and was diagnosed with paranoid schizophrenia when he was just 21.



The creative thought process may have been compromised, but there was a still a career of music to be had. This work, like most of his music, is abstract and weird, yet organic (especially through a good set of speakers).

This album features themes of Satan, zombies and aliens. Musically, it's a nice bridge from the late 70s to the early 80s.

"Two Headed Dog" kicks it off, and you get some hoarse vocals from Erickson as well as great guitars and percussion from his top-notch garage band. It has a feel of Warren Zevon and Television, but rocks enough to remain relevant 35 years later.

"Don't Shake Me Lucifer" has a West Texas roadhouse sound and a simple chorus with a funky R&B ambiance. The first side ends with "Night of The Vampire," a cool track that has hypnotic, fuzzy keyboards and a hint of psychedelic. Erickson wasn't a lost soul; he just had a lot going on in his head.

Side two opens with another rocker in "White Faces" and again deals with religious and occult themes. At this point in his career, Erickson believed that a Martian had inhabited his body. Martians or no, he could still write music, and it may have been the only thing that kept him around.

His music was dark, maybe just ridiculous. He might be a novelty, even a dated one. But this is an album that I really, really enjoy. I invite you to discover the unique, engaging madness of Roky Erickson. (*Dennis Donahue*)

Part alien, part naivety and utter brilliance. "Penultimo" is nearly as beautiful, with Makino's lovelorn delivery and the simple drum beat. "Seven Two" is awash in echos and reverbed guitar, as if sung from another dimension.

Naysayers will be naysayers; that's their job. "Halfhearted," "a cold fish of a record," "dead-eyed and clammy" – these are just a few things said to describe *Barragán* (in one review, no less.) This album is anything but halfhearted. It's subtle, moving and quite beautiful. But what do I know? (*John Hubner*)

Daniel Amos

Doppelganger

I remember it as if it were yesterday. The little experience I had with Christian music involved Russ Taff, Michael W. Smith and Whiteheart. Then came a wacky satirical band called The Swirling Eddies whose music had depth beyond typical novelty albums. I joined their fan club (got me a tube of



Swirling Eddies toothpaste!) and found that they used to be a band named Daniel Amos and so ordered a cassette entitled Doppelgänger.

My first clue that I had strayed far from the path of safe, youth pastor-approved Christian music was the opening track, "Hollow Man," which found lead singer Terry Taylor singing and speaking cryptic words over a song being played backwards, the forward words sometimes mixing with the backwards words to add further discomfort to the listener. Very weird, yet very intriguing – and is that a T.S. Elliot reference? The next song, "Mall All Over The World" starts with bassist Tim Chandler attacking his instrument in a frenzy of slapped, popped and punched notes. New wave stabs of keyboards joined by razor guitars soon enter as the song progresses to a disjointed rock song and the lyrics take jabs at a consumer cul-

ture, drawing an analogy between indoor malls and a warped view of heaven. The twitchy "Real Girls" laments how people have degraded to one-dimensional images while the hyped up 50s rock of "New Car!" takes a swipe at the Prosperity Gospel by setting the song in a game show.

The aggressive "Youth With a Machine" is a personal favorite with a killer off-balanced yet melodic bass line that undergirds lyrics that are typical of the album, words that require intentional dissection to understand ("Wild grid of noise chants "Life is negation" / He's drowning in echo / Amid the stained glass towers / Dead the innocent? / Gone the hour? / He needs you now, now more than ever"). "The Double" is another rocker, built upon a ratty guitar riff and wide melodic leaps that musically illustrate lyrics concerning the bifurcation of physical body and spirit.

Side two seems aimed more at the church. The frenzied, ballsy "Memory Lane" is packed with zany guitar fills and convicting lyrics of "It's another flat testimony / Inflated with emotional gas / The truth never changes / But shouldn't you?"

"Angels Tuck You In" looks at the near worship of angels, and "Little Crosses" turns its gaze at the trend of wearing crosses as jewelry but having no effect upon the wearer. "Autographs For The Sick" falls under the category of "What were they thinking?" If I had to make a list of the top 10 most confusing songs I've ever heard, this one would certainly be on it.

"I Didn't Build It For Me" is a bouncy, energetic song that tumbles over itself in its eager glee to reveal itself, again with an amazingly fun bass line. "Here I Am" is a meta-song which concerns the disconnection that occurs in what is supposed to be a very relational faith, connecting with fans "by way of stereo / making minimal contact" and "attending Sunday service (it's crowded so I watch it on the TV in the foyer)." As with the other songs, the lyrics are thought provoking, perhaps a bit heady, but always couched in humor.

At a time when Christian music consisted of Amy Grant, Sandi Patti and The Gaithers, *Doppelgänger* by Daniel Amos was a subversive shot across the bow. "Dark" and "edgy" are overused terms these days, but they were new back in 1982 and certainly were not ever associated with Christian music. One look at the creepy cover, though, and you knew *Doppelgänger* was going to be breaking a few rules. Out of print for over a decade, the band has finally reissued this landmark album and did a right good job. You get a re-mastered version of the album, a second CD of live tracks and remixes, plus a 24-page full color booklet with period photos, extensive notes and lyrics. As with many albums, the low-fi version is available on a popular video web site. Be brave and take a listen but be prepared to part with your money after you join the fan club. (*Jason Hoffman*)

Arctic Sleep Passage of Gaia

Arctic Sleep have come a long way since 2006's Mare Vaporum. That album sported the epic opener "Over The Antifreeze Rainbow," a sprawling, nearly 20-minute exhibition of gurgling distortion and slow-chug that owed a debt to Earth and Sleep equally. Unlike Sleep's barking Al Cisneros,



Keith D keeps his vocals tame and sleepy, like the calm amongst the fields of chugging doom. *Passage of Gaia* sees Arctic Sleep's sound in optimal form. It's bigger, tighter and, these days, more prog than doom.

"The Staircase" comes right out of the speakers with Dream Theater-like precision and a Baroness-like sound overhaul. The drums have a technical syncopation as Mike Gussis' guitars go from crushing riffs to fluidly picked lines that give the song some great variation. Emily Jancetic's backing vocals add some light on the proceedings. "Terra Vindicta" almost comes across as a progressive doom version of King's X at times. Those guitars have echoes of Ty Tabor, at least to these ears. "Green Dragon" is an epic slow-burner which permeates with both a psychedelic journey taken and a sense of loss and sadness. "Antipode" has a more straight ahead metal sound. As with a few of the shorter tracks on *Passage of Gaia*, this song sounds more like Deftones in progressive mode than a doom metal band. That's not a bad thing, by the way. The epic title track is nearly 10 minutes of jagged metal and calm beauty. It nearly jumps the tracks into post-rock territory as the song ebbs and flows with Explosions in The Sky vastness and Mogwai brutal volume.

As with some of their prog doom brethren like Mastodon and Baroness, Arctic Sleep have tightened and honed their sound from their sludge-y and more visceral beginnings. The sound is cleaner, clearer, and more approachable. *Passage of Gaia* is an album of well-produced, well-written proggy metal that shouldn't offend anyone. I can't help but wonder, though, how an album like *Passage of Gaia* would have sounded had those earlier, more experimental noise excursions been included in the process. *Abysmal Lullabies*' "Pacific Eclipse" is a perfect example of both solid songwriting and keeping things interesting, all-encompassing and on the fringes. There's nothing wrong with a band evolving its sound, but you don't have to abandon your rougher, darker beginnings to do so. Still, another solid effort from Keith D and Mike Gussis. *(John Hubner)*

Shellac

Dude Incredible

Never let it be said that Shellac don't care about you. Oh sure, they may come across as being cold, nihilistic and confrontational, but at least they care enough about their own craft to make consistently great albums just for you, the kind, unsuspecting listener.



And no, there isn't a comma in *Dude Incredible*, and it's actually quite amusing to see how some publications have overlooked this detail while discussing the album (I'm looking at you, FactMag.com). With this proper context, the title track is more about reducing the behavior of your stereotypical hedonistic frat boy down to a monkey, than it is about buddy compliments.

As one might expect from the band that came up with song titles like "My Black Ass," "Song Against Itself," and "House Full of Garbage," there is a cynical bent apparent throughout *Dude Incredible*. This time around, pet topics include the annoying rituals of obsessive-compulsive disorder ("Compliant"), vandalizing property on bicycles ("Riding Bikes") and satirizing our founding fathers for being surveyors (i.e, any one of the three songs that has the word "surveyor" in the title). Oh, and let's not forget to mention the premature exit of the self-explanatory "You Came in Me."

Thankfully, from a musical standpoint, Shellac haven't lost much of their edge with age. At an exciting and urgent 32 minutes, *Dude Incredible* has more balance and a greater sense of purpose than the meandering eight- to nine-minute songs on 2007's *Excellent Italian Greyhound*. Lyrically, you won't exactly find harrowing moments like Albini bellowing out pleas to our lord God to kill an ex-lover and her new squeeze (1000 Hurts' opener, "Prayer to God"). *Dude Incredible* is no more friendly than previous releases, but it's also not quite as acerbic, suggesting that maybe the time off between albums has at least softened Shellac's lyrical ambitions.

Subsiding aggression is not exactly criticism to a band like Shellac, but maybe being too comfortable with what they like to play is. Stylistically, they're still using traditional rock instruments and not bowing to obligatory experimental indulgences by incorporating, say, keyboards or drum machines. While their staunch ethics can be admirable, it doesn't make the music on *Dude Incredible* any less predictable, but at least their fondness for dynamics remains intact.

Shellac's stock in contemporary music has risen some, if only because they now have a new album out. Otherwise, there was hardly any promotional fanfare, and *Dude Incredible* is not boasting an accessible version to their aesthetic. So what are we left with? In commercial terms, *Dude Incredible* perhaps won't sell as much as Robin Thicke's embarrassing *Paula*. However, the band retains its cult following because they care enough about their craft to keep producing damn incredible albums. And that level of commitment beats commercial success any day. (*Colin McCallister*)



The big tour news of the week comes from the camp of **The Who**, who just announced they will be touring the U.S. in 2015. **Pete Townshend**, **Roger Daltry** and a cast of hired guns will be playing hits of the last 50 years when The Who Hits 50 Tour (see what



they did there with the play on words?) visits Allstate Arena in Rosemont, Illinois on May 13 andNationwide Arena in Columbus, Ohio on May 15. The band will then visit some other areas of the country before returning to Chicago to play the United Center October 15 and Joe Louis Arena in Detroit October 17. Tickets run from about \$100 for nosebleed tickets to \$200 for good seats. The shows will sell out, and the secondary ticket market will likely see ticket prices averaging well over \$1,000, so get 'em early if you can get them.

Wilco have announced a six-night stay at The Riviera Theatre in Chicago. The shows are scheduled for December 5-6, 8-9 and 11-12. The shows mark the band's 20th anniversary, and it has been promised that the setlist will be different each night. Tickets are on sale now and will surely sell out quickly. I'd expect some live albums to be produced from these shows as well, so you may want to be a part of the audience if you are a fan.

Billy Idol has a new album out called *Kings & Queens of the Underground*. He also has an autobiography out called *Dancing with Myself*. So what should an author/musician do to let the world know about his new offerings? Well, he'll tour, of course. Idol will wait until the new year to head to the U.S., visiting Detroit February 6 and Chicago February 7. Tickets are already on sale for both shows, but all meet-and-greet packages are already sold out.

Is it possible? Bonnaroo Festival organizers have already posted the dates for next year's shows. The annual "Who's Who in Music" fest takes place June 11-14 in Manchester, Tennessee. I've never been, but it's definitely on the Bucket List. Headliners will likely not be announced until January.

Luke Bryan has announced just a few more dates for his That's My Kind of Night Tour. Grand Rapids' Van Andel Arena is on the list for February 10, and Evansville's Ford Center will host the country superstar the following night. **Randy Houser** and **Dustin Lynch** open the shows.

The Judge Is Okay, But Its Indiana Is Outstanding

Ideally, among the movies released wide to multiplexes everywhere each week is a film I genuinely want to see. New release movie choices available this past week didn't generate much excitement. For perverse fun, I could have seen The Best of Me, a romantic weepie panned by all. I could have gone to see The Book of Life, an animated film winning praise for the authenticity of its depiction of art and cultural traditions celebrating the Mexican observance of the Day of the Dead. While I admire and respect the courage, sacrifice and service of all World War II veterans, Fury just doesn't appeal. I never want to spend time with Shia LaBoeuf, especially not in a tank.

Given my choices, I thought I'd rather see actors I enjoy in a film that has been in release for a week or two, even if the movie has been unenthusiastically received. That's how I picked The Judge. (Would it be so hard for a theater to bring The Good Lie to town? Sure, it hasn't been killing at the box office, but it is selling more tickets than Men, Women and Children which is at two local theaters this week.)

Studios count on star power, but audiences have loyalties beyond the obvious stars. Robert Downey Jr. may be Iron Man, but I think of him as a character actor and am delighted that - clean, sober and successful - he is taking on character roles again. The Judge also stars Robert Duvall who, even when he plays a leading man, as in his Oscar-winning performance in Tender Mercies, is still really a character actor.

In The Judge they are son Hank Palmer and the father judge Joseph Palmer, and their charisma largely carries the picture. I wasn't hoping for much beyond watching these two talented actors square off. The Judge does have a few other virtues, but the gods smiled on me because The Judge is set in Indiana.

When movies are set in Indiana, it is because the filmmakers want a generic Midwestern small town vibe. Most of the time filmmakers pay little attention to the real Indiana, and it is fun to giggle at the boo-boos and enjoy a little comic relief.

On the Hoosier front, The Judge gets a lot of things right. When Hank Palmer finds out that his mother has died and he's going back to Indiana for the funeral, he's in a car driving past cornfields and farms that could easily be back home again in Indiana. But when he pulls into the place designated his hometown in southern Indiana, he's not in Indiana anymore.

Hank refers to his father as the judge. They aren't close. The judge didn't attend Hank's college or law school graduation. The judge has never met Hank's daughter. The family fallings-out are exaggerated to give The Judge more juice.

Movies need family dysfunction. No extreme perversity or truly hideous tragedy. There was an accident, and it ruined the extremely promising baseball career of Hank's older brother. The tension between Hank and his dad is mostly that they are both stubborn,



proud and unforgiving.

They barely speak, but as Hank is boarding the plane, his father is arrested for a hitand-run accident that killed a man. The judge may have been drunk, and it was the day of his wife's funeral, but the judge and the victim have a past. Hank is a very successful defense attorney and gets off the plane to help his father, who doesn't want his help.

The trial keeps Hank in town, which lets us get to know more about Hank and his family and friends. And the characters and actors beyond father and son are excellent. Vincent D'Onofrio is great as the gruff older brother Glen. Freed from Law and Order: Criminal Intent, it is great to see him as a character. Hank's younger, developmentally stunted brother Joe is well played by Paul-Emile Cendron. Joe's disability expresses itself in an obsessive interest in filming everything. Very often in The Judge we go to the videotape for family backstory.

Vera Farmiga, an actress who gets mountains of praise but has never been able to get me past what I see as a frigid nature and a spooky hollow-eyed stare, shows real warmth and brains as Hank's old girlfriend.

The Judge keeps going on point when it comes to cultural identities in Indiana. The judge, a southern Indiana boy, speaks disparagingly of the hoity-toity-ness of Indianapolis. Dax Sheppard is wonderfully bumbling as the small town lawyer C.P. Kennedy who is as interested in his antique business as his law practice. He wears a tan suit, has never tried a murder case before and vomits before going into court during the trial. Hank thinks he is a real rube, the exact reason he wanted out of Indiana and makes fun of his training. (Valparaiso law school grads beware!)

The bad guy prosecutor is Dwight Dickam, Billy Bob Thornton, playing a wonderfully phony smooth operator imported from Gary to try the case. Not trusting the crooks from too close to Chicago is the subtext for this stock dishonest player. The Judge really gets our state's north south divide.

The dynamics of criminal law also shine in a few scenes. Early in The Judge some local rednecks bully Joe Jr. in a bar. Glen leaps to his defense, and a bar brawl seems inevitable. Hank steps in and guesses at the outstanding charges of the aggressors and details what the consequences of another arrest will be. It is clever and ends the conflict. When the judge thinks he can win over the sheriff during his interrogation, Hank effectively stops the interview.

The Judge is more family drama character study than crime procedural. It is a bit too long, but, especially for Hoosiers, it's entertaining, even though the location for most of the film is in Massachusetts



The School of Dysfunction

Dear Committee Members by Julie Schumacher, Doubleday, 2014

Jason Fitger's reporting is anything but fair and balanced. The antihero protagonist of Julie Schumacher's new novel delivers his tale of woe through a one-sided correspondence between himself and the world at large, and we never get to hear the world's side of the story. Given the unlikelihood that all of the indignities visited upon poor Professor Fitger happened exactly the way he claims they did, chances are that the world would tell an entirely different story if only Fitger would allow it to get a word in. He doesn't, though, so although we don't get many reasons to like Fitger, we at least learn in great detail what he thinks of everything and everyone around him.

Fitger is a tenured professor of English and creative writing at the fictional Payne University. His department is under fire from the administration; an outsider, a sociologist, has just been appointed Chair of the department because no English faculty are capable of or willing to do the job. The building in which the department is housed is undergoing construction; the more highly respected economics faculty have been evacuated to temporary (and presumably posh) quarters, but the English faculty has been left to endure the noise, dirt and potential danger of a con-

Fitger's personal and professional life is also in turmoil. His first novel saw some success years ago, but nothing he's written since has made much of a splash. These days he's not writing much of anything at all. He's recently divorced – his ex-wife works in the admissions office of Payne's law school – and re-

struction site



cently estranged from a woman he'd dated; she works in Student Services. Neither of them seems to want to have anything to do with him.

We get Fitger's story via a series of letters of recommendation that he writes on behalf of students and colleagues - for graduate schools and fellowships, for jobs, for promotions, for awards etc. He doesn't have a lot of respect for most of the people who request that he write letters for them, and his recommendations are usually ironic to the point of being, in fact, condemnations - both of the person he's recommending and the institution requesting the recommendation. The exception is Darren Browles, one of Fitger's students who is applying to a prestigious writing program; Fitger is rabid in his support of Browles for some reason - a description of the kid's work makes it sound as if

his talent isn't quite as stellar as Fitger thinks it is – and although he can't muster enthusiasm for anyone else's aspirations, he spares no energy in his support of Browles.

Fitger also uses the letters as a (very inappropriate) opportunity to vent his dismay at the state of his university, the state of academia at large, the shortcomings of our culture, the perils of technology and anything else that rubs him the wrong way. He also

Ayer's *Fury* Tops the Box Office

Tops at the Box: David Ayer's Brad Pitt-fronted war film, *Fury*, took the No. 1 spot at last weekend's box office, selling \$23.5 million over its first weekend of release. Not exactly the blockbuster opening Pitt and the gang had planned on, but not a terrible opening weekend either. Taking the No. 3 spot at last weekend's box office was Fox's new animated feature, The Book of Life, a lousy looking flick voiced by Diego Luna, Zoe Saldana, Channing Tatum, Christina Applegate, Ice Cube, Cheech Marin, Ron Perlman and Danny Trejo. Weird cast, huh? The film sold \$17 million over its first three days of release despite having a very lousy trailer and a mediocre promotional campaign. Taking the No. 4 spot at last weekend's box office was Miguel Arteta's very good Alexander and the Terrible, Horrible, No Good, Very Bad Day, starring Steve Carell, Jennifer Garner and Megan Mullally. The film has sold just under \$40 million over its first 10 days of release. Definitely a

Any film with Keanu in the lead role is immediately flawed. Also look for Bill Murray vehicle *St. Vincent* to get a wide release, opening in most major markets after testing well in big markets.

Great Lunches on the Fly

When you're rushed for lunch, it is difficult to find healthful options close at hand. I started working full-time downtown over a year ago and was pleased with the organic salad options available at Downtown Deli, located inside Cottage Flowers. It met my healthful and convenient requirements, so I was bummed out when it closed. Thankfully, Mockingbird Kitchens moved into the space, and I've been impressed with the quality of lunch items offered. Owners Jim and Zoe pride themselves on offering locally sourced ingredients, and their "sustainable Fort Wayne" attitude makes this my kind of place.

Here are some of my top picks from the menu:

Sandwiches

Roasted Beet Sandwich (\$7): Roasted beets, herbed citrus goat cheese, pickled red onions, arugula, and balsamic reduction on herbed focaccia. The earthy sweetness of the beets permeates this sandwich and is complemented well by the citrus goat cheese and pickled red onions. The tangy balsamic reduction and savory focac-

cia bread lend a nice finish, as well. It's a great choice for vegetarians, but this meat-eater enjoyed it too. My only complaint about it is it's not very filling – all those veggies sure are good for you, but they may leave you wanting more.

Shrimp Salad Sandwich (\$9): Chilled poached shrimp, sweet corn, cherry tomatoes, celery, butter lettuce and creamy citrus vinaigrette on herbed focaccia. This is the first item I tried on the menu, and it keeps bringing me back for more. The flavor and texture of the poached shrimp combined with the sweet corn and juicy cherry tomatoes creates an explosion of freshness. Add in the crunchy celery and butter lettuce, and this sandwich hits on all of the senses – taste, smell, sight, touch and sound.

Shrimp Cobb (\$9.50): Chilled herbed shrimp, corn, hard-boiled egg, cherry tomato and avocado on

mixed greens, with choice of dressing. This is my goto. Nine times out of 10, I order this salad; it is just that good. Much like with the Shrimp Salad Sandwich, the shrimp and corn complement each other well. Add in hard-boiled eggs and avocado, two of my favorite salad accouterments, and this is near perfect. Order it with the cilantro lime dressing, and you'll be hard

A few weekends ago, I had the pleasure of partaking in Brunch at Barr Street Market, featuring some fabulous dishes prepared by the team at Mockingbird Kitchens, using ingredients from the local market vendors. Hopefully, they'll take the feedback from participants and expand their offerings soon. The brunch, which boasted five full courses, was the best I've had in the Fort.

shoehorns his personal agenda into the letters, using them to get at his ex-wife, his ex-girlfriend and his ex-classmates from a graduate writing program he attended long ago.


There's a touch of inside baseball about Dear Committee Members; Schumacher is herself a professor of English and creative writing at the University of Minnesota, and she knows all the details of the situation in which Fitger finds himself. Those who aren't familiar with the world of academics will probably think that Fitger's rants are hyperbole and that Schumacher's intent is entirely satirical. While there's certainly satire aplenty to be found here, Fitger's plight aligns pretty well with the reality of academia. Universities really do marginalize humanities departments in favor of those perceived as generating more

revenue; the politics within departments really is often irrational and petty; faculty really do spend an inordinate amount of their time writing letters of recommendation; and long-time faculty members really do often end up feeling bitter at the injustice of it all.


Dear Committee Members is really the story of one man's mid-life crisis more than it's a critique of the academy in contemporary America. As a critique, it's pointed and directly on target (and very funny as well), but although Fitger is justified in thinking that the deck is stacked against him, the way he deals with the outcome of the game is far from graceful. His implosion is fun to read about from the safe distance that fiction provides, but I'd hate to have an office next to



the same difficulties and face the same obstacles that audience members themselves may be dealing with. "I want to make sure I tell that story correctly," she says. "It's important to me to find the truth behind a character and live in the moment of the scene. I work very hard to make connections to the audience."

LeClear also loves the connection between actors onstage. "Creating relationships between characters on stage is one of my favorite aspects of acting," she says. "Working with actors who are willing to open themselves up and allow your words and actions to affect them in a profound way is so rewarding. When you get two people on the stage together doing the thing they love the most in the world, there is nothing like it."

While performing *Hello Dolly!* LeClear learned the power of characters to help her face her own struggles. A later role – Georgeanne in the IPFW production of *Five Women Wearing the Same Dress* – became almost a therapeutic role-playing session to finding inner strength. "Georgeanne allowed me the opportunity to be absolutely, unapologetically an emotional mess onstage," she says. "She suffered from some of the same insecurities that I have, so it was nice to be able to sort of confront them through that character."

Her most recent role was perhaps her most challenging – and most exhausting: Amanda Wingfield in *The Glass Menagerie*. "She is such a complex, intricate and beautiful character," says LeClear. "I had such a wonderful time developing her, but after every rehearsal, I was so tired. She is a physical and emo-

tional hurricane, and she sweeps through the space with so many different emotions, either genuine or manipulative. Playing her is an incredible honor, and I worked my hardest to do the role justice. Our director, Jeff Casazza, told me before we began rehearsals that he was going to push me to dive deeper into this character – not just emotionally but physical – than I have other characters in the past. I'm grateful for that, because I've learned so much from this process."

In addition to her acting and singing, LeClear has just completed writing her first play (a drama about dealing with mental illness), and she has plans to write others. And she is already making plans to begin the process of professional auditions after she graduates.

"There are so many options for actors," she says.
"Ultimately, I would like to make it to Broadway and
win a Tony Award, but I can also see myself continuing with playwriting or maybe even voice acting or
dialect coaching."

LeClear gives a great deal of credit to her family and friends for supporting her unconventional career goals. "Without them, I don't know where I would be," she says. "They push me to work hard and create a bright future for myself."

Where does she see herself in five to 10 years?

"I would like to see myself with a cat and a steady acting job in New York City," she says. "In 10 years, I would honestly be happy with the same thing."

Above all, she wants to keep connecting. "The journey a performer and an audience go on together," she says, "is a beautiful thing."


