## Nice Folks Sometimes Do Finish First

Barbie Brown has a following. Spend a few minutes with her, and it's easy to see why.

Brown is one of the karaoke jockeys (kayjays, in the parlance of the industry) with Shooting Star Productions. And for the third year in a row, Brown's fans have voted her Best Karaoke Host.

When I met up with Brown at Uncle Lou's Steel

Mill Tavern on Taylor Street, where she hosts karaoke every Friday and Saturday night, she had two of her co-workers with her, Christie Timmons and Nathan "Nacho" Black. I asked Brown what made her so popular as a kayjay. Her answer was that she's married to Travis Brown, the bass player for Pop 'n' Fresh and the Tone Junkies. Then she said it was because she doesn't play favorites with the people who come to sing.

"I just make friends with everybody who shows up," Brown said. "I don't fix the rotation so our friends get to sing more often than everybody else."

Timmons had a more succinct reason: charisma.

And according to Nacho, "She's just the nicest person and she's pretty much our franchise."

Brown wanted Timmons and Black along to share in the Whammy win because she sees it as a group effort. "I wouldn't be able to put on the shows I do without the equipment and the music," she said.

True enough. Shooting Star Productions is owned by Nacho's father, Stu Black, and it's Black who keeps the equipment and the music up to date so that people can put their name on a list, throw caution to the wind and belt out a tune. Or something close to one any-

vay.

"The ability to sing is not a requirement," Brown said. "I always say there's no such thing as bad karaoke. We still have people that come out and can't sing a note to save their life and just have a blast. Sometimes those are the most energetic performances of the evening."

Brown said at first she lacked the confidence to even order a drink for herself at a bar. But then she started singing now and again for Black and soon was learning how to set up

all the equipment.

"And then I started following his kayjay around and learned how to set everything up," she said. "And once I knew how to plug everything in, he asked if I wanted to do a private party, and I just went from there. Then one of the kayjays joined a band and I kind of picked up from there." Chevvy's: Best Karaoke Venue

## **Keeping Their Customers Satisfied**

For the first time in five years there is a new champion in the Fort Wayne karaoke scene, at least as far as *whatzup* readers are concerned. Chevvy's vaulted ahead of all comers to take the 2014 Whammy for Best Karaoke Club.

According to owner Rick Huddleston, continuous improvement to both his bar in general and to the overall acoustic experience at Chevvy's in particular are huge reasons for the win, but not the only ones.

It gets to be a chicken-egg thing. You have to have a place where folks want to come to sing karaoke, so you need a good sound system. But if no one's coming, spending money to get them there is a leap of faith.

"You have to spend money to make money," Huddleston says. "We've done a lot to improve the sound with

a new system and new acoustical tiles. It sounds great in here. I'm telling you, we have the best karaoke singers in Fort Wayne."

Huddleston also credits American Idol Karaoke for the quality of their system and host T. J.'s skill at what he does.

"With their system and my system and with their lighting its great karaoke," he says. "T. J. is phenom-

enal. He's very good with people. There's no downtime. He keeps it exciting and fun for everyone."

T. J. and American Idol Karaoke are at Chevvy's on Wednesday, Friday and Saturday. And Huddleston

says the place is packed.

In claiming the Whammy, Chevvy's ended a five year run by the Latch String, which for their part stopped 412 Club's six year reign.

Huddleston's philosophy of spending to improve the Chevvy's experience has paid off. He says when the recession hit he invested heavily in making upgrades to the building with new windows, a deck and a huge umbrella.

"When times were tough, that's when we just built it up," he says

Huddleston credits his staff with doing a great job of adhering

to his mantra: a clean bar is a happy bar. He says his employees have helped make Chevvy's a place people want to come and stay, especially on karaoke nights.

"Back in the day everybody would come in and drink their pop and water or whatever and then get up and leave and go to the next place," he says. "Now we're keeping them, and they're eating and they're drinking and they're having fun. And they're here all

night long." (Mark Hunter)

# **An Enduring Brotherhood**

------Feature • Doobie Brothers ------

The Doobie Brothers are a band that really needs no introduction. Their hits through the 1970s and 80s continue to be a ubiquitous part of our collective musical history, and through numerous changes and reconfigurations, the Doobies have remained one of the most popular bands of that era.

Among the original members, Tom Johnston's role was key to the band's early success. His vocals and guitar provided key elements to some huge hits, including "Lis-

ten to the Music," "China Grove" and "Long Train Run-ning." He left the group for about a decade, during which time the Doobies brought in Michael McDonald who brought an entirely different vibe to the band and provided another set of hits like "Takin' It to the Streets," "What a Fool Believes" and "Minute by Minute." But by the late 80s McDonald had left for a solo career, and Johnston returned, at first just for a few benefit

concerts organized by Doobie drummer, the late Keith Knudsen.

"It was kind of nuts at the time," says Johnston. "We had 14 guys up on stage who all got together from all the different eras of the band. We had four drummers, four guitarists, a keyboardist and then Michael. We had a good time, and it was for a good cause. Keith had brought us all together to raise money for Vietnam Vets, and we enjoyed doing it."

That was 1987, and though it was originally intended to be a short-term reunion, their producer Ted Templeman suggested they make the reunion permanent. Since 1989, the group has been going strong, hitting the road every year and recording a few new albums along the way. What has always made a reunion possible was the goodwill which exists amongst the "Brotherhood."

"We've known each other so long, and we've always pretty much gotten along," says Johnston. "People have been in and left, but there's always been a pretty open door policy. Michael's been doing his solo thing for years, but he joins us sometimes. He was on our last album we did, Southbound, which we did with a bunch of country artists. We don't get to see all those guys much, so it's nice when we get back together and see how they are and what their families are up

Between their reunion in 1989 and Southbound in 2014, the Doobies had recorded three other albums and may have more in their future. But Johnston acknowledges that things are much different now than they were during their heyday. Asked whether he prefers the music business of old or the way things are now, his response is very pragmatic.

"It doesn't really matter what I think, I just do whatever is required. Music has changed a lot over the years. Business-wise, it's changed drastically. There really aren't any labels anymore, and the ones that exist are all under some big umbrella. Basically now you have Warner, Sony and Universal;

show business, Johnston is clearly delighted with her success.

"I've supported her all the way," he says. "I did provide the caveat to her, long ago when she was first getting started, that it's a tough business. There's so much more competition now with shows like America's Got Talent and The Voice, and of course the one that started it all, American Idol. There are a lot of people who see those shows and think they have a shot that never would have attempted a performing career in the past. And with everything we've already discussed

about labels, it's just a harder thing to get

"But she's been stalwart, and she's been writing songs in Nashville and recording. She's done dates with us before, and she did our whole Canadian tour awhile back. She knows she has to do anything she can do to get her foot in that door. She has an incredible voice, a great work ethic, and she puts on a great show. She knows there's an element of luck to it. but she's willing to

those are the only major labels left. In the past you would tour to support an album. Now you record an album to support the tour. It's changed completely. And really you don't sell albums anymore because of downloading and streaming. Radio is still there and has been good to us, but that's not what it used to be either. So you have to be ready to go with the flow."

Lacking the consistent marketing boost during their most commercial years with Warner Brothers Records, they've managed to remain high-profile thanks to regular touring. Though Johnston estimates they were playing up to 200 nights a year - then using their downtime to record the next album they now play under 100, with festivals providing some of their best crowds. When they visit Fort Wayne's Foellinger Theatre July 1, Johnston won't be the only family member to hit that stage. His daughter, Lara, herself an established singer both through solo work and as backup to artists like Don Henley, will be serving as the Doobie Brothers's opening act. Unlike some performers who discourage their children from a career in give it her all."

Johnston can lead his daughter by example as he hits the stage each night with his bandmates of four decades. These days they're more focused on live performance, and he says they all work hard to keep their voices in shape and continue to hone their musical chops. They focus on the songs that original members Johnston and Patrick Simmons have contributed with one notable exception.

"We do one of Michael's songs, 'Takin' It To the Streets' each night as a nod to that era of the band. It always goes over well. People like it. But it wouldn't sound the same if I tried to sing Michael's songs, so we stick to our songs and try to mix it up to cover all eras of the band."

There's little chance that the Doobie Brothers will disappear any time soon. It's obvious that the group still enjoys playing music together and sharing it with their longtime fans.

'At this point it's about going out there and playing our music live. That's the sturdiest part of what we do, and that's never changed. It's going extremely well. We're fortunate that we still have tons of offers for gigs and get a lot of radio play. We've stood the test of time, and our live show is better now that it was in the 70s. We've lost some members unfortunately, but we still enjoy the band and each other. What more can you ask for that to get paid to do what you love

Fort Wayne is blessed with a number of exceptional and significant neighborhoods that lie within shouting distance of downtown. And every year ARCH, the architecture and community heritage organization, puts on a walking tour of one of these neighborhoods.

This year, on Saturday, June 27, ARCH patrons will get to explore the historic Southwood Park neighborhood. Known for its fine collection of Tudor and Colonial revival architecture, Southwood Park is also significant in the history of the development of suburbs during the prosperous years following World War I.

The Historic Southwood Park Home and Garden Tour features 12 houses around the neighborhood. The tour will be bolstered by a silent auction, art vendors from the Paradigm Gallery and local food trucks.

is one of those amazing periods when America was really starting to feel its wealth," he said. "And they built these houses in order to live in them for their lives. They put the best things in them because they planned to live in them till they died."

Much of the value of suburban neighborhoods of the 20s and 30s was their proximity to downtown, which then was the center of shopping and business. Southwood Park was among the first to be built with cars in mind, but electric streetcars were still important and often the most convenient way to get downtown. The Fort Wayne streetcar system was extended first to service the grid layout of the northeastern section of Southwood Park and later to serve the new neighborhood as it expanded south of West Rudisill Boulevard.

But integral to the design of Southwood Park was space for commercial development. Walkable communities are not a new concept. Doctor and dentist

on Old Mill Road. The guest speaker is John Brinkman, publisher of the magazine American Bungalow. Brinkman will talk about the importance of historic preservation and small-house living.

Included among the revival styles in Southwood Park are numerous bungalow, ranch and American foursquare designs that typify the care and attention to detail that was common among architects and craftsman of the period.

Michael Galbraith, ARCH executive director, said Southwood Park is representative of a period of urban beautification and deliberate suburban planning that began in the early 1900s and continued up to World War II.

"What's neat about those suburbs is they began to think about how to build a suburb at that point," Galbraith said. "There was something called the City Beautiful Movement that swept through Fort Wayne and through the country that sort of designed suburbs so that they were more than individual houses on individual streets set out in a grid pattern. They started to have amenities like street lights, curving streets, park strips and little parks, all those things that makes suburbs what we'd all want to live in."

Such quality of life concerns extended to the design and construction of the homes within those suburbs. These days people typically stay in a house for five to seven years and then move on. Many of the homes built during the 1920s and 1930s were designed for owners who meant to live out their lives in them, Galbraith said.

"When you look at the architecture of the 20s, it

offices sprang up in the commercial area, as did grocery stores and gas stations. The


value of that infrastructure remains important today, and preserving it and the homes in neighborhoods like Southwood Park helps maintain the overall vitality of the city, Galbraith said.


"When you look at the health of a city, the downtown, the entire ecosystem, these older suburbs contribute by using existing infrastructure and by using existing services," he said "It's a good way to make cities grow, by encouraging that density within the fabric of the city. It is a green way to go. When neighborhoods stay strong, all of the businesses that depend on those neighborhoods stay strong."

Then there is the pure beauty of the homes themselves. Stately Tudor mansions interspersed with story-book bungalows and proud foursquares dot the tree-lined streets. Sidewalks encourage rambling walks and connections with neighbors. The home and garden tour provides a chance to see what it's like to live in a different place. And not just from the outside

Ticket holders not only get access to the ARCH tent that will be set up near the Old Mill Road round-about, they will get to go inside the 12 homes on the tour and explore the grounds. Who isn't curious to see how other people live? Galbraith called it the "medicine cabinet syndrome."

"We want to know what's inside," he said. "People on the tour look for decorating and design ideas. They also get to see the craftsmanship that often had disappeared from our houses after World War II because we built so many so fast. These are truly magnificent homes."

Joe Bachman might hail from Philadelphia, but he's as country as they come. Just ask his fans, many of them active and former military, and take a listen to his music, which celebrates not only pretty girls and front porch beer parties, but patriotism, family loyalty, and the importance of having a place to hang one's hat. (Bachman's, by the way, isn't cowboy. He seems to prefer the baseball cap.)

"No one who lives in Nashville is from Nashville," Bachman told me in a recent phone interview. "There are probably 10 or 12 straight-up redneck boys who grew up on a farm working in country music today.

The majority of us come from different places, and I promise you, Philly is more redneck than most."

Bachman credits his strict upbringing with establishing his country cred.

"I was a military son. Every day until I was 18, I went to bed at 8 p.m., and that was after all

my chores were done. I've had jobs since I was 13. I went to church every Sunday. My father wasn't a music man really, and there were only two artists played in our house – Johnny Cash and Willie Nelson."

"Country," he added, "is a lot more about how you were raised than where you're from."

Bachman and his band, the Tailgaters – Ryan Burdette (drums), Brian "B-Dubs" Walsh (piano), Chris "Oz" Ferrara (acoustic guitar), Tyler James (lead guitar) – will play a free show Friday, July 3 as part of Warren, Indiana's FREEdom Festival. The show will start after the parade.

When I caught up with Bachman, he was getting ready for a gig in Rehoboth Beach, Delaware. Known as a consumate road warrior, Bachman said he's learned during his 15 years as a performing musician the secret to stamina when on tour.

"The two most important things you need to do to maintain this crazy lifestyle and keep your body in check are exercise and sleep," he said. "We're musicians, right? So our job is to bring the party. But that doesn't always mean that you get to party yourself. Don't get me wrong. We like a few beers as much as the next person, but we just have to be smart about it."

Bachman grew up in Philadelphia, but spent much of his adult life in Key West, which is also where he got his big break. Literally. While performing at one of the island's many clubs, he met Kenny Alphin of Big and Rich fame. A few years later he moved to Nashville where he recorded his debut album, *One*. The 10-tracker features several catchy, radio-friendly singles, including "Small Town Rock Stars," "Like I'm Elvis" and "I Sell Em Out of Beer."

As is often the case with Nashville debuts, the songs on *One* were written by other, more established writers. That's because Bachman and his producer at the time agreed to a simple song selecting strategy: they pitted a Bachman-penned song against a song from that of a better known writer. The best song won.

"It's very intimidating going to Nashville and waking up to an email that contains, say, a song by

Lee Bryce," Bachman said.
"And I'm supposed to choose
my song over Lee Bryce's? Nah.
That's a no brainer."

Bachman is proud of *One*, and said recording it was an amazing, once-in-a-lifetime experience, but his as of yet untitled second album, slated to come out sometime this fall,

will consist entirely of songs he wrote himself. The five years that have passed since *One* dropped have boosted Bachman's confidence, as has the fan response he's gotten from sharing songs like the sweet pop hit "Lookatchu" and the more serious and melancholy ballads "The Way I Used to Be," which explores Bachman's father's battle with dementia and Alzheimer's disease, and "A Soldier's Memoir."

"A Soldier's Memoir," which grew out of a marathon, four-hour performance following the announcement that American forces had captured and killed Osama Bin Laden, addresses the struggles of soldiers returning from conflicts in Iraq and Aghanistan. Bachman was inspired to write the song when a friend of his texted him in the middle of the night. saying, in effect, that countless songs had been written about soldiers dying for their country, but that none addressed the very real phenomena of post-traumatic stress disorder and traumatic brain injury. Bachman immediately began researching PTSD and TBI, and the resulting song gets roughly 4-6,000 shares a day on Facebook. More importantly, Bachman has been told by a number of veterans that they were on the verge of committing suicide and that it was his song that changed their minds.

"It's been a life-changing experience for me," Bachman said. "What a feeling, to be told your work might have saved someone's life. It's the greatest gift I've ever been given."

# From Ingenue to 'Mom'

Before she even knew what it meant, Janet Piercy was a performer.

"I wrote plays as a kid and organized the neighborhood kids doing shows," she says. "I'd also play 'priest,' giving communion or marrying other kids. When we weren't putting on a show or doing cheers, we would do 'gymnastics' on the swing set – hanging upside down, doing flips over the bars, jumping off the swings. It seems like I was always performing."

When she wasn't faking her way through gymnastics or the functions of a Catholic priest, young Janet

Ankenbruck was singing along to show tune record albums. "I loved Julie Andrews," she says. "I learned every song from Mary Poppins, The Sound of Music, My Fair Lady, Oklahoma!, all the classics."

It wasn't until her eighth grade year that she took the next step and made it real. "A neighbor girl took me to see Sing Out, Fort Wayne [a local subgroup of Up with People] perform at the outdoor Foellinger Theatre at Franke Park," she says. "I wanted to sing and dance like those kids did, so I joined that summer. We learned all the songs and

choreography, made our costumes. I eventually got to sing some solo numbers with the group."

Then her parents took her to see *My Fair Lady* at the Wagon Wheel Playhouse, and that opened her up to a whole new aspect of performance.

Shortly thereafter, she used one of the show's signature songs, "Wouldn't It Be Loverly," at her first community theater audition.

"My sister Margaret took me," she says. "We auditioned at the Jefferson Center for the park board's summer production of *Mame* at the Foellinger Theatre. I really had no idea what to expect. I sang my audition piece a cappella. The show starred Ann Colone, a local TV celebrity. Margaret and I were cast in the chorus. I loved every minute of that experience. I met wonderful people who I later did other shows with."

Her experience in Mame got her hooked for life. Two years later she was appearing in North Side High School's production of *Oklahoma!* She was cast in the chorus, but she was also asked to understudy Laurey, the female lead, who was played by an upperclassman. A pretty big deal for one of only a few sophomores in the cast.

She went on to earn a bachelor's degree in music at Indiana University and a master of science in secondary education from IPFW. While in school, she performed extensively in theatrical productions, recitals and summer community theatre. She sings professionally for weddings, funerals, concerts and in musical revues. Overall, she has performed in over 50 stage productions to date, mainly in ingénue roles.

"Doing theatre takes a big commitment of time and energy," she says. "Juggling your job and family commitments and still finding time for yourself is not

She did manage to find time for herself after the birth of her first child, playing Mabel in *The Pirates of Penzance*. "That role was very special to me," she says. "I have also been blessed to get to do several shows with my husband or children, such as Lily in *The Secret Garden*, Marian in *The Music Man* and Edith in *Never Too Late*."

Her entire family appeared together in the 1999 Civic Theatre production of *State Fair*, for which Piercy won an Anthony Award.

Piercy has been a music educator for the past 37 years, teaching kids kindergarten to high school and directing choir concerts and mini musical produc-



tions. Her three children are grown now, and her oldest daughter, Elizabeth, has followed in her footsteps, having performed professionally for Disney Entertainment and Celebrity Cruise Lines and teaching voice in her own music studio.

Onstage, Piercy has graduated from ingénue roles to comic roles. "It seems like these days I'm [playing] everybody's mom," she says.

She has enjoyed her most recent acting challenge, Marlee in *Touch & Go* by Rebecca Cameron with the Fort Wayne Civic Theatre's 6th annual Northeast Indiana Playwright Festival this summer. It was the "most serious and dramatic role" she'd ever played, she says.

As an accomplished musician and singer, she said she enjoyed stretching her acting muscles as Marlee. "What is always fun is taking words from a page and bringing them to life," she says, "communicating with the other actors and with the audience through action and voice and facial expressions."

Characters in musicals can sometimes be a bit over-the-top. But no matter what role she is performing, Piercy says she puts a lot of focus on genuineness. "No matter whether it's a big musical or a small, personal play, I want the character I play to be a real person," she says. "There has to be an honesty to them."

Piercy also appreciates the opportunity to perform, acknowledging the wide range of competition in this city. "There are many talented actresses in Fort Wayne," she says. "I would love to see more great roles for mature women written and performed."

Nevertheless, she says, "I'm grateful that Fort Wayne has such a vibrant arts community. While I don't get into every show I try out for, I am still able to enjoy performing on stage with some regularity."

### **Mandolin Orange**

Such Jubilee

Every now and then something undeniably pure comes across the radar – something you can't dismiss, even if it's not your cup of tea. North Carolina's Mandolin Orange won't blow you back on your heels with brute force. Rather, their unfussy brand of Americana folk packs its intensity within



disciplined song structures and arrangements that strip away all but the essentials. Every note, every nuance counts. It's analogous to a plane or a rocket being stripped of every unnecessary ounce possible in order to perform at its peak.

And keep in mind, Andrew Marlin (vocals, guitar, mandolin) and Emily Frantz (vocal, guitar, violin) aren't in danger of seeing the age of 30 anytime soon. They tour tirelessly and sweat the details; making it look easy is incredibly hard work. On their latest, *Such Jubilee*, the duo showcase formidable songwriting chops.

Yes, the instrumentation is sparse and mostly acoustic-based, but the songs transcend genre. On "From Now On," Frantz's vocal brings to mind Gillian Welch with a touch of Emmylou Harris. But shades of Freedy Johnston do the lifting here, in a song that subtly shifts within shades of gray. The brilliance here is the ability to let the listener hang on every accent and chord change. No mean feat.

"Settled Down," another highlight, speaks volumes within a compact acoustic jewel of a tune. "My baby used to sing all night / She's settled down with a ramblin' man," Marlin sings. "Make time ... and take time," he adds, in a song that both reflects the burnishing of a relationship and the duality that road life and home life present.

This isn't a "we're on tour all the time" record. If the interior biography of the lyrics rings true, *Such Jubilee* spends more time dealing with the time spent off the merry-go-round, ruminating on the static life between jaunts and its own disorienting effects.

All that said, this is no confessional. The lyrics are obtuse enough to invite interpretation without overpowering the overall impact of the music. There's a beautiful consistency throughout *Such Jubilee* that never edges into redundancy.

"Daylight," with it's minor-key strum and a lyrical sentiment that pushes and pulls between melancholy and appreciation, never rises above a conversational tone. But the depth on display here is formidable, even upon a first listen.

Marlin and Frantz have a musical and emotional chemistry that sparks these songs, and their attention to craft only heightens the enjoyment you'll get out of this quietly impressive album. (D.M. Jones)

### Mac McCaughan

Non-Believers

When he's not busy running his renowned indie label, Merge, Mac McCaughan still finds time to make a bit of music on the side. He still helms the long-running (and still very much viable) Superchunk with label co-head Laura Ballance and drummer/spark plug Jon Wurster, and McCaughan's



solo work under the Portastatic handle is always a treat. On *Non-Believers*, however, he plays under his own name for the first time—and treats us to an understated record that's at once uniquely him and something of a love letter to a past era.

Having worn out a copy of Superchunk's glorious, Steve Albiniproduced *No Pocky for Kitty* (released circa 1991), I'll be the first to admit that I went into *Non-Believers* looking for now-middle-aged songwriter wisdom and maybe even significant signposts pointing toward the past.

What's striking about the new album is how McCaughan has managed to retain a recognizable style across the bands and decades, but he's completely comfortable in these shoes. Replete with tasteful arrangements, retro synth touches and an unhurried feel. "Your Hologram" heads straight to the scrapbook and sets a bittersweet, nostalgic scene ("There's an '82 Honda getting all its tapes stolen outside a party where the tension is real / There's a band inside having all their hearts broken / All the kids are wondering how it feels / I'll be down in the basement... I'll be staring at your hologram, trying

### Steve Miller Band

*The Joker* (1973)

The eighth studio record from Steve Miller was a bit of a departure from the bands earlier work in that it was a little less psychedelic and rooted more on harmony and bluesrock.



Opening with the guitar-driven

"Sugar Babe," it sets the stage for unpretentious rock n' roll with a pleasant keyboards and purposeful drumming.

"Mary Lou" has an early 70s beat, and although a little inane lyrically, isn't an awful song. "Shu Ba Da Du Ma Ma Ma Ma" has a great bass line and is typical of a SMB track. It's not complicated, but doesn't bore the ears either. They cover the great Jesse Stones' "Your Cash Ain't Nothin' but Trash," and follow with the title track, a song that I have heard played way too much over the last 40-plus years. With all due respect; Miller's *Greatest Hits* should have been called *His Most Played Songs on Mediocre FM Radio*.

Bright bluegrass hints are heard in "Lovin' Cup," and Miller kills it on the harmonica. The band covers Robert Johnson's "Come On in My Kitchen" (as an added bonus, it's a live track from Philadelphia). They do it right, and they probably should have closed the record with it.

"Evil," which follows (and is also live), is one of the better blues song that Miller wrote over his long career. The album comes to a reasonably warm conclusion with the soothing 70s soft rocker "Something to Believe In."

The Steve Miller Band will be in The Fort on July 12 at the Foellinger and will bring what is always an interesting show by a very good guitarist.

Fun Fact: Miller was taught a few chords by Les Paul and T-Bone Walker, both friends of his parents. (*Dennis Donahue*)

to make it real").

As Superchunk's catalog often balances lyrical disaffection with sky-high, irrepressible choruses, McCaughan's most energetic new numbers shift gears when the verses give way to hooky, memorable parts – albeit with more finesse. "The sky is so heavy and the static has got nowhere else to go," he sings in "Our Way Free," before a chorus, slightly reminiscent of the Who, breaks through. The last cut, "Come Upstairs," would've felt right at home on underground college rock turntables (or cassette decks, as it were) in the mid-80s. Atop an insistent rhythm and jangly guitars (and, yes, synths), McCaughan sings, "If I make it there will you meet me on the top stair?" His voice still youthful and earnest, he adds, "Take me to some fresh air/ frankly, take me anywhere / 'cause I'm in the dark."

More measured and less quirky than his Portastatic work, Non-Believers may have an eye on the past—but Mac McCaughan is making some of his best music to date with this album. (D.M. Jones)

Multi-Love

Ruban Nielson has some heavy stuff going on in his head.

Multi-Love is the result of those heavy things.

It's also a celebration of the power of love and the power of music. It's an emotional smorgasbord – happy, sad, melancholy, reminiscent, confused and overwhelming, sometimes in the same song.



A lot has been said about the love and relationships Nielson lived within while writing this album, and while I'm sure the feelings he cultivated while swimming in the beauty and confusion of those relationships show up here, this is mostly a collection of weirdly beautiful songs about life itself. The ups and downs. The good and the bad. But mostly, it celebrates the ride and what we can do when we let ourselves feel the pleasure and pain of love.



A couple of weeks ago, I got you caught up with the 2004 whatzup/Wooden Nickel Battle of the Bands winner, Take Sides. With it being BOTB time once again at Columbia Street West, I thought it would be cool to check in with some of the bands that won us over in past competitions.

This time around I set out to find out where Definitely Gary have been hiding since taking the crown in 2006. Who could forget this powerful funk/rock trio whose genre-defying music, silly stage getup and afro-coiffed guitarist made them a force to be reckoned with back in the day? They quickly made a name for themselves and gained quite the fanbase which helped them beat out a fierce competition in that year's contest.

When I asked about Gary's BOTB experience, bassist/vocalist Casey Stansifer replied, "BOTB in our era was a blast because there were so many great bands playing as well (Sankofa, Unlikely Alibi, Matt Sturm Band, etc.). One of the highlights for us was performing with Sankofa in the final battle. The guy is incredibly talented, and he went all out for those performances. I think seeing each band try to put on their absolute best performance and then trying to out-do that personal best each week was very cool."

I have to agree with him that the competition surely brings out the animal in most bands. Together, Stansifer, Zach Smith (guitar/vocals) and Jon Ross (drums) put together two fine releases (*Pleased to Meet You* and *The New Deal*), snagged some Whammy Awards and performed a number of memorable shows since forming in 2000. One particularly memorable show was when they had the opportunity to open for the Presidents of the United States of America at Piere's in 2008.

Although Definitely Gary have never officially thrown in the towel, it's been awhile since we've seen or heard anything from them. However, the members are still very active on the scene today. Ross, for in-

stance, has been in too many bands to name. You've heard of the *Six Degrees of Kevin Bacon* game, right? Well you can definitely do that with Ross, as he's performed with so many area musicians. (I believe his record is seven bands at one time.) One of those bands was The Orange Opera with whom he won another BOTB competition with the following year. He then went for a BOTB three-peat with another act, Superhunk, but came up short. Today, you can more than likely catch Ross at the Brass Rail serving up some cold ones or playing guitar with the band Boat Show.

As for Smith, you've probably seen him strumming with the dream pop band House of Bread or with the ever-popular The Orange Opera. Then there's the bass-slapping Stansifer who ventured onto other projects like The Beef Manhattans and more recently has been playing with the Dan Smyth Trio. He's also a longstanding member of the Fort Wayne Jazz Orchestra, and he directs a jazz combo at Carroll High School where he teaches English and language arts. Stansifer was recently among four Northwest Allen County Schools teachers who were named teacher of the year. Good job, Casey!

Definitely Gary are one of those bands that I had the chance to see from the very start, as I can remember seeing an early version of the band – when they were called Ping – at the short-lived Nowhere Club in Decatur. Not long after that the Definitely Gary dynasty began. The members of the band are still involved in the local scene but, sadly, just not together. Maybe someday we'll have the opportunity to see them reunite and blow us away once again. Fingers crossed!



Going into this record I was thinking this was going to be the most sonically clear and pristine UMO record to date, and after hearing lead single "Can't Keep Checking My Phone" I was sure that would be the case. Well, while there may be more clear-eyed moments on this record, it's still very much immersed in the sonic murk and mire Nielson bathed his songs in previously.

If not a hi fidelity effort, it's all the more a musically experimental album while also being the most pop-inflected and highly danceable. In fact, there's a few moments on Multi-Love you'll find it hard not to get up and shake what the Lord gave ya. "Can't Keep Checking My Phone" is Bee Gees-worthy. It's like Giorgio Morodor producing Rufus on acid, all the while telling a true blue sad sack tale that feels as real as that hi hat. "Like Acid Rain" is two minutes of Stevie Wonder funk singed at the edges. Think "Tuesday Heartbreak" sitting in the sun too long with a bit of Prince weirdness thrown in for good measure. "Ur Life One Night" shakes and shimmies like a lothario coming down hard on the dance floor. The buzz remains, yet regret and confusion linger just around the corner. There's a some truly great guitar noodling happening here as well. The Purple one would be proud. "Multi-Love," "Stage or Screen" and "Necessary Evil" wheeze and whisper with homemade synths and ethereal noise, creating an almost alien world where soul and funk melt into the cosmos. "Extreme Wealth and Casual Cruelty" features NIELSON'S dad playing some great sax, giving the song a very grounded and breezy quality.

All of these songs Nielson has penned deal with love and relationships in one way or another - a little bit about the confusion of growing feelings and a little about how we deal with those emotions. I think his inspiration to write comes from dealing with his own "multi-love" situation, but he takes those feelings and shines them outward into the bigger picture. Spread the love, and things could be quite wonderful. If we could just learn to unite and be one instead of building walls and disliking what we don't understand, the world could be so much more. Of course, we're human, and if there's a chance to screw something up, we will do that. That's the irony of spreading the love. Guilt, jealousy, and resentment usually ruin what could be a paradise.

Such is life.

Unknown Mortal Orchestra have always sounded like an alien version of rock, funk and soul; on Multi-Love Ruban Nielson perfects that alien sound. His homemade, hazy, and lovelorn songs are as good as they've ever been. This may even be the best record yet. It's at times also the most confounding, as you at times yourself wishing some of the grime would wash away and you could hear these songs as naked as they were when they were written in Nielson's basement on an acoustic guitar.

But still, a damn fine album. (John Hubner)

Jagermeister is sending Fort Wayne favorites **Halestorm** out on the road this fall for A Wild Evening With Halestorm. The tour takes place this fall as the band continues to support their new album, *Into the Wildlife*, which debuted at No. 5 on The Billboard



200. According to a press release from Halestorm singer Lzzy Hale, this tour is everything a Halestorm fan would ever want. "Here's what you're gonna get: a full evening with Halestorm only, in the spirit of our latest record, doing whatever we want. We'll be doing not one but two (maybe more!) crazy sets for you, jam packed with surprises every night." The tour, unfortunately, isn't slated for Fort Wayne but does include stops in Chicago September 18 and Columbus, Ohio September 30.

Another Fort fave, **Trapt**, are readying themselves to release a new album. The band will tour to introduce some of their new songs to fans while undoubtedly including all the hits as well. The new album, *DNA*, is set to drop sometime this fall, and the boys are booked to play Chicago on July 18 and The Machine Shop in Flint, Michigan July 23. **Sons of Texas** will open the shows.

**Sleater-Kinney** used to be one of those bands that was going to be huge; then they disappeared. Back in action 10 years later with a new album, *No Cities to Love*, released in January, the band is planning a winter tour to help reintroduce itself to the public and try to regain "It Band" status. The tour kicks off in Indianapolis December 4 and moves on to Columbus, Ohio December 5. Cincinnati December 6, Detroit December 8 and Cleveland December 9.

Foo Fighters had to cancel their current tour after singer Dave Grohl fell off a stage in Sweden and broke his ankle and leg. I've never been a Foo Fighter fan, but Grohl definitely deserves respect because the man actually finished the show - with a freakin' broken ankle and leg. Grohl said in an internet post a few days later that after the fall that he was laying on the ground thinking, "Are you kidding me? We haven't even gotten to the screamy bit of the song and the gig is over? So I asked for a microphone and told the audience I'd get fixed up and come right back to finish the show ASAP. I couldn't stand the thought of such a perfect night going to waste! I looked at our drummer Taylor and said, 'Bust out some Chevy Metal covers while they fix me up!' So, as the band kicked in to 'Stay With Me' by The Faces, the medics poured me onto a stretcher, took me off to the side, cut my favorite pants off (so bummed) and popped my ankle back into place. I asked if I could get back onstage to finish the show, but they said I needed a cast (which was 20 minutes away at the hospital) to hold my ankle in place. So I looked my EMT, Johan in the eyes and said, 'Well, then you're coming up there with me right now and holding it in place until they can bring the cast here.' Like clockwork, the cast arrived, I walked offstage for a song or two as they put it on me and then came back to finish the gig." Now that's a true rock n'roll move. Well done, Mr. Grohl. Well done.

## Magic, Romance Rarely Mix

The Night Circus by Erin Morgenstern, Anchor Books, 2011

You can see it coming even at the very beginning of Erin Morgenstern's The Night Circus: this novel was born to be a major motion picture. Morgenstern's circus is crafted foremost as a visual thing, all stark and elegant with its black-and-white tents, its centerpiece a magical clock that virtually begs to be constructed and animated with state-of-the-art CGI. And at the

heart of its plot is the story of star-crossed young lovers who must find a way to come together despite the fact that they are in conflict - not because they are a vampire and a mortal girl, but because they are magicians pitted against each other in an epic magical competition.

The novel is set at the end of the 19th century and the beginning of the 20th. Prospero the Enchanter is perhaps the greatest stage illusionist in the world, except that, unbeknownst his audiences, he is a real magician and not merely an illusionist.

At the book's outset, Prospero is saddled with his young daughter, the product of a brief affair several years earlier; the girl's mother has committed suicide and sent



the girl to live with the magician. Prospero makes the best of the situation and begins to train the girl - who immediately shows promise - to become a magician herself.

A few months later, an old adversary of Prospero, a mysterious man in a gray suit, shows up at the theater, and Prospero immediately proposes that the two of them engage in a competition in which Prospero's daughter and a student of the gray-suited man's choice have a magical battle to the death. The two sadistic and apparently heartless men have engaged in these deadly competitions before. The graysuited man agrees and plucks a young boy from an orphanage to serve as his combat-

The magicians spend years separately training their pupils. The gray-suited man takes his student, Marco, to exotic cities but keeps him confined to apartments and hotel rooms where Marco learns his magical craft. Prospero trains his daughter, Celia, by cutting her and breaking her bones so that

## Wilson Bio-Pic Hits the Right Notes

Knowing that there is a happy ending to Love and Mercy, the biopic about Brian Wilson, the artistic force behind the Beach Boys, is important to enjoying this unconventional but wonderful film. Loving the Brian Wilson sound and the Beach Boys, and even a familiarity with his bizarre history and knowing that his life has been a bumpy ride, I still wanted to look away from the pain on screen often. Love and Mercy can be very scary.

But the title gives it away; there is so much love and mercy in *Love and Mercy* that the experience is exhilarating.

Music star biopics often follow a formula of early success, grisly meltdown (fueled often by drugs, abuse and sex, the same ingredients that helped the stars become successful) and a redemptive third act. Usually these films depend on extended performance set pieces to rouse the audience. There is enough music in *Love and Mercy* to suffice, but if you want a hit parade, this is not the movie for you. If you are both a fan and music nerd who thrills to how the songs were made and what the musical wave of the day was all about, this is the movie for you.

Love and Mercy puts the expected elements of a movie biopic in play (they are all part of Wilson's life) but adds other elements and scrambles them into something very fresh. Director Bill Pohlad and screenwriters Oren Moverman and Michael Lerner take an adventurous and ambitious approach that works well to bring key moments of Wilson's experiences to vivid life on screen.

The film focuses on two phases of



Wilson's life. From 1965 to 1968, Wilson was at his most creative, and the band did very well; he was also was slowly coming apart. In these scenes Wilson is played by Paul Dano. His performance is wide-eyed, capturing the wonder of what is happening. Dano captures the passionate, curious young musical nerd/genius perfectly. In the early 80s, as he slowly emerges from years of depression and drug use (both recreational and prescribed), the foggy but appealing Wilson is played by John Cusack. Love and Mercy jumps between these phases often. Different actors make these transitions easy. The styles also signal the time gap. The 60s do not look like the 80s.

Love and Mercy begins with a montage of early songs and the routines of fame. Photo shoots, concerts, television appearances and the mechanics of music and fame are backed up by snippets of early Beach Boy hits. The later phase of Love and Mercy is introduced when Cusack buys a Cadillac. He's a different man, covered over with a new shell, but the gentle soul underneath is still there. Cusack shuffles and averts his gaze and doesn't overdo. He effectively expresses that there is a deep well of weird under his skin.

Buying the Cadillac turns out to be lifechanging. He meets Melinda Ledbetter, a bright, shiny lady who will rescue him. Elizabeth Banks is better than she's ever been as a woman who possesses deep reserves of strength and perseverance. At the dealership, we also meet Wilson's doctor, shrink and legal guardian Dr. Eugene Landy, a frightening and talented-as-ever Paul Giamatti.

Love and Mercy nimbly cuts from these two pasts. In each there is an abuser. Wilson's father hits him just once in the film, but the boys scatter and hide like bugs whenever Dad shows up. Brian's description of being beaten is awful. The humiliations of Dr. Landy are worse. He's a professional abuser with a paid staff and a drugged client.

This structure lets the filmmakers leap over the misery in between these phases (the extreme drug abuse, the enormous weight gain and the years spent in bed). Only the first rush of drugs is seen in the movie. They so effectively relieve Brian's anxiety that it is easy to see how they take over his life.

Keep the happy ending in mind when things get rough. And there are happy moments, moments of humor and joy throughout. Some are musical triumphs. Some are simpler, like jumping off a yacht for a little freedom.

The movie ends with a Beach Boy favorite; then, in the credits, Wilson sings the post mental illness hit that names the film. "Love and Mercy." That song begins with the lyric, "I was sittin' in a crummy movie with my hands on my chin." Love and Mercy is the furthest thing from a crummy movie.

## Jurassic World: Just Don't Go There. Please

Here is my review of Colin Trevorrow's Jurassic World: Why is Bryce Dallas Howard in movies? Here is another review I wrote of the film: I hate that a great actor like Vincent D'Onofrio has to be in a movie like Jurassic World. And here is the third and final review of the film I wrote: I get it, Hollywood. You like sure things. You hire a somewhat proven, marginally hip director who you can push around and manipulate. You hire a dim-witted, simple-minded leading man who will do what you need. You make a sure-thing movie that brings in a ton of money. You sell big dollars based on the name and concept alone. You don't make a good film. You make an impressively produced film (mostly because of the budget, not the talent) that isn't good at all. You ruin cinema. You leave it up to the indie world to keep the art alive. You dumb down the public. You get rich. You're an American production.

And those are my reviews.

I suppose what bothers me most is that Steven Spielberg and Frank Marshall are both involved in this film as producers. I thought Spielberg wanted to be a protector of the art at the highest level? I believed that much longer than most did. In my opinion, he's done a good job of that over the years. Sure, he's made some mistakes and missed the mark quite a bit, but never before has



he seemed so shallow and money grubbing. And that's frightening for someone like me, who wants to believe that a guy like Spielberg is more interested in the art than the money. Jurassic World should never have happened. When I heard that Spiels was involved as a producer, I thought that maybe they had a good idea. And when I heard that they hired Trevorrow and actor Chris Pratt (and unconventional choice, right?), I thought maybe they'd make an interesting film. But no. Not even close. They made a money-maker. A dumb film. They made an awesome can of Faygo. A kick-ass McRib. A rollercoaster. Not a piece of art. They made a Sports Illustrated Swimsuit Issue. An ugly pair of popular Nikes. A pack of gum. You

They made a billion dollars. In, like, a week. They insulted the American public. And maybe, by the time it's all said and done, they made a couple billion. Maybe, in a few years – considering rentals and merchandise and amusement rides and whatever – they made maybe 3 or even 4 billion. Three or 4 billion of the stupidest dollars I know of

in this industry. And, as a filmmaker, cinephile, film critic and general believer in the art of cinema, that really hurts me to think about. I don't like seeing a film like Jurassic World do so well. I'm okay with The Dark Knight killing at the box office and I'm even okay with the Star Wars reboot. But Jurassic World is just silly and dumb and backwards. We're living in a too-safe era for film, where action films based on comics are what people go to automatically. Where a film like Ex Machina can hardly get an audience despite being incredibly well made and even somewhat Hollywood-friendly. Where Fifty Shades of Grey exists. Where Ted 2 is a thing that people I know are looking forward to.

Here's what I think you should do: if you need a great Hollywood action film (some of us do, and I totally get that), wait for Christopher McQuarrie's Mission: Impossible – Rogue Nation. I think that one will be a real spectacle and certainly a production achievement. Skip that cartoon they call San Andreas and save your money for Sam Mendes' Spectre. If you want to have a blast at the theater in a larger-than-life way, go see Mad Max. Wait for the Star Wars flick. Maybe even go see Spy. But please, I beg you, don't put any money into this Jurassic World mess. Is it fun? Yeah, sure. If you're a simple-minded buffoon.

The Wagon Wheel Center for the Arts' production of West Side Story, running through June 27, is just about everything you want it to be. Musically beautiful, energetically danced, gorgeously sung and heart-breakingly acted, the 1950s musical version of Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet pits the Sharks (a gang of recent immigrants from Puerto Rico) against the Jets (a gang of white kids, many of them first-generation Americans). They're both fighting for the same turf, but things get complicated. Tony, who is starting to outgrow the Jets, falls for Maria, the Shark leader's sister. She convinces him to try to stop the gang war, but his intervention has tragic results, leaving two gang members dead.

Allsun O'Malley (Maria) is very natural onstage. Her Maria is physically delicate but has great emotional strength. O'Malley has amazing vocal control and a beautiful tone. She also has fabulous chemistry with Jordan Andre, who plays Tony. Andre conveys

Tony's youthful exuberance and hopeful optimism, which is in stark contrast to the pent-up anger felt by his Jet brothers. O'Malley and Andre let their characters have fun getting to know each other through good-natured humor and later with passionate heart-

Monica Brown is sexy and strong as Anita, Maria's confidante. Her Anita is more mature than Maria but not overly mature. She is still a girl, and her bravado breaks down when she is physically and verbally



she can learn to heal herself. It is a brutal regimen for both students, to be sure.

But what about the circus? It begins to come together when a bombastic theater producer is inspired by a review in which one of his productions is called "almost transcendent" to create something that's completely transcendent. His idea is to create a circus filled with wonders, a collection of tents filled with the most mystical, mesmerizing and, well, transcendent performers on the planet. Not surprisingly, Marco is working as the producer's assistant, and Celia is hired as the circus's illusionist.

The circus becomes the setting for both Marco and Celia's battle and their love story. The circus pops up suddenly in empty fields around the world ("It is simply there, when yesterday it was not") and it invites the locals to come inside and experience its enchanting entertainments, but only after dark. The circus "opens at nightfall, closes at dawn."

The Night Circus is not without its problems. It's slow to get started, and even though it takes nearly 100 pages for Marco and Celia to even meet, all that

time is not spent letting the reader get to know them. Instead, we're introduced to secondary characters, and we watch the gradual conception of the circus, but mostly we're told over and over again how magical and wondrous the whole thing is. The result is that nothing is very well developed – not the settings, the situations nor the characters. If it weren't explained to us incessantly that we're supposed to be in awe of it all, we might come to the conclusion that Morgenstern's world and her characters are rather flat.

Stage magic is, by definition, mysterious and entertaining; if it weren't, there'd be no reason for any of us to have an interest in it. Same goes for the circus. They are not, however, automatically the stuff of enthralling romance, even if they're infused with supernatural elements worthy of *Twilight* or *Harry Potter*. It's encouraging, then, that the world of magical performers has not picked up much steam as a trope for romance novels. Let's hope that the upcoming film adaptation of *The Night Circus* doesn't make that happen.

In light of recent news stories, West Side Story almost feels less like a love story and more like a sad commentary on racial prejudice and the relationship between minorities and law enforcement.
