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# Trine Breaks in a Venue

The pairing of the Marshall Tucker Band and the recently completed T. Furth Center for Performing Arts should not be missed. Marshall Tucker Band, with their infectious songs and nostalgic appeal, are still one of

cording to White.

The transformation of the former First Christian Church - from a Greek revival structure built in 1910 that no longer served the needs of its congregation to a 21st century performance arts center - began in June of 2008 when Trine University namesakes Tucker to look at our venue and want to play here. I think we've met that goal."

Standing on the proscenium looking out at the main floor and balcony seats, at the deep blues and gold of the décor, it was easy to imagine the opening strains of "Heard It in a Love Song" floating out across the room.

That song, from Tucker Marshall Band's 1977 album, Carolina Dreams. rose to No. 14 on the Billboard charts and was a constant presence on the radio. It marked the pinnacle of Marshall Tucker Band's career. But it was far from the end of it, despite tragedies that tested the dream of the band that got its start in 1972 in Spartanburg, South Carolina after several years of stops and starts under different names.

Formed by singer Doug lead Gray, brothers Toy and Tommy Caldwell, Paul T. Riddle, George Mc-Corkle and Jerry Eubanks, Marshall Tucker Band (the name comes from a piano tuner whose name was found on a key ring in their old rehearsal space) signed with Capricorn Records in 1972 and hit the running. opening for label

mates The Allman Brothers Band. With the release in 1973 of their self-titled debut and the success of their hit "Can't You See," Marshall Tucker Band soon began headlining. Their music – a blend of country, rock, jazz, blues and gospel - struck a note with fans. Complex yet accessible, their songs told stories of loves won and lost, drinking and shooting and of longing.

Gray's voice (he's still the lead singer and the only original member of the band) contains a gentle gruffness that seems to be clawing for peace of mind amid events beyond his control. And as it happened, such events tore the band apart. In 1980 bassist Tommy Caldwell died from injuries from an auto accident. In 1984 Toy Caldwell, Mc-Corkle and Riddle left the band. But Gray and Eubanks continued under the Marshall Tucker name. Toy Caldwell, who wrote the

for Angola. Luckily for me, it will be a short hike. The T. Furth Center is on the campus of Trine University in Angola, a few miles from where I'm writing this. So when Marshall Tucker Band take the stage at 7 p.m. on Saturday, Nov. 22, I won't have far to go. The journey for the T. Furth

Center and Marshall Tucker has not been so short, however. But for both the perseverance has paid off.

The only reason Marshall Tucker Band are playing in Angola can be traced back to the vision Trine University had to build a first-class performance space for the residents of northeast Indiana, northwest Ohio and southern lower Michigan. Randy White, vice-president for student life at Trine said the university wanted to fill a gap in the area's available performance spaces.

"There's a void up in this region," White said. "We wanted to bring musical talent to the community as well as provide a state-ofthe art facility for our students. This facility was sound engineered to provide the best acoustics possible."

It seems the goal was achieved. Charlie Daniels and his band played the Ryan Concert Hall in October and said "it is probably the most beautiful hall we've played," acRalph and Sheri Trine purchased the building and donated it to the college. Pews were removed and donated to a church in Louisiana damaged by Hurricane Katrina, and shortly thereafter the university's nascent music program moved in. Two years later the music program moved out again so interior renovations could begin.

Interior demolition and reconstruction was completed in May of this year. In addition to the Ryan Performance Hall, the T. Furth Center boasts ample practice and performance space for students and hosts numerous free concerts for the area. The 740-seat performance space is as beautiful as it is intimate. There is not a bad seat in the

"Community response has been tremendous," White said. "We plan on bringing a wide variety of music and performing arts to the Center. We wanted artists such as Lee Greenwood, Charlie Daniels and Marshall

# Heights Well Beyond Idol

Whether you're an American Idol watcher or not, you probably already know Chris Daughtry's name. And even if you don't, you've almost certainly heard some of the music of the band that bears his name. Songs like "Battleships" and "Waiting for Superman" have not only topped the charts, but become noteworthy parts of the cultural landscape.

That level of success has placed Daughtry into an elite cadre of *Idol* alum-

ni, along with Carrie Underwood and Kelly Clarkson, who have become stars in their own right. When Daughtry appeared on the show's fifth season, in addition to his vocal talents he was charismatic and bold, yet also a family man with Southern flair - all of which contributed to his quickly becoming a fan favorite. He even received a standing offer from rock band

Fuel to become their permanent lead singer after he covered their song "Hemhorrage (In My Hands)" for the show, an offer he eventually turned down. He

made it all the way to the finals and seemed poised to take the title, but that honor ultimately went to gray-haired Taylor Hicks.

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The South Carolinian started singing in local rock bands when he was 16. By 2000 he had graduated high school, married his girlfriend and had a son, while continuing to sing in the band Absent Element. In 2005 he also auditioned for Rock Band: INXS, although he didn't make it onto that show.

His loss on American Idol was only a temporary setback, however, as Daughtry wasted no time in starting work on his solo debut. The album turned into a project complete with a band, and by the time the eponymous album came out, Daughtry had become the name of the singer's backing band. Daughtry dropped in November of 2006, and the album went four times Platinum, with its lead single, "It's Not Over," becoming immensely popular.

The band's debut was noteworthy not just for its popularity or for its American Idol origins; it was a hit from a rock band at a time when there weren't many. It eventually spawned five Top 40 singles and a Grammy award nomination.

The group followed up the success of their freshman effort with Leave This Town in 2009. The album featured more of the band's solid grasp of modern rock. It also went Platinum.

The band's next album, released in 2009, was fittingly titled Break the Spell. It was Daughtry said in a recent interview. "It's still very much us, and it's still very much a rock vocal. It's not like I went straight in to autotune and into the pop world. It was all about delivering the vocals they say I always do, and it's the common denominator between all four albums. I still think that Baptized is my favorite."

The newness of Baptized also gave Daughtry the opportunity to introduce themselves to new audiences, and to reintroduce them to the fans that had been slowly waning since Chris Daughtry's Idol heyday.

"I wanted 'Battleships' to be the first single," Daughtry said in a recent interview with radio.com. "It was so drastically different from anything we had done before that I kind of wanted it to hit people and go, 'Oh, whoa. This is weird. This is different." The band ultimately opted for "Waiting For Superman" as its lead single for the album.

Having been around for nearly eight years now, Daughtry, both the man and the band, have proven that they're more than just a flash in the pan. They have staying

power, and have continuously demonstrated. In fact, some have even pointed out that Daughtry's success has even eclipsed that of some of Chris Daughtry's heroes.

'To hear those things ... it's very flattering," he told radio.com. "I'm very humbled by it. I still look at them - especially Ed [Kowalczyk, former Live frontman] - as an influence. As a matter of fact, I never really listen to a lot of the stuff I used to listen to ... and I threw on [Live's] Throwing Copper the other day just to kind of test my ears out and see if it still held up. And it was still one of the best records I own."

Daughtry also recently had a chance to return to his Idol roots by acting as a mentor on the last season of the show.

"It was awesome, because that is not something that they'd done on previous seasons, and it was special to the season that I was on," Daughtry said. "It was really cool because I got to see these contestants before they were able to go out and compete and give them my personal advice, although very few took it!"

> ably, by changing up their sound, the band was casting off the shackles of its past records by trying out new things, expanding beyond its trademarked back-tobasics rock sound and embracing melodicism more than it had in the past.

> While Spell may have been artistically progressive as well as featuring another solid set of songs, it was slightly disappointing commercially. It was Daughtry's first record not to go Platinum or to have a Top 20 single.

> Maybe it was the relative lack of commercial success, or maybe it was just a continuation of the musical progress started on Spell, but the band's next album, Baptized, released in 2013, found the typically dour Daughtry embracing positivity. Musically, the band continued to broaden its horizon, this time around most notably by incorporating elements of folk rock into its sound.

> "Lyrically and vocally, it's a little lighthearted. It's a lot lighter than my usual self,"

majority of the band's hits and sang lead on "Can't You See," died in 1993. Eubanks left in 1996. But Gray has kept right on going.

The current lineup includes Gray, Pat Elwood on bass, Rick Willis on guitar and vocals, B.B. Borden on drums, Marcus Henderson on keyboards saxophone, flute and vocals and Chris Hicks on guitar and vocals. With 22 albums, three DVDs, three live albums and a bunch of compilations, Marshall Tucker Band are still touring and getting ample play on classic rock radio.

With the popularity of classic rock acts that still perform as well as (and in some cases better than) they did 40 years ago, having a place to see and hear them in comfort and style is reassuring. The advent of an event space such as the Ryan Performance Hall in the T. Furth Center hosting groups such as the Marshall Tucker Band can only be a good thing.



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#### **Sunny Taylor**

Map to the Fire

Map to the Fire is Sunny Taylor's first full-length album of new mu-

sic since 2007's Lock the Door and Leave, and it's only her fourth fulllength album since her debut, 1999's Lux in Tenebris Lucet, but there's been a lot of maturing going on over those 15 years. These new songs aren't the spirited complaints of a kid anymore, but the self-assured

poetry of someone who's started to figure things out.

Taylor still calls her music "folk-alt rock," but Map to the Fire is only "alt" by the standards of the late 90s, when anything that wasn't Britney Spears was considered "alternative." These days, Taylor's songs, especially the tracks that open this new album, fit comfortably into the mainstream of folk rock and contemporary country. She does her share of subtle genre hopping (when the band kicks in on "Fire Fire," she stomps confidently into blues rock territory), but you're not going to find anything here that's reminiscent of The Decem-


The real strength of the songs, though, lies in Taylor's lyrics, all of which speak from a position of maturity. Some of the songs -"Hurricane Annabelle," "10 Ft Tall" - are about clashes with other personalities, but they're about stepping clear of the drama rather than participating in it.

More of the songs are about pushing through the everyday disappointments and regrets, for good or for bad; when she says in "Bury It Low," "we take it on the chin and off we go," the tone is set for the entire album. The tone, however, is not despair, but a pragmatic hopefulness that if she does the right things, everything will turn out okay. In "Big Little Fish," in which she comes to the conclusion that there's nothing wrong with being in a little pond, she reminds herself to "forget the hook and write your song." It's an important lesson learned. (Evan Gillespie)

#### **Steve Gunn**

Way Out Weather

Steve Gunn makes music that is simple sounding on the surface, but underneath there's a complexity hiding under the breezy sway and summertime shine. He's an incredible guitarist who can handle pretty much anything that comes at him. On his latest, Way Out Weather, it's all about



When I heard last year's excellent Time Off, I wasn't aware that Steve Gunn played in Kurt Vile's live band, The Violators. Now that I know that, I can really hear that Vile laid back drawl in Gunn's music. While Vile's music is firmly planted in the rock and folk camps, Gunn sticks with a more earthy, organic sound. He can kick it up a notch as well. "Drifter" is a hard-driving tune with some great Allman Brothers-like guitar. And "Atmosphere" has an almost psychedelic vibe to it, with Gunn singing through a Leslie speaker. Gunn's voice is a smoother version of Califone's Tim Rutili's crackling, whispy voice. And Gunn's music does bring to mind that Chicago band's rustic and at time acoustic-driven sound, though Gunn is more subtle and intricate. He's a clever songwriter in that he hides his prodigious playing under simple, pleasing music.

"Way Out Weather" brings to mind Allman Brothers' Brothers and Sisters and the Dead's Workingman's Dead - the latter showing a band in their prime "taking it easy" while still causing jaws to drop at their musical proficiency. "Wildwood" has a nice shuffle rhythm and some great guitar run through a Leslie speaker. "Milly's Garden" is a mover and a shaker. It's a breezy track that could soundtrack a million road trips and don a thousand mix tapes. It will please fans of the Dead and Real Estate alike. It even has a little bit of the Stones in there with the great lap steel guitar.

'Shadow Bros" is the blues, but of a different shade than what we're used to. The acoustics crackle and jangle as Gunn sings along to the beautiful waltz-time track. "Fiction" keeps that easy feel flow going with a touch of melancholy just underneath. "Tommy's Congo" closes the album out on an almost tribal note with a mantra-like guitar line that keeps repeating.

There seems to be a mantra-like feel to Gunn's music. It repeats itself over and over, lulling you into a meditative state till you almost



#### Jimi Hendrix

Axis: Bold As Love (1967)

The second album from Hendrix was released just six months after his debut (in The United Kingdom) and solidified him as a guitar legend at the age of 25.

Like his first record, Hendrix mixed blues and psychedelic rock,



The album opens with a trippy monologue about UFOs, then segues into some feedback followed by the jazzy/blues "Up From the Skies." "Spanish Castle Magic" is pure rock n' roll with bombastic percussion and distorted guitars in the same mood as Cream or Led Zeppelin. A pop song follows in "Wait Until Tomorrow." Crisp arrangements, dark lyrics and bassist Noel Redding's backing vocals make this one of the best songs on side one. "Little Wing" is an R&B masterpiece that has a soothing melody which takes you back to the day when Hendrix used to jam with The Isley Brothers. Side one closes with the acid-blues number "If 6 Was 9," which has been covered by numerous artists, including Todd Rundgren, Lenny Kravitz and our hometown boys, Left

'Castles Made of Sand" is an ethereal track about the harsh realities of life, but the band picks up the late 60s rock n' roll again in "She's So Fine," one of just a handful of songs where Redding delivers the lead vocals. The rest of the album finishes beautifully, with "One Rainy Wish," the dirty "Little Miss Lover" and "Bold As Love.'

This really is the best collection of music Hendrix ever produced, and some of you haven't even heard it yet (Dennis Dona-

forget there's music playing. It transcends from just a song to something much deeper. Way Out Weather is a record that effortlessly flows from start to finish and moves like a river in the country or a subway in the city. It's one of those rare records that will appeal to many who don't normally see eye to eye, an album that brings folks together and lets them nod their heads in unison. Simple and sophisticated. #### **Exodus**

Blood In, Blood Out

The new Exodus album, Blood In, Blood Out, features the return of two former members: vocalist Steve 'Zetro' Souza and guitarist Kirk Hammett. Souza, the band's vocalist from 1986-93 and again from 2002-2004, has apparently returned for good, while Hammett, a founding member of the band before going on



to join that other band (Metallica), contributes a guest solo on the title track.

By and large, longtime fans have embraced Souza's return, even though it meant the unceremonious dumping of previous frontman Rob Dukes. It's a little unsettling, given that Dukes presided over what were perhaps Exodus' most monstrously heavy albums (e.g., 2005's Shovel Headed Kill Machine). That, plus a war of words between Souza and Exodus in the press in which the band's main man Gary Holt memorably referred to Souza as a "pile of crap," make the transition somewhat vexing.

Unsettling as it may be on paper, the changing of the guards has nonetheless yielded a terrific result with Blood In, Blood Out. The band does sound like it's returning to its sonic roots. Recent albums, especially the two Atrocity Exhibition albums, fierce as they were, found the band stretching into epic/conceptual territory, with songs often clocking in at 8-10 minutes in length. The songs here are shorter, ranging between three and seven minutes, and the gang shout vocals will no doubt remind the old school fans of Bonded by

Blood.

The songs aren't just shorter; they have a thrillingly fast thrashiness to them. The shift from more epic to more thrash-y may have as much to do with Holt's status as the more or less permanent replacement for Jeff Hanneman in Slayer. The riffs overall blaze by with a speed and intensity that's reminiscent of that band.

Opener "Black 13" starts off with an intriguingly mechanistic intro, an understated foreboding of what's to come before the band kicks into high gear. The fourth track, "Salt the Wound," features loads of the aforementioned shout vocals, and while Hammett's guitar solo may not sound markedly different from his work with Metallica, the interplay between it and Holt's chunky riffs is exhilarating. By the time the shouted chorus of following track, "Body Harvest," kicks in, listeners will have a hard time resisting shouting along. The second half of the album is as pummeling as the first, with "Numb" being the likeliest standout, featuring a panoply of foreboding thrash and generalized shreddery.

On its own merits, Blood In, Blood Out continues Exodus' winning streak since their reformation in the early aughts. The circumstances leading up to it may have been less than ideal, but it's hard to argue with the end result. (Ryan Smith)

#### Flaming Lips

With a Little Help from My Fwends

As Flaming Lips fans learned four years ago with their cover of Dark Side of the Moon, there's hardly anything the band won't do to distinguish themselves from any band or artist that has ever existed. That includes tampering with classic albums in the Lips' bombastic, psychedelic




ways while enlisting help from musical peers who they affectionately refer to as "fwends." For all of the incredible risks the band has taken in its career, the most shocking thing about this With a Little Help from My Fwends tribute album to Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band is that it's one of the least interesting works in the Lips' staggering discography.

The album title alone carries a sense of cheeky irony. After all, it suggests, "A Little Help," but boasts close to 30 guest vocalists and collaborators ranging from J. Mascis (Dinosaur Jr.), Maynard James Keenan & Puscifer, My Morning Jacket, Dr. Dog, Moby and, most conspicuously, Miley Cyrus, who is given the honor of singing on "Lucy in the Sky with Diamonds" and "A Day in the Life.' The novelty aspect of having these many fwends share the same disc space ostensibly seems like a pleasantly eclectic cornucopia, but it ultimately ends up sacrificing cohesion and coherence.

But hey, it's hard for me to get too cynical about this album, since the Lips have proven time and again that even their hammiest ideas have their fair share of successes. Examples include Tegan & Sara's vocal treatment on "Lovely Rita" and the groove of "Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band (Reprise)" with the assistance of Foxygen. Through these stand out interpretations, at best, this tribute album highlights the reasons why the melodies in the original Lennon/McCartney compositions helped establish the mythology behind Sgt. Pepper.

At worst, these neo-psychedelic and experimental treatments offer just one worthwhile experience, but after that, each successive listen becomes more about the novelty than discovering nuances. However, it should be noted that a portion of the proceeds benefit the Bella Foundation which provides lower-income families with veterinary services. So at least there's a more generous ulterior motive in mind other than, "Hey everybody, we're the Flaming Lips and we can do anything we want whether you like it or not." Even with all the clutter in the rearrangements, With a Little Help from My Fwends is still fun and accessible, and makes no attempt to mock or satirize the well-meaning intentions of the original album. That particular distinction belongs to Frank Zappa; he made fun of the Beatles and Sgt. Pepper before it was cool. (John Hubner)





Eef Barzelay, the frontman of alt-country group Clem Snide, will be back in Fort Wayne on Friday, November 14 to play a solo show at One Lucky Guitar's B-Side performance space. Barzelay, who'll take the stage from 8-10:30 p.m., is a bespectacled indie bard EEF BARZELAY with a passionate cult fol-

lowing, thanks in part to his 2006 album Bitter Honey. The almost title track, "The Ballad of Bitter Honey," was named by Rolling Stone as one of the 100 best songs of 2006. ("Let Us Be Naked" and "I Wasn't Really Drunk" - also on Bitter Honey - should, perhaps, get honorable mention for most creatively titled tracks of that year. But we digress...)

Barzelay grew up in Teaneck, New Jersey and formed Clem Snide in 1991 in Boston. The band took its name from a William S. Burroughs character, which should tell you a little something about Barzelay's writing style. It's learned, it's clever, it's funny as hell. And a Eef show is guaranteed to be effing fun.

It's safe to say that Joe Bonamassa is Fort Wayne's favorite adopted blues son. He's been to the Summit City countless times, but not enough to wear out welcome, and he'll be back on the Embassy stage Monday, November 17 at 8 p.m.

JOE BONAMASSA

Bonamassa is riding the wave created by his latest studio album, Different Shades of Blue, which dropped in December. Rabid fans will be happy to know he just released a slew of live albums this spring, including Live in Amsterdam with Beth Hart, Live from the Borderline, Live from the Shepherd's Bush Empire, Live from the Hammersmith Apollo and Live from the Royal Albert Hall. Said slew just goes to show that Bonamassa is the kind of performer you almost have to see live to believe. As one critic put it, "Joe is unquestionably among our greatest living guitarists, destined to be counted among the best of all-time."

Influenced by British and Irish blues, Bonamassa decided to become a musician because of men like Eric Clapton and Jeff Beck and Rory Gallagher. And he decided this at a pretty young age. He opened for B.B. King when he was 12 and now has 15 solo albums to his credit. Perhaps most impressive of all his laurels is that, 33 years into this business, he's still playing, still selling out shows, still releasing new material.

And he shows no sign of slowing down. As he told Epiphone in an interview this May, "Every day I wake up and I'm excited about the guitar. I'm excited about the sound of the case latches opening. I always grab for it. Even when I tour a lot and I'm playing a lot on stage, I still practice, even after 33 years."

pers Rock Until You Drop, Wiped Out and All for One will be at the Rail Monday, November 17 with show openers Night Demon and Valhalla for an evening of metal sure to have your ears ringing for days, weeks, months to come.

Raven - John Gallagher (bass, lead vocals, synthesizer), Mark Gallagher (guitar, backing vocals) and Joe Hasselvander (drums, backing vocals) - first got together back in 1974 in New Castle, England. They quickly became known for their high energy shows and were dubbed "athletic rock." Soon they began donning sports gear for their shows (hockey masks. chest guards, helmets) and playing to larger and larger crowds around the UK and Europe. Their big break came in 1981 with the recording of Rock Until You Drop. And they did just that for over a decade. In the 90s the grunge era threatened to deep-six heavy metal. but Raven kept touring until 2001 when a wall fell on Mark and crushed his legs. He took a four-year hiatus to recover before returning to the road.

Obviously, the Gallagher Bros. plus Hasselvander aren't about to let tiny things like musical movements and physical injury get in their way. They're touring the U.S. as we write, older and perhaps wiser. But don't worry – these guys still go to 11.

# The Whole Family Should Get to Know Baymax

Last week I offered some advice on how to survive the holiday movie hustle and bustle. This week I am happy to recommend Big Hero 6 as a film the whole family will enjoy. Thanksgiving cooks should not use this movie to get the family out from under foot and out of the house. Big Hero 6 should be shared by the whole gang.

And speaking of holiday treats, if I could find just one present under the tree this Christmas, it would be my very own Baymax (if only he were real). He's cute, lovable and helpful, the most likable human-serving robot to hit the big screen maybe ever.

Baymax is the brainchild of Tadashi (voiced by Daniel Henney), a self-described nerd. He's been created as a "health care companion." He has a spine of the toughest metals, but is big and white and comfy and inflatable and deflatable. He has a soothing voice (Scott Adsit) and is full of wise words, an upbeat outlook and happy bounce and squeak when he moves. He is very good at his job and very dedicated to being a fullservice provider.

Really, Baymax has been created by a very talented gang at the Disney Studio, led in this instance by directors Don Hall and Chris Williams from a script by Robert Baird, Daniel Gerson and Jordan Roberts. The whole happy project is inspired by the Marvel Comics Big Hero 6 series. There is also an army of story shapers, animators, visual effects artists and additional crew. This is not a broth spoiled by too many cooks. There is a lot of mash up of sensibilities, and that mishmash is charming.

Let's start with the setting of this fabu-

lous futuristic world. San Fransokyo looks like the mix of San Francisco and Tokyo, as its name suggests. It's a multicultural world that seems genuinely and sincerely happily In a dark corner of this metropolis, we

meet 14-year-old whiz kid Hiro Hamada (Ryan Potter). He's brought his robot to the robot fights. He and his bot are deceptive. Both look small and harmless, but both came to play. Boy and bot end up in jail, along with Hiro's older brother Tadashi, and they have to be bailed out by their Aunt Cass (Maya Rudolph).

She's been raising both boys since their parents died. She's a cool aunt who runs a café, and they all live above it. Hiro has already graduated from high school and is wandering rather aimlessly. To get Hiro interested in college, Tadashi takes him to his "nerd" school and introduces him to his fel-

What really wows Hiro is his brother's project, the delightful and helpful Baymax, and Tadashi's hip mentor, Professor Callahan (James Cromwell). Suddenly, Hiro is desperate to get into school. To do so he needs to win a tech competition, which he does with a neat little robot, no bigger than a pinky finger. But when these little bots swarm like bees, they do impressive deeds.

Tragedy strikes when the science building explodes and burns, killing Tadashi and destroying Hiro's invention. Baymax survives and tries his best to restore Hiro to health. He's unfamiliar with emotional illness, but he's a quick learner.

When it turns out that at least one of Hi-



ro's little robots survived, Hiro and Baymax follow a trail that leads them into the path of a real dangerous dude, bent on destruction. It becomes clear that the explosion and fire were no accident.

Hiro teams up with his brother's fellow science students in a search for the truth and justice for Tadashi. They are a motley, multicultural crew and refreshingly nearly free of stereotypes. They have their quirks, though.

Honey Lemon (Genesis Rodriguez) has big glasses, long hair and skinny legs sticking out of her short skirts. She's very proper, but she's up for anything. GoGo Tomago (Jamie Chung) is a tough chick completely dedicated to perfecting her electromagnet bike wheel technology. Wasabi (Damon Wayans Jr.) has big hair, big muscles and big skills. Fred (T.J. Miller) has a very laid back mojo, but there's more there than meets the

Add in Hiro and Baymax, and we have our six. They all gear up for a fight against the masked villain. Baymax gets some armor and little enhancements to help him fly. They all mix in their tech specialties to become more formidable.

Through all the adventures the visual styling is fantastic. The animation feels so lively and real during some scenes you wonder why some superhero or adventure movies bother with live action, since so much of those landscapes and effects are mostly CGI effects. Scenes are filled with depth, detail and silly, fun flourishes. My favorite image is the sky filled with tethered wind turbines that hover like big balloons and are vividly

I am not often a fan of characters drawn with exaggerated body parts and features. Here the exaggerations are part of the swagger of each character, and though their shapes aren't realistically human at all, the way they move is wonderfully natural. The big fat happy cat is a beautiful blob but with lots of cat-like moves and expressions.

Big Hero 6 is rated PG and has a happily snarky attitude. The story spirals into a typical blow-out showdown. There will be sequels, or that's the sense when the six come flying towards the audience at the end of this adventure. All the humans are enjoyable, and I'm sure they will flourish in future installments.

The big star of Big Hero 6 is Baymax. The world would be a better place if every family had a Baymax. Without growing too many human traits - as happens to many movie robot - Baymax stays pretty true to his programming and is a (sometimes literally) warm presence. What will Baymax do next? That will get me to the sequel.



First off, for those of you who like to glance at the executive summary, here's the short and sweet of it: *Shrek, the Musical* will win you over. It won't take long. If a child brings you, you will probably be smiling by the end of the first scene. For stubborn adultish folk, it will take until Donkey gets the giggles. Expect to dance in your aisle during the curtain call.

Yes, I'll confess, I had my doubts about this show. Oh sure, I loved the four Shrek animated movies, but translating that rude, crude, ugly charming ogre's story seemed to be unlikely. Part of the humor for this ex-Mouseketeer rested in all the poking fun at Disney

traditions. How would that translate onto a stage? Studying up by reading the reviews from its Broadway run, I saw grumping about "a Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade" of "fairy-tale effigies" and "trying too hard."

Curtain up, and yes, this looks familiar, okay. Green, ear stalks, swamp, Scots-flavored narration. Then, *bam*, out strides Fiona, all ginger gumption and

soaring singing, that familiar green princess gown, and we all knew we were going to have a good night.

Guest director Doug King has cast perfectly, and it really matters. The musical is very faithful to the 2001 DreamWorks animated movie and the book by William Steig, and it gives us a lot of original music by Jeanine Tesori and humor-rich book and lyrics by David Lindsay-Abaire. This is the antidote for those who find Sondheim's *Into the Woods* too intellectual. Enchantment here gets blown away pretty quickly with a nose snort or a fart! Lindsay-Abair even works in references to other non-Disney shows, including *Wicked* and *The Princess Bride*. The costumes and makeup are right, but the singing, a little dancing, a lot of good timing for comedy and some stage magic all

come together for a charming visit to Far Far Away.

Jeff Salisbury nails the mix of moods to get Shrek just right, and he glues the whole story together. Megan Meyer as Princess Fiona is a delight, whether she is tap dancing with Pied Piper James Velez and a chorus line of rats or singing "I Know It's Today," a

captivating trio with her younger selves (played by Rebecca Short and Chloe Price) about life in a tower, waiting.

Prentis D. Moore is terrific as Donkey. It's a hard part because Eddie Murphy owns that role, but Prentis gives him just enough Eddie and even more Prentis. He and Stephanie Longbrake as that red-hot mama, the Dragon, are particularly fun

to watch. Another tough part, this time more for the physical demand than the characterization, is that of Lord Farquaad, the stature-impaired despot. Mason Hunter manages to be both believable as a thwarted dwarf at the same time that we know good and well that he is striding around on his knees. It's a joke he plays for all – maybe even more than – it is worth. Another standout performer is Nick Chaney, who leads the fairy tale rabble quite convincingly as Pinocchio.

The versatility of the cast is such that many carry multiple parts. The actors include Renee Gonzales, Isaac Becker, Bobbi Jo Carroll, Susannah Chadwell, Gavin Drew, Janna Fisher, Evan Hart, Brandon John-

# Big Hero 6 Rocks the Box Office

**Tops at the Box:** Disney's latest animated hit, *Big Hero* 6, took the No. 1 spot at a big fall weekend at the box office. Selling \$56 million in tickets in the U.S. over its first three days of release, *Big Hero* 6 sold an additional \$23 million abroad. The film, which is also getting great reviews, is voiced by TJ Miller, Jamie Chung, Damon Wayans Jr., Maya Rudolph and several others. Looks good. Good in that slightly progressive, overbaked, ultimately cheesy Pixar sort of way.

Also at the Box: Taking the No. 2 spot at last weekend's box office was the hugely anticipated Interstellar, a new sci-fi epic from writer/director Christopher Nolan (The Dark Knight Trilogy, Memento, *Inception*, etc.). The film, which cost \$165 million to produce and is almost three hours long, stars Matthew McConaughey, Anne Hathaway, Jessica Chastain, John Lithgow, Screen Time favorite Casey Affleck (who would have been much better in the lead role than McConny), Wes Bentley, Ellen Burstyn and many, many more. Nolan's latest sold \$52 million in tickets in the U.S. and \$80 million abroad over its first three days of release, making the film an instant financial success. I went to this movie and feel the need to tell you, dear reader, that it's not a good movie. I wanted it to be. I would've bet on it being a creative triumph. But no. This is the first real wrinkle in the legacy that is Nolan.

Taking the No. 3 spot at last weekend's U.S. box office was *Gone Girl*, which sold another \$6.1 million, bringing the flick's 38-day total to \$145 million in the

U.S. and \$303 million worldwide. Nice work, Finch! Stiles White's *Ouija*, produced by Michael Bay and starring Olivia Cooke, took the No. 4 spot at the box, selling \$6 million. So far, *Ouija* has performed very well, already selling \$43 million in the U.S. and \$56 million worldwide. Not bad for a mediocre \$5 million horror flick. Rounding out last weekend's Top 5 was Theodore Melfi's *St. Vincent* which sold \$5.7 million, upping the flick's total to \$27 million in the U.S. Also of note, the excellent *Nightcrawler* continued to do well, selling another \$5.5 million, upping the flick's 10-day total to \$20 million in the U.S.

New This Week: Sure, drama Beyond the Lights, starring the ridiculously beautiful Gugu Mbatha-Raw and directed by Gina Prince-Bythewood (Love and Basketball), opens this week and will likely do just fine. This weekend, however, will be all about Dumb and Dumber To, a Farrelly Brothers sequel to their signature film, Dumb and Dumber. Jeff Daniels and Jim Carrey are back in their legendary roles and yadda, yadda, yadda. You get it. The flick looks funny, sure. It'll sell big. It'll open at No. 1. It will sell well for a

I have found that the older some of us get, there is a tendency to look back at better times. I find myself driving by the old homestead or making a quick visit to the old café, just to see what it looks like, to garner memories of friends, sights or sounds of yesterday. In a flash, it all comes back.

In 1964, as a young man, I came to the city of Fort Wayne to study mechanical engineering at the Purdue extension. The IU-PU campus, now IPFW, was not yet completed. Workmen were everywhere, and many unfinished classrooms had wires still being pulled out of the walls for light switches and wall plugs. With

each passing day, Kettler Hall began to take shape, the only building in a vast and vacant field.

Amidst all of this excitement, first classes and different accommodations, I missed my home. Being the dutiful engineering student, however, I set my anxiety aside and attended classes with my slide rule and brand

new pocket protector. But within 30 days, anxiety turned to boredom.

One night as I left school, there was a notice for tryouts for *The Imaginary Invalid*, a play by French playwright Molière. Not having ever been in a play, I did not know what was in store for me. I read at tryouts and was shocked to get the lead, Argan. It was the experience that changed my life.

Director Bob Tolan, an imposing figure and well over six foot, became the leader of a small but dedicated group of followers performing in the new Purdue Indiana Theatre, more fondly known then as PIT. I had

found what I had been longing for, my new home.

Dr. Tolan convinced me to change my major to theater, as he did with a number of others. Even though I didn't continue in the acting profession, I gained confidence and skills that aided me throughout my life, both personally and professionally. Years

passed and I occasionally came back to the theater and did a part which was always rewarding. This fall when I was offered a chance to play the role of Dr. Purgeon, the role that Tolan performed 50 years ago (almost to the day) at IPFW in the original production of *The Imaginary Invalid*, it was a decision made without hesitation.

So many things have changed since 1964. PIT has become the Studio Theatre. Now students also perform in the Williams Theatre, the director and cast are different, I am playing a different part and I am slower and older. But my love for this artistic endeavor, the process of being involved in creating a performance that can sadden or lift spirits and reaffirm our humanity is still intact. And now I know, with great certainty what it means to have an alma mater (Latin for nourishing mother). I truly have come home again.
