A few years ago the rock/blues guitarist Tinsley Ellis was going through some old music files on his computer. The songs were mostly demos spanning his 35-year career, things he'd played live, cover tunes and originals. Just for fun he collected the instrumentals into a file and found that he had 20 or 30. He'd always wanted to release an album of instrumentals, so he got a band together and recorded *Get It*. The

only problem? He couldn't find a label willing to release it.

It wasn't as though Ellis was some nobody guitar player. Far from it. He'd been around for a long time and had released 11 albums on three different labels, including Capricorn, Telarc and the king of blues labels, Alligator.

So he did what a lot of people are doing these days.

"I couldn't get any label interested in it, and I thought, 'Well, I'll just put it out myself,'" Ellis said in a recent phone interview. "I felt that strongly about it. And it really put a smile on people's faces. It made a big profit too. And when it came time to do the next one, I just decided that since I

already had a label going, I could put out an album whenever I wanted to and I could make whatever album I wanted to. And that felt good."

That good feeling has led to two more exception-

ally good records in as many years. Get It came out in 2013, Midnight Blue in 2014 and Tough Love earlier this year. All three have been well-received by fans and critics alike. And vinyl lovers will get the chance to nab Tough Love after the first of the year.

Blues Blast Magazine selected *Tough Love* as best Rock Blues album of the year.

"I think that might be the first award I've won since winning the Latin award in high school," Ellis said, dryly. "Excellence in Latin."

Ellis peppered our conversation with droll humor. He said the motto for his label, Heartfixer, after the Albert King song, is "High Hopes, Low Expectations." Just goes to show you the blues ain't about just feeling sad. Which is not to say Ellis doesn't play and sing with deep emotion. After seeing B.B. King for the first time, Ellis realized that you have to play from your heart. Otherwise you're just faking it.

"I think in the blues medium you pretty much better do that or it's not going to satisfy," he said. "I remember the first time I went to see B B. King he just

poured it all out on stage. So yeah, sometimes I get so worked up down in my basement writing and singing that I just get exhausted. And I'm a morning person, so I may go down there at six in the morning and by noon I'm just like done for the day. Have to take a little nap and regroup."

Ellis is not your typical blues musician. He has a degree in history from Emory University in Atlanta, where he lives. He approaches the blues and his music with the eye of a historian. He sees the survival of the

blues as dependent not on the reemergence of the B.B. King big band era but on the fact that guitar music is popular and the blues is included in that.

"The blues came out of a scenario of discrimination and things like that. The people that made blues music initially didn't set out to even have a career in music. They were farmers and factory workers and just happened to catch the ear of Keith Richards and Eric Clapton. If it wasn't for the British Invasion, I don't know if it would have been a big deal because nobody paid much attention to it here. So it's really a phenomenon. I don't know that you can recreate those conditions, and I don't

know that you would want to.

"So the good news is that guitar music is on the rise and that includes the blues genre. Guitar was made for playing blues. Guitar is king. I didn't

make that rule I just enforce it. Guitar is on the up-rise so that's a good thing. That's what I do."

He could have easily followed a path to academia, but he chose the life of a blues guitar player over that of a professor. It's a choice he has not regretted.

"I let music into my life as an invited guest; then it turned into a friend; then it turned into a constant companion. Then music turned into a controller, and now it's a tyrant. Can't get it to turn back into anything

else. It's got me, got a hold of me."

Turns out that's not a bad thing. Not for Ellis and certainly not for music lovers. Fellow musicians have long recognized the talent and passion Ellis brings to his playing. He's good friends with Warren Haynes and Derek Trucks, to name two guys who know their way around a fretboard. He's had people like Peter Buck and Chuck Leavell, as well as Trucks, make guest appearances on his albums. When Alligator Records founder Bruce Iglauer finally gave Ellis a good

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

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# Keeping Up the Good Fight

Jackson Browne is at it again. Well into his second year of touring in support of *Standing in the Breach*, his first studio album since 2008, Browne has shattered any notion that resting on his copious laurels was all that lay before him. He has played to sold-out audiences around the world since the October 2014 release of *Standing in the Breach*, an album of vigorous originals true to

his style and his convictions. With Browne, the muse remains strong.

Browne has been called the "quintessential sensitive California singer/songwriter of the early 1970s," edging James Taylor and Joni Mitchell largely because he remained relevant from a pop standpoint throughout the 70s and well into the 80s. Browne had a knack for turning the personal into the universal, with songs like "Doctor My Eyes," "Running on Empty" and "The Pretender." Even when he began wearing his political heart on his sleeve, he did so in a way that encouraged serious thought rather than simple sloganeering. His skills as a songwriter have not dimin-

The Midwest leg of his *Standing* in the *Breach* tour brings Browne and his fine band to Fort Wayne's Embassy Theater on Tuesday, November 17.

With millions in albums sales and a 2004 induction into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame behind him,

it would be simple enough for Browne to just stay home in California and work around the off-the-grid house he shares with his longtime partner Dianna Cohen. Then again, Browne has these songs that he's written, and they're good songs, and it would be a shame if he didn't spread them around a little.

Judging by the reviews and setlists of his recent concerts, Browne is anything but a nostalgia act. Sure, he throws the audience some classics, including "These Days" (the song he wrote when he was 16 and which Nico borrowed for her 1967 debut solo record, *Chelsea Girl*) and generally at least two of the three hits mentioned above, as well as others, but the focus of the show is clearly on his new material.

Thanks to the wonders of the internet, there are plenty of videos online to give you a taste of his current tour. *Standing in the Breach* is a showcase of Browne's talents as a performer and songwriter. The songs are a blend of introspection, political awareness and storytelling woven together by sublime musicianship. Fans will not be disappointed.

It was Browne's dedication to craft that

got the attention of his upstairs neighbor in Los Angeles as the 60s melted into the 70s. Serendipity always seems to creep in with things like this. Browne lived in the same house as future Eagles frontman Glenn Frey. Frey said he would get up in the morning and hear his neighbor working at the piano,

playing the same tune over and over. Then there'd be silence for 15 or 20 minutes before the guy started back up with the same song.

Eventually they got to talking, and Browne told about this song he was working on but couldn't finish. He told Frey he could take it if he could find a way to end it. Frey took it. Good move. The song turned out to be "Take it Easy." Browne got to the line

"Standing on a corner in Winslow, Arizona / such a fine sight to see" and got stuck. Frey finished it. The rest, as they say, was a gold mine for classic rock radio.

Frey credits Browne with teaching him how to be a songwriter and actually wanted Browne to join the Eagles, but their work habits didn't meld. During group writing sessions, Browne would have trouble at some point and wander off to work on the tune by himself. When he finally returned with the problem solved, Frey and Don Henley would have already found a solution and have started on the next tune.

Old habits die hard. One of the songs on *Standing in the Breach* was a tune Browne started writing in 1967 called "The Birds of St. Marks." In recent interviews Browne said he began writing it with the Byrds in mind, but never seemed to find the right arrangement to qualify it as recording material. He finally found the right guitar player in the form of Greg Leisz, and the 48-year-old song finally earned a

place on a record. It was worth the wait.

Browne included two covers on the record. "You Know the Night" is from a letter Woody Guthrie wrote to his wife about the night they met. Browne set it to music. The other cover, "Walls and Doors," is a translation of Cuban songwriter/guitarist Carlos Varela's "Las Paredes y Puertas." Browne is as careful when picking the material of others as he is with his own work

At 67, Jackson Browne retains not only the same enthusiasm and attention to detail he had when his eponymous debut hit the streets in 1970, he still has the same hair. He's like a modern-day Dorian Gray without the character flaws. If Jackson Browne is still running on empty, he's not showing it.

listen, he signed him immediately.

Ellis has been on the road since the late 1970s with various bands, including The Alley Cats (with Preston Hubbard, later of the Fabulous Thunderbirds) and The Heartfixers (which he formed in 1981 with singer and harpist Chicago Bob Nelson). The Heartfixers soon became Atlanta's top blues band.

His current road band includes Erik
Kaszynski on drums and Jonathon Holland

on bass.

When they come to C2G on Friday, November 20, Ellis and his band will draw from his extensive work during his years at Alligator, but the focus will likely be on his current work which is stellar, despite what his self-deprecating style may suggest.

"I have just enough rope to hang myself," he said. "So far I haven't. My formula is to make the kind of album that my fans want to hear me do. You can certainly shoot yourself in the foot by making the kind of album radio would want to play, because when it comes to radio I zig and they zag. Or the kind of album that would get good reviews. I don't know what kind of album that is. You can't go wrong making an album for the fans, and that's what I've done with this latest one, *Tough Love*<br/>because the fans have really enjoyed it."



**GREAT WHITE**

Think you know Los Angeles-based hard rockers Great White? Well, think again.

This band is much more than its 80s chart-topping hit, "Once Bitten, Twice Shy." Mark Kendall and company have survived four turbulent decades of breakups, make-ups and a tragic Rhode Island nightclub fire that left 100 people dead and the group's reputation in tatters.

Not ones to give up easily, Great White returned to the road and airwaves, and they'll be at C2G Music Hall Saturday, November 21 for what they're touting as a "Special Intimate Acoustic Performance."

It's a side of Great White many fans have never seen. Most diehard and casual followers of the band are used to its hard-rocking, hard partying ways, but Kendall (lead guitar and percussion), Audie Desbrow

(drums), Michael Lardie (rhythm guitar, banjo, sitar, keys), Scott Snyder (bass) and Terry Ilous (vocals) have left that side of things – not to mention the electric cords and their hairspray – far behind for their latest tour. Stripped down, is the idea. Raw yet cozy. Nothing but instruments, their talent and the words they've used to

reach millions of fans in the U.S. and worldwide since they first came together in the late 70s.

Well, they didn't technically refer to themselves as Great White until 1982, but the seeds for the band were sown in 1977 when Kendall met vocalist Jack Russell. For two years the pair headed up Highway, then Livewire and finally Wires. They played to packed clubs in and around Los Angeles, but Russell's wild ways brought a premature end to the fun when he was arrested for shooting a live-in maid during a botched robbery attempt.

Kendall was forced to start a new band, which he did soon afterwards with the help of bassist Dan Costa (of Ozzy Osbourne fame) and singer Lisa Baker. The trio called themselves Dante Fox, and a six-month run followed before Baker left to join George Lynch's act, Exciter. Alas, fickle is the heart of rock bands. In the meantime and unbeknownst to Kendall, Russell had been sprung out of jail early, serving only 18 months of an eight-year sentence. Russell then approached Kendall about auditioning as lead vocalist for Dante Fox. He squeaked in by a 2-1 vote.

It was the beginning of the beginning. By 1982, the dudes had their lineup – Kendall on guitar, Russell on vocals, Gary Holland on drums and Lorne Black on bass – and a new name, Great White, inspired by Russell's white blond hair, white Fender Telecaster guitar

and habit of wearing white (jumpsuit, shoes) wherever he went.

A five-song demo and constant California radio play led to the band getting signed by EMI in 1983, and they put out their self-titled debut in 1984. They toured the UK with Whitesnake and the U.S. and Canada with Judas Priest. They put out *Shot in the Dark* independently, fired Holland and brought in Desbrow. Then Capitol Records signed them, they re-released *Shot* and invited Lardie (who'd worked as a session keyboardist) to join them full time. It was the heyday of hair bands, the glory days of butt rock, and the guys of Great White fit right in.

By 1987 Great White were a household name, thanks to *Once Bitten* which featured "Rock Me" and "Save Your Love." Two years later *Twice Shy* hit the shelves, as did the radio hit which combined the two album titles. See what they did there? They also got

their first Grammy nomination for Best Hard Rock Performer.

To a certain extent, it would be all downhill from there. Great White did have chart and touring success for the next decade with albums Hooked, Psycho City, Sail Away and Let It Rock, but a number of lineup changes (not to mention financial is-


sues, a changing musical landscape, and Russell's well documented problems with alcohol and drug addiction) took a toll on the band. In 2000, Kendall left the group.

But band breakups rarely last, and Kendall and Russell found themselves reuniting in 2003 to play several dates around the country, including the now notorious Station gig. That night, poorly thought out pyrotechnics caused the club's ceiling tiles to catch fire, and 100 people, including the band's guitarist, Ty Longley, were killed.

It seemed like it might be the end of Great White. The band paid \$1 million in damages to the victims' families, Russell entered rehab and things were quiet for a while. Then in 2006 the guys all started talking again, and they reformed, touring the U.S. and UK and putting out the album *Rising* in 2009. Three years later, without Russell (who'd gone on to reform Jack Russell's Great White; déjà vu all over again), Kendall and the lineup coming to C2G put out *Elation* which, according to a critic with Classic Rock Revisited, was "the most complete album the band has ever released"

And now they're back on the road, unplugged and ready to rock. Just goes to show that, like the shark so many thought they were named for, Great White just keeps on swimming.

#### PANTERA HISTORY OF HOSTILITY

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#### ForeverAtLast

#### **Ghost Again**

Listening to *Ghost Again*, the sophomore effort from Indianapolis post-hardcore quartet ForeverAtLast, one can hear the sound of a band finding its own voice. Lead singer B Paris has grown exponentially as a vocalist, displaying a brassy confidence that was still in its nascent stages on



their debut, 2012's February to February. The band, too, is more confident here

The band has also jettisoned a few elements that tended to bog down the proceedings. The most obvious difference is that the gruff vocals that were paired with B's clean vocals are gone. ForeverAt-Last are not a metalcore band, where pairing alternating clean and rough vocals is the norm, so the technique was an odd fit for them. Add the fact that the rough vocals only appeared intermittently and at odd junctures, and it ended up being more of a distraction than anything else. There were also some superfluous studio effects on F2F, along with some hackneyed melodies and lyrics. The net result was a competent album with promise, but it was clear that the band still had room to grow.

The band has apparently put the intervening three years to good use. *Ghosts* isn't a complete makeover or a radical departure from their established sound. It is a clear step forward, one that suggests the band has let go of the standard genre conventions that made them less individuated and is able to make its name with some fresh ideas. This time around, Paris' vocals are selectively and subtly backed up, mostly during melodies. The gruff vocals are gone, and without that element hitting you over the head, the rest of the band has the chance to shine.

Aided immeasurably by the driving rhythms pounded out by drummer Jared Paris, the rest of the band has both tightened up and stretched out for *Ghosts*. All of the songs are uptempo – there are no ballads in the bunch – but the band manages to change things up enough song to song to keep it from seeming monotonous. There is the driving opener "Shoreline," but there's also the haunting piano outro to "Ghost in the Attic," the haunting chorus of "The Observatory" and the anthemic "Bad Blood." And throughout the album, the band has the good sense to mix things up a lot, going from soft to loud, from the rhythic to the melodic.

It will be interesting to see what the future holds for ForeverAt-Last; if they continue to hone their craft and keep improving with each release, they may be a band to watch. (Ryan Smith)

#### W.A.S.P. Golgatha

I admit to having a couple of W.A.S.P. albums (on cassette) back in the mid 80s and specifically remember rocking out in my room to "I Wanna Be Somebody" and "Blind In Texas." Great catchy metal, those songs. I didn't keep up with this band whose singer wore circular sawblades



on the arms of his black leather glam-rock outfit, but while I was busy going to college and raising a family, Blackie Lawless soldiered on, oblivious to my own obliviousness, releasing over a dozen albums and converting to Christianity. (First Alice, then Blackie – can Marilyn be that far off?)

And so it was with much fear and trepidation that I approached *Golgotha*, their 15th album. W.A.S.P. were never known for introspective lyrics, and I've heard more than my share of Christian cheese, so I braced for the worst. Add to this that Blackie is pushing 60 and I've also heard more than my share of aging rockers who just aren't up to the task of melting your face off.

One listen to the single, "Scream," and I am happy to admit that all my fears were for naught. This is classic W.A.S.P., with in-your-face guitars pulsing with energy backing Blackie's distinctive raspy buzz-saw vocals that are in excellent form. Lyrically I'm impressed. Sure, he's still no Shakespeare, but he's, fortunately, also not Stryper. Instead, Lawless continues his string of invigorating rock anthems with pro-God lyrics that are handled in such a way that they aren't heavy handed. Exhibit one: The chorus from "Eyes of My Maker": "Take me inside / Can you bring me alive? / How can I kneel / When my soul's a liar?" Read into it what you want. I suppose a Cannibal

#### BACKTRACKS

#### Redbone Wovoka (1973)

Redbone were formed in Los Angeles in the late 60s by brothers Pat and Lolly Vegas (and Tom Bellamy). They were the first band of Native American descent to sign a major record deal, and had their first charted song in "The Witch Queen



of New Orleans" in 1971. With a combination of roots rock and funk, Redbone had a seven albums in seven years run before running out of steam in the late 70s. This record had one of their most familiar – and biggest – hits, "Come and Get Your Love".

It starts off with the title track, an almost disco version of a Native American fable. "Sweet Lady of Love," which follows, has a softer vibe and is a bright track with groovy percussion. "Someday" reeks of 70s yacht rock with overproduced strings. "Liquid Truth" and "We Were All Wounded at Wounded Knee" are political and somewhat gritty, but Redbone were proud of their heritage and down with the issues surrounding their people.

"Day to Day Life," one of the deeper cuts on the album, pretty cool musically, although the lyrics could have been less sappy (it's sort of a break-up song). "23rd And Mad," another great song, has a funk/psychedelic feel to it and closes a pretty average album from an above average group.

Bellamy and Lolly Vegas have since passed away, but Pat Vegas still puts together a band and plays several dates a year as Redbone.

Fun Facts: Jimi Hendrix considered the band one of his favorites, and it is rumored that Pat Vegas co-wrote the theme song to *The Munsters* television show in 1964 with composer Jack Marshall. (*Dennis Donahue*)

Corpse fan might be offended by the lyrics, but only if they're a mamby-pamby girly man.

As you would expect from W.A.S.P., *Golgotha* is loaded with faster songs such as the Bon Jovi-esque "Last Runaway" or "Shotgun," which reminds me a bit of "Blind in Texas," especially in the way Blackie belts out the vocals with the strength of a 20-year-old.

"Slaves of the New World Order" takes advantage of its eightminute length to explore a number of different moods and rhythms,
such as "Let me kick you in the kidneys with my steel toed boots"
in the guitar solo section. On the other end of the spectrum, but also
nearly eight minutes long, is the fervent power ballad "Miss You"
that goes down nice and easy until the chorus, when it steamrolls you
with a wall of sound, paving the way to one of many melodic and
dazzling guitar solos on the album. The whole shebang closes with
the title track, a powerful epic if ever there was one, where Lawless
cries out "Jesus, I need you now" in the chorus with such honest passion that you'll get goosebumps regardless of your chosen deity.

What started out as curiosity has led me to an all new level of respect for Blackie Lawless. Somehow he was able to make a rock solid melodic power metal album that remains true to his faith and yet doesn't alienate those fans who have differing beliefs. (*Jason Hoffman*)

#### **Beach House**

#### Thank Your Lucky Stars

While I consider Beach House a special sort of band, I'd never thought them particularly prolific. This is a band that takes a good couple years in between albums in order to cultivate and organically grow a Beach House record. That sort of melancholy and malaise doesn't just grow on trees



(unless you head up into Northern Michigan, there's an orchard that ... well, another time).

Victoria Legrand and Alex Scally tinker and hone their songs, and albums like *Devotion*, *Teen Dream*, *Bloom* and their most recent record, *Depression Cherry*, are all the better for it. But just as the ink was drying on all those *Depression Cherry* reviews and aching hearts



were healing from the final notes of that album's closing song, "Days of Candy," Legrand and Scally announced they were releasing another album of all new

Thank Your Lucky Stars, released less than two months after Depression Cherry, acts as a bit of a rough-around-the-edges version of Beach House's typical baroque sound. Some have said this is Beach House's "rock" record, and I can't argue with that.

The songs on Thank Your Lucky Stars were recorded during the Depression Cherry sessions, and they do encapsulate the wind-blown mood of that album; yet this new group of tunes offer a grittier take on the Beach House formula. Album opener "Majorette" has that dreamy, ethereal vibe, with Legrand's voice floating on a cloud of reverb and whimsy, but the instrumentation feels more direct. There's less of the losing-things-in-the-ether and more feeling the low end in those programmed beats and calliope-like organ. "She's So Lovely" feels gritty in the ears, like you're listening to this on the beach as gale force winds put 50 pounds of sand in your face. It grinds slowly through four minutes of melancholy. "All Your Yeahs" feels a bit like The xx. It's simpler and more direct than Beach House's normal song structure. "One Thing" is as rock n' roll as Legrand and Scally have gotten to this point. Distorted drums, guitars, and heavy organ offer a solid foundation for Legrand to emote beautifully. Watching them play this live, you get the feeling these two really love to make some noise, with Legrand slapping the neck of her Strat till it starts to squeal feedback.

After you go through Thank Your Lucky Stars a few times, you understand why these songs weren't just tacked onto Depression Cherry and that album made into a double album. Despite many of the same moods and feels that permeate both records, they are indeed two very different vibes. There's more of an in-the-moment vibe with Stars, and that makes this record very much a standalone experience. A song like "Elegy to the Void," with it's 80s synths and Motelslike vocals, seems better suited in this environment than the sultry, lovelorn world of Cherry. "Rough Song" and album closer "Somewhere Tonight" both offer this alternate universe version of a Coney Island sock hop slow dance. That vibe, while not entirely out of place in mood on previous Beach House albums, here seems to stand out more.

Thank Your Lucky Stars was a surprise, for sure, but it's no surprise that it's a great album. While not as lush and layered as it's predecessor, it's still an album that grabs you and doesn't let go. Repeated listens only enhance that. Victoria Legrand and Alex Scally have done it again. #### Destroyer Poison Season

Even if you're only familiar with Dan Bejar from his stints with Canadian indie supergroup The New Pornographers, you know he's a singular talent. And an acquired



For all his melodic brilliance and ability to turn, tweak and bend language to his will, Bejar can jar the listener to (perhaps) the point of distraction with a vocal style that's, well, distinctive, to say the least. It's only once you've acclimated yourself to his unique phrasing that you come to appreciate the rich musical worlds he creates in his songs.

Destroyer's latest, Poison Season, builds on the soft-rock vibe that supported 2011's Kaputt like a well-worn shag carpet. This time around, elegant string arrangements and lonesome pianos coexist with soaring horn parts ("Bangkok"), while a spare, funky bassline drives "Archer on the Beach," despite the song's chilly demeanor. It's not necessarily bleak, but threads of melancholy certainly run through the record. Draped in warm, inviting instrumentation as it is, Poison Season rarely allows glimpses of blue sky, a notable exception being the "rocker" of the album, "Dream Lover." As the pounding drums and insistent guitars and rattling tambourine announce the song, one might expect an early-model Elvis Costello to chime in on vocals. Instead, Bejar's vocal runs more along the lines of a slightly less elfin-sounding Tobin Sprout.

Following the Nelson Riddle-esque introduction, "Times Square, Poison Season I," and its quizzical opening line, "Jesus is beside himself," the second cut on the album seems to pop out of nowhere in its concision and pop-rock skin – then suddenly dives back into the mist. "Forces from Above" follows with a strange brew of the atmospheric, skittish and pensive. Bejar softly sings, "Forces from above denied you the right to be free in your own way / Forces from above, wish you were here, we think the world of you," while skeletal percussion and flitting clarinets propel the song along. Bejar's well-deserved reputation for intelligent writing and inventive songcraft comes to the fore here and throughout the record; it's powerful music that's ultimately calm and communicative at the center, even at its most inscrutable.

Poison Season is often demanding of the listener, but the payoff far exceeds the price of admission. (D.M. Jones)

#### Deerhunter Fading Frontier

Deerhunter exist in a musical spot which, were they to be removed from it, would be an empty hole. Or rather, a lack of a spot. While a particular "sound" doesn't deter-



mine their identity, they're always readily recognizable as Deerhunter when you hear them.

A lesser band might cower at the prospect of falling into repetition or worse: eventual self parody. But Bradford Cox and company are too talented and too busy exploring their capabilities to worry about such things. Like onetime tour-mates Spoon, these guys have yet to release a dud. Fading Frontier is full of heart, at times approaching the celebratory ("Take your handicaps / Channel them and feed them back / Til they become your strengths," Cox sings on "All the Same") but refusing to look away from the mundane and heartbreaking details.

Injured in a 2014 car accident, Cox has mentioned how his physical recovery and subsequent depression informed Fading Frontier. But the album feels buoyed by experience rather than pulled down by fortune. "Jackknifed / On the side-street crossing / I'm still alive / And that's something," Cox sings in the beautifully catchy "Breaker." He concludes, "And when I die / There will be nothing to say / Except I tried / Not to waste another day / Trying to stem the

Musically, Fading Frontier is a feast. Strutting like a 70s Bowie outtake, "Snakeskin" radiates with energy, while the waltzing "Take Care" and regal, crystalline "Duplex Planet" recall the tender side of 2010's Halcyon Digest. And though it lacks the rough immediacy and energy that poured out of 2013's Monomania, Fading Frontier hits the heart via its own trajectory. "I can't believe there is no hope," Cox sings in "Leather and Wood," a positive forcing its way through cracks in the negative. This is an emotionally honest and eminently listenable record, and it's bound to stand up as a highlight in a singular band's already loaded catalog. (D.M. Jones)

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

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## Burnt Stars Gooper, Not Food

Burnt, the new film from screenwriter Steven Knight (Dirty Pretty Things and last year's foodie film The Hundred Foot Journey) and John Wells, follows a tried and true recipe. In Burnt, the backdrop is the world of chefs and haute cuisine, but this same recipe is used for movies about sports figures, artists, singers, teachers, moms and dads – really just about everyone who has an ideal and stumbles badly on the way to reaching their goal. Burnt's flavor is comfort food, not haute cuisine, and it is tasty and comforting.

As cooks know, a successful dish begins with high quality ingredients. So, and I mean this in the nicest possible way, think of Bradley Cooper as a prime piece of meat, juicy and fresh, able to bring to life any flavor profile and raise the possibilities for any garnish

I love Cooper, and I appreciate that he has spoken in support of Jennifer Lawrence and the half of our species trying to get equal pay and influence in the movie world. If calling him meat sounds offensive, I refer you to *Bull Durham* or a quick review of the hacked Sony e-mails about women. I'm pretty sure he can take it. I certainly admire his willingness to take on something less ponderous than *American Sniper* to cleanse the palate.

In *Burnt* Cooper plays Adam Jones, a once hot celebrity chef, now in recovery. Born into a dysfunctional family, he found refuge in a restaurant kitchen at the age of 14. He cooked his way to a two-star Michelin restaurant in Paris until he crashed and burned. He admits he became an awful human, a drug-addled, arrogant bully and egomaniac. Sometimes, he shrugs, "my food was almost as good as I thought it was."

Adam is meting out his own punishment in New Orleans, shucking oysters keeping careful count. He's

two years clean and thinks he's ready for a resurrection. He thinks he's ready to open a restaurant, in London this time, and go for his third Michelin star.

This involves reconnecting with the people who were part of the messes he left behind. Most are surprisingly easy to get on board. The ease of securing funds, space and staff for the new endeavor, we are led to believe, is because Adam is just so talented charming, handsome and sexy. Even Bradley Cooper has trouble dragging that baggage over his past and present behavior.

Recruiting new people is more arduous. He wins over an aspiring sous chef, David (Sam Keeley), even convincing the guy to let him live in his spare bedroom. When asked why anyone would put up with this apartment crasher, David explains the importance of the Michelin system: one star makes you Luke Skywalker; two makes you "whoever Alec Guinness played in *Star Wars*"; a third would make Adam Yoda.

But no number of stars will make Adam Yoda. He's sober, but he's still struggling on the jerk front. He gets regular drug tests from a therapist (Emma Thompson, a very believable sounding board) to prove he's clean. Thompson offers advice and tries to get him to attend meetings, but he has trouble listening.

## New James Bond Film Opens Big

Tops at the Box: Sam Mendes' and Daniel Craig's latest Bond effort, *Spectre*, delivered, selling over \$73 million in tickets in the U.S. over its first three days of release, good enough for the top spot at the box. Not only are reviews great and the buzz strong, but the film has already sold \$226 million in tickets abroad, making it one of the biggest Bond openings to date. I'm not a big *Star Trek* fan, but I do tend to really like the Bond films – especially the Daniel Craig films, which I personally think eclipse what the series was prior to his involvement. With Craig probably leaving the role for good, here's hoping they pick a worthy successor. Seems that everyone really wants Idris Elba, which I am *totally* on board with. And Rita Ora as the Bond girl, please and thank you.

Also at the Box: The Peanuts Movie, which I desperately want to see for some reason (nostalgia, duh), also performed very well over its first three days of release, selling an impressive \$45 million in tickets despite still having quite a bit of active competition in the youth market. Reviews aren't the greatest for the film, but that was expected, given the nature of the material and how it was re-imagined.

Taking the No. 3 spot at last weekend's U.S. box office was, of course, the juggernaut that is Ridley Scott's *The Martian*, which sold another \$9.3 million and is quickly approaching the \$200 million sales mark in the U.S. Add in abroad ticket sales and *The Martian* will probably break the \$500 million mark. It's rare that a great director, a great actor and a great script kill at the box office all around the world. Look for this one to be a surprise come awards season.



Taking the No. 4 spot at last weekend's box office was this silly *Goosebumps* film that I hope to never have to type another word about. The movie sold another \$7 million at the box, bringing the film's total to \$66 million in the U.S. and \$92 million worldwide.

Rounding out last weekend's Top 10 was *Bridge* of Spies which sold just over \$6 million over its fourth weekend. This Spielberg film has sold just \$55 million in the U.S. and \$72 million worldwide so far. Ouch. Those are definitely not Spielberg numbers. Supposedly the movie is pretty great. Also of note: this "indie" film called *Brooklyn* opened on five screens last weekend and sold a stellar \$237,000. Good enough for over \$36,000 per screen a startling average. Look for this one to expand soon.

## Songs in 14 Lines

Pop Sonnets by Erik Didriksen, Quirk Books, 2015

There really shouldn't be much to

say about Erik Didriksen's *Pop Sonnets*, and by attempting to look at this little collection of poems deeply, I'm at risk of being that guy who nobody likes to talk to because he takes everything too seriously. I'm going to do it, though, because I kinda am that guy, and this book is worth at least a few words of careful consideration. So, here we go.

The premise here is simple: what if contemporary pop songs were re-imagined as Shake-spearean sonnets, with the sonnet's form and rhyme scheme

restrictions in place and the Bard's

17th-century language in place of our modern English usage?

It's the kind of clever but limited gimmick that would be perfectly suited to a blog on which the author posted a new popsong-inspired sonnet each week. In fact, that's exactly where the idea comes from - Didriksen's Pop Sonnets has been a popular Tumblr for quite a few months at this point - and in one of those instances of questionable medium crossover, a bunch of the sonnets have been gathered into an ink-on-paper book and published by Quirk Books.

Don't get me wrong. Didriksen's work is very clever, and the joke of casting trifling pop songs in the language and verse form of the kind of poetry we've been conditioned to think of as serious is, more often than not, very funny.

Sometimes the joke is in how the Shakespearean tone can lend weight to a song that, in its original form, is fluffy to the point of weightlessness. Consider the chorus of this one, which becomes virtually unrecognizable in the Bard's tongue:

"Though we've each other only moments known my heart doth fling fair Logic now away!

"I beg thee, take my favor for thine own – perchance to call upon me soon, I pray!"

Can you guess the original? Hint: you were really, really, re-



ally sick of hearing it back in 2012.

Sometimes the Elizabethan treatment is surprisingly artful, pointing out both Didriksen's talent and the underlying strength of the pop song on which the poem is based. Take, for example, this rewriting of Van Morrison's "Brown-Eyed Girl":

"Such mem'ries wait where once our love did grow soaked all with rain.

"How quickly we'd descend into the forested ravine below

to dance and play in th' mists of dawn, sweet friend!"

That's good stuff, no matter how you look at it. Of course, some songs resist the gimmick. There's no turning Nicki Minaj's "Super Bass" or Katy Perry's "I Kissed a Girl" into art, matter how you try.

no matter how you try.
Sometimes Didriksen's powers of interpretation fail him, too, and he ends up simply spitting out the original fluff undigested, such as when he ends the Cyndi Lauper classic with the couplet, "I'll walk within the sun's enliv'ning rays / for girls just want some fun within their days."

It's without question that Didriksen has an entertaining thing going here. The question, however, is why it needs to be a book.

Frankly, I don't have an answer to that question. Sure, if you've got a friend with both a love of Shakespeare and a sense of humor, this little book would make a decent gift. It would be much cheaper, though, to just give them the URL to the Tumblr rather than shelling out \$14 for the hard-cover - and, compared to the constantly updating blog, finite - version of Pop Sonnets. It seems a sacrilege to say that this book that pays tribute to the most traditional of all sonnet writers is better off staying on the internet, and even though it pains me to do so, I have to say

The addition to the kitchen Adam really wants is Helene, a very talented saucier (the very talented Sienna Miller). He get's her fired so she has to go to work with him. She has a young daughter to support. (Children sick of their parent's long hours as a chef is a frequent ingredient in food flicks.)

Winning Helene over is an obstacle. Some bad characters are pressuring Adam over past drug debts. There is betrayal in the kitchen. Adam gets cut off at the pass. But finally, these tribulations teach Adam how to be a better person, so we know that third star is coming.

Whole networks are devoted to food. Cooking competitions for adults (some of whom behave like children) and children (who behave with maturity beyond their years) litter the landscape. All we don't

have yet is a workplace comedy set in a restaurant.

For *Burnt*, no less than Mario Batali and Marcus Wareing are listed as the consultants. The knife skills are impressive, and the whole film is lovely, but I do wish when the beautiful food is coming out of the kitchen, the camera spent more time on the food and the pleasure it gives people. Adam says he wants to be creating culinary orgasms, and that doesn't quite happen.

From Babette's Feast flows an ever-widening stream of food movies. Big Night, Eat, Drink, Man, Woman, Like Water for Chocolate, The Lunch Box. Mostly Martha, Tortilla Soup and What's Cooking are a few of my favorites.

Observant Civic patrons will recall the 2012 play version and note that the musical that opened on Broadway that same night differs from the earlier play.

The songs have allowed A Christmas Story – The Musical to tighten up the story by tucking in subplots like the many ways Ralphie's dream gun will impress the womenfolk and help keep Hohman, Indiana safer from a wide range of villains. The children's parts are mostly now expressed in song, which means younger actors can carry them well, with the adult narrator as our guide through the story.

That story is still based on the now-classic 1983 movie A Christmas Story that was adapted from the works of Hammond-raised radio personality Jean Shepherd. Like The Wizard of Oz before it, the film won immortality thanks to television's need for something to show. As a movie pointedly without profanity or violence, the original A Christmas Story was perfect for 24-hour marathon showing on cable TV, burning such key images as the leg lamp, overstuffed snowsuits, Red Ryder BB guns and "you'll shoot your eye out" into the holiday lexicon.

The new music and lyrics by Benj Pasek and Justin Paul take those moments and lift them into songs like "Counting Down to Christmas," the catchy "Ralphie to the Rescue" (which I am humming as I write this report), the hilarious "A Major Award," a big production number that transforms a classroom into a speakeasy for "You'll Shoot Your Eye Out" and the sweet concluding song, "A Christmas Story."

Guest director and choreographer Doug King and music director Eunice Wadewitz have worked together on many shows over the past decade with excellent results each time, and this show is no exception. A Christmas Story – the Musical has a light, loose energy that makes it easy to laugh and enjoy the antics of an excellent cast in an eye-popping Derek Blanco-designed set with lighting design by Corey Lee. The rolling scenery shifts and huge chunks spin quickly or fly down from above to change the Parker's Cleveland Street house into Higbees into Harding Elementary and more, all in the twinkling of an eye. Hats off to Nan Durant's stage crew for muscling everything into place!

The cast is top-notch. Ken Low is terrific as narrator Shepherd. He has that gentle voice and full engagement that made Shep such a great storyteller. And as Red Ryder, Low rocks those white fluffy chaps that are just part of the costume array from Schellie Englehart and crew. Special kudos for the dancing leg lamps!

The Parker family are all really good, starting with The Old Man played with grumpy perfection and a Mel Brooks kind of abandon by Todd Frymier. Whether dueling with the Bumpus dogs, the klinkers in the furnace or flat tires, he is amazing. Why, one might almost say he's "The Genius of Cleveland Street." His Major Award number is hilarious.

As the central character of Ralphie, Chali Moss has a great voice and wistful demeanor, and once the wig folks got that blonde wig adjusted. Ralphie was ready to come to the rescue. As little brother Randy, Duncan Keirns is very funny, whether he is indulging in whines or screams, oinking as "Mommy's little piggie" or rolling in the alley in that red snowsuit. And in the low-key but sweet role of Mother, Aimee Lackey is as calm and loveable and patient as any mother can be stepping from the glow of nostalgia for 1940.

Ralphie's pals Schwartz (Miles Fedders) and Flick (Philip Waldorf) get some good moments, especially around the Harding schoolyard flagpole. And the bullies, Scut Farkus (Aaron Berghoff) and Grover Dill (Louie Perl) play their bad guy parts with only a little menace, which is good.





With a musical score as challenging as Andrew Lloyd Webber and Tim Rice's Jesus Christ Superstar, a cast of strong singers and performers is an absolute necessity, and the University of Saint Francis' production downtown does not disappoint. The show - comprised of a talented cast of USF students, high school students and community artists – is massive in scope. The leading players captured the rock n' roll style of the show well and handled the vocally exhausting op-

The Robert Goldstein Performing Arts Center is a stage that provides both opportunities and chal-

lenges, and in a few of the larger cast numbers some of the ensemble's vocal power was a little lost in the enormity of the space. But their physical energy made up for whatever became unclear vocally. The group radiated their excitement to be celebrating the university's 125th year, and it was truly a pleasure to watch.

On the acting front, Jake Wilhelm's portrayal of Jesus Christ was that of a conflicted and complex martyr chained by the inevitability of his fate. Wilhelm colored the role with both tremendous love and deep despair. His sorrowful rendition of "Gethsemane" was heartbreaking. Ennis Brown Jr.'s Judas was captivating from the moment he stepped on stage and only got better as the action went on, jumping smoothly between a tough critic to a regretful friend. Clare Ramel as Mary was wonderfully genuine, and her every interaction with her onstage companions was warm and heartfelt. As the decadent Herod, Gary Lanier was a riot with the show stopping "King Herod's Song." And Stuart Hepler's charismatic Pilate was remarkably compelling. His crystal clear and honey-smooth

The spectacle of Superstar was one of its strongest elements. Visually, it is stunning. The use of projections was an interesting touch on the already modernized production, and special lighting bathed

each scene in emotional intensity. Actors entered the space in ways that broke conventional theater rules. coming in not only from the wings but from beneath the stage and through the audience. When the full cast was on stage, there was nowhere to look where nothing was happening. This was particularly true during the Act

I number "The Temple." Set in a colorful and circuslike atmosphere, it features the exciting special talents of the ensemble.

Perhaps the most iconic moment of the show was the crucifixion of Jesus Christ. Covered in blood and writhing in pain, Wilhelm dragging the weight of the cross alongside a chorus of glittering dancers was breathtaking in its tragic contrast. Director Brad Beauchamp's vision for the downfall of Jesus was clear and inspired. The image of Wilhelm crowned in thorns and hanging alone on the cross is something I am not soon to forget. The team behind USF's Superstar should be proud of this wonderful celebration of their 125th anniversary.



Wonder no more! A group of eight energetic and creative actors are waiting to enlighten you as all for One productions presents The Just So Stories (adapted by Joseph Robinette from stories by Rudyard Kipling).

In this lively stage version, Rudyard's daughter, Elsie Kipling, and her friends are enjoying acting out five of these tales written by Elsie's father to entertain his children.

Kipling seems to have enjoyed blending geography, biology and fantasy in his explanations of how certain animals came to be as they are now. Often in his tales a magical person is involved (as in "How the Rhino Got His Skin"); other times it is the animal's own ingenuity or actions which cause the change (see "How the Armadillo Came to Be").

Guest director Lorraine Knox has chosen to expand on Kipling's whimsical mixture of fact and fancy, allowing deliberate anachronisms to be introduced. The stories and the actors all seem to exist outside of any fixed time-line or geography, which adds to the humor and high jinx.

While Knox has beautifully conceived this colorful staging (all for One's first play to be done in the round) her daughter Sophie, an art major at the University of Saint Francis, has designed the fanciful and elaborate animal headdresses. Making it a true family affair, husband Lee constructed the simple set pieces (a round ottoman, and four different doorways—one at each corner of the stage). Additional accents pieces are being created by our costumer Deanna Deturk and properties mistress Christine Newman-Aumiller. Veteran sound designer Scott Kump has composed original music for underscoring and for the choreography added by Mia Bendele just for our production.

Story lovers of all ages will be entertained to watch these talented young people as they become animals, wizards, trees and water. The cast includes afO Home Stage veterans Shannon Livengood (seen last season as Maja in *The Music Lesson*), Maddie Gerig (last season's Laura Ingalls), and Annika Kroeker (Princess Irene in *The Princess and the Goblin*), along with Jonas Anderson, Aiden Kroeker, Jadon Moore, Lydia Scott and Jonathan Young.

The Just So Stories will be presented for eight performances – rather than our usual six – in the PPG ArtsLab. Evening performances will be Fridays and Saturdays at 7 p.m., November 13, 14, 20 and 21. Matinees will be offered at 2:30 p.m. on Saturdays and Sundays, November 14, 15, 21 and 22.

In this telling, Ralphie's teacher Miss Shields has a bigger role, one for which Stephanie Longbrake is very well-suited. She does a wonderful job of singing, dancing (tap even!) and reacting to the kids' antics. Another non-family adult of note is Higbee's Santa Claus, played with plenty of boozy impatience by Ben Wedler.

By the way, if you are looking for an unusual photo for that family holiday photo-card, you might like to know that the Civic Theatre Guild is sponsoring a special "Luncheon & Show" event that includes opportunities for photos with the characters from the show. The festivities are this Sunday at noon. Tickets, which include the show, are \$38 for adults and \$32 for children 10 and under. Season ticket holders may add on the luncheon for \$20 per person.

## A Collaborative Study of Loss

God's Ear is truly a strange and fascinating play to explore. The writing leaves much of the theatrical production open for the designers and director to develop their own unique presentation.

Theater has always been an important means for dealing with difficult subject matter, and the duty to accurately and respectfully portray the grieving process and the strain such a loss places on the family was not lost on all involved in this production. Few involved, myself included, could ever understand the loss of a child, but the weight of the play required exploration into this situation. I am proud of the respect with which this matter was approached.

As stage manager, it has been a joy watching all of the theatrical elements come together to form this marvelously intricate production. Lighting, sound, and scenic design form the world of a play; the space in which the actors are able to live as their characters while their costumes allow them to embody the character that much more.

The interdependence of designer and actor is one of the most beautiful aspects of the theater. While the director must guide both sides of the production, stage managers hold the only other position with so close an involvement with the production as a whole. Being present at every rehearsal and production meeting, I have watched this production grow from an idea into a reality. I view the stage manager as the facilitator of this growth.

When I entered the department two years ago, I was not entirely sure what I wanted to do with theater. I was drawn to the art, but hadn't found a place I felt completely comfortable. Stage management allows me to enable the artistic vision of the show. The con-



stant problem solving and analytical thinking behind the art is appealing to me. As the greatest collaborative art, theater necessitates a stage manager to oversee the various elements involved. Working on *God's Ear*, it was quickly apparent that these elements were vital. While the language is evocative and rarely ceasing, the themes and explorations in the play only come to life with the addition of all of its elements.

I have gained a greater appreciation for theater than I ever thought possible while attending IPFW. It is easy to view a production as a whole when only seeing the final show, but the true beauty of theater is the individual parts developing into that final production. I hope everyone can learn to see this beauty as well and appreciate the masterful collaboration needed to develop into an impactful theatrical production.
