





13 Whammys and a Room of His Own

To step into Terry Ratliff's Fine Art Gallery on Broadway in Fort Wayne is to step into a world filled with bright, swirling colors and benign, off-kilter characters who don't mind being stared at.

For Ratliff his gallery represents a kind of arrival

"The gallery kind of gives you a little legitimacy. People love coming to your studio, and it's a mess, but they love seeing that. I hated it. You want to show art where you can walk in and *boom* it's hanging on a wall. It's a little more legit."

I have some news for you Terry: You got here a long time ago. But if you need more proof, your 13th Whammy Award for Best Visual Artist is in the mail. Other nominees on the ballot included photographers Sugar-Moon, Michael Deaton and graphic designer Simone LeClear.

Ratliff's big splash on local art scene – and it is a scene, man, a growing and vibrant one – came in

1992 after he returned from a month-and-a-half traveling and painting in France. He returned with 80 finished pieces rolled up in a big rug fitted with a handle. A show at Casa's on Fairfield netted him a bunch of exposure and lots more wall space to fill.

"I sold a lot of stuff and then Casa had me do all their restaurants," he said. "Casa's the best. When you

do 35 pieces for one restaurant and they're packed everyday ... Things kept on rolling from there."

Ratliff knew he wanted to be an artist when he was in first grade. But he had to wait until college before someone gave him the spark he needed to ignite that

life-long desire. He went to Franklin College on a football scholarship (as a 285-pound offensive lineman) and talked his way into a freshman painting class, a rarity for first-year students.

"My art professor was this crazy Italian guy named Luigi. He just lit a fire under me, and I knew this is what I was going to be doing the rest of my life."

That fire still burns. And he's going to need it. Between corporate and private commissions (last year he completed 63 pieces for Indiana Tech, including a couple of 10-foot murals), running his business and hosting shows at his gallery, Ratliff burns a lot of energy. But with the

current surge in local art, it's energy that is easy to replenish.

"There's so many people in Fort Wayne where I go to their house and they have like three or five or 10 different artists that I know that are local. I think that's super important for people to support local artists." (Mark Hunter)

FWMoA Gains a Mark of Distinction

For the Fort Wayne Museum of Art, 2015 has been a very good year. To start with, the museum won its first Whammy for Best Art Gallery. And since it is the first time for the category, it's the first time any gallery has a Whammy to add to its collection. But where to hang it?

And while not to diminish the hugeness of impressing the discerning whatzup readership enough

to garner a win in the annual Readers Poll, the Fort Wayne Museum of Art brought home an even bigger prize in 2015: the gift of the entire collection of work by renowned painter and printmaker Steven Sorman.

According to Amanda Martin, FWMoA's deputy director of administration and communications, the acquisi-

tion of Sorman's vast archive is a defining moment not just for the museum but for the city as a whole.

"This is huge for us because it makes Fort Wayne the only institution to have that many Steven Sormans," she said. "A collection like this puts a museum on the map. That's what makes the Metropolitan Museum of Art and the Guggenheim and the Whitney unique – because they have something that nobody has. Because we are relatively young, with only 30 years of major collecting, for Fort Wayne to have that makes this museum, this gallery, a destination rather

than just another outlet for all the other shows every other museum has."

Sorman is an internationally acclaimed American artist known for lush and complicated prints. His work is prized by museums worldwide and has been for more than 40 years. An exhibition of selected prints from Sorman's gift runs through June 14.

But that's not all that's happening in the mu-

seum's galleries. Part of the mission of FWMoA is to promote local and regional artists as well. Martin said the sheer size of the museum, along with its board of directors and broad membership, allows for a great footprint in the local art community.

"We have a Gwen Gutwein exhibit (*Heritage Barns* of *Indiana*) right now, and in

our Paradigm sales gallery we feature 75 local and regional artists," Martin said.

According to Martin, other galleries in Fort Wayne – Wunderkammer Company, Ratliff Gallery, Artlink Contemporary Art Gallery, Castle Gallery and Jeffrey R. Krull Gallery, to mention those receiving votes in the Readers Poll – work alongside FWMoA to provide vital support to the overall artist community and art lovers in the region.

Music's Biggest Weekend

If you have any interest at all in music, at whatever speed that interest may flow, Sweetwater's GearFest is the event for you. Where else can you go to hear an in-depth discussion of the Prophet-5 synthesizer by

the man who invented it, get a close-up view of a helicopter and watch Jeff "Skunk" Baxter as he pulls out story nuggets from his life as Steely Dan's guitarist and as a weapons designer for the Pentagon?

Well, nowhere, of course. Oh, and you can get your guitar restrung for

Those who have attended the two-day sound extravaganza in the past know that there is nothing else like it anywhere. And the 2015 incarnation promises to be the best GearFest yet. GearFest will be held Friday, June

12 from 9 a.m.-6 p.m. and Saturday, June 13 from 9 a.m.-5 p.m.

Area residents have an advantage over the throng of people who will come from all over the country to attend. According to Christopher Guerin, Sweetwater vicepresident of corporate communications, lodging for out-of-towners could get a little hard to find.

'We clogged up all the hotels last year," Guerin said. "We have people come from all over the country for this - certainly from all over the Midwest, but a lot of people from both coasts. Last year we had 8,000 people-plus. Our advanced registration is up 50 percent, so if that is to hold, we could have as many as 12,000."

That's a lot of people. But there's a lot to see and explore.

Needless to say, preregistration for the totally free event is encouraged and can be completed at Sweetwater's website.

GearFest is exactly what it sound like: a celebration of the equipment that musicians and recording studios use to make the music that we listen to every day. And there is a lot of equipment.

The sprawling Sweetwater campus at U.S. and Kroemer Road in Fort Wayne will be packed with 19 tents and four semitrailers full of gear from 400 vendors. You could spend the whole weekend going from tent to tent, talking to the people who actually build the gear. There's a flea market, five performance and workshop stages, food trucks, two cafeterias and a hourly drawings for more than \$80,000 in free gear. There is nothing else like it.

"Most trade shows are reserved for the people in the trade," Guerin said. "The biggest music trade show is NAMM [National Association of Music Merchants, but it is reserved for people in the music business.

rison; Nathan East. bassist who worked with George Harrison, Barry White and Sting; and Mike Stern, the guitarist who has played with Miles Davis. Billy Cobham and Jaco Pastorius.

In addition to some of the players who utilize the technological wizardry available today, GearFest also has the people who invented some of the technology in the first place.

Three in particular are Roger Linn, Tom Oberheim and Dave Smith. Linn invented the first sample-based drum machine; Smith de-

veloped the first musical instrument with an embedded microprocessor; and Oberheim co-designed the device that lets musicians combine live playing with sequenced playback. And if you don't know what any of this means, attend the panel discussion moderated by Sweetwater's Mitch Gal-

Beyond the people who play the instruments and the people who design gear that helps musicians get the sound they're seeking, there are the engineers who twist the knobs in the studio to bring it all together. including Sylvia Massey (Johnny Cash, System of a Down), Brian Vibberts (Michael Jackson, U2) and Neal Cappellino (Alison Krauss, Dolly Parton).

There will be studio workshops, drum workshops, songwriting workshops, bass and guitar workshops, software workshops keyboard workshops, electronic workshops Pro Tools workshops and live sound work-

If you can't wait for the weekend workshops, GearFest will offer five pre-fest workshops for the more serious musician. These workshops run from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. on Thursday, June 11 and cost anywhere from \$79 to \$299.

And if you get the urge to dust off that old guitar and take another crack at it, bring it in have it restrung and setup for free.

There is always something new at Gear-Fest, and everyone can find something to enjoy and learn about. The more you know about music, the better it sounds.

Painting Houses into Homes

Nestled in the heart of Fort Wayne's beautiful West Central neighborhood is the studio and home of local artist Diane Groenert. Her studio is drenched in sunlight that pours through windows, portals to the world she paints. Singing birds, a cup of tea and soothing music set the tone for a productive day of painting. Groenert needs a clear head, peaceful surroundings and slow-moving hours to get in the flow she requires to work through her paintings.

"I like to have a long period of time to paint because it takes me a long time to get in the flow. Once I get there, I want to stay there," she

On painting days, she likes to spend at least eight hours standing in front of a canvas.

Her current work is that of a charming home, lit up and glowing on a Halloween night. The canvas rests on an easel adjusted to a height that requires Groenert to stand as she

"I'm afraid if I start sitting I'll get stiff and grow wide hips," she

Groenert paints portraits of homes. She captures the essence of families and illustrates the houses they live in with details that reflect both history and personality. She uses curved lines and bright, bold

colors that catch the eye. Viewers can't help but imagine the type of people who live inside these homes and what they might be up to. Her work invites you to spend time with it, look for details and imagine yourself crawling inside a window to snoop around while the owners are out.

"I try to get in the mind frame of the owner and the stories they have told me,"

Research for each painting begins with an interview. Before her first sketch, Groenert sits with the family and listens to its stories. She looks at family photos and takes new photos of her own. She captures all an-



gles of the house, the front, back and sides. She takes photos of the family and mounts the collection of information on a reference board that sits in her studio on a table just behind the space where she paints.

Take a look at her work and you will understand the need for such a comprehensive collection of information. Groenert fills her paintings with details that tell about the most personal aspects of a family's life.

"This family has roots in New Mexico," she explains, "so I placed cacti all around. Their bicycles are here because they do a lot of biking, and the cloth with shamrocks on it is there because his wife does Irish danc-

These details are often so small that, unless pointed out, a person would likely never notice them. A hat rack inside a window, a family pet or an Air Force fighter flying through the background all require a tiny brush and a skilled hand.

Groenert focuses on perspective, line and color when she paints.

"I use burnt sienna for the undercoat that gives the painting a warm feeling," she explains. "I have a commercial art degree, so I have a good black and white foundation. That informs the light colors and the dark colors. I know how to bring certain colors forward to get people's attention."

Her use of line brings life into each of her works. She curves and bends lines that in reality are straight. By doing so, ordinary houses seem to come to life, as if they breathe and

"I use the fish eye lens to bring more excitement to the scene. It's all done in my head, not with a real

Moving things around inside her head is something Groenert has mastered. She can paint from a bird's eye view without having seen a house from above.


"This one had an interesting backyard and I wanted to include it so I went up and over," says the artist, describing a piece that resembles

something that popped out of a fairy tale. She can paint a home as it is or she can create a retro version, capturing historic homes before the renovations that modernized

Living in the West Central neighborhood, Groenert is surrounded by inspiring architecture. Each day she sees homes that people make a point to drive past just to admire the charm and individuality of the neighborhood. She has been commissioned to paint a total of 48 homes in West Central, and they will all be included in a book she

----- Feature • Jon Gillespie -----Saving the World's Music

For the past 15 years, Jon Gillespie has been immersed in a project that could go on forever.

A composer and ethnomusicologist by training, Gillespie is better known as a recording engineer. His work at the mixing board can be heard on scores of records made by local musicians. And while he continues to do that work to a certain degree, his main focus has turned to his own vision of what music is and can be. He calls the project Dream Rodeo, and his goal is to record vocalists singing in different languages.
There are around 6,500 distinct languages spoken

in the world today. Gillespie would like to record them

But to even approach that goal would require several lifetimes and a global battalion of intrepid travelers armed with microphones. In Nigeria alone, for example, there are more than 500 distinct languages arising from a few basic language families. So rather than focus on the languages themselves, Gillespie has divided Dream Rodeo into geographical groups that align with the continents. And thanks to the internet, trotting the globe can be done with a mouse click.

Through serendipity and active searching, Gillespie has managed to record vocalists from roughly 25 different countries from Asia, North America, Europe and Africa. To date, he

has nine finished albums, with a couple dozen more in various stages of completion.

Gillespie works as a sales engineer at Sweetwater where on any given day top-notch musicians from around the world drop in to record. That's where Gillespie met the vocalist Amadhia Albee. Amadhia, as she is known, collaborated on an album called Catala: Songs of the Catalans. It is Dream Rodeo's most recent release and a good example of the ambient, dream-like style of the project - and the mechanics of

"She lives in Arizona," Gillespie said. "All of the vocals and the flute were done in her closet in Arizona, and she drop-boxed them to me. I'd send mixes of the arrangements back to her. She said 'no' to a jazz interpretation of one, and I had to start over."

The songs tend to be long (seven or eight minutes is about average) and packed full of sounds. One piece on Catala has more than 80 separate tracks. If Gillespie can't create the sounds he needs on his own, he hires local musicians and those he meets through work or online. He works with a drummer from Uganda on a regular basis, trading audio equipment for tracks. He got Bakiti Kumalo, who played bass on Paul Simon's Graceland, and Spin Doctors drummer Aaron Comess to play on songs. Fort Wayne musicians Mimi Burns and Fernando Tarango both are featured on a Dream Rodeo albums, one of Celtic songs and one of Grego-

It all begins with the vocalists. The concept for the Dream Rodeo project came to him on a day in 2000 in the form of Jeff Britton. Britton and Gillespie have known each other for years and have worked together on numerous ventures in the past. This day, Britton dropped by Gillespie's studio with his niece Lydia Brown, who is a cantor in her Greek Orthodox church. Britton wanted Gillespie to record her singing and then put music to it.

Brown sang three parts, two harmony and one melody, with only a metronome and drone note. Gillespie then had her sing each part two more times without hearing what she had already sung.
"They have some really cool chants," Gillespie

said. "After all the parts were triple-tracked, I spread them out in a nice stereo image and played it back, and it was amazing. The sound was just full and rich and gorgeous."

Gillespie and Britton brought in keyboard player Eric Clancy to play some drum loops on a synthesizer; they threw in some other sounds. and Gillespie added some spoken lines and voila. They both thought it was pretty cool. They decided to do an album of Brown singing Greek Orthodox chants with Gillespie's compositions added later. One recording session with Brown took seven hours.

"So it's a pretty involved process, Gillespie said. "But my method was developed

that first day." He tends to work spontaneously, using whatever sounds right at the time. As long he keeps things interesting, freaky even, he's happy. Britton moved on to other things after that first album, but Gillespie was hooked.

Gillespie, who is 52, grew up in a musical family. His father played the violin, his mother, the piano. His grandfather was a traveling evangelist whose wife played the piano. His father had a large record collection, mostly classical and jazz. The only pop music Gillespie remembers hearing from that period was Bob Dylan's Slow Train Coming, which he listened to and then discussed with his family. Later some friends came to live with his family and they brought Beatles records. "They weren't horrible," Gillespie recalled thinking of the Beatles at the time.

At Wheaton College in Illinois Gillespie studied composition and ethnomusicology, later earning a masters in recording. It's also where he first began to appreciate rock n' roll.

"At that time I really just didn't pay attention to popular music, and then somebody played the Police for me," he said. "Zenyatta Mondata. And it was like. bing! I had been studying the minimalists like Stephen Reich and Philip Glass, people like that, and here was a band that took the best of the minimalist movement

plans to release on September 10 at the Paradigm Gallery inside the Fort Wayne Museum of Art. The book will be a collection of full color images, a collection of West Central homes.

In addition to her house portraits, Groenert has painted most of the downtown Fort Wayne landmarks. She makes the city look alive and vibrant - bustling with activity and high energy. She incorporates the people who are making things happen in Fort Wayne by painting them into her works as tiny people, perhaps sitting in front of JK O'Donnell's or piling through the back door of Henry's on Main Street, or even the Stoner family peeking out from their store-

"Fort Wayne needed some lively images of downtown," says Groenert. She created a series of 18 paintings, each one showing people interacting and enjoying good times shared in the

As Groenert flips through her portfolio, she identifies names of people as if they were part of her own family. She remembers details of stories told by the homeowners of each of her paintings. She points out Betty Fishman, painted into one of her pieces, appropriately hanging a piece of art on the wall. Groenert knows this city's history well.

"I've been in the neighborhood since '74," she says. Inside her head are clear memories of the lives of those who live and work in the city. She's dedicated to celebrating the efforts of those who strive to make our city better and through her paintings has preserved pieces of history that are no longer with us, such as the

"I blunder my way through each piece," she says. "I can't do much planning. I put a blob on the canvas and move it there, then move it over there, and move it again until it's just right, and then I move on to the next blob. It takes a lot to get all the stuff in," she con-



tinues. "I have to move things around and rearrange until it all fits. It's like a jigsaw puzzle; I have to figure

Groenert is an artist who has seen and studied the pieces of Fort Wayne; but beyond that, she has enjoyed getting to know the people behind the businesses and the families who live inside grand homes. She paints the details that make up people's lives. She's like the secretary who sits by the water cooler collecting stories and sharing them through her paintings. The rest of us look through the windows of her dancing houses and wonder what it all means. Each brush stroke tells a story but the stories are for Groenert to know and for us to discover.

"I like to get a feeling about the place," she says

An outsider looking at one of her paintings is sure to think of our city as a place of vibrancy and bustling energy. Through her eyes, our city is a place like no

and created these soundscapes in which there would be an ostinato guitar and it wouldn't change, but the bass would change under it and shift the entire harmony, and the melody would create the other part of the harmony and it was brilliant, you know. I found it intellectually fascinating and from that point on that

was like the gateway drug to rock n' roll."

From 1985 to 1992 Gillespie played keyboards in a Christian rock band called Juso, a nonsense word they made up. The band toured the country and nearly made it big, besting 42 other bands in a nationwide battle of the bands in St. Louis. But when the time came to make the jump to hyperspace, his bandmates got cold feet.

"We had record people talking to us,

and man, once the possibility of the band becoming something

big, that was it. I have never seen so many people scuttle the same ship.

That's when he decided to steer his own course. Dream Rodeo is his dream project, his life's work. It allows him to use whatever he can get his hands on, whether it's snippets of Bob Marley skanking from the master tapes or the sound of an early morning rainstorm. He pays for the rights for what he uses and does what he can to help collaborators when they need it. Recently through Facebook he met a 15-year-old Ukrainian girl who sings old Russian folk songs and plays a type of lute her father makes. It's perfect for

"Here's a bunch of these folk songs, and they're being played by two

or three people in the world, and when those folks stop play-

ing them nobody will hear them ever again," he said. "These songs need to be saved somehow. They're not recorded. It's an oral tradition. Nobody's buying records of this stuff. So I said, 'Do you want to do this?' And she's like 'yeah, I'll ask my dad.' And her dad is like 'how will we record this? And I said, 'Well, let me help you."

Through his connections Gillespie was able to get a professional vocal mic and interface to the girl and her

father, even in war-torn Ukraine. "I've gotten the files for one song so far. Got seven or eight more to go. I'm really pumped about this."

Gillespie does not see an end to Dream Rodeo.

"I want to keep doing this till I keel over. So if there are other people out there who can sing in other languages, get in touch. There is just so much to do."



Black Rebel Motorcycle Club

Live in Paris

I'm just going to say this at the start: I'm not all that familiar with Black Rebel Motorcycle Club (or BRMC for you abbreviation freaks).

That's not to say I'm not familiar with the music they make. In fact, I quite like their debut and *Take Them On, On Your Own*. What I'm saying is I have no idea



Okay, now that I have that out of the way I can get on with it. BRMC have always been this cult band that come across kinda dark and mysterious. Are they hooligans? Vagrants? An actual motorcycle gang spreading their rock n' roll gospel across the world in every town they pass through? They might be. One thing I know for sure is that they like their brand of rock extra fuzzy and dirty, even coming up with enough groove in some of their tunes to soundtrack a striptease – or at the very least show up in some sexy vampire flick.

BRMC have been at it for long enough now they felt it was time to give the world a live album. *Live in Paris* is a recording of their performance at Theatre Trianon in Paris, France.

The live album is the bastion of every great rock n' roll band. It can be the midway stop in a band's career, marking the end of one period and the beginning of the next. It can be the death knell of a band as well. To my ears, 95 percent of all live records fail in their attempt to recreate that ear-splitting, sweaty synergy you get from being at the actual show. They seem very two dimensional: a carbon copy of a carbon copy of a carbon copy of a Monet. There have been a few exceptions over the years, when a live album somehow captures the adventurous and unpredictable side of a band, but those are few and far between.

So what do you get with Black Rebel Motorcycle Club's *Live in Paris*? You get their 2013 album *Spectre at the Feast* performed in its entirety at the outset, followed by a second-half best-of collection-that grabs bits and pieces from their debut clear through 2010's *Beat the Devil's Tattoo*. It's a reasonably well balanced group of songs that includes a few deeper cuts you wouldn't expect to hear.

There are, however, some songs that are glaringly absent in this collection. "Love Burns" and "Awake" off their debut would have been great to hear. "Six Barrel Shotgun" and "Ha Ha High Babe" off *Take Them On, On Your Own* would have also been great to hear played loud and live. "White Palms" was a nice surprise. Cranked to maximum decibels, you can feel your inner being begin to come apart just a little.

Overall, this is a collection that any hardcore fan will want to own – not only for the chance to hear those buried album nuggets in the live environment, but also to hear the great Leah Shapiro playing the drums once again. Hopefully, she will be fully recovered soon enough and we can hear her playing on some new songs. I'm not sure the casual fan will get much from this dense two-disc collection, but if you're cool with plunking down the cash, give it a whirl.

Viva la BRMC. (John Hubner)

Metz

Metz seem to have found that perfect recipe for brash, explosive anger and have no plans to change that recipe. Not even slightly.

On their follow-up to their 2012 debut album, the Canadian trio seemed to be on a mission of destruction and mayhem. That record took the blueprint of bands like Big Black, the Pixies and



even early Nirvana and lit it on fire and then reconstituted the ashes into a jet black cocktail of squealing guitars, exploding drums, and buzzsaw bass. Alex Edkins vocals resembled a madman falling in an endless cavern – and a blender set to puree. It was a relentless, unforgiving 30 minutes of noise rock you wouldn't soon forget (since your ears rang for an hour afterwards).

BACKTRACKS

Heavy Metal Kids

Anvil Chorus (1975)

The Heavy Metal Kids were a band from London that formed in the early 1970s at the advent of the glam-rock scene. This album, their second, was the last to feature all of the original members.



"Hard at the Top" opens the record with a piano and a thick bass and sounds like a cross between the New York Dolls and Big Star. The funky vibe continues with "You Got Me Rollin'," a track that has a little ZZ Top feel to it, and "Situations Outta Control" has a nice Mott the Hoople/Rolling Stones feeling about it.

The party is back with the bawdy "Blue-Eyed Boy," a track that is heavy on percussion and has a great bridge with pedalheavy guitars and some amusing vocals from the boys in the band. "Old Time Boogie" continues the cool, almost garage-rock essence, complete with more keyboards, a heavy bass and a nice little horn.

A taste of hard rock comes at you on "The Turk." It's almost heavy metal, exuding on the same energy that we got from Deep Purple. And though just an instrumental, it ranks pretty high on the jam scale, even 40 years later.

"Crisis" is more mainstream, but still on the glam-rock side. It fits well on the release.

Side two stays hard with "The Cops Are Coming." The album, which has become one of my favorites from the 70s, closes with the super-ballad "The Big Fire."

Frontman Gary Holton sang on only the first three Kids albums and eventually went solo. His drug use led to his death at the age of 33 in 1985, but several incarnations of The Kids have released a few records and toured since 2002.

They will play London on August 5. (Dennis Donahue)

On *II*, the band's new record, nothing has changed. It's just as brutal, if not more so. It's another half hour of abrasive, bloody sound blasts that do nothing to up the ante from last time. If you wanted something else, well you're in the wrong place, pal.

From the opening fuzzed-out bass notes of "Acetate" to the eardrum-splitting finale of "Kicking a Can of Worms," the ride is relentless and combative. Edkins, along with bassist Chris Slorach and drummer Hayden Menzies, seems to have one goal in mind: get it as loud, angry, and in the red as they can. Then, just when you think it can't get any more intense, push it up even more.

I'm not sure you'll hear anything more intense this year than "Nervous System." It's like a panic attack transcribed into music. Even punk rock never felt this intense. There are subtle changes this time around, though. There seems to be a little more attention put to making these songs feel more melodic, if that's possible. Edkins' vocals seem to be more up front this time around, giving the songs an actual song feel, as opposed to the debut's scorched earth policy of making each song a fire and brimstone aural revival. Edkins' vocals at times resemble Jello Biafra drowning on his own blood.

"I.O.U." starts out sounding like someone searching the FM dial for something to listen to, then coming across the sound of something familiar in a sea of white noise. It's the sound of punk morphing into post-punk right before our ears. "Spit You Out" could've been a B-side from *In Utero*. Just close your eyes and listen. You'll hear it. "The Swimmer," "Landfill" and "Eyes Peeled" are the closest Metz has come to catchy hooks. They're in there; just dig a little deeper. Past the bloody rags and sweat-soaked T-shirts.

Once again Metz self-produced, and they seem to know what they're doing. There's a continuity in the swarm of noise, a through line from their debut to *II*. While some will say *II* doesn't reveal any evolution or pushing of boundaries, I'd argue there's something very comforting in that. Some bands don't need to add orchestras, back-up singers, horn sections or piano ballads in order to evolve. Sometimes the beast needn't be tamed. Sometimes a beast must simply stay a beast. Metz are the beast this world needs right now, and *II* is that beast's mission statement. (*John Hubner*)

In the end, it was a no-brainer that these cats deserved to become champs in their inaugural competition. After they were crowned, the high energy ska-core band remained on the scene for a couple more years before disbanding in 2006.

During their stint, they put together a couple of worthy releases, Last Transmission and a four-song EP, Gentlemen Don't Ask, and Ladies Won't Tell. They also did their share of touring. Plank says the band's Connecticut dates and opening for Haste the Day were among the most memorable shows.

Plank still remains on the local scene adding his guitar and vocal skills to the pop punk outfit Fighting Words. If you want to catch up with him, you can check out his band at O'Sullivan's on Saturday, June 20 along with You Minus Me. As for Alvarado, he teamed up with Witzigreuter in 2006 to form an acoustic duo known as Brideandgroom. Together they released two EPs and performed numerous shows across the Midwest. After that project fizzled out, Alvarado went on to study culinary arts in Chicago before moving to San Francisco where he currently re-

sides and can be found cooking up some fine cuisine.

Witzigreuter also moved to the Golden State. The sole member of the electro-pop outfit The Ready Set, Witzigreuter uses a backup band when he tours. In 2009, The Ready Set signed with Fall Out Boy bassist Pete Wentz's label. Decaydance Records, and released I'm Alive, I'm Dreaming which spawned the commercially successful single "Love Like Woe." He is currently with Razor and Tie Records which released his The Bad & The Better last year. The Ready Set toured on the Vans Warped Tour in 2014 and still remains

Then there's Meredith, who went on to receive a degree in Visual and Performing Arts from Indiana University and also moved from the farmland to California where he is pursuing acting. Hit him up on IMDB and you'll see he's found his share of work thus far. As for Fellon, I believe he still resides here in the Fort, I just couldn't seem to track him down before press time. I know, good reporting, right?

The guys from Take Sides have definitely spread their wings since their 2004 BOTB run. With other projects and the fact that a few of them are on the other side of the country, it's unlikely we'll ever be fortunate enough to see Take Sides perform together again. You never know, though.

The event needs no introduction. Now in its 18th year, BBQ Ribfest is an annual feast of barbecue and blues, two great tastes that go great together. The musical acts – some national, some local – will rock Headwaters park Thursday-Sunday, June 19-21. Headliners include The Reverend Peyton's Big Damn Band, the Mark May Band with the Soul Satyr Horns, and the AJ Ghent Band.

The Reverend Peyton's Big Damn Band takes the stage Friday at 10 p.m. Despite its name, the band is actually rather small. Fans will tell you, however, that the music that comes from this old-fashioned blues power trio - Josh "The Reverend" Peyton on guitar and lead vocals, Breezy Peyton on washboard and Ben "Bird Dog" Bussell on drums - is mighty. The Nashville, Indiana-based band started as a brother act (Josh on guitar and Jayme on drums) but that all changed with Josh met Breezy at a very fateful Indiana State Fair. Josh won Breezy a stuffed animal, which they christened Big Damn Bear (hence the group's name). The two soon found they had similar taste in music and joined forces with Jayme to create the string band/blues sound they're now famous for. Eventually, Jayme was replaced with Bussell. Nine studio albums later, including their latest, So Delicious, the big little band plays 250 shows a year.

The Mark May Band & the Soul Satyr Horns will perform on Saturday at 10 p.m. May, the former guitarist and vocalist for Dickey Betts and Great Southern, honed his blues skills in and around Houston, Texas and recently moved back to his native Columbus,



Ohio to rock out Midwestern-

style. According to *Guitar Magazine*, May is anything but a conventional bluesman: "Mark May's gutsy tone, feisty pull-off licks and ground-glass vocals invite comparison to any number of Texas bluesmen. But the twin guitar leads, wah rhythm spanks and occasional burst of fusionesque melodic complexity ... make May something much more than just another traditionalist."

The AJ Ghent Band, with the help of Fort Wayne's own Todd Harrold, will close out the fest on Sunday, beginning at 3 p.m. This Atlanta based group is known best for opening for the Zac Brown Band, but they're a force in their own right. Part Southern rock, part jam, funk and soul, the band is helmed by AJ, a master of the lap steel guitar. His mates include MarLa and Tiffany Ghent (vocals), Seth Watters (bass), Gary Paulo (guitar/saxophone) and Will Groth (drums). They just released their debut album in April and they're riding that wave all the way to Fort Wayne.





Cornell's tour stops in Chicago October 6 and Lakewood, Ohio, near Cleveland, October 8.

Suicide Girls continue to keep the art of the Burlesque show alive while adding unique elements to make it relevant for the 2010's. This year's tour, the Blackheart Burlesque Tour, features performances in tribute to a wide range of movies and TV shows, including *Star Wars*, *Orange Is the New Black*, *Donnie Darko* and *A Clockwork Orange*. The Suicide Girls travel to Indianapolis October 2, Cincinnati October 4 and Grand Rapids October 6.

At The Disco, New Found Glory, Corey Taylor of Slipknot and Fort Wayne favorites Halestorm, among others. Tickets for the event start at \$60 and go up to \$250 for a VIP package that includes early entry, a special VIP area, chances to meet rock stars and a year subscription to AP.



Another TV Series Fails to Make the Leap

The fine line between the absurdity of the Hollywood dream and the absurdity of Hollywood reality is what is missing from the big screen iteration of Entourage. On HBO, even in the brief broadcast running time of a half-hour, nearly every episode walked that tightrope and had some moments so cringeworthy that I almost couldn't watch. The movie's cringe-worthy moments are more of a worry that somebody has tipped off the tightrope and is in free fall, and we are not sure we can bear the splat.

Since the end of the HBO series in 2011 there has been plenty of "will they or won't they" entertainment "reporting" on whether or not the boys would make the jump to the big screen. Such a move, while potentially lucrative, can be tricky. The Sex and the City girls pulled it off once; for the sequel, not so much. Veronica Mars on the big screen didn't break out, but it made back its cost and held onto fans. Can the Entourage crew and vibe hold the new ground of the big screen?

Since the HBO series ended, the boys have been spanning time, sort of. As nice as it is to see my favorites (Jeremy Piven as Ari Gold, Kevin Dillon as Johnny Drama, Rex Lee as Lloyd, Debi Mazar as Shauna and Perrey Reeves as Ari's long-suffering wife) some things are missing and missed.

Entourage begins on a yacht off the coast of Ibiza. The huge party on board is celebrating the cheerful end to Vince's marriage which lasted only about a fortnight. That's the kind of commitment that sounds about right for the emotional maturity we expect from Vince: a wedding party and a divorce party. Adrian Grenier is just as pretty and charming and lucky and shallow as ever



What plot there is revolves around Vinnie's next project, a modern-day setting of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde, with Vinnie as the star and a juicy supporting role for Drama. Eric (Kevin Connolly) is supposed to produce, but he's having a baby by ex-girlfriend Sloan. That so often works out well.

Turtle (Jerry Ferrara) smokes a lot less weed and is now skinny and rich - go figure - but still following Vince around. Ari has retired, but he hates it. He returns to head the studio that will make Vinnie's pet project.

Writer/producer/series creator Doug Ellin does the best he can, I guess. He tries to slightly soften the guys' sexism but still hang onto the conceit so that this collection of regular guys could find success. He's the guy who was least interested in a big screen Entourage. He wasn't sure more would work, and it shows.

The biggest appeal of these boys was that they were such unrepentant, sexist, shallow jerks. If you soften that, all that is left is a need for a happy ending but no earthly reason for that to happen, except that they are men in Hollywood. There is little edge. Of course, things are going to work out, so who cares?

I blame James Cameron, which is always fun to do. For a big chunk of the series, the fortunes of Vince and his entourage depended on whether or not Vince would be cast as and be successful as Aquaman with Cameron directing.
That's drama. That's the tension of a

dork like Cameron making Aquaman. He might make it a huge success; and, just like Vince and the boys reason, no matter how stupid the movie is, that's not Vince's problem, so Vince can be as naughty as he wants

The conventional wisdom is that, if the movie tanks, the problem is Cameron's not Vince's. And if Aquaman is a hit, then Vince is a star. Cameron has a solid reputation for making a gazillion dollars on nonsense, so onward!

Vince wants to direct in Entourage. That's apt and inevitable, but excruciating to watch. But Vince's insistence that he direct is his character arc. So despite how unqualified he seems for the gig, surprise! He's a good director!

In keeping with the dumb macho vibe (I'm being polite) always present in the series, the film is stuffed with dumb men cameos and characters. To name just a few, we see Mark Wahlberg, Kelsey Grammar, Andrew Dice Clay, Bob Sagat, Mark Cuban, T.I., Piers Morgan, and Common. What dependent-on-his-fame dude wouldn't want to be on set? There are lots of ladies willing to do what it takes to be famous. Plenty of topless ogling just to hang.

Worst of all is the empty stare, square jaw and vacant personality of Tom Brady. I much preferred the series: when Turtle tried to hang onto his loathing of Brady, but succumbed to the charm of the guy, even though that was mostly in the hopes of ogling Brady's wife in the future.

If Entourage generates enough revenue for more, I hope the gang returns to its roots: the lucky idiocy of bimbo men. That would be more fun than faux maturity.

Melissa McCarthy, Paul Feig Spin Comedy Gold

Tops at the Box: Paul Feig's (or should I say Melissa McCarthy's) Spy took the No. 1 spot at last weekend's box office, selling \$30 million over its first three days of release. Not bad for a little female-fronted comedy that uses concepts that have already been done to death. Add to that another \$56 million in abroad sales and both Feig and McCarthy are bona fide megastars of the comedy world. Or something. So why is Spy doing so well? Easy. Melissa McCarthy. She's magic. In this writer's opinion, she's the best commercial comedy actor I've seen in ages. Maybe since Bill Murray was killing it in the late 80s and early 90s. Look for this one to keep selling strong; we predict it will top the \$300 million mark in worldwide sales. For reference, the other two films Feig and McCarthy made together, Bridesmaids and The Heat, made \$288 million and \$229 million, respectively.

Also at the Box: Dwayne "The Rock" Johnson's end-of-the-world action thriller, San Andreas, took the No. 2 spot at last weekend's box office, selling another \$26 million and upping the film's 10-day total to \$152 million. Couple the success of this



flick with Furious 7 and do we now have to consider The Rock the world's biggest action star? I think we do. No. 3 spot at last weekend's box office was Insidious Chapter 3 which sold another \$23 million, bringing the flick's three-day total to \$37 million worldwide - nowhere near the numbers Focus Features expected. Can we leave this Insidious thing behind now? Over its first week of release the Entourage movie sold a disappointing \$10 million. Oof. I knew the tide had turned against the Entourage gang due to bro-shaming, but I had no idea it was that bad. Rounding out last weekend's Top 5 was Mad Max: Fury Road with another \$8 million, bringing that very special film's 24-day total to \$130 million in the U.S. and \$308 million worldwide. Sadly, Brad Bird's Tomorrowland continued to bomb, selling just \$7 million, bringing the film's 17-day total to a sorta lousy \$76 million. And then we have Avengers: Age of Ultron which has now sold \$1.348 billion. Not bad at all for a

New This Week: This weekend is all about one film, maybe the biggest movie of 2015. Directed by Colin Trevorrow (Safety Not Guaranteed) and starring Chris Pratt. Bryce Dallas Howard, Jake Johnson, Vincent D'Onofrio, Irrfan Khan and Judy Greer, Jurassic World is a sure-thing big seller. Part of the allure, of course, is the legacy. Then there are the beasts. And also we have Pratt who has somehow become the biggest action star of his day. No word yet on if the film itself is any good or not, but my guess is that yes, it's going to be a very fun ride. Maybe not a great film like Spielberg's original, but almost certainly two great hours of entertainment.

ScreenRant: I finally saw It Follows, hunky writer/director David Robert Mitchell's follow-up to The Myth of the American Sleepover, and can now report that yes, it's every bit as amazing and fun and entertaining as every film fan in the world says it is. A new classic, for sure.

This Mermaid Easy to Fall in Love With

The Wagon Wheel Center for the Arts' seasonopening production of Disney's *The Little Mermaid* nearly sold out on opening night, and it did not disappoint.

Based on the 1989 animated film, the Broadway production opened in 2008, to tepid reviews. A 2012 update shook up the script and score, greatly improving both.

The basic story is the same: a feisty 16-year-old mermaid named Ariel doesn't feel she belongs, and she longs to find a place where she can find her true self. Fascinated by human culture, she falls for a human prince named Eric and trades her voice to Ursula the Sea Witch for a pair of legs so she can win his love. In return, she agrees to give up her soul to Ursula for all eternity if she can't get him to kiss her within three days.

The storyline and characters are much more fleshed out in this updated version, which reveals things about the characters that help show motivation for their actions. Why does Ariel trust Ursula? Ursula is her aunt. Why does Triton hate and fear humans so much? He believes they killed his wife. Why does Eric fall in love with Ariel without so much as a word? Well, that's still a bit of a stretch, but in an added song, "One Step Closer," Eric explains to Ariel that she doesn't need words to communicate with him; she can communicate in the form of dance.

And besides, even without words, as played by Audrey Kennedy, Ariel is easy to fall in love with. With her voice, her sense of humor (and yes, her beauty), Kennedy is the absolute perfect Ariel. Winsome, sweet and sometimes gawky, she personifies the teenage wish not to give up who she is for a boy, but to discover who she might be.

There will be many laughs and a few tears. There will be shouting matches and awkward silences. There will be a little profanity and a lot of beer. Most of all, there will be heart. The heart may have a murmur of dysfunction but it is still a vital, beating heart, nonetheless.

ber by a flock of seagulls and Louis' "Les Poissons" featuring a chorus of dancing waiters (Sean Watkinson, Tom Sweeney, and Jonathan Tilkin).

Nick Pelaccio (Flotsam) and Alex Dorf (Jetsam) are wickedly sensuous as the henchmen of Ursula, played by Kristen Yasenchak. The evil in Ursula's body language and facial expressions are somewhat held back by her costume and thick green eyelashes, but she has a beautiful belting voice and great chemistry with her minions.

Parker Irwin, who plays Flounder, is the youngest performer and has both a great singing voice and excellent comic timing.

The women in particular have a lot of room to shine. Ariels's sisters (Allison Schiller, Monica Brown, Ellen Jenders, Laura Plyler, Clara Cox, and Jennifer Dow) are adorably catty and oblivious to their own personal failings. Among other characters, they double as potential wives to Prince Eric in Act 2, and in every scene each has her own personality. complete with hilarious facial expressions and beauti-

Grimsby (Scott Fuss) and Triton (Dany Burgos) manage to be lovably paternal even when attempting to thwart Ariel and Eric from getting together.

At times, the small size of the set gets a little crammed with scenery (during "Under the Sea" and the finale in particular, the entire stage is obscured to certain seats), and the flying effects (mainly for Ariel and Scuttle) require a bit of suspension of disbelief (but nobody cares, because ... flying).

An opening night power outage in the pit forced Ariel and the women's chorus to improvise a little pantomime at the top of Act 2, but the cast, crew, and audience handled the minor glitch with professionalism, humor and a shared spirit of "ain't live theatre

The nearly a two-and-a-half-hour show held the entire audience rapt on a Wednesday night - even the under-three crowd. As one patron said after the show, "I don't think my daughter closed her mouth once."

Want to Walk? There's a Trail

Six years ago, if you had told me that I would one day run a half marathon, I'd have laughed myself silly. But come New Year's Day 2010, I decided to do just that. Wisely, I enlisted my trusty cohort Mike to join me in my folly because I'm the big idea person, but he's the one with the discipline to keep me going 10 minutes later when I've moved on to my next Big Idea. With a plan in place, we both followed with more typical behavior – I bought a book with a training program, he bought the technology needed to chart our times. It all culminated in our successful effort in September 2010 when we completed the Fort4Fitness half-marathon.

I share this surprising tidbit from my history to note something else I picked up along the way: there are a lot of people on the trails in this city. The very fact that there are so many trails to begin with is laudable, as Fort Wayne joins many other cities around the country (and the world) in providing safe and enjoyable paths for running, walking, hiking and biking. Our training runs put us in contact with many others who were out trying to enjoy a nice day while logging some miles. They did it alone, they did it with friends, they did it with family and some just brought along a dog. But the trails in this city are getting some serious use.

For the most part people venture onto the trails on their own, but Mayor Tom Henry decided to give some a nudge to explore the Fort Wayne Greenway

even more, taking people onto trails they might not have explored before or just providing more information about those trails and some of their features. With the popular Trek the Trails program, which Mayor Henry began in 2010, the city has brought almost 8000 people together to bike miles of trails throughout the summer. The mayor's office says Henry hoped the program would create social opportunities for riders and families as they logged miles toward their fitness goals. The 23 Tuesday night rides began in May and are being supplemented by four Saturday Trek the Trails rides. The Tuesday night rides average eight miles, while the monthlySaturday rides, which began this month, build from 14 to 18 miles in length. The rides vary in location, covering the entire area by fall.

A complete schedule for Trek the Trails can be found on the Fort Wayne Trails website (fwtrails.org) and updates can be found at the Fort Wayne Public Works Facebook page. So strap on your helmets, grab a bottle of water and hit the trails!.
