# Taking the Next Step

When Liz Monnier retired as artistic director at Fort Wayne Dance Collective, it was the end of an era. Although Monnier continues to work from an office at the Collective, she handed the reins of her baby, the organization she helped found more than three decades ago, to John Byrne, a talented and accomplished dancer and choreographer who has established himself in all corners of the county. But while he's still deciding how he wants to make his own mark on the

Collective, wholehearthe is edly embracing the mission Monnier set forth from the begin-

Byrne comes to Fort Wayne via North Carolina, where he was born, and New York, where he grew up. His commitment to dance seems to have come at the same time he came into the world.

"I started in dance from the moment I can first remember," says Byrne. "I was always moving, and as a child I would watch MGM movies and see Gene Kelly and Fred Astaire. I think I just knew then that would be my destiny."

There was never any question in Byrne's mind

that dance was his future, his only career goal.
"It was my only skill," he says, laughing. "Growing up, I was very theatrical, and I think as an artist you want to be multifaceted. Usually someone who's an artist is drawn to more than one thing. I like to think of myself as a Renaissance Man.

His studies took him to the North Carolina School of Arts, the School of American Ballet and Julliard, where he says he focused on modern dance and the great choreographers, including Jose Limon, Twyla Tharp and Paul Taylor. Byrne's first professional job was with the Paul Taylor Dance Company, and he recently got a call to rejoin the company for a visit.

"I had danced with Paul Taylor Dance Company for four years; then last year they called me and asked me to join them on tour. So, 10 years later, I stepped back in. I thought it would be harder than it was. It was easier than I expected because I think I had the maturity and confidence to be more present in what I was doing. Obviously the physicality becomes more difficult. There are days when I can't get out of bed because I'm sore, but that comes from dance being such an athletic activity."

Byrne's talent has put him in some very high profile company beyond the dance world. He was hired to choreograph Elton John's Las Vegas show, and his collaborations with photographer David LaChapelle had included work with No Doubt, Norah Jones, Joss Stone, Mary J. Blige and Britney Spears. He has also directed a video by Florence + the Machine and worked on a variety of television shows and commer-

"Although I do have a classical background, I enjoyed doing commercials for Sony, Target, H&M, Clinique. I like playing between the fine art world and advertising and commercials. It's been fun to work as a dancer, choreographer and director in all these different projects.

"When I was approached in 2013 to direct the Florence and the Machine video, I had already heard the song 'Spectrum' and really liked it, so I was thrilled to direct, or actually co-direct with David LaChapelle, the video for that song. I found a great local dance school

in Orange County and used the dancers there for the video, and they were able to provide the costuming. It was a great art project."

Bryne now brings this varied experiences to his work as artistic director at Fort Wayne Dance Collective, and he is happy with the approach the Collective brings to the arts and the openness that is encouraged for those who may not have thought dance was in the cards for them.

"What was mainstream is now mainstream, and people's minds are opening up to accept the unconventional." he said. "YouTube is

the new source of entertainment. Not that TV is obsolete, but it's not the No. 1 place for entertainment. Everyone has a voice now, and what makes the Dance Collective so cool is that everyone is qualified to express themselves. When I've worked in TV and film. I've always used people who are interesting rather than just going with the predictable. I think my role in this organization and in this community is to help people reach their hopes and dreams and express themselves creatively. My interest is in cultivating what has already been established."

While he is still settling into his new position and determining what his plans will be for the Collective down the road, he is getting to know the staff and has Monnier on site to help with the transition. Although he visited Fort Wayne in June to get a feel for his future home, he's already finding things he loves about his new hometown.

"I think this is the quintessential American experience. For me, Fort Wayne offers everything you could want but also has a real intimacy about it.'

While Byrne hopes to help establish Fort Wayne Dance Collective outside the borders of Indiana, he also aspires to bring dance to people who may not have ever envisioned themselves dancing. In fact, he says, anyone who brings this article with them to FWDC will be able to take a free dance class to see if dance might be exactly what they need in their life.

"I want to bring people out of the woodwork, people who maybe are at home and haven't moved in awhile. Come here and move in a safe way. This is your home, and my office is open for anyone who wants to come by."

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# A Future Full of Promise

----- Feature • Hannah Beck-----

When 20-year-old singer/songwriter Hannah Beck won the top prize at this sum-

mer's Sonshine Festival tournament, a nationally recognized Christian music competition, it was merely the latest milestone in a professional music career that had already been rolling for half a decade.

When Hannah was 15, her pastor asked her to perform an original song in church each week, and the young writer found herself on a path that came as a bit of a surprise.

"I think back then music was more of a pipe dream to me," she says. "I've always been a girl with multiple interests. Even now, I constantly am adding new hobbies and topics to my repertoire of research projects and library book lists, but music still remains my go-to and longest constant."

Pipe dream or not, there was no denying that music was very important to her, and she seized the opportunity given to her by her pastor to use her songs to make a difference.

"At 15, music played multiple roles in my life. It was my constant companion, [my] diary and the way I'd release and express emotions," she says. "Music was my avenue to dream and imagine beyond what was in the here and now. So, through that, I would dream big. I wanted to learn how to be better and excel further. Any opportunity that came to share [my music] was a privilege. It

meant that I could give life to my most recent beloved piece in front of an audience and hopefully impact someone with what I'd written. In those moments, my scribbles on notebook paper felt like something bigger than me, and that's exactly what I wanted."

She continued to play and sing, but the on-stage aspect of her music proved to be a challenge for a young performer who was still not quite sure who she was.

"I don't think my goal has ever been to be a 'professional singer,'" she says. "I love to write and play, don't get me wrong, but being on stage, conversing with people and engaging the crowd are not my strong suits. Those are definitely areas I am continually having to push myself to grow in."

Her inexperience came to the fore when she went into the studio to make her first recordings: two EPs and 2013's full-length album, *Lost in You*. The songs on those records are the work of a young writer who hadn't yet seen much of the world. And yet, Beck finds value in the naivete of those years.

"Lost in You was a compilation of my first two EPs," she says. "I came into the studio at 16 to roll out my first set of tracks

completely unlearned and fresh to the process of indie music. At the time of [the first two EPs], I came from a rather sheltered environment, so my knowledge of pop cul-



ture was pretty embarrassing. I think that was good, though. Growing up without being tainted by the outside world gave me a chance to build a foundation for depth and songwriting through experimentation."

The process of recording, too, helped Beck to grow and to develop realistic expectations for her music.

"Looking back," she says, "I would think that initially I was pretty naïve with any goals I had. As with any musician, I think everyone walks into the studio for the first time wanting to record their project and just suddenly make it. It's natural. You fall in love with your craft regardless of how radioworthy or well written it is, and you just expect everyone else to be mesmerized with it, too. Especially on first projects, I think it can be a night and day difference from when you begin the process to the time you come in for your next album in vision."

That complex maturation process, Beck thinks, resulted in an album, this year's Written on You, that is richer and more in touch with the broader world.

"Fast forward two years from the release of *Lost in You*," she says, "and I would say

that the Lord allowed me to embrace culture at an excellent time. Written on You is a totally different take on songwriting and faith than any other project I'd ever done. It came

out of more life experience and awareness of people and their struggles."

And she must be right. When she took the stage at the Sonshine Festival in Somerset, Wisconsin, this year, something clicked. Of all the acts that participated in the festival's music tournament, the judges liked her best.

"Sonshine Fest was an incredibly humbling event for me," she says "Festivals haven't necessarily been my target audience. We've discovered that my niche is in more intimate settings such as churches or conferences where I can spend time being more faith-based and explanatory in my sets. Festivals are all about the performance. People come to get a good show, and going into this one we practiced a lot."

Once again, Beck was surprised by her success.

"When I found out I'd won, I was amazed," she says. "You never know what the judges are looking for in these competitions, and I was up against people from nearly every other genre imaginable. It was an excellent chance to practice being on a legitimate stage, but I didn't expect to walk away with the win."

When asked about the future of her music career, Beck is humble and resolutely down-to-earth.

"There is no guarantee of further growth; it's all one great big unknown," she says. "I find myself deliberately wanting to choose contentment with where God has chosen to put me for now and do my best not to

become enslaved by always wanting more. My goal isn't necessarily to be the next big thing if that's not what God would choose."

And the young woman who's always devoted herself to many interests refuses to confine herself to a narrow career path.

"There are a lot of avenues alongside my music that I am pursuing," she says. "I am planning to launch an online support group for Christian women struggling with women's health challenges and infertility. I'm hoping to take my daily radio show/devotional, Blessed Womanhood, and expand to a few more stations. There are several writing projects underway that I hope to have available down the road."

Still, no matter where she goes next, it's clear that music will always be there by her

"Music is definitely a road that I'm destined to walk down in one facet or another," she says. "It's been a pivotal part of my life since before birth, as my mother will tell you. I can't help but want to impact people through song. How, specifically, I do that will really depend on the season of life I'm in."

# The Star of the Strip Mall

Since I moved to Fort Wayne over 13 years ago, Casa's has consistently been the answer to my question, "Where do you go for good Italian food?"

Don't get me wrong. I like Casa's, especially their chocolate cake served with a decadent raspberry sauce, but I recently visited Ziano's, and now I wonder why this unsung hero doesn't get more credit. While it hasn't been around as long (the first location opened in 2009) it definitely deserves some love.

I've visited the Covington Road location only (there are two other locations, on Dupont and on Maysville). The restaurant's slogan says it all: "No frills Italian bistro in a strip mall." I've mentioned before that I don't typically put a lot of stock in restau-

rants located in strip malls, but Ziano's breaks the mold. While the ambiance leaves something to be desired (you really can't help but notice you're in a strip mall) the food more than makes up for it.

First, let's talk about the breadsticks. I don't know what kind of voodoo magic they sprinkle those with, but dang are they good - like eat-the-whole-plate good. I'd be completely satisfied with an entire meal of nothing but their breadsticks.

They are handmade daily and brushed with garlic and Parmesan, but that description really doesn't do them justice. They are simultaneously sweet and savory, a delicious combination, and the texture is soft and fluffy. Trust me on this one. Best breadsticks in town. No contest. And you can get them with a variety of dipping sauces, including

cheese, garlic butter and marinara sauce.

Of course, no Italian restaurant would be complete without an Italian House salad. Ziano's version comes in two sizes (small for \$1.99 and large for \$5.99) and is made with a blend of spring mix, iceberg and romaine lettuces, tossed with mozzarella, shredded Parmesan, green onion, tomato, sweet peppers and handmade Italian dressing. The small is the perfect size for a before-dinner salad. The large is big enough for a

If you make it past the breadsticks and salad, I recommend these main dishes.

Chicken Piccata (\$12.99): Grilled chicken breast with lemon and capers, reduced in a white wine sauce and served with linguine. This dish is so simple, but the flavors are executed beautifully. It pulls off the perfect ratio of lemon to capers, both of which can be overpowering if not done right. The chicken is thin

and juicy. I have dreams about this dish. In fact, I had to stop while writing this article to go get it.

Chicken or Shrimp Romano (\$12.99): Linguine pasta tossed with your choice of meat, crushed tomatoes and Ziano's own creamy Romano sauce, which is a blend of their classic red sauce and alfredo sauce. I always choose chicken. This is a comforting dish. The sauce is smooth and savory, with a hint of sweetness. I especially like the chunks of toma-

The Pesto Pizza (10 inch, \$7.99; 14 inch, \$13.99): Homemade basil pesto sauce and fresh sliced tomato, covered with mozzarella. The 10inch is a nice size for one. Go with the 14 inch if you want to share. I am not a big fan of pizzas made with a lot of marinara sauce, so I especially like

to present in this dish.

that this one is made with the basil pesto sauce. The crust is thick, but not too thick, and has the same sweet and savory flavor combo as the breadsticks. It could use a tad more seasoning in the pesto sauce, but overall, I give this pizza two thumbs up.

Because of its casual atmosphere and modest pricing, Ziano's is a great place for a family dinner with the kiddos, but can also serve as a place for a date night with your sweetie, as well.

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### Windhand

### **Grief's Infernal Flower**

Windhand sound like the kid brother to Sleep's bleary-eyed, paranoid big brother. They make music that creeps and crawls slowly along. Maybe they're stoned, or maybe they're just cautious purveyors of doom. Their dirges of fuzz and thunderous metal would remain in the doldrums if it



weren't for singer Dorthia Cottrell. Her vocals add a touch of light to the proceedings. There's nothing girly about how she sings. Vocally her voice remains not above the music, but more of a faint howl amongst the doom and gloom. But the fact that she's not growling and chanting, but actually singing, brings Windhand's sound up from the depths of Hell to more like the backwoods of Virginia (where they're from, btw). It's swampy, moss-covered doom, not fire and brimstone doom.

For their newest album, the Virginia five-piece enlisted veteran album producer Jack Endino to helm the board, and the result is *Grief's Infernal Flower*, a dark, foreboding, 70-plus minute doom metal opus. This album is a stoned basement dweller's delight. Light some incense, grab a six-pack, and head downstairs to your favorite stained couch.

"Two Urns" opens the album with some crackling, oversaturated guitar tones that would make Matt Pike proud – rhythm that slinks from the speakers like a black ooze and covers you for eight minutes. You get carried off to some dark, moon-lit world that feels neither warm or familiar. Cue guitar solo. "Forest Clouds" remains in first gear as the song coasts down some dimly lit street in some faceless town. Windhand seem to have a handle on the stoner/doom vibe, and this song flows like lava from a crater. Cottrell is the secret weapon here. If it were another doom metal guy growling here, the music wouldn't have the same vitality it has now. "Sparrow" and album closer "Aition" are ominous, acoustic strummers that work nicely against the backdrop of the impenetrable wall of fuzz and distortion. But those quiet moments are few and far between on here.


"Tanngrisnir" is an overwhelming push of heavy, while "Hyperion" sneaks in like some long lost Black Sabbath track. "Hesperus" is over 14 minutes of crushing guitar and slow burn tempo. If Low and Electric Wizard would collaborate, I imagine it sounding like this epic behemoth of a track. "Kingfisher" follows "Hesperus" and matches that track with epic girth, but opens up more desolately. You get the vibe of slowly dying in some southern swamp, staring up at a starless sky as you slowly sink into the muck that will consume you. There's no letting up, from start to finish.

At times you can get lost as to where you are on this album. I wouldn't say this record suffers from the same-y syndrome, but after a while the ears can get dulled by the Big Muff wall of noise. There are enough stellar moments on this album that make up for the limited color palate. *Grief's Infernal Flower* is a great and epic chunk of stoner/doom metal. Put on some headphones and let the over 28 minute block of "Hesperus" and "Kingfisher" melt your psyche.

That 6-pack isn't required, but is recommended. (John Hubner)

### **Low** *Ones and Sixes*

Low's appeal emanates from the band's ability to draw the listener in, rather than trying to impress by swinging for the fences. From the first, they've excelled at the approach. Their first releases were distinctive in their inversion of the "calm at the center of the storm." Patient listeners who dug beneath the quiet surface were rewarded



many-fold, from slow-burn classics like *Secret Name* and *Things We Left in the Fire*.

Once 2005's *The Great Destroyer* hit, however, Low dropped the gloves and proved they could retain their substance even as they turned up the volume knob. But it wasn't simply a point to prove; the Minnesota trio have always demonstrated an artistic restlessness in their work. Case in point: Low's last album, 2013's more naturalistic

The Invisible Way played it both ways with very productive result

The Invisible Way, played it both ways, with very productive results. Now comes Ones and Sixes, which counters the band's last effort without running the other way. That's how true artists do it, and the rest of us just stand back and admire the artistry.

The new album reveals Low as a force of nature, with every nuance somehow amplified. No, it's not a loud record, but it's an adventure; processed percussion, angular production and in-your-face moments showcase the band's strengths in new ways that practically mainline the "Low experience." From the deliberate tempo that drives "No Comprende" Alan Sparhawk sings, "Let's try to cut to a solution," with Mimi Parker shadowing. Her ghostly vocal counterpoint helps to throw the song into sharp relief. Not a note is wasted. and the production acts as a magnifying glass. It's mesmerizing. "Kid in the Corner" melds Parker and Sparhawk's vocals to impressive effect; they become musical instruments themselves. In "What Part of Me," it's a simple query, a quiet storm. "What part of me don't you know?" is the dominant refrain, part pleading and part wheedling. To hear the married principals harmonizing these words may be more disconcerting than the words themselves, but such emotional honesty, in the end, may just be the true heart of Low's appeal.

The sound may change, but the key to what makes Low so compelling is evergreen. You can go back to the earliest of Low's material and play it against *Ones and Sixes*. What do you come away with? Low. They've never abandoned their essence, their chemistry, the magic that makes them tick. This band is living art. Treasure it. (D.M. Jones)

### **Ricked Wicky**

### Swimmer to a Liquid Armchair

Indie slackard Robert Pollard (he of the recently kaput "golden-era" re-formed Guided By Voices, which followed on the heels of the 2004 retirement of the GBV banner ... it's complicated) hasn't put out an album since May. Of 2015. So his fans



player, Swimmer to a Liquid Armchair.

By now, we expect a few different facets from the Fading Captain, aka Uncle Bob, aka the Vampire on Titus. To wit, there's his concise popsmith side, his quasi-prog side, and his "I-wrote-this-anhour-ago" side. Swimmer ... hews closer to the first, with a touch of the second. Fortunately, there's very little evidence of the third. Cohorts Tim Tobias, Nick Mitchell and Kevin March provide the musical muscle Pollard requires to play to the back row, as it were.

Though the album lurches out of the gate with "What Are All Those Paint Men Digging" (the title is repeated here more than the phone number in a cheap lawyer commercial), don't despair; the album soon takes wing. "Crystal Titanic," ironically enough, rights the ship with mic-swinging swagger and crashing drums. It's reminiscent of Pollard's Lexo and the Leapers work, with a quiet keyboard/acoustic segue in the middle to cue the lighters in the crowd before lighting the jets again. The single, "Poor Substitute," is the kind of midtempo-tempered rocker tune that's been Pollard's stock in trade for most of his post-GBV career, post 2004 GBV, that is. In fact, the album's production veneer (if you can call it that) brings to mind one of "late-model" Pollard's early efforts, 2004's Fiction Man. It's an un-fussy, mid-fi, hyphenated-adjective kind of sound that suits the material well.

There's one slight wrinkle when, mid-album, Mitchell takes over lead vocal duties on "Blind Side." While he's no Tobin Sprout. Mitchell brings a loose, fun, "rockin' Saturday night" kind of vibe to the song. Otherwise, *Swimmer* ... promises to satisfy the faithful and entertain the uninitiated.

With solid tunes like "Simple Simon Paper Plates" and "Red Legged Pygmalion," Ricked Wicky won't turn any heads that Pollard and his myriad projects haven't turned already. But he has already succeeded at carving out his own niche in the indie-rock spectrum, and he's not content to stop digging away. Plus, how many other grandpas out there can pull off scissor kicks onstage between beers and verses? Win. (D.M. Jones)

I would like to start by giving praise to one of our well-known establishments, Mad Anthony Brewing Company, who recently claimed a gold medal at the 2015 Great American Beer Festival (GABF) competition in Denver, Colorado. Presented by the Brewers Association, GABF is the largest national beer competition that recognizes the most outstanding beers produced in the United States. Let's face it, there's a ton of brews being made these days in the States and being named one of the best of them is quite a feat. Mad Anthony was recognized in the American-Style Amber Lager beer-style category for its Auburn Lager which also placed first in the European Lager category at the 2015 Indiana Brewers' Cup. I don't think I've tried this one yet, but you can bet your bottom dollar I'll be giving it a whirl.

On top of having a great year and winning awards, Mad Anthony recently announced the release of their "Out of the Box" series, dedicated to bringing a unique mix of their draft beer options straight to your fridge. This series will feature everything from seasonal Madbrew offerings, to special brewers reserve batches, all produced in short runs for optimal freshness. The first release hitting area liquor stores is Hop Wang, a wet hop double IPA brewed with fresh Chinook hop cones, grown at Hophead Farms in Michigan. If the beer is as good as the awesome packaging it comes in, then this series will be soon be finding its way to my fridge.

First, McDonald's announced they'll be serving breakfast all day long, and now Carmike Cinemas is

serving beer and wine. Who would've thought we'd see the day that you could throw back a couple cold ones while taking in a flick? I can still remember sneaking beers into the theater back in the day, and now it's as simple as going to the counter and ordering a tall draft with your popcorn. The news might be shocking to some, but actually the Cinema Center and Cinema Grill have been serving for a little while now, so it shouldn't be that surprising. The Carmike 20 on Dupont Road and Jefferson Pointe 18 will be limiting to no more than three alcoholic drinks per show, to be served by employees aged 21 years or older. Thumbs up on my end!

Driving down Broadway, it's hard not to notice the activity at the old Chappell's building, now home to Trubble Brewing. They open to the general public Wednesday, November 25, the day before Thanksgiving.

# **Cold War Tale Resonates Today**

Bridge of Spies brings to the screen a "based on real events" story of the Cold War, a story with so much cinematic possibility that it's surprising it hasn't made it to the screen before. Playwright Mark Charman brought it to Steven Spielberg who has turned it into a suspenseful spy thriller that eloquently documents a different time while drawing sharp parallels to our own endless war, the "war on terror," or whatever we're calling it these days.

The film's climax is the exchange of convicted Soviet spy Rudolf Abel for American U-2 pilot Francis Gary Powers, who was shot down by the Soviets, and an American graduate student, Frederic Pryor, who got stuck on the wrong side of the wall and is accused of spying and held by the East Germans.

How and why we get to the deal makes up most of the film. Bridge of Spies begins by establishing the strange reality of Rudolf Abel. Mark Rylance had me convinced within just a few minutes that being a spy is a very lonely, alienating existence and that he should be nominated for an Oscar for this performance.

We meet Abel looking at himself in the mirror because he is painting a self-portrait, an accurate recreation of his face. As he makes his way to the park to paint, he is followed by a hoard of FBI agents. They almost lose him in the crowded subway and perhaps don't see him palm a nickel stuck to the bottom of a park bench. Inside the hollowed out nickel is a coded

These early scenes are so quiet and detailed we almost forget this is a Spielberg movie. By the time Abel is arrested, we know he is a match for whatever the U.S. is going to throw at him.

Assigned to defend Abel, at the height of Cold War tension in 1957, is James B. Donovan, an insurance attorney who knows how to argue and negotiate. He's good at what he does, and he enjoys his work. He doesn't want Abel as a client, but his partners and various government officials tell him it is his duty. What



they want from him is a showy but low-key defense so Abel can be convicted and executed.

Appealing to a man's sense of duty can be dangerous. What they get is a man with much more integrity and belief in the Constitution. Who better to play a paragon of the strength of the American system and justice than Tom Hanks? The answer is no one. Hanks is tremendous in this role. He picks his battles. He does what he can do. He frustrates everyone by offering a real defense, not the appearance of a defense.

Abel and Donovan develop a deep respect for each other. Donovan sees Abel as a soldier doing his job. Donovan is Abel's lawyer, not an interrogator. That allows Abel to trust his lawyer. We get only snippets of their relationship, just enough to learn that they are the best examples of each nation.

His pursuit of real justice continues into sentencing. A true insurance man who believes in contingency plans, argues against the death penalty. What if we need a guy to trade later in the Cold War? It continues into the appeals process in front of the Supreme Court, which earns Donovan the contempt of many Americans and international attention. His dedication to the case lands him the lead role in the eventual prisoner

Bridge of Spies suggests the current turmoil in the world without heavy handedness. As a good-old fashioned entertaining thriller, Bridge of Spies is a must see. As a civics lesson, an example of how we are at our best, Bridge of Spies is a must see. It is rousing American filmmaking at its very best.

# Goosebumps Knocks Off The Martian

Tops at the Box: Three big movies opened this week, any of which could've stolen the box office away from Ridley Scott's The Martian. # White Shines in First Prez's One-Woman Show

|Curtain Call

First Presbyterian Theater's one-person shows have become highlights of their seasons. Through them we meet characters, generally women, who have experienced challenging lives and found ways to prevail and flourish. The latest, *His Eye Is on the Sparrow* by Larry Parr, about singer and actress Ethel Waters, is another such production through which Fort Wayne audiences meet an amazing woman who managed to survive adversity, in this case, through strength, talent and faith.

As in *Hi Hat Hattie* (about Hattie McDaniel and also written by Parr) we are given glimpses of key moments in the life of a famous entertainer. Overall, the script of *Hattie* felt a bit more complete and smooth than *Sparrow*'s but this one serves pretty well, despite leaving what feels like a few pieces missing in the telling of its story. Because of the chronology skipping from one period to another, a few transitions are set up well by segments of Ethel's monologues and tell much.

Mikki White makes an incredible Ethel, due primarily to the strength of her voice.

She's an amazing talent and sings the variety of songs beautifully. My favorites were "Tak-

mance was solid.

Race, of course, plays a major part in the story since Waters was performing during a period when black entertainers were often treated like garbage and even abused or threatened, as we see clearly several times. Like so many, Waters suffered from interactions with just about everyone in her life, white and black. She beautifully describes how the darkness of skin tone determines treatment in her time, even within her broken family.

After suffering much and losing hope, it's through a meeting with evangelist Billy Graham that she finds strength and meaning anew late in life. Waters says Graham becomes the son she never had after she lets go of her obsesion with how he looks more like a movie star than a preacher. It seems the two forged a sweet relationship as she became a major part of his "Crusades," and he offered her love and support.

Throughout the production, photographs from Waters' life are projected on a screen above the stage, effectively giving a sense of the real woman. The set design and costumes are simple and offer flexibility to the production.

If for no other reasons, White's performance and learning about Waters' life and music make for a good night in the theater.
