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

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




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Love, Arboreal Style

For many of us, that first taste of Shakespeare comes in high school, when the rivalries and tragedy of *Romeo and Juliet*, the witchy-ness and tragedy of Macbeth and the family squabbles and, well, tragedy of Hamlet give us a pretty firm impression of what

the Bard is all about. And it's pretty tragic.

While it is true that many of Shakespeare's works plumb the depths of human foibles and despair, the guy did crank out some wickedly funny plays too. He even at times resorted to, believe it or not,

Perhaps the play which best captures all of Shakespeare's talents and abilities is A Midsummer Night's Dream, a play which, while on its surface a comedy, displays a quirky set of characters and exposes some darkness even amidst the light. This year, as the IPFW Department of Theatre continues its 51st season, Jeffrey Casazza, associate professor of acting, movement and voice, is directing this month's production. While this is his first time tackling Shakespeare at IPFW, it's hardly his first time directing Shakespeare.

"It's the goal of our department to do a Shakespeare play every other year so our students have a chance to do that," says Casazza. "But that hasn't happened the last few years. For a variety of reasons we hadn't been able to do that, so we decided to do one this year, and I'm really happy

that it's A Midsummer Night's Dream.

This year is also the 400th anniversary of Shakespeare's death, so that's a big deal in the Shakespeare world. In fact, our opening night is the day before that anniversary, so our second show will fall on the actual

date of his death."

Casazza has a rich history with this particular Shakespearean work, having acted in it and directed it in the past. He thinks it's one of the author's most accessible pieces.

"I think for actors, designers and just people in general, everybody has their feet in the life of that play. The basic message – that the course of true love never did run smooth - is something that everyone can relate to on some level. We all have had experiences which make that relatable. And I think it's interesting that he wrote it during the same period as Romeo and Juliet because there are similar themes, and right up until Act IV there's a feeling that it could all end pretty badly as it did for Romeo and Juliet. It's hysterically funny throughout the whole play, and you think because there are these fairies and magic that it's going to work out. But of course, in the Scottish play [MacBeth] it didn't work out so well."

But unlike *Macbeth*, the magic of *A Mid*summer Night's Dream creates a very different atmosphere of enchantment, and even as things begin to get complicated, everyone ends up with the person they were supposed

One change he's made to this production is his approach to casting the play, which completely alters the way the characters in-

"This play has traditionally, at least in the last 30 to 40 years, been double-cast with actors in the real world playing their counterpart in the fairy world. The first time

I directed the play I doubled it one way, and the second time I doubled it a different way. This time there was no doubling which keeps the worlds aesthetically separate so I could play with the characters and have them all together which can't happen if they're doubling. One nice thing about that is that the actors don't have to run off stage and change costumes, but it's really just fun to have them all together and see what happens when these worlds collide."


Casazza has also approached the role of gender in this production, coming to the characters from a somewhat different direction in the process, particularly one of the more iconic roles in the play.

"Usually the role of Puck is played by a woman because there aren't enough female characters in this play," he says. "But I wondered 'What happens if I cast a male as Puck? And how does that affect how this group of fairies

operate in a war?' What you start to see is that the underlings don't really care when the King and Queen aren't around, that away from them they're fine. But when the King and Queen show up, that's when there's a men vs. women battle going

One of the most satisfying elements of the production is the visual aspect with stunning sets and beautiful costuming. Craig Humphrey, associate professor of costume design and head of design technology, is handling costumes and has provided Casazza with renderings of what the actors will wear on stage. The set design will be handled by Mark Ridgeway, associate professor of scenic and lighting design, and Casazza says his vision and that of Ridgeway were remarkably in tune with each other. Both men may want to hold onto these designs because, although this is the third time Casazza is directing A Midsummer Night's Dream, he hopes it won't be his last.

"I can see myself directing this one more time or maybe many more times. It continues to come up in my mind a lot, and I've seen the play over and over, and each time I find new things. I like to approach it looking for what is new to the play now as opposed to what it was when I did it in graduate

Troubadour of the Trumpet

When Chris Botti joins the Fort Wayne Philharmonic on April 30, it will hardly be his first visit to Indiana. A busy touring schedule brings him to the area often, but it also could be argued that his professional career began in Indiana when, while attending Indiana University in Bloomington, he met the people necessary to get some incredibly high-profile gigs right out of the gate.

But before coming to IU, Botti's love of music began during his childhood in Oregon with a mother who is a classically trained pianist and

"Like most kids I started with the piano super early," he says. "But I rebelled against the rigidness of the piano, and by third grade I started playing the trumpet. I was also growing up during the time of Doc Severinsen on Johnny Carson, and I loved to see him standing up and moving around while putting air through an instrument. You can put an immediate fingerprint on the music which is hard to do on the piano. A wind instrument comes much closer to the human voice so you can sound more like yourself.'

Although Severinsen made an early impression, Louie Armstrong and Miles Davis further pushed Botti toward his love of trumpet, and he says, "When I realized I wasn't going to be a great athlete, I began to take music much more seriously." So seriously that he decided early on that it would be his career. His parents, while supportive of his love of music, did have a few concerns.

"I think every parent thinks their kid is the next Paul McCartney – until it comes time for them to move

for real to New York to be a musician, and then they would rather you become a doctor or lawyer. But I campaigned with my parents and told them that I wasn't interested in becoming famous; I just knew that win, lose or draw, it had to be music. By the time I told them I was leaving home to go to IU, they knew that any pushback was futile."

Although the Jacob School of Music at IU is world renowned, Botti's attraction to it came from a workshop he had taken in Sacramento while he was still in high school. The legendary David Baker, who passed away shortly after this interview, had led that workshop and made a tremendous impression on Botti.

"I was sold on IU because of the charisma and amazing teaching of Mr. David Baker," Botti said. "I learned so much from his workshop, and he was so gracious and so great, and he basically said 'I think you should come to IU.' And once I was there, I learned so much about the trumpet from

William Adam who just died a few years ago at the age of 96. I owe so much to those people, and I'm unbelievably grateful for learning so much about jazz and the focus and rock steady approach they gave me for playing the trumpet."

Botti learned enough during his time in Bloomington that he was able to leave school during his senior year for a remarkable opportunity - to play in Frank Sinatra's

"If you want to be an educator in jazz, you need a degree," says Botti. "But to be a performer, the most important thing you do in college is meet people. IU has a brilliant school, and I had so many incredible teachers while I was there. They were all the Michael Jordans of their instruments, and I was able to feed off of them. All I did while I was at IU was practice music all day long. I never even went to an IU basketball game while I was there. No offense! But I got what I needed during my time there and packed my bags to go on the road with Sinatra. It was only a two-week gig, but it gave me a little money, and I was able to move to New York after that.'

While his early days in New York took some creativity (he recalls making some cash by standing on the street playing Christmas carols for festive passersby) he eventually began getting work as a studio musician and playing in jazz clubs. His career really took off after he played with Paul Simon's band on a world tour which was when he first discovered his love of life on the road.

Since that time he's toured the world multiple times, has recorded several albums (winning a Grammy in 2013 for Best Pop Instrumental Album) and, for a time, was a semiregular on The Caroline Rhea Show. Although he and his band perform in a variety of venues, he says he enjoys performances like the one coming up with the Fort Wayne Philharmonic.

'We love doing these orchestra shows," he says. "They're certainly more challenging than a regular show, but I love playing with an orchestra and making sure the orchestra is having a good time. You definitely have to be in sync with the conductor because you don't know if they feel rhythm the same way we do, and


there are a lot of different elements since we're playing a lot of different kinds of music. But there's nothing like hearing that orchestra soaring behind you."

Botti continues to tour and hopes to record again sometime early next year. He acknowledges that the recording business isn't what it used to be, making it harder to plan for album releases.

"The recording industry is really rolling down a big cliff at this point. I feel bad for up-and-coming artists who aren't already established and are trying to make records. But I do hope that we'll be able to record again next year, probably next spring or summer."

In the meantime, Botti is a troubadour, traveling with his trumpet to whatever city is ready to host him. It's all he's wanted to do through his childhood in Oregon and his college years in Bloomington.

I play 275 to 300 days a year. I don't live anywhere. I don't have any possessions. I'm completely devoted to my career."

One never forgets that first experience with Charlotte Bronte's novel Jane Eyre. The heart-tugging tragedy, the strength and fortitude of the novel's intrepid heroine, her intense but impossible romance with Edward Rochester, the struggle between right and wrong, love or pragmatism and ultimately a chapter which opens with the four greatest

words in all of English literature and ends in such joyous rapture that no book - nay, no mortal human – can possibly live up to its lofty standards. Well, maybe that's not everyone's experience. More's the pity.

One woman who does understand that experience is Lauren Nichols, artistic director for all for One productions and writer/director of the upcoming all for One production of Jane Eyre. Like many fans of Bronte's enduring classic, she has her own long history with the novel and a somewhat conflicted feeling about various adaptations.

'My mom introduced me to the Orson Welles film version when I was 12, and I just loved it," recalls Nichols. "So she got me the cheap, mass market paperback which I immediately read and have read almost annually ever since."

Despite her love of the 1943 film, which also starred Joan Fontaine as Jane, her own desire to adapt Eyre to the stage comes after a somewhat unsatisfying experience with other more recent adaptations. Seeing those versions and "disliking most because they never lived up to the novel," she decided to try her own hand at writing one for the stage. To make it possible, from both a narrative and logistical perspective, she

decided to take a different approach to the story than Bronte did in the novel.

'I've always been a fan of non-linear storytelling, and taking that approach with this play solved a lot of the problems with staging it – like whether to have two actresses playing Jane at different ages. And the whole part of the story that revolves around St. John leaves a long time when Rochester's not on stage. Taking a non-linear approach means I can tell exactly and precisely how much of the story I want to tell, and I can have Jane telling the story of her life before in flashbacks."

When Nichols first began dabbling with this adaptation seven or eight years ago, she admits that she was somewhat stymied by possible issues in staging the play, a consideration some writers don't necessarily take into account.

"After I started writing the first rough draft, I would leave it and go back to it periodically and try to add to it, but I couldn't figure out how to solve some of the staging problems. I know the conventional wisdom is to just write it because the staging is the director's problem, but I was going to be the director!"

Nichols began writing in earnest in June 2013 but had only a small start when she de-

paragraphs." But when Nichols talks about bringing Jane to life in her own words, it's clear the affection she has for the character. And, for a faith-based theater company like all for One. Nichols was able to see many uses of messages from a larger text. "As a believer and as a person of faith,

it didn't occur to me in my 20s like it has later just how much scripture Charlotte uses in the book. She's not beating you over the head with it, but it's there. I hope I'm being as subtle as she was in my play. And it's so wonderful to portray a woman like Jane who has so much integrity, who says she is not going to compromise her principles even if it's painful. I admire her so much more now as I've gotten older, seeing the kind of pressure she was under to go against her own sense of right and wrong. She was very courageous."

Although it's been nearly three years since Nichols finished the first act, she admits she wasn't in any hurry to get it to the stage for one very practical reason.

"I was kind of stalling for awhile because I didn't want to do it while we were still staging our plays in the library. That was a great home for us for a long time, but I just didn't think it was right for the way I wanted to stage Jane Eyre. Now that we're in our new home [the ArtsLab in the Auer Center for Arts and Culture on Main], it's perfect for what I want to do. I can have a center aisle for the actors to walk through, and the audience will really be pulled

into the story.' The first reading of her play came in November 14, and since that time much work has been done to get the story perfected. A lot has also been accomplished behind the scenes as part of all for One's mission to not only entertain but also educate. In addition to their website, there's an additional blog available for those wishing to read papers written by the cast about various aspects of this show (as well as all of their productions). While Nichols readily admits to being devoted to Charlotte Bronte's original novel. she thinks that both rabid fans and novices will find something to enjoy in all for One's upcoming production of Jane Eyre.

"I really have to say that the story works. whether you're discovering it for the first time or discovering it again in a new way.

"We have some friends who have a lovely guest house, an apartment over a garage actually, and we've held retreats and writers' workshops there in the past. Tucked away for a couple days with her favorite novel sounds like a reader's dream, but as a writer, she began to see the challenges of writing Bronte's words for the stage.

March On, Comrade rose from the ashes of another local band, Ordinary

Usually when the lead singer and main songwriter decides he's moving on, that band usually ends up packing up and calling it a day. Occasionally some-



one might be brought in to replace said singer and the band continues on with a somewhat different identity. The guys left in Ordinary Van decided to stick together and forge a new identity. That identity was forged with Fort Wayne musicians John Ptak and Ben Robinson. The result is a sound less earth bound and more floating in space. You can call it post-rock if you must, but I like to call it existential post-breakup rock - music to examine the broken pieces to and understanding why they broke. The self-titled EP from March On, Comrade seems to pull hope from the pit of ones twisted stomach. It's a grand statement in a small package.

'Pool" opens the EP with an 80s vibe as synths and clean, echoed guitar come together to give the song a Talk Talk-meets-The Fixx vibe before something happens near the three-minute mark and the song takes a melancholy turn. Instruments build upon simple motifs and stack upon each other like classic Sigur Rós. Dark clouds open to blinding light; what was impossible before seems like the next logical step. It's a big and beautiful instrumental ending.

"Archer" seems a more darker affair. It's filled with quiet angst and calculated sadness. "Prism" sounds like Elbow on a good mood bender. I think Guy Garvey would approve. "Irons" has the vibe of early This Will Destroy You, had they experimented with ethereal vocals for a bit. And closer "Shade" keeps that existential longing

March On, Comrade have a real knack for building songs piece by piece in front of our eyes. Unlike some of our post-rock heroes like Explosions in The Sky, Mogwai, This Will Destroy You and even Sigur Rós, March On, Comrade prove on this EP they don't need one whole album side for one song to get the point across. March On, Comrade have put together a five-song EP that makes us excited for what's coming next from them. It's a beautiful, sad, and longing kind of album that's an emotional heavy as well as a musical one. (John Hubner)

Loretta Lynn

Full Circle

Loretta Lynn's new album, Full Circle, kicks off with a spoken intro that reminds us of the naive, don't-giveit-no-thought way that the legendary country singer began her career. In introducing the first song she ever wrote, "Whispering Sea," she admits that she



came up with the idea simply because she was fishing at the time and really needed to write a bunch of songs in order to have the requisite 12 tracks for her first album. The songs on Full Circle represent the changes in Lynn's career, from the time when her music didn't require much thought to the time when it became difficult not to think about it too much.

Full Circle works best when it allows Lynn to be the young girl from Butcher Holler who grew up singing traditional songs. "I Never Will Marry," "Black Jack David" and especially the beautiful "In the Pines" recall a time when the residents of Appalachia could remember their families' immigrant pasts and sat around their modest living rooms singing songs tinged by the old country.

Other songs on the album have roots in the big-hair-and-sequins era that was Lynn's heyday. "Fist City" and "Everything It Takes," songs about fighting to keep her straying man, draw from the singer's scrappy persona, but in the 21st century, they're merely kitsch; threatening to punch the woman Bubba's sleeping with in the face is the stuff of bad reality TV, not admirable feminine empowerment.

There are times, too, when Lynn steps out of her vocal wheelhouse, such as on a cover of Willie Nelson's "Always on My Mind"; she fares much better when Nelson himself is there to help out on 'Lav Me Down.'


The circle closes with "Who's Gonna Miss Me?," a late-in-life lament that expresses hope for a legacy. It may be a bit of false modesty on her part, but it's hard not to hope that Lynn realizes that plenty of people are going to miss her. (Evan Gillespie)

Lucifer's Friend

Where the Groupies Killed the Blues (1972)

German progressive-rock was unheard of until these cats started blending hard rock with funky prog-jazz fusion. Seriously, this was a real band that could be trippy yet progressive and shadowed the sound of Deep Purple during the same part of the early 70s.



"Hobo" opens the release, and has sort of a Zeppelin buzz to it due to the wailing from vocalist John Lawton. Heavy on percussion and drums, the band also employed some hard rock keys and organ from Peter Hecht. Hecht opens "Rose on the Vine" with a soft piano arrangement that eventually turns into an eight-minute jam reminiscent of early Rush (and possibly Grand Funk). Side one closes with the proggy jam "Mother," an over-arranged, lyrically confusing track that almost channels Frank Zappa's early work with the Mothers of Invention.

The title track opens side two and sounds like a cross between King Crimson and Marillion (and Yes and Spirit). "Prince of Darkness" turns the guitars back on, and again there is a nice little piano arrangement and some groovy percussion. The vocals in this one want to be hard rock, but the harmonies are closer to something you'd hear from Spinal Tap. "Delirium," an eight-minute rock opera also chips away at the prog-rock stereotype with its elaborate strings, horns and percussion (at this point you've heard it all before). The album closes with the synthed-out "Burning Ships," a song I consider to be one of the best things they ever

The band produced about eight (respectable) studio records, and I've been a fan since the mid 80s. They have been through numerous lineups, but still record and tour with original members Lawton, guitarist Peter Hesslein, and Dieter Horns on the bass.



Pure Mood

The kids are alright. In fact, better than alright.


This Austin, Texas-based trio may boast the best "wacky-band-name-toactual-quality-of-material" ratio going. Since 2007, Ringo Deathstarr have pumped out four full-lengths and a trio



Pure Mood hints at development and thoughtfulness, but RD never stray too far from the blend of ethereal dreampop and buzzsaw attack that they've deployed since day one. Pure Mood opens with the beautifully airy "Dream Again" which showcases layers of bassist Alex Gehring's lighter-than-air vocals. It's easy to understand the My Bloody Valentine comparisons when Gehring is at the microphone; comparisons to MBV's Bilinda Butcher are inevitable. Then, Ringo Deathstarr follow with their change-up pitch, "Heavy Metal Suicide." Yes, it sounds a lot like vintage Smashing Pumpkins. Yes, they had toured together recently. Yes, the Pumpkins's guitarist is rumored to have played keys on the track. And it rocks appropriately. But poppier nuggets ("Big Bopper") and dreamy, fuzz-fueled numbers ("California Car Collection," "Frisbee") show a band not only embracing their influences, but absorbing them - and beginning to create something readily identifiable as their own.

"Stare at the Sun" is downright danceable, but the MBV renaissance fans out there will find plenty to love about it. And they'll be positively over the moon with "Show Me the Truth of Your Love" with guitarist Elliott Frazier and Gehring's paired vocals.

Where 2012's Mauve heaved and breathed with bouts of distortion and moments of blissed-out calm, Pure Mood feels more cohesive and realized. Some may chafe at the prospect of a band sanding down its playful claws, but the new album will definitely increase RD's appeal to newer listeners. Think of Pure Mood as a gateway drug to the rest of the band's intoxicating catalog. (D.M. Jones)



A Fine Time to Take a Hike

Having recently celebrated its fifth anniversary, the growth of Fort Wayne Trails is proof of how popular walking, hiking, biking and running have become in recent years.

As part of the city's network of trail systems – including ones under the auspices of ACRES Land Trust, Fort Wayne Parks & Recreation and Allen County Parks – safe and scenic paths are available for anyone to enjoy. Each fall the full collection of trails merge their resources as part of the Allen County Trailblazers, a collection of hikes to introduce folks to all the wonder available within a few miles. But fortunately, with autumn still several months away, there are plenty of ways to enjoy the Fort Wayne Trails much sooner.

May is a particularly busy month for Fort Wayne Trails since that's when the popular Trek the Trails program begins. Each Tuesday beginning May 3, bicyclists can gather at 6 p.m. for a long ride, generally between seven and nine miles. Participants are asked to bring helmets and water for their ride, which can be done at their own pace. Each week a different trail will be explored, and the rides are very family-friendly and open to riders of all ages

That first trek on May 3 will begin at Rockhill Park, and the following week, May 10, the official kickoff of Trek the Trails will be held at Salomon Farm, with a seven-mile ride beginning from there. The following three treks in May will begin at Deer



Playing the role of Hermia in A Midsummer Night's Dream has been an aspiration of mine from the moment I was told I was "just short enough to play her."

This timeless classic's theme of "the course of true love never did run smoothly" runs contrary to society's typical portrayal of a love story. We all know exactly what I'm referring to, and the allusions to the idea of finding "the one," the one whom we never fight with and who continuously makes us happy, surround us constantly.

I like to think that A Midsummer Night's Dream, shows the course of love in a more honest manner than society is willing to admit. That is what makes this comedy so relatable: the highs and lows of every loving relationship, not just romantic, are highlighted

in the events that unfold within the woods.

The is my second show with Director Jeff Casazza. Working with Jeff is always an adventure; his style of directing and the playfulness in which he works are inspiring. The first weeks are spent without looking

at the text, just playing with the themes and character relationships. The comedic elements in *A Midsummer Night's Dream* made it useful to play games in which we each pretended to be clowns, and the ensemble's dynamic was drastically affected by these workshops.

Playing Hermia grew to be much more than playing "the short girl," and I was continuously challenged by portraying such a fierce vixen. The most obvious

challenge with any modern Shakespeare work is deciphering the text. Having never before been in a Shakespeare production, I was unnerved at the thought of understanding the lines. However, I came to realize that while the language may be difficult at certain points, it is not the words that are most important for these characters. These characters live on raw emotion; their emotions fuel them to make unbelievably rash decisions. Understating the sentiments that fuel my decisions as Hermia turned out to be much more

important than knowing the difference between a "sweetmeat" and a "nosegay." Understanding these emotions made the acting process more enticing, and aided in the discovery of my character.

Working on A Midsummer Night's Dream has been an experience I

will never forget. The role of Hermia and this creative process have been dynamic in my development as an actress. I have no words for how grateful I am to participate in such a unique show, and I hope that you each enjoy it as much as I have enjoyed working on it.

As Hermia would say, "I am amazed, and know not what to say." $\,$





Barbershop: The Next Cut is fun, as much fun as any film in the franchise. It has been 12 years since the last film. Regular players are back and the cast has added many well-known faces. The movie is stuffed with laughs and also has its serious moments. Twelve years later and the saddest thing is that the South Side of Chicago is still a violent mess.

Ice Cube is back as Calvin Palmer, and the barbershop is surviving. But it isn't easy. The neighborhood is struggling. Gunshots ring out too often. You can bring a gun into the shop, but Calvin locks it away while you get your haircut.

Joining the cast is an amazing collection of talent. Common, Tyga, Nicki Minaj, Regina Hall and J.B. Smoove (a real fast talker) have joined the ensemble. Lamorne Morris plays a funny nerd named Jerrod. Utkarsh Ambudkr adds spice.

When this group gets going on any subject, the movie sparkles. They take on a wide range of topics from Obama to Beyonce and Black Lives Matter. I couldn't begin to list all the many references, but it

Screenwriters Kenya Barris (creator of ABC's *Blackish*) and Tracy Oliver (*Survivor's Remorse*) have packed the barbershop with so many characters there's probably a possibility of another *Barbershop*.

Tops at the Box: Jon Favreau's *The Jungle Book* absolutely killed at the box office last weekend, selling a solid \$103 million over its first three days of release. Traveling Light Not an Easy Ride

No Baggage: A Minimalist Tale of Love & Wandering by Clara Bensen, Running Press, 2016

The journey that Clara Bensen writes about in No Baggage begins with an OKCupid date. She meets Jeff, a young college professor, in front of the state capitol in Austin, Texas, and immediately feels chemistry between herself and the eccentric young man. He's a professor of environmental science, divorced, father to a five-year-old daughter and currently living in his on-campus office. He's a self-conscious free spirit who rejects any idea or behavior that he identifies as mainstream, and

he is stubbornly resistant to commitment of any kind, whether it be having a girlfriend or a lease on an apartment.

Part of Jeff's free-spirited routine is to take a trip every summer and to travel entirely without baggage, making his way through the world with nothing more than that which he can fit in the pockets of his eccentrically red chinos. This summer, he plans to travel from Istanbul to London, and he invites Clara to come with him. She's wary but excited at the idea, and she somewhat reluctantly agrees to go along.

The pair flit through Turkey and Greece and Croatia, staying with friends or strangers they scrounge up through the Couchsurfing website. They wash their underwear in sinks and hang them to dry on balcony railings, and they do their best to revel in their carefree moments in exotic places.

For Jeff, it's easy - he's quite comfortable living in the moment and thinking of no one but himself - but Clara struggles; she's a sensitive young woman with a history of feeling the weight of the world resting too heavily upon her shoulders.

From the perspective of an adult, it's hard not to worry about Bensen, beginning with the very premise of the trip. She and Jeff are only going to be away for three weeks, and given that they have credit cards, smart phones and valid passports with

them, there's little chance that their hardships will amount to much more than smelly clothes and messy hair. They work hard to see themselves as unconventional trailblazers, but their itinerary includes plenty of stops at the touristy highlights such

as Hagia Sophia in Istanbul and the Athenian Acropolis. Bensen embarks on the journey with such naivete that she seems guaranteed eventual disappointment of some kind.

Specifically, the disappointment seems certain to come at the hands of Jeff. Over the course of the trip, Bensen begins to long for the smallest of commitment from him, even if it's just an acknowledgment that he cares about her a little bit, but Jeff is too busy making a spectacle of himself - elbowing his way into the wedding photos of a young Turkish couple, hanging his underwear to dry in front of the Parthenon - to notice or care

when she's feeling down. To Bensen, Jeff's behavior looks daring and thrilling; to a cynical observer, his antics look like a frantic bid for attention, his commitment phobia like avoidance of responsibility. Bensen is recovering from a breakdown triggered by a severe anxiety disorder, and in her companionship with Jeff, she appears at risk.

I won't give away how it all ends up, but I will say that, in the end Bensen turns out to be stronger than I'd given her credit for. And although her adventure is naive, it's hard to begrudge her youthful hope and willingness to take a risk. She is, after all, the one who takes a big risk by leaping into a journey with a man who has nothing to lose. When all is said and done, it's Bensen, the reluctant traveler and excessive worrier, who is the far braver of the pair.
