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

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## ----- Feature • Fort Wayne Youtheatre A Profile in Kid Courage

If it's true that "those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it," then Fort Wayne Youtheatre is not only providing our city with its classes for young performers and a wide slate of ambitious productions, but it is also helping us all to remember the past. This is particularly true of its series of plays, Young Heroes of Consciousness. Previous plays spotlighted Mary Ingalls and Indiana's own Ryan White; this year's entrant in the series is *Ruby Bridges*.

As before, this year's production is written and directed by Gregory Stieber and

shines a light on the story of young Ruby Bridges who, at the tender age of six, was to become a pivotal figure in desegregating the South. Leslie Hormann, the executive director of Fort Wayne Youtheatre, is proud of the stories the series has dra-

"Greg came to me with the idea for *Ruby Bridges*," says Hormann. "With the timing for Black History Month, I didn't even have to think about it. It falls in line with our Young Heroes of Consciousness series, which last year featured Ryan

White. It's amazing how many major social upheavals have been led by children, and spotlighting those is the goal and mission of this series. As the Bible says, 'And a child shall lead them."

Hormann's involvement with this particular production goes beyond overseeing it as a Youtheatre administrator. She will also be playing the plum role of principal of Ruby Bridges' school, a character which at first blush is the story's villain.

'Greg asked me if I'd play the part, and it's fun to play the bad guy. My most recent performances have been directed by Greg, and I love working with him. I love his artistic insight, and I'd do anything for him. It's time consuming to be in a play, and my schedule makes it hard for me to be in anything. But he's one of my favorite local directors, and this is a great chance for me to be on the stage again."

For Stieber's part, he understands that the principal would likely be one-dimensional, the person audiences root against. But his approach to not only that character but to the entire play he's writing and directing is far more nuanced, and his hope is to bring understanding even to characters whose behavior may not invite much sympathy.

"As I was writing it, I was putting human faces on people and showing that even with those who seem like pure evil, we need to understand how they got there," says Stieber. "This was a certain time in history, and the same was true last year with our story about Ryan White. Whether it's New Orleans in 1960 or Kokomo in 1985, these stories capture a certain time in history, and we have to look at these people in the context of that time. And do these people learn from what's going on or do they not?"

Stieber has done extensive research into that era, not only as it played out in Louisiana, but as it reflected the atmosphere in the country. He also used those news stories as a tool during auditions to cast Ruby Bridges.

"I've been examining content and incorporating content from various news publications in 1960, particularly the New York well-suited in many ways, Stieber has seen through his research that the price she paid was high.

"The NAACP worked with churches to recruit kids for this particular role," he says. "It didn't just happen, it was a well-organized event. Ruby tested well because she showed very little reaction to things, so they talked the family into it. And at the beginning, all of these organizations were behind it, but very quickly everyone disappeared. and this little girl and her family were dealing with all of this on their own. They had to bring in a teacher from Boston because the teachers there wouldn't teach her. And Ruby

was in the class all by herself. It was just her and her teacher for that entire year. Every day she would arrive at school surrounded by four federal agents and had to hear people calling her names and threatening to poison her food. She just kept it all inside, but the price she paid that year was high. She was such a little soldier, and she came out the other side and went to high school and college. which speaks a lot about her."

Response to Ruby Bridges has already been enthusiastic, even months before its staging. Hor-

mann says that their performances for local schools had to be moved from the ArtsLab black box theatre downtown to Wayne High School to meet demand. And when the three scheduled shows sold out, a fourth one was added. In addition to this contribution to Black History Month, Youtheatre also has a touring production Celebrate Indiana, an

official event in the state's Bicentennial celebration. May brings the third annual Fairy Tale Fest on May 14, an event which draws families downtown in droves, and fans of Ruby Bridges can look forward to future installments of Young Heroes of Consciousness and the stories which continue to shape

www.fortwayneyoutheatre.org Times. I also used those stories and had our auditioners read them, prompting them to do so with anger, with fear or with compassion. They were reading factual content, and it was up to the actor to make the choice about how to read it. Both the adult actors and the child actors were making some really great choices. The African-American actors were reading passages with anger tinged with fear because there was great fear among the black community in 1960, fear that what was happening with Ruby Bridges was only going to make things worse for them because it was getting so much attention and so many of them didn't support what was going on.

"Ultimately I want to incorporate what we did in the auditions into the fully realized production because I see this as a real ensemble piece, a work created by the actors and the writer/director."

While Stieber is presenting a balanced approach to the supporting characters, clearly the hero of this story is little Ruby, a girl carefully selected to be placed in this highprofile situation. While she may have been

"What I've liked most about these first three subjects in the series - Mary Ingalls, Ryan White and Ruby Bridges - is that they were all children who faced adversity to be educated," says Stieber. "Mary Ingalls became blind but didn't languish. She got educated and learned how to function in the world. When Ryan White was forced out of school, he fought for his right to go to school, to get his education, and in the process he woke up the entire country and reminded us that AIDS wasn't just relegated to the gay community. And Ruby Bridges at just six years old was the first to break the barriers of blacks in white schools. They all faced challenges for the right to an educa-

# Ambassador of the 4-String

The ukulele might just be the most un-

derestimated instrument in all of world music. A perennial underdog, it is often dismissed as a child's toy and nothing more. But Jake Shimabukuro, the Hawaiian-born ukulele virtuoso, has changed millions of people's minds about the supposedly humble instrument.

Thanks to a couple of viral videos (including his YouTubed rendition of George Harrison's "While My Guitar Gently Weeps"), countless television appearances, 11 studio albums and several world tours that have taken him to the edge of the globe and back again, listeners now understand that the uke is not simply a cute afterthought, something to be plucked lazily in the background while a singer croons about the boundless beauties of island life. Instead, it can be the main event, by turns gorgeous and complex, joyful and heartbreaking.

Shimabukuro is, in effect, a ukulele ambassador, although he'd be the last to lay claim to that title. The 39-year-old, who'll be

performing with the Fort Wayne Philharmonic Saturday, January 30 at the Embassy Theatre as part of the philharmonic's Pops series, is unfailingly modest.

"I'm just a big fan of the instrument," he said in a recent phone interview. A native of Honolulu, Shimabukuro was in Nashville at the time we talked, recording his newest album. "I love playing it and I think it is one of the most diverse instruments out there. You can play

very, very simple things and make people smile, or you can play complicated pieces and wow them. It's one of those instruments that sound good the first time you pick it up.

It's disarming in that way."

Shimabukuro picked up his first ukulele at the tender age of four. The instrument was a present from his mother, an accomplished ukulele player and singer in her own right, and soon he was practicing for hours a day. As a teen, Shimabukuro played coffee shops in and around his home town, and he was a member of two award-winning bands – Pure Heart and Colón – in the late 90s and early aughts. When Colón disbanded in 2002, he went on to pursue a solo career, catching the ear of Sony Japan International who signed him to their Epic Records International la-

He went on to tour Japan, coming home to create his own label, Hitchhike Records, so he could distribute his music stateside.

Under that label he put out *Sunday Morning* (2002), *Crosscurrent* (2003), *Walking Down Rainhill* (2004) and *Dragon* (2005), the latter peaking at No. 5 on Billboard's Top World Music Albums of 2005. Each album was showered with honors in his native Hawaii, and soon he was touring the U.S.

It wasn't until a year later, though, that he got what is typically referred to as a "big break." A video of Shimabukuro doing his own ukulele version of "While My Guitar Gently Weeps" was posted to YouTube following his appearance on the New York TV show *Midnight Ukulele Disco*, and the world sat up and paid attention. The video has 14.4 million views and counting.

The immediate result was a request from Jimmy Buffet to join his world tour, and Shimabukuro very readily complied. He'd been a fan of Buffet's for years. Other artists clamored to collaborate with the young star, including Yo-Yo Ma, Cyndi Lauper, Bela

Fleck and Ziggy Marley. Such seemingly overnight success situations have derailed many a career or, at the very least, given

performers a big head, but Shimabukuro simply continued to work hard, putting out his fifth studio U.S. album, *Gently Weeps* in September of that same year and composing the score for the film *Hula Girls*.

Fans of Shimabukuro's know he's a wonderful multi-tasker. Since becoming a veritable household name in 2006, he's given numerous TED talks, put out five albums (including the No. 1 Billboard World Music hit from 2011, Peace Love Ukulele) and toured the world, tirelessly promoting not only the humble ukulele but the importance of music education and following one's passion in life. He's an inspiration to many - both the young and old - and that's why, in 2010, filmmaker Tadashi Nakamura decided to follow Shimabukuro around, documenting his life on the road and interviewing his family and friends at home in Hawaii in an effort to paint a full and honest portrait of the ukulele player.

It was a disconcerting experience for Shimabuku-

ro who, while at that point a veteran stage performer, had a difficult time adjusting to always having a camera around and having that camera pointed at him.

"I couldn't get used to it," he said. "I remember a lot of time I'd hold the door open for the cameramen. I knew they were behind me, so I'd just hold the door as a reflex and ruin all their shots. They'd

tell me, 'Jake, pretend we're not here, we're invisible,' but it's hard to be natural when you know someone's watching. You walk differently, you act differently."

Eventually, though, he grew used to being the subject of a documentary and the film, *Jake Shimabukuro: Life on Four Strings*, came out in 2012. It took home several film festival awards and honors, aired on PBS in 2013 and was streaming on Netfix until recently. For his part, Shimabukuro is simply grateful for the chance it gave him to meet and work with talented people, all now good friends of his.

"When you're an artist, all you really

"When you're an artist, all you really want to do in life, besides create beautiful art, is work with wonderful people who inspire you, who share your same values and mission, and lucky for me that's what happened with *Life on Four Strings*."

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# Finding Stages for Comics

-----Feature • Let's Comedy -----

Open Mic nights have long been a staple around the country, and Fort Wayne is no exception. The tradition provides an opportunity to people who have a desire to perform and to audiences who want to catch a new and perhaps promising talent.

Typically those open mic sessions are

musical, but a group of friends decided to provide a new spin on open mic, providing a different talent the chance to shine. The result of that desire is Let's Comedy, a source and resource for local comedy hopefuls to try out material on audiences looking for a good laugh.

The friends who made Let's Comedy happen are Ryan Ehle, Ian Anderson, Alex Price, Jared

Busch and Corey Courrielche, and now, more than two years after they first came up with the idea, the quintet are seeing big results from their efforts. Not surprisingly, a couple of them are comedians themselves.

'Jared and I have been friends for years. and I worked with Ian at Discount Comic Book Store," says Ehle. "The three of us all became friends, and Corey and Alex are comedians and have performed all over the region, touring and doing comedy for quite some time. We started talking about bringing open mic nights on a regular basis for comedians in Fort Wayne and surrounding cities. Comedians are always looking for places to perform, and they like to perform in front of different audiences so they can work on material and not have to come up with new material for the same audiences all the time."

Once they got the ball rolling, word spread quickly through old school means like flyers and through the new millennium's version of word of mouth, social media. Soon comics from cities in adjacent states -Chicago, Detroit, Columbus – as well as cities in Indiana like South Bend were flocking to the events, providing the evenings with a

"We would have maybe 75 people show up for these open mic nights, and we'd

have to get it down to 12 to 15," says Ehle. "We were posting flyers all around town, but word was also getting out on Facebook and Instagram and Twitter which was very helpful. We started getting more comics to commit to performing here, and they would talk to other comedians and share our events with them. It's really helped open up interest in what we're doing.'



And what they're doing has grown considerably since they began with the simple concept of open mic events. Let's Comedy has grown into a larger, promotional entity, one which is helping to give area comedians a break while also bringing already established talent to the region. While they continue to host events at local establishments like Pint & Slice, O'Sullivan's, Pedal City and the Calhoun Soups, Salads and Spirits Tiger Room (where Ehle works booking events, giving him an inside track on the room's availability), they also filled one of the performance halls at IPFW's Rhinehart Music Center when comedian Doug Benson appeared last May.

That May performance came fresh on the heels of the group officially branding itself Let's Comedy, with a logo and merchandise to help build that brand. Their events have branched out to include scores of local venues, including Deer Park, Columbia Street West and the new Trubble Brewing on Broadway.

On January 30 Let's Comedy hosts a unique event, An Evening with the Authors, at the Jennifer Ford Art Gallery on Carroll Road. White Rabbit Cabaret in Indianapolis, which hosts An Evening with the Authors regularly, describes the events as "some of

the best comedians working in the Midwest today lends their skills to An Evening with the Authors, performing in character as fake authors reading from their fake books."

Ehle sees this as not only a great way to bring comedy to Fort Wayne, but also a means of widening the reach for Let's Comedy in its quest to give local talent a place to share their comedy. In fact, as comedians

from other states continue to come to Fort Wayne to ply their trade, Let's Comedy is working to expand into other areas as well, particularly Indianapolis. but contacts in larger markets like Chicago and Los Angeles have also taken note of what's happening here in the Summit City, providing exciting possibilities in the months and years to come. Ehle says comedians and

performers are becoming increasingly aware of the growing demand in this area.

For his part, Ehle is content to be the man behind the machine while his cohorts take the stage. Ehle says he enjoys writing but leaves the performing to others, preferring instead to handle promotion and marketing. Courrielche lives and works in South Bend, though he performs here as well, and the partners often take the stage to do standup or to play host to the open mic festivities. itself a demanding job.

As Let's Comedy continues to grow. Ehle says local fans of comedy should watch for announcements in the months ahead, including a partnership with Cinema Center where Let's Comedy will have events similar to the popular Mystery Science Theatre 3000 on Comedy Central. Ehle, a father of three young children, also hopes to provide children's comedy shows in the near future. giving kids and families a chance to hear less R-rated material than might be found in clubs and open mic sessions. And that's just a taste of what lies ahead for Let's Comedy.

'People should stay tuned because we have some big plans coming up in 2016," says Ehle. "There are some big names involved, and we have some great things we're already lining up for this year."

Speaking of a shared value system and mission, Shimabukuro is a constant presence in the classroom, playing his music for students all over the world and encouraging them to follow their dreams.

"My passion is obviously music, but I want to use my passion to help kids discover what they're passionate about," he said. "Whether it's dance or medicine or being a chef, these can all be art forms. You can make an art form out of being a scientist or a massage therapist. It doesn't matter what the subject is, as long as you love it and learn as much as you can and continue to grow."

When he's not on the road, he's home in Hawaii with his wife, an OB-GYN physician, and two sons, soaking up as much family time as he can.

"I'm gone maybe seven months out of the year - thank goodness for Facetime and Skype – but when I'm home, all I do is spend time with my family. I love music, I love touring. This is my passion, but it is hard to be away. I'm very grateful that my family is extremely supportive of me. The trick is to find a good balance. I'm always working on finding a good balance."

# Recreating an Iconic Performance

In a career filled with iconic moments, the concert Pink Floyd played to an empty amphitheatre in the eerily still and sandy city of Pompeii stands out as groundbreaking and mind-bendingly odd. It's also a snap shot of a band in

its vibey prime, the players so in tune with each other that anything was possible. Which makes it a fitting concert for Pink Droyd, the Fort Wayne-based Floyd tribute act, to recreate. They'll bring their own version of Live at Pompeii to C2G Music Hall Saturday, February 6 at 8 p.m.

Pink Droyd - Kevin Quandt (lead vocals, guitars, talk boxes), Daniel Fisher (synthesizers, piano, vocals, trombone), Mike Lennon (lead guitar, vocals), Tim Hofherr (bass, vocals) and Nick Talevski (drums, FX) - have been together for nearly a decade and have achieved the kind of chemistry necessary to do justice to the now beloved but not necessarily radio-friendly songs featured on the 1972 film, including "Echoes," "A Saucerful of Secrets," "Set the Controls for the Heart of the Sun" and "Mademoiselle Nobs."

Live at Pompeii directly preceded the wildly popular Dark Side of the Moon and dared to do things quite differently. Not only is the concert performed for an auditorium of empty seats, but the film footage features a montage of mosaics, mud and panoramas of Pompeii itself. It's a trippy, sonic masterpiece and one of Quandt's favorite offerings from

"One thing we strive to do as a band is bring a new show every time we come back to a venue," he said in a recent phone interview. "We want to give people something to look forward to and plan for. Live at Pompeii was a fantastic time for Pink Floyd. It shows them transitioning from their early psychedelic era to a more epic songwriting style, and so what really draws you in about this show is the sonic landscape, the rich layering Pink Floyd does so well."

The dudes from Pink Droyd are not mere imitators. Established and accomplished musicians in their own right, they seek to transport audiences the same way Pink Floyd has transported them over the years, and that means spending hours of listening to every album – studio, live and bootleg – Roger Waters et al ever recorded.

Fisher, a fan of Pink Floyd since early adolescence, said that when you're a tribute band like Pink Droyd, close enough is not nearly good enough.

"You have to get things exactly right," he said. "But that doesn't entail simply memorizing every note. It's about knowing how each player plays. It's about getting inside that space and really inhabiting it. Every recording of every show sounds different, so it's not like we're slavishly locked in to the studio recording version of a song. We do our work based on dozens of versions played live by them."

A pretty strong level of commitment, that. Pink Droyd are also committed to recreating, in a historically accurate and compelling way, the sometimes dizzying look of a Pink Floyd show. Projections, video, lasers, fog, you name it, Pink Droyd provide it.

"If you're going to simulate a band that's been active



from the 60s until now, you have to have a lot of gear to cover all those time periods, all those sounds," Fisher said. "We bring a 32-foot screen, projectors, robotic lighting, and four quarter-of-a-million dollar lasers."

And, since Live at Pompeii prominently features a gong. (In addition to being struck a number of times during the show, it appears on the video's cover art.) The members of Pink Droyd are now the proud owners of a 28-inch version of the brass instrument.

"It's all about creating an authentic experience," Fisher

Live at Pompeii was, visually, a rather stripped-down version of Floyd, and the first part of the Pink Droyd C2G show will reflect that. When the band is finished creating that moment in history, however, they'll bring out the lasers, etc., and treat audiences to hits from Floyd's other many splendored eras. Regardless of what song they're playing, Pink Droyd hope listeners will get lost in the music.

"Full immersion is what we're after," Quandt told me. "I

enjoy performing and I know what I get out of the music. I want our fans to get that same sort of pleasure, so to that end, we listen to them. Some are there for the bright lights and movement, some need lasers and video, others just want it to be loud. We understand this because it's how we are, too."

It's hard to hear about how Pink Droyd came together

and not think of dominoes, the magical way they fall into place. Nine years ago, Piere's hosted a Pink Floyd tribute night with The Wailhounds, City Lights and Quandt's own Earthbound Misfits. It was so much fun Quandt decided he wanted to start a Pink Floyd tribute band, but not just any Pink Floyd tribute band. This group would have to be the real deal, to take itself and Floyd

Enter Fisher, who helmed a Floyd tribute band in Boston before moving to Fort Wayne to work at Sweetwater, and Lennon, a colleague of Fisher's at Sweetwater and former member of Fort Wayne's The Lennon Brothers, also a Floyd tribute act. Talevski and Hofherr, die-hard Floyd fans, rounded out the lineup.

Given that the music of Pink Floyd has been sending teens to their lava lamp-lit rooms to plug in and chill out since the 60s. it makes sense that each of the members of Pink Droyd has his own favorite Floyd era. Their passion for the band, however, clearly unites them in a common cause, and Quandt credits Floyd's staying power with the deceptively cerebral nature of the songs. That, at

least, is what initially attracted him and still holds him in thrall today.

"It's amazing that they can make a song that is incredibly complex yet seemingly so simple. On the surface, the lyrics are neat and cool and digestible, yet you can continue to reflect on them for decades. They're current, they're timely, and sometimes you'll be going along, driving in your car, and you don't realize you just listened to a seven-minute song about money. The songs are so well constructed you can lose yourself; you can

lose track of time. Their music always does that to me."

And who knows? Should you attend the C2G show, you might just be able to imagine you've been transported back in time to the Pompeii of 1971 when the Adrian Maben-directed video was first recorded. Close your eyes and you're there with David Gilmour and Roger Waters and Richard Wright and Nick Mason. Or maybe you'd prefer to go even further back to 79 CE when the eruption of Mt. Vesuvius blanketed the ancient Roman city in meters of ash and pumice, preserving it in a state of suspended animation for centuries to come.

That's the beauty of Floyd. Set the controls for the heart of the sun and there's no predicting where you might end

#### Listen to Formation, Look for the Signs

Have you ever been won over within mere seconds of a first listen to a new artist?

If you're especially discerning or listen to a lot of music or are just plain snobbish, it does not happen all that often. But in the time it took to hear Nadia Reid open her debut album with, "When I hit the ground in all my glory, I will know where I have come from / In the shadow of a doubt that meets the morning, I have come, and I have faced it," I was sold.



Perhaps it's the timeless, unblemished quality of her vocal. Or the spare, pulsing musical background that bolsters it. Or the unhurried meter in her delivery. One thing is for sure: I was sitting through the duration of Listen to Formation, Look for the Signs, come hell or

I've heard this album described as "emotionally literate," which sounds like it means something, but really doesn't. If I take it to mean her lyrics are astute and make a connection with the listener that perfectly jibes with the beautiful understatement she employs to sing them, well, okay. She works her way into your bloodstream smoothly; you only vaguely recall any pinprick of a needle at all. But the emotional complexity on display is readily apparent. The music is equally evocative and never overdone.

Acoustic guitars are at the fore here, no more so than on "Call the Days." Droning notes move against one another in their own good time, with Reid singing, "I was happy on my own / I would call the days as they were known." Like indie contemporary Sharon Van Etten, Reid knows what her biggest strength is: her voice carries the show. The slow-burning "Just to Feel Alive" allows Reid plenty of room to maneuver, while "Reaching Through," the relative "rocker" of the album, retains a central calm inside its musical majesty.


I'm happy to report that the remainder of Listen to Formation, Look for the Signs completely lives up to the first few seconds that pulled me in. Reid is off to a tremendous start. (D.M. Jones)

#### J. Hubner

#### **Dreams from the Big Cloud**

From his underground lair, oneman music machine J. Hubner continues his streak of solid solo releases. His latest, Dreams from the Big Cloud, marks Hubner's third album under his own handle in as many years. And it's a safe bet he's already on to another project as this one rolls out of the shipping dock up at ground level.

Some artists wait for the muse to visit, while others are simply compelled to create because it's part of their being. Unless Hubner has locked the doors and compelled the muse to



This isn't to imply synthesis. It's thoroughly, distinctively Hubner's style (one facet of it anyway). Similarly, the title track somehow conjures a bit of a Britpop vibe, though you'll find no Pollardian, faux-Limey accent here. Hubner's strength lies in delivering bittersweet, even at times melancholy material inside often breathtaking ear candy. In the case of this track, headphones pay dividends. And you might find "Theme For Enlightenment (Terry Riley's Beard Part One)," with its circular guitars and languid organs, may seem somewhat slight at first. But this uncomplicated instrumental quickly grows in to an earworm. In fact, "Theme..." could easily pass for an unused Matthew Sweet number. It also sets the stage for the closer, "Ash Wednesday." Simultaneously upfront and spacey, the song's tom-driven drums and low-flying guitar chords anchor the echos that

#### **David Bowie** Scary Monsters (1980)

Bowie's first album after the Berlin Trilogy, and his 14th overall, Scary Monsters (And Super Creeps) is a quirky diversion from of his earlier work. It was also a commercial success that made music videos a "must-



have" for artists entering the decade of music on television.

After opening with "It's No Game (No. 1)," side one goes all in with four classic tunes that redefined the Bowie sound. "Up the Hill Backwards" has some great guitar layers and was written partly about his divorce from his wife Angela. The title track featured Robert Fripp (King Crimson) on guitar and was a harder sound for Bowie; it defined the raw feel of the release. One of my favorite Bowie songs, it has been covered by many over the last 35 years. "Ashes to Ashes" was a global hit and was regarded by Bowie to be a nursery rhyme for the 80s. The video for this track is still regarded as groundbreaking and was at the time the most expensive music video ever produced. Side one closes with 'Fashion," a funky disco-type number that also has a pretty cool video to accompany it.

Side two opens with "Teenage Wildlife" and has the dazzling guitar-synth sound from Chuck Hammer. The rest of the release is a mixture of pop, glam, folk and new wave and solidified Bowie as one of the best artists of his generation.

Bowie produced a dozen more records through 2016's Blackstar and appeared in 20 films throughout his career. Sadly, on January 10, he passed away from liver cancer in New York City. I have a favorite musician/band list, and he was an easy top-five pick. No one was more original, and we are all lucky to have had him making music in our crazy world. (Dennis Donahue)

bathe Hubner's vocals in the chorus. And, yes, the whole song is a hook. We're lucky to have local artists like Josh Hall, Kevin Hambrick, and Hubner: each is never afraid to step out of his comfort zone but is always instantly recognizable in his own work. To me, that's an art in itself. (D.M. Jones)

#### The Grascals And then there's this ...

With the departure of founding member Jamie Johnson early last year, bluegrass group The Grascals had some rearranging to do before they were ready to release a new album. The remaining members replaced Johnson with John Byran, a former member of



Larry Efaw and The Bluegrass Mountaineers, and Bryan took over guitar and vocal duties as the group prepared to record new material. The result is an album, And then there's this..., that is consistently more traditional than the group's last.

That previous album, 2013's When I Get My Pay, was full of tracks that were far more radio-ready contemporary country than they were straight-ahead bluegrass. Adding banjo and mandolin to the album's title track couldn't disguise the song's country-rock heart, and the presence of Dierks Bentley on "American Pickers" isn't the only thing that gives the song a bar anthem vibe.

That all changes on And then there's this.... Not only are the song choices more traditional (the album-ending version of Bill Monroe's "Highway of Sorrow" is as old-fashioned as can be) but the current Grascals show little interest in producing contemporary-sounding tunes. Even when they veer away from bluegrass toward commercial country, it's commercial country from a long, long time ago; the lilting melody of the verse of "Road of Life" recalls Glen Campbell's "Gentle on My Mind" more than it sounds like anything recorded in

Bryan's vocals are key to the album's traditional feel. He brings no honky-tonk swagger to his delivery, and he manages to make a song like "Sweet Little Mountain Girl" sound like it was written a hundred years ago. Throw in a handful of songs sung by even-moretraditional Terry Eldredge and a few chances to showcase the group's instrumental prowess, and you've got an album that sounds a lot like the Grascals of a decade ago. 

The worst thing about Sunday brunch at the Green Frog is deciding what to order. The best thing is realizing that it really doesn't matter. There are no bad choices.

Granted, this generous assessment of the Green Frog brunch is based on just two of the seven dishes offered. Certainly it would be a mistake to heap praise so wantonly were it not for the resume and track record of the people at the controls.

Matt Billings, owner of the Green Frog, has joined forces with Andrew Smith, Jack May and Dan Campbell, the team behind the Junk Ditch Brewing Company and Affiné Food Truck, and Grace Kelly, the GK in GK Pastries, to offer up a menu that is varied and unexpected. And the bloody Mary

bar doesn't hurt.

Fancy a tumble with croque madame (house ham, Havarti, pickled onion, fried egg, GK Cuban bread)? Or do biscuits and gravy (house chorizo, lime, scallion, GK biscuit) sound more like your style?

Neither of those appeared at the table on a recent Sunday in early January. What did show up, however, was an appealing plate

of potato rosti (fingerling potato, oyster mushroom, bechamel, spinach, slow egg) and another of shrimp and grits (crispy shrimp, polenta, jowl bacon, house knackwurst).

The potato rosti was a perfect balance of ingredients. It would have been easy to soak the veggies and 'shrooms in the sauce, which combined with the egg yolk would have required a straw or strong tongue to lap up. But such was not the case. The firm exterior of the potatoes yielded nicely to reveal the fluffy interior while the finely cooked spinach added a healthy feel to the dish.

As for the grits and shrimp, no southerner could complain. The polenta (the fancy name for cornmeal mush) was just mushy enough if that makes any sense. Snuggled in and on the grits was an ample school of

tender and crispy shrimp and cubes of jowl bacon and knackwurst (a fancy name for sausage). It wasn't easy for me to tell the difference between the bacon and the knackwurst. I don't think they could pick me out of a pile of grits either. But that's okay. Recognition is not required for enjoyment. I was happy, and the hog didn't complain.

Speaking of hogs, the ones who add flavor to the

Green Frog brunch selections did not have far to travel, coming as they did from Gunthorp Farms in Lagrange. The other ingredients come from local sources as well. Junk Ditch Gardens provides the produce, Fischer arms in Jasper the beef and maple syrup, eggs come from Wholesome Horizon in Larwill and from Country Garden in Fort Wayne, which also supplies produce. Hawkins Family Farm rounds out the localvore dream

team by providing chicken and produce.


The menu is rounded out by the brunch musthave, Benedict (Hollandaise, house Canadian bacon, slow egg, GK biscuit) and perhaps the most adventurous of the items: chicken and waffles (fried chicken, sweet potato waffle, citrus, maple, Valentina).

Well, almost rounded out. The pastries must not be neglected. Consisting of banana bread, cranberry and white chocolate scone and cinnamon roll, the baked goods whipped up by Kelly are enough to make any grandmother hang it up. The perfectly balanced flavor and texture, not to mention the delicate sweetness, made the Green Frog brunch experience complete.



I haven't seen *Chi-raq* yet either. Wouldn't it be great if a theater in Fort Wayne deigned to bring that title to town? Spike Lee surprised me with his sense of humor in recent interviews. He isn't calling for a boycott of the Oscars. He's just going to the Knicks game that day.

Why hasn't *Chi-raq* made it to Fort Wayne? Lots of movies have made even less at the box office, but they have been here.

Spike mentioned that *Driving Miss* Daisy won more awards the year that *Do the* 

Right Thing was released. Spike suggested without explicitly saying so, that some injustice still lingered. I've seen both of those movies recently. Neither of them stands up very well. They are both dated by the attitude of their filmmakers.

Viola Davis doesn't have an Oscar. Halle Berre does. So do Whoopie, Mo'Nique, Octavia Spencer and Lupita Nyongo. That ain't right. Jada Pinkett Smith and Will and more are sitting out the Oscars. Boo hoo hoo. Will keeps trying to make an Oscar-worthy movie, but he can't seem to deliver. Is that Oscar's fault? No.

Oops I rant. *Carol* is a feast of cars and clothes. And smoking. There is a lot of smoking. Cloying annoying smoking. *Carol* has great production design, attitude, a mean husband, a victim daughter and more smoking.

Carol has a scene of girl-on-girl action. Once upon a time that might have provoked something. Mercifully, not any more.

Have you seen Star Wars: The Force Awakens? Way more fun than Carol.

## Inarritu Has a Hit and Maybe a Record

Tops at the Box: Alejandro Gonzalez Inarritu's latest masterpiece, *The Revenant*, took the No. 1 spot at the box office last weekend, selling another \$16 million. The film has already made a whopping \$120 million in the U.S. and almost \$200 million worldwide. Last year Inarritu won Best Director and his film, *Birdman*, won Best Picture. That film only made \$42 million, for perspective. Does this mean *The Revenant* is a lock to win Best Picture and Best Director? No, I don't think it does. I get the feeling *Spotlight*, which received six major nominations, will sweep the four major awards. But damn, it would be pretty interesting if an artist like Inarritu, made history by winning Best Picture and Best Director two consecutive years.

Also at the Box: Star Wars: The Force Awakens continues to sell well, bringing in another \$14.2 million, upping the flick's domestic total to \$880 million, making it the all-time best-selling film in the U.S. Add to that another \$1.06 billion in foreign ticket sales and Star Wars is now the No. 3 grossing worldwide film ever. 

mier returns to Arena Dinner Theatre to helm the uproarious comedy, The Complete Works of Shakespeare (Abridged) [Revised].

The extremely energetic, tongue-in-cheek production brings Shakespeare down to earth for mainstream and aficionados alike. The script points out some of the flaws of his best (and least) known works, but also points out the beauty in the language.

Performed by three

veteran Fort Wayne actors (ostensibly playing themselves), the show encompasses all 37 of Shakespeare's plays (some in greater detail than others) in roughly 98 minutes ("give or take") plus intermission. There is no plot, per se. The show merely seeks to engage the audience in non-stop belly laughs – and the production succeeds.

All three performers are as solid, polished, and hilarious as would be expected: Michael Coale (the straight man who plays most of the male roles), Jim Nelson (the comic relief who plays most of the female roles) and Christopher J. Murphy (the pretentious "preeminent expert" who plays most of the lead roles).

This production gives Murphy some of the broadest and most overthe-top acting opportunities, accents and puppetry he has probably ever had in one show. Nelson gets to interact with the audience and pretend to vomit - a lot. Coale is the glue that holds it all together, but still has plenty

## How the Smart Set Checks Out

MOURNING

Good Mourning by Elizabeth Meyer with Caitlin Moscatello, Gallery Books, 2015

The idea that discussions of death are somehow taboo in our culture is more than a little outdated. Maybe there was a time when one simply did not speak of such things, but that time has passed. These days, much of our entertainment revolves around death, and as a culture we are obsessed with the health decisions that lead our bodies toward the end. Perhaps we're still not fully appreciative of the inevitable fact that we, ourselves, will die one day, but we hardly avoid

That state of affairs takes much of the wind out of the sails of Good Mourning, a memoir that wants very much to be groundbreaking.

The book's author (or, rather, co-author; she had some help) is Elizabeth Meyer, a funeral director in Manhattan. As she begins her story, though, she's not yet a funeral professional. She is, instead, a child of privilege, the daughter of a high-priced lawyer who spends her time going to clubs and parties, flying to Europe, buying expensive things, and socializing in "high society" (her words). Her life is superficial and generally untouched by sadness until her father gets sick.

When her father finally succumbs to terminal cancer, she finds herself in charge of planning his funeral at the city's high-end funeral home, where the rich and famous go to be ushered out of this world. Unprepared for the task, she nonetheless rises to the occasion and throws an incredible funeral, complete with flowers flown in from South America, that meets with rave reviews. She decides that she has a knack for this kind of thing.

The twist comes in what happens next. A few months later, to the dismay of her family, she returns to the funeral home and asks for a job. She gets hired as a receptionist, but she's fascinated by what goes on in the embalming room, and she wants to be more involved with the business. The owner of the place realizes that she's good with the clientele (she is, after all, part of high society) and he gives her additional responsibilities. Her career takes off from there.

The book's quirky and heartwarming stories are



meant as reminders that death comes to us all, even those of us who have thoroughly conquered the art of living. Meyer draws contrasts between her materialistic clients and the physical realities of death. She also touches on the frictions between the living. She's hard on some of her posh relatives and acquaintances, especially her paternal grandmother, who is characterized

as a pathologically cold, inhumane socialite. But if this book wants to be a frank confrontation with death, it misses the mark. The idea of funeral direction as party planning, along with the non-stop focus on the trappings of wealth and fame, are, in fact, quite the opposite. If anyone is avoiding the topic of mortality, it's these people, and rather than openly dealing with the loss of loved ones, Meyer's clients see the end as one more opportunity to maintain their lifestyles. The whole thing comes off as a bit too Kardashian-esque to be revealing.

To be fair, Meyer does her best to navigate these contradictions, but she's not terribly well equipped to do so. With so many other death-confronting books out there, readers would be better served to look elsewhere for depth and nuance. If it's a thorough journalistic examination of the physicality of death you want, try Mary Roach's Stiff. If you want a quirky, contemporary look at the funeral industry, check out Caitlin Doughty's Smoke Gets in Your Eyes. If you want the point of view of a professional whose job it is to unflinchingly deal with the dead, look for medical examiner Judy Melinek's Working Stiff. If you want a family drama about the employees of the funeral industry, read Andrew Meredith's The Removers. Elizabeth Meyer's book will work for you only if your tastes are satisfied by cable TV. Good Mourning isn't subtitled Real Funeral Directors of New York, but it could be.

of opportunity to get laughs.

The production features a never-ending slew of gags and bits, including physical comedy and wordplay, as well as ridiculously exaggerated Scottish brogues, Paul Lynde and Emeril Lagasse impressions, sight gags, cross-dressing (which is universally and perpetually hilarious for some reason), rapping, endless props, audience participation and a genuinely moving Shakespearean soliloquy that kind of comes out of nowhere, to name just a few examples.

The audience attempted several times to give the actors a standing ovation but were interrupted by sev-

eral unexpected "encores," each sillier and more impressive than the last.

The opening production may have run a bit over the purported 98 minutes, but it still left the audience wanting more. It may even have inspired some audience members to look up some good Shakespeare.

The dinner was up to the theater's usual excellent standards. Catered by Goeglein's, it includes antipasto salad, garlic bread, spaghetti with meat sauce, Key West blend vegetables and Italian crème cake.
