size matters. If it's too big, students get swallowed whole. If it's too small, there's no room to get com-

fortable. But when it's just right, good things happen. It's the theater department variant of the Goldilocks Principle.

Goldilocks would feel right at home in the IPFW theater program. But it was another set of fairy tales that boosted IPFW to the land of Whammy winners. The IPFW production of Into the Woods earned the program its first Whammy in the Best Theatrical Production category, topping a strong list of nominees.

Directed by Craig Humphrey, associate professor of costume

design, Stephen Sondheim's Into the Woods stitches together four Brothers Grimm fairy tales into a musical with twists and turns. It was the second time Humphrey has directed the musical at IPFW.

"It's a show that lots of people like because of the mixing for the fairy tales," he said. "I did it here in 1998, and last year I felt it was time to do it again. Had the right group of students."

Having the right group of students in the right numbers has become a habit for IPFW. And not only is the campus celebrating its 50th anniversary this year, the theater program, which has been around just sociation of Schools of Theater. Department Chair and Professor Beverly Redman, M.F.A., Ph.D., said the

recognition is helping an already strong program become even bet-

The department offers bachelor degrees in musical theater, directing, acting, and design and technology, with many students doubling up, Redman said. With a current enrollment of about 50 theater majors and nearly a dozen minors, the IPFW theater program is, in Humphrey's estimation the perfect size.

"Students get to do pretty much anything that they set out to do," said Humphrey, who is in

his 24th year at IPFW. "We have students acting as incoming freshmen on stage. They don't have to wait until they're a sophomore. And if they want to experiment in the various areas they have the ability to do that because we are as small as we are.

"I wanted to move to a place just like this because I wanted to be where all of the students in the program would have the chance to be working on the productions, but where the resources would be large enough that the department had a strong infrastructure. Honestly, it's what I've been looking for for a long time. It's a perfect fit for our students." (Mark Hunter)

The Fort's Hundred-Year Tradition

No two words stir up memories and appetites like the words Fort Wayne's Famous Coney Island. Okay. That's five words, but all you need is the last two. You can say hot dog, but it doesn't do the same thing to

To explain the effect of those two words, Coney Island, on the synapses, Jim Todoran, who co-owns

the restaurant with his wife Kathy Choka, needs three bullet points.

It's a good product – Yes, it is. Grilled hot dog, yellow mustard, coney sauce, chopped onions, steamed bun. Simple, consistent, delicious.

2. Good service - Again, yes. The employees of Coney Island are like family (many really are family) and are as loyal as the customers. They memorize your order, transmit it to the prep line with varying degrees of vocal thrust, depending on the ambient noise level in the place, then deliver it on familiar plates.

They move like bees in a hive, helping out as needed and never letting a customer dangle for too long.

The history of the place – The ultimate yes. It's the steam on the front window and the little Coke bottles. It's the stools, the tables, the stack of paper on the file cabinet near the roll top desk. If you grew up in Fort Wayne, the history of Coney Island is part of your history. It is our shared history.

I caught up with Todoran on a recent Monday morning to talk about Coney Island's second Whammy win for Best Casual Restaurant. He was chopping onions at a small table in the tiny kitchen that everyone at one time or another has walked through.

"It reassures us that everything we are doing is right," he said of the win. "It's nice to be recog-

Coney Island celebrated its 100th birthday in 2014 and, as far as anyone can tell, not much has changed over the years.

"We're constantly trying to fight change," Todoran said. "That's what people relate to. When they come back after 20 years, Fort Wayne is big and built up and changing, but we're still the same."

A few years ago, PBS aired a special on the vast number of local hot dog joints around the country. each with it's own twist on the simple frank. But they screwed up and

missed Fort Wayne's Famous Coney Island.

"They never contacted us," Todoran said with a quiet shrug. "As far as I know we're the oldest one in the country. I think there's another one in Michigan that might be 101. But people in their home towns, they love those hot dogs. It's their place."

Yes, and Fort Wayne's Famous Coney Island is our place. (Mark Hunter)

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The Heart Is Still Beating

Around 20 years ago, I attended a Huey Lewis concert and managed to push my way to the front row of a general admission show. It's not that I was the biggest Huey Lewis fan in the world, but I liked being close and having something to lean on at the same time. That made the front row, which provided the

edge of the stage as a support and a handy beer holder the best position for the long haul.

In fact, I never completely defined myself as a Huey Lewis fan, although I was certainly familiar with the material. I had previously forsaken radio in favor of MTV and VH-1, preferring to listen to music occasionally park myself to watch it as well. That was my concession to the 80s.

It was a good decade after Huey Lewis and the

News burst onto MTV before I saw them perform live, and I was looking forward to a pleasant show. As it began, things became very pleasant indeed. Huey, as I now like to call him for reasons that will become clear shortly, came out in a cornflower blue suit and a black T-shirt. The blue was especially memorable since it so nearly captured the color of his eyes. In an instant, my appreciation for his music grew immeasurably.

The band did one set then took a short break before returning to the stage. By this time I was on my second beer (okay maybe third) and as he walked out I decided to be bold in the most demure way I could muster. I coyly reached up hoping he'd come over to give me a handshake, and he did head my way. But instead of shaking my hand, he bent down, clasped my hand and kissed it. No kidding. I had my hand kissed by Huey Lewis. Have I mentioned that I'm one of the biggest Huey Lewis fans in the world? His music is pretty good too.

And his music has really endured. It's hard to know during any particular era what songs will withstand the test of time and just a few short years later the band would return to the Foellinger for another summer show, this time in the midst of the city's biggest celebration, Three Rivers Festival. And while the Huey Lewis and the News comet flew by quickly, it left an indelible impression, not to mention a boatload of hits.

Lewis remains a familiar face to music fans thanks not only to his regular tour

schedule but also to the success of his hometown San Francisco Giants who play in the World Series often and typically invite Lewis in to sing the anthem. But ultimately, it's his hits that people want to hear, and most of us have a favorite. For me, it's "Hip to Be Square," which had been one reason the band was pigeonholed as "yup-pie rock," an issue Lewis addressed in a Rolling Stone interview.

"Hip to Be Square" was a joke that not everybody got. People thought it was an anthem for square people. That hurt us a bit. If I have any regrets, it's not writing that song in the third person. That's how I originally had it. But what-

ever ... I'm mindful that I'm a very lucky guy. We're a lucky band. We play music for a living. We play music for a living! How good is that? I'm serious. We've done very

"My little band, we're pals. We come from Marin County. We made our own records and we have a career. We play and people show up. What's wrong with that? I mean, our 15 minutes of fame were a real 15 minutes. Now you don't get 15 minutes. You get three and a half, or whatever."

In truth, Lewis and the News got a little more than 15 minutes. With one promising hit on their second album, "Do You Believe





From Mike Reno's vantage point, it must look a little like a cult: seas of young people wearing red bandannas, many of which he has indirectly sold to the young people via his band's merchandise table.

The lead singer of the Canadian band Loverboy recalled by phone this trend's humble beginnings.

"It was so hot playing in the nightclubs when we first started out," he said. "The lights were about 10 feet away from us, six feet away from us.

"We'd play concerts on the stage, and we'd get

baked," Reno said, undoubtedly referencing the definition of "baked" that has to do with cooking. "I was sweating so bad one night that I couldn't even see. So, at the break, I cut the sleeves off my shirt and used one of them as a headband."

I believe it was Hedda Hopper who wrote, "Stars are born, one bandanna at a

More than three decades have passed since Loverboy's nightclub days, and Reno's headgear has become the stuff of rock legend and/or kitsch legend.

The band performs July 10 in Headwaters Park as part of the Three Rivers Festival.

It is said that a rising tide lifts all boats, but it is debatable which was the tide and which was the boat in 1981: Loverboy or MTV.

Before the network had even launched, someone connected with it approached the band and asked for some performance footage, Reno recalled.

"They said, 'Just send us some footage of your band playing live," he said. "They didn't even use the word 'video' to describe it.'

So ill-defined was the music television concept in the beginning that when "Turn Me Loose" debuted on the network, someone had randomly edited public domain silent movie footage into it, Reno said.

Concert footage plus silent movies equals music video, apparently.

But the band's videos became hugely popular on MTV, due in no small part to Reno being at least 83 percent more good-looking than, say, (just to grab a totally random name) Ronnie James Dio.

that peaked in 70s and 80s, and Loverboy was no ex-

ever, but new music from them has gone and will go

unheard for the most part.

But these inconvenient truths have not prevented Loverboy from continuing to release new music and to polish up previously unreleased tracks.

Reno said it's silly to stop making new music because the business model has changed.

"There was a time when I had that kind of a bitter taste in my mouth about the way things had changed so drastically," he said. "But then you get over it, and you really want to put some music out because you've got stuff to say and we write songs all the time.

Bands like Def Leppard, Journey and AC/DC

continue to release new music. Reno said.

Most of it is generously reviewed and some of it (like Journey's "Revelation") actually revisits former sales glories.

"At least it's a way for the fans to get something new and it keeps them interested," Reno said. "Things have changed but it's not as if everything's terrible."

Reno said the average

age of the people he sees from the stage these days is not all that different from the average age of the people who came to see the band in the 80s.

And he's at a loss to explain it.

"They know what we looked like, so they put headbands on and they come up to the front and they dance up and down and they bop and they go crazy and they throw their hands in the air and they sing all the words, and I've got to tell you," he said, "it blows my mind."

Reno garnered stupid, predicable headlines a few years back for a substantial weight gain, but he said he's had that under control for a while now.

'Yeah it's an ongoing thing for everyone who gets older," he said.

He credits cell therapy as the reason he is able, at 60, to keep up with a taxing touring schedule.

'I've been working with doctors so I have high

energy, so I don't get sick on the road and so my voice still sounds good," Reno said. As ambivalent-verging-on-openly-contemptuous

as some bands are about having to depend on their catalogs, Reno's bandmates knows how lucky they are to still be able to draw sizable crowds of variously aged people in 2015 and beyond.

"I can't tell who's having more fun: the crowd or the band," he said. "Do you know what it's like? It's like a class reunion. They're strangers who become old friends when they share their love of our music."

The 90s will be back once again at this year's Three Rivers Fest. The Summerland Tour, now in its fourth year and featuring the likes of Everclear, Fuel, the Toadies and American Hi-Fi, will be the featured headliners for Saturday night's prime spot - a choice based partly on the success of last year's Under the Sun tour which included seminal 90s bands like Blues

Traveler, Sugar Ray, Uncle Kracker, and Smashmouth.

"We see that there's a lot of people who grew up on 90s music who really aren't being served in this area," said Three Rivers Festival Executive Director Jack Hammer. "So we decided to dedicate one of our busiest nights to looking for something that kind of served those that grew up in the 90s, and I think with

[Summerland] we found a good tour for that day."

While both Under the Sun and Summerland feature well-known acts from the 90s, the former tended toward the bright and chipper end of rock while this year's crew favors a slightly darker and harder-rocking, angst-filled edge.

Consider a couple of singles the bands are known for, each still receiving heavy radio airplay 20 years or so later. Everclear's best-known song is "Santa Monica," a song that manages to be upbeat and dark at the same time. The Toadies are known for the song "Possum Kingdom," with lyrics told from the perspective of someone who is mentally unhinged and, of course, featuring the unsettling refrain, "Do you wanna die?"

Families wanting to attend the concert shouldn't

be concerned, however. As somewhat dark as the bands can be at times, none are really extreme or all that explicit in that respect. For example, in the case of "Santa Monica," even though it has some dark overtones, its tune is very hummable and its lyrics fairly innocuous.

"We have a conversation with all of our musicians, and before they go out they know it's an all ages crowd. These people are professionals, they

want to keep working, and they know they're not gonna work if they get up on the stage and drop f-bomb fbomb f-bomb," says Hammer. "Those things aren't going to happen. And no, I don't worry about that. We need to be acceptable to community standards."

The Summerland Tour was founded in 2012 by Everclear frontman Art Alexakis to both support the

band's then-new album, Invisible Stars, and create an outlet for the kind of angst-filled alternative rock that in many ways defined the sound of the 90s and continues to influence bands of today. Past tours have all been headlined by Everclear and have featured the likes of the Gin Blossoms, Live, Filter, Soul Asylum and Spacehog, among others. According to Alexakis, he's been trying to make the tour increasingly harderedged each year.

"This is the fourth year in a row we've done it. Each year I want to get a little harder rock," Alexakis recently said in an recent interview. "We've got the new record out, Black is the New Black. It's prob-

The Dancing Never Stops

Few musical genres have been as maligned as disco. Any casual game of word association will inevitably lead to the oft-repeated mantra "Disco Sucks" being tossed around as if discussing some long ago, faraway musical form which was ultimately blown up and filed away like a bad fashion choice. But in truth, disco hasn't gone anywhere. Sure, now market-

ing gurus are smart enough to avoid the term like the plague, but what is "dance" music or "club" music if it isn't really just disco mu-

And if you want any further evidence that disco is as popular as ever, consider that Harry Wayne Casey, better known as KC of Sunshine Band fame, is still in demand and touring regularly. Surely if people really wanted disco to die, he's have been the first casualty, so ubiquitous was his music at the height of disco's 1970s reign. He, along with the Bee Gees and Donna Summer, fairly defined the era, and now he is among the few remaining who can carry on into a fifth decade.

Formed in Florida in 1973, KC and the Sunshine Band wasted no time making themselves known. A couple minor hits preceded

their explosion on the charts in 1975, and the two albums released that year and the follow-up in 1976 can each be considered greatest hits packages in their own right. "That's the Way (I Like It)," "Get Down Tonight," "(Shake Shake Shake) Shake Your Booty," "I'm Your Boogie Man" and "Boogie Shoes" are just a handful of songs which received heavy ra-

dio airplay in those early years, and later songs like "Please Don't Go" kept them around for a few years after that immediate burst. Casey's duet with Terri De-Sario, "Yes, I'm Ready," even provided a hit for him away from the Sunshine Band.

But that latter hit in 1980 signaled the end of the road, with 1981's bitter split from musical partner and Sunshine Band bass player Richard Finch coinciding with the public backlash to disco, leading Casey to retire in 1985. But in both sports and in entertainment, retirement is a fluid concept, and when the 90s dawned and nostalgia for all things 70s began to creep in, Casey was ready to become KC again and began touring, bringing Sunshine to the world.

While deeply rooted in a sweep of nostalgia, KC and the Sunshine Band continue to move forward with new material, unlike some bands which are fairly content to rest on their laurels. Two new projects this year alone, a collection of 1960s covers called Feeling You! The '60s was followed quickly by Feeling You! which features all new songs. In a recent interview Casey demonstrated enthusiasm for the new material.

"Feeling You! The '60s is autobiographical, showing how I feel about love, life and the work through the music of that era. I love all the songs on this album," he said.

Of Feeling You!, which features original material, he said, "This album of original material is more dance-oriented than any record I've ever done. There [are] more pure dance/pop songs on the album. In the past, the dance songs I've done have been more in the dance/R&B vein. There's a good variety of songs on this album."

It's very likely that when KC and the Sunshine Band hit the Three Rivers Festival stage in a few days. the set will include songs from those two new releases. But, of course, most attending the show will be there to hear the hits. And you can be assured that they will deliver. Casey doesn't shy away from the disco or dance labels, but in countless interviews over the

"I know that for me, my new music is more lyrical than before, and those songs were deliberately written the way they were written - to be commercial singles. So, hopefully, everybody will accept what I'm doing right now. It's a mixture of new and old put together, and I think it's very new and very exciting."

Joey O

Wish Upon a Starr

Everyone handles grief in their own way. When Joey O lost his younger Start Me Up bandmate Scott Starr last November, he decided to honor him with the kind of album they would have listened to growing up together, an album that was diverse yet cohesive, culling the best from rock's last few decades. And for



some reason, Joey O decided to make it an instrumental album as well, writing engaging hooks to serve as a foundation for impromptu soloing. He also decided to mourn in solitude and thus played every instrument as well as handling engineering, mastering and mixing

And what fantastic decisions those were. Some of rock's greatest hits are instrumental numbers and the 11 tracks on Wish Upon A Starr fit quite comfortably among such classics as "Jessica", "Walk Don't Run" and "Pipeline." For instance, the opening track, "Starr Power," is a bluesy upbeat rocker that evokes memories of Stevie Ray Vaughan with scorching solo after solo. "S.M.U. Stomp" is a perfect summertime feel-good song that brings the 50s into today while "Turtle Bay" utilizes a ringing mandolin to underscore its breezy melody. At 3:48 the ballad "Wish Upon A Starr" is the longest track on the album (most scream by in under three minutes) but its gorgeously aching melody makes one wish it were longer, likewise for the chiming clean guitar tones of "Scotty" which form a warm and endearing memory in notes.

Not all the memories are mournful, though, as "See You Again" is a cheery, upbeat recollection of good times spent just hanging out, couched in a peppy melody that had me thinking of the perennial classic "Winter Wonderland." Another stellar cut is "One in a Billion," a heavier rock song that contrasts excellent guitar tones with passages of clean mandolin.

Wish Upon A Starr fits right in with the high quality one expects from Joey O, blending impressive technical chops with memorable pop-rock melodies. My condolences go out to Joey O on his loss, and I can't help but imagine that Scott would be pleased by this impressive tribute. (Jason Hoffman)

Jamie xx In Colour

In Colour is a great title for the debut record by producer Jamie xx. It's crisp, tight and brimming with hues, shapes and various shades of light. It doesn't feel like a producer showing his programming chops off. It's not a Mark Ronson-like spectacle where Jamie xx is bringing in all of the famous pals he knows to



sing hooks and earworms on his carefully constructed club bangers. In Colour feels like a personal record, one in which great attention to detail was put into each beat and aural stroke. It's at times joyously enlightened and achingly beautiful. It's pretty much everything you need to soundtrack your life.

I'll admit I'm not much of a fan of The xx, the band. I can appreciate the songs and the production, for sure, but there's something too fragile about those songs. Romy and Oliver Sim's back-and-forth vocals and simple guitar and bass lines to me feel like walking in on some heavy conversation. I get that some people like that kind of intimacy with their cup of melancholy, but not me. One thing I did really appreciate about those records from The xx was the production. Jamie xx seemed to be able to make these textural beats and foggy moods on those songs that appealed to my taste in electronic music.

Hearing In Colour is like a full album of those beautiful production flourishes put to even better use. "Gosh" starts out like it could be a Prodigy track before working itself into this triumphant finish. "Sleep Sound" sounds like Nicholas Jaar's Darkside project gone full electro. Romy guests on the great upbeat track "SeeSaw," a nice change from the more low key xx stuff. She also shows up on the more downbeat "Loud Places." And not to be left out, Sims sings on the very xx-like "Stranger In A Room." While definitely not an xx

The Germs GI (1979)

The Germs came out of Los Angeles in the late 70s when disco was dying, punk rock was still hanging, disco was dying and new wave was just beginning. Formed by John Beahm (aka Darby Crash) and Georg Ruthenberg (Pat Smear), the Germs only had one full-length



album and were better known for their live performances.

Seventeen tracks ranging from a half minute to over nine, GI is fabulous American punk rock from beginning to end. It bursts out of the gate with "What We Do is Secret" and launches right into "Communist Eyes." These tracks feature quick drumming and hardcore guitars that grind away behind the acerbic vocals

"Ritchie Dagger's Crime" comes at you at an easier beat as Lorna Doom (Teresa Ryan) keeps the rhythm with a funky bass. The album reverts to a snappy pace with a few more tracks that clock in at around a minute and a half, most notably the punkmetal track "Strange Notes."

The other side (of the cassette that I had) opens with "Media Blitz," a track with some cool sampling from local and regional California television. Also on the flip side is their anthem "Shut Down," a song that winds around scrappy guitars for almost 10

GI was produced by Joan Jett and wasn't as hard as the band wanted it to be. The Germs weren't considered the "West Coast Ramones" or a late-70s answer to The Sex Pistols. They had their own sound and were actually closer to The Stooges in their sound

Darby Crash committed suicide in December 1980 at the age of 22, and the Germs were no more, although they reformed in 2007. Smear went on to record with Nirvana and the Foo Fight-

record, In Colour does feel like what would happen if Jamie xx took more control of the band and its direction. Not a bad thing, really.

Elsewhere "Obvs" is a great steel drum-driven track, and "I Know There's Gonna Be (Good Times)" has a great hip-hop feel with guests Young Thug and Popcaan. "The Rest Is Noise" and "Girl" end the album with some dance floor vibes and seriously crunchy

Jamie xx has made a great debut album. It's the kind of electronic music you can sink your teeth into. It puts me in mind of production and albums by Nicholas Jaar, Baths and some of the Software label's roster. It's not a "look at me, I'm a hell of a producer" kind of record. *In Colour* is a record filled with songs that breathe and move – songs you can keep coming back to and find something new each time. 

BAALS Ahead, Mick in the Rear View

It's hard to believe, but August is going to be here before we know it my friend. That said, you're going to want to mark Saturday, August 1 on your calendar . That's the day for the BAALS Music Festival here in town. If you remember, Fort Wayne became the rear end of jokes revolving around the name of former mayor Harry Baals a little while back and even got some airtime on Jimmy Kimmel Live. Take that hoopla and combine it with an ever-growing multi-genre music event and you have BAALS Music Festival.

From what I've been told, this is now the largest annual electronic dance music festival in Indiana. A Better Fort and BAALS Music Festival will be teaming up that day to host this electronic music festival at the Headwaters Park Pavilion. Throughout the day there will performances by Crizzly, HeRobust, Kasum and 30-plus other local and regional acts.

In 2012 A Better Fort held the inaugural #House4aHouse downtown block party on South Calhoun that attracted more than 2,000 partiers. Last year, the festival set a new high with a two-part series on Calhoun Street and Headwaters Park that between them brought in more than 10,000 people. With those numbers, it's clear this has become the real deal.

All together the festival has donated over \$15,000 to the Mad Anthony's Children's Hope House and will continue to donate to a selected charity this year. As the event draws nearer, there are some other things being added to the event; one item, I'm told, is a zipline that will allow you to cruise over Headwaters Park. General admission tickets are \$15; VIP tickets are \$50 and include access to the VIP section near the stage, a private bar and opportunity for bottle service.



Last Saturday, after nearly 40 years on this earth, I finally had the opportunity to see The Rolling Stones when they performed in Indianapolis on July 4. I've had a couple of chances over the years to see them. but never quite pulled the trigger. The majority of the time, I felt the ticket prices were ungodly or that I'd be too far from the stage. I'm not sure what came over me this year, but a \$100 ticket and being sardine-packed with over 50,000 fans seemed very intriguing. I wasn't about to be left out of this once-in-a-lifetime event with the almighty Stones performing at the world's largest sporting venue.

The Stones didn't miss a beat that evening and 71year-old Jagger was on the loose. With several wardrobe changes and zipping from one end of the stage to the other, I saw hardly any sign of sweat from this ageless wonder. Performers half his age can't pull off those moves.

I ran into a good number of Fort Wayners that evening who also made the trip, some of them having taken the Wooden Nickel bus trip. I think they'll all agree it was money well spent. I'm definitely glad I made the trip to the show, and if by chance they ever stroll through the area again, I won't hesitate.

in Love," the pressure was on for them to deliver something more consistently commercial. Their 1983 album, *Sports*, did that and then some. Five hit singles later, they were the darlings of the music world – with fans that is.

Critics were somewhat less enamored, but it hardly mattered. They were on radio and, thanks to music videos, on television constantly. One of the biggest hits on the album was inspired by a show in the Midwest.

"We're from San Francisco, and we think it's the greatest place in the world," Lewis told Rolling Stone. "We had heard that Cleveland was this great rock n' roll town. I thought, 'Cleveland? How can Cleveland be anything? What can they have in Cleveland that we don't have in San Francisco?'

"Then we played a gig in Cleveland, I think at the Agora, around 1980. It was a great gig, and the crowd was amazing. We're driving the next day, and I'm looking at the gray skyline. I sort of absent-mindedly say, 'You know guys, the heart of rock n' roll really is in Cleveland.' Then I went, "Oh my gosh, that's a great idea for a song." The other guys said, 'The heart of rock n' roll is in Cleveland?' So then I rewrote it as 'The heart of rock n' roll is still beating.' But that was the original idea."

Now, more than three decades after Huey Lewis and the News firmly established themselves with audiences who buy tickets the minute they go on sale, it's clear that for a couple of years Lewis and his band had their fingers on the pulse of that heart. And still do.

ably the hardest-rocking record we've ever made. It definitely goes back to our older records. So I wanted to make the band roster on this Summerland a little harder."

It may be a decade or two past the bands' primes (with the possible exception of American Hi-Fi; more on that later), and Summerland may be officially considered a nostalgia tour, but these aren't bands that are resting on their laurels. They've all been releasing new music in recent years, with the most recent being Everclear's surprisingly effective Black is the New Black which came out earlier this year and featured the single "The Man Who Broke His Own Heart" which has found a home on contemporary rock radio. The Toadies released Play. Rock. Music in 2012, and Fuel released a new album, Puppet Strings, last year. American Hi Fi, which is the tour's misfit in terms of chronology if not in sound, has steadily been releasing new material of their heavy, pop-punk sound from their self-titled debut in 2001 on through to last year's Blood and Lemonade.

The tour takes its name from the song "Summerland," a highlight of Everclear's breakthrough 1995 album, *Sparkle and Fade*. That title of that album, 20 years old this year, even comes from a phrase in the sound, which is a wistful ode to escapism: "Let's just leave this place / And go to Summerland / Just a name on the map / Sounds like Heaven to me / We could find a town... / We could be everything we want to be / We could get lost in the fall / Glimmer sparkle and fade."

According to Alexakis, that last line, "Glimmer sparkle and fade," captured the essence of the album. "It was dealing with a lot of stories about people going through tough times and trying to find their way out of it, trying to find the light at the end of the tunnel," he said.

It's a fitting tune for the tour and the upcoming evening of music. No matter what kind of joys or sorrows you've been experiencing lately, you can find a temporary escape at a summer evening's concert at Three Rivers Festival.

and fluid. It's not three-note power chords and fuzz pedals (though there's plenty of fuzz happening). It's slippery, wavy and hard to pin down just what the hell they're doing. The melodies that emerge from these guitar excursions are also some of the catchiest you'll likely hear.

With their new album, *More Faithful*, this Canadian quartet has cemented its place among the greats of shoegaze, noise, and dream pop. It's dreamy, psychedelic, aggressive and technical enough to keep guitar dorks like me guessing and in awe.

"Remember Nothing" comes blaring out of the speakers like a post-punk fit of rage before the vocals come in and give the song a push into the ethereal. It sounds as if Lush is trapped in a guitar squall vacuum. Enough cannot be said for the rhythm section of Michael Farsky and Garland Hastings. Hastings' drum attack is quick, masterful and raw, while Farsky lays down some great low end, giving the track some solid footing and allowing the White-Gluz/Lloyd guitar team to get as noisy as they like.

"Everything New" comes rolling in like a sweet breeze. It's an absolutely beautiful song that would make Elizabeth Fraser weep. Seriously, this is the song that should be blaring out of every car during those summer road trips. "Hollywood Teeth" is a perfect example of how No Joy have cultivated their own sound. Everything feels familiar here, yet it's like nothing you've ever heard – it's driving and aggressive, yet light, thanks to the harmonies in the vocals. At about the 1:20 mark it sounds like the song melts mid-jam, like things start to slow down unnaturally, before the song kicks back in. This is something I want to hear live.

"Moon in my Mouth" is one of those techni-

cal beauties. White-Gluz and Lloyd intertwine their voices dreamily as the guitars banter back and forth. Almost jazz-inflected, this track is as tricky as it is amazing.

No Joy front-load this record like no other. Every single is gotten through in the first four songs. That might not be a good thing most of the time, but with a band like No Joy we're just getting started. "Burial in Twos" harkens back to some classic 4AD sounds, bringing Cocteau Twins' *Blue Bell Knoll* to mind before the guitars and intricate drum beat come in and things get noisy and hazy. "Corpo Daemon" is a punk-inflected rocker with a great pop chorus. Some amazing drumming by Hastings here. "Rude Films" is another musical twist, subtle and catchy as hell and another example of this band's versatility. "I Am an Eye Machine" rolls along like a cross between The Motels and Deerhunter before things blow up a little over halfway through. "Judith" closes the album on a big and harmonious note.

It's gotten to the point where No Joy have distinguished themselves from their peers. No one sounds like No Joy except for No Joy. White-Gluz, Lloyd. Hastings and Farsky have found the perfect balance between guitar squall, sweet harmonies and angular riffage. They have taken their influences and have meshed them perfectly with their own sound, marking comparing them with others a hard thing to do (though I tried a little). *More Faithful* is an excellent album – and No Joy's best yet. Good, Predictable Summer Movie Fun

There are so many superheroes these days. They zoom into theaters during the summer at an especially rapid rate, dulling enthusiasm for their exploits. *Jurassic World* isn't original, but a movie with humans as prey and big hungry, angry creatures as the hunters, is a welcome change of pace.

Jurassic World imagines that after the original Jurassic Park there are no pesky, problematic sequels. The park closed, revamped and re-opened on the original lovely island just a stone's throw away from Costa Rica. It is now as many years later as it really is, and attendance is plateauing. When this has happened over the years, the park introduces a new attraction and attendance spikes. Attendees and investors are happy.

If you were of a certain age when *Jurassic Park* hit the big screen, you may have kids to bring to this new iteration. Nostalgia and marketing are two things *Jurassic World* takes in stride, tongue firmly in cheek.

Jurassic World is full of more corporate speak than science. The corporate structure is ideal for spreading blame, since no one cares about what is going on beyond their own selves.

Except poor Bryce Dallas Howard, stuck in the thankless role of running the park. Claire is very corporate, so much so that she hasn't seen her nephews in years and spends her life pleasing her bosses. She wears a hideous white suit, stupid heels and a frightened but conscientious attitude. She is human underneath her corporate shell.

The nephews are coming for a weekend, and she has VIP passes for them and an as-



sistant to show them around. She's under a lot of pressure to get the new species ready for prime time and initially puts the park's needs above her nephew's visit.

Her colleagues and bosses include a growling military consultant (Vincent Donofrio) who wants to weaponize extinct reptiles. B.D. Wong plays the calm but mad scientist who wants money, power and credit for creating new species. Iffran Kahn plays the money man who owns the park, a guy so rich he thinks his every move is sane and sacred

Humans are presented as a nitwit species at the park. They want park-themed food and souvenirs and pictures of themselves with the critters. There are Triceratops rides instead of pony rides and a big creepy looking thing that eats sharks, a dinosaur Sea World kind of show. The people are such sheep (or lemmings, take your pick) that it isn't so sad to see some of them gobbled up when the inevitable chaos ensues.

The new big attraction in the works is Indominus rex, a creature bigger and badder than ever. It's part T. rex, but there is mystery DNA added to the mix. There are also a few security glitches in his free-roam enclosure. Also in training is the velociraptor team led by Owen Grady (*Guardians of the Galaxy* star Chris Pratt). He's a dinosaur

whisperer and has taught some Velociraptors a few tricks and a modicum of restraint.

Owen becomes the leader of Team Good Guys, when needed. He and Claire had one disastrous date, ensuring that they will wind up together when the going gets tough.

The blasé attitude of the public is embodied by Claire's older nephew, Zach (Nick Robinson). He is bored by much of what he sees. Gray (Ty Simkins) is 11, and he's thrilled by it all. Before leaving home, Mom (Judy Greer) told them, "If something chases you, run."

That's all the information you need to know all that's to come. Indominus rex escapes and terrorizes the island, eating everything in its way. The bigwigs try to escape; thankfully many of them are eaten. The boys find themselves in harm's way. Claire and Owen team up to minimize the damage, save the boys and many other people and realize they should stick together.

Part of my 4th of July weekend was spent watching two truly awful critter terror movies, *Jaws 4* and *Piranha*. They prove that even bad critter horror flicks have charm.

Jurassic World is better than those bad movie classics. It is plenty of fun with excellent effects, lots of big teeth chomping, and the blood and decimation are all pretty harmless, despite its PG-13 rating. But don't go see it expecting too much.

See *Jurassic World* if you want to eat popcorn and see big monster reptiles eat things. On those terms, *Jurassic World* is awesome!

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Jurassic World, Inside Out Dominate Box

Tops at the Box: Jurassic World, of course, continued to roll at the U.S. box office, bringing in another \$31 million over the holiday weekend and upping the film's U.S. total to \$558 million in sales. The movie has now made \$1.385 billion worldwide, leaving no doubt that there will be another Jurassic movie within the next three years. Get your fill of Hanson when they stop in Chicago October 7-8 and Cleveland October 13-14. The more Mmmhops you drink, the better they will sound.

The Wagon Wheel Center for the Arts' production of Bye Bye Birdie, directed by Tony Humrichouser, is a bubbly musical with lots of youthful energy.

Songwriter and agent Albert Peterson (Scott Fuss) and his secretary/girlfriend Rose Alvarez (Ellen Jenders) concoct a publicity stunt that will earn them enough money for Albert to sell his share of the family business, become an English teacher and marry Rose. The trouble is, he is under the thumb of Mae Peterson (Kristen Yasenchak), his overbearing (and racist) business partner/ mother.

The publicity stunt involves getting their client Conrad Birdie (Jordan André) to give one lucky, randomly chosen teenager "one last kiss" before he goes into the Army.

The girl is Kim Macafee (Audrey Kennedy) of Sweet Apple, Ohio. Kim's boyfriend Hugo Peabody (Tom Sweeney) gets jealous, and Kim goes through an adolescent crisis - she is no longer a girl, but not quite a woman. Conrad, in Pied Piper style, gathers the kids of the town to party at the Ice House. Meanwhile Kim's parents (Andy Robinson and Kira Lace Hawkins) **JEN POIRY-PROUGH**

are left to wonder "what's the matter with kids

Robinson and Hawkins are perfect as Kim's fusty parents. Hawkins has some particularly funny moments during Conrad's sexy first number "Sincere," when André swivels his gold lamé clad hips to Presleyan perfection. Ian Peloza is strong as Kim's little brother Ran-

Jenders has a rich, beautiful singing voice. Fuss is grounded and understated as Albert and he flails his long limbs to wonderful comic effect in the show's most famous song, "Put on a Happy Face.'

The costumes, designed by Stephen R. Hollenbeck, are colorful and beautiful with lots of crinolines and horn-rimmed glasses. Lesa Denklau's choreography is fun and true to the 1950s style. Michael Higgins' set design is simple with few distractions or sight line problems.

Bye Bye Birdie is a highly entertaining, frothy treat perfect for the summer.


