The Embassy Theatre Stands Alone

There's no place quite like the Embassy Theatre. And not just in Fort Wayne. Sure, lots of towns have old theaters or opera houses that host concerts and performances of all kinds. But when it comes to sheer beauty, not to mention exceptional acoustics, the Em-

bassy Theatre stands alone.

So it should come as no surprise that *whatzup* readers awarded the Embassy the Whammy for Best National Concert Venue in 2014. It's the fifth year in a row the Embassy has won the Whammy in this category, the sixth time overall.

"We're excited," said Kelly Updike. "That's a big honor."

Updike, the executive director of the Embassy Theatre, said the reasons people like the venue, nay, love the venue, are many.

"It's a combination of things," Updike said. "It's the history of the building. It's the beauty of the building. It's the beauty of the building. It has great sight lines. It has great sound. It's a combination of all those things. And it's a comfortable place to be. All of your senses are involved

when you're at a concert at the Embassy."

Built in 1928 as a for-profit concern, the Embassy, the called the Emboyd Theatre, was a regular stop on the national vaudeville circuit and also Broadway shows. Marketing director Barb Richards said the archives are filled with signed photographs of people and acts who passed through in the 1920s, 30s, and 40s.

The theater changed hands in 1952 and became

the Embassy. By the early 70s the building had fallen into disrepair and there was talk of tearing it down. But a group of people set out to save the Grande Page Organ which for years had been used to accompany various events. To save the organ the building had to be saved. And it was.

Today the non-profit Embassy is home to the Fort Wayne Philharmonic and to a wide range of events, both national and local. And while it can be easy to slip into complacency and take the Embassy for granted – it's always been here, after all – all it takes is the opinion of one of those national acts to remind us of what a gem the Embassy is.

"When Jerry Seinfeld was here," Updike said, "he walked out

on stage and said this is one of the most beautiful theaters I've ever seen. And people laughed. And he said, no that wasn't' a joke. You really have a true treasure here." (*Mark Hunter*)

 Rock This World Class Orchestra

When people think about their favorite national concert, their thoughts tend to run toward the pop/rock side of the live music spectrum. But if Mozart suddenly showed up at say, Buck Lake Ranch and started banging out "Eine Kleine

Nachtmusik," that would probably stick in the mind.

When Ben Folds appeared with the Fort Wayne Philharmonic in October of 2014, those who attended got the best of both worlds, a pop/rock artist playing with a world-class orchestra. The result stuck in the mind.

It also launched the Philharmonic into the realm of Whammy winner for Best National Concert. The perfor-

mance, held at the Embassy Theatre, the Phil's home base, placed Folds and his piano front and center on stage. It was a collaborative effort, and the second time Folds has brought his act to Fort Wayne.

Melysa Rogen, assistant director of marketing and public relations, said the Ben Folds concert is a prime example of ways the Philharmonic is working to broaden its base while maintaining high standards.

"He has orchestrated things to go with his pop music, and he's also written a symphonic concerto," Rogen said. "So it's songs that everybody knows, but he also brings in the classical aspects."

When special guests like Folds play with the Philharmonic, it generally takes a couple of days of rehearsal to get an evening's program worked out. But the extra effort is well worth it.

"People are still talking about it," Rogen said of the Folds collaboration. "People came up to me at GearFest and said what a great show that was. It made me realize what a great thing we have here with the Phil. It helps keep us moving forward bringing other great shows."

Rogen said talks are underway with a variety of artists, but since negotiations are ongoing she can't talk about who or when. But she did re-


veal a couple of planned events for the fall of 2015. She said a Fort Wayne favorite is coming to town and that the Phil will provide the soundtrack for a wellknown film.

"We like to bring in people you wouldn't necessarily associate with an orchestra," she said. "Next season we're bringing Jake Shimabukuro, the ukulele virtuoso. And we're doing a screening of *The Nightmare Before Christmas* on Halloween. Our orchestra will be playing the music along with the movie. It will be really fun. 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Feature • Steve Miller Band **Embracing the Hit Parade**

These days, nobody much remembers a band called Gerard McMahon and Kid Lightning.

But in 1982, there was dissension in its ranks.

Three of its members, pretty much the entirety of Kid Lightning, wanted to break away and form their

own band. Guitarist and bassist Kenny Lee Lewis said in a phone interview that he, guitarist John Massaro and drummer Gary Mallabar readied eight demos for shoppingaround purposes.

Then Steve Miller called.

"Gary comes in from a telephone meeting and said, '(Miller) needs some material," Lewis recalled. "He's got to deliver an album to Capitol in two months and he's stuck. He's dry. Should we send him our demos?"

The artists formerly known as Kid Lightning decided that, yes, they should send Miller their demos.

'We thought, 'Maybe he'll cover one song," Lewis said. "He ended up taking all eight of them."

Rather than re-record the songs, Miller merely supersized the demos and added his voice to them.

Thus it was that Lewis became an integral part of Abracadabra, a hit record by Steve Miller that Lewis didn't know he was making at the time.

When Miller asked him to join the subsequent tour, Lewis sought the counsel of his future wife.

"She said, 'You've done three records. You haven't had a hit. You came to L.A. - not just to be a studio guy - but to write songs and promote them. Here's your chance."

More than 30 years later, Lewis is still with Miller's band which performs Sunday, July 12 at the Foellinger Theatre.

The immediate aftermath of "Abracadabra" was heady.

Lewis realized what he had signed up for when he performed at a Belgian outdoor music festival for 40,000 people. "I was like, 'Oh my God," he said.

"Babies are being born out there and there's mud everywhere.' Everyone was on a cell phone, which I had never seen before. It was definitely a shock."

Miller had been a hit-making machine for over a decade and there was every reason to expect that trend to continue.

But it was not to be.

"Things tapered off pretty quickly," Lewis said.

Eventually Miller made a foray into jazz

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and Lewis made a foray into the manufacture of musical equipment.

In 1993, Miller recruited Lewis to write songs for the album Wide River.

But the music business had changed a great deal in the decade that separated Abracadabra from Wide River.

Lewis said the classic rock radio format which became popular in the late 80s helped

acts like the Steve Miller Band, but it hurt them as well.

"Here's Steve Miller," Lewis said. "He's classic rock. His stuff is playing 24/7 on classic rock radio stations. And he comes out with a new record. What are you going to do with it? It's not classic. It actually competes with the classic rock market.

"It was a really strange time in music history," Lewis said.

Asked if Miller took all this in stride, Lewis said, "No," then laughed.

"He'd like it to be the way it used to be, the old model," Lewis said. "Hardware that you completely control. He would love to be able to sell hard copies again. It was a lucrative business and a second-stream income."

Lest anyone imagine Miller to be consumed with bitterness, Lewis said Miller has made peace with certain aspects of the way things are (his fans' enduring affection for his old hits) without accepting other canards about aging musical careers (the idea that he shouldn't keep trying to generate interest in his new music).

Lewis said many people on the outside of the music business have an unrealistic idea about what it's like inside the music business.

Interviewers often ask him what it's like to be a rock star and he laughs.

"I'm not a rock star," he said. "I am just a journeyman/sideman who, by the time he turned 50, actually managed to turn it into a career. It took me that long to get my arms around it."

It's a terrible business, Lewis said.

"It's absolutely, ridiculously competitive," he said, "and you need to learn every single facet about the business."

In addition to performing live and appearing on recordings, Lewis has sold musical equipment, made musical equipment,

lessons, pergiven formed at weddings and corporate functions, and done every conceivable type of writing, including business writing.

He's produced. engineered, rented out studio space and transferred tapes.

These days, he's even writing novels and screenplays.

"Everything you can think of that touches the arts, you have to embrace all of that," he said. "If you don't, then you're probably not going to make it."

Lewis said he knows such talk "sounds a little dark and dismal and takes a little ro-

mance out of it for the fans. "Because they think you're having the greatest time of your life," he said. "I hate to burst bubbles, but it's hard. I don't recommend it to anybody."

But magic does still occur, he said.

Like when certain audiences hear certain songs played live.

"When they lose their brains and start thinking they're children again - then a transformation happens," he said. "It's a Dionysian equation. Hit record equals pandemonium.

Lewis said it almost becomes a mini-Mardi Gras for the moment.

It was during a break in the early 2000s, Lewis thinks, that Miller made peace with the idea that his audiences want to hear a greatest hits package and that he should be grateful to have a greatest hits package to offer them.

Lewis said he knows of artists who refuse to play their hits, and he finds this either insane or immature.

Artists like Steve Miller are merely vessels for "an incredible catalog," he said.

"People don't come to see Steve," Lewis said. "They come to hear his amazing voice singing this catalog. That's kind of nice. You kind of have to turn it over to a higher power, if you want to get spiritual about it.

"You have to decide," he said, "Am going to agree with the direction of this blessing or am I going to fight against it?""

"These fans are just thinking, 'Can you please play that song for us?" Lewis said. "It's been a nice run. We've been out consistently since 2004. The fans are happy. He's happy. The relationship is working out."

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
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Too Cool for Television

Four years have elasped since the release of *Hard Luck Stories*, the eighth studio album from indie rocker/working man's hero Ike Reilly, and the story behind the long release gap isn't what you might expect, given the tales of other bands' dramatic hiatuses. In the case of Ike Reilly and the Assassination, there was no battle with writer's block, no big breakup, no waiting for a troubled band member to check out of rehab.

Rather, Reilly and his mates did indeed record 15 new songs, only to lose them to the ether. A hard drive

crashed and the songs, which hadn't yet been mixed, simply disappeared in the frustrating and forever way work does in our socalled digital age.

"If you talk to the guys, they'll be the first to tell you I shouldn't be the one who handles any kind of technologi-

cal or digital storage stuff," Reilly told me in a recent phone interview. "And you know what? I really

wish they'd take any mention of the lost recordings out of the

press release because now I have to talk about them in every interview, and it hurts. It hurts a lot."

Likers and followers of Ike, born Michael Christopher Reilly, know that, while he's deadly serious about songwriting, he doesn't approach the subject of himself with any sort of reverence. After telling me of his hurt, he laughed it off. A tad ruefully, perhaps, but he laughed all the same.

"Everything happens for a reason, right? And there are lots worse things in the world than losing a few songs." He sighed. "Whatever."

Fans also know that Reilly is something of a rough-around-the-edges renaissance man. His work experience includes stints as a hotel doorman and grave digger. It will come as no surprise, then, that what some might call a side project was another reason behind the delay between *Hard Luck Stories* and the band's newest album, *Born on Fire*. During those four years, Reilly was also hard at work writing and starring in a dark comic drama for AMC. The show, titled *Where's My Goddamned Medicine?*, was in the filming stages when AMC dropped it in favor of a slightly more conventional show.

"My show was sort of a modern take on Jack Benny," Reilly said. "It was cinematic, dark, funny, poignant, cool, very quirky. Turns out it was also too smart for TV executives to understand, and in the end, they went with something else."

"Long story short," he added, "AMC owned me for a couple years, which diverted my attention away from writing songs. Usually, I can write a song a day, but the TV show set me back a bit."

Reilly wasn't bragging when he said he can write a song a day. Prior to the four-year gap between *Hard Luck Stories* and *Born on Fire*, he'd basically been averaging an album a year and fans never had long to wait for their addictive dose of Reilly. Following his 2001 Universal Records debut, *Salesmen and Racists*, Reilly didn't waste any time putting out *Sparkle in the Finish*, *The B-Sides*, *Junkie Faithful*, *The Last Demonstration*, *We Belong to the Staggering Evening* and *Poison the Hit Parade*. The albums are diverse and idiosyncratic, but one thing that all Ike Reilly songs have in common is a commitment to layered, smart storytelling.

"The best songs are simple songs," Reilly told me. "I'm interested in humans interacting in America, the struggle between fulfillment and survival. I like lan-

> guage, how it works, what it means when we mess with it, and I like finding humor and irony in the darkest situations. My friends always claim they write my songs for me because I quote them a lot, but I'm like, 'Hey, I wrote it down, didn't I?'''

> In *Born on Fire*, Reilly takes on everything from the Trayvon Martin shooting to America's crumbling infrastructure, corrupt office politics and the dangers inherent in telling the truth. I asked him if he'd written a song the day we spoke.

> "Nope," he said. "No time. I was busy this morning, playing guitar and yelling at my son to get ready for work. I was hollering at him about the importance of preparation and being prompt in almost Ethel Merman fashion. Maybe I should start an Ethel Merman tribute band, now that I think about it. Nothing else has worked out. Why not?"

> He was only partly kidding. Obviously, this muchlauded musician, who describes himself as "the cockroach of rock n' roll" need not quit his day job in favor of impersonating a 1950s musical comedy star. But, as an independent musician in his late 40s living in the same Chicago suburb where he was born, Reilly does admit to being frustrated with the fact that a certain amount of success has eluded him thus far. That's why he's making a greater effort to tour behind *Born on Fire*. The tour brings Ike Reilly and the Assassination to CS3 Thursday, July 9.

> "I've always been all in on the writing, all in on the recording, but not always all in on the touring," Reilly said. "I'm a dad. I've made an effort to stay home with my freeloading kids. But this time I'm getting out there. I'm doing all the stuff you're supposed to do to promote a record. I'm being a very good

The Cozy Murder Couple

Although Joe Reese grew up in Texas and his wife Pam grew up everywhere (moving from Kansas to West Virginia to New York to Louisiana), it was in Austria where their paths ultimately crossed. Joe, employed by his alma mater Southern Methodist University in Dallas, was overseeing a study abroad program, one in which Pam would ultimately participate, setting up their meeting in a lovely setting. In fact, the Salzburg tavern where they spent time can be seen in *The Sound of Music*.

Both academics, their Austrian love story culminated in their wedding in 1980. Having just celebrated

their 35th anniversary, Pam continues to teach full-time as faculty in the Department of Communication Sciences and Disorders at IPFW while Joe now teaches part-time at the university.

If it all sounds pretty cozy, it is. And it became even more so when a bit of murder entered the story – several murders as it turns out, with the couple having just released their seventh "cozy mystery," *Climate Change*.

How does a happily married couple become the successful mysterywriting team, T'Gracie & Joe Reese? It's not a big leap, it turns out, if

the couple includes a writer and a mystery novel fan.

"I've always been a mystery reader and read all of the classics," says Pam. "Nancy Drew, Hardy Boys, Agatha Christie. Joe has a knack for writing and has written plays, essays, a couple of young adult books. I kept pestering him over the years about when he was going to write a mystery for me. I told him I knew he could do it."

When the couple was living in Louisiana and Pam was working on her Ph.D., Joe finally came through. But despite his efforts to have it published, the book was rejected by publishers who read it. One publisher, however, liked the book even though it didn't fit its genre. The publishing company, Cozy Cat Press, asked if Joe could send a cozy mystery.

"We immediately asked 'What's a cozy mystery?" and so Joe started looking online to find out what it was," says Pam.

As it turns out, a "cozy mystery" is pretty much what it would seem to be. Think Agatha Christie meets Angela Lansbury, Miss Marple meets Jessica Fletcher. Cozy mysteries provide all the sleuthing fun of murder without the language, sexual situations and violence that appear in more hard-boiled thrillers. The Reeses began pondering how to adapt their project to a cozy and stumbled upon the perfect setting for their books.

"I had a job interview in Hattiesburg, Mississippi, and we were driving back to Lafayette, Louisiana which takes you along the Gulf coast," says Pam. "We ended up going through Bay St. Lucy, which is a really nice artists' community. It was a quaint little town, even quainter before a couple of hurricanes

went through, and it seemed the perfect place for our mysteries to take place."

It was then that a third person joined the Reese marriage, namely Nina Bannister, the heroine and sleuth who tackles crime in a series which now includes seven titles. Though most of the stories are written by Joe, Pam makes her own contributions to the efforts, but does so under the pseudonym T'Gracie.

"Since I'm really expected to write non-fiction in an academic style for my work, I thought I should have a pen name for writing fiction. My middle name is Grace, and in the south they have a habit of putting a 'T' in front of things. It means petite, and it's used as an endearment. So I thought T'Gracie would be a



good name for me to use for our cozies."

Joe confirms that T'Gracie has become something of an alter ego for his wife.

"We have to buy T'Gracie clothes now."

"And I usually have a T'Gracie hat that I wear," adds Pam. "So she really is my alter ego, I guess."

Since their first book, *Sea Change*, was published by Cozy Cat in 2013, the Reeses have added six more books in just two years. Although it wasn't planned at the beginning, the books have followed a pattern in their titles –*Set Change*, *Game Change*, *Oil Change*, *Frame Change*, *Sex Change* and now *Climate Change*. Joe says the original title *Sea Change* was never intended to start such a trend.

"Nina is a retired principal and English teacher, and, of course, she loves Shakespeare," he says. "I could imagine her sitting, looking out over the water, and thinking of the quote from *The Tempest*: 'Nothing of him that doth fade, but doth suffer a sea-change.' So that title just came from that. Then as we continued to write them, we began finding titles that continued the pattern."

When they wrote a book in which Nina wins a special election to fill a seat in Congress and ultimately looks to change the male-dominated process of Washington politics, the couple also fulfilled a running joke among those who read their books.

"People would ask us all the time 'Oh, you have all these books with change in the title, when are you going to write *Sex Change*?" says Pam. "And so we did it, but it's not what you think it is!"

Anekdoten Until All the Ghosts Are Gone

So there I was, minding my own business, when a knock came upon my chamber door. "Who are you?" I asked. "Anekdoten. We've been around since 1993, though our last album was in 2007," was the reply. "Never heard of ya. Show me what ya got." Ever compliant, the nice Swedes set up their gear and



launched into "Shooting Star," the first track off their new album *Until All The Ghosts Are Gone*. Ten minutes long, this nearly instrumental track was propelled by hard-edged psychedelic rock organs, at times drawing from the well of King Crimson's *Red* album and other times throwing a bone to fellow Swedes Opeth, now and then throwing a loving glance at *Machine Head*-era Deep Purple. It was some good stuff, feeding the brain and the soul, I tells ya, and I instantly wanted to shop at Ikea. As that was a road trip I couldn't afford to take, I set up a folding chair to get comfortable and asked them to play me another song.

They obliged. "Get Out Alive" has a stoner rock feel but with a psychedelic twist, kind of like 70s Black Sabbath meets Black Moth Super Rainbow. Maybe there's a little Super Furry Animals in there also. The combination of gutsy, distorted guitars and clear cinematic strings pulsing through a well-conceived song development cycle was absolutely hypnotic, beautiful even, in a bleak kind of way. "If It All Comes Down To You" cranks up the Mellotron flute sound, as much as a flute can be cranked, layering in billows of clean electric guitars and vibraphone, creating an expansive, airy cloud of a song that made me think more than once of the subtle yet epic compositions of Oceansize, lots of tension and very little release. I applauded, and this encouraged the band to continue, launching into "Writing on the Wall," a more aggressive song starting with gritty bass guitar, orchestral strings, very few vocals and a powerful, insistent finale. Like their other songs, despite there being a lot going on, the overall feel was soothing, and I had the feeling that if I listened to their music with headphones and a black light there would be no need for any chemical enhancements to achieve a satisfying head trip.

As no one in the band had brought their black lights they instead played "Our Days Are Numbered," starting with vibraphone and flute to set a comforting tone before dropping the floor out via a creepy section that morphed directly into a dense, heavy rock feel with a tumble of drums and a twisty bass line. Five minutes of adventurous, intense rock later, the band dips into a dreamy section, and before I know it, they've snuck saxophones into the mix. This builds to a passage that would please any Syd-era Pink Floyd fans, adding in a twitchy rhythm in the drums that only adds to dark, brooding feel of the piece. As the song ends I sit there, stunned, on my lawn chair, impressed that they were able to suck me in so thoroughly on the very first listen. Therein is their genius as the music of Anekdoten is fully grounded in the psychedelic/English progressive music of very early seventies and yet is modern and fresh, both novel and nostalgic. Kudos, melancholy Swedes! You've won me over. (*Jason Hoffman*)

Faith No More Sol Invictus

It's been 18 years since Faith No More last delivered a studio album, 1997's underrated *Album* of the Year, and it's been six years since the band reunited to play live, primarily to overseas audiences. Since their initial departure, their cult status has only grown, despite often being blamed as having given

birth to nu-metal and rap-metal. The truth of the matter is, their descendants may have copped some sounds and poses from Faith No More, but nobody was really able to match their skewed sensibility, sense of humor or, for lack of a better word, artiness.

Case in point: the band recently appeared on the cover of Revolver magazine with a bunch of – wait for it – cats. That's right, it's Revolver magazine, home of heavy metal and hellfire, and the band is standing there stone-facedly holding a bunch of kitty cats. First of all, that's hilarious. Second, who else would do that? Whose heavy metal publicist would green-light such a thing?

If nothing else, Faith No More never sold out. They followed

Rolling Stones Sticky Fingers (1971)

As a huge Stones fan, it's hard to say which record I listen to the most, but I have to say that this is one of my favorites. This was also the first album without Stones co-founder Brian Jones (he was kicked out of the band in June of 1969 and died a month later).



It opens with "Brown Sugar," an edgy, guitar-driven number written about Jagger's girlfriend, Marsha Hunt, and goes right into "Sway." This is where new guitarist Mick Taylor shows he is worthy and that the Stones knew how to play the blues very well. Strings and the brilliant piano from Nicky Hopkins make this a classic track on a great album. "Wild Horses" appears on this release, as does the seven-minute jam "Can't You Hear Me Knocking." With Bobby Keys blowing a mean horn and Billy Preston shining on the Hammond organ, it is one of the best songs they ever recorded. Side one closes with the spiritual "You Gotta Move" which was recorded at the Muscle Shoals Sound Studios in Alabama (as were "Wild Horses" and "Brown Sugar").

Side two opens with the stirring "Bitch" which also features some of the best horns ever heard in a rock song. More blues and soul are heard in "I Got the Blues" and "Sister Morphine" (cowritten with Marianne Faithfull). The latter features Ry Cooder on the slide guitar. The release closes with "Dead Flowers" and the highly underrated "Moonlight Mile."

The Rolling Stones reissued this classic a few weeks ago, and are playing a brief, 15-city North American tour this summer through July 15th. They will be at The Indianapolis Motor Speedway on Saturday, and, of course, I will be there to celebrate my favorite band.

up the success of their breakthrough single "Epic" with the dark and challenging album *Angel Dust* which one reviewer called "the most uncommercial followup to a hit record ever." They were contrarians, always bucking against what they were supposed to be doing.


They still are contrarians. Their lead single for their new album *Sol Invictus* is called "Motherf—er." Yep, they announced their return with a single that was guaranteed to get absolutely no airplay because its title was a word that cannot be used on the air. Brilliant. Their second single, the scorching "Superhero," however, has been burning up the airwaves. With a cavalcade of blistering riffs and some of Mike Patton's patented vocal histrionics, the song sounds like it could have been on of the band's freak outs circa *King for a Day, Fool for a Lifetime*. So could "Sunny-Side Up," a slinky apparent ode to breakfast that is probably really a wry take on your typical lovesong. Or something. At any rate, it brings to mind other classics from the *King for a Day* album like "What a Day" and even "Cuckoo for Caca."

Overall, though, the album has its own character while still sounding like Faith No More. It's a little moodier, a little more ambient. Several of the tracks have a brooding quality ("Sol Invictus"). There are still a few scorchers ("Superhero"), and some are a combination of the two ("Cone of Shame," "Separation Anxiety").

And then there's "Rise of the Fall," which, by its very strangeness, may be the most prototypical Faith No More song on the album. It features a syncopated beat, alternating loud and quiet moments, and has some interludes that sound a bit like klezmer music sprinkled throughout the track. Think "Mouth to Mouth" from *Album of the Year* and you'll be in the right ballpark.

What it seems to lack is a greater sense of purpose. All of the individual performances stand up to – or are even better than – their earlier work, but as a group they lack a conceptual edge that came about from years and years of working together as a unit.

Unlike many reunion albums, though, *Sol Invictus* does the band's legacy well. In the intervening years, each member has been free to pursue their own musical path, so they are coming back together while still in peak playing and producing condition. Patton in particular deserves kudos (as usual) for his wide-ranging bravura performances, but really the entire band sounds solid. More so than what you could really expect after having spent that much time apart. (*John Hubner*)



boy." That said, his identity as an artist doesn't hinge on mainstream success. Mainly, he's driven by a desire to pay his band – David Cottini, Phil Karnats, Pete Cimbalo, and Adam Krier – and to continue to grow as an artist. "What I consider success is the kind of music we're making right now. It's being able to take a song and, through improvisation and incredible musicianship, make it the best song we can. It's going up on stage and performing soulful, uninhibited rock n' roll. That's success."

Pam concedes that Joe does most of the writing, though she chimes in with suggestions and often enjoys developing characters. She has also spearheaded their marketing.

"It is true that I do a majority of the writing," says Joe, "but marketing the books is just as big a job because you can't do one without the other. Digital marketing is beyond me, but it's not beyond her so our efforts are very much 50/50."

While the proceeds from book sales go to the publisher, the couple earns their income from the cozies through Kindle sales, providing Pam with her focus in marketing. She's developed a Nina Bannister Facebook page and has begun blogging as well. A website has recently been developed which will include updates and even recipes culled from the pages of their novels, meant to tout the local cuisine of their heroine. There is also a contest in the works to name their next book, having already rejected the titles *Brain Change* and *Mind Change*. It's all part of their hope to continue to write these books well into their retirement.

"Once I get these characters in my mind, there's no way I can't write," says Joe. "They just won't shut up."

The Unbreakable World Tour is the name of the **Janet Jackson** trek that kicks off August 31 in Vancouver, British Columbia. Jackson is embarking on her first tour since 2011 to support an as yet untitled new CD that will be released this fall, her first release since

The concert schedule finishes August 15 with the Summer Jam featuring **Naughty By Nature**, **Juvenile**, **SWV**, **Rob Base**, **Da Brat** and **Shock G** of **Digital Underground**.

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Pixar's Wonderful Emotional Ride

Inside Out the delightful new film from animation champs Pixar and director Pete Docter, one of the first animators Pixar hired in 1990, is a leap forward for the studio and for movies in general. I am not getting into an argument about whether or not it's the best film they've ever made. Docter himself has worked on Toy Story, Monsters, Inc, Wall-E, and Up (for which he won an Oscar). Those are all great films, but Inside Out is more and different. It is unlike almost all films. The only film it reminds me of is The Wizard of Oz.

Riley Anderson is an 11-year-old girl leading a happy life in Minnesota when her family is transplanted to San Francisco. Her friends are gone. Her new house is dreary. The moving van is lost. Pizza has broccoli on it. The new school is a challenge. She misses Minnesota.

All of this sounds like a pretty standard kid story. The story behind the story is taking place in Riley's brain. Five emotions run headquarters in Riley's brain: Joy (Amy Poehler), Sadness (Phyllis Smith of *The Office*), Anger (Lewis Black), Disgust (Mindy Kaling) and Fear (Bill Hader).

All of the voicing is spectacular. Poehler is especially great, and she needs to be. Constant Joy could get annoying. Smith is a close second. Sadness steals a few scenes.

Each emotion shares a role in what makes Riley the girl she is. Joy has been in control most of the time. Riley has been living the life of R(e)iley. The move to San Francisco has allowed the other emotions more influence. Fear says stuff like "We didn't die today. I call this day an unqualified success." Sadness says things like "Crying helps me slow down and obsess about the weight of life's problems." Disgust keeps an eye out to properly handle the cool girls. Anger is ready to blow at the slightest slight.



All this sends Joy into hyper mode. When things start to go bad her attitude is "We can fix this. We can do it." Riley's experiences roll down headquarters in the form of glowing balls. Some become core memories. Some go into long term storage. The emotions can call up memories as needed.

The real trouble starts when Sadness's touch starts turning memories of joy into memories of sadness. Joy tries to understand Sadness, but she doesn't. To keep Sadness from causing trouble, Joy gives her tasks, including reading the instruction manuals for the brain.

Beyond headquarters is the rest of Riley's brain – a massive, complicated construction. From HQ the Emotions can see part of the brain. They can see the islands – Friendship Island, Family Island, Hockey Island, Goofball Island – but they can't see everything.

As Riley's frustration in her new surroundings grows, her personality starts to change dramatically. Goofball Island is the first to crumble. When she won't goof with her parents, they think she just needs some "alone time." Mom (Diane Lane) and Dad (Kyle MacLachlan) mean well, but the move has been stressful for them as well. They are a little off their game.

Amid this chaos, Joy and Sadness are accidently ejected from HQ. That leaves Fear, Anger and Disgust in charge. Not a good combo. Next to go is Hockey Island. Tryouts for the new team just freak Riley out.

But the real action is going on in the weird mix of Riley's brain beyond headquarters. Joy is desperate to get back to headquarters to fix things because things just keep getting worse.

But even Joy has to admit that the brain is pretty cool. And this is where the brains behind Inside Out really outdo themselves. The screenplay is by Docter, Josh Cooley, and Meg LaFauve. Renaldo del Carmen is credited as a story writer and co-director. Poehler and Hader are credited with additional dialogue. I mention all the writing credits because, even if any of these folks contributed only a few lines or ideas, they should be very proud. The ideas and jokes in the brain fly by, fast and funny. Joy and Sadness run into Bing Bong (Richard Kind), Riley's imaginary friend. He's part elephant, mostly cotton candy, and a tad dolphin. Riley doesn't think much about him anymore. so he's been knocking around the brain and becomes their tour guide.

The plan is to get on the Train of Thought which runs through headquarters. That's complicated. They spend some time in the Subconscious which is where, according to Sadness, "they take all the troublemakers." The time Sadness has spent with instruction manuals comes in handy.

It would take a book to note and dissect all the clever little bits in *Inside Out*. I'll just mention one. I hope Pixar markets one of the movie posters on the wall in the Dream studio. "I Can Fly" is a classic dream, and the poster for it is cool.

Inside Out is as much for adults as it is for kids. (The kids in my audience, even the youngest, weren't ever really scared and they laughed a lot.) When Joy understands the value of Sadness, childhood is ending. Joy doesn't quite see the big picture, just yet, just as kids won't. But we adults know.

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Dinosaurs Continue to Rule the Box Office

Tops at the Box: Colin Trevorrow's *Jurassic World* continued to roll, selling another \$54 million last weekend and upping its 17-day U.S. total to \$500 million. Add to that another \$584 million in abroad sales and these dinos have already made just under \$1.1 billion at the box office. This is what happens when you have dinosaurs eating sharks. A good movie? Good enough. But I'm ready to not write about it ever again.

Also at the Box: New Disney Pixar classic *Inside Out*, from director Pete Docter (*Up*, *Monsters*, *Inc.*), continued to roll, taking the No. 2 spot at the box office last weekend, selling another \$52 million and bringing the film's 10-day total to \$185 million in the U.S. and \$266 million worldwide. Can't wait to see this one. From what I've read, it sounds like a truly special film.

Taking the No. 3 spot was Seth Mac-Farlane's *Ted 2* which sold a solid \$33 million over its first three days of release despite some pretty scathing reviews. Sequel money. Taking the No. 4 spot was a family flick about a dog called *Max*. The film, di-



rected by Boaz Yakin (*Sage*, *Death in Love*, *Uptown Girls* and other super crappy flicks) and starring both a good looking dog and a good looking older dude we call Thomas Hayden Church, sold \$12 million over its first three days.

Rounding out last weekend's Top 5 was Paul Feig's hit comedy *Spy*, starring my girl Melissa McCarthy. The film sold another \$7.8 million, bringing the film's international total to \$144 million. Not bad Paul Feig! Also of note, a re-release of Carol Reed's excellent *The Third Man* played at three theaters in the country and sold a solid \$24,000 over its first three days. If this comes to Fort Wayne, I highly, highly, highly recommend going out to the theater to see it on the big screen. Great, great film.

New This Weekend: Two big films

come out this week, including *Magic Mike XXL*. The film features the original cast, but director Steven Soderbergh is gone, replaced by Gregory Jacobs, who released a pretty great flick in 2004 called *Criminal*. This is his first film since then, and, supposedly, it's pretty great. We'll see. I'm guessing it's not. I'm guessing that people are just horny.

Also out everywhere is *Termina*tor: Genisys (genisys?!), starring Arnold Schwarzenegger, Emilia Clarke, J.K. Simmons, Jai Courtney and Jason Clarke. Great cast. The film was directed by Alan Taylor, best known for stinker *Thor: The Dark World*. Something tells me this one might just be pretty decent, but perhaps that's wishful thinking from the 13-year-old in me. The cast is good; here's hoping the script is better than the last couple of *Terminator* scripts. A number of indie films will also see limited release, including: *Amy*, *Cartel Land*, *Jackie* & *Ryan*, *Jimmy's Hall* and *Mala Mala*. *Amy*, in particular, looks pretty promising.



Math, Art's Tenuous Connection

100 Essential Things You Didn't Know You Didn't Know About Math & The Arts by John D. Barrow, W.W. Norton & Company, 2015

As someone who regularly tries to convince college students that the arts are relevant to them, I'm thrilled by the idea of a book that attempts to draw connections between the arts and a subject that is widely perceived as, at least somewhat, more a part of the everyday world than art is. Certainly not everyone is excited about math, either, but by virtue of its definite, scientific character, math might seem to be a bit more reflective of the world we really live in, and

the arts might benefit from a demonstration of how they and math are interconnected. Unfortunately, in this book mathematician John Barrow doesn't make a compelling case for a kinship between the two fields.

essential things The book is formatted as a lengthy YOU DIDN'T KNOW list of explanations, each just a couple of pages long or less, of the ways in which the arts and math cross paths. Barrow's definition of the arts is broad, and it includes both performing and visual arts, and it even is willing to consider the technology used to create art as part of the arts' territory. So we get both an explanation of the geometry behind a grand jete in ballet as well as a bit of a history lesson about the development of Auto-Tune.

This loose definition leads Barrow to include bits that are only tangentially related to the arts by way of some creative stage setting. He explains, for example, how you can use geometry to determine the minimum number of guards required to effectively protect paintings in an art museum, and he lays out the weird math underlying a deal in which you're offered three theater tickets for the price of two.

Many of the ideas are not related to the arts at all, and Barrow's attempt to make them seem so is

labored. He includes a piece about effective bidding at auctions, presumably, because art is often sold at auction, but it's not clear at all what a piece about effective betting on sporting events has to do with the arts. Similarly inexplicable are explanations of why eggs

are shaped the way they are, why roller coasters are designed the way they are or how long it takes to cook a turkey (this last one is titled

'Culinary Arts," but that's quite a stretch). Then there are pieces that seem to make the case that math and the arts are not related at all. The section that at first suggests that maybe there's an optical explanation for why El Greco painted strangely elongated figures ultimately concludes that optics have nothing to do with it and that the painter simply wanted to paint weird, stretched-out people.

All of this makes clear that Barrow's real passion is math, as does

the ARTS JOHN D. BARROW his tendency to slip pretty deeply into calculations and formulations. This book is for the math enthusiast, and definitely not for the reader who struggled with algebra.

Perhaps the most illuminating parts of the book are those sections about optical illusions. These sections explain how our desire to see patterns in images often causes us to think we see things that aren't actually there and to be unable to see things that really are there. Barrow seems to want to see math in art, even when it's not there, and even when his arguments for the intersection of the two disciplines make clear that they often don't cross paths at all.
