From the moment you enter the autopsy waiting room, the change Deimos has presided over

becomes mortally apparent. For starters, who willingly enters an autopsy waiting room? No one in their right mind. Then again, right minds tend to go wrong the moment the Haunted Jail comes into view.

The sheepification of the standard human brain comes about in part due to the relentless nature of Deimos' minions, some of whom will harangue the line standers while others will stalk those already inside.

"We have 10 to 15 stalkers at any one time," my personal invisible stalker told me. "They know all about your Freud, your Jung, your Dr. Phil. Pikers! They know what you're thinking long before you do. They've seen your dreams and they will turn them into nightmares. They pick the weaklings


out of the crowd."

COLUMBIA CITY HAUNTED JAIL

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

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Not Just for Kids Anymore

------Feature • Lord of the Flies

With its upcoming production of William Golding's classic 1954 novel Lord of the Flies, Fort Wayne Youtheatre is going dark. After decades of producing musicals, plays based on fairy tales and other whimsical fare, the venerable theater is saying goodbye to all that. At least for now.

The plunge into to the deep end of human nature is a big step for the 81-year-old

organization, and a big challenge as well. With a cast of mainly 12- to 14year-olds and relatively severe time and budget constraints, Fort Wayne Youtheatre is kicking down the walls that constrain conventional youth theater groups and taking on big issues in the form of a full-length, three-act, action-filled drama.

Lord of the Flies, is the story of a group of English school boys stranded on an uninhabited island. Freed from the world of adults, the boys at first see the island as a paradise. But utopia

quickly dissolves into dystopia as the boys break into two factions, one thoughtful and diplomatic, led by Ralph, the other savage and warlike, led by Jack. The best and worst of human nature, the two groups roam the island in search of food while paranoia and the quest for power shatter their Eden.

Leslie Hormann, Youtheatre executive and artistic director, said the idea to tackle the play arose from a production of Oliver! with IPFW. John O'Connell, Dean of IP-FW's College of Visual & Performing Arts, after directing Youtheatre actors in the classic musical, suggested taking a stab at Lord of the Flies. Hormann agreed.

'We decided to put our big boy boots on and do something that is really pertinent to youth," Hormann said. "We love our fairy tales. We love our light youthful stuff, but we kind of have a responsibility to address things that maybe are a little more serious. Bullying is such a huge thing, and at the start of the school year we've got a lot of school groups coming. The story is required reading for almost all middle and high school students. We're partnering with the Center for Non-Violence in addressing this very serious issue that all school kids have to deal with."

Bullying is certainly a fact of life, both in and out of school. But for O'Connell, the most pressing issue is the play itself.

"I don't know what I was thinking," O'Connell said. "The biggest challenge is the fact that it's a real three-act play with 12and 14-year-olds, mainly 12-year-olds. Most of these boys are used to plays that are about 50 minutes. This a is full three-act, two-hour play. Just the amount of memorization and the challenge of the type of play makes it

difficult. It's a drama. It's not a musical; it's not a kids play. On all levels, it's nothing ever undertaken before by these young actors."

That may be, but the young actors in Fort Wayne certainly did not shy away from the challenge.

"We had 45 show up for 11 parts," O'Connell said. "That completely threw me for a loop.'

Two of those young actors, Ben We-

the Youtheatre and I was Oliver in the joint production with IPFW," said the Canterbury seventh grader. "This is longer and also a much heavier plot. There's nothing you can mess around with."

Warshauer is right about that. There is no time to mess around. O'Connell said with college students rehearsals for a three-act drama generally run to three hours six nights a week for five weeks. With the Youtheatre actors, rehearsal time drops to two-and-a-

half hours five nights a week over five weeks. The level of focus, the sheer volume of memorization and-the absorption of new acting techniques is pushing both actor and director to their limits.

"I don't have to teach acting when I'm being paid to work with equity actors," said O'Connell. who spent years directing plays professionally. "In college I have to teach acting and direct a good show. With kids I'm trying to direct a good show, I'm trying to teach acting and I'm trying to keep them focused and energized to

work faster than they've ever worked before because they have a huge weight on their shoulders. They don't realize that yet."

The boys in the play not only have to spark their imaginations to pretend they're on a lush tropical island with mountains and wild animals and huge signal fires instead of on a stage with little more than raised platforms and a few props, they have pages of dialogue to recite in convincing British accents. Cheerio!


"At night I'll go over the script with my mom and we use these British accents," Westropp said. "Sometimes in my daily life at school I'll start speaking in one. Funny stuff. My family is so annoyed because my mom and I are always talking like that. It gets on their nerves a lot."

Warshauer's had a little more experience with the English way of speaking. He recently got to hear it first-hand on a family trip to the United Kingdom.

"They have different dialects," Warshauer said. "In a short two-hour train ride from London to Manchester you hear a lot of changes in the dialect."

Hormann said the shift away from the usual slate of plays will continue in February with Ruby Bridges, the story of the first student to attend a desegregated Southern elementary school. But for now, all eyes are on the 11 actors in Lord of the Flies.

"We're really happy with the level of commitment," Hormann said. "It's great to do Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs, but for a 12-year-old to do something this serious is exciting. It's really a gift to be able to push their limits and their interest in the



stropp, 14, and Miles Warshauer, 13, worked with O'Connell previously, in *Oliver!*, three years ago. And both are meeting the demands of the play head-on. In fact, they seem to be having fun with it.

"I'm Jack in Lord of the Flies, the antagonist, the troublemaker," Westropp said. "A group of British boys get stuck on an island. We try to be civilized, then I'm the bad guy. I disrupt the order and I take away my group of hunters and we kill and slaughter people. It's quite good fun, really. So yeah I enjoy being able to go to play practice and be the

The fun, in Westropp's view, is what gives the play a PG-13 rating, a rating the Canterbury High School freshman acknowl-

"It's probably something little children should not see," he said. "There is some profanity and blood and gore. I like it. I think it's awesome."

It's also a far cry from his previous roles in Oliver!, Our Town and The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe.

For Warshauer, who plays Ralph, the drama is a marked departure from his previous roles as well.

"I was Edmund last year in Narnia in

The Voice Behind Them

Two Okies from Muskogee with beautifully harmonized, country and Western voices, the Swon Brothers first endeared themselves to Americans as finalists on season four of The Voice and have continued winning over audiences through live performances and their eponymous debut album in October of 2014. Their seemingly quick ascendancy to the ranks of successful country musicians via The Voice is a tad misleading, however, since Zach and Colton have been performing on stage almost from the time they could

Born into a family of musicians, the young Swon Brothers began performing with their family's Southern gospel act Exodus at a very early age. Playing churches almost every weekend, living a musicians

life and mixing with elder musicians, the pair got an early musical education that prepared them well for their ultimate

career.
"I feel really blessed to be a musician because I've never taken a lesson on any instrument," Zach, who was playing drums for the family band by the age of 9, says. "Drums, I just picked up naturally, and I got a chance to watch a lot of good players throughout

the years with my parents, and they all showed me

In addition to their early church shows, the brothers also took part in a weekly familystyle variety show their parents began in 1995 called the West-

wood Music Show in Wagoner, Oklahoma. That experience proved to be another early musical education for the young duo, as they performed everything from Elvis and Michael Jackson to Frank Sinatra in the


The Swon Brothers also formed another important future musical connection early on with superstar Carrie Underwood who grew up down the street from them. The brothers may be more closely associated with another fellow Okie, Blake Shelton, since he was their coach on The Voice, but their relationship with Underwood goes back even further, having shared the stage many times as they were growing up. That relationship came full circle when she provided a guest vocal on "This Side of Heaven," one of the highlights from their debut.

While their love and their apparent style is indelibly country, one of their biggest influences is a notentirely-country act: the Eagles.

"Musically, we are drawn to harmony stuff; nobody does that better than the Eagles," Zach told USA Today in early 2014. "I love everything from the guitar riffs that they put on their albums to the songs and just how good the lyrics are. You mix that with blended harmonies; that's where we want to be."

The Eagles also proved to be an important touchstone for the group in another way. "Songs That Said It All," one of their stated favorite tracks on their debut album (Colton has said was their "major cut on the record"), wouldn't have happened if it weren't for that classic California band. The song was co-written with Lady Antebellum's Charles Kelley and Dave Haywood. And how did the Swons make the Lady Antebellum connection? By a chance meeting at the merch table of an Eagles concert.

After the concert, Zach and Colton convened with the Antebellum camp at Haywood's Nashville home, Colton told radio.com. "They just treated us like we were anyone else. That was such a cool feeling to sit down and hear Charles across the room and Dave sing

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tapes. It's so cool to listen back to Charles humming through lines that would work. What a great moment for noobs in Nashville."

Beyond their musical credentials, the Swons' personalities are what have endeared them to mainstream America. Like a lot of brothers, they bicker and crack a lot of jokes, and they have no qualms about letting those parts of their personalities out in the open. It's been a hallmark of their media personas since The Voice, and a lot of it revolves around the pair knocking on each other.

"Colton did much of the singing back then, but then my voice developed into the talent of the group," Zach joked about their early years in the radio.com interview. "It's hard being the face and the talent."

Their easy chemistry is both down to earth and relatable. Their good humor has also helped them fit into a music industry that can often otherwise be inhospitable. Case in point: early on in the Swons' post-Voice success, they got to tour with Brad Paisley who happens to be one of their heros. In fact, Zach has even said that he patterned his guitar playing as he was learning after Paisley.


As it turns out, superstar Paisley is not only a notable for his guitar work, but also for practical jok-



Prepare to Be Amazed

Even in our increasingly cynical world, there's nothing people like more than to be amazed. Perhaps especially now, when so many things seem so easily magnified and sensationalized with the tap of a screen, it remains thrilling when a magician can show

something so inexplicable that we are left in awe of our own wonderment

For those who enjoy such celebrations of magic, the Embassy Theatre is the place to be on October 11 when The Illusionists take the stage for not one but two high-voltage performances. With seven different magicians taking the stage, there will undoubtedly be something for everyone, and the show promises to be a fast-paced and electric evening for all. Among those taking the stage that night will be Jeff Hobson, "The Trickster," who originally began doing magic when he was seven, thanks to a performance in his Detroit elementary

"A magician came to the school and did this show that made it look so easy. From that day on I didn't worry about school because I knew what I was going to do. I performed in my first show at 11 and was paid for the first time at 12 and never looked back."

For years he didn't even know who this magic man had been who had set the course of his life, but just this year, in a conversation with someone about that day, he finally learned his name.

"It was a Detroit police officer who taught safety through the use of magic, and this person who figured out the year and when that would have been, told me it was Wally Wilson. The funny thing is I had known him for years, though he's passed away now. But I never put two and two together and realized that I'd known him all along."

Hobson was greatly influenced, as are his six fellow magicians in The Illusionists, by the many great magicians over the years, including television specials by Doug Henning in the 1970s and David Copperfield in the 1980s. He says thanks to cable channels and video sources on the internet, there's more magic to be seen now than ever before. But nothing beats seeing it in person.

"All seven of us look very different and have very different acts. It's not just one guy up there for two hours. Seven of us are coming in and doing our acts, so it's very fast-paced. In fact, I think this version of the show may be the most fast-paced we've ever done. The advertising makes it look very edgy, but believe me, it's very much a family show. People of all ages can come and enjoy

it.

Hobson's own act was honed over the years, first in Detroit where he was close to Colon, Michigan, Magic Capital of the World and host to an annual magic festival and convention. Hobson began competing there at 12 and eventually brought home two first-place finishes. In 1989 he moved to Las

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Vegas where he worked on the Strip for 23 years before getting his gig with The Illusionists. He says the travel is a big change, but it has provided him and his colleagues with a unique opportunity.

"Our first gig was at the Sydney Opera House where we performed for two weeks of sold out shows. We performed in front of 40,000 people during that time, so that was quite a way to get started. We've been doing the show for almost four years now, and we've played on Broadway and crossed the country multiple times. It's a big change from when I was working in Vegas and heading out at 6 p.m. every night and coming home at midnight. Now I'm catching a plane at 6 and heading someone new each

night to perform. It's been quite a different thing, but I have some sweet frequent flier miles to show for it."

Although all seven of the performers with The Illusionists are pros and are deeply dedicated to their acts, Hobson says when they aren't performing, there's no rivalry brewing, but more friendship among col-

leagues.

"Here's what's nice – you have seven of us who are all pretty much at the top of their game, so you're not afraid of anyone copying you. We're all past all of that, and if we get together to talk, it isn't necessarily about magic. We ask each other about golf or just have normal conversations. When we do talk about magic, we're all being really supportive of each other. It's really a family affair."

The show is already booked into 2019, so clearly Hobson and his cohorts have no plans to abandon ship anytime soon. The Illusionists is the most popular touring magic show in history, which he says is largely because they welcome even the non-believers.

"We've really embraced people who didn't like magic, but when they see the show, they say it's the best they've ever seen. They go crazy. It's not at all what they think they're going to see. I always say this is the show for people who didn't think they liked magic. They're watching a magician right before their eyes. It strips away all of the things we've learned about what is possible and what isn't possible.

"I also think that even though kids really enjoy the show, it's the adults who enjoy it most because it makes them feel like a kid again. It just affects them more because maybe they are used to CGI and such so the fact that they can feel this sense of wonder makes them feel good. We have 15 people come up from the audience, so they see people looking and examining things [and] they can verify that it's the real deal. Plus there are big screen

hi-def views on the screen, which makes it seem like it's happening a few inches away even from the back of the house."

With the show set to run for several years more, Hobson and The Illusionists are looking forward to revisiting Broadway and continuing their intercontinental travels. Perhaps eventually, Hobson will even get back home to Las Vegas.

"I've seen the world and this country in the last four years, more so than others could do in several lifetimes. I mean, the grass is always greener and sometimes it's hard to be away from home, but I imagine one day I'll be back in Vegas doing my show. Or maybe The Illusionists will end up performing on the Strip. That would be good."

ing. According to an interview on *Taste of Country*, one night Paisley sent out bearded ballerinas when the Swon Brothers were scheduled to start and wouldn't let the pair play.

"None of our gear would come on; it was just them dancing to 'Later On,'" said Colton.


Zach added, "He actually got on the mic and said, 'The Swon Brothers have taken a new direction.' They came out dancing and the whole crowd had no idea what was going on."

But the brothers took it all in stride. Jokes aside, it's their music that's the important thing. No amount of comedic antics could keep them in the public eye if they didn't have the musical chops to back them up. If their polished harmonies and sweet-sounding debut are any indication, these brothers have some staying power. They've already begun working on their second major label album. On the debut all the songs except "Songs That Said It All" were written by others. This time around they are taking on much more of the songwriting duties.

"We've actually had time to craft this record and be a little more creative, and we've just kind of listened to our fans and see what they respond to," says Zachary.

"We're really excited about it. We have a lot of fun playing the songs live already, so I think it's just a next chapter, and I have no doubt that the next one after that will be different than this one. But it's a steady process, and the biggest thing is we've written a lot more for it, so you're getting a lot more straight from the heart from us."

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Black Violin

Stereotypes

Wil B and Kev appear to be two men who enjoy playing with peoples' perceptions. In their early 30s, Kev still looks like he might be a linebacker, dwarfing the violin he so skillfully plays. Both men got started on violin in their early teens and met each other in high school, finding a common bond in their



love of reggae, hip-hop and classical music. Their "ah-ha" moment occurred when they taught their high school orchestra how to play "Gimme Some More" by Busta Rhymes and realized that combining classical instruments with popular music was a great way to get some female attention. Naming themselves Black Violin, it wasn't long before the two were writing original material and crafting their own sound, ultimately leading to an album and gigs for NFL Superbowl celebrations and the White House.

Stereotypes, their second album, is produced in part by Eli Wolf who has worked with Norah Jones, The Roots and Elvis Costello. The 12 tracks comprise three distinct types of songs. The first type is traditional R&B pop song about love, albeit with a heavy emphasis on strings. "Stay Clear" is upbeat and soulful, featuring Kandace Springs on vocals and Robert Glasper on Rhodes, and is sure to get your body moving. The slow simmering "Losing Control" could easily be heard on a number of local stations and includes a deliciously squishy bass synth tone and honest lyrics like "I've been lonely before / But never this lonely before." Featuring thick drums and pizzicato strings, "Send Me A Sign" is another outstanding song of romantic longing.

The second type is musically similar but features more socially conscious lyrics. Pulsing violins form the hip-hop rhythmic bed of "Invisible," a track featuring Pharoahe Monch who delivers encouraging rapid spoken-word rhymes about how you don't have to be ignored and "invisible" before a sizzling violin solo slams the message home. The relaxed "Another Chance" is another inspirational gem with a chorus of "I can't change the past / but I control the future" and the kind of strong melody that sticks in your head for days.

The third type is the more classically influenced instrumental. Bridging the gap between the last two types is the title track, "Stereotypes," a dramatic showcase of the immense talents of these two men as they trade chops back and forth over a jazzed up hip-hop beat, pausing occasionally for audio clips of people discussing stereotypes and their experience with such. A smoky organ and hints of the 70s pervade "Walk on By" while "Day 2" is soaked in a crusty, low-toned synth that opens to a shimmering, dancing piano figure that allows Kev and Wil B to explore a heart-tugging melody to its fullest.

"Shaker" is the most classical of the bunch, sounding like a Mozart string quartet set to a rock beat as the duo duke it out while they explore a number of themes The album closes with the cinematic "Runnin'," a slow build that crescendos in a fiery exposition of melody and technical prowess that simultaneously showcases their ability to compose heart-pounding music.

Stereotypes has just enough "classical" to lift the brow slightly, but not so much that it alienates those who can't tell Bartok from Bach. (Jason Hoffman)

Miley Cyrus Miley Cyrus and Her Dead Petz

If the essential goal of *Bangerz* was to retire the Hanna Montana alter ego and transform Miley Cyrus into a bona fide, controversial pop star, it was a naive attempt at doing so. With facetious trap beats and videos of Miley licking phallic construction equipment, *Bangerz* strained hard to prove that she could



embrace her inner "bad girl" and still adhere to corporately mandated pop. The tour's financial success gave way to artistic liberation, which is how her surprise release of *Miley Cyrus and Her Dead Petz*, made without the financial backing or supervision of RCA, makes good on blowing *Bangerz* up and away into something maximal, unflinchingly honest and uncompromisingly bizarre.

Those three traits don't always work to make Cyrus more mature as an artist or more appealing as a person. Despite *Dead Petz*

Baby Grandmothers (1968)

What can I say? I really like Swedish psychedelic bands from the late 60s, and this is one album that psych-prog-rockers can appreciate as well. Having only existed for about a year, these guys put out an album that may have been better received



had they been from the United States or gotten more press from Western rock journalists. But its sonic-heavy sound is one that immediately attracted me when I first heard them during a hazy summer evening back in the mid 80s.

Sort of a compilation record, it has a few live tracks, a few jams and a few simple rock n roll numbers.

It opens with a nine-minute mind-bender in "Somebody Keeps Calling My Name." Starting off with a gentle guitar, it picks up the pace with a nice percussion and bass. It reminds me of a blend of Pink Floyd and Sonic Youth. If you like either one of these bands, you might enjoy this record – a lot.

"Being is More Than Life" follows and has a darker, yet rich tone not unlike early Black Sabbath or Deep Purple. The guitars are just short of Hendrix, and I rarely say that.

"Bergakungen" drones on as one of the grooviest psychedelic jams from a year where there were plenty. I just don't get how this band never made it big during the era. The music has a real organic feel to it and sounds good on this release, even if the audio is somewhat distorted and flat.

"St. Georges Dragon (I)" struts around in all of it splendor, and will bring out the jam band in everyone.

I'm telling you, this is a great nugget from a golden era. At least check them out on YouTube and see what kind of trip they can take you on. (*Dennis Donahue*)

not being any more lyrically insightful or enlightening than *Bangerz*, this new album takes an experimental approach to pop, thanks to the Flaming Lips acting as creative surrogates, with regular collaborators like Mike Will Made It and Oren Yoel in tow.

The marriage of contemporary pop and eccentric psychedelia in *Dead Petz* is sympathetic to Miley's personal growth and direction, and tracks like "BB Talk" and "Milky Milky Milk" demonstrate this working relationship between the Lips and Cyrus best. However, the biggest surprise by far (for a mainstream pop artist) is that *Dead Petz* contains 23 tracks totaling 92 tumultuous minutes. As if by design, Cyrus' intentions are to further weed out casual fans who view her as merely a trend, while simultaneously testing the her audience's patience for her wide-eyed world view.

The lead single, "Dooo It!" is a balancing act between a marijuana-loving Miley in wonder and awe of the universe, and a profane Miley naively wondering why everyone doesn't just embrace peace. Its placement as the opener is just the first example among many where Cyrus candidly vents about her spirituality and sexuality in ways that an audience might sympathize with were it not undercut by unnecessary profanity and cheap word choices. *Dead Petz* is an ironic title for the album's most touching moments, "The Floyd Song (Sunrise)" and "Pablo the Blowfish", where Cyrus mourns the loss of her beloved dog and blowfish, respectively, and connects the tragedies to her own forlorn love life.

Given the album's length, Cyrus may think she has a lot to say, but she winds up repeating herself to a such degree that the album eventually becomes more about the musical avenues her collaborators provide. In the album's scant moments where Cyrus allows a guest to have a verse, Big Sean appears on "Tangerine" to offer his current stance on life, death and relationships, somehow managing to summarize everything Miley tries to convey across a 92-minute album.

At 22 years of age, it's apparent that Cyrus has yet to embrace the world for what it is (and her own faults, for that matter), but *Dead Petz* is the more definitive, confident point-of-no-return for the once family-friendly star of the Disney Channel. (*Colin McCallister*)



An Identity Crisis in Casablanca

Diver's Clothes

Lie Empty

The Diver's Clothes Lie Empty by Vendela Vida, Ecco, 2015

When we first step into Vendela Vida's The Diver's Clothes Lie Empty, we're tricked into empathizing with the novel's protagonist. She's stumbled into a predicament we can imagine being in ourselves, and Vida's meticulous description of the problem is vivid enough to evoke a queasy sense of being there. But as the character swiftly begins to make choices that none of us would make ourselves, we're likely to find ourselves confused. Would we be just as irrational and misguided as she is, or is she as dangerously out of control as she seems to be? The tension between the familiar and the outrageous keeps the novel humming, despite a thinness of plot, until the end.

The novel's protagonist is an unnamed young woman (it is important that we don't know her name) who has arrived in Morocco on a flight from the United States. She seems like a tourist, and she's disappointed that her guidebook is making her planned stay in Casablanca sound like a bad idea, but there's a hint that she's really come to North Africa to flee something in her past.

When she gets to her hotel, a drab little place that suffers in comparison to the flashy chain hotels just down the street, she stands in line to check in, and while she's distracted by the desk clerk, someone swipes her backpack which contains her computer, her passport, her credit cards and every other

means she has of identifying herself. In a panic, she reports the theft to hotel security and eventually the police, and after a foreign-land run-around, she's presented with a backpack, credit cards and a passport and encouraged to be on her way.

The problem is, the stuff isn't hers; the passport and credit cards belong to someone named Sabine, and her name isn't Sabine. This is where the odd decisions begin. Convinced that she's become wrapped up in a conspiracy, she decides to assume Sabine's identity. She lies to workers at the U.S. embassy about her identity and uses Sabine's credit card to check into a fancier hotel.



A movie starring a famous American actress is being shot outside the new hotel, and the fake Sabine stumbles onto the movie set. In one of the novel's many incredible coincidences, the producers of the movie are in desperate need of a stand-in for the actress, and fake Sabine happens to bear an amazing resemblance to the actress. She gets the job.

The rest of the novel is an ambling farce about the problem of identity and the ways in which it can be manipulated or damaged. We learn about the central character's past - she has a prettier twin sister who has dominated the protagonist throughout her life - and we get echoes of that past as the narcissistic movie star engages in the same kind of manipulation. The protagonist, who is used to the idea of being lost in the shadow of more striking women (although she looks enough like one of the most striking actresses in the world to be mistaken for her), learns how to orchestrate her own manipulation, using her VENDELA VIDA invisibility to transform old identities and create new ones. The plot developments are fairly obvious, as are the symbolic connections, and for all the

crazy twists, surprises are hard to come by. Vida's facility with detail, though, is enough to hold the novel together. She has a habit of writing about women searching for identity in exotic locales - in Let the Northern Lights Erase Your Name, the setting was Finland; in The Lovers, it was Turkey - and the books function as travelogues as much as they do as personal dramas. Casablanca in The Diver's Clothes is noisy, crowded, dirty and claustrophobic, perhaps something of a cliché, but it conjures a feeling of disorientation, an uneasiness that makes the protagonist's actions often seem much less hard to explain than they



Thin, But Fitting for the Times

When times are tough (and even often when they are not), we rush to see stories that have little to do with our own predicaments. Supposedly, the Great Recession is over (only really true if you live in a land where money grows on trees called tax breaks).

Nancy Meyer has been writing movies since *Private Benjamin* and writing and directing them since *The Parent Trap*. Her films are a balancing act between comedy and the changing times, usually with more than a dollop of romance and seen through the eyes of women. She is often trying to "have it all," as the saying goes.

The Intern is told mostly through the eyes of a man. Robert DeNiro, at his most gentle and appealing, plays Ben Whittaker, a retired widower who is failing retirement. He's done all the traveling, taking classes, golfing, fishing and visiting kids and grandkids he can. He's bored and needs something, "a place to go" as he puts it.

As a sort of outreach joke, a Brooklyn internet start-up, a fashion site called About the Fit, is advertising positions for senior interns – not high school or college seniors, but senior citizens. Ben puts together a charming video vitae and is hired.

He is assigned to be the intern to the founder of the company, Jules Ostin, an understated and likeable Anne Hathaway. She is vaguely creeped out by Ben and claims she doesn't need help. While he waits for his chance with her, he befriends and advises the hapless young men of the company and offers handkerchiefs to the tearful.

Jules notices how much he is liked and helps others, which makes her even more wary, but he makes progress with her. He's a great listener. He's there when she needs him. In a single day he cleans up that table that exists in all businesses and homes where all the stuff you don't know what to do with piles up.

Jules has a lot on her plate, as they say. The busi-

ness she founded is growing so fast her board of directors wants her to take on a seasoned CEO to manage the business side of things. She's not wild about the idea. At home, she has a sickeningly adorable daughter and a stay at home husband.

DeNiro and Hathaway have an easygoing chemistry. She discovers she enjoys having a sounding board. He is impressed by her, likes her and manages to be protective without being patronizing. Turns out Ben spent 40 years working for a company that made telephone books (one of many references to how old Ben is and how much times have changed) in the very same building that has been converted and houses About the Fit.

It is a little odd to watch a film where the two main characters are really and truly just friends. Not that there isn't some romance. Ben is sighted early on by the company masseuse, the always wonderful and welcome Rene Russo. And Jules loves her husband.

And that's where the real trouble surfaces: between husband and wife. Think of the most obvious problem that could happen between a rising entrepreneur and the spouse who stays at home to take care of the family. Yep, the trouble is hardly a spoiler.

Things come around right too easily, even for the movies. The ending isn't all that satisfying; it's like the end of a chapter, not much of a resolution for a movie. But *The Intern* has laughs and a soothing civility and charming, imperfect humans. This isn't my favorite Nancy Meyer movie, but I'll happily tune in when it shows up, as it will repeatedly, on cable.

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Adam Sandler Has Himself a Hit

Tops at the Box: The Genndy Tartakovsky-directed, Adam Sandler-written *Hotel Transylvania 2* opened strong over its first three days of release, selling a solid \$47.5 million in the U.S. and \$76.7 million worldwide. Remember when Sandler was the dumb, cute guy on *Saturday Night Live?* Who'd have thunk that he would become such a versatile, consistent money-maker in the film world. I'm not suggesting that I like his work, but I do root for the guy in a weird way. Maybe it's his unwillingness to act like a movie star, but I think he seems like a decent enough guy that is, when it comes to rich and famous Hollywood talents. And, ya know, he was in that P.T. Anderson film, which makes him forever okay in my book.

Also at the Box: This silly new flick from Nancy Myers, The Intern, opened strong, selling a solid \$18 million in the U.S. and \$12 million abroad over its first three days of release. The movie is a modern-themed comedy starring Anne Hathaway and Robert De Niro. Looks like the kind of movie you watch when you visit relatives for Christmas and can't sleep. Or something. Looks mediocre, but probably entertaining. Taking the No. 3 spot at last weekend's U.S. box office was Maze Runner: The Scorch Trials which sold another \$14 million last weekend, upping the film's 10-day total to a disappointing \$51 million in the U.S. The movie has thus far made over \$173 million worldwide. Consider the rental and Blu-Ray dollars, and I guess this Maze Runner franchise is doing well enough that we now have to expect more films. No. 4 was Everest which

finally saw a proper release and thus sold about \$13 million last weekend, bringing the film's two-week total to \$23 million in the U.S. and \$96 million world-wide. Looks very much like a worthwhile film to me. Amazing cast. Rounding out last weekend's Top 5 was the new Johnny Depp-fronted gangster flick, *Black Mass*, which sold another \$11 million last weekend bringing the film's 10-day total to a measly \$42 million in the U.S. Ouch, Johnny. Ouch. Something tells me this is a movie that will have a good home viewing legacy. Looks pretty great to me.

Also of Note: Denis Villeneuve's *Sicario*, despite having a big budget, plenty of stars, a good trailer and good reviews, is flopping thus far, selling just \$2.3 million in tickets over its first 10 days of release. Ouch. C'mon, American audiences.

New This Week: Finally, at long last, we have Ridley Scott's *The Martian* coming out this week. The film is based on the hit novel by Andy Weir and stars Matt Damon in a performance that many are suggesting might earn him his first Oscar nomination since his Best Actor nomination for 2010's mediocre *Invictus*. *The Martian* looks really solid.

am learning how to be unstoppable. She is truly a force of nature, unwaveringly confident and comfortable in a way I someday hope to be. She is, like Dolly and Amanda, a woman pushed forward by the overwhelming strength of her convictions.

Anything Goes is a marvel in that every woman has a definitive sense of agency. 

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
