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Old Friends Together Again

----- Feature • Willie Nelson w/Leon Russell------

In the pantheon of American music icons, you won't find two more revered, or more hirsute, musicians than Willie Nelson and Leon Russell. Both have left an indelible impression on music in the last half century, as well as on each other's guitar. Though each made his mark in different sub-genres of the American canon, Nelson and Russell found enough common ground to record a No. 1 album and to share an audible buzz when they manage to align their schedules and appear together on the same bill.

Of course, in America we don't have just one pantheon of American music; we have many. One is the Grammy Hall of Fame which, with its international deli approach, allows two heaps of Elvis Presley to be sandwiched in a bun of Elton John and Enrico Caruso.

Nelson is in Grammy Hall twice, Russell not at all. But I bet Nelson would gladly give his old friend one of his spots, or at least let him use it for a minute or two.

Willie Nelson and Leon Russell will add another chapter to their long and storied history on May 19 at the Foellinger Theater in Fort Wayne. Both have been in or near Fort Wayne frequently in the past few years, but this is first time the pair have appeared here together. Both men are getting on in years - Nelson turned 82 on April 29 and Russell 73 on April 2 - and both continue to record.

In 2014 Nelson released Band of Brothers, which is mostly new material, and De-

cember Day, recorded with his sister and longtime piano player, Bonnie Nelson. He is set to release another record of new material, Django & Jimmie, later this year. Recorded with his old pal Merle Haggard, Django & Jimmie recalls 1983's outstanding Pancho & Lefty.

Nelson also just published a memoir, titled It's a Long Story: My Life, with David Ritz.


Russell, after a period of relative obscurity, made the charts again in 2010 collaborating with Elton John on The Union. The success of that record and the subsequent tour spurred Russell to put out Life Journey, a disc of standards plus a couple originals. It also basically got him into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame and back on the road as a solo performer.

In the early 1970s Russell's star shone brightly while Nelson's was lost in the cluster of Nashville's star-maker machinery. Following his days as a member of the famous Wrecking Crew, the group of Los Angeles session musicians behind a bin of hit songs in the 60s, Russell had emerged as the go-toguy for the likes of Joe Cocker and George Harrison, assembling the band for Cocker's Mad Dogs & Englishmen tour and serving

as sort of utility infielder for Harrison's Concert for Bangladesh. Russell played with or produced just about every hip performer of

Russell's own output included "Delta Lady," "A Song for You," "Masquerade," "Superstar" and "Hummingbird," all songs he wrote and recorded himself but that at some point were turned into hits by others. His biggest hit was "Tightrope" from 1972's Carney.

In 1973 Billboard named Russell the top



www.fortwayneparks.org concert attraction for the year. Russell was aware of his cachet well before that. In a 2014 interview with Rock Cellar Magazine, Russell recalled an exchange with star producer Glyn Johns (Led Zeppelin, The Who, Eric Clapton, The Band, Bob Dylan) during the sessions for Russell's 1970 self-titled debut. Johns had made some suggestions regarding the arrangements. "And I said (sternly), 'when we make your record, we'll do what you want to do. We're making my record, just record the stuff and don't give me any arrangement tips, I don't care to hear

> But despite constant touring and recording, Russell's star began to dim as the 70s wore on. But in 1979 he and Nelson scored a No. 1 album and supporting tour with One

Nelson had met Russell nearly a decade earlier, and the two became instant fans of one another.

In a 1996 Los Angeles Times story published ahead of the first Nelson-Russell shows in 17 years, Connie Nelson, Willie's third ex-wife, recalled turning Willie on to Russell. "I was driving out in the middle of nowhere and had just bought Leon's new Carney tape about 1972 or '73 and was listening to it," she said. "I stopped in the middle of the Texas desert, pulled the car next to a pay phone, called Willie and said, 'You've got to hear this.' Carney was blasting from

the car radio. Later, they met and Willie started to grow his hair long soon after that."

Whenever that "later" was, it was likely the meeting where, in addition to maybe spurring Nelson's hair growth, Russell asked Nelson to scratch his name into his guitar. Nelson said he would but only if Russell signed his too. Russell was the first of many to sign Trigger, Nelson's famous road-worn Martin classical guitar. (Rolling Stone recently made a short bio-pic about Trigger.)

And it was Trigger that stole the spotlight on Nelson's breakthrough Red Headed Stranger. The concept album was released in 1975 and marked the first time a record company let Willie Nelson be Willie Nelson. The record was nothing like anything Nelson had put out before. Stripped-down and devoid of the doughnut glaze coating most country music had at the time, Red Headed Stranger reached No. 1 on the country

charts, launched Nelson to stardom and earned him his first entry into the Grammy Hall of Fame.

Like most country music aspirants, Nelson had moved to Nashville in the 60s. There he penned some great songs, including "Crazy," "Nightlife,"
"Funny How Time Slips Away" and "Hello Walls," which became hits for Patsy Cline, Ray Price,

Billy Walker and Faron Young. He recorded a number of albums, but his offbeat phrasing and his style didn't blend with the label-imposed template. The results were uncomfortable at best.

Nelson left Nashville for Texas in 1969 after his house caught on fire. The move got him out of the staid scene in Music City and into the free-wheeling atmosphere of Austin. It was in Austin that Nelson found his voice and his people.

He started hosting the infamous Fourth of July Picnics (Russell played at the first one in 1973) and blending his deep country background with his burgeoning hippie habits. The result was something new entirely. A sort of psychedelic country began pouring out of his Family Band. Longhairs and rednecks came to his picnics and boogied to the

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----- Feature • Coco Montoya In the Footsteps of Giants

If anyone in the blues rock world has a right to be cocky, it's Coco Montoya. The drummer-turned-guitarist can boast stints in bands helmed by legends Albert Collins and John Mayall, as well as a decades-long solo career during which he's recorded eight studio albums and earned a slew of awards and honors from the people, organizations, and magazines that hand out such things.

But Montoya, who brings his ice hot

stylings to C2G Music Hall on Friday, May 15, is modest - so modest, in fact, and unsure of his own talent that he only just now released a live album, the aptly titled Songs from the Road, which he and bandmates Brant Leeper (keyboards), Nathan Brown (bass) and Rena Beavers (drums) recorded during a two-night engagement at the Triple Door in Seattle.

"I've always worried about recording live," he told me in a recent phone interview. He was in Lincoln, Nebraska, fixing to perform at the Zoo Bar. "You never know if you'll be at your best ... it's probably why I avoided it all these years.'

Then Montoya started thinking about the unique draw of live music. People don't go to concerts for perfection, he realized. They can get that from their mp3 player.

Things have grown so sterile with all the electronic processing we have access to in the studio," he said. "And forget the studio. If you pick up ProTools and set yourself up in your basement, even there you can virtually wipe out and erase any trace of mistakes - being flat vocally or missing a note or two. If you go to see someone in concert, it's the little mistakes and imperfections that are beautiful, human. The best music I listened to growing up was not perfect.'

Growing up in Southern California, Montoya listened to everything he could -Buddy Holly, Richie Valens, Margie Evans. He was exposed to a wide variety of music thanks to his older brothers and sisters. He said he's also grateful to the incredibly diverse offerings L.A.'s Johnny Otis Show, which introduced him to artists like Big Joe Turner, Three Tons of Joy and Ed Vincent. Rounding out his early music education were a number of Chicano groups playing in and round Los Angeles.

Little Willie G, Los Lobos, the Delgado Brothers," Montoya said. "Name an East L.A. band playing back in the day and I listened to them and learned from them as much as I could."

Montoya began his performing life as a drummer, and when he was in his late teens he met, completely by chance, the electric blues guitarist Albert Collins. They first en-

countered each other when Montova was at Whisky A Go Go to watch Buddy Miles, his hero at the time. Collins introduced Montoya to Miles, and the experience was one of those heady and surreal things a young aspiring musician never forgets. It was Collins, however, not Miles, who ended up changing the course of Montoya's life and career. Some time after that show, Collins called Montoya up and asked him to come on tour with him.

"I'd just turned 20," Montoya said. "It was my first road gig. They were desperate vou're 20 and having a ball? As long as I had a hamburger and a place to sleep, I was happy.'

Collins died in 1993 at the age of 60. Montoya was by his bedside the night before he passed, and he's since turned Collins's last words to him into a song.

"I told him, 'Pop, I'm going home now to pay bills. I'll be back tomorrow,' and he said to me, 'Son, I'm so grateful. I don't have an enemy in the world. I've got nothing but love for everyone.' I'll never forget

that, and I wrote it into my song 'Nothing But Love."

In the late 70s and early 80s, Montoya took a sabbatical from music, working various day jobs and enjoying the freedom that regular checks bring. Then, in 1984, chance again stepped in and pulled him back into the world of touring. John Mayall, the frontman of the UK's Bluesbreakers. happened to hear Montoya playing "All Your Love" at a bar. Mayall asked him to join the Bluesbreakers the next day.

"Those two instances in my life - meeting Albert and John - were not prompted by me," Montoya


said. "I was dedicated to play, but I didn't think about it. I didn't think 'Where is this taking me?' or 'I want to be in a great rock band next year.' I just enjoyed playing and learning from people. I was lucky. I was in the right place at the right time.'

The day Montoya and I spoke was the same day news broke that B.B. King had entered hospice care. Montoya, who feels immeasurably blessed to head up his own band now, met the king of the blues years ago while touring with Collins, and even though much water has flowed under the bridge since their short chat, Montoya said he'll always cherish and remember the advice B.B. gave him on that fateful night. It also happens to be the advice Montoya passes on to the up-and-coming artists he meets by chance back stage and on the road.

'My confidence wasn't very good back then," Montoya admitted. "I was always unsure, easily shaken, and Albert told B.B. that about me. B.B. came back with, 'Son, I'll tell you what. You walk up on that stage like there ain't nobody better than you. Play your show, be proud, but when you're done and you walk off that stage, leave that up there. Come down humble.

Montoya laughed sadly. "God bless B.B. King. Those were his words. 'Come down humble.' And then he said, 'If you do that, if you walk off the stage and shake hands and sign autographs and you're grateful, what you just did on stage, you can multiply that by a million.'

That's good advice right there. Not just for music or art but for life."



for a drummer, apparently. There were no rehearsals or anything. I loaded up my stuff, jumped in the van and left. Our first performance was at the University of Oregon. There were probably 300, maybe 400 people there. To me it felt like 400,000."

Collins took on the role of a second father to Montoya and often lent him his second guitar so the young drummer could teach himself how to play during down times on

"Albert was unfailingly generous," Montoya said. "He'd tune his guitars in a different key from anyone else - open F minor - and then I'd take his guitar and tune it standard. I'd give it back to him all messed up, but he never complained."

Montoya played with Collins for several years before having to bow out because he was going broke. Broke or not, Montoya remembers those years as some of the best of

Getting Back to Business

There was a time when raspy-voiced, blue collar bard Matthew Ryan thought he might turn his back on music altogether. Fifteen years into a prolific and, many fans would argue, an under-appreciated career, he'd entered what he's described as an "existential crisis." The crisis came shortly after the release of *In the Dusk of Everything* which, according to a critic with the online music site Speakers in Code, was one of the most beautiful albums to grace the airwaves in 2012, and also one of the loneliest.

"I just got in a mode in my life of making records alone and, for the most part, at home," Ryan said during a recent phone interview. He was speaking to me from Pittsburgh where he was in rehearsals with his new band, the Northern Wires. "It was kind of shocking to me, how isolated I'd become."

Ryan, now 43 and with 10 studio albums to his credit, admits he got lost for awhile after *In the Dusk*, despite the modest success of a few of the album's singles, including "She's a Sparrow" and "Stupid World."

He'd grown disenchanted with touring and the music industry in general, and he no longer took any joy in writing or performing the down and dirty, yet emotionally vulnerable anthems he's known for.

"I have to be careful here," he told me. "I want to make it clear that the people I worked with and who helped me create during that lost time were wonderful. This is not about them. It's about being in tune with your intentions."

His intentions eventually steered him toward recording new work, but this time he decided to do so with a band behind him. After a two-year sabbatical, Ryan entered Applehead Studios in Woodstock, New York and began laying down the tracks that would become *Boxers*, his newest offering and the springboard for a tour that will bring him to CS3's Tiger Room Friday, May 22. He said the collaborative recording process, as well as the joy of being on stage with his bandmates, has re-energized him and reminded him why he began making music in the first place.

"Right now, with this gang of guys on stage, it feels like where I needed to be," Ryan said. "I'm more connected and more alive than I've been in a long time. I'd always loved collaborating with other musicians, but for some reason, when I started playing with other people again, it was almost like a revelation."

Ryan, born Matthew Webb (he changed his name in homage to his older brother who, in 2006, was sentenced to 30 years in prison and was also the inspiration behind the song "For Blue Skies") grew up in a working class neighborhood in Pennsylvania where

he developed an appreciation for the unique space where melancholy mingles with beauty and systemic hardship collides with hard-won joy. He channeled this knowledge into his debut, *May Day*, as well as *East Autumn Grin*, *Concussion*, *Regret Over the Wires* and *Matthew Ryan vs. The Silver State*. Oh, and *Dear Lover* and *In the Dusk*. His entire catalogue, in other words.

Ryan's blue collar background has made him, to a certain extent, a singer-songwriter of the political stamp, preoccupied with issues of social justice and equality, but he says his songwriting has grown more

subtle of late.

"When I was a kid, I lived in a place where government housing was the norm. Manufacturing jobs disappeared, and things grew darker, more desperate. When you're young, you can't quite put your finger on why things are going south, but you do see that people around you

are getting angrier, poorer, more dislocated. What I try to do is tell a story where empathy is irresistible. I don't want to say I've gotten sneakier in my social commentary, but I have made a conscious decision to deal with emotions rather than just facts. Facts have become so pliable these days. We're living in a time when all we can do is appeal to our humanness, our shared humanity."

Cue up *Boxers*, the album that brought Ryan back to life. Ryan says his newest work is as honest as anything he's ever done before. He's proud not only of the title track, but of bittersweet ballads like "Heaven's Hill," "Until Kingdom Come," "This One's for You Frankie," and "An Anthem for the Broken" which, incidentally, is dedicated to a friend who recently lost his battle with ALS.

"My work has never dealt in absolutes," he said. "If there's despair, there's a reason for that despair. If there's redemption, there's a reason for that too. And this rock n' roll band allows me tackle the daunting stuff with more guts, more glory. We're like a Scorcese film up there. We're not offering a bunch of feel-good, Mountain Dew anthems, but I think we're doing something beautiful, something rare. I hope Fort Wayne agrees."

hybrid sound.

In 1978 he threw everyone a curveball and released *Stardust* a brilliant collection of standards. The record won Nelson even more fans. If someone owns just one Willie Nelson record, odds are it's *Stardust*. His version of "Georgia on My Mind" earned him the 1979 Grammy for Best Male Country Vocal Performance." In 2015, *Stardust* carried Nelson into the Grammy Hall of Fame for a second time.

Considering the hard living and constant touring both Russell and Nelson have endured over the past four or five decades it's a wonder they're both still at

That they'll both be here on the same night will probably be a blast for them. It certainly will be for





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an increasingly serious day of observance of late, growing substantially since its humble beginnings in 2008.

And Fort Wayne's undeniable ringleader of the record store circus is Bob Roets,

And Fort Wayne's undeniable ringleader of the record store circus is Bob Roets, owner of Wooden Nickel and local music maven. After more than 30 years at the helm of Wooden Nickel, he's become the face of local music at a time when CD sales may be waning but, somewhat improbably, vinyl sales are soaring. And there to help lead the charge is Roets, a savvy businessman and enormously enthusiastic music fan.

Though Roets is firmly ensconced in Fort Wayne and a devoted fan of the Indianapolis Colts, he came to the city from Madison, Wisconsin. Not surprisingly, it was a record store that brought him to the area. While still a student at University of Wisconsin, Roets worked at two different Playback Music stores before moving onto manage Slatewood Records on the main drag near campus. After he graduated, he was given the chance to manage a Slatewood Records in Fort Wayne, a store that was located in the North Clinton building that Wooden Nickel now calls home.

But not long after his arrival, Slatewood's owner decided to sell the business in favor of a video rental concern, a response to the hot ticket of the early 1980s. Roets, who had long hoped to one day open his own record store, took matters into his own hands.

"When he closed the stores, it left all of us high and dry," says Roets. "I was 23 years old and went six weeks without a job. I had hoped to run my own record store by the time I was 30, but I had some money saved up, and I had a personal collection of 2,500 albums. I also knew a guy who had a warehouse full of cut-out records, records that weren't selling but couldn't be returned to the distributor. He said I could sell those. So I filled the store with my records and those cut-outs. It didn't come close to filling the store, but it was a start."

At that moment in 1982, Wooden Nickel was born. Roets might not have imagined that he and his family, which eventually included wife Cindy and his sons Christopher and Andrew, would have a business they could call their own more than three decades later. It's even more remarkable when one remembers that Fort Wayne had nine record stores - both locally owned and national chains - at the time. Roets recalls four in the adjacent Glenbrook Square alone. But always a good host, Roets began filling Wooden Nickel with music, via the newly introduced MTV which aired constantly in the store, and a clever little novelty that has become iconic.

"I always say that the smartest thing I did was those Wooden Nickel tokens. They were a nice discount, and people like that. But they were also a conversation piece. It was like a calling card, except instead of me handing you my business card, I could hand

Roets also positioned himself on the front end of the CD wave, picking up an early Genesis CD when they were not yet available in the States and getting one of the first



CD players when they arrived at Lehman Electronics. That additional novelty, and the fascination that accompanied a new technology, helped boost foot traffic as well.

"The bulk of our profits came from the introduction of the CD back then, and it really peaked when the Beatles catalog came out on CD. We had a big event when *Sgt. Pepper's* came out, put black lights in the building and had lava lamps like it was 1967. It was a lot of fun. CDs were just killing it. We had six stores opened by then, and 1988 to 1992 were our best years."

But after years of growth, there came a time when Roets admits the business suffered. When Best Buy arrived in 1992, it introduced discounts that the locally owned shops couldn't match and, along with Target and Walmart, came to offer special edition CDs which contained bonus material. It was hard for independent shops to compete.

"That hurt us a little bit because when Best Buy opened it took one-quarter of our business away. Then Napster came along and nobody wanted to have to pay for music anymore. We eventually had to close three of our stores – the ones at Georgetown, Dupont and Southgate."

But help was to come from an unexpected source. Vinyl, which had seemed all but dead with the arrival of CDs and digital sources like mp3s, began to slowly catch on again – and not just with the oldsters who still fondly remembered the format, but with a whole new generation who hardly remembered it in the first place. Wooden Nickel's North Anthony location, which carries as many albums as CDs, became a favorite stomping ground for those looking to expand their vinyl collection, and the vinyl offerings at the other two Wooden Nickel locations has slowly begun to encroach on the CD shelves too.

"A couple of years ago, I started seeing parents who had given their kids turntables for Christmas and they were coming in together to buy vinyl to play on them. And they weren't just buying brand new releases; they were getting the same thing kids were getting when I was buying albums and rediscovering classic rock and 60s hits and Motown. It's really a compliment to that time and how eclectic the bands were back then. I get a big kick out of seeing the music I experienced as a young lad being discovered by kids now."

An additional source of strength for Wooden Nickel has come recently with its inclusion in The Coalition of Independent Music Stores (CIMS). Created to help promote indies against the huge corporate competitors by providing some of the same benefits available to large retailers, interest from CIMS was a surprise to Roets, who noticed that most of its participating stores were in large markets like Los Angeles. But the folks at CIMS became aware of how much product Wooden Nickel was moving as well as the in-store appearances by local bands, something Roets had suggested to the members of CIMS when they were first introducing National Record Store Day.

After passing through a long process. Wooden Nickel is now a member of CIMS and can offer discounted new releases just as the "big box" retailers can. Another recent benefit is the addition of sampling stations where shoppers can scan a CD and hear a small sample of the music before buying.

Greater web presence and social media awareness has also come thanks to CIMS and Roets can now move merchandise that had been relegated to a warehouse and better promote in-store appearances and, of course, Record Store Day. The recent event saw the highest foot traffic ever, with Roets counting at least 50 heads in the store at any given time. With 18 bands booked, some were calling the event "Nickelstock," and while Roets chuckles at that name, it can't be entirely denied either. Where he once had to beg bands to play, he now begins to hear from them shortly after Christmas each year asking to be included in the day's full schedule.

The addition of Dogfish Beer as a National Record Store Day sponsor meant a beer truck stationed outside the North Anthony store, and businesses in the area provided their own celebration of the day. Clearly the love of records has become big business again, and Roets is starting to see that it isn't just a fad – and that he and Wooden Nickel have survived the lull.

"Vinyl has really gone mainstream. I'll tell you when I knew it was really moving that way was when a 16-year-old girl starts coming to a record store to buy vinyl when she grew up with mp3s. When that starts happening, you know it's not just a fad anymore. I was not confident three or four years ago, but when you see double-digit vinyl sales increases each year, you have to say it isn't a fad anymore."



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
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Black Vincent

Teardrop Deluxe

"I've nothing left to give," Coley Kennedy fairly cries on "Lonely and Blue," the first cut from Coley's latest project, Black Vincent.

That the erstwhile frontman for indie-folksters The Buddies (reviewed previously in these



During "When We Was Young," an atmospheric, textured stormcloud of a song, Kennedy continues the theme. "In a dream we was young," he begins simply, and he follows with memories calling forth snapshots that dissolve into shadows almost immediately.

Kennedy's plaintive voice doesn't easily fall into an easy category; it's keening and searching and a far cry from the ubiquitous, fashionably wispy bearded folk you'll hear emanating from your nearest Coffeebucks. Against the earthy-yet-airy, nuanced backdrops that populate Teardrop Deluxe, such immediacy could seem off kilter or even jarring. But Kennedy and his crew - including members of The Buddies and Welcome to Ashley - make it work. In lower, more restrained registers, he recalls Bowie by way of East River Pipe ("Smiling Jim Is Down Again," "Gone").

Teardrop Deluxe is a nexus of minimalist rock, fundamental folk, and old-school country (listen to "Sad Deep Inside" and you may hear a faint ghost of Hank himself). But though this album is generally consistent in its tone and, yes, pretty much uniformly downbeat in its lyrical mood, it's often epic in its own way. It shimmers, like sunlight in a dusty room, without sounding at all varnished. Recorded to good old-fashioned tape by folks who helmed previous productions for Deer Tick and Diamond Rugs, Teardrop Deluxe retains a naturalistic sense of space even when the reverb is cranked to "high." Kennedy often sounds as if he's singing through a storm, but he gets his point across loud and clear - even during the record's quietest moments. (D.M. Jones)

If I Kill This Thing We're All Going to Eat for a Week

What does a Foo Fighter do between tours and FF recording sessions? When you're Nate Mendel, you finally reveal your own voice to the world, and you regale us folks with the songs you've had burning a hole in your pocket and just waiting for the opportunity to be unleashed.

Under the nom de project Lieutenant, Mendel added a host of credits to his day job as a bassist when he undertook the task of



recording his solo debut- first and foremost being lyricist, songwriter

Though clunkily titled, If I Kill This Thing We're All Going to Eat for a Week is far from a tossed-off side project. Mendel has crafted an album worth hearing on its own merits, and with his own sound and voice. Sure, there's a little bit of Sunny Day Real Estate here, a dash of Foo Fighters crunch there, but If I Kill This Thing... boasts a whole lot of understated, tasteful indie-flavored rock that goes down

"Belle Epoque" has more in common with Broken Social Scene's Kevin Barnes (or maybe even Alan Parsons Project) than either of the other projects he's involved with, while "Sink Sand" demonstrates Mendel's ability to combine concise melodies with swirling, chasing horns and circling guitars. Like many of the tunes on this record, "Sink Sand" tends to favor texture over wide dynamics. It's lacking in "ah ha!" moments, but consistency can be its own reward. Smoothed-out emo echoes of Sunny Day Real Estate bubble to the surface on occasion, namely in "The Place You Wanna Go." But Mendel smartly weaves in pop confection that recalls the likes of Howard Jones and the Shins. The song is a satisfying trip and displays a surprisingly sure hand for a songwriting debut.



Go-Go's

Beauty and the Beat (1981)

Belinda Carlisle and Jane Wiedlin formed the Go-Go's in the late 70s, but it wasn't until the early 80s that they realized that their punk roots would need to be slightly muted for pop radio. This debut record was released during the summer of 1981 and was on



top of the charts for six weeks. It's blend of an alternative vibe with the post-punk beauty of the all-girl band made it a perfect fit for MTV which aired within weeks of this album's release.

The opening track, "Our Lips Are Sealed," threw out a friendly beat with a simple arrangement, making it a nice lead-in to the comfy "How Much More." Both songs had the tight drumming and harmonies that made them syrupy, yet both stoners and preps could relate to the grinding, nearly punk guitars that wailed away for around three minutes. "Tonite" was a little harder, but kept the guitars honest. The first side closes with one of my favorites, the snarky "This Town."

Side two continues the thread of alternative pop with the band's first single, "We Got the Beat." "Automatic" slows the whole thing down, but keeps it interesting with its brooding lyrics, and "Skidmarks on My Heart" rips it up once again and really shows off the musicianship of this great band.

Even though the album is understandably dated, I can still get into these ladies and their first two records. The Go-Go's popularity was sort of hit-and-miss back in the 80s, possibly due to Carlisle's goofy dancing and sugary vocals. But the Go-Go's weren't The Runaways or The Supremes, and they didn't care if they sold records (they've sold 8.5 million).

Fun Fact: The band broke up in 1985 due to drug and alcohol use, but have reformed several times. (Dennis Donahue)

While his pleasing but sometimes plain vocals aren't always up to the challenge of the material ("Artificial Limbs"), the obvious effort and talent he has poured into If I Kill This Thing... makes this record worth rooting for. As a change of pace for SDRE and Foo Fighters fans, it's definitely compelling. And its accessibility will definitely lure listeners unfamiliar with either of those bands. With this sparkling first offering, Lieutenant absolutely deserves (a) promotion. (D.M. Jones)

Sweet & Lynch

Only to Rise

Frontiers has put a lot of these types of projects together over the years, pairing big names from a past and currently successful band to make "supergroups" and "all-star projects." Sometimes this works; sometimes it doesn't. When you are putting big person-



alities together, you just never know what you'll get until you hear the end result. In the case of the pairing of Stryper's Michael Sweet and Dokken's George Lynch, it works.

There is a lot of rock history in this band, and it shows through in fine fashion. The group has crafted a straight-ahead, hard rock album much in the vein of 80s-era Dokken. Although Lynch hasn't done much lately that could be called great, the collaboration with Sweet seems to have inspired him. He is back in form with his rhythm playing and trademark solos.

Sweet's unique voice is also in fine form as the pair – along with White Lion bassist James LoMenzo and Whitesnake drummer Brian Tichy - burn through "The Wish," "Dying Rose" and "Time Will Tell." The mid-tempo "Me Without You" is also outstanding as is Led Zeppelin-esque vibe of "Strength in Numbers." "Hero-Zero" has some hokey lyrics ("the hero is a zero") but the message about elevating flawed people to hero status is spot on and the song as a whole is quite infectious. The title track serves as the albums closing tune and leaves us hoping against all hope that this album is the first of many from Sweet & Lynch instead of a one-off project designed to create some cash flow for a record label. 

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

The D-Train's Ride Gets a Wee Bit Bumpy

High school hijinks and their aftermath and effects are the fodder for many delightful and creepy movies. The best of them, whether they are predominantly funny or scary, capture the strange dynamics that arise in that constricting environment. The D Train is part of the high school reunion movie sub-genre. These movies showcase how difficult it can be to free yourself from the labels we get smacked with

Jack Black, in a role as eccentric - though differently so as his murdering mortician in Bernie, plays Dan Landsman, a guy unreasonably haunted by his high school experience. He is so obsessed by high school that he isn't just on the committee that plans reunions, he is the bullying selfappointed chair of the reunion committee. (They ditch him when they go out together after meetings.)

How nerdy is Dan? One of Dan's former classmates is played by Mike White (one of the producers). He is cooler than Dan, but at least tries to help Dan adjust his crazy. Black and White, aside from how well their names work together, make a great pair. They have done good time together in another high school flick, House of

Channel-surfing one night to forget his pain, Dan sees a Banana Boat commercial and recognizes a high school classmate, the consummate cool kid of his day, Oliver Lawless. In a bit of pure, late-night inspiration, he believes that if he can get Oliver to come to the reunion he will achieve the popularity and importance he deserves.

Dan is the kind of guy who, while calling classmates to see if they are coming to the reunion, makes up nicknames for himself, names that no one has ever called him.

He wakes his family, convinced they will share his excitement. They don't, but they are proof he's done something right. Kathryn Hahn plays Stacey, his loving wife, who knows her husband has serious self-esteem issues, especially where high school is concerned. Stacey isn't the kind of character that's made fun of. She's smart and loyal, and Hahn is so good you wish Dan could shake it off and listen to her.

Dan also has a very cool son, Zach (Russell Posner), who is beginning his own journey towards those treacherous high school years, and a cute baby daughter. But wait! He also has a decent job with a very stodgy, techno-phobe boss who genuinely likes and values Dan.



Jeffrey Tambor is Bill the boss, and a sweet subplot of The D-Train involves Dan bringing Bill into the world of modern technology. Bill's ignorance of technology allows Dan to concoct the possibility of a profitable new client in Los Angeles.

Dan needs an excuse to go to L.A. to find Oliver and



convince him to come to the reunion. A new fake client facilitates a fiction for a "business trip." Dan's lies to family and employer grow and grow, but he does find Oliver.

Oliver (James Marsden at his very best) is a floundering wannabee actor lost and sinking in the celebrity swirl of L.A. Dan's adoration and encouragement are a boost. The pair embark on some cocaine- and alcohol-fueled adventures. Dan is flung into circumstances far beyond anything he has ever experienced.

At one happening venue, the pair spot Dermot Mulroney at a table with friends. Since Dan is convinced Oliver is a star, Oliver heads over to say hello. Mulroney is polite and poised. Oliver knows just where he stands, which is nowhere mostly, and Marsden is excellent at playing the kind of "lost in celebrity world" the moment requires. He's self-absorbed

and shallow, but amid all of his druggy bad habits and delusions there is still something very human and annoyingly sympathetic and vulnerable about Oliver. Marsden doesn't hide a self-awareness of the not-A-list world of celebrity.

Oliver is a nobody to Mulroney, but a star to Dan. The hierarchy of not just celebrity, but maleness, is always present in The D Train in ways not usually shown on the big screen. Manly dynamics get more pronounced when Oliver decides to attend the reunion.

Read no further than this paragraph if you don't want to know the big twist in this movie. I didn't know what would happen when I walked into the theater, and I enjoyed the twists and turns. I won't spoil too much, and The D Train

would be intriguing even if you know what will happen. but seeing it in blissful ignorance of what will happen

Oliver is cheerfully bisexual. What happens in L.A doesn't stay in L.A. Dan returns home more than a little freaked out by what happened in one wild night. He questions everything about himself, not just his sexuality He has a mounting pile of lies and deception to juggle. He's gloomier and less confident at home and manic at work.

The D Train isn't your typical bromance. Once we know that something more than some chest bumping has gone on between Oliver and Dan, the craziness of what might happen at the reunion escalates.

All the messiness that could be is during the reunion. The D Train bumps along from loud, goofy comedic nonsense to moments of thoughtfulness to the adolescent aggressiveness that is almost too high school.

In front of everyone, many bizarre truths are shouted in front of everyone. The public spectacle is some of the more embarrassing screen time in any high school world. It isn't Carrie crazy, but you wouldn't want to be part of it. Even bystander status is uncomfortable.

But life will go on, and it does. The D Train only scratches the surface of some of the issues it raises, but it portrays possibilities few films have attempted.

Zach tells his dad, "I'm gonna get a lot of sh#@ today and I just have to deal with it. So do you."

Tru dat. Hopefully, Dan has finally shed the carapace of high school.

Ultron Dominates; Furious 7 Officially a Blockbuster

Tops at the Box: No surprise here. Joss Whedon's Avengers: Age of Ultron once again took the top spot at the box office, selling another \$77 million in the U.S. The film has grossed \$312 million domestically over its first 10 days of release and \$875 million worldwide. Reviews are solid, and check out this cast: Robert Downey Jr., Chris Hemsworth, Mark Ruffalo, Chris Evans, Scarlett Johansson, Jeremy Renner, Don Cheadle, Aaron Johnson, Elizabeth Olsen, Paul Bettany, Cobie Smulders, Anthony Mackie, Hayley Atwell, Idris Elba, Stellan Skarsgard, James Spader and Samuel L. Jackson. Have you ever seen a cast with so much star power in your life? No you have not. No, seriously, you haven't. That's as big as it gets. Ultron was/is such a surething financial success that Whedon could've got just about any actor he wanted at the lowest rate possible. Look for this one to keep kicking box office butt for weeks to come.



Another Go at Horror Gold

Outcast: Volume 1: A Darkness Surrounds Him by Robert Kirkman, Image Comics, 2015

Robert Kirkman is at it again. For his second comic book foray into the horror genre, he's drawn his story's monster from a classic horror film and set up a brooding young man as his protagonist. This time, though, there's no presumption that this will be just a comic book (the title has already been picked up as a series by Cinemax) and this initial story arc feels like little more than a prologue that lays the groundwork for a saga that will play out over the, hopefully, lengthy run of a TV series.

The hero of *Outcast* is Kyle Barnes, a young resident of small-town West Virginia who's had a rough life so far. When he was a boy, his mother was possessed by a demon, although at the time it seemed like she was just abusive. After Kyle somehow managed to inadvertently exorcise the demon, leaving his mother in a vegetative state, he ended up in a foster home where he developed a sisterly relationship with fellow foster kid Megan. Later, Kyle married Allison, and the couple had a daughter together. When Allison was possessed by a demon, Kyle once again accidentally exorcised the foul creature, but in the aftermath he was accused of abusing both Allison and their daughter. The family became estranged, and Kyle became a hermit.

That's a shame because the little town could really use Kyle's mysterious demon-banishing powers. Townsfolk are being possessed at an alarming rate not every day, but often enough that exorcisms have become a matter of routine for the town's pastor, the chain-smoking, heavy-drinking, poker-playing Rev.



Anderson. When the reverend and Kyle finally team up to smite the demon who's possessing a young boy. Anderson is amazed at Kyle's ability to hurt demons just by touching (and punching in the face) the possessed individuals, and Kyle starts to admit to himself that there might be something weird in the fact people

around him tend to go murderously mad and demon-eyed.

The story's broader boundaries are only implied in this first arc. There's a mysterious stranger in town, a smiling guy who's very polite on the surface but who is probably the devil. The foul demons that Kyle exorcises keep referring to him as "outcast," an intentionally vague term that hints at the reason behind the centrality of Kyle's role in the plot. And there are all kinds of pronouncements about faith and the lack thereof, suggesting that we're in for an epic demons-vsthe-faithful battle eventually.

With The Walking Dead, Kirkman struck gold. He took a horror trope that was introduced in an old movie

(Night of the Living Dead) and reinvigorated in some new movies (28 Days Later), introduced some soap opera-style plotting and ended up with the most popular series on cable TV. Here he follows the same inspirational formula (the role of the old movie is

played, of course, by The Exorcist, and the cinematic re-imagining is The Conjuring) and the soap-ish plot elements are sure to be delivered by Kyle's pseudosister Megan, her meathead cop husband, various children and ex-wives and a host of other characters that we'll no doubt meet soon. Even Kyle Barnes' solid two-syllable name sounds reassuringly like that of Rick Grimes. The demon-possessed people here aren't exactly shambling zombies, but they do enjoy taking bloody bites out of people now and then. The territory is not unfamiliar.

Outcast may be able to recreate the unexpected magic of The Walking Dead. Cinemax certainly hopes so. But if it does, the success isn't going to come out of nowhere like it did with the zombie story. Expectations for Outcast are high, and the creator's intention to revisit the formula of his previous success is clear in these preliminary episodes. The slow, deliberate establishment of the premise - one that, frankly, doesn't seem worthy of being drawn out as long as it is - might turn off fans who are hungry for action, though. evan.whatzup@gmail.com
