
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

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

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Truckers in the Rear View

These days, it's good to be Jason Isbell. A talented songwriter blessed with guitar-playing skills to match, the Alabamaborn Isbell belts out country-flavored rock songs straight from the heart, leaving no doubt that much of what he has written down

has come from firsthand experience.

One can find a clean perforation in the artist's career arc: before and after sobriety - and before and after his breakthrough solo album, Southeastern. As he continues to tour in support of his latest (and arguably best) record, the Grammy Award-winning Something More Than Free, Isbell reflects on starting over, his influences, his approach to the new album and the value of experience. Isbell and his band, the 400 Unit, perform May 31 at the Fort Wayne Embassy Theatre.

The 37-year-old Isbell started young, picking up the mandolin at


age 6. He established himself as a formidable musician and songwriter by 22, when he joined southern rockers Drive-By Truckers and contributed to several albums and tours. He also fell into a rock n' roll lifestyle that nearly ran his career off the rails. After releasing wellreceived but relatively obscure solo records in 2009 and 2011, Isbell cleaned up. And his star began to rise. Two thousand and thirteen's Southeastern was released to near-universal acclaim, and Isbell's profile grew. NPR featured his record. He and his band appeared on Austin City Limits and made the late-night talk show rounds. It's been an upward trend ever since.

When asked about his new album and how he approached making it, Isbell says, "I'm in a better place personally. Southeastern was a good time making that record ... it was not very difficult, even though I had a lot of things going on during the making of that record. I was getting married, had a little bit of health trouble - not anything major, but I was in a pretty good amount of pain during the recording of the record."

He credits his sobriety (and his adjustment to it) for a better-adjusted outlook.

"After Southeastern came out, things got a lot better. I became more assured in the world. I got more comfortable with being sober, which had taken some time. It took at least a year after I got cleaned up for me to feel like myself again, to feel normal. And I think that's reflected in the new album. I think it sounds probably a little bit more joyful. I still write sad songs; I think that's what storytellers do more often than not. That's what I'm drawn to, what I like to listen to. But I think Something More Than Free probably records a time in my life when I was a lot more comfortable."

Something More Than Free debuted last



he adds. "But the live show is always more of a rock n' roll show than people expect because we are a rock band at heart. So it's a louder experience than most people are prepared for if they only have experience listening to Southeastern or Something More Than

open and candid when asked about its role in his success and growth as a songwriter.

"When I cleaned up, I wound up having a lot more time to spend working on each individual song," he says. "I think that was probably a big reason for the success of those two records. There's less filler. They're more consistent from start to finish, and that was a big thing for me. Because I realized that, after getting sober and started writing Southeastern I thought. 'I really have the opportunity here to write a document, a record that doesn't make you want to skip 'til you get to your two or three favor-

ite songs.' It's meant to

be listened to all the way through."

The early influences that inform Isbell's songwriting won't shock anyone. But here is an artist who has clearly grown into his own voice, one who is quick to point out where to draw the line when it comes to taking inspiration.

"I started writing songs listening to people like John Prine and John Hiatt, of course Bob Dylan and Randy Newman, Patti Griffin, Lucinda Williams. That was the first songwriting that appealed to me lyrically. But I do still hear things that stand out. It's a difficult thing, because you don't want to directly reflect current influences on the work you're doing. I don't want to follow any kinds of trends or try to hard to immediately sound like something that I'm currently digging. I try to mix it all up as much as possible.'

When it's jokingly suggested he add modern beats to his solidly Americana style. he responds in kind.

"I think maybe if I were broke and the baby didn't have any diapers, I might collaborate with some EDM folks.'

However, here's where Isbell displays an open-mindedness and curiosity that many artists in his musical neck of the woods may not share: "But I like going to those shows." If I'm at a festival and Diplo or Skrillex or somebody is performing, I'll walk over and

Perennial Foellinger Theatre Summer Concert series favorites Hotel California are coming back to town this Memorial Day to remind audiences why the Eagles are one of the world's best-selling bands of all time, and why they, Hotel California, are the Eagles tribute band of choice for U.S. fans.

According to Hotel California frontman Dicky-Lee Dickinson, the Eagle's popular-

ity can largely be explained by the sheer diversity of their catalogue.

"The material is so vast and varying," he told me in a recent phone interview. "I think that's one thing that is so appealing about their work.

Also, they cross genres in such a cool way that it's really fun for me as a musician to play their songs. It's not like you're stuck in a corner or a box. You get to play all this different kind of music."

Like rock n' roll staples "Hotel California" and "Witchy Woman," obviously, but also songs from the Eagles' softer side – "Desperado," for instance, and "Peaceful Easy Feeling." The guys from Hotel California – Dickinson on vocals, harmonica and mandolin; Wade Hogue on keys; Scott Fronsoe on bass; Byron Fry on guitar; and Johnny Agostino on drums – know all the hits and aren't afraid to play them. In fact, every song in a Hotel California show is a hit.

"Most of the people at our shows know all the words to every single song that we play," Dickinson said. "We like it that way. But we do a include few surprises along the way, some songs that are not necessarily Eagles but more Hotel California."

Hotel California's approach to the Eagles' catalogue is one of respect – they actually approached the Eagle's legal representatives for permission to sing their songs – and creative reverence. The key to being a successful tribute band, Dickinson said, is

not mere imitation, but taking the essence of a work and building on it, layer by musical layer, in a way that honors the song but also allows the performers to make it their own.

"One of the things we've focused on forever is that we don't try to sound just like the Eagles. We don't do impressions or lookalike gimmicky stuff. We don't wear a lot of goofy hats or wigs. When we play 'Hotel California,' we put our own stamp on it. We don't mimic or emulate. We recreate."

Which is also the best way Dickinson and his mates could think to honor Glenn Frey who died in January from complications from pneumonia, rheumatoid arthritis and ulcerative colitis. They considered

adding a special section to their set honoring the late guitarist and songwriter behind such hits as "The Heat is On" and "You Belong to the City," but then reconsidered.

"We went back and forth on it for a while," Dickinson said, "but you know, we decided it would be phony, sort of smarmy. We didn't know him We'd never met him, so it felt like we would have been capitalizing on his name somehow. What it comes down to is we honor those guys by playing their music."

The music itself is unmistakable. Whether your favorite Eagles era is that of their super stardom 70a ("Take it Easy," "Tequila Sunrise," "One of These Nights," "Lyin' Eyes," "Take it to the Limit," the list goes on and on) or the years after hell froze over ("Get Over It," "Love Will Keep Us Alive"), even The Dude (famous for saying "I hate the [redacted] Eagles, man!") can't deny that the Frey and company had a unique sound guaranteed to stand the test of time.

"This is the soundtrack of our lives," Dickinson said. "We grew up to this music, we fell in love to it, we partied with our friends to it. There's such an emotional con-

Organizers of last year's inaugural Arab Fest expected about 500 people to attend.

What they got, said festival organizer Barbara O'Connor, was roughly 2,500.

The turnout and the undiluted enthusiasm of the attendees was a testament to a city that has always been able to separate people from politics.

"We were hopeful that it would be an accepting community," she said, "and we weren't disappointed."

The second annual Arab Fest happens June 4 and 5 in Headwaters Park East.

Arab-American people have been part of the warp and weft of northeast Indiana for more than 100 years.

But examples of Arab culture have been hard to find. Until now

Last year, attendees were treated to camel rides, traditional dance performances, henna art, a Western Asian/North African marketplace known as souq and examples of Arabian cuisine such as tabbouleh, falafel, shawarma, baba ganoush and hummus.

This year will be more of the same, but it will be better organized, O'Connor

Long lines for food are pretty much a standard feature of untested festivals, and last year's Arab Fest was no excep-

"We were totally thrown off," O'Connor said. "We had no idea that we would have that kind of response."

This year, O'Connor said, the layout and organization of the food stations will be much improved.

"We would like people to know that this year we will have the same quality food coming from the same vendor, but we will be more efficient in providing service," she said.

Even though there were long lines in 2015, no one seemed to mind much, O'Connor said.

"Honestly, that's one of the biggest takeaways I had from that," she said. "In spite of the long lines, I didn't notice any grumpy, grouchy people. They came to converse. When people eventually got to the food table, nobody really complained."

O'Conner said the number of dance performances will be increased this year, a calligraphy artist will be on site writing people's names in Arabic and there will be an oud player.

An oud is an ancient string instrument with a sharply angled pegbox.

The camel will return this year (not

without a lot of encouragement, one presumes). Camel rides will only be available on Saturday, however.

Admission to Arab Fest will be free again this year, O'Connor said.

As for the near and distant future of the event, Arab Fest organizers try not to think too far ahead, O'Connor said.

"We take it by year," she said.



"Most of our financial support is through donations. Trying to get grants for something

like this – it's too edgy. They don't want to touch it."

O'Connor said last year's festival lost money, which it was expected to do.

"We're hoping to break even [this year], she said. "The first one was a learning experience."

Arab Fest is and always will be celebration of a heritage shared by a sizeable portion of Fort Wayne's citizens, O'Connor said. It is an opportunity to increase understanding.

"We really strive to make it a strictly cultural event that is apolitical," she said. "It is family-friendly, children-friendly and free. There's no admission, and that is a big deal for us. It's just a cultural celebration of a group of people that haven't really been celebrated here."

O'Connor said Arab Fest is really no different from other festivals in Fort Wayne that celebrate its citizens' diverse cultural backgrounds

"I think the main goal for this thing is just to celebrate that culture," she said. "Let people know that it's right up there with the German culture and the Irish culture. They also had their times of stress in this country and lack of acceptance up to a point."

A Couple of Ukuleles

They have songs about doing the limbo and chicken chimichangas. They've got a mobile app. They've got a series of TV spots that are poised for airing nationwide. But most importantly, they've got Hawaiian shirts and ukuleles.

The Atomic Sharks are the ukulele-playing duo of Kris Hensler and Kenny Taylor playing child-friendly

music and adding in a dash of education for good measure.

They're the brainchild of Hensler, the program director at WFWA, who came up with the concept and name. Hensler then asked Taylor, a full-time musician and educator, to come aboard, and the Atomic Sharks were born. Both Atomic Sharks are veterans of several well-known local bands and knew each other from playing together in some of those previous bands.

Hensler and Taylor initially got together in 2014 and began songwriting using a simple guideline: they wanted to play Jimmy Buffet-style island music that's kid-friendly, but that adults could enjoy as well.

"The biggest point that I try to tell people is that we don't pander to kids," says Hensler. "If you just listen to it casually, it doesn't sound like kids' music. But the lyrics, the themes are kid-friendly."

Of course, humor and fun are a big part of the Sharks' repertoire, which shows through in their songs, image and mascot. They typically dress in Hawaiian shirts and have a 70s style ukulele-playing cartoon shark named Vinnie. Their graphics have a retro, tiki-style theme. Vinnie even has a mobile game developed by a Monroeville, Indiana-based company

Their goal is to get kids not just into the music, but into playing music as well. While they don't try do much educating onstage, they do invite kids to come up to the stage after the show, where they have five or six ukuleles on hand to introduce kids to the instrument and to playing music in general.

"If there are some kids who want to pick up the ukulele, we can show them a couple of things. We can show them enough to play a simple little song," says Hensler. "The idea of that is not so much to teach them a whole bunch, but just to kind of inspire them to go home and become interested in music. We do it as much for inspiration as anything else. To show them that they can make music is part of the concept"

As for their choice of instrument, the ukulele was chosen in part because it's relatively easy to play. But it's an instrument that has some serious adherents.

Anyone whose only association with the instrument is Tiny Tim's 1968 novelty hit "Tiptoe Through the Tulips" would be surprised to learn that the instrument has been experiencing a resurgence since the late 90s. While that Tiny Tim song may have seemed like the final nail in the coffin of an instrument whose

popularity had been in decline, indie bands began using it in the late 90s, most notably on the Magnetic Fields' 1999 opus, 69 Love Songs. Since that time the instrument has become practically ubiquitous.

"More and more bands that utilize a ukulele player are becoming popular, so I would say it's a trend," says Hensler. "One of the ways you can tell is that almost every major guitar manufacturer has started building a line of ukuleles, and they don't do that un-



less there's money to be made."

Hensler was able to use his knowledge of the PBS system to conceive of another outlet for their music: a series of short educational videos that will air between children's programming on public television. Aptly entitled "Music Minute," because all 10 are a minute long, the series was sponsored by Sweetwater and shot at WFWA. They videos introduce kids to basic music elements like tempo, melody and chords with the help of a bongo-playing puppet named Jimmy Bouffet. The videos are already available online, and they'll likely start airing later this year nationwide.

"Every adult in the world knows what a melody is, but a four-year old doesn't. So we're trying to introduce some of those basic ideas that a four-year-old doesn't understand that other people might assume they already know," says Hensler. "So for me it's been fulfilling to be able to introduce some of those ideas to kids and then send them on the same path that I was sent on because my dad was a musician. I learned a lot of those ideas early on, but a lot of kids don't have that, so I feel that's something I can provide."

As for their choice of musical style, it may have been Hensler's fandom for Jimmy Buffet that gave him the idea to play island music in land-locked Indiana, but their tunes offer a sunny escape from the sometimes very cold Midwest.

"We're offering fantasy more than anything else," he said. "I don't want to say it's tongue-in-cheek because, obviously, we are in Indiana, but we'll take it all with a grain of salt," says Hensler. "We're the Atomic Sharks and we play ukuleles with Hawaiian shirts on. We don't take ourselves super duper seriously, but we do take the music seriously."

Brooke Waggoner Sweven

It had to happen sometime: the millennial generation is hitting their 30s and are starting to take stock of their lives. In the hands of an introspective artist like Brooke Waggoner, this can only mean good things await those with ears to listen.

Who is this Ms. Waggoner, you ask? She's probably best

known for playing on Jack White's two solo albums, but she's also a masterful songwriter and arranger who thought 2016 was a good time to release *Sweven*, her fourth full-length album.

While at first glance you might dismiss her as just another pianoplayin' female, your ears will tell a different story. While the piano is usually the foundation, Waggoner skillfully orchestrates each song, decorating the solid bones with an otherworldly, almost fairy tale-like sound that is both magical and melancholy. The premier example is the 1970s folk-pop "Pennies and Youth" which begins simply with "Spend a lotta my time / Stuck in coffee shop lines" and "Sifting through the potholes of all my future dreams" before catchy pop strings enter, growing in intensity (and reminding me of Elton John's "Levon") as she struggles with past decisions before resigning to "Oh nevermind / This is my life."

But not all is doomed, such as "Ovenbird," where Brooke discovers that for "All of the hours you've wasted / Time is still on your side." "Widow Maker," another strong offering, starts with a plucky skating rink organ before launching into two minutes of frantic and infectious albeit quirky rock. The lone instrumental, "Egg Shells," which follows is a tumbling of nearly dissonant cascading piano runs, melodically tumbling over each other. It too is brief at just over two minutes.


In fact, like a good fairy tale most of the tracks are short, keeping in the two- to three-minute range. Despite their diminutive length, these songs are well developed and orchestrated, jumping from a string quartet to processed drums to electric piano to trippy horns to fuzzy guitars to staccato vocal outbursts. You want a kitchen sink? You got it! And somehow the songs never seem overly busy, but instead retain their sparse and otherworldly feel.

There's a lot of sonic variety on Waggoner's *Sweven*. This leads to a broad diversity that some might find off-putting or, frankly, a bit unconventional. That is, unless you're a fan of art-pop, or chamberpop, or whatever adjective kids use these days to describe music that's immediately catchy yet a little bit intellectual and artsy. (*Jason Hoffman*)

John Carpenter Lost Themes II

I'm not sure what you'd call this, a second wind? Third wind? Dust in the wind? Whatever wind it is, it's a mighty one for John Carpenter.

In a few print interviews I've read with Carpenter over the last few years he's sounded a little on the bitter side regarding films. He was to the point of



making movies for a paycheck (nothing wrong with that; gotta pay the rent somehow), just going through the motions so he could sustain himself for another couple of years until something else lackluster came along that he could force himself to make.

If John Carpenter were a longtime hack filmmaker, then I'd say whatever, but Carpenter is not a hack filmmaker. He had a visual style that was unlike anyone working the horror genre. He could create mood and tension as expertly as Hitchcock. His films were very much his own, whether he penned them or not. So to hear that someone as iconic as Carpenter is disenchanted with the art of filmmaking was kind of disheartening.

But then early last year John Carpenter put out the album *Lost Themes*, a collection of music he'd created over the years but never used. It was an astounding collection of heavy synth and electronic music, with bits of rock thrown in. He seemed rejuvenated artistically and creatively. I mean, it was no surprise the album was great. His films were distinctive not only for their visual style, but for their



Rainbow

Rising (1976)

Back in the day, Ritchie Blackmore and Ronnie James Dio had a nice little heavy metal band. This, the band's second album, was one of the heaviest things in an era filled with yacht-rock and disco.

It opens with the proggy "Tarot Woman," a six-minute mind bend-



"Run With the Wolf" brings the tempo down, but the energy is still there. Rainbow had the slick guitars, but the release also featured a heavy percussion sound and some groovy keyboards from Tony Carey

"Starstruck" is a bluesy number with a little boogie-woogie thrown in, as the band channeled Savoy Brown. Side one closes with the grungy three-minute appetizer "Do You Close Your Eyes." Again, Dio just kills it on this one.

Side two only contains a couple of tracks, each over eight minutes long.

"Stargazer" is a trippy prog-rocker with enormous arrangements and a big wall of sound that would make bands like Dream Theater blush. This track has a heavy vibe but touches on Sabbath, Zeppelin and Deep Purple (Blackmore's first band). It has Blackmore tearing it up on the guitars and the dazzling Cozy Powell behind the drum kit. It's almost too much, but I really dig Rainbow, and this is one of the better songs from their catalog.

The album closes with the speedy "A Light in the Black." They should have flipped these two tracks and closed with "Stargazer," but this song is a nice little headbanger. I really dig the bass from Jimmy Bain on this one.

Dio, Powell and Bain have left us, but Blackmore still performs live.

scores which Carpenter penned, both on his own and with Alan Howarth.

Now, just a little over a year since *Lost Themes* was released Carpenter has released *Lost Themes II*. Second time around, Carpenter uses subtlety in his compositions and, with the help of his son in the studio, fashions a sophomore record that feels like the master at work once again.

Musically, *Lost Themes II* seems to mine an array of moods and vibes, but with more of a full band feel this time around. "Distant Dream" jumps into the darker vibes of *Lost Themes*, but feels less constricted, looser and more rock n' roll. Carpenter sounds more like Zombi than Tangerine Dream on this opening track. "White Pulse" sounds like "Tubular Bells," but with a more baroque approach to melody as the track melts into a very Bach-meets-Walter Rizzati thing. Then the song falls into a heavy rhythm and Gothic synths, a la Sinoia Caves. "Persia Rising" could've been some great theme to some unrealized Carpenter feature. It pulsates and bounces beautifully, very much ready for its cinematic close up.

There's much less of the forced rock bravado this time around than on *Lost Themes*. When there is a distorted guitar solo or big drums, they feel more natural this time around. But really, the majority of *Lost Themes II* is melancholy tracks like "Hofner Down" or "Windy Death" with its Vangelis feel. The Gothic "Bela Lugosi" towers over us with doom-laden walls of synth. You can almost see that coffin opening in the distance and Lugosi rising from it.

"Dark Blues" is more rock than synth-themed scores, but it still brings the goods. "Virtual Survivor" is reminiscent of Carpenter's own *Escape From New York* soundtrack, with updated guitar gruff. Album closer "Utopian Facade" sounds like Nightsatan a bit, but in a more restrained and refined way. It's like laser metal meets Vangelis.

But the fact he's found a new artistic outlet in putting out albums of original music makes that disappointment much less painful. *Lost Themes II* is a perfect late night spin, and a continuation of Carpenter's artistic renaissance. The audience makes that job easy night after night, according to Dickinson.

Many people we perform for never had the chance to see the Eagles live, so this is fresh for them. As a lifelong entertainer, it's my job to put it all out there every single time. You don't pull back. You can't. Then the fans give energy back to you."

"We've been to the Fort Wayne six years in a row now," Dickinson said. "It's always packed. It's a big rock 'n roll town. People in Fort Wayne are enthusiastic and fun and we always have a great time there."

Finding Bliss in a Walk in the Park

Every winter I whine to myself, "Why am I living in northeast Indiana?" Every spring, I get it: Oh, this is why. I spent a recent Sunday morning walking in that big Fort Wayne park. You know which one. It's an F-word: Foellinger, Franke, Freimann, Foster. See Squared rolls her eyes because I can never remember this trivia. Sue me. The larger point is: I'm walking. In Nature. Shut up.

There's this brief period in Indiana spring when the whole world seems to be an impressionist painting – a little blurry, but a feast of color. Brown tree limbs are covered with pale green fuzz. Clouds of white dogwood petals entwine with pink and fuscia redbud in the branches above my head, and I walk the trail surrounded by a watercolor palette of green, yellow and red. If I were more of a scientist, I would know Tulipa gesneriana and Narcissus poeticus without looking them up. I'm more of a walkist.

The park is a family-friendly place, so there are usually young couples, children and dogs. I am entertained by the dad with the bulging biceps under his sleeves of tats, lifting up his wiggly daughter so she can poke a dandelion in his hair.

I am greeted by big, woofy dogs, some big enough to be a little scary. But the dogs all are far too busy to give more than a passing whiff to me. Some run flat out, claws digging in for a tight circle, in a game of "I'm running away! No, I'm not!" That fun is never exhausted.

The other thing that blows me away during a park walk is the scent. I think, if I could harness the combined scents of a spring morning in Indiana, with the flowering trees along the river, and produce bottles of that perfume, I'd be a gazillionaire

It's the growing phase that is so deliciously smelly. In just a few weeks, when the flowering stage is over, the blossoms begin to fall away and the scent becomes pungent, like fertilizer. I suppose that is how that bloom-pollinate-decay cycle of nature is supposed to work.

If the sun is out during my walk in the park, I listen for bees. Okay, maybe they're not all bees – they could be any number of buzzing, flying, insecty things also enthralled by the plant perfume. I listen for them because I like them to be at a distance from me. Though I may be smelly by the end of my walk, I do *not* smell like flowers, so bees should stay away from me. But I like to hear them. They sound like growing.

Sometimes it's easy to feel like that wonderful renewed, springing-up thing belongs not to me, but to somebody else. I'm far from that age of wonderment that the kids in the park still feel as they run, jump and shriek in the park playgrounds. But I'm not too old to breathe in the odd floral breeze, to hear the quiet business of nature's working girls. In fact, after a walk in the park, I don't feel my years at all, but that crazy invincibility of youth.

So this feeling has a short season – so what? For as long as I can, I'm riding this wave.

Nice Guys Packs Punches, Laughs

The ratio of punches to punchlines in *Nice Guys* is probably three to one. The ratio of bullets to laughs is even higher. But since smacks and bullets are in on the joke, *Nice Guys* is mostly laughs. And fun.

Shane Black, co writer and director of *Nice Guys* won me over with *Kiss Kiss Bang Bang*. Is there a movie title more direct? Film noir meets pulp fiction. Yes, please. *Nice Guys* is sweeter. And I mean that in the nicest possible way.

In *Nice Guys*, silliness is key. Buddy comedy rules. And nothing else matters, sort of. Black, a *Le-thal Weapon* screenwriting vet, churns the genre in a

cozy way. And add in a wisecracking teen chick and we are good to go.

The 70s are a decade easily parodied and enjoyed. Plop a couple of guys willing to do what needs to be done into the center, and you have some chemistry.

Russell Crowe gained a handle or two to become the thug he is. "I felt good that day," is what he says about the "diner incident." [Crowe was involved in a famous altercation in a London restaurant in 1972 when he made a racist remark about the New Zealand Warriors rugby team – ed.] He's on track to become a vigilante. A lot of Nice Guys trades on a loosely translated movie vigilante vibe. But make no mistake, these nice guys

In particular, *Nice Guys* trades on *L.A. Confidential*. Kim Basinger is barely animate as the "villain" She had the Oscar from the moment she appeared on camera as a stand in call girl dressed as Veronica Lake in *L.A. Confidential*. Here she is photographed with such heavy "Vasoline on the lens" that you can't really tell if she is in the movie or not. She and Crowe do not

have the chemistry they managed in that contemporary noir classic.

There is a through line from Cain and Abel to every story that shows up on the big screen in all buddy comedies. Crowe and co-star Ryan Gosling bounce off each other with ease and chemistry.

When I think of Gosling, I think of him as Lars. Real girl or not, any actor who could take on such a challenging role has my loyalty. Here he is somewhere between Lars and the hiptster ready to score in *Crazy*, *Stupid Love*.

Crowe and Gosling do have buddy chemistry. In a mystery, part buddy picture

film that is part murder mystery, part buddy picture that is important. Laughter is abundant.

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Answering the Call of the Wild

Fast into the Night by Debbie Clarke Moderow, Houghton Mifflin Harcourt, 2016

Debbie Clarke Moderow's memoir about her experiences racing in Alaska's great sled-dog race, the Iditarod, is not an especially affecting story of personal struggle, but it is an effective explanation of an unusual race in which the racer's vehicle is not an inanimate machine. In the Iditarod, it's possible – even necessary – for a musher to have a relationship with her means of conveyance, and Moderow does a fine job of illuminating the high-stakes, and highly personal, connection between a racer and her dog team.

Moderow frames the story of her two Iditarod races with flashbacks to the family history that got her onto the icy trails through the heart of Alaska at the back of a racing team of 16 huskies.

Born into a privileged family in New England, Moderow was from the start raised in an environment where an adventurous spirit was expected. Her mother was an early aviator, and the tenor of her mother's lifestyle is neatly summed up in one photo in the book, her mother's debutante photo; in it, she stands next to her autogyro aircraft, decked out in a rakish aviator goggles and a mink jacket.

Moderow herself grew up with the same, if somewhat less daring, love of hobby adventurism, skiing and grouse hunting with her father, first in the East, then in Wyoming. When a mountain-climbing expedition with friends in Alaska intro-

duced her to an adventurous lawyer, she mar- ried him and stayed up north.

Her new life in suburban Anchorage gave her new opportunities for outdoor adventure, but it also put her into the role of wife and mother. It wasn't until a pair of miscarriages left her despondent that a new outlet for her active enthusiasm appeared. A friend gave her family the gift of a retired Iditarod dog, and when the dog, a white husky named Salt, took up residence in their home, the entire family was infected with the fever of dog racing.

Moderow's two kids became avid mushers, and

her son Andy dreamed of being the youngest racer ever to finish the Iditarod. By the time that Andy actually finished the race, at the age of 18 in 2001, the whole family was involved in the sport. Moderow herself started her first Iditarod in 2003.

It's that first race that fills out the first half of the book, and her second Iditarod in 2005 makes up the book's back half. Moderow's travails as she be-

gins to understand the scope of the race (the frigid, lonely trails; the intimidating power of the dog team; the danger of river crossings over unsteady ice; the long, sleepless stretches between checkpoints) are made that much more harrowing because she faces them from the perspective of inexperience. She often thinks that she's gotten herself into something unwise, and none of it is made easier by a lingering uneasiness caused by a scary mountain-climbing fall she took decades earlier.

It's the dog team, though, that got Moderow onto the trail in the first place, and it's her affection for the dogs that gets her through the more difficult parts of the races. The

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dogs have distinct personalities and complex relationships with each other and with Moderow, and the way Moderow describes how they all depend on one another provides a touching underpinning for the

Fast into the Night is not a hardcore sports memoir. Readers who want detailed descriptions of the mechanics and drama of the race itself may want to look elsewhere. Nor is it an unflinchingly introspective examination of the author's emotional baggage in the vein of Cheryl Strayed's Wild. It is, however, an endearingly personal spin on an old-fashioned tale of adventure.

check it out. These people are having a whole lot of fun. But I wouldn't know where to start. I can barely work my computer; I couldn't build an entire song out of just computer noises. I can record demos of me playing acoustic guitar into my cell phone, so that's about as much as I need at this point.'

In addition to managing a higher profile and promoting his latest album, Isbell is also adapting to his role as a father He clearly relishes it.

"It takes a lot more scheduling, which I was never really good at, but I'm getting better at it now," he says. "You have to make time for certain things. That's fine with me; I had a whole lot of free time before, so it's good to have that occupied by family. And really, the little girl's not a lot of trouble. She sleeps well; she travels well. We took her to a Lucinda Williams show and she was able to behave herself - didn't scream all night, so that was good."

Tellingly, Isbell is able to view his daughter's experiences from a writer's perspective.

"I'm definitely inspired by watching her have to learn everything from scratch. That's something that's opened my eyes a lot. A good friend of mine, Will Johnson (a great songwriter who lives in Texas), told me that having a baby is a very psychedelic experience. It really is! You see things in a very different way, and notice things you've forgotten about ... having to start from the ground up. You take that for granted as an adult, but when you see it firsthand, it makes you notice a lot more things. I think anything that makes you more aware of the world is good for a songwriter, for sure.'

Having found balance in his life after over 15 years in the music business, Isbell finds himself at a point where he can, with clear eyes, observe the path that's led him here.

"I don't regret the things that I did when I was younger. I think that was a great time," he says. "We made a lot of good music together and had a whole lot of fun. As you get older you learn how to treat people, so there's always things you wish you hadn't said or things that you wish you hadn't done, but it's all led me to where I am now.'

And if he were somehow able to go back in time and visit a young Jason Isbell, just starting out with the Drive-By Truckers, what would he say to the younger

"If I could give myself one piece of advice, it's just not to worry so damn much. Things have turned out all right to this point."





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
