A Dream Reborn

There are those who might describe Charlie Noble, the late founder of the Key Palace Theatre in Redkey, as a visionary and a force of nature.

But some townspeople had a different word to describe him back when he was trying to get something – anything – off the ground in Redkey in the 1980s.

"People thought he was an idiot," said John Runyon, the club's new

owner

Legend has it that Noble, who grew up in Muncie, was working at a fish processing plant in Alaska in the late 1970s when he ran into a Hoosier friend who informed him that a former one-room schoolhouse outside of Redkey had come up for sale.

For reasons that can only be guessed, Noble bought the school-house so he could live in it.

Noble later bought a bank building in Redkey and allegedly tried to turn it into a Dixieland jazz

club, an entertainment concept that might not even work in New Orleans anymore, but surely wasn't a good fit for Redkey.

Eventually, he acquired an old movie theater and turned it into a blues club called the Key Palace Theatre (after experimenting with theatrical shows and country music).

Blues clubs opened and closed in the 1990s in nearby Fort Wayne, a city with hundreds of thousands of residents.

Redkey has less than 1,500 residents, but something sort of magical happened at the Key Palace Theatre.

It became known as one of the best blues clubs in America, a sentiment that was shared with Jay Leno and the nation by Leon Redbone on *The Tonight Show*.

It regularly drew patrons from Indianapolis and Columbus, Ohio, not to mention even more far-flung locales, Runyon said.

Runyon said Noble used to let him and his friends in the back door of the club when they were technically too young to occupy such an establishment.

It may be that the Key Palace Theatre owes its success to Noble's quirks, eccentricities and stubborn tolerance of economic discomfort.

At any rate, when he died in 2010, the club essentially died with him. His successors could not make it work.

The club sat empty for three years, and when the property came up in a tax sale in early 2015, Runyon took a tour.

"I took a look around," he said, "and something just fell on me while I was in there and I decided I just had to have the place."

When he says something just fell on him, he is referring to an emotion.

But he's lucky something more literal didn't fall on him.

"Oh, it was in terrible shape," Runyon said. "The ceiling in the theater had fallen in. The roof was an ailing problem when Charlie had it, and he just had to suffer through it. He could never get the money to get the roof fixed."



Runyon said they had to haul "tons of moldy junk out of there."

There were also egregious plumbing and foundation issues, Runyon said. But a number of companies in the region donated time and materials to help get the club up and running.

Runyon said he took possession of the building on September 5, and he was able to present his first show on October 3.

The inaugural concert by the Stacy Mitchhart Band was standing room only, he

To help make the resurrected Key Palace a success, Runyon is moving a diner he owns across the street into the Key Palace space.

That way, there will be something open for business and generating income every day.

And he said he's going to diversify the programming at the Key Palace to include plays, gospel, country, rock, comedians, lecturers and youth nights.

One aspect of running this business that will take some getting used to is Runyon's role as master of ceremonies.

Noble was a showman and a ham and was always capable of supplying memorable pre-show banter.

"Charlie had a great personality," he said. "He had a lot better stage presence than I have. I am getting better at it. But there really were a lot of people who came here just

"I don't know that anybody wants me to get up there and tell jokes," Runyon said, "but we'll see what happens over the years."

So read on, find some fun things to do and have a fantastic Christmas and New Year's. See you in 2016!

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

Feature • USF Music Tech Program

The University of Saint Francis has long been an important institution in Fort Wayne. As the university celebrates its 125th anniversary, it is clear that the school's administration is not content to rest on its laurels. In fact, in the last few years the School of

Creative Arts has not only added programming to their academic offerings, but they have reached into the community to become part of the business and downtown growth this area has enjoyed recently.

With their new dance major, USF has collaborated with Fort Wayne Ballet, itself about to celebrate its 60th anniversary, to enrich not only the creative options at the university but the academic options for FWB dancers. In acquiring the former Scottish Rite auditorium - now called the USF Robert Goldstine Performing Arts Center the university expanded its geographic reach as well, providing another venue to the growing downtown arts scene. Since that acquisition in 2012, the venue has hosted 53 USF events and 17 non-USF events, attracting more than 30,000 attendees.

Another area of growth has been the USF Music Tech program, one which has close

ties to one of Fort Wayne's largest and most prestigious employers, Sweetwater Sound. The program, which began in 2008, already has a long list of successful alumni working both at Sweetwater and in positions around

Jeff Rodgers was an employee of Sweetwater, as well as a part-time faculty member of USF, when he was tapped to serve as director of the music tech program.

"I had already been teaching at Saint Francis part-time, then started teaching full-time," says Rodgers. "The program began growing so quickly that I just transitioned into this job here. I never actually quit at Sweetwater. I just was suddenly here all the time. I even still have my Sweetwater badge!'

In a few short years the program has grown quickly, hitting 60 students before a recent graduation left them with 55. But there's room for more growth in the coming years, thanks to a move from the Saint Francis campus to the new USF facility in the former Chamber of Commerce building downtown. With work set to be completed in the summer, faculty should move into their offices before the start of the fall 2016 semester. The change of scenery allows for a lot of positive changes for the program.

"We're going to have a lot of things that we don't have now," says Rodgers. "Dedicated practice rooms instead of just whatever space you can find, for one thing. We'll also have mix suites and rooms for mixing and editing productions. There will also be a dedicated piano lab. But one of the best parts of the move downtown is that we create so

many more opportunities for students positions at Sweetwater, a number Chuck Surack, founder and president of Sweetwater, confirms with some surprise. "I had no idea we had that many," admits Surack. "I would say the program has been wildly successful from my point of view. Our University of Saint Francis graduates are great employees, and I am so honored and thrilled to have them on our team. They are Sweetwater's future."

With internships and part-time positions available for current students, it becomes

an easy transition for those who have com-

pleted their degrees. Rodgers says that 31 of the program's alumni have already found

> "I had been a supporter of the school for quite awhile," says Surack. "I was happy that Rick and I both had the same vision for this and thought it would be perfect for Saint Francis students. At the time we were first looking at it, we actually had an even closer geographic connection because we were still in our building on Bass Road which would have been even

more synergetic. But their move to downtown, with the connections with schools and churches down there and the opportunities they'll have, is just going to be wildly successful."

Surack is also happy to have his former employee heading the program.

"Jeff knows what skills we need and is able to teach those to others. USF is lucky to have Jeff there as a leader and mentor."

Rodgers is one of three full-time faculty members at this time, with one part-time and a handful of adjuncts available for some of the specialized courses the major requires. Once the move downtown is completed, the program should be able to comfortably serve more than 100 students, allowing it to more than double from its current numbers. While other music programs focus primarily on classical music, Rodgers says the music tech students can run the gamut, from rock to jazz, country to hip hop, allowing them to learn composition of a variety of musical forms, better preparing them to write anything from a performance piece to a commercial jingle.

"All of these experiences provide them with more opportunities in technology and

Of course, this is where having a connection to Sweetwater Sound comes in handy, not only for the university but for those



downtown, so they can develop themselves professionally. They can make connections with the churches, clubs, music venues. Places like the stadium and Come2Go will be in walking distance for them."

Additionally, the location allows them easy access to the university's own Performing Arts Center where they can provide production assistance to that expanding venue programming for both USF and other organizations in the community. The experience is part of what differentiates the music tech program from other music majors around the

"Music tech provides a more tangible option than other music programs since a music major typically focuses on performance or conducting or being a music educator. But a music tech program prepares you for jobs related to music in other areas like audio, TV, film, videogames."

Creating a Downtown 'Collision Space'

In August, the pool of prospective firms vying to redevelop The Landing was simmered down to three finalists. At some point during the audition process, something happened that might not have happened 20 or more years before: Three of those firms reached out to Arts United to see how they could coordinate their visions for that charming stretch of historic Columbia Street with what the fundraising arts council had done and was hoping still to do on nearby East Main Street, according to Dan Ross, Arts United's director of community development.

'Three of them reached out to us to say, 'Hey, what are you guys doing with the Arts Campus," Ross recalled, "because we've had conversations connecting the Arts Campus and Freimann Square to the Landing.

The Arts Campus – which now includes the expanded Fort Wayne Museum of Art, Arts United Center and all the Auer Center's artistic tenants (Artlink, the Fort Wayne Ballet and Arts United's ArtsLab) - is inspired by architect Louis Kahn's plans for that area, plans that never fully came to fruition in the 1960s due to lack of funding.

Arts United's president Susan Mendenhall said a lot of the people who are working on improving downtown Fort Wayne these days share the same "big picture

People coordinating autonomous efforts feels like a relatively new phenomenon for Fort Wayne.

Two decades ago, downtown Fort Wayne was (in this reporter's estimation) one tumbleweed short of a ghost town and was as empty most weekends as an Antarctic research

There were people back then who said, "Let downtown die." Some of those same people today probably enjoy Parkview Field just as much as anybody, and some of them probably gaze upon the ever-escalating resplendency of downtown and see only wretched excess.

Downtown Fort Wayne was not allowed to die, it goes without saying. Indeed, it seems more full of life with each passing year, and Arts United has been a big part of the re-

vivification process. Ross, who first came to Fort Wayne in the late 1980s, said the last six or seven years have been the most exciting years of his Summit City residency.

'And it really looks like the next six or seven are going to be even better," he said.

Mendenhall said she recently participated in a focus group for the Northeast Indiana Regional Partnership about talent attraction and retention, and a theme of the discussion was that Fort Wayne has evolved into a city for builders of various kinds, meaning people who want to create rather than just lie back and enjoy what has already been created.

'If you're someone who has interest, passion and vision,

it can happen here," she said.

Mendenhall has been in charge of Arts United for almost two years, having taken the reins in January 2014 from someone who wasn't even holding them at the time: Jim

Sparrow had already departed in September of the previous year for a job in North Carolina after seven years as Arts United's head

Mendenhall was born in Indianapolis, spent some time in the development department of the Fort Wayne Philharmonic, took a fellowship with the Atlanta Symphony and spent a year in Colombia, the birth country of her husband.

While in Colombia, she wrote grants for Arts United that helped the organization advance the Auer Center project.

After her return to Fort Wayne, Mendenhall realized that the downtown vibe had changed, aided in no small part by the addition of Parkview Field.

"The biggest change was social," she said. "Suddenly, people were actively finding excuses and places to linger."

The downtown Fort Wayne of the late 20th century was an event-oriented place, she said. People came downtown for a purpose and departed after that purpose was fulfilled. The downtown Fort Wayne of the 21st century is looking more and more like "an urban neighborhood in which people slow down and explore," Mendenhall said.

"Restaurants, cafes, trails, galleries, retail, festivals, public art and creative activities are like magnets for people," she said. "People are attracted to people. Human beings seek out social interaction in dynamic, authentic, welcoming places, and our downtown is becoming that go-to place for northeast Indiana"

With human interactions in mind, Mendenhall in October announced Arts United's intention to improve and grow the Arts Campus.

The master plan includes refurbishing the aging Arts United Center and establishing better pedestrian routes connecting the Arts Campus, the Landing and the developing riverfront, among other locales.

Mendenhall thinks in terms of "third place collision spaces." The phrase "third places" refers to locales that are neither home nor office. "Collision spaces," despite any fender-bending connotations, refers not to automotive encounters but human encounters.

They're the nice collisions that happen when people who wouldn't naturally cross paths in their daily lives meet up and decide they should get to know each other better, perhaps even build a few things together.

Mendenhall said arts and culture "uniquely brings people and engages them in the community."

Arts and culture "helps them meet and see other people who don't necessarily look or sound like them," she said.

When this reporter arrived in Fort Wayne in the late 90s, downtown Fort Wayne wasn't merely un-walkable; it seemed hostile to pedestrians.

Now, everyone in town is thinking in terms of "walkability," Mendenhall said.

"The 'walkability' of downtown is a priority that has been incorporated in community development plans by the City of Fort Wayne and Greater Fort Wayne," she said. "The Arts Campus isn't an island. It's an interconnected hub of activity in downtown. We are very intentionally looking at ways to improve pedestrian connectivity with nearby corridors, and we have a unique envision that a 'night out on the town' will mean parking your bike or car, dining at a hip bistro on Columbia Street and walking over to a show or exhibit at the Arts Campus.'

Making downtown Fort Wayne a friendlier place in which to linger goes hand-in-hand with a more traditional Arts United goal: Helping member organizations grow their audiences.

Mendenhall and Rena Burden, Arts United's director of development, came up this year with a hip and innovative way to subsidize projects that can't be funded through more traditional means: Crowdfunding.

A crowdfunding initiative called Amplify Art will bring four projects to fruition: an inflatable

outdoor screen for Cinema Center, rooftop terrace concerts for the Embassy Theatre, science-minded theatrical presentations for Science Central and the Civic Theatre and crosswalk murals for Artlink.

Crowdfunding not only makes things happen that would not have otherwise happened, Burden said, but it gets the community more viscerally involved in helping local arts or-

People who make small donations to a crowdfunding campaign really feel like they've had a direct role in making something come to life, she said.

There was an over-arching message to all the research. focus groups, interviews, surveys, town hall meetings and committee meetings Mendenhall spearheaded after taking over Arts United: the need for advocacy and promotion.

And connectivity is a huge part of that: creating new connections between patrons and arts organizations and new connections between arts organizations and other downtown

"This is such a magical time for this community" she said. "It's just an exciting time where the topic on people's minds is quality of life, it's talent attraction and retention, it's arts and culture, and it's how our community is perceived by others. It's just such a powerful message that goes way beyond arts and culture. But it's a really great time to be a part of the arts and cultural ecosystem.'

contemporary music," says Rodgers. "The more that you can do and do well, the more versatile you'll be.'

Not all alumni of the USF music tech program end up with Sweetwater, which also pleases both Rodgers and Surack. Graduates have found jobs in a range of fields around the country, and not surprisingly the program's reputation has also spread to draw students from places outside of Fort Wayne.

"We are starting to get a lot more applicants from outside of our area," says Rodgers. "We have applicants now from Chicago, Maryland, Arizona, California. We are definitely attracting more national interest. I think once students discover how affordable Saint Francis is, there will continue to be more interest. People assume because it's a private school that it's expensive, but we have a lot of scholarships and financial aid which makes it the same or maybe even less than a state school."

With a wealth of opportunities afforded them, it's not surprising that Rodgers and Surack are both pleased that so many of the graduates have opted to stay closer to home, to stay in the community and contribute to the success of Fort Wayne and of Sweetwa-

"Sweetwater is a great place to work," says Rodgers. "It has a lot of great amenities. and a great variety of jobs between the warehouse and the tech support. And Sweetwater really provides them with great experiences while they're students. They get to learn as much as they can take in."





Beamer's Steaks Deliver the Sizzle

Brandon Gump, the manager of Beamer's Sports Grill, is a chef at heart. After attending culinary arts school in Louisville, he did stints with restaurants in Chicago and then in Fort Wayne. At Beamer's he wanted to create a dining experience beyond the typical bar menu of burgers, wings, pizza, breaded tenderloins and so on.

A few months ago he started Steak Dinner Night. Every Friday he whips up a meal of New York strip, ribeye or prime rib and a side preceded by a salad. Sounds good, though it strays a bit from the mandate of this column which is to explore the region's vast river of bar food. But hey, Beamer's is a bar and steak is food, so off we go.

Beamer's sits at the western edge of Allen County near the corner of U.S. 30 and County Line Road. It has a pool table, a stage where live music happens every week and a variety of arcade-type games, including one of those punching things that measures the player's level of inebriation.

Because of its location, Beamer's also has a smoke 'em if you got 'em policy. The smoke eaters do a valiant job, sucking in enough air to keep the band and the punchers clearly visible, but not enough to keep your clothes from smelling like Sean Penn's dressing room.

The smoking aside, Beamer's is a friendly place filled with friendly staff and patrons. It's also filled with good food, including outstanding fish tacos and a burger topped with bacon, peanut butter and a fried egg served on a pretzel bun.

On a recent Friday night, the cut of choice was ribeye, a 14-ounce slab of meat that owned the center of the square white plate it came on. It arrived as ordered, medium rare, with a grid of crispy grill marks like you see on television and in glossy print ads. And its flavor matched the sizzle those "Mad Men" covet.

Thankfully, the fresh mixed greens salad that came before it, adorned with grape tomato halves, cucumber and green pepper, was plentiful enough to soften the hunger pangs but not so large as to silence them. Goldilocks would have loved it. The blue cheese dressing was creamy and blue-cheese chunky.

The side was button mushroom caps stuffed with brie and hog jowl bacon. The brie and bacon shared space equally in their cozy mushroom nest and on the palate.

Beer-wise Beamer's has a decent selection of craft beers in bottles and on tap, along with the usual suspects. There is also top-shelf booze. I had a Bell's Tw Hearted Ale to start, but then decided the elegance of the meal required a beverage a bit more sophisticated. I requested a Manhattan.

Maria, the lovely woman behind the bar, deferred to Gump, whose duties that evening included not only cooking but delivering food, chatting with regulars and helping with everything else. (Beamer's is a busy place.)

It turns out that Gump keeps on hand a pre-mixed Manhattan concoction made with Canadian rye whisky, sweet and dry vermouth and orange bitters. He blends the liquor, adds a little water to soften it then ages it for five weeks in a small oak barrel. Served chilled in a Champagne saucer with a cherry, it was the best Manhattan I've had.

We give Beamer's four-and-a-half napkins on a scale of five.

The appropriately titled Paper Gods Tour visits Chicago for two nights July 8-9 and Detroit July 11. **Chic**, featuring **Nile Rodgers**, will open the Detroit date while the Chicago opener is still unannounced.

Animal Collective have marked February 19 as the day they will release their 10th LP, *Painting With*. They will also begin their tour that day in Philadelphia and head to Columbus, Ohio February 26 and Chicago February 27. Legendary rockers **Suicidal Tendencies** are providing direct support for the tour while **Havok** and **Children of Bodom** are slated as opening acts.

If ever there were a show tailor-made for me, this one may be the one. Savage Arena, on the campus of my alma mater, the University of Toledo, is where I will be on March 19 for Rock the Arena, an all-day concert featuring some of the better rock acts from the late 80s and early 90s. **Bret Michaels** is headlining the event that also sees **Ratt**, **Warrant**, **Winger**, **Lita Ford**, **Firehouse**, **LA Guns** and **Trixter** on the bill. Tickets are on sale now and range from \$35-\$125. If you're a fan of this era of music, you know how cool this show will be.



How do you find yourself listening to Sunn O)))? What makes you decide to buy tickets to see Sunn O)), donning cloaks and floating in a sea of fog machine emissions in some small theater as the ceiling tiles shake and plaster cracks and crumbles from the sheer hellish volume they create?



In the past I've listened to Sunn O))) out of morbid curiosity. Their music always felt like the beginning of some doom metal song stretched out for 10 minutes, then nothing. Droning feedback, sublevel riffs quiver and quake under the weight of ample fuzz and dtuned strings and faint hissed whispers for vocals make their way out of the muck and mire of their songs. They seem adamant about what they do. There doesn't seem to be any hesitation in the delivery, so I think they're quite good at creating these dark passages of music. The lack of drums and any real discernible rhythm creates a wooziness; without drums pushing the song along, the guitars create almost this sea of black we begin floating in. Stranded in this droning, doom-filled body of water, our small vessel nearly capsizes as wave after wave of volume and squealing swells of noise crash on the bow. There is never a horizon with Sunn O))), just impenetrable blackness.

Kannon is the first true full-length record from Sunn O))) since 2009. It's not nearly the black hole of drone that Monoliths and Dimensions was, but very little is. What it is, however, is three songs that clock in at a little over 33 minutes and deliver on the promise of a new Sunn O))) record, which is sheer volume and dark atmosphere.

I was listening to *Kannon* at home last Saturday night while my wife and I sat in the living room reading. About two minutes into "Kannon 2", the second track on the album, my wife looked at me with a squinting look on her face and went "Ahhhhhh", pointing at the speakers. I said "What's wrong? Is it hurting your ears?" in regards to the screeching feedback and sub-level drone emanating from my Pioneer tower speakers.

"Yeah. Just a little," she said, wincing

That's really all you need to know about *Kannon*. It's not for everybody, but it might just be for you. If you're at all familiar with Sunn O))), then you know what to expect. I will say this: "Kannon 3" has almost an upbeat feel in the drone-y delivery of the hellish squalls and shrieks. It has more of a sea chantey vibe, had a pirate ship been sucked into a wormhole and shot out into an alternate universe in slow motion. But overall, it seems to be business as usual—which I think is a good thing. There are certain bands you don't want to change all that much. You want them to retain those things that made them special and unique, whether it be ear-shattering volume, breakneck speed, chanting, or sludge-y, soupy riffs played at the speed of blood-tinged molasses dripping down a white canvas. Oh, and cloaks. Don't forget the cloaks.



Jeff Lynne's ELO

Alone in the Universe

Not many can have a successful career first as a recording artist, then as a sought-after producer. Jeff Lynne did that.

In the 70s he was the leader of ELO; then in the 80s he produced albums for George Harrison, Tom Petty and the supergroup Traveling Wilburys (of which he was also



Unfortunately it's also like a watermark that indelibly dates the songs and albums. While it's a calling card with a catchy phrase you never forget, after a while that catchy phrase goes from clever to kind of kitchy.

Lynne has returned after a rather quiet 15 years (give or take some producing here and a covers album there) and has given us

Frank Zappa Chunga's Revenge (1970)

After his period with the Mothers of Invention, Frank Zappa ventured out on his own to what has become one of the most illustrious careers of any American musician. Though most critics and fans don't recognize Zappa as mainstream, his following (myself included)



was loyal and knowledgeable when it came to digging what he was putting out in the late 60s through his death in 1993.

This second release mixed jazz and rock with some improvisational numbers and was lyrically based on being on the road in a band (groupies, drugs, sex). But musically, it was structurally sound, attractive and somewhat complicated.

"Transylvania Boogie" opens up the record with an almost late 60s surf music atmosphere that intertwines with a jam band sound familiar to fans of Phish and Umphrey's McGee. "Road Ladies" is gospel blues number that features a mean guitar from Zappa and some of the attention-grabbing lyrics he was known for

"The Nancy & Mary Music" is an almost 10-minute number that for non-fans can get a little repetitive, but the guitars are extremely groovy nonetheless. "Tell Me You Love Me" is straight up rock n' roll that goes right into the poppy "Would You Go All the Way." The latter songs actually has a funky trombone arrangement (because Zappa didn't follow rules).

The title track is also an instrumental number that brings the tempo down for a moment before going on for another five minutes on cruise control with a funky little organ and sick guitars from Zappa. "The Clap" is a short little percussion blend; it goes into the goofy "Rudy Wants to Buy Yez a Drink."

His massive catalogue is unique, strange, brilliant, original and sometimes over your head – but it's never too late to discover the genius that was Frank Zappa. (*Dennis Donahue*)

Jeff Lynne's ELO. *Alone in the Universe* is most definitely a Jeff Lynne album. Do you like soaring harmonies, melodies for miles and a sprinkle of heartbreak for good measure? Then step inside Mr. Lynne's guitar-shaped rocket ship and enjoy.

I'm not sure what constitutes an ELO album anymore, as opposed to just a Jeff Lynne album. They're really hard to tell apart at this point. I suppose there's less spaced-out rockabilly and Roy Orbison-isms on an ELO album than on a solo Lynne record. Alone in the Universe revisits some familiar ELO territory, in particular Face the Music- and A New World Record-era ELO. The "Telephone Line"-like "When I Was A Boy" will make you feel all warm and fuzzy, while "Dirty To The Bone" feels like Lynne revisiting the few moments of 80s ELO that weren't dreadful. "When The Night Comes" has a stunted reggae vibe, like Lynne can't get loose enough in the rhythm department to get the right amount of skank. Still, it comes across as a decent enough Jeff Lynne song.

The production touches Jeff Lynne is known for have mellowed over time, like a leather chair that has been worn down over years of use. The snare isn't quite as snappy as it used to be, which is a good thing and a good fit for the weathered voice that emerges from that bearded face.

Alone in the Universe is worth the price of admission just to have two exquisite tracks. "The Sun Will Shine on You" is regal – like floating through space in some magical bubble powered by a truly "strange magic." This song is proof Lynne should continue to make music until he no longer can. "Ain't It a Drag" is a jangle rock track that sounds like what would happen if the Traveling Wilburys had been produced by Jon Brion on a coffee buzz. It's a fun rock n' roll number that Lynne might've thrown at us in his Armchair Theatre days.

So if you're looking for A New World Record, Face the Music or Out of the Blue, then go listen to those albums. Alone in the Universe isn't those records. It is, however, Jeff Lynne making the best out of growing old. It's also a couple Jeff Lynne classics and a handful of pretty decent songs. (John Hubner)

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Jerry Gaskill *Love and Scars*

For the past few decades, Jerry Gaskill has beaten the skins for King's X, a relatively unknown but highly influential power trio. While the other two members have added a string of side projects and



solo albums to their work as a band, Jerry has released only a single solo album. Until

While Gaskill's first album, *Come Somewhere*, sounded like it had been written on an acoustic guitar and later rocked up, *Love and Scars* is a full-on melodic, hard rock onslaught. The modern sound is largely due to guitarist/songwriter/producer DA Karkos, plus friends like Andee Blacksugar, Billy Sheehan and Phil Keaggy. But as they say back on the farm, if you slap lipstick on pig and put it in a fancy sequined dress, you might have a date for Saturday, but it's still a pig. To that end, all the deluxe sonic treatments won't do anything to make a poorly written song enjoyable.

Thankfully as a co-writer for many classic King's X tunes, Gaskill excels at creating great songs – and this time it's obvious that his guitar was plugged in when he wrote

And thankfully for King's X fans, Gaskill solo sounds a lot like King's X. Surprise! I'm sure it helps that the guitarists "borrow" Ty Tabor's signature guitar sound and style, but since it's been awhile since a proper King's X album, I'm not complaining. I mean, can you really rip off your own band? As a confirmed Beatles fan, Gaskill also uses vocal harmonies to flesh out his rich melodies. Instead of going through song by song, I'll just say that there are grinding mid-tempo rockers, lighter songs filled with dreamy guitars and even a playful "live" song at the end. In short, it's got everything a rocker could want.

Always one to write some way-out lyrics that leave the listener scratching their head ("Six Broken Soldiers" and "American Cheese" come to mind), Gaskill combines poetic mystery with humor and enjoyment out of everyday activities. Just a few examples: "You're only pretty when your heart beats / Or your lungs breath / After that I just don't know" (concerning his heart attack), "So Patty, cut my hair / We talked about the air" and "You're so lovely when you're far away."

With Love and Scars, Jerry Gaskill proves that he's much more than just an excellent drummer and songwriter. He's survived two heart attacks plus losing everything to Hurricane Sandy and is still able to kick back, laugh and enjoy life. Thankfully, the songs on this album invite us to sit down and enjoy the humor of life by his side. (Jason Hoffman)

Leftover Crack

Garden of Delete

"When was the last time you met somebody who thinks for themself?"

That question is asked in the sampled recording that intros the song "?!Paliamor Fiesta Crack!" about halfway through Constructs of the State, the



latest album by Leftover Crack and their first full-lenth in 11 years. The question neatly sums up what the band is all about: individualism and, by extension, railing against any form of groupthink.

The album starts off with "Archaic Subjugation," a fullfrontal assault on religion. Afterwards, the band tackles the rich, the military and authoritarian systems in general.

In case you haven't figured it out yet, Leftover Crack are dyed-in-the-wool lefties and aren't making any apologies for their politics.

They've also proven that they're not above courting a

little controversy - this is the band, after all, that released an album that depicted George W. Bush, Dick Cheney and Rudolph Giuliani causing the World Trade Center bombings – an album that, not surprisingly, was quickly banned by outlets like Wal-Mart and Best Buy.

Whether you agree with their politics or not – and chances are that's "no" for most folks – they at least deserve credit for practicing what they preach. In addition to spewing radical left treatises through their music, the band members actually live in C-Squat in Manhattan. Granted, that particular location is no longer technically a squat, but it is a landmark in the anarcho-punk movement, and remains something of a mecca for punk rock music and skate culture.

Musically, Leftover Crack play a blend of hardcore punk, post-punk and ska with a tinge of metal. "Archaic Subjugation" delivers a cavalcade of crushing guitars and introduces the harsh vocals of Scott Sturgeon (aka Stza Crack, Osama Stiz Laden, and Ol' Dirty Stza). By the second song, Sturgeon proves that he's not a one-trick pony, engaging in a surprisingly hooky chorus, delivered in his trademarked rasp. The band, too, flexes its musical muscles throughout: "Slave to the Throne" has a monster riff that's a drop-dead ringer for Slayer, and "Vicious Constructs" is a brooding number that's straight out of Fugazi's playbook.

Even though the band hasn't released a new album since 2004, they've remained busy with side projects and playing live, and it shows. *Constructs* is a tight album that benefits from enough of a variety that it doesn't become monotonous, but not so much that it is unfocused. And who knows, maybe their politics will move you to go out and get that anarchy symbol tattoo you've always wanted. (*Ryan Smith*)

Steve Forbert

Compromised

Steve Forbert is a lifer. He writes rock tunes that swell with pop – pop tunes that don't condescend – in a timeless style.

Forbert blasted onto the scene back in 1980 with "Romeo's Tune." The arrival of this potent

singer/songwriter came just in time for that decade's affinity for musical detachment and flash and the devaluation of such a 70s-era virtue as a guy holding a guitar and spouting clever and heartfelt lyrics

Forbert held his ground, however, and he outlived the synths and the haircuts and "the death of the guitar." With his now ultra-gruff vocal delivery, he certainly sounds like he came out the other side of some kind of battle. Drop the needle on any of the cuts on *Compromised* and witness an artist who has stuck to his guns. Many tunes, including the title track, bear the hallmarks that define most of Forbert's substantial catalog: tight, concise songs coated in just enough jangle to make the earthy substance of the lyric go down smoothly. While his delivery may be an acquired taste to new listeners (I'd suggest checking out some older Forbert material as an appetizer to this album), Forbert hasn't lost a bit of his edge.

The production on *Compromised* sounds as timeless as Forbert's songs; placed in context with his early work, these songs would absolutely fit right in. While *Compromised* doesn't parrot his past work in the least, the album showcases what the man does best. It will prove comfortable as an old shoe to longtime Forbert fans.

The piano and horns driving "Welcome the Rolling Stones" may not be considered radio catnip these days, but they add a friendliness to a nostalgic tune that could have easily been diluted by modern studio sheen. The gentle "You'd See What I See," written after Forbert visited John Lennon's boyhood home, imagines the young Lennon's thoughts upon first meeting with a kid named Paul, while the firmly in-thenow "Whatever, Man" lets us know that life is far too important to take seriously. "I'm not the only one with worldly problems / But I'm the only one with mine," he sings before admonishing the listener to lighten up and look at the big picture. "Whatever, man / Don't let it drive you crazy."

Coming from a lifer with such a lived-in voicebox, those simple words rise to the level of sage advice. (D.M. Jones)

Adele

25

It's been said that once you sell 30 million copies, there's nowhere to go but down.

Released in January 2011, Adele's 21 became a cultural milestone for the new decade, with singles like "Rolling in the Deep"



being an inescapable presence in modern culture that still persists today. The album was also viewed as the saving grace for an ailing music industry struggling to survive in the digital age. Continually mounting sales and a deluge of awards put an unfair amount of pressure on the singer-song-writer to save the music industry yet again with a follow-up. However, like any good mother would, she held off on the task in favor of raising her son, Angelo, birthed in the melee of Adelemania.

Adele finally announced her reintroduction to the world by saying "Hello" – mostly as a way to make peace with her past self and reflect on the passage of time. Thematically, her third album, 25, is a makeup record, but not a stark contrast to its break-up oriented predecessor. When she laments, "I know I'm not the only one / Who regrets the things they done / Sometimes I feel it's only me / Who can't stand the reflection that they see," on "Million Years Ago," it's one of many bitter spots in an otherwise sweet album.

The legion of Adele fans who focus on her vocal dexterity are not at all going to be disappointed by 25. Each of the 11 songs demonstrates undeniable triumphs of a skilled vocalist in total command of her range and pitch. The collaborations with Max Martin ("Send My Love"), Danger Mouse ("River Lea"), Tobias Jesso Jr. ("When We Were Young") and Bruno Mars ("All I Ask"), among many others, remain consistent despite each of them practicing within different genres. The artistic success of 25 can be measured by its continuance of 21's love for soul music and remaining sympathetic to the plights of many.

Which is also the record's most disappointing aspect: however many fans will be satisfied, there's bound to be a respectable percentage of fans who can't help but feel cheated by having to hear the same album over again. Some of the biggest talking points to this album have more to do with its first-week sales figures of 3.38 million copies sold, rather than how she took more advantage of a situation that would have allowed her to branch out and still be hugely successful, no matter what. It's also possible that once you sell 30 million copies, there may be little choice but to repeat what appeals to a worldwide audience. (Colin McCallister)

El Vy *Return to the Moon*


The National's Matt Berninger isn't one to just fall into a project. Call him an artist; call him complicated; call him pretentious, if you like. But back up a few paces and you realize that this singer has never phoned in a line in



his life. One gets the impression that a "lark" is not an attractive foundation on which he would build anything.

El Vy (as in, more than one Elvis. Get it?) pairs Berninger with Brent Knopf, late of Menomena, and their freshman effort is an energized breath of fresh air. Rather than simply slum during downtime, Berninger actually created personas to embody these songs. Reportedly inspired by both his early exposure to the Cincinnati music scene and the camaraderie

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Plenty of Dancing Days Left

Honey and Leonard by Mark Paul Smith, **Christopher Matthews Publishing, 2015**

In the heart-rending documentary I'll Be Me, we watch as singer Glen Campbell deals with the dramatic progression of Alzheimer's disease, and we marvel at his denial of the disease's effects. As his memory begins to fail, he explains his inability to answer his doctor's questions by claiming that he's choosing not to remember the things that don't matter to him - even if those things happen to be the current season or his

The need to fit the disconcerting loss of self into something that seems normal is strong, and it's easy to imagine we'd do exactly the same thing if we were in the same situation. Those themes

of denial and fear can be found in Honey and Leonard, Mark Paul Smith's new novel, as can the assertion that happiness and fun don't need to flit away along with the memories as life begins to wind down.

Honey Waldrop is the widow of a small-town doctor; she's 77 and feisty, a wealthy woman on her own who doesn't hesitate to say what she thinks or do what she wants to do. Leonard Atkins, 76, is a widowed farmer, himself financially well off thanks to a lifetime of smart investing. Honey and Leonard have found each other in their twilight, and they've been living together for months, a situation that's caused a minor scandal in North Manchester, Indiana, the small town where they live.

Leonard is in the early stages of Alzheimer's, and he's moved out of an assisted living facility in order to move in with Honey. That doesn't sit well with his niece, who already has power of attorney in Leonard's affairs and is trying to have him declared mentally incompetent so that she can take over fully as his legal guardian.

When routine blood tests turn up high levels of arsenic in Leonard's system, Honey is accused of poisoning him, and his niece obtains a court order to keep the pair separated. But these two strong-willed people are in love, and nothing will keep them apart. Honey suggests that they flee their small town, just fly off to France on a whim. Leonard, who's never even been on an airplane, is scared but willing to follow Honey



anywhere. So off they go, instantly turning themselves into fugitives from the law.

What follows is a comic adventure, with Honey and Leonard making their way, clumsily and romantically, through all of the tourist hot spots in France. charming cab drivers and waiters along the way. Hot

on their heels are everyone from a private investigator, to a small-town journalist, to the FBI. When the world gets wind of the romantic exploits of this adorable couple, they become international celebrities, a harmless Bonnie and Clyde who easily steal the hearts of everyone who encoun-

Smith tells the story of Honey and Leonard with humor and a healthy sense of whimsy, but the lurking problem of Leonard's increasing dementia is always there. The message seems to be, however, that Leonard's escalating difficulties are no reason for him to give up on himself and certainly no reason for Honey to give up on him. They are both still alive and in

love, and they are stubbornly determined to make the most of what they have, right here and right now.

Smith also boldly addresses the challenges of simply being old in a culture that doesn't have much respect for the elderly. He writes frankly – although not especially graphically - about Honey and Leonard's sex life, and he shows us how they bristle at the assumption that their relationship is somehow less complete than one between two younger people.

Most soberingly, Smith shows us two adults who. thanks to a legal system that's stacked against them. are in danger of losing control of their own lives when they've still got plenty of living to do. It's no wonder that they would fight so hard and go to such extremes to keep that control in their own hands and convince everyone that they are still perfectly capable of taking care of themselves.

he viewed in the Minutemen documentary We Jam Econo, Berninger created Didi Bloome and Michael as kind of avatars to give voice to the new album.

Return to the Moon is also nuanced and not without its melancholy moments. While the National's frontman doesn't exactly shed the mannerisms and vocal stylings that make his full-time band instantly recognizable, he is more energetic here.

Knopf's musical contributions put Berninger in a far different context, framing his baritone in a more upbeat, if not joyous, setting. The opener, "Return to the Moon (Political Song for Didi Bloome to Sing, with Crescendo)," brings home a suspicion I've had about the National: they re-imagined The Smiths, albeit as a matter of degree. The sprightly "Return to the Moon" only bolsters this feeling, thanks to its compact musical construction and tight, lively beat.

"Leave me somewhere near the back / Where the bouncers won't attack," he sings on "Need a Friend." He continues, "I don't need your love / I just need a friend." Pumping pianos and an insistent beat add to the song's tension. It's pop, but the bubblegum is salty rather then sugary. I'd be remiss if I didn't point out that Amsterdam's The Great Dictators have always sounded to me like a take on what the National could have sounded like. "Need a Friend" sounds more like TGD than the National. Go figure.

If you love Matt Berninger's thoughtfulness but could use a little sugar to go along with the usual medicine, Knopf's chops supply it. It's no surprise that El Vy have become an actual entity rather than just a one-off vanity project. This record brings out another side of a gifted songwriter as it manages to stand alone as a worthwhile listen. The best praise I can offer is this: If this is the first time you've ever heard Matt Berninger and Brent Knopf, then you're in for a treat. (D.M. Jones)

The Hollywood holiday schedule is as crowded as ever, so look for some highly buzzed about films not making it to the community until 2016. National expansion for even a film like the highly praised and an-



ticipated *The Revenant* is currently dated for January 8.





of the season.

Standouts include Fawn Liebowitz guitarist Paul Stephens, as a kind, shaggy bear of a dad who's just trying to do right by his dramatic, teenaged stepdaughters, eccentric mother-in-law and his younger son, without going broke in the process.

Maggie Kole Hunter and Gavin Drew are Miss Nancy and Jason, a bickering mom and son (Leslie Hormann herself will appear as Miss Nancy in the second week of the run). They *seem* like they are the two biggest Grinches in the known world. There might be some hearts growing a couple of sizes as the parent finds out her child is now a man.

Harvey Cocks and Dotty Miller steal the show (and will steal your heart) as a forlorn old geezer and his immigrant housekeeper. Neither has much of a reason to be happy at Christmas, but they manage to give each other the real Magi gifts of joy and hope. I needed my hankie, so fair warning.

The show is an abundance of riches with wonderful performers, dynamic dancers and sweet voices singing familiar songs. Some songs are traditional, some are popular; they all stick with you as you make your way home.

Holidaze: A Survivor's Guide for the Season is absolutely family-friendly because, well, Youtheatre. The uproar from the children in the audience mixes with the uproar from the children in the cast and it's all part of the entertainment. Running time is about 60 minutes, so little ones can enjoy live theater without getting cranky.

And speaking of cranky, all of the folks who are feeling bummed about the *Holidaze* should get over to the show. You'll find out a secret, and I don't think I'm giving it away, that one small, friendly act can make a Christmas miracle.

Well Worth the Gas Money

South of Fort Wayne, in Gas City, lies a hidden gem that is well worth the drive, Payne's Restaurant. This eclectic restaurant was founded over 10 years ago by Stephen Payne who was born in England and travelled to the United States to visit the birthplace of James Dean in nearby Fairmont. Long story short, he ended up falling in love with this country and eventually opened Payne's, which can be described as a freespirited restaurant that is serious about food.

Many of Payne's dishes are heavily influenced by Stephen's British background. He and his wife oper-

ate the business together and have created a truly one-of-akind dining experience that you wouldn't expect to find nestled among gas stations at a nondescript exit off the interstate. In fact, most people probably know the Gas City exit by the town's questionable choice of the Comic Sans font used on the water tower.

I've made several trip to Payne's and rate it as one of my top 10 restaurants in northeast

British Chicken Curry (\$14): Mild aromatic korma with steamed potatoes and naan bread. This dish is an explosion of flavors, simultaneously sweet and savory. The naan bread is house-made and serves as the perfect vehicle for sopping up all of the delicious

> spiced sauce. The chicken is juicy and the potatoes are smooth, complementing each other and the complex flavors. Even if you think you don't like curry, this is a must-try menu item.

> Huntsman's Breakfast (\$10): Grilled ham steak, grilled potato cake and over easy-eggs. This dish is almost too beautiful to eat. It comes stacked high on the plate and garnished with fresh herbs from the garden.

The ham steak is about as big as your head, and the grilled cakes tato add a muchneeded savory smoothness. And, you can't go wrong when you top a

The décor is kitschy and cozy. During the spring and summer months, the urban garden is in full bloom, and many of the items on the menu are influenced by what's growing outside.

That said, the menu is constantly changing, so each time I go back it's like Christmas - I never know what wonderful surprises await. Payne's serves breakfast, lunch and dinner. Just make sure you arrive hungry; portion sizes are huge.

Bangers and Mash (\$12): Traditional British sausage, rutabaga/potato mash and Sweet Scrumpy's onion gravy. I have had this dish at several local and regional restaurants, but this version is my favorite. The addition of the slightly bitter rutabaga in the rutabaga/potato mash adds a sophistication to this dish that is lacking in other versions I've sampled. And as I mentioned before, the portion sizes are huge. This dish easily provides a few days' worth of leftovers.

dish with an over easy egg. All that yummy gooiness drizzles down and meshes with the other flavors in a way that can't be described.

Bourriche Grilled Cheese & Cock-aleekie Soup (\$9): Cock-a-leekie soup, a Scottish classic dating back to the 1590s, is made with leeks, prunes and chicken. The soup

presents an interesting mix of flavors; the sweetness of the prunes, combined with the savory chicken and onion-like leeks, results in a surprisingly pleasant experience. I asked our server several times to explain Bourriche to me, and I am still not sure what it means. What I do know is this is one of the best grilled cheese sandwiches I've ever had. Bourriche refers to the type of bread it was served on, which was not like bread at all. It was more like a puffed, but dense pastry, stuffed with several types of cheeses. It is impossible to eat like a sandwich; it definitely requires a knife and fork, but delicious just doesn't do it justice.

In addition to the items mentioned above, Payne's offers a wide selection of soups, sandwiches and entrees and an impressive selection of dessert custards. I have always been too full after my meal to venture into dessert, but I have my eye on James Dean's Payne: vanilla custard, raspberries and espresso. Yum!

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
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
