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# Dorothy Takes the Stage years ago. But for those well familiar with

The Wizard of Oz has long been a part of the fiber of our world. The film, which for decades was a fixture in American homes, recently celebrated its 75th anniversary, and even the original Frank L. Baum books remain popular and beloved. In fact, a new television series, Emerald City, debuts on

NBC in January, a retelling that is promised to be darker than the film and will cover the material of the entire series of books.

With that lasting popularity, it's almost surprising to realize that stage productions of the story are rare, and when the University of St. Francis opens their fall production of Oz next week, it will be the first time the show has been performed live in this area.

At the helm is local theater veteran Brad Beauchamp, who has overseen a remarkable variety of shows for USF. With Oz he hopes to return families to something that many of us fondly remember as an annual family tradition.

"I liked the fact that there had never been a live production done here before," says Beauchamp.

"And the movie used to be such a big family experience for everyone. It only aired that one time every year, and the family would gather together and share this experience. Now everyone has their devices, and the film airs on different cable channels, so it's [no longer the] special family event that it used to be. It's also a great escape from the current political discourse. So if you're tired of all of that, then The Wizard of Oz is where you need to be.'

First broadcast in 1956, the 1939 film (which was part of Hollywood's finest year and only won an Oscar for best song thanks to a little film called Gone with the Wind) garnered much more attention on television thanks to its inaccessibility through other means. While it's hard to imagine now, at one time families were at the mercy of network programmers to see anything from Hollywood films to holiday specials. By the mid-80s, that was all changing thanks to home video releases and since ... a variety of media platforms ... vie for viewer attention.

Perhaps because of that, Beauchamp was surprised to discover that not everyone now has even seen the film, something which would have been unthinkable just 30 the movie. Beauchamp says that audiences will be pleased with the stage production.

"I actually sat down to watch the film and followed along with the script, and they're almost word for word," he says. "What they did was take a great film and make a live version of it, with the one major change being that the jitterbug number is back in. That That alone should help the youngsters sleep after seeing the show. And the music from the film is one of its most beloved elements. particularly "Over the Rainbow" which the American Film Institute has called the greatest movie song of all time.

"The rumor is that 'Over the Rainbow' almost didn't make the film because it was the only song from the black and white part

of the film. The other songs are all part of her dream. and so they wrestled with the idea of whether there should be this song before all of that began."

Of course. the switch from black and white to color (something some of us never in experienced our youth thanks black and white televisions) is another challenging aspect of staging the show. The dramatic shift perfectly startles

the viewer who has seen this sepiatoned world only to wake up along with Dorothy in a technicolor masterpiece.

Beauchamp promises that gels and khaki costumes will provide the underwhelming palate of the Kansas scenes, and then the sets and lighting will provide that same shift in perspective. With all of these ele-

ments included, an already large cast grows to an overall crew of almost 70 people - from both USF and the community - making this special show possible.

Aside from the visual splendor of the show, Beauchamp loves presenting Baum's themes in a way which is still interesting more than 100 years after he published his first of the series, The Wonderful Wizard of

"There are so many themes and layers that Baum wove into this series. His point was that things are not as they appear. You can keep digging and digging for different meanings, and while it may seem hard to compare him to Arthur Miller, I think you can say it's like Death of a Salesman in that you can find so many themes that we face in everyday life. We're all looking for something, and when Glinda tells Dorothy that 'there's no place like home,' she's telling her that what she was looking for was no further than her own backyard. She just needed somebody to give her a nudge. We all just need to have the heart and the courage to see that it was there all along, we just need a push. And as the song says, 'the dreams that you dare to dream really do come true."

> scene was deleted from the film, but it gives us another great number for the ensemble in the production."

The cast is large, providing one of the challenges for Beauchamp. In addition to the 20 youngsters cast as Munchkins, there are also 29 principal roles. There are also a few production challenges, something that USF's increasingly state-of-the-art system is able to tackle in their new Performing Arts Center downtown, but Beauchamp is still required to think outside the box to accomplish a lot of the special effects.

"We do have the ability to do so many things through technology now. In some areas we aren't quite there yet, but I can do a lot of things with digital projection. For example the Wicked Witch's fireball will be digitally projected because we can match the video sequences with the live action. The same is true for the great and powerful Oz who will be projected on stage to seem as large and imposing as he is in the story."

Although the story can deal with some darker themes, Beauchamp says this production is very family-friendly. And for those fearing the dreaded flying monkeys, there will be monkeys - but they won't be flying.

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
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# Serious, Feel-Good Music

Feature • Rusted Root-----

Many know Rusted Root for their trippy joyful mid-90s anthem "Send Me on My Way" off their Platinum-selling *When I Woke*. What just might come as a surprise is that the band owes its very existence to an impulsive trip to Nicaragua undertaken by frontman Michael Glabicki when he was still a teenager. The journey – alternately inspirational, depressing and dangerous – proved

life-changing.

Glabicki, the time a college freshmen, wanted to see for himself the consequences United of the States' involvement in the Nicaraguan Contra war. A native of Pittsburgh, he'd spent the majority of his high school years raising awareness of the sufferings of the people of Nicaragua and El Salvador, but he was eager to witness firsthand what, up until that point, he'd only read about and heard discussed by experts in the field.

"I don't think
I'd do it now," he admitted in a recent phone interview, "even though my life wasn't threatened in any direct way. The front lines were well drawn, but I did get close enough start to think about it. One day I was taking a nap on a park bench and some kids lit off fireworks. I got up and just started running. It turned out to be a holiday I didn't know about, and people in the street saw me running and laughed.

"Nicaraguans are often described as the happiest group of people in the Americas, and that is true," he continued. "They are so beautiful and happy, and they were incredibly generous to me, especially considering my country was causing them a great deal of strife."

Glabicki returned to the states and suffered through a period of depression. He lacked direction and purpose and was unsure of what he wanted to do with his life. At one point, he sat down and wrote a song, and thanks to that small creative act, his future grew clearer. Given the harsh realities he was exposed to while in Nicaragua, not to mention the culture's rich musical heritage and seemingly endless potential for optimism, the most obvious path to Glabicki lay in forming a band, and not just any band, but one with world music and social justice as its guiding principles.

Glabicki formed Rusted Root in Pittsburgh in 1990, and while they've undergone a few lineup changes since then, they've managed to remain remarkably stable considering they've now toured for a quarter of a century. The current version of Rusted Root is Glabicki on vocals and guitar, Patrick Norman on bass, Dirk Miller on guitar and Liz Berlin and Cory Caruso on percussion. That lineup will join the Devon Allman Band on The Hub's stage Saturday, Novem-

scene. One of the Rusted Root's biggest breaks came in 1994 when they opened for the Grateful Dead and close to 100,000 jam band fanatics. The audience was there for Jerry, but they went wild for Rusted Root, responding to the group's good time vibes, world beats and emphasis on spirituality and compassion over cynicism and greed.

Soon you couldn't go anywhere without hearing "Send Me on My Way." It was on constant rotation on the radio, in college

dorm rooms, in basements where young people got together to talk about how much reality bit and what they could do to change it. Silly. serious, contagious and imminently dance-able, "Send Me on My Way" joined the best loved hits of the Dave Matthews Band and Blues Traveler in forming the soundtrack of the 90s.



Allman is, of course, the son of Gregg Allman, but he is a star in his own right, and his style of blending soul, rock, blues and indie/alternative meshes well with the embracing aesthetic of Rusted Root. Having played several dates together last year, the two bands found they had lots of common ground. Hitting the road together just made sense

"Devon Allman has an amazing musical pedigree, and he and his band bring a lot of energy to the stage," Glabicki said. "They really get the crowd going, and we appreciate that"

Despite the fact that Rusted Root came of age in America's so-called Rust Belt, it didn't take long for Glabicki and his mates to make a name for themselves in what was arguably the golden age of the indie music



The height of Rusted Root's fame was an equally exciting and confusing time for the band. Now that the 20th anniversary of the Root's second best selling album, *Remember*, has arrived, Glabicki said he's had time to look back on that moment and think about what it meant to him artistically and professionally.

"The time for me was a little chaotic. We were trying to figure out what our roles were as band members. I think I was a little too experimental, letting the process just happen instead of taking the lead. I discovered that I needed to jump in and work things out. That's how I remember that album. It was a huge learning experience."

That said, *Remember* is an important album to Glabicki and the rest of Rusted Root, including as it does some of the band's

# Cymbals Eat Guitars Pretty Years

Joseph D'Agostino and Cymbals Eat Guitars have returned with their most pared down, popcentric, and engaging album yet, *Pretty Years*. Produced by John Congleton, the album feels vibrant, present and in the moment. It pushes air through the speakers into your ears with force and con-



viction. It's not a heavy trip, but it makes good use of every last second of its run time.

"Finally" bursts out of the gate with all the conviction of a kid determined to take over the world with nothing more than his will and pounding heart. D'Agostino sounds like a guy who has found that balance between hazy, stoned digressions and concise pop songcraft. "Have A Heart" flutters by like a warm summer day. It's a shot of jangly pop guitar that begs for rolled down windows as you sing along to "I'm so out of sync / you're so out of sync with me" as the guy in the car next to you stares like you're insane.


"Wish" makes me think of The Boss – electric piano, saxophone and super tight rhythm section evoke New Jersey turnpikes and stadium singalongs. It's a total rock and soul jam. Vocally though, D'Agostino seems to be channeling *This Year's Model*-era Costello which seems to fit perfectly here. Then we come to "Close," an alien creature of a song that to have come from out of the ether. It's like The Motels, The Feelies and ancient Yo La Tengo intertwined with something not of this earth. It's an incredible song and one that haunts my ears long after its done.

"Dancing Days" is haunting and epic in its five-minute runtime. Cymbals Eat Guitars have mastered the epic track to the point where it no longer needs to be six or seven minutes long. The guitars are bright and ethereal, with some stomp box effects that turn their Jazzmasters into science fiction projects. "4th Of July, Philadelphia (Sandy)" crackles and distorts like a soul on the verge of explosion. This sounds like old Cymbals Eat Guitars jamming with new Cymbals Eat Guitars. It's a buzzing, kinetic track. "Beam" is a shot of punk rock spittle. Everything feels like its in the red, needle bobbing far to the right. It's explosive and ready to take you out back to go a couple of rounds. "Mallwalking" is a heavy track. D'Agostino sings "Back in '99 / After Columbine / I had the strangest dream / Liquid angels swam thru the halls of /Waretown Elementary". It's a song about reflection and sad reminiscing, another New Jersey attribute (see Springsteen, Real Estate, Titus Andronicus.) "Well" and "Shrine" continue this incredible streak, with the former feeling like a lost Hooters track that was covered by Straitjacket Fits, while the latter dissipates into a spectral ball of light, courtesy of guitars, reverb, and more reverb.

Pretty Years is the culmination of years worth of writing, honing and D'Agostino and crew figuring out who the hell they are. They've figured it out, as Pretty Years proves that beautifully. (John Hubner)

#### **Dwight Yoakam** *Swimmin' Pools, Movie Stars*

Given that Dwight Yoakam has long been associated with Hollywood and the 80s rock-driven revival of traditional country, it's easy to forget that he was born in Kentucky. If he didn't grow up or build his career there, the Appalachian hills have always been present in his music, even after it was



imported to the West Coast. As the title of this new album suggests, Yoakam is using *Swimmin' Pools, Movie Stars* to make the argument that his music effectively bridges the distance between the hills of Kentucky and the ones in California.

For this project, Yoakam revisits nearly a dozen of his early songs with the specific intent of recasting them as bluegrass tunes. Sometimes the translation is seamless, as with "Gone (That'll Be Me)" or "What I Don't Know," which clearly have bluegrass in their DNA. A song like "Guitars, Cadillacs," however, simply won't be purged of its honky-tonk soul. That doesn't mean, though, that there's any hint of inauthenticity in any of the songs; this is not revision of the material as much as it is a reinterpretation that brings out qualities that were there all along.

## BACKTRACKS

#### **Black Sabbath**

Never Say Die (1978)

Spins

This was the last Black Sabbath record with all of the original members. (Ozzy Osbourne was fired from the band seven months after its release.) This album has been overlooked by critics and fans alike, but it is one of my favorites.



The title track, more metal than acid rock, opens the release, and guitarist Tony Iommi completely shreds it. "Johnny Blade" follows with a spooky little synth and goes right into the speed-drumming from Bill Ward. Because of the heavy drug use, the production suffers a little, but you can almost see the formation of Osbourne's solo work. "Junior's Eyes" harkens back to the stoner rock from the early part of Black Sabbath's career. Drug-induced heavy metal never sounded better. Side one closes with "A Hard Road," a track that includes backing vocals from all of the band members. It's one of my favorite Sabbath songs, ever.

"Shock Wave" kicks off side two in all of its majesty and continues the heavy/hard rock genre. Simple lyrics in front of grungy guitars and bass, it almost doesn't sound like Sabbath. If you want to know where Soundgarden got their sound, it may have been this song. "Air Dance" brings the tempo down, but doesn't slow the albums pace. It has a ballad feel to it and featured sessions master-pianist Don Airey. "Breakout," an instrumental with horns (gasp!) takes you into "Swinging The Chains" which featured Ward on lead vocals.

If you like "Iron Man" and "Paranoid" from their early years, you may not recognize this band from this record. But if you like flamboyant late 70s hard rock and Black Sabbath, this is one of the best.

Fun Fact: Van Halen opened for Black Sabbath on the tour in support of this release. It was the band's first time touring outside of the United States. (*Dennis Donahue*)

A cover of Prince's "Purple Rain" is the outlier here. It was recorded spontaneously as a tribute when Yoakam and his band heard of Prince's death, and although it's a stretch to look for bluegrass in the song's structure, the sheer sincerity of the cover is enough to make it fit. Sincerity is, in fact, what makes the whole album work. Yoakam lives in California, but he obviously feels hillbilly music somewhere deep down, and it shows. (Evan Gillespie)

#### **Devin Townsend**

#### Transcendence

For most of his career – his life actually – Devin Townsend has maintained a firm grip on the maestro's baton of his creative output, controlling and directing every aspect of his music, driving it into new and unforeseen territory. For his latest album, *Transcendence*, he made the very difficult decision



to allow his band to help write the songs and even come up with their own parts. The result is an album that sounds like Townsend and yet has a bit of its own character, though it isn't exactly innovative, going instead for another round with the pop-metal explored in the amazing *Addicted* and the just-okay *Epicloud* – but this time with more prog and orchestral ambience.

The album starts with "Truth," a kind of explosive mood-setting abstract that he originally recorded on 1998's *Infinity*. The first proper lyrics are "Time is a human construct," and I feared that the rest of the album would be filled with similar bombastic musings. Fortunately, Townsend does tone things down a bit, but more than ever on this album his lyrics sound almost preachy. The man is in a good place right now and wants to share, which I can appreciate, but personally I find the journey more interesting than the destination.

But back to the music. To be honest with you, this album sounds like Townsend doing his usual thing, which no one else does. There really aren't that many surprises and though right now most crit-




A name I haven't heard much of lately is Duke



most long-standing hits, including "Heaven," "Infinite Space" and "Voodoo."

"The music itself was very free in a spiritual way," he said. "It came to me in a dream, and so my approach was very raw lyrically. We still play quite a bit of those songs each night, and now there's more of a technical aspect to them – we work hard to get them right – and more of a personal feeling behind them, too. It's funny. When you're older, it's like you understand the process and the meaning of the songs more than you did before. Personal experience melds with the collective consciousness to create something really special."

Rusted Root have released four albums since *Remember*, the most recent being the spiritually focused *Movement*, which has helped Glabicki and company reach an entirely new generation of fans. The key to

Rusted Root's staying power, in Glabicki's opinion anyway, is the band's focus on the positive. The music is deadly serious, delving into the universal themes of poverty, war and oppression, but it is infused with hope, and anyone who's been to a live Rusted Root show can attest that it's virtually impossible to leave without a smile on your face.

"I think the fun, the good feeling that results from our live shows, is about intention," Glabicki said. "It's the way we approach the music. We visualize it happening. As a group of musicians, we consciously make the effort to bring about a positive response in the audience, and it's our hope that simply by playing our songs we clear out any and all the negative energy in the room. At the end of a Rusted Root show, you should be thinking, 'You know, the world isn't so bad after all. In fact, it just might be pretty great.""

ics are saying how amazing the songs are, in reality 10 years from now this will be considered an average Townsend album.

Which is to say that it's enjoyable but not likely to upset your musical world. For example, "Failure" is a chunky mid-tempo song running just over six minutes long. It's both aggressive and relaxed, the kind of dichotomy that Townsend revels in, and tends to be a bit dark. But it's also grandiose with an orchestral ending and surrounds an airy guitar solo unlike Townsend's usual output. Probably my favorite song on this album is "Secret Sciences" which starts in a kind of 90s alt riff set that becomes a quirky rhythm featuring a superbly inventive bass line. The chorus is an uplifting rocket blast that runs straight into an angular guitar rhythm the leads into the solo section, blending in a catchy pop vocal melody with enough twists and turns to keep one on their toes to become a complicated Addicted song.

This past weekend I found myself with melodies in my head from *Transcendence*. That is a good thing, but I didn't especially find myself yearning to hear the songs that contained them, which is not so good. All in all, the album seems a bit bloated. All the usual Devin Townsend ingredients are there: bits of pop metal, a playful sense of experimentation, layers of beautiful gauzy production acting as the foil to thick, heavy guitars drums, plus a grandiose symphonic feel that never feels snobby. However, it never fully comes together. To use a reference from *Deconstruction*, *Transcendence* is a Five Guys cheeseburger: a very good thing, but you know the band is capable of, well, transcendence. (*Jason Hoffman*)

### Regina Spektor

#### Remember Us to Life

For her first new album in four years, Regina Spektor had a tricky job to do. She had to be true to her artistic impulses which have pulled her a little closer to the mainstream in recent years, but she also had to avoid



alienating fans who have a stake in their beloved songwriter's staying endearingly on the oddball side of the music industry. *Remember Us to Life* is Spektor's stab at walking the line, and for the most part she pulls it off

The album's opening track, "Bleeding Heart," epitomizes the multiple-personality approach, as the song's moody lyrics are delivered through a see-sawing melody that gives way to a sweet, poppy chorus


and then to an angry, pounding bridge. Elsewhere, Spektor sways back and forth between pure pop ("Older and Taller," "Black and White") and quirky music-poems ("The Trapper and the Furrier," "Sellers of Flowers"), and sometimes she does it within a single song ("Grand Hotel").

There are times when it doesn't work. "Small Bill\$" is a little too obvious in its dance-music-style appropriation of Eastern themes, and the lengthy "Obsolete" meanders melodramatically for too long. But more often than not, Spektor's aim is true.

New fans who know Spektor primarily from her theme song to *Orange is the New Black* probably won't be disappointed in this collection. Even if she never cuts loose the way she does on that song, she's still recognizably the same edgy musical agitator. And she's still unpredictable, which should keep her old fans happy. (*Evan Gillespie*)

# Survive RR7349

Kyle Dixon and Michael Stein seemed to know what they were doing when they formed and created the score to the Duffer Bros.' Stranger Things.



They captured a feeling in those synth-heavy pieces that you can't just get from a plug-in you use in some computer-based program. These were hands-on pieces, meticulously strung together using man-made boxes, circuits and analog magic.

I was enthralled (by the show and score equally.) Where did these guys come from? They seemed to have appeared from the ether, like two time-traveling synth nerds that stepped out of space/time pods from 1978 with an arsenal of exquisite analog synths, sequencers and possibly bright, chrome space suits. Turns out Stein and Dixon aren't space-traveling synth marauders at all. They're one half of an Austin, Texas synth band called Survive (though for some Austin, Texas is in fact pretty alien).

In Survive, Dixon and Stein are joined by Mark Donica and Adam Jones. If you give their Bandcamp page a look, you'll see they've been putting music out since 2010, with the band officially coming together in 2008. So all this success seems to be a long time coming

My first post-Stranger Things listen by the band is their excellent new LP titled RR7349. It's everything you'd hope from a group that tapped into the zeitgeist of early 80s nostalgia wielding synths as their weap-

Kings of Leon just released their seventh album, *Walls*, but they are planning on giving us a few months to digest it before we get to hear it in a live setting. The Nashville-based band head out at the beginning of January and visit Detroit on January 22. If you can't

Country superstar **Miranda Lambert** drops her sixth album, *The Weight of These Wings*, on November 18, just in time for those who still like to give the gift of music for Christmas. In a not so shocking turn of events, Lambert is going on tour to support that album, but, just like Kings Of Leon, not until after the holidays are over. So far, a March 19 show at Van Andel Arena in Grand Rapids is the only scheduled show in our region, but I'd expect more shows, including a tour of the summer sheds, to be announced after the first of the year.

Former **Creed** singer **Scott Stapp** and his over-inflated ego continue their trek on the Proof of Life Tour. The tour is named after Stapp's second solo album, *Proof of Life*, released way back in 2013. Apparently Stapp is leaving no stone unturned in his quest to let people know he is still a voice in the rock community, so he has scheduled a December 1 show in Indianapolis and a December 6 show in Chicago to help spread the word.

**Roger Waters** just announced the Us + Them Tour for 2017. Promising a whole new show and songs from throughout the iconic musician's career, Waters is obviously planning on featuring music from *The Dark Side of the Moon* album as well. The tour starts around Memorial Day next year and stops in Columbus, Ohio July 22 and Chicago July 22-23.

**Green Day**'s Revolution Radio Tour hits the U.S. starting in March. The band will play some warmer parts of the country before making their way to the Midwest with a lone show in Detroit on March 27. I'm pretty sure this won't be your only chance to see the iconic punk rockers this year, though; look for a blockbuster summer tour announcement with stops at the usual sheds to be announced for cities like Indianapolis, Chicago and Cleveland sometime in the spring.

Glenn Frey will now be "standing on the corner in Winslow, Arizona" for the foreseeable future. The town recently erected a life-size bronze statue of the Eagles singer credited with co-writing about the town in the hit "Take It Easy." Frey's likeness joins a statue of Jackson Browne, the other guy responsible for writing "Take It Easy," in the aptly named Standing on the Corner Park in Winslow. Browne actually wrote the song after being stranded in the town, and Frey added the line "It's a girl, my Lord, in a flat bed Ford" after Browne got stuck trying to finish the song.



If you haven't been to The Golden yet, allow me to introduce you to the third greatest love of my life, behind only my immediate family members. It has propelled my appreciation of farm-to-fork style dining to new heights.

Having previously tested their concept in a popup craft cocktail setting, former Joseph Decuis phenoms Aaron Butts, Sean Richardson and Carmen Mc-Gee opened a permanent location this spring in the Ash Skyline Plaza in downtown Fort Wayne. Already well known for their unique and clever libations, The Golden's opening was the most highly anticipated of the year, maybe even this decade. That's saying a lot, considering a handful of impressive restaurants have

come onto the scene this year

Inside The Golden, big city feel meets small town culture. The wait staff dresses in casual attire, often donning Hawaiian shirts or T-shirts and flannels, not the white shirts and black slacks you might expect. While some people may have been intimidated to dine at Joseph Decuis due to its reputation as a fancy-pants and super expensive establishment, there's no reason for anyone to be intimidated walking into The Golden. As its website says, The Golden is for everyone. The ambiance is

Because the restaurant focuses on regional ingredients, the menu changes often, influenced by what is in season. If you're accustomed to getting "the usual" wherever you dine, this might not be the place for you. But if you're an adventurous eater who likes to try new things and push the limits of you palate, The Golden is your spirit animal. If you're really concerned about whether you'll find something you will like, check out the menu online before you visit. It's updated regularly. And don't be afraid to ask your server if you aren't sure what something is. A friend said they didn't enjoy their experience because they had to Google everything on the menu. The staff is there to help you navigate the choices.

Because the menu changes regularly, it is hard to recommend specific items, but I will call attention to The McGolden, one of the few consistent offerings. This dish, as the name suggests, is inspired by Mc-Donald's Big Mac. It is made with two beef patties,

beer cheese and Dijonnaise and served on a honey bun with a side of fries. The patties, made from beef sourced from a local farm, are extra thin and cooked to a slight crunch. Typically, I like my meat medium rare, but that wouldn't be right for this dish. Trust the chef to make it the way it should be. And the beer cheese? Whoa! The savory, yet tangy, flavor complements this dish just right. Perhaps the most telling sign that The Golden takes food preparation seriously is the ketch-

up, which is made in-house. If you like sugary, artificially flavored ketchup, you might not like it, but I love the natural flavor of real tomatoes sans a ton of added sugar.

Another favorite menu item is the Confit Chicken Wings, prepared with agave, citrus, jalapeno, and cilantro. I am a fan of wings. I once wrote an article that rated the best wings in town, which required me to eat my weight in wings in one month. When I wrote that article, I rated Tower's wings number one, but The Golden's bury them. Juicy, meaty goodness is drizzled with a sweet



and tangy sauce and accented with a punch of spice from the jalapeno. The result is a very Korean-esque/ Vietnamese flavor that will knock your socks off.

I'd be remiss if I didn't mention The Golden's brunch. Fort Wayne has waited a long time for a worthwhile brunch, and this is it. When I went, an open-faced tuna sandwich graced the menu. I've also sampled a heaping mound of berry pancakes and the Pig Face Hash, made with sweet potatoes and topped with a poached egg and pickled onions. Brunch also features my all-time favorite donut: the Old Fashioned Sour Cream from Hetty Arts Pastries.

Quality ingredients cost money, so The Golden's prices are higher than other restaurants in town, but it is worth it. If you're looking for a bargain, choose one of the hundreds of chain restaurants in town. You will not have another experience like this in Fort Wayne.

So, what are you waiting for? Get to The Golden! Belly up to the expansive bar, order a finely crafted cocktail from head barkeep Patti Nix, and make some



# McGinniss' Tale of Discontent

Carousel Court by Joe McGinnisss Jr., Simon & Schuster, 2016

Nick and Phoebe, the central characters in Joe McGinniss Jr.'s new novel, are a married couple in trouble. Their plans for the future have been derailed by the Great Recession, and their financial woes are destroying both their individual lives and their stability as a couple. Their story is bleak, and so is McGinniss' novel, a grim tale that makes one of America's most difficult decades seem even worse than it was.

Although McGinniss doesn't give us any clear chronological markers, the novel is clearly set in the early stages of the late 2000's housing market collapse, back when young market speculators

when young market speculators were coming to terms with the harsh realities of foreclosure. Nick and Phoebe are two of those speculators. After watching their friends in Boston rake in huge profits from flipping houses, and being inspired by an HGTV schedule full of shows about the free riches to be had in real estate, Nick and Phoebe finally take the leap. Nick, an aspiring filmmaker, gets a job in California, and he and Phoebe seize the opportunity to invest their fortunes in real estate.

Of course, they're too late to the party. They buy a house with a zero-down mortgage and begin to pour money into it, outfitting the property with every extravagance they can think of – a pool with a natural stone waterfall, an indoor rock-climbing wall, anything to increase the resale value. Once they're far, far over their heads in debt, Nick loses his



job, the bottom falls out of the real estate market and they're stuck in Carousel Court, their rapidly decaying subdivision, with no way out.

This is all a backdrop for the moral deterioration of Nick and Phoebe themselves. Nick takes a job as a repo man of sorts, liquidating the contents of foreclosed properties, and Phoebe goes back to her old gig as a pharmaceutical sales rep. Burned by the system and desperate, they be-

come part of the problem.

Not that they were ever paragons of virtue. Back in Boston, Nick made his name as a filmmaker by making an exploitative documentary about a troubled young man, and Phoebe found success as a drug rep by flashing her underwear at doctors. Phoebe, too, is seriously addicted to tranquilizers and spends her days either in a drugged daze or wishing she was. When her life begins to truly

crumble, she hatches a plan to exploit her former boss, with whom she'd had an affair.

The heart of the couple's problem is disempowerment. As they lose control of their lives, they grasp at any lifeline they can find. Phoebe wavers between using her sexuality to keep her head above water and just giving up, and Nick frantically searches for a way to prove himself to Phoebe. And, increasingly, they

ons of choice. But while *Stranger Things* has a backdrop of the Spielberg 80s and latchkey kids, *RR7349* is more of a mid 70s trip, all warm and bubbling synths taking us into darker territories.

In an interview Dixon and Stein conducted during the perfect storm aftermath of *Stranger Things*, the guys had said they like making music that you can't tell what era it was released. They don't want to date the music they make, and *RR7349* definitely has a timeless vibe. There are no icy cold digital imprints like a lot of the early 80s synthesizer sounds had. No heavily reverbed electronic drums.

Opening track "A.H.B." is a dark and looming affair. It seems to take the heavy sounds of 70s synth albums and add an 80s sense of melody. It's a striking juxtaposition that these Austin natives do very well throughout the album. "Other" sounds like Tangerine Dream and Giorgio Moroder collaborating on a Michael Mann film. It's otherworldly and atmospheric. "Dirt" has the sound of a sci-fi nightmare; droning synths and what sounds like shots from a laser cannon fly by your ears as some existential battle rages on around you. There's a Jean Michel Jarre vibe here as well, like a grand space opera is happening amongst the action.

Elsewhere, "Wardenclyffe" captures both a cosmic feeling of dread and longing. Much like Sinoia Caves' Jeremy Schmidt does so well on his records, Survive create an emotional and intense trip on this track. "Low Fog" is an exquisite, droning piece that sounds like both dread and peaceful abyss. "Copter" sounds a bit like Com Truise on a Goblin wave, while "Cutthroat" has a Italian giallo vibe to it. It's a perfect way to end this heady synth trip.

I think what's great about Survive is that they don't seem to be wanting to tell a specific story throughout their album. Each song is a feeling and vibe. RR7349 isn't a concept record; it's 9 individual trips you take. Where the songs move you is up to you. It's an album that will satisfy and engage the most refined synth lover and enthusiast.

I also love the fact that there's a history in this band. They weren't just conceived out of thin air to make some nostalgic music for a TV show. They've been at it for years. *Stranger Things* was the open window, and *RR7349* is Survive taking flight. (*John Hubner*)

#### Purling Hiss High Bias

Purling Hiss are a band that can't really be labeled. As soon as you think you know who they are, the sound changes. Mike Polizze and his Purling Hiss proj-



ect began as an experimental outlet for him to record his white noise and fuzz-drenched solo songs, but it turned into more than that. Comparisons to Dinosaur Jr and fIREHOSE weren't unfounded, but pigeonholing the Philly native as an 80s and 90s indie rock revivalist wasn't what Polizze had in mind.

With 2013s Water on Mars, Purling Hiss blew the speakers with album opener "Lolita," a frontal lobe-melting scorcher that sounded like Nirvana's In Utero re-imagined as a scuzz rock masterpiece. From there though, the album skated from sound to sound. In 2014 Polizze followed up Water on Mars with the folksy Weirdon. If you thought you had Purling Hiss pegged, you were dead wrong, and Polizze was happy to point that out song after song.

Well Purling Hiss are back with *High Bias*, probably their most consistent record to date. It's a punky, power chord-fueled affair that balances between unabashed, upbeat rock n' roll and late-70s hardcore punk workouts that, while different in attitude, always seem to follow the same rock n' roll spirit.

"Fever" is a balls out rock n' roll barn burner and a hell of an opening salvo. It's as if T. Rex and the Ramones mind melded somewhere between "Jeepster" and "Judy Is A Punk" – no saccharine or sentiment, just sweat and buzzing amps. "3000 AD" sounds like a lost Cult track with bits of Screaming Trees thrown in for good measure, while "Notion Sickness" has a Dead Kennedys vibe in both the punk rock squall and Polizze's Jello Biafra-affected vocals. "Follow You Around" is an all-out early 90s indie rock tune, complete with Lemonheads-like vocals and a Dino Jr lean in the guitar jangle.

Polizze makes no qualms about his love of those early 90s indie rock inspirations, and you can certainly hear 'em in his tunes. But he's also enough of an individual and musical voice that he doesn't need to recreate Lollapalooza '93 on every song. Case in point, "Teddy's Servo Motors." It's a nearly 7-minute post-punk banger that has as much in common with Polvo as it does METZ. This is what makes Purling Hiss such an exciting band and what makes Polizze an engaging songwriter, singer and guitarist. I think Polizze could shred on every song if he wanted to, but instead he pushes his guitar prowess into repetition and monster riffs.

"Get Your Way" sounds like Jesus and Mary Chain covering the Beach Boys' "Do It Again," while "Pulsations" is another post-punk staccato attack. "Everybody in the USA" is an 11-minute psychedelic trip that goes from Mudhoney's "Mudslide" to Dead Kennedys' "California Uber Alles" and back again. It may run a few minutes too long, but Purling Hiss don't really care. And in the end, neither should I.

High Bias shows Polizze in a fuzzed-out rock n' roll mood with little letting up throughout the album's nine ear-shattering tracks. Amidst a sea of faux rock n' roll bands and over-produced, plastic artists, it's refreshing to have a new Purling Hiss record. Something that has feeling. Something that feels alive with blemishes, scars, faults and jagged edges that'll cut you if you're not careful. Makes me want to sew some patches on my jean jacket, put on some hi tops and turn my amp up to 11 in the garage. (John Hubner)

turn on each other.

America, in reality, has moved past the shell-shocked era that McGinniss captures in his novel. Disbelief has turned to fear and depression, and we've started to look elsewhere for the causes of our discontent. McGinniss gives hints at what's in store for his characters, as the residents of Carousel Court, made poor by the banks, arm themselves and start looking with suspicion at their Vietnamese, Latino and Ukrainian neighbors.

In any case, Carousel Court is not a novel for anyone who wants to envision a bright new day for America. Its characters don't respond to adversity with resilience and determination. They respond, instead, with cynicism and deceit. That might be true to life, and McGinniss writes it with a lyrical darkness, but it's bitter stuff to swallow for anyone who's tired of the grim twilight of the past decade






