

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

The day is near once again – the day audiophiles around the country celebrate their passion, a day created just for them. It's their day to buy new releases. It's their day to buy rare and hard to find albums. And it's their day to wallow in their audiophilic geekdom.

April 16 is Record Store Day, and it's a great day to love music.

Now in its ninth year, Record Store Day has become a national holiday of sorts for music lovers. With new releases and rare and hard-to-find CDs and records available for the first time and in what are usually very limited quantities, Record Store Day is a day that's become increasingly popular every year, and not only for those looking to buy music products. It's a great day for those who are looking to share their love of music with others as well.

Some of the roots of Record Store Day began right here in Fort Wayne with Wooden Nickel Music store owner Bob Roets.

As he described it in a recent interview, "About a decade ago, I was contacted by a couple of guys who were record store owners in other cities. They were highly concerned, as they should have been, that over 3,000 independent record stores had closed over the course of the previous decade and they were looking to do something unique to help combat the big box retailers who were dominating the music sales at the time. That was really the genesis of Record Store Day."

Fast forward a year and a half: those same people persuaded Metallica to sign on as supporters of the independent music store cause, and Record Store Day was born. There was only a handful of new music available to the stores that first year, and the releases were heavily dominated by CDs, not the vinyl that the event is known for today. There also were only a few stores around the country who participated in that first Record Store Day. Wooden Nickel was one of them.

"We really didn't know what to expect that first year," Roets said. "We only had 37 new releases [to sell]. We did see a sales bump, but we had very little media attention the first two years. It wasn't until the third year that it really started to click and people started to get excited about the limited edition vinyl releases. That's when it

really started to take off.

"Record Store Day exclusive releases have gotten really vinyl heavy since then," Roets continued. "In my opinion, the reason that vinyl has really taken off is because of the buzz that the Record Store Day releases have gotten. It's really brought people back to listening to and buying vinyl. Because of

the huge increase in demand, we've added titles to all of our stores each of the last five years, and vinyl continues to be a growing category for us. Just this year alone, vinyl sales for Wooden Nickel are up over 40 percent."

Roets also gives credit to the Coalition of Independent Music Stores for helping his stores increase sales in a world where "nobody buys music anymore." Wooden Nickel joined the organization last year as one of

just 50 stores around the country invited to become a member. The Coalition of Independent Music Stores, or CIMS, is "a collective of independently owned record stores in 25 states throughout the country working together for the betterment and support of each other, the music industry, the artists and the music fans that make this all possible," according to a statement on their website. The people behind CIMS are also responsible for the incarnation and growth of Record Store Day.

"Joining CIMS has been beneficial to us in many ways," Roets said. "First, they have recommended us to artists from around the country who are looking to perform. We have had several in-store appearances by bands touring nationally because of those recommendations. Also, CIMS gives us access to a lot of exclusive items that we can hand out to fans."

For example, the store recently gave away an exclusive thickstock Jeff Buckley poster and autographed booklets from The 1975. Lastly, Roets says, CIMS has

helped provide valuable tips to him and other record store owners who are trying to compete in today's digital world.

"I have been able to pick up a lot of ideas on how to use social media more effectively and to our advantage," Roets said, "and get our name out to people who might already be shopping online retailers and spending time on the Internet but are looking for somewhere locally to buy product as well."

As for this year's Record Store Day particulars, Metallica are back as Record Store Day ambassadors and are offering a limited edition live CD called Liberté, Egalité, Fraternité, Metallica! - Live at Le Bataclan. Paris, France - June 11th, 2003. The CD features a live recording from the club where the terrorist attacks took place last November, with the band, Record Store Day and independent record stores donating proceeds to benefit Fondation de France's Give for France charity. Other major Record Store Day exclusive products include items from Tom Petty, Bob Dylan, Grateful Dead, The Doors, Fleetwood Mac, Jimi Hendrix, Cheap Trick and three releases from David Bowie, just to

name a few. You might also be interested in checking out the rare Justin Bieber picture disc, a Carl Douglas "Kung Fu Fighting" 7-inch or the 10 LP Classic Album Collection from The Monkees.

As always, there will be a lot of other things happening in and around the Wooden Nickel North Anthony location to help celebrate the day. The event has evolved into a

An Actor Comes Full Circle

A surprising number of actors get their start in Fort Wayne theater and go on to work professionally in big cities - New York, Hollywood, Chicago. Billy Dawson has come literally full circle and has forged a professional music theater path back here in Fort

Dawson's road to professional theater was an unusually easy one, but it started, as such roads often do, in childhood. He describes his childhood self as "weird, and I mean that in the best possible way. I was an only child so my imagination was my best friend. I certainly had a sense for the dra-

His family considered him a born performer, and he certainly made the most of his imagination and talent for the dramatic. He was also introduced to a diverse selection of music early on by many members of his family.

"My grandmother used to sing gospel music with her siblings on the radio way back in the day," he says. "My cousins, Logan and Levi, are in a band called Dag and the Bulleit Boys.'

His first experience with live musical theater was a production of Beauty and the Beast that he attended at the Embassy Theatre as a small boy. Although he was too young to remember much about the performance itself, he says, "I remember feeling that magical buzz in the air before the show, and it was all just so grand to me.'

It wasn't until he was a 5th grader at Weisser Park Elementary that he got his first taste of the stage himself.

"We were doing a play called *The Nightmare*," he says. "I was auditioning to play the lead boy, and I held my music up to my face so I couldn't see anyone. The director said, "Lovely voice," but I didn't get the role. However, I was cast as half of a singing floral couch and the rest is his-

His next role was a duckling in Honk!, a musical telling of the Ugly Duckling tale with Edwards Productions.

Although his experience playing singing water fowl and musical furniture didn't tell him he was destined for a career on the boards, his role as The Baker in Into the Woods his senior year at South Side High School did.

"That is the role that showed me I could train to this professionally," he says. "That was the moment that I truly fell in love with performing.'

Throughout high school he also performed with the Fort Wayne Civic Theatre, Arena Dinner Theatre and the Fort Wayne

Komets once and would love the opportunity to do that again," he says.

After graduation in 2009, Dawson attended IPFW's Department of Theatre for about three years. However, felt pulled in another direction.

"I made the choice to take a leap of faith and left before I finished the degree," he says. "Luckily, I was still able to get work without it."

However, he cautions, "If a young person considering going to school for theater is reading this and thinking, 'Well, I'll just quit school and go for it,'-don't. My experience was rare and lucky."

From there he started "making connections and auditioning for anything that I could," he says. "Theater performers don't have the right to be too picky, especially when you're just starting out."

As he gained experience, Dawson learned even more about performing do's and don'ts, including the value of collabora-

> "Very few things I hate more than a performer who is only focused on themselves," he says. "Luckily, those people never last too long in the business."

> Although he found himself missing doing straight plays like he'd done at IPFW, he soon discovered that the Chicago musical theater scene was a completely different entity from straight theater. The audiences, he found, were also different from the ones in Fort Wayne.

One of the last musicals he did in the Windy City was The Producers, in which he played the flamboyant Broadway director/performer Roger DeBris.

"Every night Springtime for Hitler," he says, "I had a moment to flirt with someone in the audience. Let's just say that some of the responses were ... unexpected."

As good as Chicago theater was to Dawson (he appeared in nine musicals and two operas, and earned membership in the American Guild of Music Artists union), after four years he started to feel the call to return home to his roots. He and his partner of six years, Andy Planck, another former Fort Wayne theater star who found professional theatre success in Chicago and elsewhere, decided to take what they had learned from Chicago theater - the good, the bad, and the ugly – and bring it back home.

And thus, the Three Rivers Music Theatre was born.

"We pay all of our actors and staff, and have a relationship with Actors Equity Association," says Dawson, who is employed by the company as both a performer and the marketing coordinator. "While other theater companies certainly run in a professional manner and have had professional actors direct and perform on their stages, we are the first contractual professional theater company.

The company's affiliation with the actor's union means they will be hiring Equity actors for their productions and in a few seasons they will be able to offer local actors

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
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Laying Down Roots

Feature • John O'Connell -----

Since his arrival at IPFW in 2007, when he first accepted the position of chair at the university's Department of Theatre, John O'Connell has become an increasingly influential member of the community. Having become the dean of the College of Visual and Performing Arts – first as an interim dean in 2012, then filling the role on a permanent basis in 2013 – O'Connell has also become a valuable resource for other arts entities in the city, mostly notably as a direc-

tor and advisor for a couple of recent Fort Wayne Youtheatre productions.

The fact that he landed here is hardly accidental, since O'Connell already had a close connection to the city before he moved here himself. Brother Dan is the president and CEO of Visit Fort Wayne and provided John both an incentive to move and a positive appraisal of life in the Summit City.

The seventh of eight children, O'Connell grew up in Minnesota and was driven to serve from a young age. While he was drawn to music and theater, his real interests leaned toward community, specifically mentally handicapped youth. At the age of 13 he began his own chapter

of ARC after attending a convention and determining a need in his community. His training in the area came via a summer camp, but since the camp was short of counselors, his training lasted a day before he was put to work. He ended up running the camp for the next four summers while he attended college. But theater was always part of the mix, even as he saw his career possibly going another way.

"I was active in my high school musicals, and we had Sister Judine Sutor directing all of these shows," says O'Connell. "I was in 13 performances in high school, which was just a huge number of productions for a high school to be doing. They were big, huge musicals too, and she would hire choreographers and bring in costume designers. I kind of fell into my theater degree in college because I hadn't intended on it, but I kept taking the classes until I was told that if I took four more, I'd have a theater degree."

Although advised to pursue graduate school, O'Connell opted to get a job and take some time off from academics. Even future professors can face the dread of writing more papers, it seems. But his administrative jobs at facilities which served adults with mental disabilities had a ceiling, and O'Connell felt he had accomplished all he could there and was ready eventually to look toward a career in theater.

"I decided to move to New York City. Four of my friends from my university theater program had already gone to New York, so I had a place to stay when I got there. I arrived there on September 1, 1983, but once I got there I realized I had a bit of an identity crisis. I wasn't sure if I was an actor or a director, and I was also stage manager for some off-off-Broadway shows. I just never really found my niche."

It wasn't until O'Connell began his graduate studies at the University of Alabama that he found his call-

ing. By this time he had already met future husband Jim Williams, and together they found a home – for a few years at least – in Tuscaloosa.

"Once I decided to pursue my MFA in directing, that's when I knew I had found that niche. I didn't start graduate school until 1995, so I was 37, much older than everyone else. I had gone through a two-year process of taking the GRE and applying to eight graduate programs. I was eventually accepted to four and chose Alabama."

Although O'Connell loved directing, he says he

always knew he'd eventually end up in a classroom, which is one of the primary reasons he chose Alabama.

"The other programs offered assistantships which would have meant acting as stage manager, but the program in Alabama offered an assistantship in teaching so I was able to get three years of teaching experience while I worked on my MFA."

O'Connell and Williams left Alabama for Arkansas in 1998, where Williams worked on an MFA in book arts while O'Connell taught and eventually ran the BFA program. The couple knew they weren't planning to stay in Arkansas permanently, however, and ideas of landing in Indiana were

already creeping into view.

"We spent our 40s in Arkansas, but we knew we didn't want to spend our 50s there. We were already coming to Fort Wayne a couple times a year to visit my brother and his family. Their youngest is our godson. We'd come for the holidays, and we'd rent a lake cottage in the summer. In the meantime I applied for 300 positions over the course of nine years. Theater positions are very competitive, especially in directing so in those nine years I got two nibbles: Vermont and IPFW."

After Larry Life's death, the chair position in the Dept. of Theatre, one which he had held for many years, was open, and O'Connell was eventually offered and accepted the job. He quickly took on the teaching and administrative duties which came with that job as well as directing plays in several of the community theaters. He might have continued on in that capacity indefinitely, but when the dean of the College of Visual and Performing Arts left in 2012, he was asked to serve as interim while a national search was conducted for a permanent replacement.

"I thought it was a great opportunity to test the waters," says O'Connell. "If you had told me I'd be dean one day, I'd have said 'Yeah, right. Now have another drink.' But it was a good way to try that hat on and see how it fit. When the search was going on, I was one of the three finalists, and in 2013 I was named full-time dean. They say everyone will have five careers in their lifetime, and I've had five – actor, stage manager, director of a BFA program, chair of a department and now dean – and this is the best job I've ever had. I liked being a chair, but I love advocating for multiple arts, not to mention music teachers, art teach-

Zephaniah

Reforged

The metallurgist forging the sword on the cover to Zephaniah's second album, *Reforged*, alludes to the brute force waiting to be unleashed from within the confines of a compact disc. The word "forged" itself means that something is being made with the utmost care and concentration, par-



ticularly by beating it into shape, and preferably with a sledge. As it applies to Zephaniah, this definition manifests in their music by pounding their listeners into submission with their Manowar-inspired progressive power metal. And much like a sword, *Reforged* is a powerful weapon against everyday villains we all face.

The self-titled opener is a stately re-introduction to the band after a six-year hiatus, and finds the five-piece more skilled and melodic than ever before. From this auspicious beginning, it is apparent that the production throughout the album boasts a more professional attack and is, as a result, more powerful in its impact. For over an hour, every member's contribution to the whole statement can be easily discerned, and the whole purpose aims to force the band's musical prowess front and center.

The triptych of songs dedicated to the *Mad Max* series – one for the namesake film, "Road Warrior" and "Thunderdome" – are well-endowed tributes to the cult films. Appearing early on in *Reforged*, these three tracks showcase technically proficient performances from guitarists Justin Zych and Shaun Cothron, who deserve mention for their imaginative and harrowingly paced melodies that accompany the lyrics from vocalist Logan Detwiler. Of course, they wouldn't quite have the same impact were it not for the rhythm section of Ian Bender on bass and Cody Johns drums providing the much needed gravity for the otherwise sky-rocketing guitarists.

Perhaps the most exciting aspect listening to *Reforged* is the same thing that will prevent non-metal heads from giving this album a listen out of curiosity: there is a certain thrill in wondering exactly when the pressure of the music's blistering pace will finally cause its craftsmen to buckle. Given power metal's implications, listening intently to an album like this can be an endurance contest in which metalheads already challenge themselves to see if they can withstand the energy bursting out of the speakers. Additionally, the progressive nature of the song structures (particularly "Quest for the Royal Crown") inevitably makes the listener wonder how the band can keep track of the sheer number of riffs and ideas in each song.


Overwhelming as the scale of *Reforged* can seem, it certainly does its job in separating those who claim they like metal from those who actually love it and live it. You'll notice that I consciously avoided using the word "epic" to describe Zephaniah and their staggering songs because given everything this band strives to accomplish, "epic" is just redundant when it comes to describing just what Zephaniah really strive for: total sonic annihilation. Wild Nothing

Life of Pause

Jack Tatum's musical inspirations run far and deep, which makes a Wild Nothing album something to behold.

His newest opus, *Life of Pause*, opens with the rather breathtaking baroque pop of "Reichpop," a nod to both the songs that keep you company on



"Lady Blue" sounds like an off-kilter B-side from *Reach The Beach*-era Fixx. "A Woman's Wisdom" sounds to me like what John Lennon may have been dabbling in a year or two after *Double Fantasy*, had the universe allowed it. Now I don't know if Tatum was listening to Wire's *Chairs Missing* during the writing process, but "Japanese Alice" really puts me in mind of their exquisite "Outdoor Miner." This is the jangliest track I've heard from Wild Nothing, and I would love to hear more. Title track "Life of Pause" is pure

Widespread Panic

Widespread Panic (1991)

Of all places, Athens, Georgia was an indie-rock hotbed during the early 80s and through the late 90s. With formidable bands like the B-52's and R.E.M. gaining traction on early college radio, it was just a matter of time



before this college town of just under 100,000 people was internationally known. Widespread Panic formed in the mid-80s and are known as one of the second-generation American jam bands that reinvented the genre. John Bell and Michael Houser met at the University of Georgia and formed the band (named after Houser's panic attacks) and released their debut record in 1988. This album, their second, was a groovy blend of Southern rock and keyboard-driven, jazzy blues and doesn't get enough credit for a band that has been around for over 30 years.

It opens with the funky "Send Your Mind" (a Van Morrison cover) and continues on with "Walkin' (For Your Love)" and the great keys from the extraordinary Terry Lavitz. "Mercy" brings the tempo down, almost too much until the swampy "Rock" gently gets you back in the swing of things.

"C. Brown" has little hints of the alt-country version of R.E.M., as does the scrappy little jam "Love Tractor." "I'm Not Alone," another ballad, is a preview of a career that blends great arrangements and lyrics. "Barstools and Dreamers" is a little formulaic, but drifts along nicely; and "Proving Ground" is one of the best tracks on the album. The release closes with "The Last Straw"which completes an above average record from a band that still tours today with four original members. Houser passed away in 2002 from cancer, but the band carries on and has 12 studio and eight live albums. They will be in Chicago in May.

80s pop perfection. Listening to this song, as well as the whole of *Life of Pause*, I'm reminded of early 80s David Bowie. Going back and revisiting those records (*Let's Dance, Tonight*, and *Never Let Me Down*) after Bowie's passing, I was reminded of just how good those records were. Tatum does something similar in that he makes incredible pop music but doesn't make it thin and tinny. He gives his music such depth and layers it perfectly. Is *Life of Pause* Wild Nothing's *Let's Dance*? It's not totally off to say it is.

Life of Pause is sonically rich and densely complex for a pop record. Here is a pop record for people who don't think they like pop. It's also for people that love pop music and have never heard of Stave Reich

community showcase with many of the area businesses in the North Anthony Corridor taking part in the festivities. 



called The Troubadour in Los Angeles to kick off their reunion, but the main shows will take place in stadiums this summer. Will Slash and Axl be able to coexist for 20 shows? I have my doubts. Rose has been running the GNR ship for many years on his own and is used to being the man in charge, so it is likely he will let his ego get in the way at some point and ruin the whole thing. It's good, then, that the first dates are in our areas, as the stadium tour kicks off a Detroit's Ford Field June 23, then moves on to Chicago's Soldier Field July 1 and Paul Brown Stadium in Cincinnati July 6. Rob Halford would be a much better choice.

Because I like 80s rock, I'll tell you that Faster Pussycat are heading out on a 30th anniversary tour beginning later this month. While they were never one of the bigger bands in the scene, the band did manage a Top 10 hit with "House Of Pain," and I'd stack their debut self-titled album up against just about any other band of the era. They were really responsible, along with LA Guns, for turning me on to the "sleaze rock" I continue to love today. Check them out May 1 at The Firehouse in Richmond, May 4 at O'Shecky's in Columbus, Ohio or May 5 at the Southport Music Hall in Indy.

Coincidentally, there is some LA Guns news to report too. Sort of. After disbanding his version of LA Guns and vowing not to play that band's material again, original LA Guns guitarist Tracii Guns formed a new band and released a couple of albums with them. Well, I guess the response hasn't been overwhelming for Guns and his new band, as he just announced a solo tour playing the debut self-titled LA Guns album in its entirety. I'm not sure who will be in the band with Guns, but that album is a classic and hearing it entirely live would be amazing. Check out Guns and his unknown band of warriors when they bring their 1988 Tour to Cleveland April 29 and Detroit May 3.

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Bring a Hankie to Hank Film

I Saw the Light, the new movie about the life and music of Hank Williams, begins with a song. Tom Hiddleston, bathed in light, brings a real ache to the classic "Cold, Cold Heart." He's alone on the stage with just a guitar, and the scene soars. Hiddleston has received both praise and criticism for his performance. Hank Williams III has complained loudly that the singing isn't good enough, and that a real Southern boy, not a British actor, should be playing his grandfather. That was not my experience. Hiddleston and his singing – and of course, Williams' amazing songs – are wonderful.

We are treated to "Hey Good Lookin'," "Your Cheating Heart," "I'm So Lonesome I Could Cry," "Move it on Over," "Jambalaya," "Lovesick Blues," "Why Don't You Love Me Like You Used to Do," "I Saw the Light" and a few more in various settings with different sets of musicians, mostly with his regular band, The Drifting Cowboys.

Based on the biography by Colin Escott, *I Saw the Light* is written and directed by Marc Abraham. He includes many of the messy details of Hank Williams life, and they are exhausting.

The movie begins in 1944 on the eve of Hank's marriage to his first wife, Audrey, beautifully played by Elizabeth Olsen. He's 21 and sings with his band on a morning farm show in Alabama. They are full of fun and hopes and dreams.

But the trouble starts early. Hank's devoted mother, Lillie (Cherry Jones, playing tough), really dislikes Audrey. Audrey returns the dislike. Audrey wants to be a singer, and she just doesn't have the pipes or pitch. This causes plenty of friction, at first with his band and the radio station bosses.

Hank can't hear how bad she is, but to try to keep the peace, he starts touring without her. Away from home, he does lots of drinking, smoking and flirting.

Hiddleston brings a skinny boy charm to his performances. You can see his charm in performances, often winking at girls. There is a sexiness in him and a raciness in the songs he sings. Without the hip swiveling of Elvis, you still know he's ready to go.

His big dream is to get on the Grand Ole Opry, which he does. He's always writing. He argues to record his version of "Lovesick Blues," and it becomes

his first No. 1 hit. His popularity grows, and so does his drinking and smoking.

He also starts using harder drugs, in part because he has a bad back and a spina bifida lump on his back. His vices become more serious, and he starts missing gigs.

Bradley Whitford, as producer Fred Rose, fills in details in black-and-white documentary-like footage, so we are spared some of the downward spiral, but in between the music performances Hank's troubles become worse.

For every lovely walk in the woods (the film is beautifully shot by Dante Spinotti) or welcome performance sequence, the trouble just piles on. The fights between Hank and Audrey grow more violent. Hiddleston makes Hank's decline in health painful to watch.

He rallies from time to time. Williams was on his way to become a crossover star. We see him meeting with Dory Schary to discuss possible movie roles with MGM. He appears on Perry Como's show. His natural charisma shines. Along the way his marriage ends, he marries again and has a child with yet another woman

Williams was a singular talent, and it becomes overwhelmingly sad to watch him destroy himself. He is a man alone, despite all the people he collects. And he knows it. Williams wrote more than 50 songs in 10 years, many of them country classics. He inspired Elvis and Dylan.

We meet him when he is 21, and he doesn't make it to 30. He died on New Year's Day, 1953, on the way to an out-of-town gig, in the back seat of his blue Cadillac being driven by a kid he barely knew. I do recommend the movie, but bring something to hold your tears. I Saw the Light ends with a crowd of fans singing his much beloved hymn.

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Superheroes Top the Dump Heap

Tops at the Box: What an incredibly boring weekend at the box office. The Oscar season has passed, and the summer blockbuster fun has yet to begin; right now is one of the two most uninteresting times of the year at the movies. I call it Dump Season, when the studios dump all the movies they invested in that didn't turn out so great. And there are, of course, some good flicks peppered in the mix. One of those films, by a lot of people's standards, is Zack Snyder's Batman v Superman: Dawn of Justice, which was the No. 1 film at the box for the second consecutive weekend. After just 10 days of release, the film has already sold \$261 million in the U.S. and \$683 million worldwide. So the reviews are bad. So there are people who passionately hate this movie. Who cares? It's averaging \$68 million in ticket sales per day around the world so far. Look for this one to top the billion mark before it even leaves theaters. Add to that merch, cross-marketing, rentals, home video and a sure-thing sequel and you have to wonder if such a terrible movie ever made so much money before.

Also at the Box: Taking the No. 2 spot at last

weekend's box office was another major hit, Disney's new classic, *Zootopia*, which sold another \$20 million over the weekend, bringing the film's five-week U.S. total to \$276 million in sales (\$787 million world-wide). Good flick, that one.

Taking the No. 3 spot was My Big Fat Greek Wedding 2 which sold another \$11 million, bringing the film's 10-day sales total to \$36.5 million. Ugh. No

Speaking of no comment, *God's Not Dead 2* took the No. 4 spot at last weekend's box office, selling \$8 million over its first three day of release. Rounding out the Top 5 was Christian flick *Miracles from Heaven*, which sold another \$7.5 million. Oof.

Equity Membership Candidate points toward eventually joining the union themselves.

Dawson is currently playing Jamie in the Three Rivers Music Theatre's first production, *The Last Five Years*, which opened April 1. He considers this to be the greatest performing challenge of his career.

"First, it's very vocally difficult," he says. "I come out belting my face off at the very beginning and have to have enough voice left to do my ballads at the end."

The other challenge comes from finding the honesty of a character who is very different from himself

"As a person, I speak with my hands, and have a very expressive face," he explains. "Jamie is teach-

ing me to trust the stillness. I can't rely on my usual 'bag of tricks,' and I have to really lose myself in the role."

Although a Hollywood film based on the musical was recently released, Dawson says the live theater production is a bit different. Nevertheless, he says, "the audience can expect a very real story, told by very capable storytellers, with some of the best music to ever come from a musical."

Dawson considers himself lucky to be back in his hometown that still values the arts so much. "There is so much room for art in this incredible city, but only if we support it," he says "The developments that the Fort Wayne arts communities have been so exciting and we are thrilled to be a part of it."

O'Connell also relishes many of the partnerships he's been able to establish, ones which strengthen the academic advancement of his students and contribute to the artistic wealth of the community at large, bringing Indian music and performance to town while connecting his theater program to Youtheatre, where he directed a production of *Oliver!* in 2013. He also took a group of IPFW students, a 50-piece wind ensemble,

to Carnegie Hall during their recent spring break. Having just married Williams last July 4, O'Connell has definitely found his niche, and his home, here in Fort Wayne.

"We bought a lake cabin in 2012 up near Columbia City. Jim is on our faculty and teaches here full-time. It's very rare that a couple can both teach at the same institution, and we're happy here. Our roots are growing very deep."







Three Rivers Music Theatre is a brand new company, and if the company's first production, The Last Five Years, is any indication, the company is in for a

This production has two characters: Love and Loss. Love is, of course, the hero, and Loss? Well, if not exactly the villain in this piece, maybe it's the rotten SOB you grudgingly come to respect by the show's end.

Okay, that's a lie. Actually, the two characters are Cathy and Jamie, played by Jessica Butler and Billy Dawson, and in this intimate portrait, we get to watch their love story begin and grow and, ultimately, end.

I did not want to see this production. It would be sad! The songs would make me cry! I would be reminded of a long-ago lost love!

It was. They did. I remembered.

And I was so glad I went, I almost did a little dance. The Last Five Years is great because it's a universal story. It may not resonate with all you people who loftily remind me you've been married for 150 years, but for every couple who lives happily ever after, there's another couple that

has to part. Those are romances! Hubble and Katie. Rick and Ilse. Harold and Maude.

Directed by Andy Planck, The Last Five Years is one tough little show. A wise choice for a premiere offering, Planck keeps it simple, yet simply beautiful. The set, by Robert Shoquist, is evocative. We stand on a guy-wired bridge with the city in the distance. In a way, the members of the audience are a part of each scene; they become the passers-by, the literary party

Curtain Call VIRGINIA RELPH people, the cynical audition-holders.

Butler and Dawson are well known for fine musical work in Fort Wayne, and they shine in a vocallydemanding show. The style seemed part traditional musical, part opera, with lyrics that must be understood and wonderful vocal arabesque. Additionally, each character tells one scene at a time, alone on stage. so they each have to be pretty much perfect all the

time. They pretty much are.

Music Director Tommy Saul leads the orchestra on keyboards, backed by cellos, guitar, bass and violin. (Piano and strings - it doesn't get much more romantic.) Saul's leadership in the Jason Robert Brown score is sometimes moody and often thrilling.

Yet The Last Five Years is not a typical romance. There's no fatal agony; no one turns out to be a monster masquerading as a human be-

ing. That's what's cool about this show. Yes, the young couple can't make a go of it. In the end, though, it's still kind of hopeful. As the lights go down, Cathy and Jamie are still pretty young. They part respectfully, wistfully, gently.

Love and loss are the fraternal twins of every couple's story, regardless of how long they happen to be together. Love and loss are what make this story real.
