Superheroes in Pen & Ink

Jaime Hernandez and his brothers grew up wanting to create superhero comic books.

But something changed in their teens, something that would go on to transform comic books as an art form.

The Hernandez Brothers – Jaime, Gilbert and Mario (now known collectively as "Los Bros.") – decided to forgo costumed demigods in favor of real people, specifically mildly fictionalized versions of the real Latin American Angelinos that they knew and loved.

Hernandez says no one was telling Latin American stories anywhere at the time.

"That was one of the main reasons for doing it," he says, "because we weren't seeing our culture, our lives depicted out there. Or correctly, anyway."

The brothers self-published their first comic book in 1981.

It was called *Love & Rockets*. More than 30 years later, Los Bros. are still producing new *Love* & *Rockets* stories.

Jaime Hernandez will be a guest at the Appleseed Comic Con at the Grand Wayne Center on May 16 and 17.

Hernandez is probably too humble to acknowledge the following himself, but he and his brothers unwittingly spearheaded an alternative comics movement in the 80s.

"When (the Hernandez Brothers) first started the series 30 years ago," wrote Cate McGehee in the Seattle newspaper, The Stranger, "it was a sea change for comics. The brothers came of age in 1980s Los Angeles as members of the

Chicano community and the emerging punk scene, and their early comics represented this background at a time when there wasn't really anyone else in the industry speaking to it.

"It was one of the very first comics to include LGBT characters and people of color," she wrote, "to draw from an underground urban demographic and to have kick-ass female leads."

Acclaim came swiftly to the brothers, a development that troubled Jaime Hernandez at first.

"At first I was worried success might change me for the worse," he says, "but I found that the more praise I get, the more I feel I must live up to it and do better work. The pressure is always there but hopefully it steers me in the right direction."

From the start, Hernandez was lauded for his sensitive and nuanced depictions of women, something the two mainstream comic book companies, Marvel and DC, still struggle with.

Some comic book artists and writers like

the Hernandez brothers spend their entire careers outside the mainstream, and others like fellow Appleseed attendee Hilary Barta move back and forth, between and among upstarts and megacorps.

Artist/writer Barta says his first inking and writing jobs were with a mainstream company: Marvel Comics.

He quickly figured out he wasn't really a mainstream guy (although he has

continued to do work to reca lywood crazy a

"It was the greatest creative challenge I'd faced in comics," he says. "I did the best I could at the time, and overall I'm pleased with the result."

Another career highlight, he says, was adapting B-movie icon Bruce Campbell's directorial debut, *The Man with the Screaming Brain*, to the comic book medium.

"It was a riot," he recalls. "We signed the deal in a conference call, while – I seem to recall – Bruce was driving in a car in Hollywood. Bruce gave us carte blanche to go crazy and to make the comic the 'director's

cut' of the film.

"He had been frustrated by budget restrictions," Barta says, "and told a few funny stories about arriving on set to direct a crowd scene, only to find that the promised 100 extras were closer to three."

Barta says the independent comics revolution that the Hernandez brothers helped launch largely fizzled out, with some companies going belly up and others behaving more like the mainstream companies they were supposed to be an alternative to.

But good and lasting things came out

and DC over the years).

Barta says he discovered while writing stories for Marvel's self-parodying title, What The--?!, and for Insane, Dark Horse Comics' answer to Mad Magazine, that he didn't really gravitate to the gravity and grandiosity of most superhero books.

"It was during these years that I found my own voice, which was definitely not as a superhero artist," he says. "I tend to add a bit of humor to everything."

Interestingly, one of Barta's career highlights happened on a superhero project, but not a grave or grandiose one.

Barta did a stint as penciler on DC Comics' *Plastic Man*, an influential title created in 1941 by writer-artist Jack Cole.

Cole's work on *Plastic Man* was surrealistic, silly and audacious.

"I think Jack Cole is one of the greatest cartoonists that came up through comic books," Barta says. "And to me, Plastic Man is the greatest superhero of all."

Barta calls the assignment daunting and

of it, he says. Comic books, he says, draw a broader audience these days that expects a wider range of content.

Fantagraphics, the small Seattle company that discovered the Hernandez brothers work, is still going strong and still publishing *Love & Rockets*.

Hernandez says that even when he isn't actively working on *Love & Rockets* stories, the characters live on in his head.

"Strange as it sounds," he says, "I have to treat them like real people who live nearby. It makes them seem more real to me. For example, when I'm doing a story without my main character, Maggie, in it, I'm still picturing where she is, where she lives in relation to the story."

Barta says his career has been "a cycle of burnout and rejuvenation."

The comic book business sometimes gets him down, he says, but the work doesn't.

"Sometimes it seems all of life is coming to grips with the cynical, dog-eat-dog realities of survival," he says. "But I still find joy in drawing funny pictures. Forget the 'comics industry' – I still thrill watching two suns rising over an alien world, I still smile at the drool from a bug-eyed monster and I still laugh at the antics of a square-jawed, muscle-bound hero."

Dancing Toward a Vision

--Feature • Mikautadze Dance Theatre

For those who have seen Mikautadze Dance Theatre at Taste of the Arts or at their annual May show at IPFW, where they have a residency, it's immediately apparent that the founders of the company, Elizabeth and David Mikautadze, enjoy collaboration.

Not only does the couple, who met in Boston when Elizabeth was studying at

The Boston Conservatory, share a vision for their group of dancers (with Elizabeth acting as artistic director and David, who works at Sweetwater Sound, as musical director), but they bring along an eclectic assortment of colleagues. Poets, singers, instrumentalists to name a few have shared the stage at MDT. This May's show will be no different.

"For those who have seen a MDT show before, you can expect to see even more collaboration this May," says Elizabeth. "Our newest artistic element this year involves an art installation/sculpture by Gregor Roth. We are also working with three composers and The Manchester University Chamber Singers who are performing live with us. Every year our collaborations have become more deeply rooted in de-

veloping a vision with the creativity of several artists. This process of collaboration has become a source of energy and connection to local artists. Collaboration is a big part of why strong work is being produced and why we can benefit the community."

Elizabeth's background is filled with collaboration and experiences from a variety of different influences. After graduation from the Boston Conservatory, she headed to New York City and studied further at the Martha Graham Dance Center, Alvin Ailey School, Paul Taylor School and others, dancing professionally with Buglisi/Foreman Dance company and Mereminne Dancers. She says her time dancing with the iconic Martha Graham Dance Center continues to resonate in her work today.

"My time spent at the Martha Graham Dance Center is very influential to me as a director and choreographer for MDT. The MDT dancers spend most of their training hours developing their bodies in Graham's technique, which builds strong, core-centered dancers that have a versatility and ability to express movement like no other.

"Some MDT dancers have come to me with little or no formal training, and quickly this method has proven to me that this technique, although formed in the 1940s, is still very valid today," Elizabeth continues.

"Much like ballet is a cornerstone for many styles of dance, Graham's technique is that for my choreographic process and athletic demands. I am so happy to be sharing what I learned from the great Graham artists in New York City with MDT dancers in Fort Wayne."

The Mikautadzes moved to Fort Wayne

in 2012. I try to remember that each step in the right direction is important no matter how small and how long it takes."

As she approaches this year's performances (May 15-16), Elizabeth's choreography is clearly inspired by a variety of artistic influences, which makes the longing to collaborate with others understandable.

"My approach while working on choreography is to not just focus on the dancing

itself, rather the complete artistic vision. Each piece has at least two genres of art involved. So whether it is dance and music or dance, music and photography or sculpture, the combining of these elements are all important. and attention to all of these elements is crucial to me as an artist. Dancing and choreographing has always been about the artistic result, not purely about the technicality of the dancers or the trendiness of a certain style.

"I hope that the audience is taken somewhere outside of their normal day to day and is given a catalyst to spark imagination. Much of the work is received as an impression, like a painting on canvas that moves."

Elizabeth also credits her growing company of dancers for bringing her

choreography to life and for making the presence of MDT felt more in recent years.


"The company is constantly evolving. We have Tracy Tritz who has been with us from the very beginning. Tracy's dancing and my choreography fit like Cinderella's glass slipper," she says.

"As an artist, really knowing your dancers and their nuances is so special. Very often choreographers set work on dancers they just met, and I cannot help but think this alters the work.

"Emily Keisler and Nina Shaw have also been with MDT for several years. I know them now as dancers and people, and it is truly awesome to be able to go home and choreograph, already knowing how it will look when they dance the work.

MDT also has three new dancers: Cory Waite, who is dancing his second season with the theatre, and Emily Craig and Kelsey Patnoude, both MDT apprentices.

"This group of dancers really works well together and I couldn't be more proud of them," Elisabeth says. "With new dancers in the room there is always a shift in energy and dynamic, so blending this new energy with the more senior dancers is inspiring and keeps me on my toes as a choreographer."

A Storybook Weekend

The first Fairy Tale Fest was such a success that on Saturday, May 16 it's coming back, bigger and better than ever.

"Last year's event exposed a lot of our audience to different things the downtown Fort Wayne arts scene has to offer," says Youtheatre executive director and Fairy Tale Fest organizer Leslie Hormann. "We're so excited to bring it back again."

Along with Youtheatre administrative assistant Bret Wilson and outreach educator Heather Closson, Hormann has been attending meetings throughout the past year with the Kickstart Fest committee, which is holding their event in conjunction with the arts festival.

"It's neat to connect the arts with a citywide event," says Hormann. "Kickstart merges fitness and outdoor activities with other activities that can be enjoyed by the whole family. We bring the arts component."

For Youtheatre's 80th anniversary season, Hormann selected two shows, one of which was significant to their history. The musical The Magic Pebble Gang was written for the Youtheatre 33 years ago by Nancy Carlson Dodd and Betsy Chapman, two long-time arts support-

Because it was written 33 years ago, it was a little bit dated in some ways, so Hormann updated it slightly.

"There are cell phones in it now," she says.

The cast includes two adult actors: Andy Gingrich, who plays Captain Crimson, and University of St. Francis theatre student Clare Ramel, who plays Old Lady Figaro.

"Both are very comical roles," says Hormann, "and Andy and Clare are hilarious in the show."

The other selection, Sleeping Beauty, was written by Hormann, and features an all-youth cast and "a lot

Hormann says that it was difficult to cast the shows, despite their large casts. One hundred and ten kids auditioned for 60 roles.

Although anyone can audition for Youtheatre productions, Hormann says that students have a bit of an advantage simply because the directors are familiar with their work and their capabilities.

"However, we had a pretty good mix of veteran Youtheatre students and non-students," she says.

In addition to the Youtheatre shows, the festival will feature two other live performances from local arts groups. The Fort Wayne Ballet will present Thumbelina from this season's Family Series, and the Fort Wayne Dance Collective is performing an interactive show, How Taiko Was Born, "which brings in a musical element," says Hormann.

Hormann says they learned a lot from last year's inaugural event and have made some improvements to this year's. For instance, there will be more free activi-

"We're also ramping up our storybook character meet and greet," she says. "Last year we just had a couple of characters that children could interact with, but this year, we have 10."

The live, costumed actors, provided by Rose

Brand, will include familiar characters from children's including, of literature, course, princesses.

They also selected a more prominent location for FAME's arts and crafts section, which will include hands-on activities for kids to make.

"And there will be more interactive stuff," says Hormann. "We're having a treasure hunt to tie in with

The Magic Pebble Gang which takes place aboard a pirate ship. We're doing Mad Libs in the lobby and an interactive dance activity."

Hormann and her team are already planning the 2017 Fairy Tale Fest, which takes about two solid years to organize. Next year's Fairy Tale Fest production will be Alice in Wonderland, and they will also be holding an audition workshop in April 2016.

Tickets to this year's festival are \$20 for all four performances, or \$12 and \$17 for single performances. Other activities in the downtown Arts United campus (including the Arts United Center, Fort Wayne Museum of Art, and the Auer Center for Performing Arts, all on Main Street at Lafayette) are free. There will also be an assortment of food trucks and food vendors available.

The festival starts at 10 a.m. with Sleeping Beauty. How Taiko Drumming Was Born will be performed at 11:30 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. Thumbelina will be at 11:30 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. The festival closes with *The* Magic Pebble Gang beginning at 2 p.m.

To kick off its 60th anniversary season, the Wagon Wheel Center for the Arts (WWCA) in Warsaw is stepping up its annual fundraising game.

Viking

No Child Left Behind

What comes to mind when one hears the term Viking metal? Well-oiled muscular brutes like Manowar? Tolkien references from bands like Amon Amarth? Fire-breathing European black metalers like Bathory? Despite the namesake, Viking ditch the common pretensions and arguably over-



blown theatrics of Viking metal and concentrate on blasting bits of your face off with powerful thrash and groove metal.

The band's third album, *No Child Left Behind*, is the sound of a long dormant army finally being enacted to fight another war. After band leader, Ron Daniel Eriksen, became a born-again Christian in the midst of recording 1988's *Man of Straw*, he disbanded Viking to become a bible teacher and Pastor of the Calvary Chapel of Cheyenne. In the past few years, however, drastic life and faith changes prompted Eriksen to end his decades-long hiatus.

Normally, 25 years in between albums would be a cause for concern in regards to song quality. Fortunately, the musical vitality of *No Child* shows no hint of atrophy, rendering the passage of time between albums irrelevant. This is a rare quality for a thrash band, but one that comes at a price for Eriksen, as he uses the album's blistering 50 minutes to exorcise his personal demons. Such tales of personal trauma as told in "9:02 on Flight 182" extend back to Eriksen's childhood when he witnessed a 727 jet aircraft crash into the neighborhood near his home, killing over 150 people. Album highlight, "Helen Behind the Door" offers a harrowing account of a time in Eriksen's life when a mental patient stalked him and even stabbed the man who prevented her from gaining access to Eriksen.


While Eriksen provides the creative guidance to take Viking in an exciting direction, the musicians expertly fulfill their duty in bringing the songs to life. Local shredder of Zephaniah and Cougar Hunter fame, Justin Zych, makes his guitar flutter and scream to match the emotive lyrics. Gene Hoglan, living up to his nickname as "the atomic clock," pairs up with Mike Gonzalez on bass to create a punishing rhythm section and give the songs the complexity they deserve. The dedication in the performances shines throughout, but the ensemble proves particularly skilled on (relatively) short bursts like "An Ideal Opportunity" and "By the Brundlefly."

Eriksen's screaming vocals will remind some of a younger, lessstrained Tom Araya of Slayer, and some will view this album as a satisfying surrogate until the new Slayer album arrives. But *No Child Left Behind* is more than just a beast created by thrash enthusiasts for thrash maniacs; it's also a dignified return for a promising thrash band from decades of yore. Colleen

Captain of None

Colleen is the nom de plume of Cécile Schott. She performs, records, mixes and produces her albums herself. According to the liner notes of her new and stunning album *Captain of None*, she plays Treble Viola Da Gamba, melodica, percussion and effects, along with handling singing duties. The album



is a mix of instrumental pieces and more pop-inflected songs with vocals. But make no mistake, this isn't radio dreck. This is beautiful and rather alien music that could be playing in the background one second and be a score to an art house film or playing at an art installation the next

If I had to compare what Schott makes with someone you might recognize, I'd say Andrew Bird comes to mind. The violin is the through line in "Holding Horses," the album opener. Much like Bird, Schott doesn't play the music in that regular old way. She plucks with her fingers. She creates new sounds with an old instrument.

"I'm Kin" shows Schott's vocals nicely. There's no showboating, no lovelorn weeping coming through her voice. Her voice is like another color in the overall painting and perfect for her music.

BACKTRACKS

Them

Them Featuring Here Comes the Night (1965)

The U.S. debut from Van Morrison's first band, Them, was a little different track-wise than the U.K. release, but it had all the groovy mid-60s soul.

Opening with the brilliant Bert Berns number, "Here Comes the Night," the record keeps on swingin' with "Mystic Eyes" before taking a well-deserved breather in the melancholy "Don't Look Back." A little bluesy and



maybe a touch of Motown, it's the blueprint on which Morrison based his solo career.

"One Two Brown Eyes" has the British Invasion smell all over it (even though they were from Belfast) and has the same feel as The Animals or even the Rolling Stones. Side one closes with "Gloria," one of their most familiar hits and a song that has been covered by artists ranging from Hendrix to The Doors to Tom Petty.

Side two begins with the breathtaking "One More Time," followed by the mushy, yet romantic "If You and I Could Be As Two." "I Like it Like That" is rootsy rhythm and blues with a nice guitar hook and some cool keyboards from Peter Bardens. Them cover "Route 66," a standard from 20 years before written by Bobby Troup, and the album closes with the hearty "Go On Home Baby." That song will have you swearing you are listening to the Rolling Stones.

Although Morrison was only with the band for a couple of records, Them went on to produce about a dozen decent LPs and tour extensively in the early- to mid-70s. Morrison has released over 30 albums, and is touring in Europe this summer. He has won several Grammys (and other notable accolades) and has one of the most recognizable voices in rock and roll.

Fun Fact: Morrison's "Brown-Eyed Girl" has been played on the radio over 11 million times. (*Dennis Donahue*)

"This Hammer Falls" is reminiscent of Adrian Belew and his more experimental moments on *Mr. Music Head*. Then, toward the end, there's some electronic noodling and radio squall that brings electronic musician and pioneer Pauline Oliveros' "I of IV" to mind. Pretty stunning stuff. The beautiful "Salina Stars" ends side A on a longing and wistful note.

There is an island feel to *Captain of None*. From the ocean blue color of the album art, to the "captain" reference in its title, to the melancholy feel of a track like "Lighthouse" (which brings to mind Lindsey Buckingham's "Never Going Back Again" in the way Schott plucks the violin's strings), you get the feeling of looking out over a vast ocean, feeling both at peace and overwhelmed at its utter beauty and vastness.

There's something that's both very familiar and completely alien with this record. There's familiarity amongst the spacey effects and experimental interludes. "Soul Alphabet" is playful with an almost Southern charm as Schott layers bits and pieces with her violin to create a sunny stroll of a song. "Eclipse" is heavy on echo and has more of an ominous vibe – the calm before some impending storm. This track is a great example of what Schott truly can do in the studio. It all builds up to the title track, a song that I think I could listen to all day and still not grow tired of. I think it was a smart move of Schott to place the catchiest track on the back end of this record. It lets all the other beauty on this record shine even more brightly. "Captain of None" is a piece of strikingly wonderful work.

What I've learned after listening to Colleen's *Captain of None* for the 30th time in the last few days is that once in a while you just need to throw caution to the wind. Sometimes you need to step out of the comfort zone and give something new a try.

Captain of None is one of the best albums I've heard in 2015, and one I'll be listening to for years to come. (John Hubner)



Hip-hop pioneer Tech N9ne (aka Aaron Dontez Yates) is famous for co-founding the Kansas City label Strange Music with friend Travis O'Guin, but even more for throwing a lot of dark commentary into his fast-as-lightning

rhymes. Over the course of his now quarter-century-long career, Yates has tackled everything from abortion to infidelity and the psychology of violence. Fans also know him as the dude in the weird face paint. Come performance time, he's rarely seen without his trademark white and black mask, the crown of which sometimes sports a simple "IX" and other times is more intricate and esoteric.

Yates, often referred to as "Tech," will be at Piere's Thursday, May 14 as part of his "82 Cities in 85 Days" tour. Guests Chris Webby, King 810, Krizz Kaliko and Murs will open the show. Yates got his rap name from the Tec-9 semi-automatic handgun, but the moniker is not an homage to violence. Rather, it's in reference to his dizzyingly quick, Chopper-like rapping style.

In the 90s his rapid-fire and often odd lyrics drew the attention of hip-hop heavy hitters Perspective, Qwest, and JCOR records. Before growing disenchanted with the music biz, he put out *The Calm*



Before the Storm and The Worst. Then, in 2001, he left the JCOR label to start one of his own, and released Anghellic with Strange Music. Since then, he's worked with pretty much every big name in hiphop, including Snoop Dogg, T-Pain, Busta Rhymes, Lil Wayne and Mint Condition. He's also helmed 16 studio albums, including the much-loved Something Else and his newest effort, Special Effects. His songs are featured in films and TV and video games, and he's performed on Jimmy Kimmel Live and at the Rock the Bells festival.

According to Lloyd Jaffe of Hot New Hip-Hop, Tech N9ne is a rare breed of artist. He plays well with others – he's always recording new "collabos" with his friends and on such recordings is more than happy to share the mic and the spotlight – and creates tracks that dare to sound like nothing you've heard before.

"Tech is one of the most consistently intriguing artists in hip-hop right now," Jaffe writes. Intrigued? Get your tickets now.

Slipknot/Stone Sour frontman Corey Taylor has booked a solo tour to coincide with a promotional book tour he's launching in July. Taylor's latest book, You're Making Me Hate You: A Cantankerous Look At The Misconception That Humans Have Any



Common Sense Left, is set to be released July 7. He is doing a few book signings, though none are currently scheduled in this area. There are, however, solo gigs set for Detroit on July 10 and Chicago on July 11. If you are going to either of those shows, I'd check the Slipknot website, as there are bound to be book signings in those cities as well.

Stone Temple Pilots are reportedly better than ever with new frontman **Chester Bennington** at the mic. The band has announced a few dates for the fall, and this area is a focus. STP will visit Cleveland September 15, Detroit September 16 and Cincinnati September 22. One dollar per ticket sold on this tour will be donated to Music For Relief, a non-profit organization dedicated to disaster relief and environmental protection. That organization is currently helping people in Nepal deal with their earthquake disaster.

Mamby on the Beach is the ridiculous name for a two-day EDM festival in the Windy City. Taking place at Chicago's Oakwood Beach July 11-12, the festival is touting **Passion Pit** and **Empire of the Sun** as headliners. Also set to appear among the 30 or so booked acts are **Royksopp**, **Cut Copy**, **Phantogram**, **Felix Da Housecat** and **Matthew Dear**. If you're going, don't forget your glow sticks.

Daughtry are heading to Firekeepers Casino near Battle Creek June 26. The band is still touring in support of its 2013 album, *Baptized*, and plans to tour through the summer before releasing a new album. Also scheduled for Firekeepers are comedian **Tim Allen** on July 11 and **Boston** on July 18.

Boston will be back in the area August 7 when they play Hoosier Park Racing and Casino in Anderson as part of that casino's summer concert series. The series currently only consists of three shows; the Boston show, **Travis Tritt** and the **Charlie Daniels Band** June 5 and **REO Speedwagon** August 15. No Need to Rush to See the New Avengers

The first of May fell on a Friday this year, and Avengers: Age of Ultron grabbed that date to kick off the summer movie season. I want a rip-roaring kick-off to the summer surfeit of movies. Unfortunately, Avengers is so stuffed with stuff that it will be weeks before I can subject myself to more gooey, glossy summer action fare.

With so many superheroes to give screen time to, it isn't surprising that this second Avengers installment is long, two hours and 22 minutes long. Writer and director Joss Whedon is back, and he has put more of everything into this next chapter: more plot, more characters and more crazed action se-

There is more humor too. The jokes don't stop after the first five minutes, which is welcome, but the whole enterprise is ex-

Early on, somebody says, "I totally support your avenging." I echo that sentiment, but this avenging is berserk.

Avengers jumps right in with a long, loud action sequence that involves most of the gang. They descend upon the last stronghold of HYDRA, high in the mountains of Sokovia, to retrieve the staff of Loki and the

Infinity Stone that is some part of its origin story. They wrest these prizes from the clutches of Baron von Strucker (Thomas Kretschmann)

Iron Man is leading the crew, and much as I love Robert Downey Jr., he looks weary - like he could use an infusion of iron for strength. (He looks better as the film goes on, which makes little sense, since much of the trauma of Age of Ultron is his fault.) Also

involved this first raid and on board for the duration are Chris Hemsworth as Thor, Chris Evans as Captain America, Jeremy Renner as Hawkeye, Mark Ruffalo and his CGI

alter ego the Hulk and Scarlett Johansson as the Black Widow.

During the raid they pick up new characters: the weird twins, Aaron Taylor-Johnson as Quicksilver and his telekinetic sister, Scarlet Witch (Elizabeth Olsen). As Colbie



Smulders (back as Maria Hill) says in the most succinct and funny line of the movie, "He's fast. She's weird." The twins hate the Avengers and keep changing sides.

Though their mission is mostly a success, the Avengers, especially Tony Stark and Ban-Bruce ner, worry that the Avengers can't provide enough protection for the

good people of Earth. Retreating into the laboratory, Stark and Banner take the powers of the Scepter and the Infinity Stone and tinker themselves some monster artificial intelligence.

In full on Frankenstein mode, good

intentions go horribly wrong. They want an army of artificial intelligence robots to protect us. What they get is an army with a leader who evolves to the idea that the only way to get peace is to eliminate humans and put some flesh and life into his "people."

James Spader is the voice of Ultron. As the product of Tony Stark's imagination, Ultron has the snarky sensibility of his creator. Spader has every vocal weapon in the arsenal. He makes a great villain.

He loses an early battle with the Avengers who retreat to lick their wounds. The safe house that gives them shelter is a very comely old farmhouse and barns in what could be upstate New York or Pennsylvania.

To their surprise, this is the secret home of Hawkeye, and it comes complete with a great wife (Linda Cardellini) and some kids. This humanizing respite is a high point in the

We've already seen Black Widow use her charm to calm the Hulk back into Bruce Banner. In these quiet moments we see that these two have real chemistry, and we learn that the flirting between them is part of an effort for Bruce Banner not to lean too much



We in Fort Wayne have a little gem in the West Central neighborhood that I had not visited for far too long. The Arena Dinner Theatre, founded in 1974 and in its current location (719 Rockhill) since 1995, is Fort Wayne's only dinner theater, and it packs a bunch of entertainment and style into an intimate space.

Its current production, Rounding Third, written by Richard Dresser, is a delightful two-person play which begins when a little league baseball coach meets his new assistant coach. The two couldn't be much more different. Picture The Odd Couple taking place in the dugouts of a suburban park and you have Rounding

Third. These two clash just as much as Felix and Oscar and are as funny when they do.

Michael Johnson, an uptight businessman with zero baseball experience, is not at all what Coach Don would have picked for an assistant, but it seems he'd been given no choice. Equally disappointing for Coach Don is that Michael's son, Freddy, who

has the same amount of baseball skill as his father, will be on the team. The list of complaints Don has about Michael is a lengthy one. He's late. He answers his phone during practice. He doesn't drink. He doesn't bring his wife to games. He doesn't bring snacks. He doesn't care so much about winning, which is all Don



Curtain Call

Over the course of one little league season, the two men learn much about each other and about compassion and how to cope when life is uncooperative with our dreams. During periods of life transition. they show each other an unexpected kind of support though their insults of the other never cease.

The two seasoned actors playing Don and Michael are very good, indeed. Kevin Knuth brings to the character of Don a combination of gruff obnoxiousness and a kind of weird charm. His observations of and thoughts about Michael. which he freely expresses, are hysterical. The advice and rules he gives the little ballplayers

are pretty funny too. As Michael, Aaron Mann, who has spent quite a bit of time on all of Fort Wayne's stages, is also very funny. We watch him both learn about baseball and loosen up, at least some, during the season. By the end of the play, he even channels Don's

Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee is one I wish was going to be around a week longer. It is a little shiny gem of singing, dancing, humor, wisdom, audience participation, improvisation - and several deliciously hard spelling words to be learned.

Guest directed by Dr. John Tolley, the show is as good as you could find in any theater anywhere. William Finn's 2005 score is beautifully played by music director Eunice Wadewitz's small but mighty pit

orchestra. The story is acted and sung with zest, heart and even the oft-sought and seldom attained quality of pizzazz by an amazing cast of theater veterans with credits not just in northeast Indiana, but in exotic places like New York and Chicago.

The truths that are spelled out between the words may even make you squirm. The play is supposed to take

place at a middle school spelling contest, and middle schoolers are all about making people squirm. And yes, there is some of both A Chorus Line and You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown, as director Tolley noted in his well-crafted Director's Notes last week; but there is also some Avenue Q swearing and talk of "inconvenient erections" and maybe a future for Chip Tolentino as an Elder in The Book of Mormon.

The six "kids" are each wonderful in their characters' own ways. Eric Smead as William Barfée practically stops the first act with the number "Magic Foot" and redefines pudgy, grumpy, proto-bully William along the way. Smead also was part of a show-stealing pair of princes last year in IPFW's production of Into the Woods, so here's a vote for more Smead in future shows! Gary Lanier's choreography highlights youth-

ful energy, fun and pandemonium, as epitomized by "Magic Foot."

Emilie Henry also is magnificent playing Olive Ostrovsky, a latchkey kid whose nurturing comes

from the dictionary. "The I Love You Song," sung by Olive and her absent parents (Henry, Tracey Graham and Albert Brownlee), was superb, emotional and musically perfect. The small but mighty orchestra of Wadewitz, Eileen Ahlersmeyer, Ben Wedler, Tom Beuchel. Faith Vernon and Evan Gidley were astonishing. I wish it could be on YouTube so I

could replay it over and over.

Free-spirited Leaf Coneybear, played by Nick Chaney, is another character you tend to take away from Spelling Bee. Costume designer Schellie Englehart's design really is something a middle-school aged homeschooled boy would create. Leaf's outfit is amazing and perfect, as is Leaf. Chaney, hot off his hilarious turn as Pinocchio in Civic's Shrek, keeps just enough of the squeaky sincerity to make Leaf adorable. Emily Arata, the youngest member of the cast, plays the driven perfectionist Marcy Park judiciously, delivering a blend of brusque determination followed by eventual liberation.

Another audience favorite on opening night was

If you've not been to Arena, I encourage you to reserve a seat for Rounding Third between now and the 16th or for its next production, Daddy's Dyin' Who's Got The Will?, starting in June.

years, particularly since Alexis Ingram assumed the role of youth company director. She admits to having her own attachment to *The Secret Garden*, one which makes this story especially significant for her.



But soon playtime is over, and it is back to mayhem for the Avengers. All troops are called. Samuel L. Jackson appears as Nick Fury, full of wisdom and a Shaft-like fashion sense. Others who appear include Don Cheadle as James Rhodes or War Machine and Anthony Mackie as Sam Wilson, the Falcon. Julie Delpy, Idris Elba and Stellan Skarsgard all put in some time. Andy Serkis has a brief but memorable few minutes as a criminal type.

Best expansion of a role is Paul Bettany going from the voice of Jarvis, the automated butler of Tony Stark to a fine looking bit of walking, thinking, good guy, artificial intelligence known as Vision.

If you aren't a devoted Avengers fan, I don't recommend *Age of Ultron*; at the very least I wouldn't urge you to rush to the theater. It will play for a long time, move to discount movie theaters and live forever in other formats. If you do go and your attention lags, leave after the country home respite.

Things just get so crazy after that. Its all effects, effects, effects. Of course, nothing even tries to make sense after a certain point. For instance, the bad guys are going to lift a chunk of the earth, throw it into space and then hurl it back to Earth to get rid of civilization as we know it. Whatever.

None of it matters. Nothing bad is going to happen. There is no sense of jeopardy for

any of our Avengers. The rest of the movie is a quip here, a crash there, a dig at a fellow Avenger every now and then and explosions everywhere. The fate of humanity does not hang in the balance. There is barely a reason to hold your breath.

One smart-mouth line of the movie riffs on *Long Day's Journey into Night*, loosely quoted as "I've had a long day. Eugene O'Neill long." Whedon and his cast have the skills to carry off a film that has a little more O'Neill style complexity and strife.

The next *Avengers* chapters are the highly anticipated "Infinity War," currently scheduled to come out in two parts one for May 2018 and 2019. I hope future installments have more heart and soul and less dependence on CGI battles and mayhem.

First, he can design terrific sets like this one, transforming the Arts United stage into the Putnam Panther's gymnasium. And now we learn that he can also sing, dance, skate and act? In the spirit of the Kentucky Derby last weekend, when Civic hired him, they hit the superfecta!

Megan Meyer has had a stellar season at Civic, with the part of Logainne Schwartzandgrubenniere as her fourth substantial role. While the lisp made her somewhat hard to understand, she got a plum with one of the

parts of the play that traces back to its improvisational roots: The Schwartzy Ad Lib in which Miss Schwartzandgrubenniere is expected to fire off a couple minute speech about a current topic. Needless to say, as the daughter of two gay dads, Indiana's recent political history provides some low-hanging fruit for Schwartzyu, which no doubt will continue to be honed sharper with each performance.

The Adults are no less delightful. As Rona Lisa Perretti, Tracey Graham is our host, our color commentator and would-be orthographic icon. Few actors get applause from Fort Wayne audiences by just walking out on stage, and now Reuben Albaugh has earned that appreciation. From our first view of him as Vice Principal Douglas Panch,

we believe he really is a junior high school principal. And few miscreants doing community service can sound as angelic as Albert Brownlee's Mitch Mahoney, champion hugger. He was more than a little confusing however as one of Schwartzy's dads. His Dan Schwartz wears an apron and a longhaired wig, making him look more like a *Hairspray* mom than a gay dad.

And lest we forget, one last bit of praise should go to Corey Lee's lighting. The use of spots added a lot to the production, particularly with Leaf Coneybear, as well as in Olive's parental fantasy and in Jesus' memorable come-to-Marcy moment.

Overall, this one rates a big "bravo!"
