# Manx Man Axe Man

The Isle of Man, a possession of the British crown, is not widely known for its bluesmen.

Most Americans know so little about this tiny, self-governing, water-encompassed country in the Irish Sea that they couldn't even begin to surmise what might be giving its residents the blues.

But one Isle of Man axe man who has made headlines in the states is here to report that the Isle of Man has a vibrant and varied music scene.

And it owes it all to herring.
"The fascinating thing about the Isle of Man is that it's slap bang down in the middle of England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales," said Davy Knowles in a phone interview.
"Back in the day, there was huge fishing - herring fishing. So you'd get boats from all of those countries and other places coming to the Isle of Man, fishing around the waters and stopping in the Isle of Man."

They'd all bring their songs, and Manx musicians (Manx being the name of the language and native people of the Isle of Man) would learn those songs and appropriate those songs and tweak those songs, he said.

So "there are a lot of great musicians" on the Isle of Man performing traditional Celtic music, blues and rock, Knowles said.

Knowles will play a mix of all three when he performs at C2G Music Hall on February 13.

But it wasn't a Manx musician that inspired Knowles to take up the guitar.

It was Mark Knopfler.
Knowles' dad had an expansive record collection and Knowles was poleaxed by the Dire Straits hit, "The Sultans of Swing."
"My dad played me that tune when I was 10 years old," he said. "I was totally hooked. (Knopfler's guitar work is) just so melodic You could sing every one of his solos."

Later, his sister introduced him to the Irish bluesman Rory Gallagher and Knowles was brought closer to what would become his style of play.
"I really connected to him a lot because I could hear a lot of Celtic in his playing," he said. "It was really cool to see this quite exotic American music being played by an Irishman and coming out slightly mid-Atlantic.
"The aggression of Rory's playing really grabbed me," Knowles said. "Between Rory Gallagher and Mark Knopfler is where I'd like to be."

Knowles started gigging when he was 14, toured England when he was 15 and formed a band at 16 with some schoolmates called Back Door Slam.

The short-lived group played the SXSW Festival and toured the states twice before disbanding in 2009.

Knowles said his first U.S. tour was "astounding."
"Just totally a dream come true," he said. "Up to that point, we'd just been playing pubs, mainly on the Isle of Man. It was
game. They're total inspirations and you'd be foolish not to sit and take notes every night."

Sharing a stage with legends is one thing. Collaborating with them is quite another.

A friend of Knowles who lived in Nashville shared his music with another musician, and that was how Knowles came to be on the receiving end of a call one day from Peter Frampton.
"I got a phone call from him and he said, "Hey, I've been listening to your stuff and I like it a lot. We should get together,"" Knowles recalled. "And I'm thinking it's a big practical joke."

Eventually, tour breaks coincided and the men met up.
"We just hit it off," Knowles said, "He's such a lovely bloke. We just wrote and worked really well together."

Because they'd co-written so many songs, Knowles asked Frampton to produce his next album.
"He was into the idea, thank God," he said. "It all kind of fell into place quite nicely. What a joy he was to work with. A lovely, lovely man."

These days, Knowles is based in Chicago, the home of the blues (or one of them).

He lives with his girlfriend who he met at one of his Windy City shows.
'I'd been on the radio and her folks dragged her down there," he said. "She didn't particularly want to go."

One sad fact about contemporary Chicago is that its days as a blues mecca are long past.

Knowles said the blues scene is made up of "a very, very, very few elder statesmen - people like Luther 'Guitar' Johnson, Jimmy Burns and Buddy Guy. But there are very, very few people who are doing it with integrity, with a kind of old-fashioned spirit behind it."

A lot of the blues that gets played in Chicago, he said, is equivalent to music performed by a rock cover band or tribute act: designed for undiscerning tourists.

And few African-American residents patronize the music, Knowles said.
"It is a very, very strange thing," he said. "Not that I'm one to talk in any kind of way. But the audience is mostly white people white, middle-aged people. Which is fine. If you like music, then [liking music is] the only thing that should be involved.
"But this is very much a black music adopted by other people," Knowles said. "It's

# Cleaning Up the Clown Act <br> Viracola.

The stand-up comic known as the Disgruntled Clown is quite a character.

In several senses.
The clown is quite a character and the man behind the clown is quite a character.

He performs February 5 and 6 at Snickerz Comedy Club.

The man behind the clown doesn't really like to share his birth name for reasons that he says have to do with what he was up to long before he donned the grease paint and floppy shoes.

In his teens and 20s, he says he was a tough guy who got paid (by the U.S. government and then by a repossession company) to get tough with people who were probably pretty tough in their own right.
"I'm not going to say I've never been beaten," he says via phone. "But I've never been beaten twice."

A turning point of sorts occurred when the man who would one day come to be known as the Disgruntled Clown visited a comedy club in Charleston, North Carolina in 1987 to chat up a female bartender he'd gone to high school with.
'She was every guy's fantasy in high school," Disgruntled Clown says. "She married a football star, and it was all downhill from there."

A friend pranked him at the club by signing him up for joke-telling challenge. He got up on stage and told the true story of how he fell out of a boat on top of an alligator while on a poaching trip and had to wrestle the crocodilian for a while.

The joke (more of a humorous anecdote, really) advanced him in a comedy competition. He came in third at the finals. One of the people who beat him was a thenunknown Jay Mohr.

His prize was a $\$ 50$ drinking credit at the club's bar and free admission to a year's worth of in-house comedy classes.

The classes were taught by whatever headliners came through town, so Disgruntled Clown studied at the feet of such masters as Jay Leno, Jeff Foxworthy, Jackie Mason, Howie Mandel, Bobcat Goldthwait and Sam Kinison.
"We were all sitting there like baby puppies waiting for a snack," he says.

Established comics were much more generous with advice in those days, Dis-
gruntled Clown says.
"Back then, comics helped each other," he says. "It wasn't like it is now: dog-eatdog."

Disgruntled Clown says he and a buddy

He says he learned to apply the makeup from a friend who owned a store in Charleston called Hocus Pocus Costumes \& Entertainment.

At first, the clown act (less Bozo than John Wayne Gacy) was so dirty "it would have made Andrew Dice Clay blush," Disgruntled Clown says.
"I had things thrown at me on stage," he says. "I've had club owners throw chairs up at me on stage."

But as the man behind Disgruntled Clown honed his skills, he came to understand that there were better ways to make people laugh than by "working blue," as they used to call delivering risqué material back when all comics were presumed to be squeaky-clean.

He says a tough club owner in Newport News, Virginia read him the riot act.
"After the place closed, she sat me down and said, 'You'll never work steady if you can't make the clown endearing to audiences. You can be disgruntled without being disgusting."

That early material, coupled with Disgruntled Clown's now conquered tendency to get into bar fights, cooled his career aspirations for a while.

But things are starting to heat up again.
"Now I can play to anybody," he says, "from 5 years old to 95 years old. That's why I am getting popular. And Fort Wayne is one of my favorite places to go. I have a huge following there. The cool thing about people like me is that no two shows are ever the same."

Helping keep Disgruntled Clown on the straight and narrow (or, in his case, the slighter straighter and marginally narrower) is the woman of his dreams, whom he met seven years ago.

Her name is Squirrel Killer. She even started doing "in-betweens." That's when a comic offers to go on stage at a rock club between sets or bands for free or in exchange for beer.
"When people hand you free beer, you take it." he says. "It's rude not to take it. I'm from the South. I was raised right."

After working the clubs for about four years, Disgruntled Clown concocted the clown persona one day while he was having a chat with Carrot Top's joke writer, Charlie


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# Pushing

When Musiq Soulchild (birth name Taalib Johnson) was growing up making music in Philadelphia, his aspirations did not feature a major record label.
"I wasn't even planning to sign a deal," he said in a phone interview. "I was planning on just recording records - pressing up CDs and selling them myself. That was pretty much the plan.
"I'd heard a lot of stories about artists going through what they were going through with record labels," Soulchild said. "I mean, I didn't really know anything from anything, but I was thinking about my music not being respected and appreciated and having to compromise my integrity in order to make a dollar."

But Def Jam President Kevin Liles, who'd fallen hard for Soulchild's demos, proved very persuasive.
"I guess everybody around me was doing their best to make me feel comfortable," he says.

Soulchild said he wasn't in a position to turn down a blessing like that.
"I had nothing to my name," he said. "I was homeless, essentially depending on the kindness of strangers."

The result was that Soulchild made a big splash in 2000 with his first single, "Just Friends (Sunny)" and with a debut album, Aijuswanaseing (I Just Want to Sing).

He was hailed by some as heir to a possibly endangered tradition of sweet soul balladeering and, by extension, as a presumed protector of that tradition.

Soulchild released three subsequent albums in the Aijuswanaseing vein. They were all well received and lucrative, but Soulchild began to feel restless.
"Everybody's point of reference for me became this crooner or love man or romantic guy," he said in a phone interview. "And that never fit me. That's not even my personality."

Indeed, it was Soulchild's diversity that made his musical reputation in Philly. He could beat-box, freestyle, scat sing and perform credible street corner doo-wop.

In a 2000 profile in the Philadelphia Daily News, a 22 -year-old Soulchild expressed a fear of being pigeonholed.
"The world is my focus," he said. "It's not just the ghetto. It's not just the suburbs. It's not just soul or hip-hop music. It's not just pop, blues or jazz. The whole world is my focus."

Soulchild's desire to experiment with his hits in concert rather than mimic them hasn't sat well with some fans.
"People expect a typical R\&B show," he said. "And I do the singles - do the hits - but I like to try different iterations. I may rock out on one and do a jazz version of another and a straight out remake of something. And people get this look on their faces sometimes


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- because it doesn't sound like it did on the radio."

The debut of Soulchild's rap alter ego named The Husel in 2014 also met with a lot of pushback.

Soulchild said he welcomes criticism. He listens to what sounds relevant to him and casts the rest aside.

It wasn't always that way. He said it used to upset him more when he learned that someone wasn't pleased with something he'd done.

Based on a preponderance of the anecdotal evidence, it might be safe to conclude that sudden fame isn't so much a mixed blessing as it is a mixed curse. In the early days of Soulchild's career, people used to
tell him how well he was handling everything. But he said he really wasn't handling everything well at all.
"I wasn't really ready or prepared," he said. "I wasn't accustomed to that amount of attention. When you don't have much going on in your life, nobody really cares. You have to beg for attention. Suddenly it was coming at me in a way I'd never experienced."

He said it was really difficult at first for him to handle people recognizing him and coming up to him on the street.
"My shoulders would get tight," he said. "Because people don't walk up on you like in Philly."

Soulchild wasn't much of a drinker then, but people started buying him free drinks and it became a problem, he said. He's been sober for a while now.

These days, Soulchild said he's committed to "refocusing people's expectation about who I am and what I have to offer."

He is gratified to be so widely identified as an R\&B artist, but he hopes to become known as more "R\&B adjacent."

To that end, Soulchild is launching his own record label called Soulstar Music Company. It will be a venue where his various personas can play, including one that no one has heard yet: Purple Wondaluv.

Asked what sort of music Purple Wondaluv makes, Soulchild gave an expected response: new age.
"The sound comes from an idea I had," he said. "'What would it sound like if you sort of mashed together Bob Marley and Sade?"

Soulchild said he intends the music to be calming and relaxing.
"With Purple Wondaluv, I don't plan on making love songs or songs about romance," he said. "The songs will be about general compassion. Not only for other people, but also for yourself.

He likens Purple Wondaluv songs to self-help books. Soulchild wants to use Purple Wondaluv to convey to listeners what he has learned about coping with some of the more difficult aspects of life.
"Without being self-righteous about it," he said. "My idea is, 'Here's how I felt and here's how it helped me and maybe it will help you if you go through it.'"

All future feats and forays will be kept separate from each other, Soulchild said. The only persona audiences should expect to see at a Musiq Soulchild show is Musiq Soulchild.

Soulchild said he isn't afraid to fail.
"Being an artist is about learning to walk in your artistic confidence," he said. "I may not know anything. I may not always know what I am doing. But I will always know what I am capable of."

# Indining lightimanes <br> The Bazaar of Bad Dreams by 

Stephen King, Scribner, 2015 The Bazaar of Bad Dreams is Stephen King's sixth collection of short stories, and it is, figuratively, separated by miles, in both time and tone, from his first. That early collection, titled Night Shift and containing stories such as "Children of the Corn" and "Jerusalem's Lot," helped to set King on the path to becoming the horror writer we all know. Almost 40 years later, King has different sorts of stories to tell, and even if some of the stories include familiar elements (malevolent cars, bullies and evil that lurks in a misleadingly mundane-looking form) the real world intrudes here in a much more direct manner than we've come to expect from King's stories.

The stories included here are often stories within stories, laid out with the measured cadence of a storyteller reaching for maximum dramatic effect. The stories unfold under the guise of imparted wisdom, the advice of men who have learned a great truth and who need to unburden themselves, to pass on the lessons they've learned before it's too late. King also repeatedly turns the tables between advisor and the advised, as a character who has thought of himself or herself as an expert is forced to admit that he doesn't know everything after all. More than once, a lawyer listens to an outrageous tale told by his client, patiently following along despite his disbelief, unaware that he'll be confronted himself by the truth in the end. More than once, a caretaker finds herself in a similar position with her charge, refusing to believe what she's hearing and seeing until the terrible power of the story is visited upon her.

What matters is life experience, King seems to be saying, and if you draw conclusions about the world before you've experienced what I've experienced, you do so at your peril.

There are moments when King's out-ofdate folksiness raises its head and threatens to derail the stories (when, for example, 21stcentury kids spout exclamations like "Holy Jeezum!") and there are times when he tries to slink back to the over-the-top scary fiction of his youth. The book's opening story, perhaps the weakest of the collection, is about a ravenous man-eating car, a monster so obviously drawn from the stock characters

in King's imagination that even within the story itself, King can't help comparing it to

Elsewhere, though, King reins himself in and keeps his prose tight. Sometimes he does it intentionally; one story he consciously tried to write in the style of Raymond Carver, another in the voice of Elmore Leonard. These stories, absent a reliance on superfluous detail and firmly focused on the path of the story, are some of the strongest of the bunch. A tale set in the Old West in which a stubbornly laconic man is accused of murder is especially effective in its conciseness, and its ending twist provides a surprising thud of a gut-

Although King denies having any interest in writing "confessional fiction," these stories, in both their straightforwardness and their recurring themes of end-of-life confession, feel like stories told by a man who's getting on in years and who has begun thinking about the Big Questions in a much more literal way than he has in the past. Some of the stories have titles like "Morality" and Afterlife," and in their content, they are as simple as that; they are pure, uncluttered musings about the typical mysteries of the universe. These stories are not always especially revelatory, but they feel more naively honest than a story like "The Little Green God of Agony," in which King halfheartedly tries to put a supernatural spin on a reminiscence about the pain he endured after a nearfatal accident in 1999.

The opportunity in such stories is that, in their prosaic nature, they may resonate more strongly with the reader. We might be more profoundly affected if we're forced to think about dropping dead unexpectedly in a convenience store or succumbing after a battle with cancer than if we're reading about vampires or killer clowns or demonpossessed laundry-folding machines. King has certainly shown the ability to take us down that path before, and in this collection his attempts to make a purely human connection are on target.

kind of sad to see that not a lot of that is being embraced.'

Before the Internet robbed records and CDs of their profit-earning potential, success in the music business was easier to define but harder to achieve.

Of course, it's never been easy to be a bluesman.

For Knowles, success "just means carrying on doing it."
"I don't want to be a big pop star," he
said. "I just want to get better and better and keep enjoying it and be able to tour.'

There are certainly some unsavory conditions in the music business, Knowles said.
"But it's no good complaining or grumbling about it," he said. "I don't know what the old days were like. I wasn't there. This is the only time period I will know. I've got to make the most of it. There is a place for musicians rather than people who just want to be on the charts."

## It's Like ... Carpe YoLO, Man

The spirit of punk is alive and well. It spits and swings, spins and flails and breathes fire on The Snarks new EP, It's Like ... Carpe YOLO, Man.

Last year's Night at Crystal Beach was a rallying cry from the Fort Wayne-based Snarks - a mix of
 post-punk angst, surf rock dreaming and fractured pop jangle. There was no denying the infectious swagger that was contained on that EP. If you weren't a convert to The Snarks before, prepare to be
"Toothache" opens with the sound of someone saying "Roll it". then the band break into a swirl of punk rock bravado. "Counterfeit" doesn't let up, with Kendra J spitting each word through the speakers with just the right amount of attitude and indignation. "Space Cases" is a dreamy track, and epic in length in comparison the the first two tracks' under-two-minute time stamps.

Kendra Johnson, Bart Helms, Zachary Evan Kershner, Dan Kinnaley and Dan Arnos pull off introspective just as well as they can aggressive. "Drone" sounds like the love child of The Damned, Love and Dick Dale - a whole mess of surf rock, jangle, and a middle finger to the establishment. "Make It Stop" is an explosion of hardcore speed and Johnson's innate ability to push 10 tons of anger down your earholes while you're giving yourself whiplash. It's the ultimate punk rock statement on an EP that's filled with 'em.

The Snarks waste no time. There's no dead air in between these five songs and the very tight 12 or so minutes this EP inhabits. Recorded and mixed directly to tape at Jason Davis' Off The Cuff Sound in Fort Wayne, It's Like ... Carpe YOLO, Man is yet another shining example of the quality bands that are coming out of the Midwest, and Fort Wayne in particular.

If hardcore, post-punk, jangle pop, and even bits of late-60s surf rock pique your interest, then grab a copy of It's Like ... Carpe Yolo, Man at its CD release show on February 6 at The Brass Rail. ## Steve Taylor \& The Danielson Foil Wow to the Deadness

Steve Taylor \& The Perfect Foils' Goliath is the best album I've heard in the last 18 -odd months. It rocks hard, in a rootsy way, but with enough wit, creativity and soul that I've yet to grow tired of it. The album was crowd-funded, and fans waited patiently for over a year after the funding goal was obliterated. On top of this it took 20 years for Taylor to get around to making this album,
 so I wasn't expecting anything new this decade

Always expect the unexpected. Apparently Taylor and his Foil met with the legendary Steve Albini to lay down six new songs. And to up the "unexpected" ante, they added a new member, the bewildering Daniel Smith, a.k.a. Danielson, a.k.a. the guy who discovered Sufjan Stevens.

If you've ever heard the plucky music of Danielson, then imagine that, but with an inventive, "always in the pocket" hard rock band instead of his usual approximately played, quasi-acoustic backing. This holds true for half the songs.
"Wait Up Downstep" starts with a quirky Danielson-rhythm played on acoustic guitar before power chords occasionally punctuate the bridge with Taylor singing. The low key "Nonchalant" seethes with rumbling distorted guitars and Taylor handling lead vocals with Smith throwing in a squeaky "hey!" at the most perfect of times before John Mark Painter adds even more grit compliments of a baritone saxophone. "Drats" begins with Danielson singing in his trademark Muppet-like voice (seriously, it's like if Beaker could sing, but in a good way) against acoustic guitar before the band once again hijacks the song with a surging wave of thundering guitars and pounding drums.

More bari sax is found on the title track, which is more of a traditional rock song, although one with hand claps and some un-tuned

## Sir Lord Baltimore

 Kingdom Come (1970)Sir Lord Baltimore hailed from Brooklyn and are now considered the godfathers of stoner rock. Their heavy sound was only around for a couple of albums, and the then-unknown Mike Appell wrote and arranged all of the
 tracks on this debut release.
"Master Heartache" opens the track and is riddled with some heavy guitars and a thick bass line. Drummer and leader singer John Garner has an almost Danzig-style vocal presence and oozes some great heavy metal vocals during their brief career.
"Hard Rain Fallin"" is three minutes of pure adrenaline-filled garage metal, and "Lady of Fire" almost comes at you from a pre-punk, glam-rock era. Side one closes with "Pumped Up" and reminds me of an American version of what Zeppelin and Sabbath were putting down as the 60s came to a close. Louis Dambra could indeed play a pretty sick guitar and kicked around a bluesy sludge of heavy metal (before the term heavy metal was even around).

The title track opens side two, and you can feel the Deep Purple influence in this track and in "I Got a Woman." "Hell Hound" is a great rock number, with guitars and percussion trading punches throughout the entire song. "Helium Head" is one of my favorite numbers on the record. It has some heavy riffs and reminds me of early Aerosmith and, especially, Sabbath. For the millennials reading this, think Monster Magnet without the overproduction.

The band released another album in 1971, but parted ways a few years later after trying to put together a third release. They did reform (without bassist Gary Justin) and released an album in 2006. Dambra now runs a homeless shelter in California, and Justin worked on Wall Street. Garner passed away a few months ago in Florida. These guys were not a footnote; they were a foundation. (Dennis Donahue)
glockenspiel thing that magically fits perfectly in the mix. "Dust Patrol" is pure punk energy and features some of the most ragged and ratty guitars put to analog tape, at least until the bridge when everyone has a seat while Danielson is accompanied by Mexican horns and possibly a mandolin. "A Muse" quietly opens with the lyrics "I wasn't out late / I barely had anything / Why do you act like you even care?" before lashing out into a soulful, powerful and angry chorus, backing down in the next verse with "That came out harsher / Than when I rehearsed it." Blistering.

Wow To The Deadness completely blew away my expectations, which wasn't difficult because I wasn't expecting anything. However it is a worthy successor to Goliath with its peculiar, punchy melodic rock that leaves a pleasant yet puzzled smile on your face. (Jason Hoffiman)

## The Besnard Lakes

The Besnard Lakes sound like a cloudburst in the middle of an emotional breakdown. Absolute beauty in the midst of some psychic turmoil. Towering melody and cavernous harmonies riding psychedelic riffs and proper rock and roll drum bashing.


Ever since the very beginning back in 2003, the Montreal-based husband and wife team of Jace Lasek and Olga Goreas have mined, along with like-minded friends and musicians, the core of psychedelic, pop, and rock n' roll music. The results are found within the crystalline, hallucinogenic and galactically beautiful songs that show up on albums like The Besnard Lakes Are The Dark Horse, The Besnard Lakes Are The Roaring Night and Until in Excess, Imperceptible UFO. The Besnard Lakes have returned with the dreamy and psychedelic A Coliseum Complex Museum, further opening the door to some magical musical realm

at only opens when Lasek and Goreas commit music to tape
"The Bray Road Beast," which shimmers and flutters like fragile light through the crack of a door before a sense of uneasiness comes through all the golden haze and heavenly warmth, is a perfect way to open A Coliseum Complex Museum. It's a statement of grandiose, druggy enchantment, like C.S. Lewis on a grand LSD trip. "Golden Lion" is a single if I've ever heard one. It's as if Carl Wilson recorded a record with the Raspberries in 1974 and it was produced by Phil Spector.
"Pressure of Our Plans" is the track here that encapsulates all those things that make The Besnard Lakes so unique and wonderful. Soaring vocals, wavering, quivering guitar lines slither into your ears like a musical serpent, and subliminal melodies lurk just under the surface, creating an overwhelming sense of nostalgia. There's that feeling that you've heard this song, a long time ago in some strange, sweaty, hallucinogenic circumstance. "Towers Sent to Her Sheets of Sound" is cavernous psych pop with a touch of proggy headiness for good measure. There's such an amazing balance of anthem and outsider here. The vocals pull you in while a barrage of noise and dissonance hides just under those silken sheets of sound. "Necronomicon" seems to appear from some dense haze like some ghostly ship just off the shore. It's a nuanced, sleepy song that carries you along it's compact journey.

Their songs bring forth these colorful, wonderful, but mildly unnerving worlds that once the song ends you leave behind but can never quite forget. "Nightingale" encapsulates one of those worlds, one with dark skies overhead and a blinding line of a horizon in the distance. Something melancholy and something desperate lingers in the songs's notes. "Tungsten 4: The Refugee" sums up this album wonderfully, with a mix of classic rock riffage and power pop bliss

The Besnard Lakes are an island unto themselves. No one is making music like them. No one seems to want to take the time and make something this dense and beautiful anymore. A Coliseum Complex Museum is not a drastic change for The Besnard Lakes, and we should be very happy about that. (John Hubner)

## Hank Williams Jn.

## It's About Time

There's usually not much room for ambiguity on a Hank Williams Jr. album, and for the most part that's true of It's About Time, Williams' first original album in almost four years.

The album's one
 opportunity for nuance comes when Williams considers the question of how much of a legend he wants to be. "Don't call me an icon," he protests on "Just Call Me Hank," but just two tracks earlier he was schoolin' us on how to "Dress Like an Icon." Is he an icon or isn't he? Of course, the contradiction is inherent even in the song's title; if he wasn't making a pitch for icon status, the song would be called "Just Call Me Randy." If anyone has made a career out of trying to take a shortcut to iconville, it's Hank Williams Jr.

The ambiguity vanishes when you consider what Williams wants to be an icon of. That's all in the song titles: "Club U.S.A.," "God Fearin' Man," "God and Guns," "The Party's On," etc. In Hank's world, all problems would be solved if we all owned more guns ("God is great and guns are good"), talked more about praying, acknowledged the God-granted superiority of the United States ("Being born here is like winning the lottery") and spent the rest of our time getting drunk ("We're startin' early and goin' long"). Those principles are delivered in about a dozen relentlessly
stomping, simply structured country-rock anthems with the exception of "Wrapped Up, Tangled Up in Jesus (God's Got It)," which has Williams inexplicably trying to sound like the Rev. Charlie Jackson through an interminable pseudo-gospel monologue/ blues ramble.

The song is actually a fitting coda for the album, since Williams is doing nothing if not preaching to the choir. Those fans who've been content with Williams' shtick over the past 30 years will be happy that it continues unchanged on It's About Time. The album is unlikely to win any new fans, though, and it's certainly not going to change any minds about Hank and his ideology. (Evan Gillespie)

## Eleanor Friedberger

## New View

Oh Eleanor, it's going to be alright Things may seem down right now, but I promise things will get better. People come and people go out of our lives, but we will always have the memories of those
 people to put a smile on our face. Or, bring a tear to the eye. Regardless, you will always be able to put those memories and emotions in perspective in your songs. Right? - J. Hubner to an imagined Eleanor Friedberger

If Eleanor Friedberger were here right now, that's probably what I would say to her. Ever since her first solo album in 2011, Friedberger has written very cut-and-dried, singer-songwriter kind of fare. Very clean and crisp 70s pop production makes her subtly melancholy Laurel Canyon-esque tales of love, loss and the occasional moment of whimsy all the more engaging and intriguing. Her tunes are a cross between Ru -mours-era Fleetwood Mac, a more eccentric Carly Simon and a bit of introspective-mode Chrissy Hynde.

Her newest album, New View, feels like a series of journal entries about a break-up or a loss in some form. Pages decorated in bubble lettering, big pink hearts, and sad faces. Tear-stained? Maybe
"He Didn't Mention His Mother" starts with tape speeding up, then slowing down, then the song coming into focus as it is carried on a steady stream of loping drums, strummed acoustics and 60s-style organ. It seems very personal and direct, as if someone out there knows exactly what this song is referring to "Open Season" continues that vibe, with Friedberger singing "Have you seen the movie yet?" and "Is it freezing over there? / I'm moping in a tree museum / That's my new hobby," giving the scene, possibly a conversation between two ex lovers, both a heaviness and random ambiguity at the same time. In "Sweetest Girl" Friedberger sings "Sweet Girl with the broken heart / Stop cryin' so I won't start" over a cross between 60s soul and Brill Building pop chops.
"Your Word" opens like electric Dylan but quickly goes for a more downer Southern California vibe. "Because I Asked You" has a looser vibe, with funky electric piano and skronky guitar bends. "Cathy With The Curly Hair" is a driving pop song that succeeds at being both upbeat and a downer at the same time.

New View is a series of city vignettes about dealing with a break-up, both directly and in a roundabout sort of way. Friedberger continues to write engaging, catchy pop songs without ever becoming uninteresting. She's a songwriter in the classicist sense, but every song feels very much her own. (John Hubner)

The Oscars are so white. This year is especially ridiculous. It isn't just that all 20 acting nominees are white. For the two critically acclaimed and financially successful films telling black stories, the nominees go to the white folks involved: the screenwriters for Straight Outta Compton and Sylvester Stallone for Creed. But the Oscars have never been easy. They have been brutal and mercurial as long as they have been racist, which is since the beginning.

Before launching into just how perversely race is a factor over recent years, let's reflect briefly on who hasn't won an Oscar. Cary Grant's only Oscar is honorary. Harrison Ford doesn't have an Oscar. Peter O'Toole had the misfortune of playing Lawrence of Arabia the same year Gregory Peck played Atticus Finch. No Oscar for Peter O'Toole. Robert Redford's Oscar is honorary. Leo will get his this year. On the lady side of things: Sigourney Weaver, Annette Bening, Glenn Close, and Joan Allen are all Oscarless. Myrna Loy's Oscar is honorary. Everyone has favorites who haven't been honored.

My point is a lot of fabulously talented actors have been denied a gold statue, except the honorary kind. Since the nominations for this year were announced, there has been a lot of talk about how to improve diversity within the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences.

There has also been talk of boycotting the event. Most boycott talk has fizzled, as it should; it won't help.

Studios are run almost exclusively by white guys who mostly greenlight projects that make them comfortable, which means not enough stories from other perspectives. They hire mostly white guys (not women or people of color - to produce, direct, write, star and crew for their movies.

At the other end of the spectrum, distribution practices aren't great either. How can people connect with the nominees if they don't get to see the films? Spike Lee's most recent film, the highly acclaimed Chi-raq, hasn't played in Fort Wayne.

In the middle of the industry is the Academy. They have been talking for too long about reform.

The Academy got a little public shaming this past weekend from the Screen Actors Guild. They give awards for both movies and television and have nearly three times the number of members. Their film award recipients are all white, but their television award winners are a rainbow of talent.

Viola Davis won again and now has three SAG awards. She should have an Oscar. In 2012, she was nominated for The Help and lost to Meryl Streep for Iron Lady. In 2009 she was nominated for Doubt and lost to Penelope Cruz for Vicky Cristina Barcelona. So did Taraji P. Henson who was nominated for Benjamin Button. Davis had my vote both years.

The most exciting news on the diversity front is happening at Sundance. Nate Parker, a young filmmaker has taken the title of a racist, but technically revolutionary film, Birth of a Nation and made a film about Nat Turner and slave rebellion. Nice.

February is Black History Month. The best the Academy can do is give an Oscar to What Happened, Miss Simone? She deserves a film this good, and if you don't know her story, watch it (on Netflix now). ckdexterhaven@earthlink.net

Tops at the Box: Fox's new animated release, Kung Fu Panda 3, voiced by Jack Black, Jackie Chan, Bryan Cranston, Dustin Hoffman and several others, opened at No. 1 last weekend, selling a solid $\$ 41$ million in the U.S. over its first three days of release. The movie has already sold about $\$ 76$ million abroad, bringing its three-day sales total to $\$ 116$ million. Whoa. Big money in pandas these days I guess. Looks like a not-good movie to me, but I'm not a 7 -year-old, so in this case, my opinion especially doesn't matter.

Also at the Box: The Revenant continued to surprise at the box office, selling another $\$ 12.4$ million last weekend, upping the film's six-week U.S. total to $\$ 138$ million.
