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Dressing Up for Christmas

Although heading downtown for holiday fun is now a way of life, there may be some young residents who do not remember the relatively dark days of downtown Fort Wayne. The only light to be seen downtown in fact came the night before Thanksgiving when Santa and his reindeer and the Season's Greetings wreath were all to be enjoyed downtown during the holidays. Or maybe any time of year.

That's all changed now, and the streets are alive with not only light but with activity, enthusiasm and excite-

Among the first to change the holiday landscape of Fort Wayne was the historic Embassy Theatre which in 1984 began its now traditional and beloved Festival of Trees. The largest fundraiser for the Embassy Foundation, Festival of Trees has not only been part of the revitalization of downtown and the explosion of holiday festivities in the last three decades, but it has more firmly established the Embassy as one of the city's treasures.

This year, with more than 50 trees on exhibit, Festival of Trees will open on Thanksgiving Eve as part of the city's Night of Lights and remain open through Wednesday, November 30. There are even more opportunities to visit the exhibit this year as

hours have been expanded. "There are new public evening hours this year," says Kyle Snare, special events director for the Embassy.

"On Monday, November 28 we'll be open from 5-9, and traditionally we had not been open that day on the second week.'

As part of the Night of Lights celebration, the trees will be on display to the public for the first time. Additionally, Fort Wayne Komets mascot Ice Eagle will be

visiting as well as characters from popular CW programs, a Festival of Lights first. That evening will also feature the unveiling of the Harrison Street window displays which is now part of a larger effort to feature decorated windows as Fort Wayne famously did many years ago. In addition to the Embassy windows, other downtown businesses will join the theater and feature decorated windows of their own, bringing back the full nostalgia of Wolf & Dessauer's heyday.

Of course, Santa and Mrs. Claus are prominently featured at the Festival of Trees. Although the annual Breakfast with Santa always sells out immediately, there are other plentiful opportunities to get your list to the jolly old fellow. This is the second year of the new décor for Santa's area, and visitors will be treated to not only audience with the chief executive of Christmas, but might score a candy cane along the way.

Snare also promises entertainment on the Embassy's iconic stage, which will include those visitors from CW as well as the Fort Wayne Children's Choir on Wednesday, November 30. There will also be a visit from Fort Wayne's Sister City in the form of the Taizhou Opera.

As for the trees themselves, you can expect a return of the popular Wells Fargo Money Tree, a refurbishing of the TinCaps tival because it just grows larger and larger each vear.

"We had record-breaking attendance last year at over 20,000 - actually it was 22, 210. Our numbers have been slowly increasing since 2008 when the economy was down, going up hundreds and thousands each year since then. We're hoping to top 22,000 again this year."

> "This is my fourth Festival of Trees, and I had been working with Barb Richards the last few years," he says, referring to the Embassy's former marketing director who left this year to become program director for the local CW affiliate.

"We usually hit a lull in special events, which is my area, around April and May which is when we can start really focusing on Festival of Trees. But we're already reaching out to people about next year's Fes-

Snare says seeing all of that happen has been rewarding.

"I love watching it all take shape," he says. "It's great to work with the sponsors and see them all become part of it. It's exciting to see the decorations go up. In two short days, it goes from being a building with no decorations to be a fully decorated building. It's such a great tradition and such a part of our holiday wonderment. It was so exciting to experience it the first time and to watch it all unfold. It's amazing to see a year's worth of work unfolding in just two days time."

For many years, that night before Thanksgiving has been an opportunity to gather downtown to watch the lights go up on another magical holiday season. The sense of community has always been palpable as residents of Fort Wayne stood together to usher in another month-plus of revelry, but for many years it was just a lighting ceremony (and perhaps an excuse to grab some Coney dogs downtown).

Now, of course, it's become that and so much more. As Festival of Trees began adding to the celebration in the 1980s, the activities downtown that night and the weeks that follow have grown exponentially. With the Downtown Improvement District overseeing much of those plans and partnering with businesses and organizations down-

town to engage the entire community, the eve of Thanksgiving has become one of the busiest in Fort Wayne's annual calendar.

"Every year we get more entertainment, and every year it gets better and better," says Frank Howard, marketing director for DID. "We try to make it the most engaging experience possible for our partners, and

depending on weather, we get anywhere from 15,000 to 25,000 down here for the festivities."

Even if your schedule doesn't allow you to attend the lighting ceremony and all the fun that can be had on ThanksSmall Business Saturday as a means of encouraging people to shop local businesses and include them in your holiday spending.

The Holly Trolley shopping day brings people downtown and provides trolley rides to those who want to visit the shops downtown, on West Main and along the Wells Street corridor. With many new shops opening just this past year, as growth in the downtown and surrounding regions continues, that Saturday is a great chance to visit both old and new places to find those special gifts. And since the Last Saturday of each month offers additional activities downtown, there will be plenty to do in addition to shopping that day, and it's all just a trolley ride away. (As an added bonus, the first 200 shoppers will receive a special gift tote for their effort.)

"This year we have a huge business

participation for Holly Trolley," says LeMay. "It's probably a good idea to visit our website to plan your attack because it just grows and grows each year. We're trying to make it better each year logistically, and now that there are even more shops opening downtown we have really robust participation. Even more than last year.'

Among other highlights of Holiday Fest will be the Festival of Trains at Science Central and the Twelve Days of Christmas at the Botanical Conservatory. There will also be ice

Growth & Change

The life of a long-running band can in some ways mirror that of a person. There are good times and hard times, challenges and changes. For local favorite Walkin' Papers, who have been building up a considerable local following for decades, 2016 may well be remembered as a watershed year.

The first thing that made this year really stand out for the band was the release of their first album of originals, *Paper Cuts*. Traditionally a cover band that has its feet firmly planted in the classic rock tradition while nonetheless branching out to play more esoteric fare, the band stretched into a new role as songwriters for *Paper Cuts*. The process of writing and recording stretched out over several years and wasn't entirely continuous, as the band's members worked on it whenever they had the chance.

"The writing really took [place] over a few years, just with different ideas coming up and we would build on them when we had time," says vocalist Perry Lifsey. "And then, within the last six months before we actually went in and recorded the album was when we started getting really serious about getting arrangements down and honing the songs to where we really wanted them to be. And there were probably three or four songs on the album that weren't even written until the last few months before we actually went in and started recording."

The album found the band centered in classic bluesy rock mode while still stretching out into different genres like punk and even some reggae. So far it's been well-received by the band's fans. During a typical set, the band will work in three or four of their originals which are met with enthusiasm by the crowd. They even get play requests for their songs on occasion. With the success of the album, the possibility exists that the band may continue writing and recording original music.

"We have a few ideas, kind of carried over from when we were writing the first album that we might explore a little bit farther," says Lifsey. "I think probably within the next year or so we'll be writing some more and get some more ideas down. It also depends on the lineup and how much interest everybody has in doing it, but I would certainly be interested in doing some more writing and see if we can outdo ourselves."

The album wasn't the only thing to shake up the band this year, though. For about four months, their guitarist Devron Conroy had to take a leave of absence due to carpal tunnel syndrome. The band had to take the unusual step of canceling a few shows and scrambling to find someone to fill in for Conroy. Fortunately, he was able to get treatment and return to the stage. But there was also a silver lining in that the temporary guitarist, longtime Ft. Wayne player Gary "Meatball" McMeekin, ended up joining the band permanently; Walkin' Papers is now a five-piece with two guitarists.

The addition of McMeekin wasn't the last shakeup for the year, however. The band is now in its final months with bassist and founding member Joe Svec who will retire at the end of this year. Svec started the band with drummer Jerry Miller, but their shared history predates Walkin' Papers; the two have been playing together since the 60s.

"[Svec] is in his 60s now, and I think he's just, he's ready to hang it up," Lifsey said.

As Svec's time with the band nears its end, they have started to look for replacements, although no decisions have been made yet.

"We've got a couple of hopefuls," Lifsey says. "We've had a couple of jams with other guys, and we haven't zeroed in on anyone just yet, but it's looking promising."

This year may have brought some changes and difficulties to the band, but as a group they're nowhere near ready to call it quits. After all, the band has been steadily building up a following by playing regular gigs for many years.

"Well, we work hard and we get songs down really tight, but I think in addition to that we just have a good time while we're playing. We have a lot of fun playing together just naturally, and I think that comes across on stage and people pick up on that," Lifsey says. "I think as long as the people

Serving Up Music

When plans were first taking shape for Fort Wayne's minor league baseball team to move from their stadium adjacent to the Memorial Coliseum and begin playing at a new

downtown, there was plenty of controversy and debate. Now a decade later some of that division has subsided as the downtown area has grown not only to include more businesses but to embrace more events than ever before. But the transition was not without some casualties, and those changes have sometimes brought on surprising developments, particularly for Corey Rader and John Commora-

"When plans were being made for the new baseball

stadium, both John and I had our houses purchased so it could be built," says Corey Rader. "We both had to find new places to live."

Rather fortuitously, and definitely evidence that fate can take some unexpected turns, their mutual effort to find new homes in the downtown area led to not only those two separate purchases but also one shared investment: the Brass Rail on Broadway. Rader, a native of Fort Wayne who graduated from Homestead 25 years ago and has worked for Kapp's Green Lawn since high school, was suddenly a bar owner with no previous experience.

"I went from working one full-time job to having another part-time job," says Rader. "I had no experience in owning a club, just a love of music. But we kept the same staff, and they were all trustworthy people who had been there for years. The bar business is a partnership with the staff, and if the staff is good, the bar does better."

Over the years the Brass Rail has become known for its stage as much as its drinks, and both local bands and some national acts have found audience at the Rail. As a music fan, Rader has enjoyed his firsthand look at all the talent that has come through the door.

"I've enjoyed meeting all the musicians, and there's a new crop of local bands every three or four years. I like seeing all the new bands, and some of them have helped us bring in some of their favorite bands from out of town. There have been a ton of bands, and it's great to bring in some of the up and coming bands that wouldn't otherwise have a place to play in Fort Wayne."

With a capacity of 180, the Brass Rail has developed its own unique niche in the

area. Smaller than some of the stages which require big names, but larger than some bars and venues that host local bands and open mic events, the club has enjoyed a devoted core of customers and music lovers who can find something different on the Brass Rail stage. That has put

them in line to partner for some events that are putting Fort Wayne in a good position to capitalize on the city's reputation for great music.

"We got involved in Middle Wayes this year

"We got involved in Middle Waves this year which was a good kick-start to revitalizing music in Fort Wayne," says Rader. "I was happy to donate time to that and will gladly do that again. It was a nice side project."

Rader's lowkey demeanor suggests someone who is unflappable, but he says that this

chapter in his life was definitely unexpected and that he knows better than most how life can hand you a few surprises.

"I'm pretty much the poster boy for what can happen in life. It never would have occurred to John or me that we'd be owning a bar together. When we sold our homes to make way for the baseball stadium, it was a catalyst for everything that's happened since. We'd both lived down there since we were kids, but downtown was a ghost town back then. It's great now to see so many people downtown and all the new buildings and places and things to do.

"Obviously no one wants to have to be forced to sell their home, and I understand somewhat why people were upset during all of that, but we were living in a circle with nothing inside of it. Now those of us who live downtown have a little bit of everything around us. People who live downtown can live in a nice 100-year-old home that's affordable and have access to all these restaurants and things to do."

Rader says that owning the Brass Rail can be difficult in many ways. He and Commorato have been friends most of their lives, but it can still be a challenge to be on the same page with a business partner all the time. He also juggles two demanding jobs and a home life (he and his wife have no kids but do have a couple of dogs) which leaves little time for relaxation.

"I have one of these modern work schedules where I basically work seven days a week," he says. "I'm lucky that my bosses at Kapp's are really great and I'm not really punching a clock. My schedule is a bit flex-

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

who are coming to see you know that you're having a good time, they're gonna respond the same way; they're gonna have a good time too. As long as people are having fun when they come out to see us, chances are they're gonna want to come and see us again."

For Walkin' Papers, that fun factor isn't just what gets the crowd moving and what earns them their fan base. It's also what continues to motivate them after playing together for years on end. And it's that enjoyment that carries them through a year of landmarks and lineup changes.

"We have such a good time just performing, even just getting together for rehearsals is a blast," says Lifsey. "I've been in a few bands over the years, but I've never had as much fun with a band as I have with this one. It's just been a total blast the whole way. So, I mean, even through the tough times we have enough fun together that we can work through the tough stuff. Keep us going. I think that drives us more than anything else is just to continue staying out there and having fun. And the people, the people who come out to see us, friends and family that are regular fans that come out to almost every show. And that's really part of what drives us."

ible, but if you look at my rest to work ratio, it's probably not a really healthy situation. But I'm trying to work when I want to."

Part of his payment for that extra effort is in seeing live music and new bands as they come into the Brass Rail. For someone who admits he couldn't play an instrument and couldn't make a drink, owning a bar may have been a big departure, but it's also given him a new outlet for his passion for music.

"I used to go to a lot of shows, some of them locally, but also in places like Bloomington or Indianapolis or Chicago. And it got to be pretty expensive. The Brass Rail had done shows before we bought it, but for a while it had been empty of music. I love that we have so many bands coming here to play, and I'm always trying to find that next band and get them in here on their way up. I'm sure we could make more money if we had karaoke or booked 90s music in here every night, but I'm trying to get people to try something they haven't tried before. I think we've found the right audience, and those are the people we're trying to reach."

Red Fang

Only Ghosts

I've been digging into the Red Fang discography for the last few days, ever since I picked up their newest album, *Only Ghosts*, on the always trusty Relapse Records. I have to say, with the exception of a few songs, I'm not all that moved by these Portland stoner rockers. I'd heard the track "Cut It Short" and was im-



pressed. I'd listened to a song here and there over the last few years and was never driven to dig deeper. I thought maybe this new album might be my gateway into the world of Red Fang.

Not so much. The new album is the same as the older albums: you get big riffs, occasional Mastodon-like growling, High On Firelite doom and a guitar sound that seems rooted in Foo Fighters' *One by One*. None of these things are bad, really. I just prefer my metal with a little more bite, less bark.

Before the haters start hating, let me say that I think Red Fang are a damn good band. There's enough variety in their songs to satisfy the stoner, hesher and closeted metal head in everybody. If you're looking for a metal band to play in the family van on a trip to the store that's not going to destroy impressionable young minds, then I think you'd be safe with Red Fang. And these guys seem genuinely fun. Just watch any of their videos and you can see they don't take themselves all that seriously. The only trouble with that is after a while it's hard to take them seriously at any level. Without that element of danger in metal, what's the point?

Only Ghosts is the tightest album Red Fang have delivered thus far. Ross Robinson produced the band this time around, and he gave their sound a nice, chromed-out sheen. There's nary a spot on this record that isn't shipshape and pristine, just the way Robinson likes his well-produced albums to be. "Cut It Short" is a fun chunk of pop metal that riff-wise sounds like one of Dave Grohl's forays into the darker, heavier sides of his musical personality. "Shadows" is another big riff rocker that sounds rooted in Queens of the Stone Age's Songs for the Deaf sound. "The Smell of the Sound" wallows in more sludgy doom territory, with both the melodic and growling vocals that go back and forth. "Living In Lye" is an angry headbanger that closes the record out with over six minutes of vocal belting and speed metal riffage.

The thing is, besides a sonic cleansing from Robinson, we're not that far off from Red Fang's self-titled debut. That album's "Prehistoric Dog" was a fun stoner rock anthem that sounded to be as influenced by "Detroit Rock City" as it was "Devilution," I think it was also a more honest sound for Red Fang. There seems to be more metal posturing going on than actual metal mayhem on *Only Ghosts*. Maybe that's intentional; I don't know. The self-titled album and *Murder the Mountains* found a decent balance between having a good time and melting faces with killer riffs. It was pretty much the same grind the whole way through, but it was a fun ride. *Whales and Leeches* seemed more of the same, and now with *Only Ghosts* the tread on those mags is starting to wear a bit too much.

Only Ghosts is a solid record to play as you annihilate a case of Red Stripes with some pals, or to listen to on the ride to Low Bob's Discount Tobacco for a pack of Winstons. If you're good with that, then party on, Wayne. (John Hubner)

Goat *Requiem*

Listening to Goat's new epic album, *Requiem*, one gets the feeling of coming across some jovial dance party in the Shire. Big-footed hobbits drinking goblets of some fermented fruit as they succumb to the groovy sounds of Goat. *Requiem* could also pass for the soundtrack to a new Wes Anderson movie at




times – playful and giddy enough to coat an Anderson scene with just enough punch and chutzpah as to give the oddball protagonist some serious cool (think the bee scene in *Rushmore* scored by "A Quick One, While He's Away"). Goat have already established themselves as expert purveyors of psych/folk rock on their first two records, but

Bauhaus

In the Flat Field (1980)

I'm not sure when I heard Bauhaus for the very first time. In high school, when the Gothpunk era was in its infancy, I had some friends of friends who were into the scene. This was the debut album from a group based out of Northampton, England, and the critics hated



it. The kids, however, couldn't get enough of this band – and the genre it helped ignite at the beginning of the decade.

The album opens with "Double Dare," a track that hums away with a fuzzy guitar behind the catatonic vocals from Peter Murphy. It was punk music that was decelerated, yet heavy enough to grab the metal kids, and we liked it. The title track grabs you as well with its post-punk flavor and the schizophrenic guitars from Danny Ash. Dark and gloomy, it's like Henry Rollins fronting a crappy Black Sabbath cover band. "Dive" is two minutes of guitar-driven punk which takes you into the somber half-speed "The Spy in the Cab."

Side two picks up the eccentricity with "Small Talk Stinks." Still touching the punk sound from the late 70s, it meanders around some harmonies and trippy Goth vocals. And "St. Vitus Dance" has all of the post-punk qualities that David Bowie crafted, albeit from a different place.

My favorite track on the release has to be "Stigmata Martyr." Relying on guitar hooks and Murphy's shadowy vocals, the song is a great introduction to the genre; you can see where bands like the Cure, Marilyn Manson, Nine Inch Nails and Tool were influenced. Goth music followed Bauhaus, and the scene was exceptionally relevant throughout the 80s and early 90s.

Bauhaus recorded four more albums and reformed briefly in 2006. The scene again flickered, but in my opinion it died when Rozz Williams (frontman for Christian Death) tragically hung himself in 1998. (*Dennis Donahue*)

here they've doubled down by giving us a double album teeming with the pastoral and the gritty, pop confections and spectral psych. These masked Swedish psych freaks have laid out the map to enlightenment here. We best be getting on our way.

Goat never shied away from getting lost in the groove on their previous efforts, 2012's *World Music* and 2014's *Commune. Requiem* proves to be no different, and that's a very good thing. The heavy acoustic mix here grounds these songs firmly into an organic world. No space explorations or intergalactic mind melting here. All the otherworldly music is retained in nature; the wet earth, loping trees and dew-covered valleys come to mind on tracks like "Union of Sun and Moon," "I Sing In Silence" and "Temple Rhythms"; while "Alarms" gets a little noisy with some Hendrix-style guitar freakouts. "Trouble in the Streets" is exuberantly fun and dance-y. It's like Bjork singing along to Rusted Root in her car on the way to pick up her kids. Thing is, the person that would stick their nose up to Goat would also be the same person sitting in front of their computer at 11:30 p.m. on a Saturday night playing Rusted Root's "Send Me on My Way" on Youtube and singing along off key (just an observation). Anyways, back to the album.

I think the most important thing to point out here is how groove-and rhythm-heavy this album is. "Goatband" is nearly eight minutes of serious heavy groove. It sounds like the E-Street band on some serious Afro-Cuban kick. "Try My Robe" is almost funky. Heavy bass, fuzzy guitar, with an eastern flair gives this track it's own little groovy world. "Goatfuzz" is just a massive jam – a glorious, heavy jam. "Goodbye" would seem to be a perfect note to end the album on, as it feels like a proper, awe-inspiring sunset on this perfect day of an album, but "Ubuntu" is the actual album closer, and it feels like waking from a dream.

Goat have spun a massive web of musical vibes on *Requiem*. It's over an hour of mystical vibes and psychedelic colors and shapes. These masked musical marauders continue to enlighten and hypnotize with their earthy brand of jangly, earthbound psych, and I don't see that changing any time soon. (*John Hubner*)

Hastings is now serving his second term as mayor.



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Real Life Ain't No Video Game

The Hike by Drew Magary, Viking 2015

If only life were a video game. Imagine how easy it would be if every obstacle you faced was a puzzle with a definite correct answer, and you were able to find all the clues you needed to solve each puzzle just by looking around you carefully. That's how video games work, but real life doesn't work that way, except in The Hike, the fantastical second novel from GQ columnist Drew Magary. The novel's protagonist sets off on an adventure that rips him away from the world and puts him on a path that has all the omi-

nous challenges - but also all of the easy

resolutions – of a game.

The hero of the story, Ben, is a businessman with a businessman's typical boring life. At the outset of the novel, he's driving deep into the Poconos of Pennsylvania for a business meeting at a secluded mountain hotel. He checks in and then wanders off down a mountain path, intending to take a short hike before his meeting. He expects nothing out of the humdrum ordinary.

Not far down the path, however, he stumbles upon something far from ordinary. At a creepy remote homestead, he encounters a pair of murderous psychopaths drawn straight from a horror movie, and as he flees from them he loses his way. The maze-like twists of the path are more confusing than they should be, and he quickly understands

that it's some strange magic that's getting him lost in the wilderness. From this lightning-quick beginning, the rest of



the novel follows Ben on his journey, as he comes upon one dream-like dilemma after another. He finds a tent occupied by a girlfriend from long ago and a quaint cottage that's home to an old woman

who seems to be from another time and place entirely. Everyone he encounters offers him hints and clues about where and how he should proceed, and he continues slogging on with their help.

The path gets stranger and stranger. Ben is forced to do battle with a giant cricket, and he befriends a talking crab. He is held captive by a menacing giantess, and he is imprisoned with an intriguing Spaniard who hails from

Through it all, like Homer's Odysseus, Ben is motivated by his desire to get back to his real life. He is driven by thoughts of his wife and children, and if he was bored by anything in the real world before, he longs for that boredom now. As his

time on the path stretches from hours into days and weeks, his need to be with his family remains strong and pushes him onward.

The Hike, if it is not already apparent from this

Hold On: The Big Stuff's Coming

Tops at the Box: In a better world this week's column would be all about how we all went and saw Arrival to kill time while waiting for the new Kenneth Lonergan film, Manchester by the Sea. But that's just my version of a better world. Maybe in your version, Marvel's Doctor Strange had a second big weekend, taking the No. 1 spot again at the U.S. box office with another \$43 million in sales. Well that's what happened. The film has now sold \$153 million in the U.S. over its first 10 days of release – \$492 million worldwide. It's a very good action film, boasting maybe the best cast we've yet seen for a comic book-based film. But hold onto your pants, guys; the best films of the years are coming and they're coming quick (more on that below).

Also at the Box: Trolls once again took the No. 2 spot at the U.S. box, selling another \$35 million and bringing the flick's 10-day sales total to \$94 million in the U.S. and \$222 million worldwide. It's almost like we only get comic book films, animated films and awful films through most of the year. The indie movies keep us going until awards season.

Taking the No. 3 spot was Denis Villeneuve's new classic, Arrival, starring Amy Adams, Jeremy Renner, Michael Stuhlbarg and Forest Whitaker. An incredible film. The movie sold a respectable \$24 million over its first three days of release and is the best film to sell big numbers in the U.S. in a long time. Go see it.

Taking the No. 4 spot at the U.S. box office was family comedy Almost Christmas which sold \$15.5 million over its first three days of release. Not bad! Look for this one to sell decent for weeks to come.



Rounding out last weekend's Top 5 was Mel Gibson's new war epic, Hacksaw Ridge, which sold another \$11 million, bringing the flick's 10-day sales total to \$32 million in the U.S. I've not yet seen the movie, but from what I've read and seen, it looks like something of a production marvel. The cast, too, is quite impressive.

Also of Note: Jack Reacher: Never Go Back, Inferno, Deepwater Horizon and Snowden all continued to flop. Oof. Even the box office failures are very watchable in most cases these days, and I think that probably applies to all these movies. Oh, and Moonlight, the year's big critical hit, continued to sell strong, selling another \$1.4 million last weekend despite playing on just 176 screens. So far the flick has sold just under \$5 million in the U.S. Look for this one to get a whole lot of Oscar nominations.

First up this week is Ang Lee's new war film, Billy Lynn's Long Halftime Walk, starring Vin Diesel, Garrett Hedlund, Steve Martin, Chris Tucker and Kristen Stewart. You had me at Chris Tucker. 



Kacey Musgraves A Very Kacey Christmas

Yes, Halloween is barely past, and, yes, it's awfully early to start listening to Christmas music. But if you're going to buy a new Christmas album this year, you need time to decide which one it's going to be. That's why a truckload of new Christmas albums hit the stores last week, among them a yuletide collection from country music's current designated rebel, Kacey Musgraves.

Don't expect much rebellion from this Christmasy confection, though. The track listing is composed of all the radio-friendly secular Christmas standards you'd ex-



Even when the album's song choices get a little weird, they usually do so in a traditionally weird way. Musgraves goes for a cutesy vibe (to which she is not well-suited) on the Chipmunks' "Christmas Don't Be Late" and "I Want a Hippopotamus for Christmas"; her version of the latter, fortunately, probably won't make you want to claw your eyes out as much as the cloying 1953 original does. Musgraves also upholds the odd traditional link between Christmas and Hawaii both with the standard "Mele Kalikimaka" and the original "A Willie Nice Christmas."

That last one is the most rebellious song on the album, not just because of its use of ukelele and Hawaiian guitar, but for its conflation of Christmas cheer and weed. Willie Nelson guest stars, of course, because he seems to be obligated to sing on every new country album these days. Here he sounds exhausted--or maybe just "higher than the angel on the top of the tree"--and the song's hook is not nearly as funny as it was no doubt intended to be.

A Very Kacey Christmas tries very hard to have more of an edge than Jennifer Nettles' To Celebrate Christmas, which is also new this week and which makes the curious choice of including only religious Christmas songs. If you're committed to remembering the reason for the season, you'll probably want to choose Nettles' offering, but if you're all about cutting against the grain, Kacey is the way to go.. description, is a long string of metaphors. As Ben struggles with each magical monster and fantasy conundrum, he reaches back to memories from his real life, to points where he faced momentous decisions or situations that would influence the direction that his life would take into the future. The implication is that things, back there in the real world, never worked out in a pat, predictable way, not in the way that they do in this game-like magical universe.

The weakness of The Hike is not so much in the predictability of its fantasy plot - anything can happen in this weird world, after all - but in its plodding pace. Magary writes with a simple surface sheen, his plainly stated plot twists marching from one to the next, and like a video game with a meandering narrative that progresses from checkpoint to checkpoint, the journey gets wearisome after a while.

Eventually, even the whirlwind magic of the fantasy land, where ravenous wolves can be conjured out of thin air, loses its thrill. By far the most compelling parts of the story are those moments of lucidity when Ben recalls the real world, and the fantasy seems dull by comparison. Perhaps, then, the point is that life really is better for not being like a video

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Then we have the major releases: sports drama Bleed for This, comedy The Edge of Seventeen and Harry Potter spin-off Fantastic Beasts and Where to Find Them, directed by the great David Yates and featuring maybe the year's best cast (Eddie Redmayne, Katherine Waterston, Ezra Miller, Colin Farrell, Samantha Morton, Jon Voight and Ron Perlman).

I'd watch the Potter flick, the Ang Lee movies or The Edge of Seventeen any weekend, but the real noteworthy releases this week are two smaller films. First up is Tom Ford's second directorial effort, Nocturnal Animals, starring Amy Adams, Jake Gyllenhaal, Michael Shannon, Isla Fisher, Laura Linney and Armie Hammer. This one looks like a new classic and is already doing very well overseas. Ford is a very talented guy.

Then, finally, we have the big one, the movie I've been anticipating more than any other this year. The movie I think could very easily snag Best Picture, Best Director, Best Screenplay, Best Actor, Best Supporting Actress and Best Supporting Actor nominations come Oscar time: Kenneth Lonergan's Manchester by the Sea, starring Casey Affleck (Best Actor), Kyle Chandler (Best Supporting Actor), Gretchen Mol, Tate Donovan and Michelle Williams (Best Supporting Actress). This is the big one, guys. Get out to the theater once it comes to town. Or go see Moonlight. Or the Potter flick. Or new teen classic The Edge of Seventeen. Or Doctor Strange. You've got options.
