



Every so often, an Alice Cooper show will still be protested by self-described Christians in small, conservative communities.

Because Alice Cooper shows tend to feature nooses, simulated decapitations and sprays of fake blood, some folks come to the conclusion that Cooper, who performs May 19 at Foellinger Theatre, must be in league with Satan.

The truth is more wonderfully complicated than that.

First of all, when you call Alice Cooper on the phone, you end up talking to a guy named Vincent Damon Furnier.

Furnier is a health nut, an avid golfer, a devoted family man, a devout Christian, a non-drinker and an evident Republican (although he really doesn't like to talk about politics).

The shocking plot twist here is that Furnier is Cooper.

Cooper is a character Furnier plays. Furnier often refers to Cooper in the third person as if he is someone in the next room.

It wasn't always so. Furni-

er has been around long enough to have socialized with some of the late greats of 20th century rock. He calls them his big brothers and sisters, and what he learned from them is that he had to split his personality.

"I used to drink with Jimi Hendrix," he said in a phone interview. "I used to drink with Jim Morrison and Janis Joplin – every single one of the ones that died at 27 years old. I realized that they were trying to live their image.

"That's what kind of taught me that if I was going to be Alice Cooper, I had to be two people," Furnier said. "I had to be the character on stage and not the character off stage. That's the thing they never learned. That's what killed them. Trying to live up to that image all the time. You have to fuel that with something."

Furnier was born in Detroit and grew up in Phoenix, but he says Cooper's sound is pure Detroit.

"It's always guitar rock," he said. "It's always going to be hard. Ninety percent of the show is hard rock all the way, and then we make it special by adding the icing on the cake."

The icing to which he refers is composed of theatrical elements inspired by horror films

Cooper came up at a time when many rock acts were mounting elaborately theatrical shows. Nobody does that anymore, re-

ally, but Cooper never stopped.

Furnier said the Cooper character was based on two of the unlikeliest sources imaginable: the soft-core sci-fi film *Barbarella* and the camp classic *Whatever Happened to*

Cooper's outfit is inspired by the shocking-then-and-shocking-now getup that Anita Pallenberg wore while playing the Black Queen of Sogo. His makeup was inspired by Bette Davis' smeared face in the latter film.

At first, Furnier said, the Cooper character was an outcast.

"He was sort of society's victim," he said. "He was always getting beat up. He was sort of the poster child for the outcasts and every kid that was on the outside. The ones that were getting bullied. Fans who'd had similar experiences saw Alice as their hero."

Eventually he evolved into a villain, but one who had more in common with Captain Hook than Hannibal Lecter.

"When I quit drinking," he said, "I decided that Alice needs to be a villain. Alice needs to be like rock's villain. And with that comes comedy. It's fun to be the villain. You have to have some fun with it. The villains in anything I've seen always have the best lines. They were always the most fun guys in the whole movie."

Whatever antics and shenanigans Cooper got up to on stage, they never went beyond what Furnier could condone in real life.

"If people look at the lyrics, there was

never anything satanic," he said. "There was never anything satanic in anything Alice ever did. There was never anything where they could ban Alice Cooper. I kept within the boundaries of everything. No. I really don't have any problem playing Alice Cooper and being a Christian."

In some senses, Cooper may be the most ingratiating villain in the history of entertainment.

Longtime local media personality Chilly Addams said Cooper's meet-and-greets – those post-concert opportunities for contest winners and VIPs to meet their idols – were notable for the musician's enthusiasm.

"I've been to meet-andgreets before where it was kind of a cattle call situation," he said. "But before [Cooper] was completely out of the room he was coming out of, it was like, 'Hey you guys! How you doing? Was that a great show or what?""

WXKE disk jockey J.J. Fabini tells a similar tale.

"Every conversation he had [with fans] wasn't about him," he said. "It was about them. He wouldn't just sit and let them ask him questions. He started the conversation: 'Hi! How are you? What's

your name? What do you do? Tell me about your family. How long have you listened to rock n' roll? What kind of bands do you like?' He is controlling the conversation and steering it right back at the person he is talking to."

Since James Brown is no longer with us, Furnier may be the new "hardest working man in show business."

To stay that way, he said, he must follow a meticulous health and fitness regimen.

"I actually am in better shape now, at 68, then I was at 38," Furnier said. "When I was 38, I was a mess. At 68, I do 4 or 5 shows a week; I come off stage and I'm the only one not breathing hard."

Last year, Cooper did something that not many 68-year-old rockers get to do: he formed a supergroup.

It's called Hollywood Vampires. Other members include actor Johnny Depp and Journey guitarist Joe Perry.

Furnier said that the band "pays tribute to all of our dead, drunk friends."

Pretty much everything about this is a

Given its size, it isn't too surprising that Boston has been a hotbed for musical talent over the years. Bands like Aerosmith and the Cars have found fame starting in Beantown, but just one band decided to take the city's name as their own. Boston, with their

first self-named album debuting in 1976, were the brainchild of Tom Scholz, the guitarist, keyboardist, songwriter and producer who created the Boston sound. But it was also its original singer, Brad Delp, who defined its uniqueness through incredibly distinctive vocals on Boston's hits "More Than a Feeling" "Piece of Mind" and "Don't Look Back."

Delp's death in 2007 and multiple departures along the way have altered the lineup of Boston, but Scholz's original vision remains intact. And while Boston still wear their Massachusetts heart on their sleeve, these days they do so with a Hoosier in the mix. Elkhart native Tracy Ferrie joined Boston in 2012 following a stint with Christian metal

band Stryper. Scholz became aware of Ferrie at a fundraiser for the victims of the 2003 Rhode Island nightclub fire, a tragedy which took place during a

Great White concert, when Ferrie joined members of Boston to perform "Peace of Mind." That session led to a fateful call in 2012.

"He just called me out of the blue," recalls Ferrie, four years later. "He says to me in that deep voice of his, 'This is Tom Scholz, and Boston has a tour coming up. I was wondering if you'd like to come play bass for us.' That was it. No audition. I just started touring with the band and have been there ever since."

Of course, the road from Elkhart to his current home in Cape Cod, where he lives when he's not on tour with the band, has been a winding one, full of some unexpected turns for a rock star. True, his career started playing in a school band, but it was the tuba he played first before eventually adding electric bass and guitar to his resumé. And his road to performance included something other than music.

"My parents owned a roller skating rink in Elkhart, and I was performing as a skater," says Ferrie. "I traveled all over performing as a figure skater in front of really large crowds, so I think performance was always in my blood. As was music since I was exposed to classical and popular music all the time and then

disco at the skating rink." While the skating was a significant endeavor for Ferrie, it was music that won his full-time attention, thanks in large part to his band director.

"He told me I should study music in college, so I ended up going to Berklee College of Music in Boston. That band director follows me now on Facebook, and I think he gets a kick out of seeing what I've done since then. And I'm a music instructor now too, and I tell people all the time what I've learned, that if you have a good attitude and work hard, you never know

where it will lead."

Having joined Stryper in the mid 90s, Ferrie continued to play with them until the eve of their 25th anniversary tour in 2010 ,at which point, he says, he decided to bail

"The original bass player had come back, and they were going to tour with two bass players, which I thought was a bit much," he says now, laughing. "So I figured the fans would be happy to see the original guy, and that was a good time for me to leave."

Now with Boston for four years, Ferrie admits that those early days touring with the band were "surreal," realizing he was now playing some of the most recognizable songs in rock history.

"I've traveled the world and played with a lot of bands, and some of them get some large audiences. But they have niche audiences. But with Boston, you can't get in your car

and drive from Point A to Point B and not hear a Boston song on the radio.'

The touring schedule suits Ferrie, now a father of four children ranging in age from six to 15. Boston currently tour seasonally, getting together in the spring for rehearsals before touring through the summer. Ferrie is typically back home by the time school starts in the fall and spends those months doing session work and working on his house on the Cape. He's looking forward to the first leg of this tour since it brings him back to his old stomping grounds.

"I used to go to Fort Wayne all the time for concerts at the Coliseum," he says. "It was about 45 minutes away, so there were some late nights, but talk about inspiration. I saw some really great acts back then: AC/DC, KISS, Ted Nugent, Van Halen during their 1984 tour, which was the year I graduated. I think about Fort Wayne and those concerts and how as a kid I wanted so much to go back there and play sometime. And it's finally coming true."

Although this performance will be at the Foellinger Theatre rather than the Coliseum, Ferrie is looking forward to the visit and says there will be plenty of familiar faces in the crowd.

"I'm going to have a lot of people there, friends who I haven't seen in awhile. I keep getting messages from people who tell me they'll be there. I'm really looking forward to it."

The music never left her head and even followed her to school.

"My fifth grade teacher, Mrs. Phillips, had to remind me several times not to tap dance or sing in class," she says. "I don't know that I was a born performer, but I know there was always music around and in me.'

When she was in third grade, her parents brought home an upright piano and she began taking lessons.

"One of the local piano teachers had a music club and we would do recitals and perform for civic meetings in town," she says. "My friend Julie Hodge and I sang 'Edelweiss' from The Sound of Music. We thought we were the biggest thing ever.

She attended Grove City High School and was active in theater there.

"One of my first auditions was for The Velveteen Rabbit in high school. I was scared out of my mind."

She credits her two theater teachers, Tony Naples and Kaye Pollock, as helping her feel comfortable onstage. Their encouragement worked, and she was cast in the lead role.

Her small town high school allowed her to participate in many activities. In addition to being a theater performer, she was a majorette and sang with and played piano accompaniment for the school choir.

After graduating in 1977, she attended Ohio University in Athens, where she was a vocal performance major. After a year and a half, she switched her major

"At the time, schools didn't have musical theater degrees. You were either a music major or a theater major."

Before she had taken all of her general courses required to graduate, she moved to Orlando, Florida, to live with her Aunt Lois for a summer. There she performed in Damn Yankees for a summer theater program at Rollins College and playing Catherine in Pippin at the University of Central Florida.

While there, a friend told her about the Burt Reynolds Dinner Theatre Apprentice Program in Jupiter, Florida. One of the requirements was an associate's degree at a Florida institution. She finished her associate's degree by taking her general courses at Valencia Community College in between performing. She auditioned for the apprentice program and was one of a dozen or so accepted. She was placed into not one but two apprentice groups from 1981 to 1982, and at the end of the program she and the other apprentices received their Actor's Equity union cards after earning Equity points while performing in shows at the dinner

"I realize now how lucky I was to have this experience," she says. "I got to work with many prominent actors and see how they developed their craft from the rehearsal process to the stage.'

> One of the most prominent actors, she says, was her teacher, Mr. Charles Nelson Reilly.

> "That is how he always introduced himself - Mister Charles Nelson Reilly," she says. "He always referred to his friends by their proper names, as well. Mr. Reynolds, Miss [Julie] Harris, Mr. [Vincent] Gardenia. It was very important to him to show respect to those he loved."

> Reilly, who died in 2007, was a prolific TV film, and stage actor in the 1960s and 1970s, although he was perhaps best known for TV game shows, Match Game and Hollywood

Squares.

"Above all, his favorite thing to do was teach," Bixler says. "He loved us completely."

His humor made him a favorite among the ap-

"He asked me to perform the song 'Is it Really Me?' from The Rainmaker for one of our apprentice shows," she recalls. "One rehearsal he came over to me and said, 'Just sing the [expletive] out of it!""

During the program, she understudied the role of Chava in Fiddler on the Roof for the Burt Reynolds Dinner Theatre and performed in three mainstage shows, including The Music Man.

Reynolds himself also taught, including a very popular late-night class, which met from midnight un-

"We didn't care," Bixler says. "It was exhilarat-

One particularly fond memory she has involves the graduation of the first group of apprentices. Bixler was set to participate in the second group, so she just sat on the far end of the first group's graduating class.

"When Mr. Reynolds came out, he introduced all the graduates," she says. "When he got to me, he didn't say anything. He just reached down, took off my shoe. and tossed it off stage to the stage manager."

She sat through the entire graduation ceremony wearing only one shoe. At the end, Reynolds asked the stage manager to bring out the shoe, which he did carried on a pillow.

'Mr. Reynolds took the shoe, kneeled down, and told everyone if the shoe fits I would get to stay," she says. "It was really sweet. My father was in the audience and I know he told that story many times."

She went to work on a cruise ship after the program ended, spending the next three years on three

Chaos and Clarity

Don't be too concerned by the title of Jon Durnell's new album. Although the album's songs offer plenty of clarity, there's very little chaos to be found anywhere among the 10 tracks. Instead, Durnell writes about the clarity that comes after chaos, and by the time he gets around to



singing about the hard times, he seems certain that better times are just around the corner - if they aren't, indeed, here already.

The album's opening cut, "Good Thing," exemplifies Durnell's look-on-the-bright-side aesthetic; in it, he sings of disruptive change on the horizon but can't help expecting that the change is going to bring a better day. The same goes for "Hoppin' a Train" in which geographical change is the impetus for positive life changes.

When Durnell writes about the challenges of relationships, he does so from an optimistic perspective. In "All the Things I Lack" he celebrates the complementary nature of his and his partner's relationship, and in "The Way That I See You" he tries to inspire confidence in her with his unflagging support. Even the bittersweet reminiscence of "Remember When" comes at loss with the expectation that it's all part of the plan, and that things will get better.

True chaos is not in Durnell's musical vocabulary, whether in his lyrics or the smooth, saxophone-embellished flow of his music. When he calls for revolution in "Wake Up," he's not talking about anarchic revolt. His revolutionary message is one of positive thinking and hope, and he delivers it gently. (Evan Gillespie)

#### Shoeshine Tommy

Shoeshine Tommy

Funk is in the middle of a resurgence right now, no doubt about it, but funk of the slick, uptown variety is not the kind that Shoeshine Tommy play. The Defiance, Ohio-based quartet calls its hybrid sound "the fluezz" - that's a combo of funk, jazz and blues, not this year's newsworthy virus - and that term comes



pretty close to summing up the moody mixture on the band's debut album. At the same time, it perhaps understates the album's rock influences. Maybe "fluekzz" would be a better, more comprehensive hybrid term for the music, but you can't blame the band for not choosing it.

Like funk should, these songs depend heavily on the band's rhythm section – drummer Jon Spencer and bassist Edward Mason - and the blues often rears its head, too, sometimes even wearing a swampy cap as in Robert Chase's acoustic slide guitar on "Baby Boy." Jazz figures in, thanks to Chase's wandering keyboards, although his synthy touches also sometimes bring to mind prog rock. Underlying all the genre-melding, though, is an urgent darkness that could only come from the realm of rock, specifically metal and punk. Even if songs like "Good Times," "Sunshine," "Stop" and "Move Your Feet" turn a superficially happy, funky face to the world, there's turmoil in the songs' hearts. Often the darkness is lying right there on the surface - the grief of "Baby Boy," for example, or the heartbreak of "Get on That."

There's very little smoothness in Kevin Eis' vocals, and if that makes his voice not quite right for uptown funk, it's perfect for the edgier stuff that Shoeshine Tommy play. (Evan Gillespie)

#### Mark Allen

Mark Allen has modest goals for his self-released, self-titled EP: he just wants to sell the CDs he's having produced. Despite the opportunities offered by the digital world, Allen isn't concerned with taking his music online right away, and for this EP release ahead of a planned full-



length album this summer, he's going old school in terms of distribution. That's an approach well-suited to Allen's music, which is 100 percent old-school rock.

### BACKTRACKS

#### **Edgar Broughton Band** Sing Brother Sing (1970)

Edgar Broughton was a bluesman, but his English upbringing and disposition made him more "psychedelic" than anything. I could go on about the character of this very odd gentleman, but I'm paid to write about the music. In this case, the man is the music, and



it is some of the coolest stuff from the early 70s.

The best way to describe most of Broughton is Captain Beefheart singing The Grateful Dead as written by Frank Zappa.

The record opens with a hip number in "There's No Vibrations, But Wait!" "The Moth" follows in three different stanzas, and this five-minute gem sounds uncannily like early Pink Floyd. "Momma's Reward" is heavier, with the grittier guitars like a subdued Black Sabbath behind Edgar's heightened vocals. The goofy "Officer Dan" closes side one and is a weirdly amusing track on a record sprinkled with psychedelic and heavy blues.

"Old Gopher" opens side two and has a Southern rock feel to it - in a Canned Heat kind of way (which is good). "Aphrodite" lowers the guitars, but respects the thread of the album. It reminds me of Ween, or even The Brian Jonestown Massacre and would fit nicely on college radio even today. "Granma" picks up the funkyblues again, and reminds you again of the quirkiness that comes with Broughton. "Psychopath" is a weird little suite of music and is broken up into a couple of parts. It's a little creepy, and certainly lives up to its name.

The Broughton clan continued on and off as a band through 2010 and released eight records in a dozen years. The original band members are still around, and Broughton has his own thing going on with activism, blogging and solo projects.

Fun Fact: Broughton used to play at your house if you flew him in and served him dinner. (Dennis Donahue)

Allen's influences are crystal clear from the initial chords of "Hit the Road," the first of the EP's three songs. After a slow, chiming intro, the song kicks in with a chugging distorted guitar riff that underpins the rest of the tune. Allen acknowledges that riff's similarity to The Guess Who's "American Woman," but there's just as much of Ted Nugent's "Stranglehold" in the song's vocal melody and unwavering tempo. There is, too, a touch of early Kiss in the song's heavy simplicity, but Allen's vocals never reach the extremes of Paul Stanley's wail or Gene Simmons' growl.

The moderately lighter "Baby I Got You" finds a spot for Allen within the Kiss cosmos, however, as the song's janglier melody and mid-range vocal fall into line with the band's Ace Frehley-fronted

If any of the three songs are incongruous, it would be "No More Yesterdays," a song that pairs the grimy guitar from decadent 70s rock with an inspirational Christian refrain. Otherwise, the song toes the same tempo line as the other two, keeping the EP solidly consistent in its reverence for old-time music. (Evan Gillespie)

surprise, but the most surprising thing is that Depp has been able to show Perry a few things on guitar that Perry did not know.

'That's how good Johnny is," Furnier said. "Johnny is a killer guitar player. Everybody knows him as a great actor - he's an Academy Award-caliber actor – but you put a guitar in the guy's hand and he can play with Eric Clapton or he can play with anybody.

"If he weren't an actor and I saw him auditioning for a band, I would go, 'I want that guy right there,'" he said. "When I do reference points, like if I say, 'You know there was this Yardbirds song that went like this,' he'll go, 'Oh yeah, yeah. I know which one it is' and play it back to me.' And it's always exactly the sound I was thinking of.'

Furnier said he hopes a protégé takes on the Alice Cooper persona after he's gone (a la the "Dread Pirate Roberts"), although he plans to live "for another 100 years."

If anyone ever produces a movie about his life, Furnier said Johnny Depp would be able to play him "if he were just better look-





A look at the Billboard Top 100 albums last week reveals two things: (1) you don't really have to sell many albums to make the charts anymore; and (2) nothing boosts your record sales like dying. I worked in record stores for years and I saw it many times; when a



big music star dies, record sales go up. In Prince's case, his death resulted in five albums making the Top 10, including 1999 and Purple Rain. Though it happens time and time again, I've never understood this phenomenon. Do fans think the artist's albums are suddenly going to go out of print? Do fans think the albums will suddenly become more valuable? Do fans just want to celebrate the musician's life by listening to the artist's music, the music they obviously don't own and possibly never owned? The last explanation is probably the likeliest, but if you're really a Prince fan, wouldn't you already own 1999 and Purple Rain? I mean, those are the only two Prince albums I do own, and I wouldn't necessarily call myself a fan, so why would all the true fans have to go out and buy these the minute Prince died. It's just an observation really, but it's something that has baffled me for years.

The Revolution, Prince's former band, is looking to cash in on their former leader's death. In a Facebook post, Revolution guitarist Wendy Melvoin said the band spent "three or four days together grieving the loss of Prince" before they decided to hit the road again "soon," although no dates have been booked as of press time. The Revolution were part of three albums with Prince: Around the World in a Day, Parade and Purple Rain. As far as I know, they have done nothing since, with the exception of a one-off reunion show in Minneapolis a couple of years ago that Prince did not attend.

Hey, why not one more tidbit of Prince news? The jacket Prince wore in the movie Purple Rain will be sold at an auction June 29 alongside items from Britney Spears, Katy Perry and Michael Jackson. The initial bid for the jacket is \$6,000, but it is expected to go for much more. There is an option to bid online if you're interested.

In non-Prince news (yes, there really is such a thing): Dweezil Zappa has been served a cease-and-desist letter ordering him to stop touring as Zappa Plays Zappa. Apparently the Zappa family trust recently became controlled by two of Dweezil's siblings, Ahmet and Diva, and the siblings want Dweezil to stop using the trademarked name of Zappa Plays Zappa. If Dweezil continued to play as Zappa Plays Zappa he would risk "copyright infringement damages of \$150,000 each time he played a song without permission," according to the letter. So much for familial love, I guess. The almighty dollar rules once again. Don't fret. Although Dweezil Zappa is no longer allowed to sell Frank Zappa merchandise or use images of him on tour, he will continue to play the songs his father made famous and won't have to pay anything to do it. His new band name? Dweezil Zappa Plays Frank Zappa.





## Marvel Finds the Fun in *Civil War*

The term franchise doesn't do justice to the world of Marvel movies. In the next four years over 20 Marvel character-based films will open. (Okay, that includes the Ninja Turtles.) Those future titles pile on top of the 30 or so that have played in theaters over the last several years. I can't keep up and wouldn't want to, but *Captain America: Civil War* is worth a trip to the theater. In performance level guidelines, I would put it somewhere between "meets expectations" and "exceeds expectations."

The title can be taken literally. This is a brother-against-brother story, a deliberate, if not artful invocation of our real Civil War, which still haunts us. Pleasantly, this is a story where the villain sets out to destroy something manageable and, from his perspective, completely worth destroying. We don't find that out for awhile, but it is refreshing to watch a plot that isn't about world domination/destruction or the impending demise of some rogue nation or the collapse of the monetary system or some other thing we are supposed to care about, but in fact provokes a yawn.

The opening sequence is appropriately messy. A mission goes wrong, so wrong that buildings collapse and many innocent people are killed. The Avengers involved have feelings ranging from chagrin to trauma. Don't try to keep up. Over the course of the film we are asked to keep a scorecard of 12 avengers, additional support players and some bad guys.

The opening sequence lasts so long I was begging for it to end so the movie could begin. When the dust settles, the scene changes to the false serenity of a pastel-washed drawing room from the not-so-distant past. Mom sits at the piano. Dad is packing for a business trip. Their son is unhappy that they are leaving. He's a young man version of Tony Stark, Robert Downey Jr. impressively aged down. Then snap, today Tony pauses the action.

Since "hanging up the suit" as he calls it, he's been working on this simulation process that lets trau-

ma sufferers relive their trauma to allow for closure. The software is his attempt at redemption.

After these two set-ups, the Secretary of State (William Hurt with an impressive hair piece) informs the Avengers that they will sign a document ceding authority for the Avengers to the U.N. The world has grown weary of having the Avengers rain death and destruction on innocents in the name of world peace.

Now we are off the races. To sign or not to sign becomes the question that causes a rift between the Avengers who divide into Team Iron Man versus Team Captain America.

In the avengers versus avengers battle to come. Spidey and Ant-Man have the funniest lines. Their presence unlocks some humor out of Iron Man as well. Rarely does a superhero action flick offer up so many laughs in big action scenes in the middle of the movie, including an extremely funny *Star Wars* joke.

Captain America is, so typically, too long. A starstudded cast, plenty of humor and some good fights between just a few players make Captain America fun. The Stan Lee cameo is excellent.

Is the United States a heroic nation or a brutish superpower when we engage in "peace-keeping?" Do our super weapons (like the enhanced avengers) make warfare less horrific? How much collateral damage is acceptable?

Captain America: Civil War doesn't really care about answering the question it so lazily poses. Think pieces, editorials and term papers galore will try to answer. Best not think too deeply on that. Grab your popcorn and go.

## Big Bucks for *Captain America*

Tops at the Box: As expected, Captain America: Civil War had a huge opening weekend, selling \$182 million in the U.S. over its first three days of release. Add to that almost \$500 million in abroad sales and these \$250 million dollar budgets don't seem like that big of a deal anymore. What's cool about a movie like this doing so well is that, from what I've gathered so far, people really like the film. Reviews, too, have been very strong, with a lot of critics likening the film to an amusement park ride (because that's certainly never been said about a movie before). Taking the No. 3 spot at least week's box office was, don't laugh, a movie called *Mother's Day* that looks to be about the most vanilla thing I've seen in ages. Oof. This pandering lil' ensemble comedy (I

don't even know if it's an ensemble comedy, but I assume it is) sold about \$9 million at the box over its second weekend of release. Thus far, the film has sold about \$20 million in the U.S. over its first 10 days and zero dollars abroad. Ha.

Taking the No. 4 spot at last weekend's U.S. box office was *The Huntsman: Winter's War* which sold \$3.58 million, upping the film's 17-day total to \$40 million. Rounding out the Top 5 was *Keanu* which sold another \$3 million, officially putting the 10-day-old film into the profitable category with \$15.1 million in sales. Does this mean that we get to have more films with Key and Peele? I sure hope so.

New This Week: Horror flick *The Darkness*, starring Kevin Bacon, Matt Walsh and ScreenTime dream girl Radha Mitchell opens wide this weekend alongside Jodie Foster's *Money Monster*, which stars George Clooney, Julia Roberts, Giancarlo Esposito and Dominic "McNulty" West. *Money Monster* looks very promising; can't say the same for *The Darkness*.

Several smaller films will also see limited releases, including *The Lobster*, which looks fantastic.

## A Local Writer Spins a Romance

Bring a Cowboy Home by Gloria Doty, Vox Dei, 2016

At first glance, it looks as if Lucy Crowder has everything going for her. She's a wealthy business owner, and she has two happy, healthy grown children. She has a devoted best friend, and she has the means to live her life as she likes. But she's in her late 50s, a widow and a divorcee, and she has an irresistible itch to have a man in her life. When she leaves Chicago to visit her daughter in Texas, in the small town where Lucy herself grew up, her friend Phoebe drops her at the airport with the directive to "Bring a cowboy home!" Thus begins the first romance novel from local author Gloria Doty.

Our heroine, whose full name is Louisa

Mae Crowder, is a successful real estate developer in Chicago, but her heart remains in Texas. That's why she takes every opportunity she can to visit her daughter and pine over the old family ranch, which her no-account brother lost in a card game years ago – a transgression that Lucy is violently unwilling to forgive. She's so lost in nostalgia that, when she comes to town this time, she can't help visiting a local saloon that's done up to mimic the Long Branch from the old Gunsmoke TV series. And when a dead ringer for Marshal Dillon - a successful local rancher named Cal - ambles through the door, she's powerless to resist him, too.

The romance between Lucy and the kind-hearted Cal should be effortless, but there are some obstacles in the way. Cal has a big secret that will make Lucy turn on him if she finds out, and Lucy has a secret or two of her own. Both of them have children who are afraid that the other is a gold digger set on making off with the respective family fortune. Throw in a potential family tragedy and some shady business hijinks, and you've got the makings of anything but an effort-

Lucy navigates it all with the caution and wisdom of a woman who's already been through a lot, not like



a kid who's caught up in the throes of young love. Her devoutly Christian daughter argues that Lucy would feel much more at peace if she'd only pray more, and although Lucy has long ago experienced a crisis of faith, she soon begins to see that maybe her daughter

The hook of Bring a Cowboy Home is that its characters are on the far side of 50, but they still have a lot of living left to do. The 60ish crowd is chronically underserved in popular entertainment, but if you have any doubt that they're out there and that they like to see stories about people who look like them, ask the hordes of fans who got very upset when A&E cancelled *Longmire*. The weathered cowboy still has the appeal he's always had, and Doty is quick to tap into it.

> But that's not the only way that Doty's book is more mature than your typical romance. The tried-and-true, swept-off-her-feet-by-a-cowboy trope, along with the straight-ahead morality of the book's Christian content,

might lead you to expect everything to be tidy and conventional, but Lucy isn't quite so easy to predict. She may want male companionship, but she's also stubbornly independent – sometimes so stubborn that she does and says the wrong things to people who care about her. It's her learning to reconcile her conflicting urges that represents the real turning point of the

Bring Home a Cowboy is the first installment in a planned series of romance novels centered on Lucy, her clan and the dusty, quaint environs of Magnolia, Texas. This first book is a solid start that will likely leave cowboy lovers eager for more.
