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accident, little suspecting that it was just the first of many.

"It was the song, 'We're Going To Be Friends, which is hilarious," Larson said. "It ended up being prophetic.'

Buist said she and Larson knew they were going to form a band that very day. And it came to pass in a big way.

The Accidentals perform January 28 at C2G Music Hall.

In the intervening five years, the young women (and their eventual percussionist, Michael Dause) signed a contract to record four albums with producer (and rock legend) Marshall Crenshaw, were named a "breakout act" at the SXSW Music Festival by Billboard magazine and were de-

scribed as one of the best unsigned bands in America by musicologist Jim Linderman.

Given how hard it is for most local bands in America to stir substantive national interest in their music, it can be no accident that the Accidentals have risen so far so fast.

They're really good.

At the risk of sounding like I have no idea what I'm talking about, I'll compare them to Nickel Creek, the Band Perry and other acts that mix traditional American musical forms (bluegrass, country, jazz and folk music) and make the results as instantly captivating as the best pop (without doing any of those influences a disservice).

The band had instant chemistry, of course, but some dues paying did ensue. Buist said they had no idea what they were doing at first. They owe some of their current polish to aid provided by a vibrant and nurturing Traverse City music scene.

"A lot of musicians in the area came around and really supported us," she said. "We owe it to Traverse City as a whole for coming around and doing that. Not just the musicians but the people too. Pretty soon all of Michigan started to be like that. We're kind of trying to take that general love for music and bring it other

But things certainly did happen fast. For example, the band had to wait until the summer of 2014 to tour in earnest because Larson had not yet graduated from high school.

Buist said they performed 218 shows last year.

Touring has been "one of the most difficult and amazing experiences a 19- or 20-year-old could ask for," she said.

"We've learned how to keep ourselves healthy on the road," she said. "We've learned how to load in

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# The Man As Artist As Art

#### By Heather Miller

Down a flight of wooden stairs, in the basement, hangs a curtain of Visqueen that hides the artist's workspace. A sheet of drywall mounted to the wall serves as the perfect drawing surface for Christopher Ganz, a master of charcoal, pencil and printing.

A large sheet of paper tacked to the drywall waits, ready to accept his newest charcoal drawing. His subject is the Tower of Babel, a tower partially built by the survivors of the Great Flood, a tower that would stretch into the heavens.

Ganz's tower nods to the Seven Wonders of the World as he draws one civilization on top of another, each giving way and crumbling under the weight of the next. His concept reflects his own interpretation of societies crumbling under their own weight. He

is drawing a piece of architecture that represents the life cycle of civilization; when one society dies, another takes over, building its foundation on the previous but moving forward toward modernization.

Ganz is fascinated by architecture. His idea for the Tower of Babel drawing buds from annual trips to Italy where Ganz marvels at the ancient buildings and ruins, perfect examples of old civilization serving as the foundation for our modern life. The artist is also intrigued by the internal framework of objects, a fascination that was deep-rooted during his studies of anatomy and drawing the human figure. He plans to show both the inside and outside of his Babel structure by adding caverns and gaps which will allow him to draw both the outer and inner structures of the architecture.

His current drawing, which is that of a large object drawn almost as an island, is a step away from his normal method of composition. Ganz normally creates unique worlds within his drawings, worlds that extend beyond the page and keep the viewer's mind thinking and wondering what lies beyond.

In his piece, "Reclamation," Ganz produces a world that is dark yet uplifting. The drawing represents the inside of a cathedral with light streaming in through multiple paned, Gothic windows to spotlight trees that somehow grow from the church's floor. Light pulls the eye to the altar, and then up toward the peaks of the flying buttresses where the shadow of three moon phases where the shadow of three moon phases overhead. The piece leads one to imagine walking through a forest planted between the pages of an ancient tale but with something more. A virtual overlay appearing

similar to a theater scrim offers soft lines and streaks that suggest a barrier between the viewer and the world within the drawing. The piece both haunts and absorbs. "Reclamation" is successful in both charcoal and print and is a piece that tends to linger within the viewer's mind for the long term.

The absurdity of our society and culture

of the artist's hand. Small details such as an apple paired with a snake lead one on a search for symbolism and hidden meaning.

"Absurdity ion's always had" says Governor.

"Absurdity isn't always bad," says Ganz as he refers to his drawing and its subject. "Just going into one of those stores is a visual experience. When I first started drawing I didn't realize how much was in those

places. There's just so much information, and it's all contained at eye level. The ceilings are so high, but there's nothing to look at above and there's nothing to look at below. Most of the space is just empty in those stores. They're almost incomplete."

Ganz fulfills his role as an artist by showing us how these stores are dehumanizing products of our consumer society.

"Everything in the store is designed to get your attention and to buy it. Things aren't made to be beautiful; they are there just to get your attention. Big stores

is the running theme in Ganz's work. He walks through life with an idiosyncratic eye, keenly aware and responsive to the absurdity that surrounds us all.

"There's definitely sarcasm in my work," he says. "I don't want my work to be dripping with it, just a little bit is enough."

At first sight the piece "Checking Out" is jarring, as it depicts comatose bodies sliding down the conveyor belts of a big box store. One wonders if these figures are alive or dead; then a quick realization connects with the eye as it discovers that all the figures, all eight of them, are of the same man, Ganz himself. Eight self-portraits within one drawing lets the viewer know that this piece has intentions beyond showing the deft skill

are a direct reflection of America.

"The artist should be an agent of change in society, or at the very least try to get people to look at things a little harder," he continues. "I guess there is quite a bit of social criticism in my work but I try to use humor to get the point across."

Ganz has been using his own image to get the point across since he was an undergraduate. He started adding multiple images of himself within one drawing as a graduate student and continues to use the device to tell stories and as a means to move the viewer through each piece.

Caravaggio and Rembrandt are two art-

# Writer of 'Real Life' Stories

Area attorney, musician, art gallery owner and author Mark Paul Smith said he wrote the first draft of his latest book, Honey and Leonard, in the mid-90s while he was struggling with addiction.

It was, he recalled, "written in a hazed frenzy.'

After 15 years of sobriety, Smith "dug the manuscript out of a drawer" and said he could "feel addiction dripping off the

page.
"It was a shocker," he said. "It was like, 'Whoa, I thought I was fine back

Drugs and alcohol can be a kind of "rocket fuel" that can provide "some inspiration," he said.

"Some good stuff came out of the bad stuff," he said. "But in the end, if you keep drinking, you'll kill yourself like Heming-

Smith doesn't miss those days

"In fact, guess what?" he said. "This'll shock ya. Life's more fun without it. Who knew? I could have saved a million bucks."

Smith said he had to get knocked off his high horse and end up down on his knees.

"And by 'down on my knees," he said, "I mean I had to accept a higher power in my life. I'm not saying it's Jesus or Mohammed or Buddha. I don't know what it is. I just know it's not me."

Honey and Leonard, which can be purchased via Amazon.com and

at the Castle Gallery (owned by Smith and his wife, Jody Hemphill Smith) is about an elderly couple that goes on the lam and becomes an international cause célèbre in the

Among the many aims of the book is banishment from common English usage of the word "elderly," he said.

"The book says you can be vibrant and vital well into your 70s and 80s," he said. "In fact, you can be in love! You don't have to be just elderly. I think elderly should go the way of the word retarded. Don't use it anymore. It's not nice anymore."

The Honey of the title struggles to make what she thinks she knows about love fit her current circumstances, Smith said. She thinks loving Leonard might cure him of Alzheimer's. She wonders if she can continue to love Leonard as Alzheimer's progresses. And she ponders what the ravages of age mean for her own lovability.

What she realizes (and this goes back to revelations Smith has had in his own life) is that it's "more important to love than to be loved," he said.

You can have a stadium full of people love you and it won't do you one bit of good if you can't love at least one of

them back," Smith said.

There was a time in his own life when Smith sought the love of stadiums full of people. After a stint as a newspaper reporter in the 70s, Smith went off to seek fame and fortune as part of a rock band called Wyler.

He describes Wyler as "a seven-man band touring the southern United States and working steady during the disco era."

The band found especially enthusiastic audiences on the Bayou south of New Orleans, he said.

"The band got to the point where we met with (Bob) Dylan's manager," Smith said. "He was going to sign us, and I realized, 'I don't understand any of this.' So I went to law school so I could negotiate my own rock n' roll contracts, none of which were forthcoming."

Smith's father was a lawyer who taught

his young son cross-examination at the breakfast table.

"He'd say, 'Who were you out with last night? How many sisters does he have? What's their number? I'll call them. What time did you get in? Really? Because your mother and I were up then.'

Smith said that everything he did for the first 30 or so years of his adult life was dedicated to changing the world.

"I tried to change the world as a hippie protester," he said. "I tried to change the world as a journalist. I tried to change the world through rock n' roll. And, finally, I tried to change the world through law. I'm sad to report that the world has changed me. I have not changed the world.

"For everybody who is out there now trying to change the world," Smith said, "I've tried it from every angle and, as far as I can tell, it ain't changing.

The only thing you can change, Smith said, is yourself.

"That's kind of what Honey and Leonard is about," he said. "How to change yourself.

"Here's the deal. Life is a spiritual obstacle course. It's designed to see if you can get over yourself. That's the whole game.'

We are all destined, perhaps, to believe at one or more points in our lives that we are at the center of the universe, Smith

"That is a trap we are all in," he said. "And one way out of the trap is to love somebody more than you love yourself."

Smith, who describes writing a book as "the most fun you can have with your pants on," is already hard at work on his next

It's called Rock and Roll Voodoo.

"It's about my band in New Orleans and on the Bayou," he said. "I'm about 70 pages into it, and I'm having a ball."

Smith describes it as a roman à clef.

"That is fact disguised as fiction," he said. "Because, lord knows, this protagonist is doing stuff I would never dream of doing.'

Smith eschews the "violence porn" that infects so much entertainment these days and encourages authors to write about real

"It's not always pretty," he said. "It's not always thrilling. It's long stretches of boredom punctuated by sheer terror. But that's

I think one of our fans saw it and said, 'Hey did you guys know that you're one of the top seven breakout bands at SXSW according to Billboard magazine.'

"We were like, 'No way!" she said Given that both women are under 21, it is understandable that they'd claim the last

five years have passed slowly for them. But when they're made to think about it in hindsight by an old journalist for whom time passes really quickly, they realize how improbable and magical it has all been, Buist

"We're playing SXSW," she said. "We're playing at a couple of rock venues and opening for acts like Keller Williams, Rusted Root and the Wailers. It keeps escalating into craziness. It's like this whole crazy, dream roller coaster."

Buist said they've tried to be totally present and in the moment so they "don't forget anything.'

"We've actually documented some of it via video," she said. "We're making sure we're really embracing this part of our lives because not many people do what we're doing right now."

# Putting the City's Best Face Forward

When Dan O'Connell moved to Fort Wayne in 1988 to head the city's Convention and Visitor's Bureau (now Visit Fort Wayne), he did so because he could see the potential in Fort Wayne and felt much of it had not yet been tapped. Now, almost three decades later, the city has exploded with options for both residents and visitors. While he's happy with the growth, O'Connell also sees so much more on the horizon.

His arrival in Fort Wayne came after O'Connell left a similar position in St. Cloud, Minnesota where he had graduated from St. Cloud State University, part of the University of Minnesota network and a campus that O'Connell says compares to IPFW. His major had been marketing, and he quickly saw that he could apply that knowledge to helping to improve a community.

"While I was in school, I had an internship at the local Chamber of Commerce,' says O'Connell. "I saw how advertising and marketing could be more rewarding if it was used to help with community development. Making a destination better, whether it's through ballparks or festivals, is an asset for both visitors and residents."

O'Connell admits that the focus of the visitor's bureau in St. Cloud involved a lot of fishing and snowmobiling, but he saw how much Fort Wayne had to offer and how a move here could benefit his career.

"There was a lot of potential here that the bureau wasn't really capitalizing on or championing. At that time the Memorial Coliseum was just adding on the new Expo Center, and there was the Children's Zoo, Science Central was coming along, and there was the Grand Wayne Center. There was a

Of course, the addition of Parkview Field has helped grow the downtown area and brought more foot traffic to the businesses there, but O'Connell says the seeds of downtown's revival pre-dates even the ballpark's contribution.

'The Downtown Improvement District was already working to bring more businesses to downtown and making downtown

cleaner, greener and friendlier. That was an important foundation block for all the things that followed, like the ballpark, the expanded library, the expansion of the convention cen-

That growth also helped the Convention and Visitor's Bureau to both move and rebrand itself Visit Fort Wavne. O'Connell says the changes have helped it grow and better serve the commu-

"When we moved our offices from a small parking garage across from the Hilton into the corner building on Harrison, we

were within walking distance of the Grand Wayne Center and many of the places we were working with. And with the move we decided we needed a new name, and other cities were beginning to incorporate 'Visit,' which made sense. When we were the Convention and Visitor's Bureau, people thought we were a government agency, which we're not, or the convention center, which we're not. At that same time, our online presence was exploding, and Visit Fort Wayne was already aligned with that."

The main focus of O'Connell's job is to

ago that effort took a very personal turn. His brother John, a theater and directing veteran, was looking for a new place to call home. When the IPFW theater department was looking for a new chair following the death of Larry Life, John's brother Dan was able to

provide some valuable information that ultimately led to John's relocation to IPFW where he is now dean of the College of Visual and Performing Arts and Fort Wayne.

"Of course, my brother had come here regularly to visit my family during the holiday season, so he had spent time here. But when he was looking to move here, I was able to pitch the growth of IPFW, which had just become a Division I school and was adding a medical school and the Rhinehart Music Center, so there was great growth there and in the downtown area.

But I was also able to tell him that there was an active gay community here. The gay community wasn't reclusive, and I could tell him what an open community this is. People here are tolerant."

O'Connell also notes how moderate the political landscape is here, not liking anything "ultra-conservative or ultra-liberal," and that, while it sometimes takes awhile for the city's residents to get on board with a


"Once we reach a consensus, this city acts and embraces it. That's why we're able best genealogy center in the country. I was talking to someone the other day who said. 'I'm so tired of hearing about your River Greenway! You have 60 miles of trails, and in Indy we only have 18.' I love hearing things like that."

On the horizon for O'Connell is to continue to lure more businesses and organizations into town for their conventions. He says the city's affordability, not to mention the amenities it has to offer, have made it easier to bring events, like this summer's National Scrabble Convention, into Fort Wayne. Visit Fort Wayne has also developed its social media presence, with more than 10,000 Facebook likes and 750,000 visits to their website. Those elements have helped draw more attention to everything Fort Wayne has to offer. O'Connell is also excited about the upcoming riverfront development project, and sees terrific potential for its possibilities.

With a quarter-mile of riverfront area to work with, we can do almost anything. We can have a commercial area, but we can also incorporate a natural habitat with parks and picnic areas. We have a lot of riverfront to work with, so we can play to a lot of different tastes. We don't have to put all our eggs in one basket."

In the end, with all the changes and new developments that have taken place since O'Connell came to town all those years ago. he still likes to sell Fort Wayne with the same approach that made him want to call this city home. It's a great place to raise a family.

"People say that all the time, right? That this is a great place to raise a family. And that was important to me at that time because I did have a young family, and the important factors were schools, parks, Friday Night Lights. But our social services are aimed at kids and our sports programs aim at kids. So those are the things that enticed me, and as a community leader, those are the assets to sell to other people."



ists with bodies of work that guide Ganz through each of his pieces. Besides creating beautiful images, both Rembrandt and Caravaggio are masters at moving the eye through a

"To me they are more like directors of a stage," says Ganz. "There is drama they are creating as a person moves through a piece, kind of like directing a film. There's a hierarchy in a piece, some things are more important than other things. If everything has the same value, then the piece becomes flat and no one will want to look at it long."

Spending time looking at Ganz's work is compulsory for most viewers. The precision of line and accurately developed shapes and forms in his work are not easily surpassed.

"I love trying to draw complicated things," he says. "I love the feeling of trying to capture light. That's when I really get into my work. It can take a while to figure out which way the shadows should fall and how the light hits things. Line form and shape are the hard things to solve. Getting to the details is the fun part."

Ganz has mastered accuracy and detail, but what makes

his work stand apart is his intuitive use of the picture plane.

"The paper is an arbitrary thing, an abstraction," says Ganz. "There is value and space beyond the picture that needs to be considered. It is important not to stop at the edges. An image is one part of the bigger whole."

Ganz goes on to explain that a successful piece of art can be cropped into smaller pieces that can stand alone, a feature that is common in his own work.

Ganz is an artist skilled at creating worlds that are absurd but so finely executed that we believe them.

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#### **David Bowie**

Blackstar

In the aftermath of David Bowie's unexpected passing on January 10, his 26th and final studio album, *Blackstar*, has taken on a life of its own. Released on January 8, Bowie's 69th birthday, this stark and mysterious album contained numerous clues about Bowie's illness and impending death. Between a jewel-



encrusted skull in an astronaut helmet in the title track's video, and a less subtle image of Bowie rattling on a deathbed in the video for "Lazarus," these images were observed as puzzling, bizarre and disturbing. Now, they tell a story of how Bowie dealt with being given a liver cancer diagnosis – and a finite time frame to make one last, wonderful album.

Bowie's nascent love for black music often inspired his own, so it should come as no surprise that he, along with longtime producer, Tony Visconti, were taking cues from Kendrick Lamar's *To Pimp a Butterfty*, which coalesced jazz, funk and soul into a hip-hop album. *Blackstar* demonstrates elements of jazz, funk and soul – drastically different from the art rock of his 2013 comeback album, *The Next Day*, which relied more on safety and consistency to provide a sturdy career resurrection after a decade of silence. Most Bowie fans will appreciate that *Blackstar* abandons any notion of safety, even more so when considering it as a cryptic epitaph.

All seven of *Blackstar*'s songs tie thematically to Bowie coming to terms with his death and reflecting on his life with an array of emotions and layers of subtlety. "Lazarus" goes back and forth between welcoming death to end suffering and likening himself to the namesake biblical figure who sought a cure from Jesus before succumbing to his illness. Others like "Sue (Or in a Season of Crime)" and "'Tis a Pity She Was a Whore" are based off a tragedy by 17th century playwright John Ford, and could be interpreted as allegorical references to Bowie's own repentance for past sins.

Blackstar invites various interpretations, making it an experience unique to the individual listener. (Bowie himself, perhaps misleading on purpose, told a session musician the title track was about ISIS, whereas others directly involved in the production didn't know what it was about at all.)

As fans and critics alike praise the album for being a brave and unique statement before his death, *Blackstar* is being reappraised as one of Bowie's greatest works. Greatness aside, the liberal applications of rock and jazz, as well as the cryptic lyrics, are not ready made for newcomers looking to start learning about what made Bowie the artist such a powerful and far-reaching figure in music history. However, as the world mourns Bowie's loss, *Blackstar* is indeed a fitting parting gift to those who have either followed him for decades, or will become fans in the future. Regardless of whether he was a rock star alien sent to blow our minds or a human being who made it okay for other humans to embrace their individualism, his life and work remain an immortal source of inspiration for anybody looking to make their mark on the world. A few years back, a documentary came out entitled *Global Metal*. It was a sequel of sorts to a previous doc, *Metal: A Headbanger's Journey*. Both were made by anthropologist Samuel Dunn, himself an avowed metalhead. In *A Headbanger's Journey*, Dunn explored the cultural origins and impacts of

One of the countries that made an appearance in both documentaries was India, a nation more renowned in the states for sitar music than heavy metal. Metal may not be an obvious fit, but India is culturally diverse, if nothing else, so it makes sense that metal has at least found a niche on the subcontinent. Major touring bands like Megadeth have also been making stops in India on world tours in recent years as well. And the Indian fans appearing in the docs were just as enthused about the music as they were anywhere else on the

## The Bags All Bagged Up (2007)

Alicia "Bags" Armandariz and Pat Morrison formed the Bags back in the late 1970s. On my opinion, they were the godmothers of the West Coast punk scene. Signed to the short-lived, yet extremely important Dangerhouse label, these ladies were



the reason that punk rock thrived and survived in Los Angeles during a bland musical period. This release, on the hardworking and era-saving Artifix label, captures them in their peak and features some fantastic performances and outtakes through 1979.

The collection opens with "Survive," a sultry little number as it opens before kicking over the mic stand and grinding it out for just under three minutes. "Babylonian Gorgon" follows and hints at another band (The Runaways), but has an edgier sound. Then imagine the Plasmatics a year later as an angrier version of the Bags, then a lighter version in The Go-Go's – you can see the female punk-group family tree starting to grow, right?

You get some live recordings from The Masque, a short-lived CBGB's-type club in Hollywood, as well as some stuff from a show in Portland from 1979.

All Bagged Up is not the easiest record to find, but if you have the means, you could probably score something from an auction site or on cassette. Let me know if you hear of anything.

Alice Bags still performs musically, is an activist and poet-Still travels to speak. Pat Morrison played with Sisters of Mercy and The Damned and retired from music after giving birth to her daughter in 2004.

I wish I could convey just how important this band is in the rock n' roll timeline. If you enjoy punk rock, I'd urge you to Google them to experience their originality and contribution to the punk genre. (*Dennis Donahue*)

planet.

Enter SystemHouse33, who are touted as leaders of the Indian metal scene. If you've never heard of them, don't feel bad. They're not well known outside of their native land, although they just finished a mini-tour through Germany opening up for American death metal stalwarts Six Feet Under.

Given the company they keep (read: "Chris Barnes"), it shouldn't come as a surprise that their fifth album, *Regression* is a full-on metal assault with some seriously heavy riffage. Overall, their sound is best described as a blend of groove and thrash metal; American bands that they recall are Pantera, Lamb of God and Anthrax.

After an ominous intro ("Catharsis"), the band jumps into the title track with frenzied, staccato fretwork and howled, yet somewhat melodic vocals. Those tight, almost djent-y riffs appear throughout the album, notably in songs like "Death Chamber" and "Detestable Idolatry." And they have the good sense to mix up the djent/Meshuggah-esque approach to riffage with rolling, crushing riffs that recall early Exodus.

The album is short, only eight songs counting the intro, each ranging from three to five minutes. And their sound is a bit of a throwback, eschewing, for the most part, the metalcore and death/black metal forms that have come into prominence; their sound is more akin to late 90s to early 00s thrash/groove metal, but they don't necessarily sound out of date. In fact, they're able to embody their chosen genre without sounding like a retread.

It's kind of remarkable how much they sound like an American or European metal band. If you're not paying attention to the lyrics, there's nothing in the sound to mark it as distinctly Indian or south Asian. The lyrics do deal with some of the harsh realities of living in a developing country. In that, they're a bit like Sepultura, who hail from Brazil but were able to rise to prominence in America and Europe in the late 80s and early 90s. Their sound was heavy thrash, almost death metal, but in their lyrics they often explored themes of social strife in their homeland.

For now, Systemhouse33 demonstrate on *Regression* what a potent metal outfit they are. Fans of thrash and groove metal will find plenty to enjoy on the album. It would really be interesting if the band could figure out a way to incorporate sounds and ideas that are uniquely Indian into their sound. For now, though, they're churning out more than enough to mosh to. (*Ryan Smith*)



In a bit of a strange pairing, Weezer and Panic! at the Disco have announced a coheadlining tour for this summer that will stop in 40 cities. It doesn't seem like these bands would have many fans in common, but that may be the genius behind the team-



ing, as both bands stand to gain a ton of new admirers if their performances are up to par. Panic! just released a new album called *Death of a Bachelor*, and Weezer just announced they will put out another self-titled album (currently dubbed the White Album by fans) on April 1. If you're so inclined, the tour stops in Detroit July 8, Chicago July 10 and Indianapolis July 12. **Andrew McMahon in the Wilderness** will open the shows.

The Rock Hall Three for All Tour is the "trying too hard" title of a tour featuring three Rock and Roll Hall of Fame bands on one stage in one night. **Cheap Trick, Heart** and **Joan Jett & The Blackhearts** have combined for over a century in the music industry and will bring all of that experience and all of their hits to the stage in Detroit July 14, Indianapolis July 17, Chicago July 19 and Cincinnati July 22. (Editor's note: Heart will be part of this summer's Foellinger Theatre Concert Series; tickets go on sale March 3, and judging from the response to a Facebook post we made last week [over 85,000 views and 750 shares], they are going to go very quickly.)

We were lucky to get a **Luke Bryan** show in our area last year, as the man has become one of the biggest names in the business. Bryan has graduated from the New Haven cornfields he played in last year to stadiums this year. While there will most certainly be more dates announced for 2016, Bryan has only scheduled a few so far, and they include Chicago's Wrigley Field on August 27 and Detroit's Ford Field on October 29. **Dustin Lynch** and **Little Big Town** will open the shows.

When **Motörhead**'s **Lemmy Kilmister** died in December, virtually every member of the hard rock and heavy metal community paid their respects via Twitter, Facebook or some other form of media. Lemmy was well-respected and by all accounts a very good dude. Much has been said about the English musician, but one thing you might not know is that he was not a fan of some fellow countrymen. In an interview with a German TV station just before his death and before he knew about his cancer, Lemmy acknowledged that if he died he would "have to stop performing, I guess. But you never know. I could haunt somewhere; mess up somebody else's gig." When pressed for whom he'd like to haunt most he said it would most likely be 80s new wave band **Tears for Fears**. Happy haunting, Lemmy, happy haunting.

## The Church Gets Scrutinized

Unlike the reporter in *Broadcast News*, a more comic film about the world of journalism, I won't bury the lead. *Spotlight* is superb and magnetically entertaining.

Movie magic is needed to transform the painstaking efforts of a small team of Boston Globe reporters uncovering the decades long efforts of the Boston Diocese of the Catholic Church to cover up sexual crimes against children committed by priests. Skill and dedication are what we see on screen by the filmmaking team and the reporters. But these qualities create a kind of magic.

A subject this sensitive, devastating and horrific could have gone wrong in so many ways. In *Spotlight* there are no missteps. The filmmakers don't turn drama into melodrama. They create an atmosphere of everyday life and peel back the layers.

The team named Spotlight reports stories in depth for the Globe. In 2003 they won a Pulitzer for their reporting. Specifically, they won the Pulitzer for Community Service. Their efforts could be classified as investigative reporting, but the even higher merit of their efforts is the effect they had on the community.

The catalyst to the investigation is the appointment of a new editor-in-chief at the Globe. Marty Baron (Liev Schreiber sporting an incredible poker face) takes the reins of the Globe as an interloper, to the paper and to Boston. He encourages the Spotlight team to dig deeper into the story of one particularly despicable priest who was shuffled around from parish to parish to hide his crimes.

Everyone on the team – Mike Rezendez (Mark Ruffalo), Matt Carroll (Brian d'Arcy) and Sacha Pfeiffer (Rachel McAdams) – is a lapsed Catholic to some degree. They are led by Walter Robinson "Robby" (Michael Keaton), who describes himself as a coach not a boss. The Spotlight team's editor is Ben Bradlee Jr. (John Slattery).



The local boys know that pushing the Catholic Church could have devastating effects on the paper (53% of the readership is Catholic). But once they start meeting resistance from everyone they interview, they face the uncomfortable reality that there is a huge story to be investigated and told. The telling could ruin lives, careers and more.

As one of them is told, "The church thinks in terms of centuries." That statement made me shudder. It is the answer to "How could this happen?" What's a few decades of modern age outrage over sex scandals when the Church has survived the Reformation?

What they seek to discover is not just how many priests are "bad apples," but what did Cardinal Law (a genial menacing Len Cariou) know about the sexual misconduct. They aren't after individuals. They want to know how deeply the institution of the Church is involved.

"How long is this going to take?' Robbie is asked about the investigation. "Too long," is his answer. Victim testimony is heartbreaking, but the team needs documents, which they find. One letter they find, and is quoted in the film, is a letter to Cardinal Law by a subordinate asking if the objectionable priest can be re-assigned duties away from children. That acknowledgement of a problem meant that poor soul who sent the letter was reassigned to the middle of nowhere.

Luckily for our community, we gained a man of integrity. Bishop D'Arcy came here. Luckily for him he wasn't sent to South America, as another outspoken

## Hart, Ice Cube Overcome the Force

**Tops at the Box:** Tim Story's buddy cop sequel, *Ride Along* 2, starring Ice Cube and Kevin Hart, took the No. 1 spot at last weekend's box office, selling a solid \$39.5 million in the U.S. over its first three days of release. 

## A Pair of Challenging Conversations

Two Plays on a Bench, currently running at First Presbyterian Theater, combines two one-act plays, Duck Variations by David Mamet and The Zoo Story by Edward Albee. The two share a simple plot of strangers sitting on a bench and sharing thoughts and experiences, emphasizing connections and disconnects.

In the first performed, *Duck Variations*, two older gentlemen discuss life and mortality through their observations of, among other things, ducks on a lake. The two connect in memorable ways as they observe what is happening around them in the park and stretch those observations to connect themselves to the world at large. They try though don't always understand the

points the other makes in generally generous ways. Until I checked the program, I was thinking that we never learned the characters' names, though they are George and Emil. I think I'd have preferred to continue on thinking they were nameless representations of personality types.

The character holding a Reader's Digest throughout the play, who turns out to be

named George, seems to have read bits and pieces about a variety of things. Many of his sentences begin with "I once read ..." and his companion, Emil, whose first act is to grab a newspaper from the trash bin, accepts some of what George has to say and dismisses other bits as total bunk.

Emil, too, has insights and observations to offer. One of his most interesting was that when he's at home he can look forward to going to the park, but that he has issues with the park because when he's there the only place to go is home, a lonely place for him.

As the two men, Thom Hofrichter and Bob Sut-

ton are very good and have a sweet chemistry which makes the conversation sparkle consistently. Because of this, I was amazed that a man behind me was actually snoring at one point. It isn't all sunshine and lollipops, but the overall feel of the play is one of connectedness to others and the universe's cycles of life. I rarely say this of a play, but I really loved seeing this.

The second one-act, The Zoo Story, follows in-

termission. One man, Peter, is peacefully reading on a Central Park bench one Sunday afternoon when another man. Jerry, wanders up and begins a conversation with him. We learn that Peter is a secure seemingly content family man with a wife, children, cats and a couple of parakeets. Jerry on the other hand, soon shows himself to have a troubled past and questionable present

in a rooming house with a drunken landlady and an aggressive dog. As he hears more from Jerry, Peter grows increasingly uncomfortable, as many in the audience surely will be by the play's end.

In what I'd call an unenviable role, Reuben Albaugh is very good as the manic Jerry. It's an incredibly complex role, but he manages to shift from one mood to another quite well. Albert T. Brownlee makes an appealing Peter as well.

Interpretation of drama, of course, asks audi-

Three guys, 97 minutes (give or take a few), 37 plays by the greatest playwright in the history of the English language, Godzilla and laughing till your sides hurt. What do these things have in common? You'll find them all in our production of *The Complete Works of William Shakespeare (abridged) [revised]* at Arena Dinner Theatre.

You don't need to understand Shakespeare or love his work to enjoy our show; you just need to want to laugh, and we will provide the rest. This show takes the audience on a ride that careens wildly from lunacy

to brilliance and from delightfully tacky to mildly offensive, all with large doses of tongue in cheek. Be warned, however! This is not a show for the faint of heart, the weak of constitution, the often grumpy or those with chronic good taste. Be ready for bad jokes, worse puns, sword pokes and angry fun. Watch for flying props, severed limbs, talking socks and cross-dressing men. In short be ready for anything sur

short, be ready for anything, surprised by nothing, and above all else, have a good time.

A lot of work goes into a 97-minute show covering Shakespeare's 37 plays with only three actors. I did only a portion of the work. The three gifted ac-

# Mary-Louise Parker Mans Up

Mr. You

Dear Mr. You by Mary-Louise Parker, Scribner, 2015

Mary-Louise Parker is taking a pretty big risk with the premise of her new book, *Dear Mr. You*, in terms of gender politics.

In writing about herself by focusing on the men in her life, she invites, in theory, accusations of subverting her own identity to those of the men around her, of defining herself by the way men see her rather than the way she sees herself. That's a criticism in theory only, though, because that's not at all what Parker does. If you've paid attention to any of the roles she's played in recent years, you might suspect that Parker doesn't subvert her identity to anyone, and there is no question that she's calling the shots throughout the experiences related in *Dear Mr. You.* 

The book is not quite a memoir, but it's close. It's written, as the title implies, as a series of letters (essays, really) from Parker, an actress most well-known for her roles in TV series such as Weeds and The West Wing, to men who have played important parts in her life. Sometimes they've played small parts (a young Native American dancer with whom she shared a momentary flirtation when she was a teenager). Sometimes their parts have been huge- her father and her grandfather, especially. Parker sees them all as significant, and she frames the story of her life through her encounters and relationships with these men.

That sounds terrible, but it's a lot less charged when you realize that the men who are the subject of the essays are not, ultimately, the subject of the book. The subject of the book is, without a doubt, Parker herself, and if anyone gets shortchanged in the deal, it's the men who exist solely to react to Parker or to provide a way for Parker to construct her image of herself. The men are a means to measure the author, to observe her, and they don't have much substance in themselves

There's the college theater teacher whose strongly-worded advice that Parker should get over herself and work harder was the wake-up call that helped



transform her from a flighty adolescent into a serious artist. There's the beautiful beach bum who helped save her from her own timidity. There's the accountant who helped save her from her irresponsibility.

Most of the men in the book are, in one way or another, stand-ins for Parker's father, the subject of one of the first essays in the book. That essay, as well as one about the grandfather she never knew, are

deeply sentimental and affectionate, and in them Parker credits these men with instilling in her a ferocious dedication to family and a steely resilience. She makes it clear that, of all the men in her life, her father came first.

That's important, because it's the presence of a father figure that allows Parker to be who she wants to be. She can be the woman who's not so good with money because she's got Abraham the accountant to keep an eye on her. She can be the free-spirited college girl because she's got a movement teacher

reminding her that she can't breeze her way through everything. The men give her something to rebel against and something to fall back on.

Dear Mr. You begins with a condensed dedication to all the men who have crossed Parker's path, and it's sometimes a cringe-inducing litany of masculine cliches: "to you who can fix my screen door, my attitude, and open most jars; to you who codifies, slams a puck, builds a decent cabinet or the perfect sandwich."

These are guy's guys, with little in the way of nuance, weakness or flaw. If the book is going to be a faithful portrait of real men, this is not a good way to begin. As it turns out, though, it doesn't matter. As the negative space by which Parker creates a portrait of herself, these men work just fine.

critic was threatened.

The behind-the-screen brilliance of *Spotlight* begins with the screenplay by Josh Singer. The journalists who reported the story were given the opportunity to review the screenplay. Though *Spotlight* is a crime procedural, there is no creepy Special Victims Unit nonsense here. The brilliant work of editor Tom Mc-Cardle probably makes the screenplay even better.

Director Tom McCarthy (*The Station Agent*) juggles tones, moods and environments. Most notably, *Spotlight* is a tribute to old school newspaper journalism, of endless painstaking research. The work of the Spotlight team is not the work of a few sanitized internet searches. *Spotlight* is just as grim and plain as a real old-fashioned workplace. In *Spotlight* the smell of stale coffee and the ache of prolonged sleep depriva-

tion lurk at every corner. In these nitwit times, this is a welcome reminder of how vital and productive the facts, thoughtfully presented, can be.

The Spotlight team performed a profound community service for Boston. But the experience of Boston is not unique. At the end of the film, the number of communities in the United States where similar scandals have been uncovered, in part because of the work of the Spotlight team, is staggering. An even larger number of communities around the world have uncovered similar crimes and cover-ups. Spotlight will continue the healing of victims by acknowledging they have been wronged. Spotlight is also a masterpiece of the craft of movie-making and a gracious salute to the value of journalism. Don't miss it.

ence members to find meaning and connect lines of dialogue to bigger messages and possibly to universal truths. *Duck Variations* is the far more accessible of the two in terms of offering easier connections to self and the world around us. *The Zoo Story* clearly asks more of the audience and some may, to be honest, not be up to the challenges it presents. Whereas *Duck* 

Variations encourages connecting to other members of our species, *The Zoo Story* suggests that it's probably best not to. Though I prefer to follow the line of thought offered by the former, the combination of the two offers two valid ways of seeing a chance meeting with a stranger.
