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CEC It's Time to Think Spring

Mid-life can be a time of deep reflection and self-improvement or shallow consumption and denial, depending on how one chooses to respond to the aging process. When it comes to the Fort Wayne Home and Garden Show, which turns 43 this year, it's more a case of coming into one's own, of aging gracefully, like a fine wine or a smart woman.

As in the past, the show will take over the Allen County War Memorial Coliseum for four days of exhibits and demonstrations showcasing the latest and greatest in home and garden décor and design.

This year's event will run February from 25-28 and will expand to fill the Coliseum's new 25,000-foot wing. That means 650 exhibitors catering to the needs and wants and desires of anyone who has a home and a garden and a wish to spruce things up

following the long winter. Think bed. Think bath. Think way beyond.

In addition to the exhibits, the Home and Garden Show will welcome several special guests who will pass on to visitors their expertise in the areas of property and antique refurbishment, grilling and gardening.

One such special guest is gardening expert Melinda Myers. Myers, the author of more than 20 gardening books, is the host of the nationally syndicated radio show "Melinda's Garden Moment." A certified arborist, Myers has a master's degree in horticulture, has taught horticulture at the college level and writes a regular column for Birds and Blooms, Chicagoland Gardening and Wisconsin Gardening magazines. She is also a recent recipient of the national American Horticultural Society's B.Y. Morrison Communication Award and has three decades of experience under her belt.

Myers will give two main presentations, "Garden Renovation for Any Sized Landscape" and "Low Maintenance, Big Impact Perennial Gardens." Both talks will focus on the practical side of things.

"People are busy. They're also always monitoring their budgets, but even within time and money constraints want to add personality into their landscape and garden," Myers said in a recent phone interview. "The idea behind my 'Garden Renovation' talk is

to give gardeners simple tricks, like renovating overgrown shrubs or adding flowering plants so they can create for themselves the perfect oasis, regardless of plot size."

Myers, who often appears on local television shows and is a key player in the How to Grow Anything DVD series, understands that many TV garden improvement programs give aspiring gardeners unrealistic expectations. Or worse, they turn them off trying to pink for a time and become seed pods which then draws birds to your garden.

"That doesn't mean you shouldn't buy plants that are only pretty for three weeks," Myers said. "If your absolute favorite plant blooms out quickly, that's just another reason to surround it with others that last a little

If it's grilling that gets you hot and bothered, then you'll want to check out Mad

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do the work Melinda Myers (left); themselves. because Mad Dog & Merrill.

they think huge overhauls performed by experts is the only way to go.

"Not many of us have \$100,000 to devote to our gardens, right? If you watch such shows, you might think you need that kind of money to transform your space. Also, in my opinion, such shows are missing the point. The set-up so often involves master gardeners swooping in and renovating the landscape for the home owners, when so much of the joy really comes from doing the work ourselves."

So Myers' mission is to give her audiences the tools they need to be the master gardeners of their own domain. In her "Low Maintenance" talk, for instance, the focus is on plantings that are lovely for the longest amount of time.

"There's never a no-maintenance plant, obviously, but that talk will focus on fairly pest-resistant plants that require minimal deadheading and staking and pruning. Also plants that have a long and repeat bloom time and several seasons of interest."

By "several seasons of interest," Myers means plants that go through different stages of beauty and usefulness. Perhaps they begin with lush green flowers, bloom into bright Dog and Merrill's presentations, taking place all three days at noon, 3 and 7 p.m. Mad Dog and Merrill, are self-proclaimed "grillologists" from New London, Wisconsin, who've been acquainting audiences with the finer points of barbecuing for more than 30 years. They also put out their own line of sauces, write cookbooks, and host a television show, Midwest Grill'n. Home and Garden Show favorites, their talk is sure to be two dashes serious and practical advice about backyard home entertaining and three dashes good fun.

Joining Myers and Mad Dog and Merrill on the Home and Garden Show stage will be Cari Cucksey of HGTV's Cash and Cari. who will be speaking about her passion for turning "old into gold" each day of the show at 1 and 6 p.m. Inspired in her love of the historical by her mother, an antiques enthusiast, Cucksey has been collecting anything and everything retro since she was just 12 vears old.

As the owner of RePurpose Estate Services, Cucksey travels the country, putting on estate sales for clients and hunting for buried treasure that she then re-purposes and sells to interested buyers. Her mission is to find valuable items, be they furniture, instruments, cars or knick knacks, and restore

Honoring Rock's Heroes

When first conceived 10 years ago, Down the Line seemed like a pretty good idea. Some of Fort Wayne's finest bands take the Embassy stage to cover some of the greatest music in contemporary history, all to benefit the Embassy's coffers. The brain-child of Matt Kelley, founder of One Lucky Guitar, the one-night event featured a host of local talent covering the music of the Beatles, Bob Dylan and others, providing a unique way of celebrating the local arts scene on many fronts – and giving bands more likely to play bars than historic venues a chance to experience the Embassy in a new way. It certainly looked good on paper.

While some great ideas never fully blossom, Down the Line has become a runaway smash, an annual event which has spawned genre-specific spin-offs (with country music and hard rock each getting special nights of Down the Line) and has made the grand event in February so successful that last year it became a two-night festival. This year's 10th anniversary celebration continues that two-night trend and promises to be the biggest and best Down the Line yet, one which pays homage to the past while looking squarely into the future.

There have been some changes in the planning of Down the Line in recent years, with Kelley handing off those duties to the Embassy some time ago and marketing director Barb Richards, formerly one of the city's most popular radio personalities, taking over the reins a little over three years

ago. Embassy programming director Jared Duymovic is in his fourth year but also oversaw some of the extra Down the Line events which have popped up along the way. Together they have put together a special Down the Line for this year, with 10 performers taking the stage in two nights.

With Matt Kelley and the Legendary Trainhoppers joining David Todoran & the Mobile Homewreckers in recalling the inaugural event, there's plenty of room to see new faces in the lineup. Friday night's performers include Kenny Taylor (covering the music of Elvis Costello & the Attractions), Streetlamps for Spotlights (Alex Chilton & Big Star), Big Caddy Daddy (AC/DC), Last Call (Maze featuring Frankie Beverly) and the B45s (Tom Petty & the Heartbreakers). On Saturday the aforementioned Trainhoppers (Bruce Springsteen), Soft N' Heavy


(Crosby, Stills, Nash & Young), Red Arrow (The Allman Brothers), Lost Lakes (Blondie) and Todoran & Mobile Homewreckers (Neil Young) take the stage.

Much has happened in the 10 years since Kelley first brought this event to fruition, and he recently reflected on that night and all of the changes to this city since then.

"Midway through the first Down the Line, an ice storm hit," he recalls. "I still remember us packing up at the end of that night, slipping and sliding and wanting to go for a beer, but watching cars skid through stoplights on black ice. It was a weather emergency. As we loaded our cars, we did so in the shadow of Bill's Palace and a liquor store. That's now a Courtyard hotel and a baseball stadium. Down the Line 10? It takes my breath away how fast time moves."

Kelley had maintained a hand in the op-

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
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

Resilience Recognized

The phrase "jam session" usually brings to mind images of bearded baby boomers with banjos and hard rocking teens taking over their parents' garages, but the session that will take place from 1-3 p.m. Saturday, February 27 as part of the seventh annual Abili-

ties Abound event will be anything but typi-

For those two hours, young people of all experience levels - with or without cognitive and/or physical challenges - are invited to join internationally acclaimed jazz pianist Matt Savage on the Sweetwater stage for two hours of jamming, creative collaboration, and positive vibes.

Abilities Abound is a fundraiser sponsored by The Northeast Indiana Disability Advocacy Coalition. Sweetwater is hosting the event for the first time, hence its musical focus. According to Dave Nelson, a member of the event

planning committee, music has a unique ability to inspire children with disabilities. He's discovered this through working with his own son, who has autism.

"I'm not a therapist or a medical professional," he said, "but I have noticed that music has allowed me and my son to connect in a really wonderful way. As a jazz musician and a father, I'm looking forward to seeing kids in that sort of spontaneous environment, improvising and jamming and lighting up when they experience a moment of brilliance."


"Brilliant" is a word often used to describe Matt Savage, a 23-year-old piano prodigy who, like Nelson's son, was diagnosed with autism - in Savage's case, Pervasive Development Disorder - as a child. Noticing that Matt had strong aversions to noises of any kind, Savage's parents enrolled him in intensive auditory integration therapy. That therapy opened the door to music for Matt, and he taught himself to play the piano in a matter of days. At the tender age of seven, he was fully competent classical pianist, training at the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston.

Then he discovered jazz, which quickly became his first love, and he released his debut album, One Is Not Fun But 20 is Plenty, at seven and a half years of age. Matt's exceptional talent threw him into some pretty impressive company, including that of Dave Brubeck who had this to say about what seemed to set Savage apart from other impressive child performers: "I keep track of young talent in kids and he's the first one that I met that young [who] was that talented. It seems like he's such an advanced musician in so many ways already at 8."

Fifteen years and 10 albums later, Savage tours and performs regularly, both in the states and around the globe. When he's not taking the stage alongside the likes of Chaka Khan, Neil Young, Steve Earle and Wynton Marsalis, he teaches at Applied Behavioral Learning Services, a Boston-based school for children with autism and other developmental disabilities.

In addition to the jam session, the Abilities Abound event will include a reception with heavy hors d'oeuvres, a ceremonial program during which the recipients of several \$500 enrichment grants will

be announced, a live art piece painted by Frank Louis Allen, a talk and



more formal performance by Savage and the handing out of the Above and Beyond Business of the Year

The aim of the enrichment grants is to help young people with disabilities purchase equipment or enroll in classes that will further their educational development. The Above and Beyond Business

Award goes to a local business that goes out of its way to welcome and accommodate those with disabilities. and this year's honors will go to Spiece Fitness.

One of the event's organizers, Teresa Harmeyer, said ticket holders come to Abilities Abound for a number of reasons.

"It's an opportunity for the community to come together to support individuals with disabilities, for like-minded people to gather and show their solidarity. Also, this year we'll have the added the enjoyment of seeing an incredibly talented young man perform.

"I think it's important to note that this is an ongoing process," she added. "A number of organizations work together not just to put on this event but to continually raise funds for worthy causes, and so donations are always gratefully accepted."

The organizations involved in Abilities Abound are many and include Aging & In-Home Services, Audiences Unlimited, Autism Society of Indiana, AWS Foundation, Byron Health Center, Camp PossAbility. Down Syndrome Association of Northeast Indiana, Easter Seals Arc, Fifth Freedom, League for the Blind and Disabled, Mental Health America of Northeastern Indiana, Passages, Pathfinder Services, Turnstone and YMCA of Greater Fort Wayne.

Jason Meyer, a fellow committee member, agreed with Harmeyer. The event is to raise funds for and awareness of the needs of the disabled in our community, but it also promises to be a very good and meaningful time for all who attend.

"It's interesting to me that when people come to Abilities Abound, they're often surprised by the talent and passion on display and by the fun they have when they're there," he said. "People often don't know what to expect when they buy a ticket, and then they come and are very pleasantly surprised."

The Cactus Blossoms

You're Dreaming

It's not 1957, and brothers Jack Torrey and Page Burkum didn't grow up in Tennessee (they're from Minneapolis, actually) so there's no way you can argue that their music is authentic. But if there's room for authenticity in the music of kids who've made the conscious choice to write and play in a style from the



middle of the last century, Torrey and Burkum, who perform as The Cactus Blossoms, have found it on their latest album. You're Dreaming unfurls without a trace of irony, almost eerily recreating the dawn of rock n' roll in the digital age.

You're Dreaming is a departure, both in songwriting and performance style, from the brothers' twangier earlier material. The most obvious analog for their harmonies is the Everly Brothers, and the jump of a song like "Clown Collector" conjures sock hops, drive-ins and roller rinks more than it does honky-tonks or tumbleweeds. The musical moment captured here is that time when country music was dabbling in vocal harmonies and trickier rhythms to produce something new; that's how you can get both the jaunty "Stoplight Kisses" and the moody "Mississippi" from the same act.

The sometimes disorienting time travel of You're Dreaming is given even more punch by the album's often ghostly tone - a dollop of reverb here, a drop into a minor key there. It's the unsettlingly haunting sound that Dick Clark called "a little unusual, a little strange" when he introduced the Everlys' "Cathy's Clown" back in 1960. Back then, the strangeness lay in the music's innovation, but the sound still has a touch of the uncanny about it, and You're Dreaming harnesses that uncanniness to beautiful effect. Night Beats Who Sold My Generation

Night Beats have always put

out music that sounded as if it had been locked away into a time capsule back in 1969 and had been recently unearthed for all to behold. Their new album, Who Sold My Generation, doesn't change that formula. Instead, they've tweaked their strange trip to include some Philly



soul leanings and psych-inflected R&B, all with just the right amount of grit and grime.

Night Beats' new LP opens to the sound of a static-y radio as a voice speaks in a British accent, but within a few seconds "Celebration #1" kicks in like some militant psychedelic rallying cry. It comes across as angry, but indifferent. Yeah, things suck. Whatcha

"Power Child" has a great bass/drum groove going on as the chorus blows up into a killer psych/soul mind melt. It's like Otis Day and the Knights dropped some acid before the show at Delta Tau Chi. "Right/Wrong" sounds like The Yardbirds in a melancholy mood, complete with a "For Your Love"-like guitar line. "No Cops" comes roaring in as if BRMC time-traveled back to 1966 to some suburban garage party and blew suburbia's mind. This is definitely one of the catchiest songs Night Beats have put to tape (and yes, I have heard "Puppet On A String"). "Sunday Mourning" has a killer groove with vocals that bring The Beta Band to mind, mixed with a healthy dose of Roky Erickson for good measure. The guitar solo here is part freak out and part Band of Gypsys-era Hendrix. It's damn good.

Night Beats seem to have upped the ante on this album. There are still tracks like the acid cowboy freakout of "Shangri Lah" and the desert roadtripping daze of "Burn To Breathe," as well as the reverb-drenched rocker "Last Train To Jordan," but there's also a surprise in the horn-powered "Bad Love." It's a brass-driven tale of woe that sounds like Del Shannon went on a bender at Muscle Shoals with Tower of Power. It's a great tune, complete with piano and a great back beat. "Egypt Berry" is the last thing you hear, and it leaves its mark with some serious garage/punk/desert rock groove.

If you're familiar with Night Beats' previous LPs, then Who Sold My Generation won't seem wholly new to you. But what it will seem to be is a band focused on honing their particular brand of psych and garage rock. Night Beats tow the line of psych, soul and R&B quite nicely. And there's still plenty of freak to go around. (John Hubner)

Poobah U.S. Rock (1976)

It was a Bicentennial year, and rock n' roll was at a different juncture. Disco and heavy metal were sorting themselves out while progressive and new wave were beginning to sit at the big kid's table. Jim Gustafson and some of his high school buddies



already had one album, but this sophomore album took them from their Youngstown, Ohio roots to international status after touring with bands like Foghat and Canned Heat.


The record kicks off with "Flesh Fantasies," a rocker that blends the guitars and heavy organs of Blue Oyster Cult-meetsold-REO Speedwagon. "Watch Me" is a little jam heavy on percussion and screaming vocals that has me thinking of the glam-rock genre and delivers some pretty good riffs behind the staggering vocals from Gustafason. "Coast To Coast" is a couple of minutes of mid-70s rock n' roll and delivers a nice little punch. Great organ in this one as well. Another nice little nugget is "Thru These Eyes" where keyboardist Ken Smetzer takes over on lead vocals. Gustafson takes the mic again in "Crazy." This track, and most of the stuff from their mid-70s catalog does give you a hint at the sound the hair bands reinvented in the 80s. But it worked in 1976, and may have been a little ahead of its time when it was released. It even has a little narrative that sounds like something from Alice Cooper. Was it a novelty? I don't think it mattered, because the band was very free-spirited. Finally, bassist Phil Jones takes over on vocals for the hard-rock-psychedelic "Out of You" to close the album.

Obscure to a point, but these guys were really, really good (and fun). Gustafson still plays as Poobah and will be at North Lima, Ohio's Sidewinders on Saturday night. (Dennis Donahue)

The Ghosts of Highway 20

In the mythology of America, the road symbolizes life and opportunity, adventure and possibility, the future and freedom. But there's another side of the American road, where decay and decline reminds of us of where we've been and what we've lost, where the past is vivid but untouchable. That's the Ameri-




can road that Lucinda Williams travels on The Ghosts of Highway 20, an album inspired by a stretch of Louisiana blacktop that Williams frequented in her youth. On this road, death is her destination, and memory is her traveling companion. It's a gloomy path, but one that's perversely satisfying to follow.

Williams takes her time on the journey (of the 14 songs on the album, only one is less than four minutes long, and three of them stretch to more than seven minutes) and her signature sleepy vocal slur often seems on the verge of giving up for good and fading away. It never does, though, and her vocals intertwine with the layered guitars of Bill Frisell and Greg Leisz to create a velvety, spectral cloud. Williams and her band subtly shift between genres, sliding from the echoing jazz of "I Know All About It" to the gospel of "Doors of Heaven" and visiting folk, country and blues in between.

It's not as if Williams completely discards the notions of hope and happiness on the album, but every moment of joy is mirrored by the expectation of pain. In her cover of Woody Guthrie's "House of Earth," the constructive forces of sex and nature are tempered by an undertone of menace, and even the lilting "Place in My Heart," in which Williams expresses devotion to a friend, is counterbalanced by the acknowledgment of love's burden: "Even though you make blue/I got room enough for you."

Through it all, Williams clings to a sense of peace - albeit a brooding one - in memory. The album's title track sums it all up succinctly in the song's final refrain: "I know this road like the back of my hand / and I have seen the signs that say / we're closing in on the final days / but I got nothing left to repent / my saving grace is with the ghosts on Highway 20.". Towering Above the Rest

A few years ago, I reviewed the area's top chicken wing restaurants for our local NPR affiliate, WBOI. For years, I listened to people debate about which establishment served the best wings, so I decided to take matters into my own hands and see for myself. I did some crowdsourcing to identify the top six wing spots, and within the span of a month I visited them

One was the clear winner: Tower Bar & Grill. I don't know what the secret is, but visit on a Wednesday or Saturday night, which are 55 cent wing nights, and you'll learn quickly that Tower wings are definitely in high demand. Since completing my wing review, I've been back over and over again to enjoy the wings, and I've ventured to sample other menu items as well.

While you could describe the fare as bar food – it's not a fine dining establishment – the quality, consistency and taste make Tower an all-around winner

in my book. My one complaint is service: it is pretty hit or miss, depending on which server you get, but with wings this good they can get away with it.

Here are a few of my favorites from the menu:

Cheesy Bread
Sticks (\$6.75) – Mozzarella-filled bread
sticks, deep fried and
served with marinara
and cheese sauce. These
are pure junk food, but
pure goodness – a heaping plate of steaming,
bubbling cheese bread.
It's a must try, but plan
on sharing.

Wings (\$8.25 for 10 daily or \$0.55 each every Wednesday and Saturday) – Tower wings are tender, juicy and flavorful and are offered with a variety of sauces.

are offered with a variety of sauces. The extra hot sauce is prepared in house with 10 peppers and packs a big punch, but unlike other hot

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sauces that are hot for hot's sake and nothing else, this hot sauce is flavorful, too. Tower Grill is a rub, and it's amazing – tangy with just the right amount of heat. Fajita Grill is also a rub, and it tastes just like a fajita – spicy, salty and tangy. Chipotle Citrus BBQ is very sweet with a smoky chipotle flavor. I typically order this one grilled, which means they throw them on the grill at the end for extra flavor and a bit of caramel-

izing. Mild actually carries some heat, with a subtle vinegar flavor. Hot Teriyaki is not too sweet or salty. It is simply a well balanced Asian flavor.

Hoosier Burger (\$8) – A half-pound charbroiled burger with lettuce, tomato, bacon and American cheese, topped with a fried egg. Tower has a nice selection of burgers on the "Burger Bar" portion of their menu, but this is my favorite. For me, put a fried egg on almost anything and it's bound to be my favorite item on the menu. Other than that, this is a classically good burger. There's nothing fancy about it. It simply hits the spot when you need a cheeseburger. It is served with chips, or you can have fries for an additional \$2,

which I'd highly recommend. Tower fries are some of my favorite in town. They are perfectly crunchy and golden brown, seasoned just right with a little bit of salt.

Chicken Fajita **Wrap** (\$7.50) – Grilled fajita chicken with peppers, onions, tomatoes and colby jack cheese, wrapped in a flour tortilla with salsa and southwestern ranch dressing. If you're looking for something on the lighter side, this is a good choice. It is well seasoned with the fajita spices, peppers and onions. I especially like

the southwestern ranch dressing; it adds a nice creamy texture, along with a tangy punch.

While the wings may be enough to drive you to Tower, you can't go wrong with many of the other menu options as well. And while

the ambiance is nothing special (it's a big open room with high-top tables and larger low tables, with ample seating at the bar) there are plenty of TVs for watching your favorite sports teams. They also have daily lunch and dinner specials, which they post on their Facebook page. There's good news for third shifters too! Tower opens at 7 a.m.

Tedious Absurdity

Welcome to Night Vale: A Novel by Joseph Fink and Jeffrey Cranor, Harper Perennial, 2015

If you've heard of the popular podcast Welcome to Night Vale but haven't yet tried it out, you might want to give it a listen before you invest in the new novel based on the podcast's setting and characters. The podcast is an amusing bit of absurdism whose hook can be entertaining over the brief span of each episode. The novel, however, requires much more

requires much more of an investment on the part of the reader, and if you're not totally willing to buy into Night Vale's cheeky break with reality, your patience will likely be stretched to the breaking point after just a couple of chapters.

The setting of both the podcast and the novel is a small town in the desert Southwest where outrageously strange things happen: a five-headed dragon runs for mayor, strange lights hover in the night sky, hooded figures lurk in the town dog park, angels lurk elsewhere, the Sheriff's Secret Police rule with a darkly oppressive power, etc. The town's residents blithely accept all the weirdness, and many of them are quite weird themselves.

The novel's plot concerns itself, mostly, with two residents of Night Vale. Jackie is the owner of the local pawn shop, and she's troubled by a mysterious message given to her by a mysterious stranger. Diane is a single mother who is troubled by the mysterious re-appearance of the long-lost father of her teenage son. Eventually, Jackie and Diane discover that their individual problems are related, and they begin to work together to sort out the mystery.

Jackie and Diane are both strange in the Night Vale style. Jackie is perpetually 19 years old, and her pawn shop exists in a temporal limbo where it always seems to be both first thing in the morning and closing time. Her mysterious message is delivered on a piece of paper that, no matter how she tries to discard or destroy it, always reappears in her hand. Diane's challenges include her relationship with her son, Josh. He's a shapeshifter who is often anything but a teenage boy; he takes the form, for example, of a kangaroo or a piece of furniture, and his changes in appearance are quick and constant.



The *Night Vale* podcast lifts its premise from the Lake Wobegone news segments of *A Prairie Home Companion*. The episodes are narrated by Cecil, an announcer for the local radio station, and he lays out the loose plot of the story in the guise of news reports on

the crazy goings-on in the town. Garrison Keillor has done most of the heavy lifting in getting us to accept the form – Lake Wobegone is, after all, a pretty absurd place in its own right – and it's not a very big leap to get from his town to Night Vale.

Joseph Fink and Jeffrey Cranor, as well

as Cecil Baldwin, the actor who portrays the announcer on the podcast, are all veterans of the Neo-Futurists, a New York-based experimental theater group. Despite its name, futurist theater has more in common with Surrealism than the Futurist art movement; it's often about challenging audiences by replacing conventional narrative traditions with nonsense, and that aim is obviously at the heart of *Night Vale*.

On the pages of a novel, though, the absurdity of Night Vale feels thin and labored. The twist in many of the book's passages relies on simple contradiction; the authors spend a paragraph telling you one thing and then end the paragraph by telling you that that thing isn't true. You are supposed to giggle delighted at the paradox.


The result is the feeling of listening to a story through a storm of static. Some of the words have value, but many of them don't. Night Vale fans don't just tolerate the static; they value it. An extensive fan-created wikia provides an online reference tool for those who are intrigued by the podcast's extensive cast of characters and difficult-to-follow tangents. These fans will certainly enjoy the Night Vale novel. A novel, however, demands a relationship with narrative, with storytelling. Night Vale chooses to subvert narrative depth in favor of absurdity - a valid, if facile, goal - and if you're not up for that subversion, the Night Vale novel will probably require more work than you're willing to contribute.



them to their former glory.

Some who have never attended at Fort Wayne Garden Show might assume that it would be a snooze for the kids, but that couldn't be more wrong. There is a special area set aside for children, and this year's Family Fun Area theme is "Alice in Wonderland." When kids are done falling down the rabbit hole, they'll have a chance to delight in live animal shows, a petting zoo, on-site pet adoptions martial arts demonstrations, comedy routines, and pottery and balloon animal making.

Myers will also be on-hand in the Family Fun Area, helping children discover the wonder that is gardening, composting and working with worms. Kids will have a chance to begin their own individual compost pile, and will go home with a small cutting plant as well as a seed in soil, which, if tended, should grow to full glory in good time.

"Studies have shown that when kids garden, when they're out working the land, they do better in school, they're more focused and confident, and they eat more vegetables, especially if they've grown them themselves," Myers said. "And if the kids are excited about gardening, they can often bring their parents on-board, and then it's a journey for the entire family."

The Fort Wayne Home and Garden Show is therefore about a lot more than the latest irrigation system or the newest form of organic pest control. It's about inspiring people – young, old, middle-aged – to get out in nature, to dig deep, get dirty, even find peace. Myers' garden is her happy place, where she goes when she's stressed or stumped, and it was her retreat this summer when her father died unexpectedly.

Getting busy growing things was a way for her to heal, she said, and her hope is that by helping others find their green thumbs, she'll also be guiding them down a path toward serenity and productivity and, of course, delicious, healthy foods.

"When I'm in my garden, I don't listen to music. I listen to the birds, I dig in the soil, I tend my plants, I harvest. It truly is a place of peace for me," she said. "Right now I'm looking out on snow and I can't wait for spring to come, to feel that change in the air that says gardening season is just around the corner."

eration for a few years has since left it in the capable hands of the Embassy and is pleased with how the event has continued to evolve over the years.

"Congratulations to The Embassy team on keeping this event alive all these years and helping to create some of the most memorable live performances in Fort Wayne over the last decade – maybe ever. It's a unique community that creates and supports an event like this, and one that we should all be proud to call home."

From seasoned veterans like Kelley, Todoran and Taylor to the B45s, which boasts some of the youngest talent to date, there's something for everyone at this year's shows. Barb Richards points out just how young the performers are in

young the performers are in some instances.

"One of the kids in the B45s is 12. He's still in middle school," she says, "so if he plays again in 10 years at the next big anniversary, he'd still only be 22!"

While that is an extreme example of the youth movement, Richards does enjoy how the event continues to not only attract younger performers but younger audiences, as well.

"I'm always excited to bring younger audiences into the Embassy," she says, "and this is really such a family-friendly event. It's great that we continue to see younger people in the audience, and the event continues to resonate with them and with older audiences who maybe some to see Dave Todoran and stay to see another band they may not have heard before.

"That's really the goal of Down the Line, to create new fans for the Embassy stage, and we do feel some pressure to make it great every year because it's an important fundraiser for us."

Duymovic, who comes to Fort Wayne from Indianapolis, has spent his years in town developing relationships with people like Kelley and getting to know the talent in town so that he can start making those important contacts when the time comes to pull together the show each year.

"The talent pool is so deep in Fort Wayne, and I

love to talk to these bands and see what they want to play. We talk and maybe choose something together, but then they might call me later and say 'Actually, we're going to do this.' These things are really generated organically as we all start to go over the possibilities."

In choosing who to cover this time, Kelley dipped back into his love of music and devotion to a couple of particular performers who have influenced not only his music but his life.

"The Legendary Trainhoppers closed the firstever Down the Line with the music of Bob Dylan. We're still, oddly enough, the only band to tackle Bob at Down the Line. It's a real thrill and honor for us to

return and perform at Down the Line 10, where we will tackle an artist who has not yet been taken on at Down the Line, Bruce Springsteen. "Like Dylan Bruce is

"Like Dylan, Bruce is a great American songwriter, and he's got songs on the Mount Rushmore of American music. His songs will live on like those of Woody Guthrie and Hoagy Carmichael. Which is to say, you can bend 'em and beat 'em and fight with 'em, but you can never break 'em. We're looking forward to trying.

"The funny thing is we're the first band up, at 7 p.m. sharp on Saturday. We're hoping it's not a rainy night because we would want the audience to get wet when the other bands are playing. I mean, with the roof blown off and all."

In addition to the music, there will be further cele-

bration of this milestone anniversary with Jack Hammer, Doc West and J.J. Fabini all presiding as emcees. Richards expects a lot of shared memories and nostalgia thanks to their contributions, making both nights of Down the Line 10 to be must-see enter-

"They'll be reminiscing in between acts and going back in time a bit," she says. "It's just a wonderful pleasure to have them there that night too. This whole event is just such a treasure for our community, and I'm grateful I have a chance to be part of it."

The three-day event takes place July 15-17; tickets go on sale February 12.

Almost five decades into his career, Iggy Pop keeps on rocking. The Rock and Roll Hall Of Famer's new album, Post Pop Depression, arrives in stores March 18 and Pop heads out on tour March 28. Appearing on the tour are Josh Homme, Dean Fertita and Troy Van Leeuwen from Queens of the Stone Age as well as drummer Matt Helders of Arctic Monkeys. The tour rolls into Chicago April 6 and Detroit the following night.

Brand New and Modest Mouse have joined forces for a co-headlining tour. There will be no opening acts for the run of dates that begin at the end of June and head our way shortly thereafter with a July 2 show in Chicago and a July 3 show in Detroit.

In the early to mid 80s the band was one of the biggest on the planet, with six No. 1 hits to their credit, along with six Top 10 albums. Hall & Oates visit Detroit July 18, Cincinnati July 20 and Chicago July 22. Heavy hitters Sharon Jones & The Dap Kings and Trombone Shorty & Orleans open the shows.

Dave Matthews says he will be taking a break from touring in 2017, so this summer upcoming dates may be your last chance to see him with his band for quite some time. DMB are playing two full sets at each show this summer, so rest up beforehand; you're going to need a reserve of energy to make it through the night. There are plenty of chances to catch the band before they go on vacation, as the tour stops in Cincinnati May 20, Cleveland May 21, Columbus, Ohio July 8, Detroit July 20 and Indianapolis July 22-23. christopherhupe@aol.com

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
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

A Mostly Paint-by-Numbers RomCom

How to Be Single plays a little too much like a paint-by-numbers movie, as if it was put together by a computer-generated algorithm. That doesn't mean there aren't many funny lines or some genuine moments that address the idea of being a single white female. For a girls night out, How to Be Single has its pleasures. It is that odd example of a movie being more funny and pleasurable than its trailer.

Director Christian Ditter and screenwriters Abby Kohn, Marc Silverstein and Dana Fox have divided the white chick world into categories. At the center is the idealist, Alice Fox. I am so glad not to be burdened with any image of Dakota Johnson in any shade of faux sexiness. She is charming as Alice, a young woman with charm and curiosity about life.

Alice is just graduating college and has never had a serious problem in her life. She tells her boyfriend Josh (Nicholas Braun) she wants some time on her own before they move in together. She doesn't want to go from her parents home, to a dorm, to living with her boyfriend without some time on her own. She wants a taste of being single.

Not surprisingly, he doesn't take well to being put off. She doesn't actually start living by herself, but moves in with her older sister. Meg (the wonderful Amy Mann) is a tough career woman. She is a doctor, delivering babies for a living. She is devoted to her work, vigorously eschewing the idea of a family.

Alice takes a job as a paralegal where she meets Robin, the unabashed party girl single lady. Rebel Wilson, in a role I can



only assume was written for her to show off her sharp comic skills, begins Alice's education in how to be single.

Alice keeps telling Robin she and Josh are only on a break. "There is no such thing as a break! Ross, season four," is Robin's response. After an awkward start, including some pathetic flirting, Alice acclimates. She takes a turn with hunky bartender Tom (Anders Holm), a gruesome stereotype of cute womanizing.

Also hanging in the bar they frequent is Lucy. She wants a relationship in a creepy, clingy way. She pursues this scientifically. She's on numerous dating sites and has a very long list of qualities she wants in a man.

So we have four ladies with four different approaches to life. And they are all rigid in their limits. The romantic idealist seems to have no professional goals. She is all about the personal goals, most of them romantic. The career woman has no interest in relationships. The party girl wants no relationship longer than one night. The romantic researcher can't see any man she can't imagine as a husband.

These are the ladies at the beginning of *How to Be Single*, but this is a movie so we're on board for profound changes in attitude and situation.

Let's quickly dispense with the other

typical movie-isms. New Yorkers don't find apartments in a week. Paralegals don't have the money to rent an apartment like Alice's. These are very *Friends*-like fantasies.

The changes begin. Meg, in a scene only an actress as good as Mann could pull off, after 3,000 deliveries, meets the baby that makes her want a baby. So begins her journey to in vitro fertilization and an inconvenient relationship with a younger man (the adorable Jake Lacey).

Josh starts dating and then becomes engaged to another woman. That pushes Alice forward. For a few months, Alice dates a nice man named David (Damon Wayans Jr.), but he has issues. Alice is forced to forge a genuine single life.

Robin stays a mystery until the end of the film, but what we learn about her helps explain her. Wilson is the comic relief of *How to Be Single*, but her presence and talent is overused.

Lucy has a meltdown in a bookstore which lowers her defenses. She is comforted by George (Jason Mantzoukas), a guy whom she would never choose, but we know is, in a quirky way, Mister Right.

In the large landscape of romantic comedy, any movie that doesn't find partners for all the ladies is unusual. Alice's impulse to be on her own, at least for awhile, is a good one. Any movie that takes no note of race and weight issues is unusual. "

How to Be Single isn't a smooth ride. It bounces around, in a charitable characterization, the way life does. Maybe more than life, there are plenty of laughs.

Groundbreaking and Nostalgic

Although the Broadway hit 42nd Street debuted on Broadway in 1980, making it a relatively new entry among classic musical theater, its history is long. Originally a novel, a 1933 film adaptation made it synonymous with backstage musicals and elaborate production numbers. One of Busby Berkeley's flashy accomplishments, 42nd Street starred legendary performers Ginger Rogers, Ruby Keeler and Dick Powell and has remained a popular gem from the early days of musical films.

In 1980 Broadway decided to turn the hit film into a musical. That may not sound risky now that Broadway is filled with musicals inspired by films (Once, Footloose, Flashdance and a host of Disney animated hits), but it was a risky move at a time when Rodgers & Hammerstein musicals were commonly adapted to film standards. In 1980, only one film had made the move to stage, and that musical, Gigi, was hardly a ringing endorsement for a new trend. 42nd Street changed all of that, becoming a Broadway hit not only in 1980 but again in 2001 when it won a Tony Award for Best Revival.

The original staging almost 36 years ago had a few stars of note, particularly Jerry Orbach, later known to millions of TV viewers as Lennie Briscoe on Law & Order, but perhaps the production's biggest names were behind the scene. Producer David Merrick took a chance on the unlikely success of a film-to-stage adaptation, but he hedged his bets by bringing in the legendary Gower Champion to direct. As the 80s dawned, Broadway was in the grip of a nostalgia craze, one which saw classic musicals from

the middle of the century making splashy returns to the Great White Way, and while 42nd Street was new to that collection, the film was nearly half a century old and a perfect vehicle for starting what was to become a new trend. And in Champion, Merrick brought in a man known for putting his unique spin on musicals, particularly in the area of choreography. He and his wife Marge made an indelible mark on musicals of the 1940s, 50s and 60s, and his contributions to 42nd Street helped make the musical a hit.

Unfortunately, Champion's health was already failing by the time he was tapped to direct and choreograph 42nd Street, and his death actually came on the show's opening day. Although he was no longer around to see its eventual success, the stunning production numbers are testament to his talent, even as he battled illness in his final year of life. It's a gift he has left for his fans and for those who love musical theater. For those who have yet to see the film, keep your eyes on the Turner Classic Movies schedule where it's sure to pop up. Or better yet, check out the production at the Embassy Theater on Wednesday, February 24 when the full extravaganza hits the historic stage as part of the Broadway at the Embassy

Frankenstein Is Alive Indeed

Fort Wayne Civic Theatre's production of the Mel Brooks musical, Young Frankenstein, is a bawdy, bouncy, polished bundle of outrageous fun that sidles up as close as it can to the boundary of burlesque. This is in the same vein as other recent Civic favorites, including Shrek, Spamalot, Rocky Horror and The Producers - familiar, funny, easy to watch tributes to the familiar. Director Phil Colglazier and his team of designers, Music Director Eunice Wadewitz and a ready-for-prime-time cast sprinkled with local stage stars have meshed to create a show that goes one better than simply paying homage to the iconic film - they have brought it to new

life. Yes, dear reader, it's alive! Unlike Brooks' other stage conversion success, The Producers, this one's songs are not what you'd call catchy. The Civic cast and invisible orchestra do a splendid job

with the music, but it's the sheer exuberance you are most likely to take away. Hats off to Choreographer Gary Lanier

for the zany monster mash of "Transylvania Mania." the "Don't Touch Me" Charleston and, of course, that wonderful "Puttin' On The Ritz" production number.

Another outstanding aspect is the use of sound, special effects and lighting marshalled by the team of Scenic Designer Derek Blanco, Lighting Designer Corey Lee, Sound by Jeremy Bugge and Stage Manager Bruce Hancock. I loved the stereo thunder washing back and forth, the projected giant moon, the moody fog, those towering castle and vaulted lab

walls, the above-stage captions and credits and the creative use of the pit lift. And then there are the justright costumes by Schellie Engelhart and her crew and the makeup and wigs by Gabrielle McAfee. From the "monster shoes" on everyone for the big "Ritz" number to the Monster's green skin, such solid attention to detail pays off.

A.J. Lorenzini Frankenstein heir Frederick as mostly the straight man to the wacky Transylvanians he finds at his grandfather's castle. Leading that trio is the hunchbacked sidekick Igor played well and for all it's worth by Gavin Drew. Drew's Igor really is the star of this production, with spot-on timing that

makes his every move hilarious. Then there's beautiful Inga, a leggy lab assistant with a yodel that is simply amazing by Jana Henly, who plays Inga with a naïve yet lusty innocence. Icing the cake is Maggie Kole Hunter's creepy Frau Blucher, the chatelaine with a past who knows more than she tells. Rounding out the castle denizens, of course, is The Creature played to hulking perfection by Billy Dawson.

Road has been described by some as "Our Town with a bad attitude." If you are familiar with the Thornton Wilder classic, you will recognize the immersive style and second-person narrative perspective of *Road*. Even if you are not familiar with *Our* Town, you will quickly become acquainted with the meta-theatrical quality that defines both plays. Do not expect to be merely a passive viewer; there is no fourth wall on this road. Do expect, however, that propriety and good taste will go out the window.

While the townspeople in Our Town can boast the

manners and social conventions of middle class, turn-of-the century New England, the occupants of Road have abandoned all notions of decorum. Behavior (profanity, drunkenness, drug use, sexual promiscuity) that may appear crude or uncouth to our refined sensibilities

is a coping mechanism for our desperate ensemble of

Flung into destitute poverty as the result of the conservative policies of Britain's Iron Lady, Margaret Thatcher, the characters seek comfort in their self-destructive behavior. As you observe life on this road, consider the reality that these characters are confronted with: industry has vanished from the area, taking with it most jobs. Negligible social benefits are many people's only source of income, and an air of filth and staleness pervades everything. Given this, it is not surprising that escapism is a recurring motif in



Road. Not only through alcohol, drugs, and sex, but through the melancholy reminiscence of better days that have long since expired. Plagued by the feeling that their best days are behind them and that there is

no hope for something more, what reason have they to carry on subscribing to the artificially constructed standards of civilized

> society? Even so, for the younger generation, a sentence to a lifetime of poverty and despondency is not yet a foregone conclusion. Despite the fact that many of Road's in-

habitants seem to have resigned themselves to their fate, others confess their secret dreams for a better life - somehow, someway, they might escape. What you will witness is not raunchiness or vulgarity purely for the sake of its shock value; Road is a brutally honest reflection of human suffering. While you will bear witness to the rawest expressions of broken spirits, you also will be reminded of the strength of the human soul and its ability to rise from the ashes.
