# From the Page to the Stage

When first conceived, the Fort Wayne Civic Theatre's annual Playwright Festival seemed like a great way to expand upon the Civic's contribution to theater arts in the

area by providing an opportunity for writing hopefuls to put their work before a group of judges who could weigh in on its merits. It also provided a great gathering of artists for a weekend of learning and growing in the art of writing for theater.

The concept has proven highly successful, and this year's Festival - Saturday, March 19 – will feature a production of this year's winning entry along with read-

ings of the two runners-up, as has been the case since the festival's in-ception. This year's keynote speaker the festival's workshop will Douglas Post who will

weigh in on the art of adaptation, a conversation which will no doubt include his own work of adapting the beloved novel The

Wind in the Willows for the musical theater.

But the biggest stars of the weekend will likely be this year's celebrated playwrights. With the second- and third-place finishers earning a reading of their play in front of an audience of fellow writers and anyone who wishes to attend, both men who have claimed those prizes are looking forward to sharing their works with northeast Indiana.

Jim Henry, whose play Sir Lancelot Jones placed third in this year's festival, is no novice to writing. A native of Gary, Henry now lives in nearby Wheeler and is the executive director of services at NCR, where he has been employed for 34 years. But he is already an acclaimed writer thanks to his recent effort, Crashing with Flamingos, a play which premiered at Towle Theatre in Hammond in February. He says he got the idea for Sir Lancelot Jones during a visit to southern Florida several years ago.

"I visited the Biscayne Bay National Park and was reading historical placards along one of the outdoor walkways," says Henry. "There was a reference to a man named Sir Lancelot Jones who played a key role in the development of the National Park, saving the picturesque area from commer-

cialization which would have polluted the bay and damaged the delicate eco-system. I was fascinated by the brief mention of this man and decided to research the history of the park and Lance. The more I researched, the more I realized I had the makings of a

more discreet lifestyles is becoming more and more mainstream in a traditionally conservative country. Society and institutions are trying to figure out how to respond.

With this play, I knew I'd be delving into a bit of a hot button topic, but for

a chunk of the population who once didn't have a voice, the questions have been asked: 'How do I fit into this culture, this political system, this faith? Do I have a place at the table?' With *The Last Stand*, in this case a traditional church is challenged to face the topic of gay marriage. This play isn't an answer, but I'm hoping it's a good discussion

Collins is looking forward to not only hearing actors reading his lines, but to whatever conversation opens up from the

sharing of his play.

'It's great to have actors inhabiting the characters that have just existed on the page. But as much, I'm looking forward to hearing feedback. I'm not assuming my play is a truly finished work. I realize that I've got a limited vision of what a fully inhabited play can be. For me, whether this play has any further life or not is a process that is still open to change. Not that I'm look-

ing forward to criticism, but I'm hoping for

good discussion." Daniel Hart is this year's winner of the Playwright Festival and will see his entry. The Tales of Charlotte Wilson, P.I., staged in full as the finale of the day. Directed by Civic's executive director Phillip Colglazier and followed by a discussion led by Post Hart's story should resonate with fans of mysteries tinged with wry humor. Hart, a native of Eugene, Oregon, has lived in Fort Wayne for five years, is currently a finance intern at Arts United and also does freelance work in video production and editing. The play is based on a character Hart and his sister featured in a short film on their YouTube channel in 2011.

"I've always been a fan of the detective fiction genre, so I decided to blend that with comedy by making a parody of a film-noir type detective. We made a couple of short films about Charlotte Wilson, P.I., and I really enjoyed the character and thought she had a lot of potential. This inspired me to write a full-length story about her."

Hart says he was surprised to make the

Henry looks forward to hearing his play read at the festival and hopes to continue to shop the story around and generate interest in the otherwise forgotten story of Lancelot

"I have already begun the process of marketing the play to theaters nationwide and to other contests. I look forward to seeing what response I get with the piece. I also am writing the play into a screenplay format and will shop it in New York and LA. I feel the play would also make a compelling mov-

Joseph Collins' second-place entry, The Last Stand, deals with the conflict clergy face when dealing with contemporary issues which challenge what were once accepted Christian practices. Originally from Marion, Collins moved to Fort Wayne to work in television and continues to be a filmmaker, enjoying the process of telling people's stories, something he has tried to do with The Last Stand.

Parents of young children and anglophiles and anglophile parents of young children have most likely been familiar and even friends with Peppa Pig for years, but others might need a bit more of an introduc-

Peppa is a four-year-old pig with a passion for mud puddles. Sometimes she wears golden boots. Like any other youngster, she often goes on play dates, loves

spending quality time with her teddy bear (named, fittingly enough, Teddy) and digs dressing up. She lives with her parents, Mummy Pig and Daddy Pig, and little brother, George Pig, in a pleasant home in England. Mummy works from home; Daddy is an architect. Peppa and George have a number of friends with whom they have adventures, including Rebecca and Richard Rabbit, Suzy Sheep (Peppa's best friend), Candy Cat, Danny Dog, Pedro Pony, Zoe Zebra, Emily and Edmond Elephant, Delphine

and Wendy Wolf. Now in its fourth season, Peppa Pig is almost as popular

on this side of the pond as it is in England, Europe and Australia, probably because Peppa's world is a sweet and funny place, peopled with animals (all anthropomorphic, obviously) and

full of time to play, learn and create. And now Peppa's world is coming to ours. For the first time, "Peppa Pig Live" is on tour in the U.S., and the show will be stopping by the Embassy Theatre Thursday, March 24 for a 6 p.m. engagement.

"This is such a fun and interactive show," said Lib Campbell in a recent phone interview. Campbell plays Peppa Pig in the live version. "Fans of the TV program will love it because so much will be familiar to them, the characters, the narrator, even the color

One difference will be the inclusion of Daisy, a live girl played by Candice Moll. Daisy's job is to get kids and their parents to participate in the song and dance numbers. Peppa Pig the television version is very musical, and the live version will be even more

'Oh my gosh, there is so much singing, so much dancing, so much jumping," Campbell said. "Daisy will be leading the dancing, and every song gets the kids up on their feet. A lot of the songs will be recognizable too, including 'The Bing Bong Song' which is a favorite from the TV series."

One thing parents love about the television program *Peppa Pig* is the show's educational component. For instance, in the episode "Grampy Rabbit's Dinosaur Park," Peppa and her friends tour a sort of sweeter, gentler version of Jurassic Park, learning along the way fun facts like when the dinosaurs inhabited the earth and the scientifically correct name for a Brontasauros – it's Apatosaurus, in case you were wondering

> - thanks to so-called "clever clogs," Edmond Elephant.

"Peppa Pig Live" will be likewise chock full of bits of trivia and knowledge sure to delight both the young and the young at heart, Campbell

"The show is really interactive. There's a great deal of counting and kids are asked to say their names, and Daisy asks the audience questions and we don't move on until the kids give their answers. The kids always get really into it, and soon they're yelling their answers. It's great fun and educational in a cute, sneaky way."

For Campbell, who trained at the Australian Academy for Dramatic Arts and even worked as a clown for two years, playing Peppa Pig is

a joy and an honor.
"This is a really special part for me," she said. "I did

a lot of research on the role because at first I had no idea Peppa was such a global phenomenon. She's not your typical kids' cartoon character. She's smart and she has a lot of sass and a real point of view on things, even though she's a four-year-old piglet."


And how does a real life woman play a four-yearold piglet on stage? Peppa is a puppet and Campbell stands behind her, bringing her to life. With the exception of Daisy, all the characters are large, life-sized puppets whose movements and gestures are performed by Campbell and her fellow actors.

"It's been an interesting challenge," Campbell said. "We're basically wielding the mouths and heads and arms ourselves. They're beautiful puppets, so lifelike and true to the show. It's surprising how quickly you get the hang of it, and soon you're moving right along with the puppet in unison. It's like creating a seamless character, a melding of person into puppet.'



# In Search of a Classic

Music has never made Chuck Prophet rich. There have been times in his life when it didn't even make him solvent.

But it has made him happy. Sort of.

Prophet performs at the B-Side on March 26.

Prophet has never "played the geetar on the MTV," and he has never been a guest judge on *American Idol*. And while it is indisputable that "chuck" and "prophet" are both household words, the name Chuck Prophet is not.

What Prophet has consistently done for three decades is write and perform beautiful, intricate and challenging rock music.

It is fitting that Prophet's email signature reads, "As soon as you realize it's all insane, it all makes sense," because he never seems to stop trying to make sense of things.

His career goal is nothing less than redemption.

"I tell myself that if I can make a classic, a real classic for the ages," he said in a phone interview, "it's going to make sense of my life, make up for all the evil [stuff] I've done. That's probably a lie."

Music is hard to talk about if you do it right, Prophet said. The reason most conversations about music turn to paydays, attendance figures and other tabulations is because music is ephemeral, he said.

"They don't like to talk about things that are ephemeral," he said.

One of the questions Prophet said he hears most from fans is, "Why aren't you more famous?"

The question strikes this journalist as the king

of all backhanded compliments, but Prophet's answer is that "success came in many forms" in his career.

"I mean, it took all kinds of different shapes," he

When Prophet played in bands in middle and high school, his biggest goal was to have enough music to play a 20- or 30-minute set.

"Getting a gig at a club was a huge deal to us at the time," he said.

Later, when Prophet joined the band Green on Red, success for him had morphed into something equally modest.

"The thing that most impressed me about them was that they had a rental van and a gas card," he said, laughing. "At the time, that was really bourgeois."

Green on Red recorded for Mercury Records for much of its existence, and Prophet said the label never interfered with the music the band wanted to make.

When he talks about it now, Prophet sounds like he can't understand why the label didn't get more involved.

"I don't know why we got signed," he said. "It's hard for me tp even figure out how we got a record deal."

The band performed a reunion show in London in 2006, Prophet said, and Jim Bogios sat in for the late Alex McNicol on drums.

"We were taking a cab back to the hotel after the first rehearsal, and he was looking at me and he said, 'How did you guys get a record deal?" Prophet recalled, laughing.

Prophet didn't even think of himself as a songwriter early on.

"We were just making up songs," he said. "Later,

I became more aware of "Oh, Jimmy Webb. He's the guy who wrote all these great songs."

Prophet said he hesitates to cite any personal

icon because he's "had so much inspiration along the way, if I mention one person like Jimmy Webb, I'll leave out 100."

He is willing, however, to assert that all roads lead to Bob Dylan.

Prophet's perfectionism as a composer and as an audio engineer is well illustrated by a Dylan anec-

He said he was hanging out with a friend recently who records world music and the friend wondered aloud, "What's the point of doing another take of a song or another revision? No one's going to be able to

"He kind of had these absolutes," Prophet said "and it was funny because it bothered me."

The next morning, Prophet said, he read an article stating that "there was gonna be a 40-page draft of the song 'Dignity' from the *Oh Mercy* sessions that didn't make the album."

"Oh that's my kind of guy," he recalled thinking. "That's why Dylan is my guy."

He is never happier than when he is "wrestling some idea to the ground and getting a verse to have a nice straight line through it in plain language," Prophet soid.

"That's the kind of buzz I am chasing," he said.

Prophet said he thinks in terms of albums, not individual songs.


While writing, he said, he always stands back and thinks, "Is there a record here? Am I tapping into something I never tapped into before, musically or thematically?"

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#### **Elton John**

#### Wonderful Crazy Night

It might seem unwise for Elton John, at this stage in his career, to make an album that attempts to recapture the spark he had in the prime of his career, given that that prime was close to a half century ago. That's what he does with Wonderful Crazy Night, though, and although the album doesn't



take John's music back to the 1970s, it comes surprisingly close.

The album assembles some regulars on the Elton John team, in-

The album assembles some regulars on the Elton John team, including lyricist Bernie Taupin, producer T Bone Burnett and guitarist Davey Johnstone, and together they string together a collection of mostly up-tempo numbers that capitalize on John's glitzy vocals and jazzy-gospel-rock piano underpinnings.


What works here is all on the shoulders of John himself. While his vocals don't have the leanness and electricity of the 70s hits, his voice is still strong, and he can crank up the energy when he wants to. Although the title track could easily serve as the theme for a Pixar movie, it's close enough to an anthem like "Bennie and the Jets" to stir up the ghosts, and when he takes a balladeer turn on "I've Got 2 Wings," he gives it a sincere effort.

What doesn't work can largely be blamed on John's collaborators. Burnett's production sands down any interesting edges that might have existed on the songs' original takes, and Taupin's lyrics on songs like "Blue Wonderful" are generic and miles distant from the poignant authenticity of "Goodbye Yellow Brick Road," "Levon" or "Daniel."

On the whole, Wonderful Crazy Night should be enough to satisfy John's long-term fans, and despite its failings, it's proof that at 68, John shouldn't be ready to call it a career just yet. (Evan Gillespie)

#### Kanye West The Life of Pablo

In February 2015, Kanye West, with his usual over-confidence, stated that his seventh album was 80 percent done. One year, multiple album title changes and a few track list adjustments later, the ambiguously christened *The Life of Pablo* was finally released in the early hours of Valentine's Day. However, the word



"released" is a loose application for an album that feels like it's still a hostage to West's militant protection of his art, as it's only ever going to be available online through Tidal. Furthermore, if the music within *Pablo* was never meant to be a radical game changer for the hip-hop genre, the terms of its arrival have birthed serious discourse on how the album format in the internet age is constantly being redefined in the interests of public demand and artists alike.

As a follow-up to the divisive, corrosive acid house sounds of 2013's Yeezus, this "gospel album with a lot of cursing on it" is comparatively relaxed, but no less schizophrenic. Pablo feels more like a glorified mixtape, where randomly shuffling the album's 18 tracks makes as much sense as its official arrangement. However many characteristics the album shares with a puzzle, the micromanagement of ambitious ideas throughout give the impression that this spiritually inspired work was never meant to be "finished" in the traditional sense.

The sparse opener, "Ultralight Beam," clues us into West's approach to gospel music with renowned singers Kirk Franklin and Kelly Price giving credibility to a truly moving song. The repeated chants of "We on an ultralight beam / This is a God dream / This is everything" serves as an incantation for the varied musical ideas that follow in the next hour. This is the closest we get to actual gospel music on the whole album, but other markedly spiritual songs ("Waves," "Low Lights" and "Father Stretch My Hands, Pts. 1 and 2") demonstrate the album's most human, revealing and, yes, sometimes endearingly profane moments.

But if you thought being a husband and father might have deterred West from sneaking in lines like "I think Taylor and I might still have sex," from the now infamous, "Famous," and "My ex said she gave me the best years of her life / I saw a recent picture of her, I guess she was right," from "30 Hours," you've apparently forgotten

#### Cruachan

Tuatha na Gael (1995)

With St. Patrick's Day is upon us, the relevancy of reviewing an Irish band at this time of the year seemed obvious (I skipped this relevancy the last two years). This group, Cruachan, is a band that I discovered last year when I was doing some research



of a genre called "Celtic folk metal." Yep, it's a real thing, and these cats have been laying it down for over 20 years.

This album, their debut, opens with howling winds behind a nice acoustic guitar and some beautiful whistles and flutes (it's an Irish thing). But then "The First Battle of Moytura" jumps out at you with an almost White Zombie/prog-rock vibe and some huge guitars. "Maeve's March," another instrumental takes it down again and is standard Celtic music, but it does have a Thin Lizzy/ Jethro Tull thing going on when the guitars and percussion are introduced. The next couple of tracks average over seven minutes long and are complicated, trippy and, in some cases, pure metal, especially "Fall of Gondolin," If *The Lord of the Rings* had a house band, it would have been these guys.

"Táin Bó Cuailgne" has a very strong presence on this album, and though I don't really get the lyrics, it has a great Irish sound way out in front of a heavy percussion arrangement. The middle of the track even has some chirping birds, and after the bridge, well, it may as well have just been three songs meshed together. "To Invoke the Horned God" sort of brings the sound all together and digs in for some pretty competitive heavy metal, but is short of Anthrax or Pantera on the head-banging scale.

If you want to experience the genre, check out these guys (who have seven albums and are still around). Éirinn go Brách!. (*Dennis Donahue*)

about West's bloated hubris and facetious misogyny. Among other isolated incidents where impulsive lyrics turn into repulsive images, there is, fortunately, redemption in "Real Friends." When West observes, "I cannot blame you for having an angle / I ain't got no issues I'm just doing my thing... / When was the last time I remembered a birthday / When was the last time I wasn't in a hurry?" we gain an understanding of where *Pablo*'s true heart resides.

It's moments like those where longtime fans are rewarded for their patience, even after the self proclaimed "38-year-old/8-year-old" Kanye occasionally butts his way into the album's conversation. Regardless, his gift for properly utilizing – and bringing out the best in – a team of collaborators is intact throughout *Pablo*, which is part of the reason his art attracts acclaim while his persona attracts ignominy. When he dares us to name one genius that isn't crazy, it's a point proving that his products are often worth the controversy. No matter what, Kanye will always love you like Kanye loves Kanye. final three, much less win, and he modestly seems as anxious to see what Henry and Collins have done as to see his own play staged.

"What I'm most looking forward to about the festival is actually to see the stage readings of the second- and third-place plays. Both of them sound very interesting and very different from my own play, so I'm excited to see what they're like. With my own play, I'm just excited that a work of mine will be seen by so many people I don't know and who probably have no experience with my writing."

Although Hart earned an associate's degree in accounting from Ivy Tech, this success has given him encouragement to continue to try his hand at writing.

"Winning the contest was such a surprise because I wasn't sure if people would enjoy my writing/comedic style. It was a huge encouragement to me that I was selected amongst all these other writers who probably have more experience than myself. Clearly this means that at least some people find my work enjoyable. I am even more anxious to see the response that comes after the play opens to the public. This has definitely inspired me to continue writing and seek other outlets for my work to get seen."







The Cheesers (probably not what they want to be called) are headlining all three nights of the event that features 50 or so other like-minded bands including Bassnectar, Major Lazer, Greensky Bluegrass and, of course, The Disco Biscuits. Rothbury is located just north of Grand Rapids next to Lake Michigan.

Rascal Flatts have announced what is sure to be one of the biggest country tours of the summer. The band is promising a "stripped down" version of their usual stage spectacle, but that doesn't mean it won't be amazing. Still supporting their 2014 release, Rewind, Rascal Flatts are bringing up-and-coming stars Kelsea Ballerini and Chris Lane along for the ride to Cleveland June 25, Cincinnati June 26, Chicago August 7, Lima, Ohio August 27 and Noblesville September 17. The Lima date is part of their county fair and is already almost sold out.

appeal can be explained not only by her sass and smarts, but by how relatable all of the characters are. Parents will find something of themselves in Mummy and Daddy Pig, and kids will recognize their own characteristics in Peppa, George and their friends.

"The show seems simple on the surface and in a way it is," Campbell said, "but it's also very smart and insightful. Daddy Pig is a lot like human dads. He's funny and goofy – we can all have a giggle with Daddy – and Mummy is strong and nurturing, and Peppa and George are curious. They want to know what the world around them is all about,

and kids who watch the show definitely see themselves in those characters."

Campbell has had the opportunity to meet a lot of Peppa fans during the meet-and-greets that follow "Peppa Pig Live," and what she hears is that kids love the fact that they finally have a chance to really interact with characters that before only came to life on their television sets and computer screens.

"Everyone enjoys how participatory it is. Kids rush the stage basically, singing and dancing and having fun. It's a blast. A really sweet time at the theater."

When asked if thinking "in album terms" is an endangered mindset these days, Prophet responded, "I don't care. That's the other thing about success. People say, 'Isn't it a shame nobody buys albums anymore?' I don't make records for other people. I don't care. I don't want to be successful."

Prophet said he continues to strive because he feels like everything is just out of reach.

"Sometimes you go past things and sometimes you fall short," he said. "But anytime you're engaged in just trying to get the beast to behave, that's inspiration."

Tours are like vacations for Prophet, he said, because it means he can stop obsessing about albums. Except that he never really stops obsessing.

Asked if he ever plays "woulda, coulda, shoulda" after an album is released, Prophet said, "Of course I do. When you play it live, it's still living and breathing," he said. "You'll be playing the songs in Scranton, Pennsylvania in a half-filled bar on a Wednesday night and you're like, 'Oh god. If we'd only played it like this when we cut the record."

Prophet said he sometimes takes songs out of rotation because he is so disappointed with some aspect of the composing and recording process.

After enough time goes by, he adds the

songs back in because he can't remember what was bugging him about them in the first place.

Prophet's unceasing quest to make sense of things even extends to interactions with fans.

He said it sometimes seems as if they ate him.

"You're on tour and they see you play and they don't really like you," he said. "They're sort of like, 'Oh, I used to be in a band. It's really hard. You're really brave."

"And I'm like, 'Really? Does this look hard?" Prophet said. "'I'm driving around, staying in decent hotels. I'm playing music with my friends. I don't get it. Does this look hard to you? You should see what my dad did for a living. Now that was hard."

Prophet chalks these sorts of conversations up to people just "trying to make sense of their own lives."

Fans ask for advice about breaking into the music business, but Prophet said he has never really been in the music business per se.

"I don't have a manager that's connected in any way," he said. "I have a wonderful relationship with Yep Rock records, and that relationship is: If I can make records, we'll put them out together.'

"What I am doing here, really, is running a mom and pop business," he said.

# Smith in a Van Is Still Maggie

Watching Maggie Smith play Miss Shepard, the title character of *The Lady in the Van*, it is easy to imagine that the role was written for her. And despite being told at the beginning of the film that this is "a mostly true story," the premise is so absurd that at first the claim seems a mighty exaggeration. The characters grow on you. Curiosity about what is truth or fiction grows. Humor tempers the serious issues. By the end, *The Lady in the Van* proves to be a unique, modest, quirky gem.

Seeing Smith in this role is part of my *Downton Abbey* withdrawal. The role of Miss Shepard, an older, homeless woman who lives in a series of vans parked in the driveway of the house of a shy, introspective writer, might seem a far cry from the dowager countess of Grantham. But both are opinionated, very private, difficult women.

When Alan Bennett buys a home on Gloucester Crescent in Camden in 1970, the neighborhood is on the path to gentrification. The neighbors are mostly friendly. They try to be good neighbors to their homeless resident, but she doesn't make things easy.

Miss Shepard smells. Her van stays put for days on end. She stuffs bags full of who knows what under her van. She can be quite rude.

Alan Bennett is played by Alex Jennings, twice. The part is divided between the person and the writer. "I live. You write. That's how it works." They argue with each other. This device works very well, mostly. The inner conflicts present in all of us – but more acutely in some – are fluidly presented.

They argue about whether or not to write about Miss Shepard, but both sides have reservations about taking her on. As danger and the authorities target Miss Shepard, Alan invites her to move her van into

his driveway for a few months until she gets settled.

A few months turns in to fifteen years, and along the way Alan keeps his distance, though he helps her when problems arise or when she demands it. Since her advisors include the Virgin Mary, Alan is skeptical when she occasionally reveals details from her life before homelessness.

Margaret (or Mary Shepard, as she calls herself) reveals that she was once a nun and once an accomplished pianist. She speaks fluent French. She is traveling incognito because she lives in fear of the police.

The movie belongs to Dame Maggie's performance. Jennings is also wonderful. He has the additional challenge of playing against himself.

The principal players have shared this story before. In the original London stage production, Smith starred, Bennett wrote the story and Nicholas Hytner directed. All three reprise their roles for the film. They work well together and must enjoy each other's company, as the naturalness of the film demonstrates.

Hytner and Bennett first collaborated on *The Madness of King George*, for the stage and then for the screen. They made the same collaboration for *The History Boys* for both stage and screen.

The team has loyalties to actors. Among the many small but excellent neighbors is Frances de la Tour, as Mrs. Vaughan Williams. Ten of the original *History*

# Marvel, Disney Still Going Strong

Tops at the Box: Disney's Zootopia took the No. 1 spot at the U.S. box office again last weekend, selling another \$50 million. So far the film has sold \$142 million in the U.S. over its first 10 days of release, making it yet another animated Disney monster hit. Add to that another \$288 million in abroad sales and this is the movie to beat for the first quarter of 2016. I've not seen the film because movie tickets are disgustingly expensive in NYC, but I hear it's smart and beautiful and fun. Looks kind of cheesy and played out to me, but what do I know about children's movies. If the kids are enjoying it, then yay.

Also at the Box: Director Dan Trachtenberg's Cloverfield sequel, 10 Cloverfield Lane, took the No. 2 spot at last weekend's box, selling a stellar enough \$25.2 million over its first three days of release. Looks good to me, but I'm pretty much in love with the film's star, Mary Elizabeth Winstead, so needless to say I'm biased. J.J. Abrams, who seemingly can't lose, produced the film, just as he did the original Cloverfield. That means something, right?

Taking the No. 3 spot at last weekend's U.S. box office was Marvel megahit *Deadpool* which sold another \$10.8 million, upping the film's five-week total to \$328 million in the U.S. and \$708 million worldwide. Wonderful film. (You know how earlier, as in like 12 sentences ago, I suggested that *Zootopia* is the movie to beat this season? Rounding out last weekend's Top 5 was Whiskey Tango Foxtrot, a comedy starring Tina Fey as a war reporter. The film made another \$4.6 million, bringing its 10-day total to \$14.5 million. Ugh. I know people really love Fey, and I don't want to be too much of a Fey Hater, but I'm sort of happy to see one of her projects fail. I think she can be a funny writer at times, but I've never cared for her acting. In tiny doses on TV at midnight? Sure. The star of an expensive feature film made by good directors? Nope.

Also of note: Sacha Baron Cohen's latest work, The Brothers Grimsby, bombed, selling just \$3.1 million over its first weekend of release despite playing on 2,235 screens. Ouch. I'm a huge Cohen fan and

The film is shot in Alan Bennet's actual house, driveway and neighborhood. Bennet makes a cameo, walking on set towards the end of the film – an extra blur of reality and fiction.

The Lady in the Van won't tickle every fancy, not even among the older audiences that have a more natural affinity with the story. Before the movie began, a parade of previews, consisting of explosions and other forms of violence or treacle had everyone in the audience groaning. If these subjects make you yawn or role your eyes, don't miss The Lady in the Van.



For readers who are way younger than I am, Aeroflot was the Soviet airline with the reputation for crashing airplanes, and Richard Nixon was the U.S. President with the reputation for crashing the American democratic system. The current production at Arena Dinner Theatre, Frost/Nixon,

what actors we have in *Frost/Nixon*: the ensemble of performers draw a nuanced portrait of human vanity, comedy, outrage and sacrifice that is a joy to behold. Todd Frymier, as David Frost and Jeff Moore as Richard Nixon, are first among equals, but it's wrong to say Bob Ahlersmeyer, Emily Arata and Brad Davis are "supporting" actors. Look also for Sophia D'Virgilio and Paul R. Faulkner, who make big impressions in small roles.

Actors who are asked to portray historical figures do so with some limitations: a tall actor must play a much-shorter man. A slender actor embodies a full-figured person. Accents suggest, rather than copy, actual nationalities. Audiences should just hold up their pants with their disbelief suspenders, because the stage picture is a really good fit.

The technical production is a simple, but challenging design. The stage dressing itself suggests a boxy television with the horizontal lines of pre-pixel video.

The eye is drawn to the onstage television screens that suggest the control-room view of the television producer. Stage manager Ben Wedler and his staff of Frank Sims, Nathan Dwyer, Heather Closson and Brock Eastom run a very smooth show.

First-nighters at Frost/Nixon included several student groups, and young people aren't always typical of the more mature audiences at Arena Dinner Theatre. But this is the show parents could, and should, share with their older children. There's some salty language, to be sure, but with that parental guidance, this play is very likely to open discussions between young people who did not experience the history of Watergate and its aftermath and older people who did. This play is very likely to spark some critical thinking about what's good and what's lousy in media, politics, crime and punishment in the country today.

# Okay, Just Not Great

Hotels of North America, By Rick Moody, Little, Brown and Company, 2015

There was a time around the turn of the century when the literary establishment was absolutely determined to anoint a new generation of Great American Writers. To that end, the establishment identified several young white male writers from the East Coast who'd recently written large books, and then the establishment cranked out essays and reviews that officially installed these writers as Important Writers. The assumption was that all future work by these writers would make up the canon of 21st-century American litera-

Unfortunately, for the most part, the past decade and a half has not been kind to these writers. Many of them have been unable to write anything that approaches the Greatness of their millennial novels, and some of the critical tablishment has begun to express second thoughts.

Rick Moody is one of those writers. The novels he's published after 1994's *The Ice Storm* have not been consistently gushed over, and sometimes they've even been infamously subjected to critical hatchet jobs. *Hotels of North America* is Moody's chance to get back into literature's good graces, and it does the job in an appropriately modest way.

Although it caters to a fashionable allergy to conventional narrative, the book does tell a story about a central character. That character is Reginald Edward Morse, a former securities trader turned traveling motivational speaker who has found some internet notoriety by publishing reviews of the hotels and motels in which he stays as he trudges about the world. He's middleaged, divorced, financially unstable and interminably crabby. He travels with his girlfriend, identified only with her initial, "K," and the pair are not above pulling a scam to get out of paying their hotel tab now and then.

You'd expect a writer like Moody to approach the novel with a gimmick, and he doesn't disappoint. The conceit is that the book is a collection of Morse's hotel reviews gathered by the director



of the North American Society of Hoteliers and Innkeepers, Greenway Davies, who writes a foreword to the book. Moody, playing himself, writes an afterword. In between, Morse's reviews are collected and displayed, though, for no rational reason, not in chronological order.

The novel's biggest problems are those of voice and credibility. Some of the groups of people who do not generally speak or write in

> the verbose language of an Ivy-educated author are these: directors of professional associations, securities tradmotivational ers. speakers, hotel reviewers. Yet that's how both Davies and Morse write. and their voices are indistinguishable from one

another; it doesn't ring true. The novel, too, asks for an enthusiastic suspension of disbelief if one is to accept that any professional association would publish Morse's curmudgeonly reviews (they'd be more likely to try to get him banned from the review website) or that they'd want to collect the reviews in an old-fashioned ink-on-paper book.

But those quibbles are not the point. The improbable conceit is just an excuse for Moody to create an interesting character and let him ramble on for a couple hundred pages. In that ambition, *Hotels of North America* is successful. Moody, in the guise of Morse, gives us dozens of picturesque turns of phrase and several clever jokes. If Morse's morose drone becomes a bit numbing at times, he's more often entertaining.

No one, I hope, is going to try to cast *Hotels of North America* as a Great American Novel, and that's just fine. The hyperbole heaped upon Moody's early writing did an injustice to him and to his readership, and the folly of trying to define greatness without the benefit of distance will always come to no good end. *The Ice Storm* was a good book, *The Diviners* was not a good book and *Hotels of North America* is a decent book. So far, that's all we can tell.

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
