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# A More Perfect Blues Union

----- Feature • Tedeschi Trucks Band------

If you want to quickly understand why Derek Trucks is widely considered to be one of the best blues guitarists in the world, seek out a YouTube video of a B.B. King concert from 2012.

At one point in the show, King, John Mayer and Derek Trucks are performing a Jesse Blevin song that came to be associated with King called "Guess Who?," and King asks Trucks to do a solo.

What ensues is nothing less than magi-

cal. Mayer, no slouch himself in the guitar department, gawks at Trucks in disbelief.

The world of electric bluesman and blues rockers is full of shredders, but there aren't many guys who can make a guitar gently weep like Trucks can.

His solo is a poem in notes. It is more soliloquy than solo.

Afterward, King says, "That's about as good as I have ever heard it." And Trucks looks genuinely embarrassed by the praise.

Trucks will perform with the Tedeschi Trucks Band, the group he formed in 2010 with his wife, Susan Tede-

schi, at the Embassy Theatre on Nov. 17.

Trucks had an unusual childhood. He picked up his first guitar for \$5 at a garage sale when he was nine, not an uncommon thing for an American kid to do. By the time he turned 12, he'd performed with music legends like Bob Dylan and Buddy Guy, an utterly uncommon thing for an American kid to have done.

"I don't even know how to explain it," he said in a phone interview. "I have kids now who are the age I was when I was traveling on the road."

Trucks said he never craved rock star adulation, so the mere act of taking a stage wasn't enough to swell his head or scare him stiff. He said he just saw playing guitar as a welcome challenge at that age, very much on par with playing Little League baseball.

The joy he got from playing as a kid was unencumbered by adult responsibilities and ramifications.

"When you get in the zone playing sports and music, there's a thing that happens where everything slows down," he said. "It's a very pure thing that happens and you start looking for it more and more."

Trucks' father was (and still is) a music aficionado who took his young son to rock, blues and jazz shows.

He was a huge fan of Eric Clapton and the Allman Brothers, so one can only imagine what a thrill it was for him to see his son perform with both those classic acts.

"It was all pretty surreal," Trucks said. "I think I'd been on the road for a decade when I got the call to join the Allman Brothers. I had a record out. At that point I think I figured that the band was winding down and the guitar chair was never going to open up again. So it came out of left field, and was certainly a major honor. I had no idea it would last 15 years.

"I don't really believe in the preordained script but this was kind of part of it," he a year later and a daughter two years after that.

Trucks said they knew they would collaborate some day but they wanted to wait for the right moment.

"Her career was taking off," he said. "I think not long after I met her, her first record went Gold and she was up for Best New Artist. Things went from 0 to 60 with her. I was working with my solo group and the Allmans, and things were intense and great. So there was this sense for the first eight years: 'Your thing is your thing and mine is mine.

Let's not cross-pollinate too much."

But after their family had been established for a while, they started talking about teaming up professionally.

In the days when they had two separate bands, they arranged their tour schedules so one parent was always home.

That aspect of things became more challenging after they joined musical forces.

"We're very fortunate," Trucks said. "My parents live not too far from us. My brother and his wife live right down the road. We all live on the same street now. Now when we leave.

my mom kind of moves in. And we don't leave for any extended period of time when the kids aren't out of school. We have the small village thing working for us. I don't know if we would be able to do it otherwise."

Doing a lot of shows is imperative for the large band in these economic times. The band has swelled to 12 members, including three singers and a horn section.

"It's an evolving thing," he said. "When we first put band together, we definitely had a horn section in mind. But you can't bring 10 people on the road right out of the gate."

The band always grows after it tries something new and everyone realizes they can't live without it, Trucks said.

"You don't go backwards," he said. "You just keep finding a way to make it work."

There are no sidemen in the band. Trucks said. Every member is a virtuoso and a visionary.

"Really everyone in the band has done or could do their own thing," he said. "There are no pick-up musicians. With that, you're getting a world of experience; you're getting big personalities."

The band performs 200 shows a year because Trucks and Tedeschi want everyone to be financially comfortable.

It was during Trucks' first tour with the Allmans that he met his future wife. Tedeschi, a rising star on the blues scene at the time, was an opening act throughout the

"I always joked with the guys in my solo band at the time," he said. "I'd just gotten out of a relationship, and I was like, 'It's kind of fun being a single guy on the road.' I remember telling them, 'Unless I find a woman with a CD collection that has John Coltrane, Howlin' Wolf and Mahalia Jackson in it, I'm just going to hang back a while.'

"And then, when I met Susan, I called Yonrico (Scott), our drummer, and I said, 'I think I stepped in it,'" Trucks recalled.

Members of the Allmans and of Tedeschi's band picked up on the future couple's chemistry and musical compatibility right away, he said.

"They were like, 'We don't care if you date, but you've got to have at least one child," Trucks said.

The couple married in 2001, had a son

# Band of 'Be' Brothers

None of the five members of the Be Colony is older than 24, and yet they are all talented and creatively confident beyond their years.

For confirmation of this assertion, stream the album "Mystic Morning" at the band's website.
"Mystic Morning" features six assertive forays

into acid-washed soul and dreamy jangle pop, among other mesmerizing stylistic conglomerations.

The Be Colony are adept at whipping up savory, multifaceted sonic stews. There isn't a weak cut on the album. Each track grabs the listener and does so in a unique way.

Lead vocalist and guitarist Atticus Sorrell said the band's musical influences are wide and

"We all come from different places," he said. "We all really like psychedelic music. We all really like 60s rock and 70s rock, the harder stuff. Me and (drummer Bray Coughlin) in particular like funk and soul music and the Stax stuff and the more acid jazz stuff and the electric Miles Davis

The band calls what it does "psychedelic groove music," Sorrell said.

"Because we like to play rock music and we also like to play kind of groovier stuff too," he said. "We want to meet in the middle. We don't want it to get too funky, and we don't want to be head-banging all the

The Be Colony are ever evolving, Sorrell said.

"We are always trying to listen to new music," he said. "We're always trying to branch out and expand our influences."

Sorrell and Coughlin came to the band from Soft N' Heavy. The band also features Wes Johnson on bass and brothers Jacob and Zac Terhune on guitars

Johnson said the band's name was inspired by the 2009 album, Broadcast and The Focus Group Investigate Witch Cults of the Radio Age, a collaboration between the British bands Broadcast and The Focus

"Broadcast and The Focus Group have a special place in the hearts of most of the members of the band," he said. "We all find the name relatable in many ways. We are advocates of living in the now, being here in this present moment. The 'colony' aspect of the name is also something we clung to right away, as we've had help from offstage members since

the beginning, and that's something we've really seen grow the longer we've been together.'

The highlight of the band's existence thus far, Johnson said, was performing at the inaugural Middle Waves Music Festival in September.

"It was great to be a part of something so awesome for the Fort Wayne music scene, especially in its first year," he said. "There was a really cool vibe in



the air at the fest, and our set in particular went really well. A lot of our friends came out to support us, and our light team, Newman's Psychedelic Liquid Light Show, put on their best light show yet."

Sorrell and Jacob Terhune are on the verge of graduating from the University of St. Francis with degrees in music technology (Sorrell's focus is on music business and Terhune's is on engineering and produc-

The band's members intend thereafter to spend a lot more time on the band.

Sorrell is in favor of gradually expanding the Be Colony's geographical reach while Terhune just wants to get out of Fort Wayne as soon as possible.

Sorrell is an advocate of "testing the waters."

"You go out west and the price of everything triples," he said. "We don't want to go out there and try it and just suddenly be totally broke."

In this age of streaming music, the band defines success in modest terms.

"I don't even care if we make lots of money," Terhune said. "I just want people to listen."

"I don't ever see myself becoming some rich, famous rock star," Sorrell said. "But paying the bills, or at least paying part of the bills, would be just great."

"I guess that's success right there," Terhune said. "Not having to work a day job."

"It's not what you need to personally get by," Trucks said. "It's what the band and the crew need to get by. It sure would be nice to have a month or two of not touring at this period, but we're like, 'Maybe next

Trucks said it's tough being away from home so much, and it's tough feeling like you're always in motion, but it's "a good hang.

"Musically it just gets better the more you do it,"

he said, "when you're actively pushing it forward and trying new things. The band is better because of it. I don't feel like at any point with this band that we play too much and the inspiration goes away. It's the op-

Trucks said the band "just keeps feeling this magic kind of bubbling more and more."

'It is the nature of what we do," he said. "The more you do it, the better it's going to get."

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
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renaissance in Fort Wayne these days, and that has given rise to a culture of food fanatics. A handful of top-notch restaurants have opened in the past year, and one of my favorites is Junk Ditch Brewing Company from the folks who brought us Affine Food

If you've lived in Fort Wayne at any time during the past few years, you are likely aware of our booming food truck culture. What began a few years ago with the Bravas Hot Dog cart parked on the corner of Wayne and Calhoun streets has exploded into a scene with dozens of food trucks scattered throughout the city on any given day. Be-

cause I try to eat (mostly) healthy, Affine became my go-to mobile lunch because they will make any of their sandwiches into a salad - an extremely fresh and delicious salad.

When I heard they were opening a brick and mortar establishment, I could not wait. The wait was worth it. Junk

Ditch does not disappoint. Located in the old Korte Paper Company warehouse on West Main Street, it serves up some creatively refined dishes in an industrial warehouse setting. People from larger cities might feel like this

theme is played out, but it works well in Fort Wayne which hasn't yet been saturated with the warehouse-turned-restaurant trend. It is casual and comfortable, yet simultaneously elegant. I always feel special dining there.

The dinner menu, designed to encourage sharing, offers a nice selection of small and large plates. It also changes often, so what you savor today, may not be available tomorrow. For some, this may be unsettling. People like consistency, but for adventurous eaters this is a dream come true. I don't check the menu online before my visit because part of the experience for me is being

surprised and delighted when I get there. If that's not your style, you can always check the website for the latest menu. They updated it regularly.

Junk Ditch boasts an "everything from scratch" philosophy, and that is certainly evident in the final entrees. Highlights from a recent trip for dinner include Strawberry & Beets Salad with fennel, arugula, nasturtium and sesame seeds; Crispy Veal Sweetbreads

> with charred cauliflower, tomato. lemon, thyme. pepitas and white anchovy; and Duck with broccoli, corn, onions. arugula, mint. cherries and pistachios. Junk Ditch certainly stretches one's comfort zone by mixing flavors and ingredients you may not have thought to mix. The result is simply splendid.

thing

Perhaps the best about the new(ish) restaurant is the brunch. Junk Ditch is open for brunch on Saturday and Sunday, and my hands-down favorite dish is the Shrimp and Grits. served with polenta. scallion, fried egg.

bread crumbs and shrimp gravy. Another must-try is the cinnamon roll - best I've ever had. I suggest getting the pastry board to share. All pastries are made in-house by GK Baked Goods, and the assortment is always changing. I have ordered it three times. and I have loved it every time.

Of course, what would a Brewing Company be without beer? Last time I visited. Junk Ditch was serving five of its own house beers as well as a nice selection of guest beers. I am particularly fond of the Camelote, a dry saison.



#### Bob Weir

#### Blue Mountain

Jerry Garcia once described his experience performing with the Grateful Dead much like riding a train, slow to get going but fast and powerful once at full speed. Alternatively, his solo projects, like the Jerry Garcia Band, were more akin to a sports car. He was at the wheel and in control, able to speed up and



slow down and take sharp turns at will. The same could be said for his fellow band member Bob Weir and his solo ventures. He has had many through the years, from Kingfish to Bobby and the Midnites, to Ratdog. I'm sure he has had similar thoughts about the differences between bands, but with Weir's latest album and subsequent tour, it is not a locomotive or sports car that is the appropriate metaphor. It

Blue Mountain is an album that is a country-tinged reflection of Weir's past. In his younger days before going out west to California and becoming a founding member of the Grateful Dead, he worked as a ranch hand in Wyoming. The songs are oftentimes melancholy and evocative, reflecting the personal nature of the lyrics. This is Weir at a point in his life where he has reached the maturity and soulfulness to look back and reflect on hard living and bad choices.

"Ki-Yi Bossie" references "12 step meetings under fluorescent lighting" and tells a story of "coke and whiskey" filled nights. He has revealed in interviews that this song is dedicated to lifelong writing partner, John Perry Barlow, who has been suffering from a series of illnesses of late including a near-fatal heart attack just last year.

Another standout song, based off a traditional folk tune of a similar name, is "Lay My Lily Down." The words speak of a father burying his daughter and are hauntingly beautiful. Weir is no stranger to the passing of loved ones, the most newsworthy was the death of Garcia in the mid 90s, but a number of band members have also died, including most recently Rob Wasserman. Wasserman was a former bass player for Ratdog and many of Weir's other side projects. When asked in an interview in Rolling Stone magazine how he put himself into the emotional space for the song, he simply stated that he has

On the album, Weir is joined by familiar musicians with whom he has performed in the past. Drummers Jay Lane and Joe Russo have provided the beats for Weir in different bands such as Ratdog (Lane) and Furthur (Russo), but trade off on tracks for this album. Steve Kimock plays the lap steel guitar and is a fellow luminary of the Grateful Dead family, performing with the band The Other Ones along with Weir and the remaining members of the Dead. Other contributors include guitarist Aaron Dessner of the National, who performed with Weir recently and expressed his love of the cowboy tunes that Weir covered in his career as a member of the Grateful Dead. These tunes include "El Paso" and "Me and My Uncle," mainstays in Weir's musical catalog for decades.

If you are a fan of Weir's cowboy songs or just an avid music lover, you will find this album to be endearing, pensive and enjoyable. There are moments of sadness, revelry and reflection that carry the listener through a storyteller's journey to a time before the radio, a time when cowboys sat around a fire and told tales set to song. Weir was once a teenager, listening to the old cowboys tell their tales. Now, with the release of Blue Mountain, we all can listen to Weir tell his. (John Lauer)

Nowhere is Gaga's new path more apparent than on the title



#### Beautiful Freak (1996)

Mark Everett's songwriting isn't for everybody. Indie-rock is an acquired taste, but this debut from his new project was a pretty good selection of music about everyday life.

"Novocaine for the Soul" gets it started and is still probably the most recognized track



"Not Ready Yet" picks it up again with dusky lyrics about facing the day with depression. Again, Everett's songwriting is sometimes gloomy, but the music eventually picks you up. "Flower" brings a spiritual tone to the record and comes complete with what appears to be a church choir. It's probably a synth, but is an imaginative element to a very handsome song.

'Guest List" also contains a spiritual message, and the harmonica gives it a delicate Dylan texture. "Mental" has a trippy hard rock beat and deals with mental illness (or does it?). 'Spunky" also brings a detailed keyboard that brightens a moody cello arrangement. It's one of my favorite tracks from the release and sort of epitomizes their deep, yet imposing indie-rock sound.

Your Lucky Day in Hell" probably sounds familiar, as it was featured in several films, including 1997's Scream 2 and Grosse Pointe Blank. It's poppy, but still has some good modern-rock roots. The album closes with "Manchild," a dreamy, romantic song with some background dialogue and inaudible sampling.

Beautiful Freak introduced us to a band that has since released a dozen albums. Twenty years later, they still sound great. (Dennis Donahue)


track, an acoustic tribute to the singer's late aunt. Here Gaga's vocal has an indie-esque instability, and the song sparkles with authenticity. The fresh path shows up, too, on "A-YO," a silly party anthem that has a bit of honky-tonk rasp about it.

Lest you think Gaga is serious about the countrified stuff, though, try "John Wayne," proof that even if she claims to love a cowboy, she's never going to be content to just shut up and sit on the back of the horse.

At times, Joanne resorts to yesterday's Gaga-ness, as in the laughable "Dancin' In Circles," a Beck-produced pop trifle about auto-affection, or the predictable "Perfect Illusion." Those songs are in the minority, however, and most of Joanne shows that Gaga is still able to find some sharp edges at the margins of pop's polished surface. (Evan Gillespie)

#### **Barry Gibb** In the Now

An unavoidable poignancy casts a shadow over In the Now, the first solo album from Barry Gibb in more than 30 years. Of the three brothers Gibb who made up the Bee Gees, Barry is the only one still living, and his return to music after all these years and the loss of his broth-



Now from being simply an over-produced effort from an over-the-

Fans hoping to hear a revival of the Bee Gees' 70s heyday will probably have mixed feelings about the album. Gibb enlists his sons, Stephen and Ashley, to provide the harmonies once handled by his brothers, Maurice and Robin, and the family resemblance is striking.

Well, the former Piere's is now The Hub Entertainment Center. New ownership has wasted no time cleaning up the joint. They actually told me it took a good couple of weeks to tidy the place up. They updated the lighting and sound, fixed the roof, slapped on some paint and, most noticeably, installed new flooring in the main room. Gone are the tiles and carpet that made up the majority of the area, replaced now by a simple one-level, much sleeker looking floor. Boy, if that old carpet could only talk; I'm sure it saw a whole lot during the Piere's days.

There's also a new ticket window near the main entrance, so you no longer have to enter the facility to purchase tickets for a show. Sounds like a pretty quick and easy process, and it's open weekdays from noon

As of now, Crooner's is open nightly, Club Phoenix opens on the weekends and the main room is open during concerts. Ownership did inform me, however,

But amongst all the upgrades, probably one of the biggest changes is that the concerts will now be allages. Say what? Yes, the majority of the concerts are now all-ages, though minors under the age of 14 must be accompanied by an adult. If you are of age, then all you'll need is an ID and a wristband to consume alcohol.

Think about all those great shows that have appeared on the Million Dollar Stage over the years that you couldn't see because you weren't of age or couldn't find a sitter. Now you can just bring the rock

This is going to be a much different concert experience for us all, but it's way cool for the underagers who have missed out on some good ones. Plus, it might mean these shows are going to sell out quicker, so you won't want to hesitate on purchasing tickets in the future.


All in all, it looks like we're in for some positive things not only with The Hub. Find your way to "the hub" of the city soon and get this place hopping again.

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

Two years ago, the Pink Floyd tribute act Pink Droyd teamed up with members of their philharmonic orchestra perform program called "No Strings Attached" for fans eager to hear their favorite Floyd



tunes set to strings. This year they're returning to C2G Music Hall, Saturday, November 12 for another chance to perform the music of Pink Floyd in a way most listeners have never heard. Dubbed "Restrung," the show will bring together all the fun elements of a live Pink Floyd show but with the added bonus of elegant accompaniment. Think good old rock n' roll dressed up in a coat and tails.

Pink Droyd formed when a few friends got together to play a Pink Floyd tribute set at the venue formerly known as Piere's. Riding the wave of that magical night, the dudes eventually decided to devote their time to the music of Roger Waters, Nick Mason, Syd Barret, Richard Wright and David Gilmour. The rest is cover band history.

Together the members of Pink Droyd – Kevin Quandt (lead vocals, guitar, voice box), Daniel Fisher (synthesizers), Mike Lennon (lead guitar), Nick Talevski (drums), Tim Hoffher (bass) and Brooke Hills (vocals) – can boast 50 years worth of covering Pink Floyd's most popular and even most obscure hits for audiences all over the country.

In the past, they've recreated a number of magical Floyd moments like their bizarrely beautiful "Live at Pompeii" concert (in Pink Floyd's case, played to an empty amphitheater) and *Dark Side of the Moon* in its entirety, combining musical mastery with visual effects aimed at transporting Pink Floyd devotees back to the original and most celebrated days of the British prog rock legends.

And why not, when your job is to celebrate the experimentation of one of the world's most experimental bands, add a few strings to the mix? That's a rhetorical question, by the way. Kind of like, "Is there anybody in there?".

You might know them best for their early 90s hits, "Seventeen," "Headed for a Heartbreak" and "Can't Get Enough." You might also know them as one of America's steamiest glam-metal groups, famous for bringing the heat both to their songs and the small screen by way of bordering-on-explicit music videos. Or maybe what comes to mind is Fred Durst announcing in the Korn song, "All in the Family," that Winger is Korn frontman Jonathan Davis's favorite band.

Regardless, Winger – Kip Winger (vocals, bass). Reb Beach (guitar), Rod Morgenstein (drums), Paul Taylor (keys) and John Roth (guitar) – understood sexy way before Justin Timberlake could even think of bringing it back, and they'll be at Sweetwater Sound Wednesday, November 16 for a free concert showcasing their unique contributions to the work of hard and progressive rock, as well as the power of the Bose F1 system.

If you were under the impression that Winger broke up long ago, you aren't wrong exactly. Kip and company did indeed part ways in 1994, but they came together again both in 2001 and 2006 for reunion tours and have actually been performing as Winger for the past 10 years. In 2014, they put out *Better Days Comin*', their follow-up to 2009's *Karma*.

The thing about Winger, besides, of course, their hair, is their insistence on for-real musicianship in the face of ridicule from shows like *Beavis and Butt-head* and *King of the Hill* and Metallica's Lars Ullrich, who throws a dart at a Kip Winger poster in the video for "Nothing Else Matters."

"That is why it's the great irony that we ended up on that geeky guy's shirt on *Beavis & Butt-head*," Kip Winger said in response to Ullrich's stunt. "Because Metallica couldn't play what we play; they couldn't do it. They literally, technically, couldn't do it. And I'll challenge those chumps to that any day of the week, but we could play their music with our hands tied behind our back."

Can't get enough of them fighting words.

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## The Going Back Never Stops

The first cause of a heavy sigh of ennui is in the title of *Jack Reacher: Never Go Back*.

Never go back?

That's what studios and stars spend a lot of time doing these days. This is the second time Tom Cruise has played Jack Reacher, and the movie landscape is rife with good guys who need to be on their own to get the job done. Novelists too. Lee Child has written 20 best-selling Jack Reacher books. How many more will spawn films?

Jack Reacher: Never Go Back is a serviceable enry into the world of good guys righting wrongs. There is enough humor to leaven the violence. I don't have the baggage of being a fan of the novels (just a nice way to say I've never read them) and only a sometime fan of Mr. Cruise. The movie plays out in a very predictable way, neither surprising nor too lame.

The movie begins with Reacher (as everyone calls him) single-handedly rounding up a gang of human traffickers, beating up some roughnecks and calling in the corrupt sheriff to the military police officer who holds the job he held before he walked away from the

He likes the way Major Susan Turner sounds on the phone, chatting him up with a spunky mix of charm and smack. He promises to drop by for a visit the next time he is in Washington. She has made such an im-



pression that he is soon on a bus headed her way.

Upon arrival he learns that she has been relieved of duty and arrested, charged with espionage. He is sure she's not the type to commit such crimes and starts nosing around. His first lead comes from Sgt. Leach (Madalyn Horcher) who helps out at key moments throughout the film.

Reacher shames Major Turner's attorney into digging a little deeper, and that gets him murdered. Reacher is charged with the murder. As he is being booked and incarcerated, he breaks out and takes Major Turner with him in a sweet, slick sequence.

We learn in this sequence that Major Turner is not just a desk jockey. Colbie Smulders (The Avengers and How I Met Your Mother) has trained for this role. She looks buff and keeps up – as she is supposed to as Cruise's female counterpart.

There are forces at work to frame both Turner and Reacher. Reacher wants to clear them both. Turner

## Dr. Strange Soars; Arrival Arrives

Tops at the Box: As expected, Marvel's Doctor Strange, starring Benedict Cumberbatch and directed by Scott Derrickson, took the No. 1 spot at the U.S. box office, selling a solid \$85 million in the U.S. over its first three days of release. The movie has already made \$325 million worldwide. Reviews have been very mixed, but New York Times critic Manohla Dargis liked it, and she's usually very reliable. Everything appears to be in its right place for this one, so I find it hard to believe that it's a bad movie. Maybe not the classic so many thought it was going to be, but likely very entertaining and impressive. At this point Marvel is making, if nothing else, beautifully produced films. And I suppose highly profitable films, too. Look for Doctor Strange to keep making the big bucks for a few weeks as we shift into the awards season releas-

Also at the Box: Mike Mitchell's Trolls opened big, selling \$45 million over its first three days of release in the U.S. The movie sold an additional \$104 million abroad, absolutely guaranteeing that we will see a Trolls 2. Yay. Taking the No. 3 spot at last weekend's U.S. box office was Mel Gibson's supposedly very good Hacksaw Ridge which sold \$14.5 million over its first weekend. Tyler Perry's Boo! A Madea Halloween took the No. 4 spot at the U.S. box, selling another \$7.8 million while bringing the movie's 17-day U.S. sales total to \$65 million. Surprise, surprise – the film has made less than \$1 million abroad. Boo! could very well end up being Perry's No. 2 alltime selling film behind *Madea Goes to Jail*. I wonder when Perry's New Year's film will come out. I wonder how many times I've typed the name "Tyler Perry' since I started writing this column eight years ago.

Rounding out last weekend's Top 5 was Inferno which sold \$6.3 million over its second weekend. Ouch, talk about a sharp decline. The movie, which cost Sony \$75 million to make, has so far only sold \$26 million in the U.S. But who cares? The movie, like just about any Tom Hanks movie, is on its way to


crossing the \$200 million mark in abroad sales.

Also of note, *Moonlight* continued to sell strong, selling another \$1.3 million despite playing in on just 83 screens last weekend, upping the flick's 17-day total to over \$3 million. Amazing, considering the budget of the film, the marketing A24 has done and how hard it's been to get a ticket. Nearly every screening of the film thus far has sold out or come close to selling out. This is what we call a phenomenon. Hopefully the movie goes wide before the end of the year and ends up as part of the Oscar race conversation. I'm sure the Big Brains at A24 have a plan in place.

New This Week: Well it's finally here, Denis Villeneuve's Arrival, starring Amy Adams, Jeremy Renner, Forest Whitaker and Michael Stuhlbarg. This is the one that the critics have been waiting for. Villeneuve made a name for himself with the excellent 2013 film Prisoners. Then in 2015, with Sicario, he became one of the most exciting film directors currently working. Arrival is not just Villeneuve finally getting the budget and cast he deserves, but his first big stab at a Best Director nomination. Looks really, really promising.

Also out is ensemble comedy Almost Christmas, starring Danny Glover, Gabrielle Union, Omar Epps, Romany Malco and Mo'Nique. Looks very cute and funny. And finallly we have thriller Shut In, starring Naomi Watts. This one has been getting some great reviews. Oh, and last but not least, Paul Verhoeven's Elle, starring ScreenTime favorite Isabelle Huppert, will start to play in New York and Los Angeles. Looks very promising, and like a new chapter in Verhoeven's very interesting career.

Gibb's own vocals are occasionally reminiscent of his falsetto lead on songs like "Stayin' Alive," but his 70-year-old voice is understandably unwilling to consistently go where it was able to go 40 years ago. Instead, he stays more often in the husky range of "How Deep Is Your Love," and he achieves a warbling vibrato that brings to mind Aaron Neville more than vintage Barry Gibb.

Stylistically, *In the Now* hangs out in a middle ground that is nowhere near as fresh as the Bee Gees' mastery of disco felt all those years ago. "Star Crossed Lovers" is a strings-enhanced ballad that plays it safe, and "Grand Illusion" is even safer pop. "Home Truth Song" is built around an acoustic guitar, and Gibb unfortunately flirts with a country-style twang in his vocal.

Gibb has said that *In the Now* emerged not so much from his desire to do a solo project, but the realization that his brothers were no longer around to make music with. That's a powerful place from which to begin writing songs, and when Gibb strips down his delivery on "The Last Goodbye" and "End of the Rainbow," the pathos is almost unbearable. A cynic might argue that it's manipulative, but a kinder heart would admit that a guy like Gibb deserves just such a moment at this point in his life. (*Evan Gillespie*)

#### Videodrones

#### Mondo Ferox

When I listen to Videodrones' excellent new record, Mondo Ferox, I'm instantly transported back to my youth. Mondo Ferox is an instrumental LP that elicits woozy, seedy and



dark nostalgia for a generation of folks that grew up watching their horror and sci-fi films via videotapes and VCRs. It's an LP of analog synth that is used to create scenes of bleeding colors, hallucinogenic disarray and glassy-

eyed indifference, a Betamax psychosis that wraps your brain in miles of seedy videotape and you emerge from it wanting more and more. *Mondo Ferox* is the soundtrack to a youth forged on dusty videotapes and late nights in front of the TV.

It's no surprise that El Paraiso Records is behind this release. Jakob Skott's *Doppler* and Jonas Munk's *Absorb/Fabric/Cascade* are two of the best synth records released in the last few years that more people should know about. If you're at all familiar with *Doppler*, then you'll feel right at home inside Videodrones' warm, gooey world of bubbling, hazy synth structures. Each piece is built around the idea of a scene.

"Main Titles," "Blood Brew" and "Helena Markos" blip and beep like the score to some lost sci-fi flick you found buried under an inch of dust on the back wall of some crumbling video store. "Theme From Mondo Ferox" is all sweaty menace, something you might have heard on a 16mm film from Abel Ferrara you'd find hidden in a cardboard box underneath some old Fangoria mags. "Dødssmitten Fra Mars" is reminiscent of Brian Gascoigne's underrated Phase IV score, as is the excellent "Moebius Run." On "Moebius Run," Videodrones seem to capture both Italian horror cinema and 8-bit video game music as well – a combination of Castlevania and Bobby Beausoleil's Lucifer Rising score. "Stalker State" becomes a gateway to some long lost world, a world that latchkey kids would remember all too well.

Mondo Ferox is an ode to late night videos, hazy basement viewings and the sometimes heady scores that accompanied those flicks. Videodrones have tapped into something far deeper than just nostalgia. They've re-imagined the sickly, sleepy 3 a.m. movie binge that I know all too well. And I imagine some of you may know it as well. Put on some headphones, drop the needle, and let Mondo Ferox mess with your psyche a bit.

And remember to be kind, please rewind. (John Hubner)

wants more. Two of her men were killed in Afghanistan, on assignment for her. She wants their killers brought to justice.

The bad guys are a mix of private contractors, a Blackwater type company and active military officers gone greedy. They are personified by a particularly nasty mercenary known only as "the hunter," a suitably creepy Patrick Heusinger.

What makes "the hunter" so dangerous is that, for him, getting Reacher becomes personal. And Reacher has an unforeseen complication. He may be the father of a 16-year-old girl. Her mother has filed paperwork with the Army to collect back child support.

Samantha (Danika Yarosh) does seem like a chip off the old block. She's full of attitude and has the same loner pose. By the end of the movie, "the hunter" is chasing Sam through the streets of New Orleans while a Halloween parade crowds the streets. The fighting between Reacher and "the hunter" gets ugly and brutal.

More enjoyable is the interplay between Sam, Reacher and Major Turner. *Jack Reacher: Never Look Back* is directed by Edward Zwick. Before he collaborated with Cruise on *The Last Samurai* or directed Glory and Blood Diamond, Zwick and his frequent collaborator, Marshall Herskovitz, created the series thirtysomething. They are two of the screenwriters for this film along with Richard Wenk (*The Magnificent* 7.)

When Reacher and Turner are debating how to handle Sam, or Turner is bemoaning the sexist treatment she feels Reacher is serving up as the latest in a long line of unfair treatment by male officers, the ghosts of *thirtysomething* are present. Reacher and Turner sound a bit like Hope and Michael bickering. If you squint a little they even look like movie star versions of Ken Olin and Mel Harris.

Reacher and Turner aren't as whiny as Hope and Michael, and they don't dig too deeply into issues of sexism, but the female presence does keep the film from just being one shoot 'em up after another.

Jack Reacher: Never Look Back will spend time at second run theaters and eventually land in a comfy cable rotation. Unless you are looking for a mildly diverting PG-13 entertainment, you can wait and see it for a low to no ticket price.

## afO Takes a Whimsical Turn

After its first production of the 2016-17 season, Freud's Last Session, all for One took a wide left turn, bringing a much more inter-generational and whimsical tale to its stage at the ArtsLab black box. Freud, while providing some genuine laughs, was a pretty intense look at some big issues - war, fear, love of country and belief in God. With its second show of the year, The Wind in the Willows, afO has moved sharply into an iconic children's tale, replete with animal characters which sweetly and humorously jab at all too human foibles.

For those who have never read the book (guilty,

unfortunately), the story unfolds in gentle fashion, with some unlikely heroes and perhaps completely likely villains. The anti-hero of the piece, Toad, is a funny and flawed character, and it is his redemption which the story puts at its center. The performance of Toad is cru-

cial to the success of the overall outcome, and Jadon Moore is more than up to the challenge. There is no call for nuance or subtlety in the portrayal of the braggadocious Toad, and Moore just lets it fly. From his puttering sounds which reveal his love of motor vehicles to his playfully mischievous facial expressions,

Moore gives Toad personality to spare. Even as his faithful friends - Badger, Mole and Rat - attempt to tame his bad behavior, it's hard not to root for him to remain troublesome.

The supporting "animals" also provide plenty of fun. Dennis Nichols, husband of Lauren Nichols and


> co-founder of afO, brings amusing gravitas to the role of Badger while Stacey Kuster, chief administrator for afO, provides a great moral compass as Mole. But its Ruth Fearnow as Rat who, with an Emma Thompson-like charm, comes the closest to stealing the stage from the delightful Toad. Her

characterization almost makes one want to root for a rat, and that's saying a mouthful.

Another delightful aspect of the show, at least for those who read the program in advance, is understand-

## Dickens' *Carol* Timely as Ever

Though the weather is a little balmy for it, it really is time to grab a stake of holly and queue up to see the Fort Wayne Civic Theatre's production of A Christmas Carol - The Musical. This is a familiar story nearly everyone has seen on stage, in the movies and on television. A Christmas Carol is possibly the most familiar story about the celebration of Christmas holidays. The originator of the tale, Charles Dickens, wrote this novella mainly because he was broke, and it became one of his best-beloved stories, as a redemptive tale of Ebeneezer Scrooge, a miser who discovers

his love of money has nearly ruined his life. A timely story.

Dickens' dark tale is lightened considerably in this version, with music from Disney composer Alan Menken, but there are still some creepy apparitions and cautionary visions of the past and future. As Scrooge is terrorized by Jacob Marley and his quartet of ghosts, one young theater-goer cried, "Daddy!" I remember

needing the comfort of my daddy's arms long ago as we watched this story.

But Scrooge deserves what he gets! Scott Rumage's Scrooge is delightfully cranky and horrible, yet wise enough to recognize that he must learn from his

The rest of the cast weaves in and out of the story, all playing many characters. Look for Ennis Brown II who, as Marley's ghost, adds a smidgen of Bob to his Jacob. He is equal parts doom and beauty.

In this version, we learn a particular reason for Scrooge's parsimony: He remembers the destruction of his boyhood under crushing debt. Yet the Ghost of

Christmas Past, played by Charity Rankin, doesn't excuse him. "The memories of the past are what they are," she says. "Don't blame me." Rankin, as well as the other Ghosts of Christmas, played by Tim Miles and Daisy Paroczy Hickey, are all singers and dancers

as well as actors.

Other standouts include Brock Ireland as a merry Mr. Fezziwig, Tyler Hanford, as Scrooge's kind nephew Fred and the trio of Rich Laudeman, Gary Bugge and Robert Doerr in various roles. A tiny, but moving role of motherless Grace Smythe is filled with the sweet, heart-rending voice of Ella Nagel.

A Christmas Carol is a feast for the eyes, with enormous, yet mobile sets and fantastic lighting courtesy of technical designers Corey Lee and Adam Fletcher. Stage Manager Michelle Purcell and her tech team of Tala Munsterman and Clarence F. Tennis III make the effects thrilling.

All of the people involved in A Christmas Carol are wonderfully chosen and generationally diverse. It's really easy to imagine Victorian England as we see the privileged wealthy brushing against the truly poor and down-trodden. It is a society made up of the haves and have nots. One singer comments that "Charity is

ing what a family production it truly is - and not just for the audience. With Kuster's daughter playing Otter and the Nichols' granddaughter Lucy playing Little Portly, it's easy to imagine how much fun rehearsals were as well. Sensing the community on stage made it even more obvious how this community of animals would come together.

The amusing bad guys of the operations are, perhaps predictably, the weasels and ferrets, and while a somewhat bumbling lot, they can be more than a little creepy. For children who fear the flying monkeys in The Wizard of Oz (or grownups who have seen films like Deliverance) their arrival in the woods can be alarming. But as the story unfolds, their ineptitude

and cowardice reveals their weakness and calm is immediately restored.

Ultimately it is the direction of Lauren Nichols which really shines, and it's apparent to anyone who has seen more than one of her efforts that she can squeeze humor and humanity out of any material and that's saying something since the afO material is often remarkable. The Wind in the Willows is another excellent example of how the company finds ways to entertain while injecting just enough thought-provoking material to provide fodder for conversation days after the performance.

Truly, my service reminiscences are about the hundreds of enlisted people whose pay I straightened out, whose leaves I arranged and whose wives and mothers I kept in base housing while they were deployed. When I tell my very unsexy stories of life in uniform, those tough old dudes pipe down and their jokes get a lot more tender.

This year for Veteran's Day I'd like to remember all the young women who were not trained on high school football fields for the physical rigors of military service and who gutted out the physical training while ignoring the shouts that they were weak, they were slow, they were *not* going to hack it. Apparently, a whole bunch of us did, in fact, hack it.

We hacked it because we were motivated by the same ideology as all the guys had – we did not want to let our unit down. We wanted to learn new things and take advantage of opportunities not possible in the towns we came from. We wanted to make a difference in a tough old world.

And there were planes and ships and armored vehicles! We were invincible young women, and it was all pretty exciting. Well, except for the drudgery, of which there was plenty.

I completely enjoyed firing weapons on the range and completely hated cleaning weapons afterward. My knees ached with the running, even those thousands of years ago. But there was a real community and a shared mission that civilian life often lacks.

This year I'm traveling to Kansas City to hang out with some chicks. Well, we used to be chicks. Now I guess we're *hens*. We're going to wine and dine and tell some lies, and I'm going to bet that for one evening, even for a few short hours, all those intervening years will evaporate and we will be once again the invincible women we were in the past.

Stephen Ambrose once wrote that veterans often become builders, teachers and artists because, after seeing destruction, they desire above all things to create. Women veterans have done, and are doing, all these things. They have taken their vulnerabilities and made compassionate choices, from which the country still benefits. Yes, indeed, I love vets. They are some of the best people you'll ever know, even if you never guess they once wore the uniform and carried the gear.
