In the meantime, please get out, have some fun and tell everyone you meet and greet along the way that what zup sent you.

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




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Dancing with the Tsars

American audiences are very familiar with *The Nutcracker*, as it has become a beloved piece of our annual holiday celebrations and Tchaikovsky's music the soundtrack of the season. While most cities have the opportunity to have their local ballet company stage yearly productions – and this city has the esteemed Fort Wayne Ballet to its credit – there are also companies which tour and share their own take on the classic.

When Moscow Ballet visits the Embassy Theatre on December 7, it brings not only a familiar story but its own unique, decidedly Russian take on the tale.

The cast will include a traveling corps of 40 professionals, but also features local talent in the cities that they visit.

"We begin advertising for

local students a few months before we perform in the city," says Moscow Ballet's soloist and audition director Anna Radik. "We go to different ballet schools or dance schools and find students who have at least one year of experience in ballet. Those auditions take an hour, or maybe two hours, and then we rehearse with them so they can learn the choreography. They have two or three months to rehearse before they perform. These students then fill roles like the snowflakes, the snow maidens, the mice and are in the Arabian and Chinese roles in the second act. It's a once in a lifetime experience for them to perform with a professional company."

Radik herself, who has been with Moscow Ballet for four years, performs as a parent, a snowflake and in the Arabian scene. She says the dancers do sometimes change roles, though this year she is in the same roles as last year, but with new choreography. Moscow Ballet tours regularly, not just during November and December when they perform *The Nutcracker*. They also tour with productions of *Swan Lake* and *Sleeping Beauty*. But it is this show – which they call *The Great Russian Nutcracker* – which they infuse with elements that are very much part of the Russian history and culture.

"We feature the full Tchaikovsky score and open with a large dome with the Moscow skyline," says Radik. "We also have full-size Matrushka dolls in the snow scene. A part that is exclusive to Moscow Ballet is the duet which features two dancers wearing wings, and one wing is 20 feet long. It's amazing."

Those scenes, the "Land of Peace and Harmony" (which substitutes for the "Land of Sweets" typically staged here) and "Dove

of Peace," are part of Moscow Ballet's effort to infuse the show with uniquely Russian touches. The history of *The Nutcracker* as a ballet dates back to the 19th century and very much centers itself in Russia. Moscow Ballet proudly shares this history on its website.

"The origin of The Nutcracker, a classic Christmas story, is a fairy tale ballet in two acts centered on a family's Christmas Eve celebration. Alexandre Dumas Père's adaptation of the story by E.T.A. Hoffmann was set to music by Tchaikovsky and originally choreographed by Marius Petipa. It was commissioned by the director of Moscow's Imperial Theatres, Ivan Vsevolozhsky, in 1891, and premiered a week before Christmas 1892. Since premiering in western countries in the 1940s, this ballet has become perhaps the most popular to be performed around Christmas time. The story centers on a young girl's Christmas Eve and her awakening to the wider world and romantic love. The composer made a selection of eight of the more popular pieces before the ballet's December 1892 premiere, forming what is currently known as the Nutcracker Suite, Op. 71a, as is heard in Moscow Ballet productions. The suite became instantly popular; however the complete ballet did not achieve its great popularity as a Christmas performance event until almost 100 years later."

There are a few narrative changes to that which is most familiar to American audiences, says Radik. While most productions open with the party scene, and the character of Drosselmeyer arrives as a somewhat mysterious figure, in the Moscow Ballet version, that character is established from the beginning.

"The story opens with the toy maker in his workshop, just as the book does. It is there that he prepares his wondrous toys he plans to bring to the Christmas Eve party. He wants to surprise and delight all the children at the party. From there it is the same as most shows with the party scene and the grownups dancing while the children are playing. And of course Masha – or Clara in America – falls in love with the Nutcracker Prince."

Although only with Moscow Ballet for four years, Radik brings much experience with her, especially considering how young she still is. At the tender age of 10, she was invited to attend the renowned Kiev State Opera and Ballet Theater and graduated with a diploma of distinction in 2009 with a Choreographic Teaching Degree from National Dragomanova Pedagogical University, also in Kiev. Her ability to work with very young children (the recruited cast members range in age from seven to 17) in cities around the world makes these productions of The Great Russian Nutcracker possible. There's very little rest for the weary this time of year, and Radik, when asked if they get to have a relaxing Christmas, admits that the dancers of Moscow Ballet will have to wait a little longer for a reprieve.

"In January. We will get a break in Janu-

Reviving a Holiday Tradition

Written 45 years ago, The Best Christmas Pageant Ever has long been part of our annual holiday celebrations. Particularly as a stage play, the sweet and funny story captures much of what we all love about Christ-

mas and is a traditional favorite of many. Fort Wayne's own Youtheatre made the show an annual tradition for many years, but has since pulled back, making it a less frequent piece of their annual season.

This year, however, The Best Christmas Pageant Ever is back in the rotation, largely to commemorate the book's 45th anniversary. Directing is Christopher Murphy, a longtime contributor to Youtheatre and now it's full-time director of outreach. The last time Youtheatre staged

Pageant was five years ago, and he's excited to bring the show back to the stage, this time at First Presbyterian's theater.

"This show is Youtheatre's version of The Nutcracker or A Christmas Carol," he says. "In fact, at one point I directed seven or eight of them in a row. I love doing this show in particular because, as busy and hectic as December is for everyone, this show always puts me in the Christmas spirit. I love watching all of those audiences coming in and responding to the show. It really warms my heart."

The Best Christmas Pageant Ever is such a big part of Youtheatre's history that they're adding to the celebration by actively searching through databases and social media to reconnect with the thousands of people who have been part of previous productions. A reunion, set to take place before the December 10 matinee, is sure to make this year's effort even more special.

There will also be some special reunions taking place on the stage.

"For this particular production, as a part of the anniversary celebration, I'm revisiting some of the actors that have been involved in previous Pageant's that I've directed. Every single time Janet Piercy played the lead adult role, the director who takes over after the original director has broken her leg. This time Janet is returning as the director who breaks her leg, and the other role is being played by Kimi Holmes Eckman who in my previous productions always played the lead child role.'

Murphy, who began his new position with Youtheatre in September, has spent the last five years staging and producing the Fort Wayne Philharmonic's Holiday Pops performances, and he thinks that in casting he had an objectivity which allowed him to cast a great assortment of actors of all ages.

"I think we have a great mix of Youtheatre students and people from the community," he says of a cast where the youngest performer is four years old. "I didn't know until I read their bios after I'd cast the show that it ing message."

For those who have seen the show in the past, Murphy says this year's Youtheatre presentation of The Best Christmas Pageant *Ever* has one significant difference.

"Although the book was written in the 1970s, most of the time when the show is

presented it's done as if it's taking place now. But since we're using the First Presbyterian stage and sharing it with their production of It's a Wonderful Life, it made sense to set our show in the 1940s.Obviously,their show has to take place in the 40s, so we're able to share sets and staging if we set ours in the same time. And it makes sense because it's a much different time now than it was when the book was first written. There's an innocence in children then so that the 70s are more like the


40s than they are like our modern world. It's also been a great way to talk to kids about how children would behave in 1943, how the way they might have behaved in church or those kinds of situations might have been different then than it is today. There's a different physicality, and of course we have them gathering around to listen to the radio rather than the television."

Murphy is also happy to have the First Presbyterian stage for other reasons.

"As someone who has directed on a lot of stages in this town, I think First Pres is my favorite. In terms of the stage size, it can accommodate a big cast like this. And its relation to the audience is much better because at the Embassy or even our home stage at Arts United Center some aspects of the show might be lost on the people in the back row. But here we can really bring out the nuances and subtleties which might not work on the other stages."

Fort Wayne Youtheatre is also borrowing a page from Fort Wayne Ballet's "Muttcracker" program and will this year feature adoptable dogs from Fort Wayne's SPCA as players in the show, with a table set in the lobby for visiting and possible adoption. Dubbing it "The Best Doggone Christmas Pageant Ever," Youtheatre hopes some pups will find new homes in time for the holidays. It's just one more reason that, after dozens of previous productions of The Best Christmas Pageant Ever, for Fort Wayne Youtheatre, this may indeed be the best.

"I'm excited to be part of Youtheatre full-time now after working with them for years as a freelance teacher," says Murphy. "And I really believe in this cast and am enjoying the Christmas cheer I'm already feeling as we work on this show."



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was really a mix of about 50/50 Youtheatre students and new faces. The adults are all great Fort Wayne theater vets. All of them have been very active in the area and can lead by example for the kids in the show."

The cast of 60 - which includes 20 roles which are double cast to allow the younger actors to share the load - allows Youtheatre to not only share a classic piece of holiday cheer but also provides a great education to the young actors in the show, a big part of the Youtheatre mission. While directing young children can be challenging, Murphy relishes the opportunity.

"I really am enjoying spending this much time at the holidays with this tremendous group of kids. It's really what the secular part of Christmas is all about, that joy that comes from Christmas with kids. Christmas is such a family holiday, and this show is very family-oriented too. We have siblings in the show together, and we have a mother and daughter who in the past have played mother and daughter in the show but are not playing other roles. This story is like all the best Christmas movies since it's alternately hilariously funny but also has a really touch-





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
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The Writing Fireman

In his teens, Mark R. Hunter dreamed of becoming a full-time firefighter and a best-selling author.

"By the time I was a sophomore in high school, I had a plan: I would write fiction between my shifts as a career firefighter, hit the bestseller list by age 21 and, by age 25, be writing full time from my Hawaii mansion with its all-girl staff," Hunter wrote in an email interview. "Let's remember, I was a teenage boy. I was also convinced I'd never age after 25.

Teenage dreams rarely come true, and that's probably a good thing where dreams about becoming professional video game players or a snack chip testers are concerned. "Instead, I've

Hunter said, "and fighter for 35 years," Hunter said, "and take 911 calls for a living, and don't even get me started on the 'bestselling' part."

Still, Albion resident Hunter doesn't seem at all daunted

by the lack in his life of chic Manhattan literary soirées. He has built up a regional literary renown with meteorologically themed romances, a long running if itinerant humor column and his latest book, *Hoosier Hysterical*.

Hoosier Hysterical is either a humorous history book or a historical humor book about Indiana.

There is a tradition here that used to be practiced by such authors as Will Cuppy and Richard Armour. Writers don't try to write funny history books as much as they used to, but that doesn't mean it's not worth doing.

The impetus for the book, Hunter said, was Indiana's bicentennial.

"I'd written some columns poking fun at history, and they went over well, so I got ambitious: Why not write a book poking fun at an entire state, just in time for that state's 200th birthday?" he said. "Who could possibly have a problem with that?"

It took Hunter two years to research and write *Hoosier Hysterical*, which isn't long at all in either geological or book-crafting time.

"My first history book, *Smoky Days and Sleepless Nights*, was over 25 years from conception to publication," he said. "Even elephants only carry their children for a year and a half."

Researching *Hoosier Hysterical* was "pure joy," Hunter said.

"(My wife) Emily and I roamed the state from top to bottom for two summers, filling up three camera memory cards," he said. "We especially fell in love with our state parks. For two winters I read every book I could get my hands on, took copious notes and tried to figure out my notes."

Hunter said it's his history books that have sold the best so he has high hopes for this one, of course.

He has already done book signings sponsored by the same library system through which he discovered his love of reading and that is always a special kind of thrill.

Hunter's literary interests are wideranging, obviously, but he owes his forays into the romance genre to his first wife.

"I wrote a humor column poking fun at the old romances my mother used to read, which provoked my first wife into challenging me to read modern romance novels," he said. "I found they'd changed much for the better, and decided to take a stab at one myself, after writing mostly SF and action/adventure up until then. One of my favorite romance novelists was Andrea Edwards, which turned out to be the team of Anne and

Ed Kolaczyk, fellow Midwesterners. Men write romance novels! How very Nicholas Sparks."

The romances he has written and released thus far are set against a backdrop of meteorological chaos because Hunter, who clearly has free time to spare, is also a trained weather spotter.

Hunter promises that his next romance, *Radio Red*, will feature only a special guest appearance by weather.

Most of Hunter's books to date have been published by Whiskey Creek Press, a New Jersey eBook publishing house.

Hunter's kids are grown now, which means he has more time to write. Still, he said, having young children in the house should not be an impassable barrier to book finishing.

"I did carve out writing time, and lots of parents get book contracts even while the rug rats are still ratting on the rugs," he said. "It's a matter of determination, which a writer must have, and time management skills, which in my experience many writers don't."

The trick, Hunter said, is to write whenever and wherever a window of opportunity opens, even if it is a dollhouse-sized window.

"In early morning, late night, during nap time, while waiting in the car for school to let out," he said.

Writing should be prioritized not backburnered, Hunter said.

Tim Bushong O Come Emmanuel

Christmas albums run in the Bushong family. A few years back daughter Hannah recorded and released the excellent *Sleigh Bells*, an album whose enjoyable pop and jazz renditions of the classics have made it a staple in many households. Now it's time for Daddy (aka Tim) to throw one of his many hats into the ring.



Many? In addition to being producer/engineer/owner of T Bush Studios, one of *the* best studios in the area for capturing all the nuances of guitars turned to 11, Bushong is also one mean guitar slinger – but not mean in the angry sense because he's also an ordained pastor. This plays out in his music because even though many of the tracks on *O Come Emmanuel* are foot-to-the-floor rockers, there's a sense of reverence that is absent on some other rock Christmas albums such as, say, *A Twisted Christmas*.

Unless you've been living under a Yule log you've heard Christmas carols rocked up. But I'm willing to bet a box of candy canes that you've never heard them this well done, so well done, in fact, that they almost sound majestic.

Take for instance "Joy To The World." It starts with dual clean guitars playing the familiar melody via an amazing Brian May tone before bursting into pure classic rock bliss. "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing" utilizes an original and tight hard rock guitar riff that opens the song and reappears throughout, taking this old carol into stratospheric heights. The tone of the guitars on this, and all the others, are varied and simply to die for.

The riff on "What Child is This?" strikes me as something that would have been at home on a Vivian Campbell-era Dio album. Match this with the killer drumming of son Aaron and you've got a song you'll want to hear year round. Aaron also plays on the whimsical instrumental "Skating," a track whose walking bass line and noodling guitar melody are guaranteed to make the Grinch's heart grow at least two sizes. Aside from a few drum cameos, though, Tim plays and sings everything else.

While most of the songs on *O Come Emmanuel* are familiar, "Santa Claus Won't Come This Year" was new to me. Originally recorded by Charlie Stewart, this rockabilly song is a hoot with lyrics about Santa cracking his jingle bells and Rudolph getting the croup. A bonus track is the original "The Ballad of John Roberts," a pirate chantey full of slide guitar, a sing-along chorus and biting lyrics concerning the current chief justice of these here United States of 'Merica.

Because of the high-energy perfectly captured on these songs, I doubt that many homes will have *O Come Emmanuel* as background music while opening presents. Indeed, this music refuses to be mere sonic wallpaper, instead choosing to be the perfect Christmas album for fans of rock guitar. Which of course makes it perfect for that road trip to grandma's house in Larwill, Indiana. (*Jason Hoffman*)

Omaha, Alaska _{Omaha,} Alaska

Listening to Omaha, Alaska's self-titled debut album, you step into what seems to be the cycle of a relationship – or a relationship crumbling. Musically, it's a pianoled affair reminiscent of Sufjan Stevens and Manchester Orchestra. Given the concept nature of the album, The Antlers' *Hospice* album comes to mind as well. As



the stories within these eight songs unfold you hear about drinking whiskey for courage, late night fighting, texting, moving on and not wanting to move on and coming to the conclusion that taking the blame is better than having your feet put to the flames.

This all sounds very depressing, I know, but musically its very pop-centric. Whatever's happening in the narrative, it doesn't take away from the well arranged melodies. *Omaha, Alaska* is a bummer, but the kind of bummer that doesn't necessarily bum you out. Know what I mean?

Omaha, Alaska are the musical shell that former Wooden Satellites and Heavens Gateway Drugs' member C. Ray Harvey is curBACK FRACE Uriah Heep

Uriah Heep are an English band that formed in 1969, back when bands like Led Zeppelin and Black Sabbath were filling the void for heavy rock at the end of the British Invasion. This album, their fourth, was more progressive than their earlier work and may have caused them to be left behind



during the explosion of heavier rock from the early part of the decade.

With Mick Box on lead guitar and Ken Hensley on keyboards, the band created a sound similar to Deep Purple, but with a little more production.

It opens with "The Wizard," a guitar track that starts off slow, but swells into a nice piece of heavy, harmonic 70s rock n/ roll. "Traveller in Time" has a soft prog-rock feel, but its tranquil arrangement fills the void before coming into their biggest hit, "Easy Livin'," their best charted song in the United States, breaking the Top 40 on Billboard.

"Circle of Hands," the six-minute jam that closes side one, is a close to Emerson, Lake & Palmer but has the dexterity of Yes. "Rainbow Demon" is heavy on the keyboards, and the darker tones of myth and mystical visions put it up there as one of the best tracks they ever produced. "Paradise" brings the tempo down a bit and swims along with a nice acoustic wall in front of strong vocals from bassist Gary Thain. It's another great song that dabbles in the prog-jazz genre (if there is such a thing).

The record closes with "The Spell," a piano-heavy track that touches the pop rock sound and almost seems out of place for 1972, but nicely encapsulates their career up to that point.

rently residing in. Harvey is an enigmatic dude, seeming to grab the limelight in whatever he seems to front, whether that's his intention or not. He's just one of those folks you gravitate to, as he seems to have something interesting to say.

Musically, he's not a shy or subtle guy. He's all about the big statement. He's all about big emotions and grandiosity (when you open your Cure set at Down The Line with "One Hundred Years," you're definitely not going the subtle route.) While *Omaha, Alaska* isn't a grandiose statement per say, its concept and delivery are very much an emotional kick in the gut.

According to Omaha, Alaska's press press release: "The album called *Omaha, Alaska* is the a collection of songs written and composed to be heard in sequence." It also says Harvey wrote, recorded, mixed, and mastered the album himself and had help performing the album in the studio from Nate Richman, Ben Hoeppner and Andy Plank.

The album moves along quickly with no space between the tracks. "Song for Omaha Alaska" moves right into "I'm Not Missed," which then leads right into "Of Course You're Doing Fine" and so on and so forth.

As stated before, these songs read like late night confessions about the fall of a relationship. Drunken arguments during late night drives ("Read at 10PM"), self-discovery ("Hallelujah(I Know Who I Am)"), texts from the other woman ("Truly(Lonely) With You"). It's a heavy record emotionally, but Harvey and the musicians let some light into this darkened room with a lighter touch on the music end.

The end of something that was once great is a hard thing to swallow. What you thought would last forever crumbles before your eyes and there's nothing you can do about it. Some people go to therapy. Some drink the pain away. Others, make a concept record about it to heal.

The place called Omaha, Alaska is categorically the most remote location in one's mental landscape. It is the birthplace of all of Omaha, Alaska's musical concepts." Omaha, Alaska is indeed one lonely place. But it's not without its perks. (*John Hubner*)

Mannheim Steamroller, the Chip Davis-helmed new age music sensation, have become a Christmas tradition for many families, and this year they'll be at the Embassy Theatre Tuesday, December 6 as part of their annual holiday tour. The show will feature many of Mannheim Steamroller's perennial favorites from the group's best-loved albums, starting with 1984's aptly titled Christmas, as well as selections from their concert "30/40," which aired on PBS in 2015.

Many fans know Mannheim Steamroller as a Christmas band, but the truth is it all began as an alias for Davis who enjoyed experimenting with the effects of blending baroque classical music with jazz, rock and synthesizers. Discovering that no major record label had any interest in his experimentations, Davis founded American Gramaphone records in 1981 and began distributing a series of albums with seasonal themes under his own label. Fresh Aire explored spring, Fresh Aire II fall, Fresh Aire III summer and Fresh Aire IV winter.

Davis and his collaborators, the keyboardist Jackson Berkey and guitarist Mason Williams, went on to put out several Fresh Aire albums, but it wasn't until they began turning their talents to Chrismas music that they really snagged a large audience.



They followed up the very successful Christmas with

the equally successful A Fresh Aire Christmas and Christmas in the Aire. Soon, Davis and his team were touring North America and Europe, treating audiences to intimate concerts pairing haunting melodies with a holiday-themed light show, and Mannheim Steamroller the holiday legend was born.

Davis underwent surgery in 2008 that ended his touring career, but now two ensembles - the red and green touring companies - play the hits in his stead. At Christmas time, there are certain high water marks celebrants look forward to - performances of The Nutcracker, downtown Christmas tree lightings, decking the halls of one's home - and Mannheim Steamroller's annual holiday concert has undoubtedly become for many an essential entry on that list. Time to make said list and check it twice, if you know what we mean. (Deborah Kennedy)

Morrissey had to cancel several U.S. shows a couple of weeks ago after one of his band members collapsed just before a show in Boulder, Colorado. The gigs have been rescheduled for the early part of December, with the Detroit show now taking place on December 7. Cluster of December 0 and Chi



December 7, Cleveland December 9 and Chicago December 10.

Country music and TV star **Blake Shelton** has announced plans for the early part of the coming year. The singer is heading out on the Doing It to Country Songs Tour, named after one of the songs on his newest album, *If I'm Honest*. You should mark March 17 off on your calendar if you're interested in seeing *The Voice* judge, as that is the day Shelton visits Chicago. **RaeLynn** opens the show.

In my opinion, **Dada** are one of the most criminally overlooked bands of the 90s and 00s. The California-based band's unique blend of pop and rock got lost in all of the grunge of the 90s and the decline of the recording industry 10 years later, never quite getting their due despite putting out several high-quality albums. The guys don't tour a whole lot together anymore but do occasionally play shows. To celebrate their 25th anniversary as a band, Dada have announced a handful of dates including March 2 at The Double Door in Chicago. **7Horse**, a band consisting of two of the three members of Dada, will open the show.

I once saw **Vanessa Carlton** at Borders in Fort Wayne. There were about 150 or so people there. She did a good job but had clearly dropped a notch or two in popularity since she hit it big with her single "A Thousand Miles," way back in 2002. The singer/songwriter has released four studio albums since her debut, along with her current live album, *Liberman Live*. Carlton's 2017 tour starts February 22 in Indianapolis then heads to Ann Arbor the following night. There are two shows scheduled in Chicago February 24-25, a February 26 show in Cincinnati and a February 28 show in Columbus, Ohio.

Fort favorites **Tesla** spent a good part of 2016 opening for **Def Leppard** and **REO Speedwagon** on a massive U.S. tour. The band has decided to go back to headlining with their first tour of 2017, still supporting their new live album *Mechanical Resonance, Live*. The current plan is for the tour to start in Chicago on February 1, head to Firekeepers Casino in Battle Creek on February 17, stop at the Star Plaza in Merrillville on February 18 and make the last stop in our area February 19 in Detroit. No matter which show you go to, you can bet Tesla will bring it 100 percent, as I have never seen them disappoint an audience.



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How to Survive Teen Angst

"Adolescence is rarely a picnic. Even the happiest and most well-adjusted kids usually experience some degree of misery and panic as they pass through adolescence during those all important teen years. Everyone remembers the weird and wacky moments of awkwardness and trouble that adolescence brings. That's what makes movies and television shows about these experiences an ongoing parade of entertainment.

Kelly Fremon Craig makes her directorial debut working from her own screenplay with *The Edge* of Seventeen, a film that dips into the complicated and treacherous territory of surviving adolescence. Thoughtful, serious and often quite funny, *The Edge* of Seventeen slips in to the movie continuum farther from the suffering in *Rebel Without a Cause* and closer to the more realistic moments from *Fast Times at Ridgemont High*, but not as witty and light as *Clueless*.

Nadine was never a happy, well-adjusted kid. She tells us she felt different and outside of things even at the age of nine. Her mom had to push her out of the car at school. She had no friends and a large share of resentment towards her popular easy-going older brother Darian.

She has two people she likes and trusts. At school she meets Krista, a sweet girl who becomes her best friend. At home she has her dad who supports her and loves her. But just as Nadine is entering the real danger zone of growing up, her father dies of a heart at-



tack. This catastrophe, and her other early woes, are told in sharp and effective flashbacks.

The Edge of Seventeen takes place when, you guessed it, Nadine is 17 and about to experience another devastating change. Hailee Steinfeld, who wowed critics and moviegoers as a tough, determined young lady in *True Grit*, gives a stellar performance as Nadine. She goes from vulnerable and hurting to blindingly selfish to sarcastic to the point of nastiness in the time it takes for a teen mood swing. Even when Nadine is a jerk, which is often, Steinfeld keeps us rooting for her. She's as whiny as Molly Ringwald in *Sixteen Candles*, but the loss of her father makes her easier to forgive. She's smarter too.

One weekend when Mom is away (Mom is Kyra Sedgwick as an insecure dating widow still dealing, barely, with the loss of her husband) Nadine parties a little too hard. Krista (Haley Lou Richardson) is there to hold her hair back at the toilet. Darian (Blake Jenner) is having a pool party.

Much to Nadine's hung-over horror, she crawls

a few Oscars.



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Making War Not Quite Hell Grunt: The Curious Science of Humans at War

by Mary Roach. W.W. Norton & Company, 2016

Mary Roach has made a career of writing books of science journalism that explore topics that many people find distasteful. But even if the books' topics are difficult to look at closely, they are fascinating simply because they are essential to our lives. Stiff was a close look at the biological mechanics of death, Bonk an unflinching consideration of the realities of sex. Gulp was a tour of the human digestive system, from one end to the other, narrated without restraint. Now comes Grunt, a book that's a departure in that it's

not always an uncomfortable journey, and in that its topic, although a fundamental fact of human existence, isn't a necessary one. Those two departures make Grunt feel more gratuitous and less justifiable than Roach's previous projects, and thus, less enjoyable.

The theme that ties the varied chapters of Grunt together is military science. In each chapter, Roach writes about, through background research, interviews with experts, and hands-on experience, a different aspect of technological innovation in the American military. The hook is that the science she explores does not have to do with weaponry. Instead, her subject is the science that helps to keep military service people safe

and comfortable so that they can do their jobs, as well as science that helps them to survive when they're injured in the line of duty.

The book's topics include the development of uniform fabrics, diarrhea-control medications, explosionresistant vehicles and hearing-protection technology. Roach explicitly and intentionally stays away from politically charged topics like PTSD, not because she thinks that they're not worth coverage, but because she doesn't want to cover them inadequately. So she mainly stays in noncontroversial areas and focuses on research that most people would agree is worthwhile and noble.

Through it all, she maintains her personable style, cracking jokes and inserting herself into the story. Instead of reciting dry facts, she tells stories about the characters she meets and gives self-deprecating

accounts of her experiences during interviews and demonstrations. Her style is, somehow, irreverent and respectful at the same time, and she shows admiration for the science she writes about while approaching it with a humanizing light touch. That kind of approach is essential as she writes about technology

designed to keep soldiers alive, and it's Roach's basic strength. She knows how to write about squirm-inducing stuff in a way that both makes us laugh and makes clear to us how important the topic is.

Grunt's limitation is in the way that it sidesteps the larger implications of its subject matter. It feels awkward to discuss military technology while trying to avoid thinking about the morality of war. Sometimes Roach can't manage the separation. In a section about genital reconstruction for soldiers injured by IEDs, she successfully argues that we need to take seriously an uncomfortable situation that is life-and-death serious for the men going through it. But at the same time, her flippant com-

mentary sometimes undermines the tone. Elsewhere, her attempt to stay in a morally neutral territory is unavoidably clumsy. When she writes about the design of snipers' uniforms, she explains

how a lack of zippers makes the uniforms more comfortable, herself uncomfortably skipping past the reality that the uniforms make the snipers more effective at killing people.

It's easy to make a case for a book about the finer points of our digestive tracts, our sexual behavior, or even our deaths. As much as these things sometimes make us queasy, they're things we all have to deal with, like it or not, and Roach's whimsical approach makes it easier to take a good, long look them. In order to help us take a whimsical look at the science of war, however, Roach has to ignore much of the reality of war, and that, at least for some of us, is a very unpalatable thing to do.

down the hallway the next morning to find Krista and Darian in bed together. Angry, confused and totally wrapped up in her own little world, Nadine forces Krista to choose between her and her brother. Krista refuses to give up Darian and tells Nadine she is being ridiculous, but Nadine shuns her anyway.

Very much alone, Nadine starts spiraling. She insults her favorite teacher (a fine, funny and deadpan Woody Harrelson) but spends many a lunch hour in his classroom. He's the kind of stand up guy that when she reads him her suicide note, he takes a long pause and a deep breath and says, "You really have to watch those run-on sentences."

She's so caught up in her own troubles, she barely notices Irwin, the sweet boy crushing on her. He sits next to her in class. and eventually they strike up a friendship. Hayden Szeto is a scene stealer as Irwin. He's rich, smart, cute and a budding filmmaker, but Nadine only has eyes for someone else.

A mistakenly sent text gets the attention of the bad boy, and she is lucky to escape that mistake as unscathed as she does. This brush with trouble accelerates her learning curve. She starts to realize that maybe things aren't quite the way she's been playing them out in her head.

She grows and learns as adolescents must to get out of their self-absorption. As she does this, she sees and we are shown more of the struggles of every character surrounding Nadine.

The Edge of Seventeen has the bad language, bad behavior and bad choices that come with the territory. It is an enjoyable entertainment and the kind of movie that will provide comfort to teenagers in the throes of adolescence.

Grownups can also benefit from seeing this film. It is a reminder to deal with adolescence as young as you can. Adolescent flare-ups in adults are worse than acne flare-ups in adults. Adult adolescent flare-ups have been epidemic lately. The Edge of Seventeen will help you check yourself.

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

The Arena Dinner Theatre's holiday offering is a charming little play by Ivan Menchell titled The Cemetery Club.

The Cemetery Club! "What?" you say. "That sounds like Halloween! '

Don't plotz. It's a comedy, already.

What I like about The Cemetery Club is that it is a universal story about, shall we say, ladies of a certain age. The play is set in the city, and the ladies are Jewish matrons, but most women are going to recognize these characters and their foibles. It's a

story that could easily happen in Indianapolis, Fort Wayne or Decatur. Trust me: You know these ladies, or ladies just like them.

These are reasonably happy women who have a pretty satisfying life routine: they meet their friends, they have tea and cake, they shop, they cook, they gossip - they visit their husbands' graves at the

cemetery. Who could kvetch? And yet.

They have the bothersome sense that maybe there could be something more in their lives. Who hasn't felt that? But to find that "something more," these ladies might have to make a change. And we all know how well ladies respond to a prospect of change.

The three ladies are Ida, a sweet peacemaker, played by Hazel Stream; Lucille the party hamster, played by Carol Howell-Wasson; and elegant yet fragile Doris, played by Donna Frey. The dialog among these longtime friends will resonate with anyone who has ever had a girly posse - words of love alongside a poke in the backside.

Their words make the story authentic. The ladies aren't superheroes or corporate magnates - just regular women who do regular things. The rhythm with



them is easy and familiar; even when they are completely ticked off with each other, all will all eventually be forgiven. They know this, and so do we. The excitement comes from watching them move through it, which they do with a lot of style and grace.

So everything's cool, right? The girls are groovy.

And then they run across that most dangerous of all things: an eligible, interested man. Bruce Hancock stands out as Sam the Butcher, delivering an achingly vulnerable performance of a widower who is finally figuring himself out. Well, sort of.

Also watch for Judy Whit-

ney as Mildred, who plays The Other Woman, or The Fox Among the Chickens. When it comes to dating, relationships and love, I sometimes wonder if we ever grow up beyond the age of 15 or so. Teenagers to veteran adults can enjoy this exceedingly unsmooth course of true love.

Director Becky Niccum helms a beautiful little show that is, in its quirky way, perfect for this time of year. The themes of love, friendship, nostalgia and family all fit - no matter the denomination of one's celebration. This is the time of year when we recognize the end of something and the beginning of something new. To let something go can be a little painful, but for the future, there's hope and healing. These characters show the heroism in small, or-

dinary acts – acts that allow a new spirit to emerge. Perfect, indeed, for this time of year.

Cellophane Gardens Illuminations

When you think of a musician holed up in the Ozarks of Arkansas creating music amongst those storied wooded hills, the sound that comes to mind is a particular one. That sound probably isn't of the atmospheric and spatial variety, but more of the old time-y, bluegrass variety.

In fact spatial, atmospheric,

dreamy, and drone-y are exactly what you'll find on Cellophane Garden's debut vinyl release called Illuminations. Cellophane Garden are the musical project of musician and vinyl record curator Kevin Blagg. Blagg and percussionist J. Seymore have cultivated a beautifully textured album that feels as melodically rich as it does artistically satisfying.

Armed with electric and acoustic guitars, synthesizers, echo systems and a healthy dose of sound collaging, Blagg has sewn together musical patterns and shapes into Brian Eno-esque walls of noise. "Mystic Maneuver" floats along a steady stream of flanged tones. It sounds like thoughts and ideas floating through the ether and has the feel of a sci fi score. 'Voice of Sonar Healing" is a beautifully textured piece. It's nine minutes of exquisite melody - nostalgic like looking over a ridge and to the sea, thinking of all those who've come and gone in your life. Blagg seems to be channeling some classic 4AD sounds here (Cocteau Twins come to mind). But beyond inspirations and influences, "Voice of Sonar Healing" is just a beautiful piece of music. It's new age-y, in that you can see someone falling into deep thought while listening to this song and finding some greater truth. But if that phrase bugs you, then we can just say it's some seriously heady sounds.

Elsewhere, "High Frequency Blue" has the desolate sound of a

rugged, earthier Tangerine Dream. The acoustic guitar and electronic percussion seem to have been made for independent film. It has a real cinematic feel. "Hiss is Bliss" uses the electric guitar to wonderful effect, filling the spaces with subtle nuance. The mix of acoustic and electronic instruments helps to give a very organic feel throughout the album. Blagg and Seymore have built a mysterious musical world here, one that ebbs and flows between bittersweet and darker tones.

Cellophane Garden's Illuminations is a vast musical landscape that seems to beckon from some farreaching realm. The Ozarks of northwest Arkansas have bestowed upon Blagg a sense of journey and spatial exploration. He's created musical worlds for us to get lost in. It's a soundtrack for the moment where the mountain meets the sky and that overwhelming sense that comes over you when you reach it. (John Hubner)

When igi Pirandello (1867-1937) won the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1934, the Sicilian-born dramatist was widely known as the author of intricate philosophicomedies. cal One in particular, Six Characters in Search of an Author, had catapulted him onto the international

scene in the early 1920s, leading to acclaimed performances all over Europe and the Americas.

The setting and the initial style of Six Characters is very familiar to audiences worldwide. A professional acting troupe gathers on stage to rehearse Pirandello's The Game of Role Playing. The troupe is comprised of the requisite players including a prompter, stage manager, director, technician, actors, secretary, crew members; in essence, a representation of the hustle and bustle of professional theater - professional to the point that the director wants the impudent leading lady fined for being late and when the boorish leading man complains about his costume, the director exclaims, "We never get a good play from France anymore, so we are reduced to producing plays by Pirandello!" Pirandello is certainly not lacking in self-deprecating wit.

Before the actors can dig into the script at hand, however, six characters wander into their rehearsal space a little lost and perplexed. A Father, Mother, Step Daughter, Son, Boy and Little Girl explain that they have been abandoned by their author and their story left dangling, incomplete. The Father pleads with the director to help them complete their story and live, for a moment at least, through the actors. Pirandello describes the characters in his stage directions as "created realities, unchanging constructs of the imagination, and therefore more solidly real than the actors with their fluid naturalness."

Intrigued and persuaded, the director begins the challenging task of sorting out each of their unfinished stories and finding a way to develop a cohesive play for the stage. Eventually the character's become frustrated with the actors' process of making their story into a play and deny the value of interpretation altogether. The characters want to take on the roles themselves and "live," not play at, their own truths. They struggle to take on the roles themselves, but even this becomes mired in the conventions of the stage they wish to avoid altogether.

Although they initially present themselves as flat Characters, their story is actually far from simple, since it is a collection of many stories made up of individual perspectives. The conventions of communication available to them and to the actors simply do not suffice to get all of their inner truths out into the world and communicated to others intact.

Why should we think about or even perform Pirandello's near-century old little play any more? Well, perhaps because it teaches us the very best and the very worst aspects of human communication. Maybe we will come to realize, as Pirandello does with Six Characters in Search of an Author, all that can be achieved is a kind of collective empathy for our common disability - an awareness that we are trapped in our own stories and our own perspectives about those stories.

"That makes something like - what? - five or six genres for us, not to mention [that my wife] Emily's been writing horror. I just want to write books, and humor. Well, and eat chocolate, preferably while writing."
