A Kaleidoscope of Color

When first debuted in 1987, Blue Man Group was a quirky blend of music and performance art, a decidedly outside the box bit of theater that seemed largely rooted in its era. It would have been hard to imagine then that the show would survive into not just an-

other decade but into a new millennium. But the show has not only survived, it has thrived and become one of the most popular shows to hit stages every night across the country.

When the show revisits Fort Wayne's historic Embassy Theatre next week, it will feature among its cast a young actor who has been with the show since 2011 and has performed with it in New York and across the country. Patrick Newton is a native of Kalamazoo, Michigan and attended Western Michigan University. Majoring in musical theatre there was a natural offshoot of what he had been doing his whole life.

"I grew up with it," he says of music and performance. "My parents are music teachers, and I was always just drawn to it. I was in band and choir and worked in community theater. I was really just a loud, obnoxious kid that needed an outlet for all of my en-

ergy.

Having succeeded in high school at a variety of roles, Newton found himself drawn to the career, never really imagining any other option. His confidence was wellfounded, and as he worked on his degree and sampled many of the opportunities afforded to him in college and regional theater, he didn't realize that Blue Man Group was lurking in the wings, waiting to chart his course.

"I was actually in my senior year at Western, and our technical director was married to someone who was on tour with Blue Man Group, so we got tickets to see the show. I saw it and thought, 'I can do that. I'm a drummer. I'm an actor.' So I sent my head shot and auditioned for the show in New York and basically got the part right then. But I asked them if they could be flexible and let me join the show later so I could finish my degree.

"I was really lucky because they allowed me to do that, so I had the job lined up my senior year and started two weeks after graduation.

Newton has taken the stage in the show

not only in New York but across the country, filling in for other actors in touring productions when they have to take a leave. His role as a substitute took him from Orlando to Boston to Chicago and back again, but New York City remains home base for him. The current tour, which began in August and runs through April, allows him to share the

to how they make each show unique, and they just take it as it comes.

'How we approach it depends each night on how we're feeling. We have to have an openness, a willingness to learn. Sometimes we do talk about ways that we might accomplish something on a particular night. We might come up with some ridiculous sce-

> nario or goal, and the audience would never guess what we're thinking or doing, but it adds layers onto what it is we're doing."

> The audience also brings its own unique spin on the show, and Newton says their response feeds into their performance as

> "The audience is fundamental to live theatre, and when we're performing this way it's the very essence of live theatre. There's no fourth wall, so we're feeding right off of them. They physically change the show every night, and I think that's awesome. It's vital to the show.

While the show is not as apparently physical as some productions that feature big production numbers and frenetic dance numbers, Newton concedes that the show has physical

demands that are far more subtle but every bit as challenging.

"I like to compare it to hosting a party. Even if you're not doing back flips all night long, you do suddenly realize 'Oh my gosh, I'm exhausted!' There's a stress you put on a body when you hold an intention so strongly. It feels like a

life and death struggle, and when you hold that intention, it can be surprisingly difficult. It takes a tremendous amount of focus and is

surprisingly physical."

Having performed in the show for more than three years now, Newton says he hopes to continue in the show "until I die." When in New York he keeps busy with other projects, both musical and theatrical, but he is happy to keep expanding upon the opportunities presented by Blue Man Group. He is especially happy with the current touring group and is grateful to share the show with audiences around the country.

"The people in this company are awesome. Blue Man holds itself to a standard of community instead of company. It's great to work with friends in a well put together situation, and Blue Man Group has shown me what it's like to care about and share these experiences with each other. The others in the cast take care of me; we take care of each other and put on this show that I think is just a really damn good show."



stage with three other actors with whom he's worked in Blue Man Group over the years in a variety of cities and casts. His fellow Blue Men include Mike Brown, Adam Zuick and Steven Wendt, with the four actors rotating the three roles for eight shows a week. He says working in this cast is the best part of working in Blue Man Group.

"I say this all the time, but the thing I love most about the show is that I get to work with my best friends and play games every night. [For] most shows there's a script that you have to follow, and there's a script for Blue Man too, a way things are supposed to go, but the three of us make it different every single night. 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The Eagles Are Landing

Over the years Sweetwater Sound has become much more than an internationally known place to buy musical gear. It has become a valued resource for local musicans - both professional and amateur - to expand their experience and knowledge, both through workshops with the Sweetwater staff and in special programs in which famed artists share their craft and technique. It has

also become a place where area musicians can record their work and perform. This month a unique performance brings all of those elements together in a show that is sure to please fans of one of music's most popular bands.

The Eagles were one of the most successful bands of the 1970s, and their album Hotel California is both one of their most popular and vexing. The puzzling but enthralling lyrics to the title song alone place the album among the most memorable collections of the era. When the band went its separate ways in the 80s and both Don Henley and Glenn

Frey saw success as solo artists, it seemed that those days had ended for good, but a blockbuster reunion in 1994 showed that the band still remained viable and extremely popular, and they have continued to perform together ever since.

One member missing from recent tours and the band's lineup is guitarist Don Felder

whose 2008 memoir, Heaven and Hell: My Life in the Eagles (1974-2001), provided insight into both his years with the band and his acrimonious departure. But his contributions to the band are unquestionable, and it was actually his book which provided the original impetus for Sweetwater's upcoming Eagles tribute.

The Eagles tribute concert all started with a friend of mine that I played golf with on a regular basis," says Phil Rich, Sweetwater's senior vice-president of merchandising. "One day this friend gave me Don Felder's book Heaven and Hell, and as I looked inside the front cover I saw that it was signed by Don to me. It turns out that my golfing buddy was also a golfing buddy of Don's. I read the book, which was great, and after that I started re-visiting the Eagles catalog a lot more. The more I listened, the more impressed I was by all the seemingly simple and yet amazing guitar work.

'Fast forward a few years, and I moved out to Fort Wayne to work at Sweetwater, which I quickly discovered is a place loaded with musical talent. After settling into the

new job and meeting some world class players here at Sweetwater, I figured it might be time to put together a band that could really play the material to the level I wanted it to be, which was to perform the material right off the record or from their best live performances. After seeing the success Mark Hornsby, Mitch Gallagher, Bob Bailey and Kat Bowser have had with their tribute shows [Janis Joplin, Led Zeppelin], it seemed like the right group of people and friends to start

throwing around ideas on how we could do this."

Having been inspired by Felder's autobiography, it's not surprising his name should come up during

plans for the show. But Rich says what first began as casual suggestions soon became a game-changing plan.

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"At first it was kind of a joke - 'yeah, let's get Felder out here' - as we rehearsed for a few months. It's funny because I put the band together in a way where I could play all of Don's parts. Once I got in contact with Don, it all happened very quickly. Don was going to be in town anyway and, it turned out that he was friends with a few more of my friends, some of [whom] encouraged Don to sit in with us. He pretty much said 'yes' as soon as I got in touch with him. He's a really nice and outgoing guy."

The band itself was formed in February, and some of Sweetwater's finest were quick to get involved. Included are Sweetwater's Editorial Director Gallagher on guitar, Director of Sweetwater Studios and Artist Relations Hornsby on bass and local musician Bailey, who provides vocals and guitar. Bowser, whose upcoming CD is being produced and recorded at Sweetwater and whose Janis Joplin tributes have become a popular annual tradition, has contributed vocal arrangements. With so many Eagles songs available, it's been a significant part of the process determining a setlist for the

"The Eagles had so many hits and great songs to choose from," says Rich. "I think we spent a few weeks just going back and forth with song lists to decide what to play. Of course, there are songs you just have to do for an Eagles show like 'Hotel California,' 'Take it Easy' and 'Life in the Fast

Lane. It's a great mix of hits and some stuff you rarely hear on the radio that Eagles' fans will love hearing live."

Hornsby echoes Rich's sentiments about the show and credits the folks at C2G for helping pull the plan to-

"Mark Minnick and JJ Fabini at WXKE immediately wanted to support this show once I mentioned it to them," says Hornsby. "After Don's name was involved. their excitement grew even more. Myself, Phil and everyone else involved enjoy putting together great shows for the community and bringing in artists like Don Felder to really enhance the experience."

Felder's involvement goes beyond a chance to take the stage for the Eagles performance and allows for him to share his expertise with others in the city.

"Don will be in town for a few days. He'll be spending some time at Sweetwater and also playing the show on Friday. Don is going to come out during the latter part of the show to perform some of the biggest hits from the Eagles, including 'Hotel California,' which will be one of the highlights."

On Saturday, November 15, Felder will be conducting a Master Songwriting Workshop at Sweetwater. Details are at sweetwater.com.

With such a perfect combination of performance and music education, one wonders if similar tribute shows might be possible in the future. Rich says people should stay

"We would love to do more performances like this," he says. "Do we have plans to do them? Not yet. This tribute band was put together out of love and admiration for the Eagles music and was inspired by Don's story. We didn't have plans at the time to do more than pay homage to the music and simply 'do it right.' We've put in months of work, and we've got even more to go. It would be awesome if we could use all that preparation to do more shows. Right now, our goal is to play the show and have Eagles fans – and everyone else – walk away saying, 'Those guys sounded like the real deal.' With Don joining, it feels to us like the real

A Tale Danced to Life

Hema Rajagopalan was born to dance. As a girl growing up in Chennai, India, Hema was drawn to classical Indian dance at an early age. She began taking lessons when she was six, and by the time she was 10 she was performing solo dances for audiences across India. The classical Indian dance she learned, Bharata Natyam, involves intricate hand movements and facial expressions designed to tell stories based on religious and mythological traditions.

It seemed only natural that as she got older her attention would

turn to teaching. In 1974 she and her husband moved to Chicago, and shortly thereafter Rajagopalan began giving private lessons in her living room to Indian-American girls. Now, 40 years later, the school that grew out of those lessons, Natya Dance Theatre, is recognized around the world for its artistic and cultural excellence.

The Natya Dance Theatre will perform The Flowering Tree at 7:30 p.m. on Saturday, November 8 in the Auer Performance Hall on the IPFW campus. The performance is the fifth in a series in a collaboration between the IPFW College of Visual and Performing Arts and Shruti, the Indian Cultural Society of Fort Wayne. Past performances have brought classical Indian musicians to the city. The goal of the program is to bring the rich culture and traditions of India to the Summit city.

The Flowering Tree is based on a 2,000-year-old Indian folktale about a young girl who helps her impoverished family by turning herself into a flowering tree. The girl's sisters collect the blossoms and sell them before helping their sister return to human form. The folktale had never been performed as a dance until Rajagopalan was urged to do so by A. K. Ramanujan, the Indian poet and scholar.

'Several years ago I was working on another project with the author, A. K. Ramanujan," Rajagopalan told me by phone. "He had given me this book in the 1980s. I revisited it in 2007 and decided to choreograph it for dance."

Rajagopalan said the story gave her plenty to work

"It definitely has a lot of images and meanings and values that people can relate to today. It talks about the environment. We take these things for granted. In the East we do a lot of rituals. It touches on the connection between every living thing on the planet."

In the story the woman transforms into a tree and back. She gets abused when married. In the end it proves that love has the power to transform.

"It's a secular folktale with many meanings," Ra-

In creating this piece, Rajagopalan changed her style a bit by excluding lyrics. An opera based on the Ramanujan translation of the folktale premiered in 2006, but for this Natya Dance Theatre production Rajagopalan chose a different method of storytelling.

"Most classical dance theater uses lyrics," she said. "But I felt it was possible to convey the meaning of the story through movement.'

Rajagopalan said the 15 dancers in the 80-minute performance will be accompanied by narrator musicians, including a sax-

ophone, violins and piano and a combination of eastern and Western instruments. "It is very percussive. I think it is a new style of music, and it helps convey the emotions and themes of the story."

Rajagopalan doesn't shy away from changing the dance form. In fact, she says changes are necessary to keep the art moving forward and to keep it relevant. In this way she sees herself as an Indian Martha Graham. "I am like the Martha Graham. She was very interested in Indian dance, in trying to convey meaning. Many modern dances don't try to communicate any-

The need to change the dance became apparent to Rajagopalan when she first came to the states.

"Our music and dance evolves continually," she said. "It is something which is classical but contemporary. We are relating to today's audience. The dance formed over hundreds of years. It was a very solo form of dance with the main focus on hand gestures and facial expressions. But the essential point was communicating the spiritual and mythological content of the lyrics. Over the years dances with secular themes have begun to appear.

"When I moved here in the 70s, I needed to expand my performance. When I performed as a soloist, the stage was expansive. I also had to communicate to larger audience. I had to include jumps and leaps like in ballet. Our movement is very earth grounded, percussive. Ballet is aerial. I had to learn to reach a larger audience."

Rajagopalan and her Natya Dance Theatre have succeeded. NDT has received numerous awards including the Chicago Dance Award and the Paul Berger Arts Entrepreneurship Award from Columbia College Chicago. A 1994 PBS production, World Stage Chicago, earned Rajagopalan an Emmy. In October NDT received a grant from the MacArthur International Connections Fund to support an artistic collaboration with Indonesian-based Nan Jombang Dance Company to produce a main stage work of dance theater.

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Looking to Book Bigger

Over the last many years, the Foellinger Theatre has been a busy and popular place during the summer months. Between a host of popular concerts, generally featuring retro bands from various decades, and the movies which bring families for a cheap date night every week, the Foellinger has provided a lot of great memories for people in the area.

But in recent years the venue has taken it up a notch, and these days the Foellinger is arguably one of the hottest stages in town, pulling in huge acts, most of which sell out quickly. One of the people behind

that push has been Mitch Sheppard, deputy director of Fort Wayne Parks and Recreation. A native of Ligonier and a graduate of Tri-State University, Sheppard earned degrees in English and communications, a perfect background for someone who has spent much of her professional life writing and working with media. While her jobs keep changing, however, her employers rarely do.

"This is only my third employer since college," she says. "I came to Parks and Rec figuring I'd be here three to five

years, but I've now been here for 20. I've never been in the same job for more than two years, though."

When she assumed her current position early last year, the 2013 schedule of concerts had already been set at the Foellinger, making the 2014 list of concerts her first in the role. But she quickly made her mark, putting together one of the most extensive list of shows - including rock icons like Styx, REO Speedwagon, Foreigner and Los Lobos along with gospel, soul and civil rights legend Mavis Staples - the outdoor venue has ever seen. The schedule has also ended up being one of the deepest in terms of calendar dates, with the Los Lobos show falling well after the usual summer lineup featured at the Foellinger.

"I hadn't originally planned to schedule a show in October, but I decided to take advantage of the opportunity to book Los Lobos. Sometimes you just have to be nimble enough to respond to an opportunity, and I just told people they may want to wear a coat to that

Although Sheppard has only had two previous employers – an ad agency and United Way – each has brought with it experience that paved the way for her to understand the unique balance of working for and serving the community while taking the kinds of risks that concert promoters juggle constantly. She credits the help of one of those promoters with helping to make the current Summer Concert Series so successful.

"Peter Kernan has been promoting concerts for years, and our partnership with him has been a big part of the growth this year. He has connections not only in Fort Wayne, but also South Bend, and Texas and California. He assists in producing the show and

no guarantees when putting together a concert lineup. and she credits staff changes with putting together a team that is willing to boldly move forward. She felt confident that the Foreigner concert would sell out. but she was less certain of some others.

The changes in the last five years have given us leadership that is willing to take a risk, and there are a lot of risks involved. What if nobody comes? What if a performer does something before a performance that makes them a risk? We are working with a pool of non-public money thanks to strong partners - corporate sponsors and media sponsors - so we aren't risking public money. We've had to come up with a strong

marketing plan and make the ticket prices marketbased but reasonable."

Sheppard touts the offerings in Fort Wayne. particularly the musical interests which she sees as unusually strong for a city of this size. Although there are competitors for concert dollars, Sheppard maintains a good relationship with similar venues, particularly the Embassy Theatre which shares a lot in common with the Foellinger The-

"The Foellinger is a historic and beautiful structure and has always had a history of bringing

in big acts, everyone from Mitzi Gaynor to Ozzy Osborne. Maintenance has been very important, and in recent years we've been able to hang more technically complex shows, hang more lighting. It's a special place because it's in a park and it belongs to the city, so everyone who comes to a show can feel like they own a piece of that place. That may be old-fashioned but that's really special to me."

Sheppard has also been instrumental in bringing music to the other venue she oversees, the Foellinger-Freimann Botanical Conservatory. Her office is nestled inside the conservatory, and she has the same feelgood attitude about her surroundings there.

'When a family comes walking down the hallway outside my office, and they see the exhibit and gasp. that's when I get paid. It's schmaltzy to say, but I'm a public service geek. I have a deep spiritual belief that it's the right thing to do, that community service is the price you pay to be part of a free country.

The conservatory is a very unique place," she continues. "Often places like this are in the middle of acres of open space, but this is an unusual conservatory in that you walk 20 feet out the door and you hit pavement. So we have to know how to work within

Continuing to grow both the conservatory and the Foellinger Theatre requires diligence, and Sheppard specifically noted staff contributions, particularly those of Tim Byers who she says "produces a hell of a show." Although already looking ahead to next season's shows, she also keeps an eye on the future of the venue itself, knowing it's the cornerstone of the whole plan.

"There are lots of things we hope to accomplish

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

Constantly Making Music

Grey Gordon is a busy man. He's a manager at a local tattoo shop which in and of itself is a full time job. In addition to that, he has a solo singer/songwriter career that's taking off. And if that weren't enough, he also plays in three other bands in different styles of music. One is a hardcore band (Par-

asitic Twins), another is a black metal band (Antlers As Roots) and a third is a straightforward "grungy" rock band (Wickerwolves).

"I feel like if I'm not doing too much, I'm not doing enough," Gordon says. "Pretty much I spend all my free time writing and recording music."

His solo work can best be described as a plaintive blend of indie rock. Listening to it, one can hear remnants of musicians that came before him, from the Replacements and Elliott Smith to Sebadoh and Hüsker Dü. But the most apt comparison may be to Yo La Tengo, whom he reflects with his eclectic approach. Live, he sometimes plays solo acoustic, sometimes with a backing band.

When you see him live, especially when he's playing solo acoustic, expect to hear a mouthful in addition to his music. Gordon says that he enjoys a back and forth communication with his audience, and he also says that, coming from a punk rock background, he feels like someone playing just an acoustic guitar should justify him or herself.

His studio recordings feature a full band. On his earlier recordings he played everything but drums, but on his debut full length, Forget I Brought

It Up, he was able to have others backing him as he sang and played guitar. The album was recently released on a California-based indie label, fittingly titled No Sleep Records.

While his solo music may lead one to expect shaggy indie rocker, Gordon looks the part of a hardcore/punk rocker – covered in tattoos. And if his videos are representative of his attire, he literally wears his influences on his sleeves, being dressed in T-shirts and hats bearing the names of his forebears.

His background is also evident in his choice of lifestyle, which is vegan and straight edge. For those who are unaware, veganism is the abstinence of consuming (or wearing) any animal byproduct, and straight edge is abstinence from intoxicants. Both have a notable number of adherents in music and punk rock circles.

It's a shame that politics can sometimes get in the way of the music; Gordon's stands

on its own merits. But he's proud and vocal about the lifestyle he's chosen for himself.

"I've been straight edge for seven years and vegan for maybe three and was vegetarian for four before that. At one point these were things that I was extremely vocal about," he says. "At this point they're more just integral facets of who I am. If anyone is interested in talking, I'm always down



for talking about the merits of the lifestyle. There are political reasons for that and personal reasons for that. I could write you a thesis on why I'm straight edge but suffice it to say there's a veritable cornucopia of reasons why I made that choice."

Another label that gets thrown at him a lot is "emo," which is a little bit harder to fathom, His musical style doesn't necessarily match that of prototypical emo artists (e.g., Sunny Day Real Estate) which may just mean that it's an elastic term that's thrown at a variety of acts. But either way, it's not a handle Gordon chooses for himself.

"I think that it's kind of a buzzword right now, with a lot of bands carrying the banner from that 90s emo movement. I love a lot of 90s emo. I love a lot of contemporary emo. I would not consider myself an emo musician," he says. "The way that I perceive it is I'm just making independent music; I'm just making indie rock. Personally, I take a lot more cues from bands like the Pixies or Sebadoh than I do from bands that would be considered more traditional emo."

Politics and stylistic points aside, Gordon's work ethic has paid dividends in terms of the amount of music he produces and where it has taken him. In the roughly four years he's been working solo, he released

two EPs and a slew of demos prior to the release of *Forget*.

And, in addition to managing the tattoo shop, recording and releasing music, and playing in three different bands, he also tours, he recently returned from a month-long solo acoustic tour that took him as far away as San Antonio, Texas.

"I've toured quite a bit," he says. "I've done little 10-day tours here and there – 10 days, two weeks. I've done some five-day outings. So mostly it's like kinda shorter stretches, and then this last one I did was a month long."

He's also had the opportunity to tour overseas and may have more foreign tours in the future. Last November, he did an 18-day tour of Europe that included shows in Germany, Austria and Switzerland. And there have been talks of a south Asian tour on the horizon. Fortunately, Gordon's work situation allows him the flexibility to leave town for long stretches at a time.

When asked about his career highlights, he immediately cites a show he played in Berlin while on his European tour last year. The show happened in a packed record store.

"The show was amazing. It was packed. I played to a 300-person,

packed. I played to a 300-person, packed little room," he says, "and it was such an amazing feeling to hold an acoustic guitar in front of 300 strangers in a different city and talk to them and make them laugh and feel like I was really communicating something in that moment. And getting something across to that many people simultaneously is a really powerful, empowering kind of feeling."


Listening to Forget I Brought It Up is a worthy listen, but not just for the music. It's the sound of a young artist just beginning to break into a bigger audience. With his work ethic and a little bit of luck, good things seem to be on the horizon for Grey Gordon.

"I'm stoked that anybody cares about me enough to want to hear what I have to say or listen to my music," he says. "It's a continuing privilege to make music because I never thought I would even get to put out a record."

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

with the theatre, a lot of capital needs. We have to keep up with the technology because the minute you put in a system, there's something better coming along. We need to meet any expansion needs and bring in more partners to help make that happen. We want to keep

reaching out to the broader community so we don't get pigeon-holed which is why we brought in acts like Mavis Staples and Los Lobos. We want to be a venue that serves the community as a whole not only in the city, but in the entire area."

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Bonfire John

College

Owen Yonce is Bonfire John, and Bonfire John is Owen Yonce. Somewhere in between there, though, is a band that makes up the live version of Bonfire John. But alone in a room inside a house is Yonce putting on many hats and making records all by his lonesome, occasionally with the help of a friend or two.



Three years ago Yonce put out the Bonfire John debut, and he showed tremendous songwriting chops for a barely adult 18-year-old just graduating high school from somewhere down Carmel, Indiana way. Three years later Yonce gives us *College*, his messy, jangly, folksy and sometimes gritty rock n' roll sophomore effort under the Bonfire John moniker. It's a record filled with solid songs, done with the spirit of the Old 97s, Pavement, Jonathan Richman and even another Indiana songwriting savant named Josh Hall (aka, Thunderhawk.)

There's a laid back feeling to *College* that frankly is missing in a lot of current music. It has the air of a cat sitting in a living room with some drums, mics and amps set up around him. Hitting record after a swig of beer from a half warm bottle, hands still chilled from that last smoke out on the porch, he goes into opener "One Night" and proceeds to lay the track down with ease.

You see, despite the fact that Yonce is still a young dude, he writes and performs songs like a crusty lifer with tons of stories to tell under his belt. "Everybody" sounds like John Prine re-imagining Bad Company's "Feel Like Makin' Love" after a whiskey bender and a few uppers just to keep him upright. "My Name Is Bill" has the simple vibe of a Daniel Johnston track, but the sly smirk of Stephen Malkmus under the surface. It's like the Moldy Peaches came out of Stockton in 1992, especially with that vocal help from Kate Haldrup. "Runaway Dog" has a ramshackle feel of early Sebadoh before easing into the nice country feel of Son Volt (at times Yonce's vocals do resemble that of Jay Farrar's delivery, but just sometimes.)

Here's the thing: anyone can put a faux country twang in the voice, strum an acoustic, and pretend to be the hipster Woody Guthrie. It's been done and is still being done (I can hear someone doing it right outside my window). But Yonce comes across as someone far more interested in making honest-to-God art through music. He leaves empty spaces in between the notes. He lets the songs breathe and expand as they leave the speakers. Listening to *College*, I hear a guy with a sense of humor, and ear for melody, an old soul writing though a young-ish dude. Around these parts we call that kind of songwriter the "real deal." You can't write songs like "To The Light," "You Haven't Got to Leave" and "Wanting You" without possessing that essence of the true artist. Proof? Just hit play on *College* and see for yourself.

There are so many artists Bonfire John's *College* puts me in mind of: Pavement, Old 97s, Wilco, Son Volt and, at times, even a drunken, lo-fi Jayhawks. But give Yonce and Bonfire John one more album and it's simply gonna sound like Bonfire John. *College* is a hell of a record. (*John Hubner*)

Big Jaw Photophobia

How dare Clint Roth, aka Big Jaw, write music like he has on *Photophobia* well into the 21st century. What kind of music am I referring to? You know, the kind with big, meaty guitar riffs, mammoth drum beats and that thing called melody. It goes completely against current music standards – in particular, Music Standards 4 I which standards



sic Standards 4.1 which states, "Music shall not be titillating, spine-tingling or have any semblance of groove." Has Roth not read the Brooklyn Music Accord of 2007?

Well, I suppose since we're here we might as well discuss this slab of gutter pop and dirty glam rock called *Photophobia*. Fair warning, though: once you hit play on this one you will uncontrollably tap your foot, play air guitar and generally rock out like a fool.

BACKTRACKS

New Order

Brotherhood (1986)

New Order rose from the ashes of Joy Division following the death of lead singer Ian Curtis. Although Joy Division was a darker band musically, the bandmates used their musical prowess to become one of the best electronic/house/techno/dance bands of all time.



This album, their fourth, kicked off the 80s revolution and catapulted new wave music into the mainstream.

Opener "Paradise" introduces listeners to the heavy synthetic sounds of bass, keyboards and drumming along with the crisp vocals of Bernie Sumner. There are also some real instruments in the band's repertoire, and the guitars in this track are polished; they essentially carry the next track, "Weirdo."

"As It Is When It Was" brings the tempo down a tad, but not enough to disrupt the collection of songs on the record as a whole. In fact, "Broken Promise," which follows, could have been the template for the alternative guitars that bands like The Cure and The Smiths displayed in their illustrious careers. "Bizarre Love Triangle," possibly one of their most recognized singles, is still played (and remixed) in clubs all over the world and fits perfectly on the album; and it isn't dated over three decades later. "All Day Long" has a poppy vibe, and reminds me of Orchestral Manoeuvres in the Dark who came on the scene about 10 years before this release in 1978. It is the closest thing they ever did to Joy Division, and to this day is one of my favorite New Order songs.

New Order will always be the kings of this genre, and we are all better off for their music.

Fun Fact: The band just signed with legendary independent label Mute Records and will release their 10th studio record sometime in the second half of 2015. (Dennis Donahue)

Back in the 90s there were a handful of bands that appeared on the music radar for a short time; they made extremely catchy and heavy rock that you could play and not feel emasculated if you were caught listening to it. Bands like Dovetail Joint and Big Wreck made big, heavy, riff-laden music that was equal parts *Electric Warrior*. *Physical Graffiti* and *Are You Gonna Go My Way*. You can throw Stone Temple Pilots and Imperial Drag on this list as well. It's that kind of rock that appealed to the stoners, rockers, preps and greasers (basically the cast of characters from *The Outsiders* and *Dazed and Confused*).

Big Jaw keep that catchy metal flag flying high on *Photophobia*. "Walk Away" opens this album with some serious Queens of the Stone Age/*Them Crooked Vultures* strutting, Roth himself even having a Homme-esque snarl in his vocals. It's a killer riff and killer tune. "Never Coming Home" has riffs and attitude for miles and something the old timers used to call a "guitar solo." There's talk of drinking whiskey and forgetting names. This cat is lovelorn and is wearing his heart on his torn, bloodied sleeve. There's a "Custard Pie" vibe in the groove and guitar riffage here as well. This is the kind of music you crank through your Pioneer speakers as you cruise in your 1974 Chevy Nova. Hell yeah.

"This Is All There Is" stomps and rocks into your brain. This

"This Is All There Is" stomps and rocks into your brain. This is the kind of track Lenny Kravitz used to write before he got concerned about the fashion runway and Oscar nominations. It's got a classic glam crunch in the guitar that harkens back to Dean DeLeocirca 1995.

Besides some serious riffage, there are some moments of weird and cool experimentation like the short "Not Who I Will Be" which has some backwards voices and what sounds like German being spoken. This leads into the deep and soulful "Calling Out", yet another violation of current music standards, in particular Music Standards 5.3 which states, "Artists shall not, in any circumstance, write any music remotely resembling heartfelt, earnest emotion without including ironic undertones." Roth shows some serious studio chops besides serious songwriting and arranging prowess throughout this record, and this song is a culmination of those strengths. "Light" ends this album on some serious vocal work and starry-eyed wonder.

So, if you want to be non-compliant with current music standards, then give *Photophobia* a spin. You'll find yourself sucked into the riff-heavy world of Clint Roth and Big Jaw. Just be prepared to not look back and to say the hell with those standards, Brooklyn be damned. You know what? Forget the standards. Hit play on *Photophobia* and turn it up as loud as it'll go. Flying Colors

Second Nature

The idea was to assemble a band of seasoned veterans and have it fronted by a younger pop vocalist. Hey, it worked for Garbage and it worked for Flying Colors, so much so that I



kicked myself for "discovering" their album too late to write a review (it's a music dork kind of thing).

Do you remember hearing "Owner of a Lonely Heart" by Yes or "Heat of the Moment" or "Only Time Will Tell" by Asia, both in MTVs early days? The pop hooks grabbed me instantly, and though I wasn't brushed up on my music theory, I could tell that something very interesting was going on under the hood. Such was the music on the first Flying Colors album where gossamer melodies fought each other for time inside your head while some seriously fantastic music played underneath.

While I've found myself humming a few of its melodies *Second Nature* does not reach the same dizzying heights of perfection as its predecessor. One of its biggest problems are the lyrics. They're kinda cheesy, especially for a rock album made by veterans who should know better. Non-imaginative song titles include "The Fury of My Love," "A Place In Your World" and "Lost Without You," a nice shorthand for the lyrics they contain. Also, instead of creating explosive blasts of intelligent pop music, the band returns more to the trough of 70s-era prog rock, evoking thoughts of Kansas ("Bombs Away") and Styx ("A Place In Your World").

But it's not all bad. The first track, "Open Up Your Eyes," is a traditional Neal Morse progressive rocker with four minutes of instrumental bliss before lyrics encroach, eventually filling out 12 and a half minutes with catchy melodies, interesting musical twists and non-offensive spiritual lyrics. Channeling Muse is "Mask Machine," their single that starts with Dave LaRue sporting a fuzzy and delicious bass tone, similar to that applied to vocalist Casey McPherson. Overall, the song is a bit simplistic, especially at six minutes long, and repeats "woo-oo-oo" much too frequently (as in every few lines), but the song does rock.

Watch the video to hear for yourself and to see proof that there is no way to make rock keyboardists look cool. Sorry Neal, but you know it's true. Drummer Mike Portnoy, on the other hand, would look cool baking a quiche. "Peaceful Harbor" is a nice slow build, growing from acoustic guitar to power ballad complete with some very tasteful guitar solos via Steve Morse. My only beef with the song is the inclusion of a gospel choir at the end, a very tired way of "ending big." Fortunately the band shows how to "end big"

the right way on the last song, the 12-minute "Cosmic Symphony." (They are humble, no?) Constructed of three equally captivating musical ideas, nicely fleshed out and held together by more astounding Morse guitar solos, the song "ends big" by ending quietly and introspectively, reflecting the profound and intelligent lyrics contained within.

Now don't get the idea that *Second Nature* is a bad album. It's good, but just seems to be missing something, like the band is too nice to each other and will accept "good" instead of pushing each other for "better." "Better" was their first album but if they keep at it I'm sure one day they will release "Best." I can hardly wait. (*Jason Hoffman*)


stead a curtain of dark melancholy – slow, gray swaths of Gothic dream pop and almost antagonistic, visceral shoegaze. Those songs were as brooding and heavy as anything you'd find on Joy Division's classic downer, *Closer*. So although *Sway* doesn't stray too far from that epic and mournful gaze, it does kick up the heavy and in turn makes a stunning album of monolithic heaviness and headiness.

I can't help but put Whirr in a category with contemporaries (and friends) Nothing and Deafheaven. Like those two great bands, Whirr have that rare gift of making music within a genre that has been raped and pillaged by so many subpar bands over the years that it's very easy to really screw things up. But when playing within the Kevin Shields/Slowdive/Ride playbook, Whirr not only get it right, they transcend that sound into something darker and far more beautiful than I think Shields ever imagined it could be. Whirr make shoegaze and dream pop for the kids that populated the film *River's Edge*.

"Press" opens *Sway* with a massive bang. It's heavy and volatile and feels like it could explode at any moment. Drums are blanketed in reverb as Nick Bassett and Loren Rivera's vocals twist and mingle like a Shields/Butcher cocktail. "Mumble" rumbles and moans like a tidal wave moving up from a cavernous depth. It has the momentum of the Cure in fine *Disintegration* form. Underneath the rather downtrodden mood there is a pulse in Whirr's music. "Clear" moans underneath the blankets of reverb. It's the voice of the weird kid looking for a purpose in a sea of static. "Sway" melts into the horizon like a long-burning day, while "Feel" ends the album like slow motion understanding. A connection made, reluctantly, to another lost soul.

There's a dark romance and a feeling of unrequited love throughout *Sway*. You can easily get lost in its world. It's a world painted in charcoal undertones and blood reds that wash out along the edges of a beat up used canvas. This is music made by the punks who decided being mad wasn't for them. Whirr's *Sway* is for the outcasts standing on the shoreline, still looking for a place of their own. Arms stretched out to a world that won't have them. (*John Hubner*)



The League Gets Its Due

Justice League, Volume 1: Origin DC Comics, 2011

Prepare to hear a lot about the Justice League in the next couple of years. Just last week, Warner Brothers announced its plans to release a total of 10 films based on DC Comics characters over the next several years, and although the slate of films includes a couple based on outlier characters (Suicide Squad, Shazam), the centerpiece

of the plan is a pair of films based on a team made up of the

publisher's big-name superheroes. Warner's long-range plan is an obvious attempt to duplicate the phenomenal success of Disney's The Avengers and its many affiliated films, but it's unfair to the members of the Justice League to think of them as a late-to-the-party version of The Avengers. Batman, Superman, Wonder Woman and the gang aren't some rag-tag band of copycats; they're the original super team.

The Justice League first hit the comic shelves way back in 1960 when DC decided to bring together its A-list superheroes into one supergroup that would band together to save the universe and, hopefully, get the fans of each individual character to buy some more comics. The idea was such a hit that Marvel jumped on the bandwagon; the Marvel superhero teams (Fantastic Four, The Avengers, X-Men) were all direct descendants of the original Justice League.

Unfortunately for DC in our day, the Justice League fell prey to the general cheese-ification of the publisher's characters in the 60s and 70s. Batman was the campy goofball played by Adam West on TV, Linda Carter was playing Wonder Woman and the Justice League itself was transformed into Super Friends on Saturday morning cartoon TV, complete with talking dogs, super monkeys and the Wonder Twins. The vibe couldn't have been further from the antihero superheroes - including the edgy reboots of Batman and Superman – that had become so popular after the turn of the century.

The Justice League was ripe for its own reboot, and in 2011, as part of DC's "New 52" re-imagining of its entire fictional universe, the team finally got a new beginning. The origin arc of the new Justice League takes us back to a time when Batman and Superman had not yet met, and all the characters who would become part of the team needed to get used to the idea of working together. It was a bumpy ride at first, both for the heroes and for the world around them, but very soon the Justice League was a cohesive unit determined to keep the universe safe for mere mortals.

True to the 21st century American spirit, the team first has to deal with the aggressive individualism of its members. On page one, Batman clashes with Green Lantern, a mouthy know-it-all from California who doesn't like the idea of being told what to do by the un-superpowered loner from Gotham City. The two heroes pound on each other for a while before deciding to head off to Metropolis to get in Superman's face; there's



a weak premise about an alien threat that the cranky duo thinks Superman might know something about since he's, well, an


> It's really just an excuse to turn the duo into a trio. Green Lantern finds out quickly that this isn't his grandfather's Superman; he's no noble paragon of virtue, but instead another hothead who, when insulted, punches first and asks questions later. He pounds on Lantern and Batman awhile until the alien threat demands their attention and that of the other superheroes who soon show up: Wonder Woman, Aquaman and a half-machine

kid called Cyborg. Eventually the heroes stop punching each other and start punching the aliens.

This version of the Justice League is very much a superhero team for 21st-century America. They're not quasi-official authority figures like they were back in the Golden

Tickets are still available starting at \$65.

The members of **ZZ Top** are expecting to be back in full health next year as they have begun scheduling dates. If you remember, the Texas band had to cancel their Foellinger Theatre show due to **Dusty Hill**'s hip problems, so it's nice to see the band will back in the area again when they also visit Firekeeper's Casino on March 20. A meet and greet is available to purchase for that show if you've got an three hundred bucks sitting around. Rumor has it the band may be on the schedule for next year's Foellinger Concert Series, but nothing has been announced officially yet.

Line Up for Holiday Film Treats, But BYO Snacks

Soothing and rejuvenating respite from the cacophony of family, friends, food and fun can be found at the movies. I hate to push the season (though we did see wet gloppy snowflakes pelting trick-or-treaters in our neighborhood), but here are a few titles and a strategy to keep in mind (if meditation or church attendance aren't in your toolbox of spiritual rejuvenation) to slip away from the

The main parade of holiday fare is as follows. Interstellar is the first, next big thing on deck. The Thanksgiving big movie is The Hunger Games: Mockingjay, Part 1. Foxcatcher opens in November, an unusual drama for comedian Steve Carell and hot bod Channing Tatum. Based on a true story, this is a film about wrestling, wealth and murder.

Horrible Bosses 2 (who thought the world needed a sequel to *Horrible Bosses*?) and Penguins of Madagascar, a sequel for the kiddies, fill up early December. Dumb and Dumber To arrives in November. It may be great, but if it gets panned and you are a fan of the original, get to the theater.

Spectacle meets the Bible, an honored Hollywood tradition, launches on December 12 with Exodus: Gods and Kings.

Closer to Christmas, the big pics are

Hobbit: The Battle of the Five Armies and Night at the Museum: Secret of the Tomb. These franchise pictures need no discussion. Even if the reviews are grim, they will hang around in theaters long enough for anyone, so no matter how many holiday obligations you face, you will have time to see all of the

Another recent holiday trend is the musical. I don't like Jamie Foxx much, so the Annie remake is perfect for my taste. Foxx plays a media-hungry, phony politically correct talking, money-worshipping celebrity. He's the perfect updated Annie daddy, a shallow self-interested nitwit who believes wealth equals worth. Luckily, Annie also features Cameron Diaz walking on her dark side and an actual cute, tough kid, Quvenzhane Wallis as Annie.

Into the Woods, an adaptation of the Broadway smash, is set in a fairy tale world and stars Meryl Streep. Yep, the musicals will be in theaters for awhile.

How long will our little market wait for the non-mainstream market? That is the big question every holiday season. When will smart movies get to Fort Wayne, if they make it at all. The schedule is crowded with all kinds of genre pictures that will make an appearance. Their success or failure will determine which smaller pictures will get a spot here in town.

Rosewater is a movie I hope makes it here in a timely fashion. If Jon Stewart thought the story was worth taking off many months to direct, I want to see it. The story,



which seems truly dipped in Stewart's disdain for a certain brand of arrogance mixed with stupidity, may trickle down to the film's availability. If and when it gets here, hurry to the theaters.

The arty movie of the season, Mr. Turner, a Mike Leigh concoction about the life and times of J.M.W. Turner, a museum favorite who died abut 150 years ago, is a potential pleasure and Oscar darling.

A Merry Friggin' Christmas stars Robin Williams, an acquaintance who should not be forgot. The Theory of Everything may do for Stephen Hawking what A Beautiful Mind did for John Nash.

Inherent Vice, a film from Paul Thomas Anderson, based on Thomas Pynchon's novel, has an all star cast and is set in the 70s.

Part of the Hollywood holiday survival plan includes a concession strategy. Don't forget that, with all the cookies and candy coming and going this season, avoiding the annoyingly overpriced and unhealthy snack options at the multiplex is easy. Dip in to the bounty you are given for the season and tuck them in your pocket.

Until the price of popcorn, candy or a beverage comes down to the happy new price of a gallon of gas, I say BYOC (bring your own concessions)! Really, if a gallon of gas is less than \$3, by what stretch of capitalism are concession prices the market rate? If you just say no to rip-off concession prices. you can go see another movie. Here is your choice: a movie with popcorn and pop, or two movies with a handful of Christmas cookies. You make the call.

I understand and appreciate that movie theaters need to make a substantial profit on concessions, but current offerings and prices inside the theater are insane. At the typical marked-up rate of any convenience store nearby a multiplex, snack foods are often less than half the price of theater prices.

In the theaters, the snacks could be worth the trouble, but they aren't currently. Popcorn can be healthy and fresh and is inexpensive. Why is it the opposite of all those things? The theater and the customer should be friends.

The most important thing is to pace yourself. Go to films that the family and friends groups want to see. A bad movie can still be fun if you see it with the right crowd. Slip away with a friend or a sweetie to see what you want to see. Step away from stomach upset by avoiding overpriced, empty-calorie concessions. (New Year's resolutions will be easier if you follow the concessions instructions.) Remember that big flicks will hang around into 2015.

I remember fondly many holiday movie going experiences following these guidelines. A surprise snow shower doesn't hurt. Happy holiday movie going to all!

The Medicine Cabinet

What are your comfort films? The movies you revisit often and never tire of? The films you make your new girlfriend and/or boyfriend watch even if you have to tie them up and tape their eyelids open? The flicks you'd go see a midnight screening of at the Cinema Center no matter how many weddings or funerals or big meetings or exams or losings of virginity you have scheduled for the next day?

Looking through my embarrassingly huge collection (no, seriously, it's become an eyesore), I was surprised by my 10 or so go-to movie picks. Not because the quality of the films themselves, but because each pick seemed to fill a different mood or season or need (and, in general, the list had an oddly masculine vibe).

So here it is, with no further ado, here's what you'll find in my Movie Medicine Cabinet ...

Taxi Driver (directed by Martin Scorsese, 1976): No one who reads this column with any regularity will be surprised by this pick. Marty and Bob's dark, poetic, streetwise opus is the movie that ultimately steered me into the cinephile world. It's dark and ugly and gritty, yet Taxi Driver always manages to leave me feeling okay about the world. What I'm saying is that yes, maybe I need happy pills. Maybe I need to watch 30 Rock or How I Met Your Mother. But no, thank you.

Badlands (directed by Terrence Malick, 1973): The dialogue Malick wrote and the performance Martin Sheen gave both seem to become more relevant with each new generation of filmmakers. The use of voice-over. The cinematography. Kip. Just Kip. He is my friend, and I visit him two, three times a year. For my money, one of the all-time great art house comedies.

Pineapple Express (directed by David Gordon Green, 2008): Absolutely no one wanted to take Seth Rogen's writing seriously. Many are still coming around. But the truth is that Rogen works incredibly hard and has become, like it or not, one of the great comedic voices of his time. Pineapple (which Rogen wrote, stars in and produced), a buddy-slash-stoner comedy for the ages, was also directed by one of the great un-celebrated modern American directors, David Gordon Green. And, of course, there's Danny McBride, in the role he was born to play: Kimono dog.

Big (directed by Penny Marshall, 1988): I'm an unashamed super fan of Tom Hanks and consider many of his films to be great comfort food watches. Big is the one I've seen most and maybe the one I enjoy most. Several others – including Joe Versus the Volcano, The Burbs and even You've Got Mail, Cast Away and Sleepless in Seattle – get regular play in my apartment.

Finding Forrester (directed by Gus Van Sant, 2000): Of all the Gus flicks, this is the one for me. Maybe not my favorite (Mala Noche, Good Will Hunt-

ing, My Own Private Idaho and even Elephant are all better movies), but the one I return to the most. It's about all my favorite things at once: New York City, being a writer, friendship and basketball. And look, despite including one of the most laughed-at moments in film history ("You're the man now, Dog!"), I think the flick is pretty much perfect.

High Fidelity (directed by Stephen Frears, 2000): Music and Cusack. Records and more records. Chicago and Jack Black in the role he was born to play. The beautiful juxtaposition of love and art. The Music. A film I basically have memorized.

Rocky (directed by John G. Avildsen, 1976): At first it was the underrated film, the movie starring no one and made for almost nothing. Seemingly overnight Rocky became considered overrated. The film took the year's Best Picture Oscar over Taxi Driver, Network and All the President's Men and the little known Avildsen wins Best Director over Sidney Lumet and Scorsese.

Now, decades later, *Rocky* can only be considered underrated. Watch the new Blu-Ray print and what you'll find is a beautifully shot and composed drama with a lot of grit and humor. Maybe the movie I've watched most in my life (not counting *House Part II*, *Major League* and *Encino Man*, of course).

Hoosiers (directed by David Anspaugh, 1986): Maybe it's because I'm from Indiana and spent a whole lot of time around basketball hoops growing up. Or maybe it's Hackman. Or just the corn fields and filmmaking. I've never quite been able to pinpoint why I love Hoosiers as much as I do – probably simply because it's one of the all-time great films.

The Master (directed by Paul Thomas Anderson, 2012): A new entry on my list. I've watched *The Master* 14 times since it was released just 26 months ago. It's not just my favorite from P.T. and my favorite film of the last few years, but I believe it's the greatest film since *The Tree of Life* and one of the most misunderstood films ever. Better with every viewing.

The Squid and the Whale (directed by Noah Baumbach, 2005): My over-the-top love for this 80s-set family dramedy surprises some people. I don't just like this film, I think it's one of the all-time great NYC films, one of the best scripts ever written and, obviously, one of the best movies to revisit often. It's funny, it's sad and, most of all, it's poignant.

Darker Side of the Prairie

Is there anyone, young or old or in between who hasn't heard of Laura Ingalls Wilder and the Little House books? The perennial popularity of that series, along with the 1970s television show starring Michael Landon, have cemented this pioneer girl's story in the minds and hearts of American children for generations.

all for One productions is delighted to be able to share a new chapter in the Little House story with our local audiences of all ages. There was a year or so, 1876 to 1877, that Laura never wrote about in her children's books, although she documented it in her memoir, *Pioneer Girl*. (That manuscript, rejected by publishers during the Depression, will be published at last, later this year.)

After two years of grasshoppers destroying their crops, the Ingalls family was in desperate straits and decided to move east to join some former neighbors, the Steadmans, who had purchased a "hotel" in Burr Oak, Iowa. The Masters Hotel was really a roadside inn or tavern, with a public dining room and just four sleeping rooms upstairs. But it was a hustling, bustling place compared to the quiet prairie Laura loved.

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


