Making a Home for Millennials

If you don't build it, they will leave. Or maybe they won't come at all.

"They" refers to the millennials. "It" refers to whatever

Like many medium-sized cities and regions across the country, Fort Wayne and northeast Indiana face an aging

population and young workforce willing to relocate to fulfill needs that go unmet

Likewise, when employers consider a location for a new factory or offices, they look for an educated and skilled workforce willing to put down roots and commit to a place. Otherwise, the employers, too will look elsewhere.

Millennials, the 18- to 34-year-olds who grew up in a world of instant social connections irrespective of geographic boundaries, have become the demographic driving economic development across the country. Attracting and keeping them is the puzzle cities and regions must solve in order to avoid stagnation.

Of course, the success of the region depends on the whole population, not just one demographic. Everyone uses the roads and the parks and supports the businesses. But the current annual population growth of just .7 percent lags behind "best practice" regions that have around 2 percent annual growth. And that growth rate is not nearly enough to entice employers.

"With the aging baby boomers, if we keep growing at .7 percent, in 10 years we're actually going to have 9,000 fewer workers in our workforce," said Courtney Tritch, director of marketing with Northeast Indiana Regional Partnership. "When I think about the numbers of businesses that are trying to find talent now, and taking 9,000 people away from that – that's not where we want to be going from an economic standpoint."

Northeast İndiana's solution is the ambitious Road to One Million plan. The plan seeks to boost workforce population growth while attracting quality employers, basically by spending a ton of money creating fun stuff to do and building cool

The 11-county Northeast Indiana Regional Partnership came up with the plan which includes hiking and biking trails, improvements to parks and access to rivers, as well as new housing and cultural centers across the region. Fort Wayne is the anchor, but smaller cities and towns in each county have an important role to play.

The Indiana Economic Development Corporation in December rewarded the partnership's plan with \$42 million to get things rolling. The Road to One Million plan, which includes some 70 projects in the 11-county region, including 38 that are considered "near term," was completed before there was any assurance of financial help from the state. The 38 near term projects call for an investment of \$400 million over the next two years, Tritch said. The regional cities money will help jump-start the work, she said.

In Fort Wayne two of the projects – riverfront development and the rebirth of the Landing – are important not only to the economy of the city and the region but to the care and feeding of the millennials.

For many, developing the riverfront in Fort Wayne has long been a dream, but agreement on how to undertake the project and, more importantly, how to dispel the perception of the rivers as unappealing have proved elusive. Until now.

In 2011, representatives of the regional partnership voted anonymously on what the priorities of the region's develop-

"These are people from business, education, government officials, kind of the whole gamut of 10 counties, we're 11 counties now (Kosciusko County joined after the voting) and they voted to make downtown riverfront development in Fort Wayne the quality of life priority for the region," Tritch

"And that was a huge step because this is people from all these different counties saying what happens in downtown Fort Wayne affects us too."

Phase one the riverfront plan includes building a promenade on the south side of the St. Mary's River in an area bound by Wells, Superior and Harrison streets. The promenade will connect with Headwaters Park.

Directly across the river is Fort Wayne Outfitters & Bike Depot. The business rents and sells kayaks, canoes and bicycles and also hosts events on the north bank of the St. Mary's. Since opening in 2007, owners Cara and Tim Hall

have seen a steady increase in people interested in getting on the rivers. Such curiosity has had the side benefit of changing people's idea of what the rivers have to offer.

We had over 10,000 people get out on the river in 2014," Cara Hall said. "That's pontoon rides, kayak rentals. Everybody that goes out, even if they've lived here their whole life, it just changes their perspective. Once they paddle through downtown to Headwaters with the skyline.

they're kind of in a park. I think each person that experiences it changes their mind. and they do care about the rivers more and want to take care of them."

Many of the people using the rivers are millennials, but they are not the only ones. Local high school rowing teams practice on the rivers and traveling business people and convention-goers have also discovered them.

"You know, we always talk about other places and how cool they are," Tim Hall said. "But we get people from all over. People just come to visit from out of town and they're just blown away by our rivers and our greenway. I remember a guy who was from Lake Tahoe just complimenting us, saying you guys are way ahead of your time. Just hearing that from someone who comes from a place that's so beautiful, coming here to little bitty Fort Wayne and being blown away by what we have and what we're offering, feels great."

The biggest perception that needs to change, according to the Halls and Dan Wire, executive director of the Tri-State Watershed Alliance, is that the rivers are foul cesspools connected directly to the city's sewers. Which is true, to a point. During heavy rains, the storm water and sanitary sewers do in fact connect and flow into the rivers. But Wire said that will change.

'Right now we're 71 yearly discharges, but they are going to be down to less than five," Wire said. "The city is halfway through an 18-year, \$240 million plan to separate the street drains and the sanitary sewer."

Like the Halls, Wire has taken many people who have never been on the river on boat rides. He said they always come away astonished.

"I personally have taken enough of the titans of industry for tours along the river.

and even though everyone is an individual, everyone reacts the same way," he said. "Their jaws drop down, they're spinning around in the seat on the boat and they're saying oh my gosh, this is so not what I expected. People expected to see this heinous toxic wasteland of a dump on the rivers. And instead, they found a very beautiful, inviting environment. It totally misplaces your memory when you're on the rivers. You forget that you're in an urban environment.'

Wire said the shift in the thinking about the rivers is part of a larger shift in how employers see the importance of loca-

"Seven years ago people started talking to me about quality of life," Wire said. "Now they call it quality of place. I think that the business community as a whole recognizes that quality of life or quality of place is a positive return be-

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

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Choreographing Shakespeare

Feature • State Ballet of Russia

While Shakespeare left behind a vast wealth of masterpieces during his era, both historically and interpretively, it is typically his tragedies which are most familiar to anyone who attended high school or those who frequent theatrical productions of his work. And while Hamlet, Macbeth and King Lear are well known in their own right, perhaps no one of his works is as often referenced as his ode to young love, Romeo and Juliet. Those names conjure the very essence of intense and passionate love and, oddly enough, seem to set some standard for the measure of love between two people. Never mind that by the end of the story they both end up dead. They loved each other - a lot and that's what people choose to remember.

Not surprisingly, Shakepeare's play has found itself presented in a variety of formats, and perhaps none, outside of the original story itself, is more beloved than the great Russian ballet by Prokofiev, written in 1935 and originally featuring a much happier, albeit controversial outcome for our esteemed lovers. By the time the ballet debuted in 1940, the traditional and unfortunate conclusion of the great love story had been restored.

That now well-known version of the ballet will be performed at the Embassy Theatre by the State Ballet Theatre of Russia, the name by which the company is known during its tours of the United States. Back home it is the Russia Classical Ballet of Moscow, and the company tours extensively in its homeland while spending a few months each year visiting America, sharing the classical dance for which Russia has long been credited with establishing.

The man who oversees these productions, Igor Levin, says that during their current 10-week stint in the U.S. there are different productions being staged.

"We are doing four productions, and we began our visit on December 2 and of course did *The Nutcracker*," says Levin. "Our production is a bit different than the ones you have in the United States since we have no kids in our production. Now we are performing *Romeo and Juliet* and will also do *Swan Lake* and a few special performances of Tchaikovsky's Gala. We are mostly in the U.S. but will also go to Canada."

One of the ballet's principal dancers is Natalia Gubanova who alternates the role of Juliet and Mother Capulet in this production. Gubanova, who began dancing at the age of five and became professional at 10, thinks the tale of the star-crossed lovers remains powerful for audiences today.

"It's a story of true love, and people love the story itself," she says. "But this is also a wonderful production and a good example of this style of choreography. It's good for people to know and be exposed to this kind of dance which has lasted since 1914 in Russia and the Soviet Union. It's a choreo-drama, and this style is important because it's not about technique, but about the drama of the story. It is classical dance, but it focuses on the personal relationships which are explored through dance, so there's no jumps and great demonstrations of flexibility as much as showing the drama and feelings of the story."

Gubanova thinks audiences are drawn in by that drama and become very attached to the story and characters, explaining why – even though everyone knows how tragically it will end - they can't stay away from the story itself.

"Audiences feel compassion for heroes and for these characters," she says. "It is very difficult, but it is very good drama and theatre. And of course the music by Prokofiev is wonderful."

By alternating performances as the story's very young heroine Juliet as well as her mother Lady Capulet, Gubanova is able to tap into very different means of expression through dance.

"I like the flexibility of these ballets and getting to live many lives. With Juliet I get to feel again the feeling of first love, of desperation and this story which doesn't happen in real life while going back to another time. Then with Lady Capulet I can feel like a woman of middle age and experience the conflict of the two generations. Lady Capulet is very closed-minded while Juliet is really still a child and is open-minded. And there is where the conflict is, and I get to live both sides of that."

Gubanova also enjoys the variety of performances the company tackles during their 10 weeks in the United States. They also tour extensively in Russia as well as playing closer to their home of Moscow, staging Giselle, Cinderella and Sleeping Beauty in addition to the productions on this tour during their season. Being able to play roles other than just Juliet provides a welcome relief from the grim outcome that heroine faces.

"It's difficult to go from one production to another, but it's also very interesting and better than just one. I can't just die and die and die and die everyday! It's nice to switch to different roles, and I'm very happy to refresh ourselves with a new production."


them" has garnered her some serious radio play, not to mention a legion of loyal

Making Connections

Many performing artists draw from past experiences of pain and angst to shape their performances. Albert Brownlee, by contrast, had a happy childhood that was highlighted by family support, social interaction and an appreciation for the arts. His maternal grandparents were singers, as was his mother, who had a natural talent for drawing as well.

Brownlee's artistic family ties have carried on into his adulthood.

"My family is immersed in the arts," he says. "My wife Tamarah was a theater minor in college and is an accomplished singer and thespian in her own right."

He and Tamarah met while college students. Brownlee led a vocal performance and recording group, of which Tamarah, a theater minor at another institution, was a member. Like her husband, she came from a long line of artists and continues to perform today. Their children are also heavily involved in various aspects of the arts - dance, theatre, music and drawing.

Brownlee describes his own performance background as "a natural evolution." Music was his first love; he began singing as a toddler and played piano and saxophone as a boy. He credits teachers Linda Greaf,

Laura McCoy, Ed Harris and Mike Whitlock for honing his musical skills through

skills through the Summit Program with Fort Wayne Community

partner Reuben Albaugh

Schools.

"I haven't stopped performing since," he says.

Other aspects of performing also appealed to Brownlee. During summer vacations he would write and direct plays with the other kids in his neighborhood.

"I had been bitten by the acting bug," he says. He soon began participating in church and school theater and eventually community theatre.

While on tour with the Fort Wayne Children's Choir, a fellow singer encouraged him to audition for the upcoming Youtheatre production, *Ride a Blue Horse*. The show was directed by Harvey Cocks who would become one of the primary influences on Brownlee as a performer.

"I was totally unfamiliar with the script or even the premise of the show," he says. "I just knew two things: one, I liked performing, and two, I wanted to be cast"

Despite his lack of preparation, the 11-year-old Brownlee was cast in a supporting role.

"I remember being nervously excited," he says of his theatrical debut, "as well as enamored with the experience of performing live on such a big stage."

Thirty years later, he hasn't stopped performing.

His audition preparation skills have evolved since the 1980s. He reads the script ahead of time to determine which roles he would like to audition for, and he sometimes will turn to the internet to find videos of shows he is unfamiliar with.

Once cast, he utilizes his own instincts for the characterization while also heeding the director's advice for how his character fits into the overall story.

"I also like to research and develop a context for the character by understanding the setting, time in which they lived and any social implications," he says. "This helps make my characterization more 'real' versus 'acting."

Brownlee's method of acting is quite simple: "In

the words of Nike," he says, "just do it. The more natural your performance is, the less it will feel like acting to the audience. My goal as a performer is to take the audience on a journey into a world that is outside of their own. The audience should become a part of the show and emotionally feel what we are expressing on stage."

He enjoys the challenge of working with different types of actors (an interesting irony, he says, is that people he might not get along with offstage sometimes turn out to be his strongest scene partners).

"It stretches you as an actor to find ways to connect with others on stage that you may have

difficulty connecting with in real life," he says. "This at times, can produce great chemistry."

Some of his favorite roles are also ones that buck

"I love being cast in roles that are typically cast for other ethnicities, races or body types than me," he says. "I like things that are out of the box and challenge us to change our paradigms."

Brownlee enjoys playing the gamut of roles, from comedic to deeply serious. He says he is typically cast as "the family man or religious type."

However, one of his favorite roles was the antagonistic Wazir in the musical *Kismet*, in which he appeared while an undergraduate student at Clark Atlanta University in Atlanta.

"What I liked most about the role was the ability to portray someone who had so many varying dimensions," he says. "The Wazir was the one you wanted to hate but loved to watch. He was the comic center of attention, but at the same time the nemesis."

His current role is quite different. He plays Peter in *The Zoo Story*, a one-act play by Edward Albee that is part of a double feature of one-act plays at First Presbyterian Theater. Billed as *Two Plays on a Bench*, both one-acts feature two men sitting on a bench and talking (the other play is *The Duck Variations* by David Mamet). In *The Zoo Story*, Brownlee's character

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Johnny Cash

Man in Black: Live in Denmark 1971

It's tempting to think of Johnny Cash's Man in Black: Live in Denmark 1971 as a document of Cash at the peak of his popular career, when his slick stage show was being exported to satisfy a worldwide hunger for Americana, but the performance recorded on the album actually represents a much more complex point in Cash's history.

By the time he went on a Danish sound stage to record a TV special,

his American TV variety show had already been cancelled by ABC as part of the TV networks' "rural purge," and with the recent release of the provocative protest song "Man in Black," Cash had taken a bold step into America's cultural tumult. The times were changing for Cash, and this performance marks a period of transition.

A video version of the *Live in Denmark* performance has been available for years on DVD, but this release is the first time it's been sold as a stand-alone audio recording. The need for the release is questionable, given that none of the show's performers - with the possible exception of Carl Perkins, who delivers sharp versions of 'Blue Suede Shoes" and "Matchbox" - is at the top of his or her game. Although Cash's duet with wife June Carter on "Darlin' Companion" has moments of the sparkle that made the couple so much fun to hear. Carter struggles at times with her vocals, and the usually fluid harmonies of the Statler Brothers are shaky on their solo num-

Cash himself is subdued, and he rolls through versions of hits such as "A Boy Named Sue" and "Folsom Prison Blues" with the tempo cranked to the red line and all the rough edges smoothed out. His lack of interest in revisiting ancient history shows as he quickly introduces "I Guess Things Happen That Way" as one of "our old ones" and then rips through the song in just over 50 seconds. Most of the rest of the set list is given over to Kris Kristofferson covers and guest numbers.

Live in Denmark stands as a marker for the time when Cash was in the twilight of his career as a pop star and on the cusp of becoming an outlaw elder statesman. As a picture of Cash as a performer, however, it is far from an exceptional example. (Evan Gillespie)



JOHNNY CASH

Being There (1996)

Although Wilco already had an album under their belt (1995's A.M.); it was this release that allowed me to look past the alt-country sound that was Jeff Tweedy. And 20 years later, this under-the-mainstream-radar Chicago band continues their original sound and just keeps getting better.



This double-album contained 19 songs and had a tempo that was ferociously structured, yet very organic at the same time.

It opens with "Misunderstood," a soulful, bluesy piece that drifts around for six and a half minutes with a great piano and jazz-rock-psychedelic drumming. It's probably one of the things that made me buy the CD in the first place.

"Far, Far Away" has remnants of Tweedy's other band Uncle Tupelo, whereas "Monday" and "Outtasite (Outta Mind)" both have a nice polished garage-pop sound. Another standout from the band was "I Got You," a guitar-based number that still has to be one of the best things they do live. "Hotel Arizona" has a Grateful Dead sound, and the late Gram Parsons is channeled in "Say You Miss Me."

The second disc opens with the somber "Sunken Treasure," then the alt-bluegrass "Someday Soon," and sort of tricks you into thinking that you are listening to a different Wilco release. "Why Would You Wanna Live" is Wilco, but sounds like a singersongwriter country radio track from the mid-70s.

The second disc closes with a very good track in "The Lonely 1," Heavy with organs and a violin, it captures the essence of Tweedy's vocal presence. 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

cause that's what keeps their workers satisfied, so they want to stay."

West Columbia Street, The Landing, sits just a block south of the proposed riverfront promenade. During the time when the Wabash & Erie Canal was a major transportation route, The Landing was the hub of activity. Kirk Moriarty would like to see The Landing return to prominence.

Moriarty, of Greater Fort Wayne, Inc., is heading up the push to find a developer for The Landing. He said past efforts to turn the street to a destination – and there have been many – have had varying degrees of success mostly because of the lack of a unified vision. That latest effort, he believes, solves that problem.

The Downtown Development Trust purchased seven of the 12 buildings on West Columbia Street over the past 18 months with the idea of transferring title to one of three development groups.

"We feel we had enough to offer to one development group," Moriarty said. "We think that's important. We want to put potential property management groups or business owners or commercial retailers in a position to succeed, so if one tenant goes it all doesn't fall apart."

Falling apart has been the pattern over the past few decades. The narrow, one-way street is a natural gathering spot, but retail shops and bars and restaurants have come and gone. Currently Columbia Street West and Flashback on the Landing are the only reasons for people to come to The Landing after 5 p.m.

Moriarty said the concept includes not only more eating and entertainment options but first-floor retail and upper floor living space. And it's the living space that may be key to the success of The Landing.

Demand for downtown living is at it's highest in anyone's memory. The 44-unit Randall Lofts on the corner of Harrison and Pearl streets opened in April of 2015 and has a lengthy waiting list for its one and two bedroom units. While I was talking with the manager a few days after Christmas, a man in his mid-20s came in asking about vacancies. I asked him why he wanted to live downtown and he said because of all the activity.

"There is so much happening here," he said.

Randall Lofts has both market and income-based units. That's the type of housing Moriarty said will be the focus of The Landing project.

"Because neighborhood stabilization program dollars were used to acquire some of those build-

ings, the winning developer is obligated to set apart x-amount of those units for low-income housing," he said. "As far as the demand goes, we're currently at 1,800 residents here in downtown Fort Wayne. We have the capacity to easily get to 3,000-5,000 in six years."

Urban living is one of the things millennials want. That and a reason to feel attached to an area. Ryan Krueckeberg, a board member of Young Leaders of Northeast Indiana said people his age need to feel connected a city before the are willing to commit to it.

"I think it's inclusion that we really need to work on a bit," he said. "To have conversations, get people talking. It's about giving people the opportunity to get attached to Fort Wayne. I think it's going to be different for everybody. With downtown development, it's giving millennials that lifestyle that they want to live. It's more than a cool place to hang out. It's jobs, it's the culture."

Peter is both similar to himself and very different.

"In some ways, I am Peter – a professional family man who loves his family," he says. "He's a family man who is accomplished, somewhat reserved and the quintessential picture of normalcy in a society that is anything but normal. The biggest challenge has been to go outside of myself and find reasons to react as Peter does that is very different than the choices I would tend to make in my own life."

Brownlee's scene partner is Reuben Albaugh who lays Jerry.

"He is engaging as Jerry, as well as in real life," he says. "We have great chemistry together on stage, and that has made it fun to be a part of this show."

He says he has not only gotten a lot out of working with Albaugh, but from working with director Thom Hofrichter as well.

"I immensely enjoy working with him as a director and artist because he 'gets it,'" says Brownlee. "His approach is very introspective in that he always encourages you to look within and find your character from there. It's more about understanding who you are and why, versus 'the author wrote it this way, so this is who and why I am.' This makes working at First Pres

vastly different from other theaters."

When he's not performing, Brownlee is the CEO of Genesis Outreach Inc., a social services agency that helps the homeless with housing, workforce development, and support services. His theatrical background has proven to be a boon to this organization.

"I often have to speak in public settings and engage donors in supporting us charitably," he says. "The theater has helped me learn how to be comfortable in diverse settings and has provided me techniques in reaching others and gaining their attention."

However, he also points out, "I think on some level, we all 'act' while doing our day jobs."

His job gives him a unique perspective on his current role in *The Zoo Story*, which is not only funny but thought-provoking.

"It will make audiences look at life and how we live in a society where we see, but yet don't see one another every day," he says. "We often look past the forgotten ones: the homeless, the disenfranchised, persons of certain ethnicities. Yet these are all people who simply want to make a connection. This play will help us to think about that and hopefully make changes in our own lives and daily choices as human beings."



What's really interesting is what people are buying. **Adele**, somewhat predictably, topped the 2015 best sellers list, but the rest of the list was less predictable. **Amy Winehouse** pulled up in second with *Back To Black*, **The Stone Roses**' self-titled disc was third, **Ed Sheeran**'s *X* was fourth and *Guardians of the Galaxy – Awesome Mix 1* was fifth, according to the website Official Charts. **Pink Floyd**'s *Dark Side of the Moon* was, of course, in the Top 10 while a couple of **Led Zeppelin** albums, a couple of **Nirvana** albums and **The Beatles**' *Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band* made the Top 20. It looks like all of those albums we once threw away in favor of the new CD are being bought once again.

Am I the only one not excited about the upcoming **Guns** 'N **Roses** "reunion" tour? The worst kept secret of 2015 is the New Year's biggest anticipated concert tour, and I couldn't care less. Only one date has been announced so far, but the impending "reunion" involves only original members **Slash**, **Axl Rose** and **Duff McKagen**, along with some of the other people who have been in the band since Slash and Rose split several years ago. Is anyone excited to see **Richard Fortus** on guitar and **Frank Ferrer** on drums? Who? In the wake of that news, I say let's pump the brakes on this one for a bit. The band had a groundbreaking album in 1987 called *Appetite For Destruction*. The Force Awakens Still a Long Way from Top All-Time Spot

Tops at the Box: For the fourth consecutive weekend J.J. Abrams' *Star Wars: The Force Awakens* has taken the No. 1 spot at the U.S. box office, selling another \$42 million last weekend and upping the film's 27-day total to \$812 million in the U.S. and \$1.73 billion worldwide. The movie is not just the all-time highest grossing *Star Wars* film, but now the all-time best selling American film, recently passing both *Avatar* and *Titanic*.

Despite that great accomplishment, *The Force Awakens* still has a long way to go before it becomes the all-time best selling film in the world. And, if you adjust the sales numbers for inflation, *The Force Awakens* is just the 15th best selling film of all-time, behind such juggernauts as *101 Dalmatians* and *Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs*. Look for Abrams' flick to keep selling well for weeks to come and easily breaking onto the all-time Top 10 adjusted-for-inflation list.

Also at the Box: Alejandro Gonzalez Inarritu's *The Revenant* had a strong wide opening last weekend, selling an impressive \$38 million over the film's first three days of proper release. Not bad at all. It's hard to say how well the film will do in the long run, but

I think it will at least come close to earning back it's massive \$135 million budget. And hey, if it wins the Best Picture Oscar (and it certainly has a chance after last night's Golden Globes), that will certainly help. It's nice to see a long, said-to-be-boring art film do so well at the box office.

Taking the No. 3 spot at last weekend's box office was comedy *Daddy's Home*, starring Mark Wahlberg and Will Ferrell. The film sold another \$15 million over the Golden Globes weekend, upping the movie's 17-day total to an impressive \$116 million in the U.S. and \$154 million worldwide. Ferrell can be a really special talent from time to time, and Wahlberg plays off of him pretty damn well. What I'm saying is that I will probably see this movie someday, and I think I will probably even be entertained by it.

Taking the No. 4 spot at last weekend's box office was semi-artsy horror flick *The Forest* which surprised by selling a solid \$13 million without any real star power to speak of. Supposedly it's damn good, but I'm skeptical. Rounding out last weekend's Top 5 was buddy comedy *Sisters*, starring Tina Fey and Amy Poehler. The film sold another \$7.2 million last weekend, bringing the flick's 24-



day sales total to \$75 million in the U.S. and \$83 million worldwide.

New This Week: Michael Bay's new war drama, 13 Hours: The Secret Soldiers of Benghazi, will open wide this week. The film stars John "Big Tuna" Krasinski and a bunch of actors you likely aren't familiar with. Looks promising if you ask me. Bay is capable of more than people realize. Also out is animated flick Norm of the North and action comedy Ride Along 2. And, of course, more and more of the great indie flicks from the end of the year are seeing slight expansions. What I'm saying is this: it's a damn good time to go to the movies.

ScreenRant: Did you watch this year's Golden Globes telecast? I sure did. And I was entertained. Jim Carrey's 90-or-so seconds on stage were the highlight of the night, but many of the awards were surprisingly nice as well.

The Pho the Merrier

I'll never forget the first time I experienced pho, a traditional Vietnamese soup consisting of broth, rice noodles, herbs, spices and meat. I walked into a local Vietnamese restaurant and asked the waitress for a recommendation. She directed me to the pho section of the menu, and it changed my life.

I am not exaggerating. I had never had anything like it, and I was immediately smitten with the complex flavors, aromas and textures of the steaming dish. Pho tai, which has become my favorite version, is simple in appearance, but rich in flavor, and is a cure-

all for just about anything that ails you. I am serious. At the first sign of sniffles, go get some pho and it's likely you'll keep the sickness at bay — and if not, you got to enjoy a wonderful meal.

In general, Vietnamese food is

steeped in tradition, and the care by which it is prepared shines through in every dish. Because the country expe-

country experienced long phases of war and conflict, the majority of its people live in poverty, and, therefore, they use inexpensive ingredients, utilizing easily grown and readily available herbs and vegetables. But don't mistake inex-

pensive for bland, low quality or unhealthful. The opposite is true. Vietnamese cuisine is considered one of the healthiest in the world because of its minimal use of oils and its innovative preparation of high quality fresh herbs, spices, vegetables and meats.

We are blessed in Fort Wayne with a nice selection of Vietnamese restaurants that serve pho (Saigon, Kim Vu and Banh Mi Barista), and now there's a new kid on the block, Pho Viet, located in the Mike's Donut location on Bluffton Road. Yes, you read that right. Pho Viet shares a space with Mike's Donuts, a rather uncommon pairing.

Mike's former co-tenant was a diner, and the décor inside has not been updated, so upon walking in, don't be startled. You'll be met with neon wallpaper and checkerboard floors – certainly not the typical Vietnamese

restaurant ambiance, but there's something pleasantly quirky about it. While it is an odd setting, the food is spot on.

One thing is certain: the food at Pho Viet is made with care. Each dish is a masterpiece unto itself. During my first visit I ordered my favorite, pho tai, and I was not disappointed.

The broth was rich and flavorful. The vegetables were fresh and crispy. The meat was prepared and seasoned just right. I also ordered a serving of crab Rangoon, prepared to the perfect golden crunchiness and complemented



by the savory sweet crab mixture inside. So, so good.

On my second visit I ordered a beef noodle bowl and was equally impressed. Loaded with colorful vegetables and well-seasoned meat, the dish also featured roasted peanuts (an ingredient I have not encountered in other noodle bowls served at local Vietnamese places) that lent the dish a robust nutty flavor. Prices are reasonable as well. A couple can enjoy a nice dinner out for less than \$20, including that scrumptious crab Rangoon I mentioned.

I have been a long-time advocate for our local Vietnamese restaurants, and I gladly add Pho Viet to this list. Please make sure to visit soon to show them support. We need places like this in our city.

Paranormal Power

Ghostbusters: Massy Hysteria by Eric Burnham, IDW Publishing, 2015

In the coming months, a new film will reinvigorate a venerable fantasy franchise, one that over the past several decades has been one of the most widely marketed film properties across a spectacular range of media and merchandise. You probably think I'm talking about *Star Wars*, but I'm not. I'm talking about *Ghostbusters*, and if you're surprised that I'm arguing that the 1984 film is such a cultural and commercial touchstone, well, you're no more surprised than I am. The evidence shows, though, that we must love *Ghostbusters* even more than many of us think we

The new film I mentioned is Paul Feig's upcoming reboot, due out in July, in which Kristen Wiig, Melissa Mc-Carthy, Leslie Jones and Kate McKinnon will play an all-female version of the ghost-busting team. The original film's surviving stars

- Bill Murray, Dan Aykroyd, Ernie Hudson and Sigourney Weaver - will all be involved in this new film; the fourth Ghostbuster, Harold Ramis, died in 2014, and Rick Moranis declined to be involved with the project.

The *Ghostbusters* legacy isn't just about a single remake, however. There are already plans to continue the reboot with a new all-male version of the team, this one featuring Channing Tatum, in another film, and in the 30 years since the original film there have been three animated TV series and at least half a dozen comic book series based on the characters. If you wondered why Sony was remaking *Ghostbusters* after all this time, here's your answer: people love *Ghostbusters*, and they've been clamoring for more for dozens of years.

As Ghostbusters comic series go, the IDW title collected in *Ghostbusters: Mass Hysteria* is neither the longest running nor the most popular, but it's a handsome, hefty volume that seems an appropriate tribute to the 30th anniver-



sary of the original film. The titles collected in this volume make up the second volume of IDW's ongoing series, 20 issues originally published in 2013 and 2014 that encompass several different story arcs.

The volume begins with "In the Box," an arc that sees the original Ghostbusters being abducted by spectral kidnappers and trapped in another di-

mension, leaving New York de-

fenseless and in need of a new

ghostbusting team. The four people who come together to save the city from its ghostly problems are a typically rag-tag bunch: the Ghostbusters' secretary Janine Melnitz, FBI agent Melanie Ortiz, bookstore manager Kylie Griffin and con artist Ron Alexander. Maybe it's just a coincidence that this team of New Ghostbusters is three quarters female, but the book should certainly help prime fans for the gender shift in

the upcoming film.

Without question, the book looks good, aside from an unfortunately dull cover (I know it's supposed to look like a Muon Ghost Trap, but it's just not compelling design). Dan Schoening's art is whimsical without being silly, and colorist Luis Antonio Delgado provides a palette that is a rich combination of black and deep, saturated hues. Only two chapters in the middle of book that are drawn in a looser style by Doc Shaner derail the volume's consistency.

In a forward to the volume, Dan Aykroyd sounds a bit bemused, if thrilled, by the fact that his *Ghostbusters* is still so popular 30 years later and that the grandchildren of the film's original viewers are still interested in all things Ghostbustery. It's true, though, and this attractive volume is a must-have for any diehard Ghostbusters fan.
