With the release of the album came an




Conley is acting as host this year, though he did admit that he might "perform a song or two." The stars of this year's show are five mostly female acts.

An Emerald Isle Christmas

Before Mairead Carlin was a member of Celtic Woman, she was one of the group's biggest fans. The young singer from Derry in northern Ireland admired the all-female ensemble's honest approach to music, and she listened to their albums when she wanted to feel uplifted. As coincidence would have it,

it was during one of those times – a difficult period in her life when she'd just been dropped by a record label and was making the rent giving voice lessons to children – when she got the call from the group's producers, asking if she might be interested in joining Celtic Woman for their next tour.

"I just couldn't believe it," Carlin told me in a recent phone interview. "It was an amazing opportunity and I was so grateful for the chance. I'm still so grateful. Quite honestly, I don't know where I'd be without Celtic Woman."

When I reached Carlin in her hotel room, she and her mates – Susan Mc-

Fadden, Eabha McMahon and Tara McNeill – had just arrived in Santa Rosa, California in preparation for their first performance in the U.S. since March 2015's 10th anniversary tour. They were getting ready to launch their Home for Christmas: The Symphony Tour, which will bring them to Wabash's Honywell Center Thursday, December 16, and Carlin was fresh from a talk with her fellow Celtic women about their individual journeys as youthful singers to professional performers.

Carlin grew up in a musical family. Her father was a band leader who often traveled America, Canada and Turkey, entertaining troops at naval bases, her sister a classical violinist, and her grandmother a singer, and music formed the backdrop of her childhood. She began singing lessons at age four, but her teacher refused to subject Carlin to a strict regimen of technical instruction, and Carlin credits the freedom she had as a youngster to find her own voice, along with her triumphant turn at BBC Talents Young Singer Competition at aged 16, with helping shape the singer she is today.

"The girls and I were talking about how, if you get too technical with young singers, it can be a real hindrance," Carlin said. "Singing is such a primal thing to do. When a baby cries, it's almost like they're singing. We all start out singing, and if someone tells us how

to do it when we're too young, it can take the joy and uniqueness out of it. It should be fun, it should be free. I'm just glad my teacher let me do that."

Carlin, whose resume includes a world tour with her friend and mentor Don McLean, jumped at the chance to join Celtic Woman in 2013 because she sensed that it, too, would give her the freedom to be herself

A year later, PBS aired Celtic Woman's sold-out performance at Dublin's The Helix, and the group's eponymous debut soared to the top of the Billboard World Music charts. Celtic Woman became, in short order, a favorite act stateside.

The group has gone through a number of lineup changes in its 12-year history, but one thing has remained constant: Celtic Wom-

an's absolute devotion to the music they perform, be that music lifted directly from the traditional Irish songbook or something a little more contemporary, like Celine Dion's "My Heart Will Go On," which appears on Celtic Woman's newest album, *Voices* of Angels.

Another thing fans can count on? The members of the group getting along like the proverbial peas and carrots. Their gruelling eight-months-on-theroad touring schedule would be impossible otherwise.

"Being on the road so often means we can't just go home and close the door," Carlin said. "We sleep on the bus together, we wake up together,

we share a stage together. The truth is, we get on great. Eabha was my bridesmaid at my wedding. That shows, I think, how much love we have for each other. Obviously you have to have musical talent to be chosen for Celtic Woman, but the producers give a lot of thought to personality as well. Everyone in the group has a lovely disposition. It just wouldn't work if our egos got in the way."

Celtic Woman are known not only for their lack of backstage drama but their ability to take a Christmas classic like "Silent Night" and make it new again for every listener. This year's holiday-themed show, according to Carlin, has the potential to delight even the most jaded Scrooge in the house. That's because the orchestral arrangements – or, in some cases, lack thereof – are designed to surprise, all the while staying true to a tune's original appeal.

"There's a real mix in the repertoire," she said. "There are traditional Christmas songs and really fun numbers like 'Santa Claus Coming to Town,' and 'Joy to the World' and quieter ones like 'It Came Upon a Midnight Clear.' There's really something for everyone, and our hope is that the audience has as much fun as we do. This is our favorite time of year. This is when we feel most at home, and the goal is for everyone to link onto their loved ones and have a nice night."



and perform music that is important to her on a personal and cultural level.

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"Each one of us takes the music incredibly seriously," she said. "Eabha, for instance, is dedicated to keeping the nearly lost art of *sean nos*, a traditional Irish way of singing, alive. It's her mission, and I really admire that. Susan, when she goes through a song, makes sure she understands every single word of it and the emotion behind it, and she works hard to communicate that to the audience. The same is true of Tara. Every note is clearly thought out; every moment is a chance to communicate through music, and it's really a privilege to be part of a group whose music comes from such a heartfelt place."

Celtic Woman first formed in 2004 when artistic partners David Kavanaugh, Sharon Browne and David Downes – the musical director behind the smash hit show *Riverdance* – decided to pool their energies into recruiting five Irish women vocalists who would then tour Europe and the U.S., performing both traditional Irish ballads and modern music with a Celtic twist.

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Back to the Boards

Kia Miller was an imaginative child who honed her craft with the resources she had at her disposal: Disney movies and Barbie dolls.

"I always used my Thanksgiving wishbone to wish that I would turn into a mermaid," she recalls. "And my sister and I came up with really complex stories for our Barbie dolls, usually involving them fighting for their lives in some sort of natural disaster. Playacting stuck, I guess, although I don't hide behind toys anymore."

She became obsessed with musical theater when she was in kindergarten and her mother and her father, a theater teacher, gave her a cassette tape of the *Les Misérables* cast recording.

"They're clearly awesome parents," she says. "I could recite every word to the show. I carried around my little tape player and sang along. I would wake my parents up in the morning by singing, 'Look down, look down, don't look 'em in the eye."

Miller says she was crushed when her parents saw a production of *Les Misérables* without her, but they made up for it the following year when they took her to see the touring company at the Embassy Theatre for her seventh birthday.

"I had to sit on a pillow to see the stage and I stayed up way past my bedtime," she says, "but it was so worth it."

Her parents fed her craving for live theater by taking her to many plays and musicals after that. She even got an autograph from her hero,

Christopher J. Murphy, who played Captain Hook in *Peter Pan* at the Civic Theatre – never dreaming she would one day become friends and colleagues with him.

Soon she was ready for her first audition: *Charlotte's Web* at the Fort Wayne Youtheatre.

"My dad made me go," she says. "I was very nervous. I had one line in the audition."

She didn't get the part, which she says was fine with her, although she admits, "There was some added pressure from being a theater teacher's daughter."

The young Miller persisted and was cast as a Baby Angel in *The Best Christmas Pageant Ever* for the Youtheatre.

"I had three or four lines and had a blast," she says. "I had no idea that being in a show could be so fun. I made so many new friends from all over Fort Wayne, people I'm still friends with today."

Miller cites numerous influences on her performance. In addition to her father, she gleaned priceless theater advice from Harvey Cocks through the Fort Wayne Youtheatre from childhood through her early 20s.

"He helped me master the fundamentals of the craft," she says.

She also learned from Kirby Volz and the Fort Wayne Summer Music Theatre, working with them as an actor for four years and an assistant director for five. She has continued her collaboration with the group, arranging and directing their fundraiser cabarets.

"Fort Wayne Summer Music Theatre gave me an opportunity to try new things as an actor and really challenge myself," she says.

As a teenager, she also spent a summer at the



world-renowned Interlochen Arts Camp.

"They gave me tools and resources that helped me to become an actor of analysis and the teacher that I am today," she says.

As for her singing, Miller says her longtime voice teacher Mindy Cox gave her an invaluable education on vocal production.

"She taught me how to 'mix' [to sing in a combination of head and chest voice]," she says, "which completely revolutionized my vocal technique."

Cox was the person who introduced Miller to *The Light in the Piazza*, which quickly became the high school senior's "favorite piece of musical theater in existence." It is one which is extremely difficult to pull off, both technically and in terms of talent. It has never been produced in Fort Wayne – until now.

Miller won her dream role, Clara, in the Adam Guettel musical, which is being produced by the Fort Wayne professional theater company Three Rivers Music Theatre. It's her first onstage role in four years.

With her directing and teaching background, she approached the role academically at first, researching and analyzing the time period, character, script, score and source material.

"As a director, it's my responsibility to understand the inner workings of all of the characters," she says, "but as an actor, I get to hone that time and energy into one character. I need to understand the way Clara thinks, moves, and behaves."

Once her lines and music were memorized, "it was about getting out of my head and being in the moment. Instead of using my director brain and asking,

Sting 57th and 9th

On his first album of purely pop/rock music in more than a decade, Sting proves that he remembers where he got his start musically. While it's being heralded as a welcome return to the artist's original form after too many years of albums filled with lutes and flutes, nothing

on 57th and 9th is going to



resurrect the early days of the Police. Yes, there are guitars aplenty here, both jangly and distorted, but this is indisputably an older and less raw Sting than that kid who merged punk and reggae back in the late 70s.

Not that he doesn't try. On "Petrol Head" he shamelessly shoots for driving rock, and even if this kind of music was never truly in his wheelhouse, he doesn't do a bad job here. More often, though, the songs are the kind of layered, easy pop rock you'd expect from the Sting of the 90s, as in the smoothly produced "I Can't Stop Thinking

Lyrically, many of the songs touch on unsurprising political themes - climate change on "One Fine Day," the refugee crisis on "Inshallah" - that the superstar Sting is known for embracing. When "If You Can't Love Me" descends into a dark meditation on a doomed relationship, though, the deeply personal menace of classic Police comes startlingly to the fore.

One of the album's most telling songs is "50,000," an uncomplicated lament about the music superstars who have died recently. It's a tribute to those who have been lost, but Sting is of course singing about himself and his confrontation with his own mortality. How will we think about him when he's gone? The question is very much on

And he's got to be hoping that we'll let him make a good rock/ pop album in his 60s without insisting that it's a return to his younger days. He's made that album with 57th and 9th, and he deserves credit for it. (Evan Gillespie)

Brad Laner Micro-Awakenings

Brad Laner is one of the most creative musical minds you've probably never heard of. He's a California guy that's been deep in the experimental music scene since the mid 80s.

From cassette excursions with Debt of Nature and Steaming Coils, to the monumental noise pop pro-



vocateurs Medicine in the late 80s and early 90s, to the electronic experimentation of Electric Company, Laner seems to pull influence and inspiration from all over the map. Besides his unique industrialmeets-psychedelic guitar sound, he's a prolific studio master. His solo records as well as the two Medicine reunion albums released in 2013 and 2014 have a sound all their own. Laner seems to create sonics that are both futuristic and classic. Buzzing guitars and industrial rhythms are surrounded by almost jazz-inflected vocal harmonies. Laner seems to be as moved by the Mothers of Invention as "Mother Nature's Son."

Last year Laner released For Magnetic Tape with Drawing Room Records, a cassette release of Cecil Taylor-esque piano excursions. It's a release where free jazz collides with the avante garde. It's an intimate and personal release.

Now, Drawing Room and Laner present Micro-Awakenings, a double LP with four musical suites that feel like traveling through a musical mind that shape shifts through styles and sounds. It's experimental pop - an art house record that taken in all at once feels like a metamorphosis of the psyche.

The history of Micro-Awakenings begins in the early 2000s when Laner began writing and recording the suites that are included on the record. Between 2003 and 2009 the music was recorded, and there were plans to release it as a double LP, then with another label. Plans fell through and the music was eventually released digitally as

KISS

Dressed to Kill (1975)

Without trying to figure out why, the American rock band KISS have a huge following. Not to say I wasn't in the KISS Army when I was younger, but the novelty wore off as I entered high school. That said, my sister was a huge fan, and I did listen to her collection from



the basement stereo growing up. This album (their third) was decent enough to bang my 10-year-old head against the wall.

It opens with "Room Service," a garage rocker with simple chords and a basic chorus that sounds like Elton John could have produced it. "Two Timer" is a little harder, but most of the time it was probably due to Gene Simmons' vocals. "Ladies In Waiting" keeps the heavy vibe, and Ace Frehley had a way with his guitar. But still, the misogynistic (boring) feel was something that drove me away from the band in the early 80s.

"Rock Bottom" is an acoustic piece and isn't really that complicated. But two minutes in, you're reminded that these guys were KISS. Paul Stanley has a distinctive vocal characteristic, and

C'mon and Love Me" has a groovy hard rock vibe, but the sexual overtones are tiring and routine, and I actually prefer the Skid Row version from 1992. "She" is another heavier track that fits perfectly in the period. Although the riffs aren't complex, it still has the KISS double vocals and above-average rock thunder from Frehley and drummer Peter Criss.

The record closes with the ultimate mid-70s anthem, "Rock and Roll All Nite". Still a favorite, I can't think of another song they released (maybe "Beth") that almost everybody knows.

If you love KISS, you should already have this record. If you are a casual fan, they have about a dozen compilations from which to choose that are more worth buying. (Dennis Donahue)

61 individual tracks through Mutant Sounds. But now Laner finally gives Micro-Awakenings the proper vinyl release it deserves through the excellent folks at Drawing Room Records.

So how does it sound? Well, imagine driving in some beat up old gas guzzler late through the night and flipping through the radio for something to listen to. It's like channel surfing through these intergalactic stations that only appear when you're traveling at the speed of unleaded through open-skied desert at 2 a.m.

The music ranges from crystalline, futuristic pop to lounge-y late night vibes. It runs the course from groovy bass numbers to experimental electronic. There are moments of Adrian Belew-esque pop experimentation (much like his underrated Op Zop Too Wah) and industrial-heavy sonic snark.

If you're at all familiar with Laner's later work (on his solo albums as well as the last two Medicine records) then you know this album sounds incredibly good. Each of the suites ebb and flow within themselves. It is four album sides (or four long single tracks for the digital-only folks), and within those suites the mood and vibe changes and alternates every so often. Though it can be a heady mix to ingest, there's still a playfulness throughout. Side C ends with a child talking in the mic through some heavy delay that reminds me of my own kids messing around in my studio when they were still young enough for things like that to entertain them.

Micro-Awakenings isn't for the masses. It's not barbecue and grilling music (though if you are playing this at your next barbecue, please invite me.)

It is, however, music for the musically adventurous. It's an album to savor like a fine wine or exotic dessert. If you love Oneohtrix Point Never, Adrian Belew, Laner's work in Medicine and his solo work (especially his score for the Beautiful Noise doc), then seek this album out. It feels and sounds like a lot of work and love went into these pieces. The least we can do is enjoy the fruits of his labor.

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

Whether you like your drinks shaken, stirred, with a twist or up against a wall, the 10 members of Bloomington-based Straight No Chaser have what you're looking for. Granted, they're not bartenders. They're singers, and as singers they're purists. Hence the straight up part, and the eschewing of the chaser. SNC, one of the top selling a cappella groups performing today, will be at the Embassy Theatre Tuesday, December 13 doing what they do best: entertaining audiences with hits from their six-album oeuvre, including this year's release, *I'll Have Another ... Christmas Album*, and serving up a big shot of fun just in time for the holidays.

Having formed at Indiana University in 1996, Straight No Chaser are the epitome of the online video success story. In 2007, a 1998 video of their performance of "The 12 Days of Christmas" went viral, resulting in a five-album deal with Atlantic Records. Since then, the group – now a separate entity from the university – has performed with basically everybody, including Elton John, Stevie Wonder, Dolly Parton, Phil Collins and Seal.

They're probably best known for the unique and irreverent takes on Christmas classics, which makes their stop in Fort Wayne so timely. Can someone say "cheers"?

It might be difficult to fathom, but the Oak Ridge Boys have been around in one form or

another since 1943 when the group sang regularly for the staff confined to a nuclear research facility in Oak Ridge, Tennessee during World War II. Seventy-three years and innumerable lineup changes later, the four-part harmony legends from the holler will be at Wabash's Honeywell Center for a one-night engagement Friday, December 16, performing as part of the group's popular annual Christmas tour.

The Oak Ridge Boys began as Wally Fowler and the Georgia Clodhoppers. Back then, the group members stuck mainly to gospel music. That changed in 1973 when the lineup that took the Oak Ridge Boys name to the household level – Willie Wynn, Duane Allen, William Lee Golden, Richard Sterban and Joe Bonsall – solidified and made the subtle switch to country. They lost some gospel fans in the process over the next 15 years, but they gained millions of country followers, thanks in large part to hits like "Elvira," "Bobbie Sue" and "I'll Be True to You."

Through the 70s and 80s the Oak Ridge Boys were staples of the country charts, and they also released two best-selling Christmas albums during that time. The 90s were colored by fading popularity, more lineup changes and declining sales, but in 2000 the boys signed with Spring Hill Records and experienced a renaissance, returning to their gospel roots. Last year, they were inducted into the Country Music Hall of Fame, and, minus Willie Wynn, the core group is going strong.

The boys are back, in other words, with a recipe for success: four veteran singers, their mics and the music of Christmas. (*Deborah Kennedy*)

Anastasio also has a solo career, and it will be the music from that career that will be on display when the singer embarks on a spring tour supporting his tenth album, *Paper Wheels*. It's also likely you'll hear a few Phish songs when Anastasio stops at the Murat in Indianapolis on May 6 and the Royal Oak Theatre in Detroit the following night.

Wilco, a band that refused to play The Fort despite the best efforts of several big names in the Summit City music scene a few years ago, have announced a few dates to support their newest album, *Schmilco*. While Fort Wayne has been left off of the touring schedule once again, fans of the band can travel to Chicago February 22-23 and February 25-26 or to Kalamazoo March 14 to see them.

Bon Jovi have added dates to their own 2017 tour in support of their new album, the mostly uninspired *This House Is Not for Sale*. Their first tour since 2013, Bon Jovi visit Columbus, Ohio March 18, Cleveland the following night, Indianapolis March 22, Chicago March 26 and Detroit March 29. Hopefully they'll shy away from the new material and stick to the songs we all know. I'd be hard-pressed to find one song on the new album that I'd want to hear again.



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In Search of the Real Batman

The Caped Crusade: Batman and the Rise of Nerd Culture by Glen Weldon, Simon and Schuster, 2016

Who is the true Batman? Is it the brooding, violent outsider in Christopher Nolan's Dark Knight movies? Or is it the silly, spoofy caricature played by Adam West in the 60s TV series? To satisfactorily answer the question, you've got to meet a couple of conditions. First, you've got to care. Second, you've got to believe that there is a true version of the charac-

ter – a version that's right and versions that are wrong. In order to enjoy Glen Weldon's The Caped Crusade, you definitely have to satisfy the first condition. If you meet the second condition, the book might make you angry. Meet the first condition but not the second, and Weldon has just what you're

Weldon's book is an exhaustive history of the character of Batman, from his origin in the comics in the 1930s to his ascent to full-fledged cultural phenomenon in the late 20th century and the opening decades of the 21st. Weldon tracks every iteration of the character, every development in his history and development, no matter how small or monumental, in comics, TV, movies, merchandising and every other aspect of the culture in

which Batman has had even a little presence.




Through it all, Weldon pays careful attention to the character's identity. Who is Batman? How do we think of him? How does he behave? What motivates

him? Weldon's thesis is that Batman is cyclically mutable. He shifts through a number of identities, from brooding loner to devoted father figure to wise overseer of a big, wacky family. Batman never stays in one place for very long, and if you want him to have a fixed cultural identity, you're bound to be disappointed.

Right now, Weldon points out, we're in the middle of a brooding phase. In his earliest years, Batman was a hard-boiled crime fighter, a take-noprisoners detective who didn't hesitate to kill criminals (with a gun) because that's what detectives in the 30s did. In the 60s, Batman had transformed into a space-traveling, sci-fi clown, and that version of the character culminated in the campy take

Disney Dominates the Box Again

Tops at the Box: Disney's new animated hit. Moana, once again took the top spot at the U.S. box office last weekend, selling another \$28 million over the sleepy weekend, bringing the film's 10-day sales total to just under \$120 million in the U.S. and \$177 million worldwide. Expect this one to keep making money through the holidays, almost certainly topping the \$400 million mark worldwide – and maybe sneaking away with an Oscar for Best Animated Feature. I've not yet seen the movie, but I've heard and read some really great things. Sounds very fun.

Also at the Box: The new Harry Potter World flick, Fantastic Beasts and Where to Find Them took the No. 2 spot at the U.S. box office last weekend, selling another \$18 million and bringing the movie's 17-day sales total to \$183 million in the U.S. and \$607 million worldwide. My little sister says that it's very good, and she knows her Potter. Can't wait to see this one for sure; director David Yates and J.K. Rowling make a great pair.

Taking the No. 3 spot at last weekend's box was Denis Villeneuve's new sci-fi thriller Arrival which sold \$7.3 million, upping the movie's worldwide sales total to over \$100 million. This is a new classic, I believe. And I think that might become the campaign going forward into Oscar season. Consider the cast, the commercial success, the critical success, the creative accomplishment, the brilliant script. I think topping the \$100 million mark makes Arrival one of the top four films in the Best Picture conversation along with Moonlight, La La Land, Manchester by the Sea and Denzel Washington's *Fences*. Perhaps Martin Scorsese's *Silence* as well. (Why isn't anyone talking about the new Jim Jarmusch film as a contender?)

Robert Zemeckis' new romantic thriller, Allied,

starring Marion Cotillard and Brad Pitt, continued to bomb, selling just over \$7 million last weekend, good enough for the No. 4 spot at the weekend box office. Thus far the \$85 million film hasn't even made \$30 million in returns. So much for Pitt being a sure-thing draw. That said, I do think it looks like a good film and I hope to see it sooner than later. The competition for well-made, artsy dramatic films is just very crowded right now, and so Allied isn't getting the attention it may receive any other year.

Rounding out last weekend's Top 5 was *Doctor* Strange which has now made \$215 million in the U.S. and \$635 million worldwide. Good for you, Benedict

Also of note, Manchester by the Sea continued to sell out theaters while in limited release, playing on just 156 screens this past weekend. The movie has already made \$4.4 million before seeing a wide release. I would love to see this film explode and be a surprise holiday season hit. It has all the makings of a new American classic, and that's exciting.

New This Week: This weekend's releases are all about three very different films, starting with the only one that will see a major wide release, Office Christmas Party, an ensemble holiday comedy from Josh Gordon and Will Speck (aka the Blades of Glory guys). Looks fun, but the other two releases are much more interest-

Miracle on 34th Street to the hilarity of Christmas Vacation – it can't be argued that It's a Wonderful Life is likely the most watched of all the holiday films. Although rights to the film are now firmly held, and airings are a bit more sparingly doled out, the film was for decades in the public domain and could easily be seen on nearly every channel dozens of time from Thanksgiving on. There are few moments more intrinsically Christmas than George Bailey's poignant brush with the eternal and Clarence's quest for his wings.

First Presbyterian Theater has staged *It's a Wonderful Life* before, but this year's performances have a unique and special twist. For those who remember or have heard stories from parents and grandparents about the days when radio dramas and comedies provided the escape that now belongs to television, this year's FPT production is a radio-drama inspired telling of the classic story of the Bailey Building and Loan. Part heartwarming Christmas play and part behind the scenes storytelling, the play – as adapted by director Thom Hofrichter – is a sweet and entertaining twist on a standard stage play and allows for both a smaller set and a trimmed cast while never losing any of the heart and spirit of the Capra

Six Thought-Provoking Characters

It's rare that I'm excited when I see a play listed on a local theater's upcoming season listing. When I saw Six Characters in Search of an Author would be a part of IPFW's 2016-2017 season, though, I was truly pleased. Although I hadn't read it in several years, it's always been one of my favorites

Seeing the masked Characters walk through the back entrance of the Studio Theatre was exciting to me since the characters in question felt like unchanged old friends, and it was, at the very least, an interesting experience for other members of the audience on opening night. It was clear, too, that meeting this strange family was fun and thought-provoking for the rest of the audience.

As directed and modified from Luigi Pirandello's original 1934 script by IPFW Department of Theatre Chair Beverly Redman, *Six Characters* tells the story of the cast and crew of a production of *Macbeth*. It was an effective decision on Redman's part to transport the scene to IPFW and add references to members of the Department of Theatre, the campus itself and contemporary happenings. Doing so made it feel as if Pirandello's odd Characters had truly just walked into the actual space we as audience members were inhabiting with the players on the open stage.

Thanks to luck and the open seating of the little theater, I ended up sitting next to Redman, as I found out during the first of two intermissions when she overheard me say that I was teaching the play in a literature class this semester and introduced herself. Watching her tune into the reactions of the audience as they watched the unusual plot of the play within a play gave me a little something extra.

Without giving away too much, I can say that, with a somewhat shaky memory of what the ending

actually might mean and require of an actual audience. I took advantage of my position next to the director and actually asked what to do when the play seemed to be over and there was no clear answer. Going to see this is worth the time and ticket price if for no reason other the challenge of figuring out the ending.

Redman told me that the changes she had made to the original script and setting were to make the play more accessible to a local and modern audience. The changes work beautifully and no doubt enrich the overall impact of the play for theatergoers.

The Characters (Father, Mother, Step-Daughter, Son, Boy, Child) who interrupt the rehearsal of a contemporary performance have been in a kind of limbo as they were created by an author who abandoned them without fully completing the play in which they "lived." So, they propose to the director and actors of the production on stage that they be given life by

Rising to the Challenge

Three Rivers Music Theatre is once again doing something well worth noting in its Fort Wayne premiere of the Broadway musical The Light in the Piazza.

Adam Guettel's music and lyrics won the 2005 Tony Award for Best Original Musical Score and Best Orchestration, and it's easy to hear how this music would have charmed Broadway that year, with

its plush mixture of the "golden years" of Guettel's grandfather Richard Rodgers and the beautiful passions of Italian opera.

As Director Andy Planck noted in his opening remarks last Friday, "they said it couldn't be done, that Fort Wayne doesn't have the singers, that we couldn't manage the orchestrations." And yes, this production proves the doubters wrong. Three Rivers Music Theatre has assembled a cast of amazing musical capacity, starring the splendid Leslie Beauchamp, Billy Dawson and Kia Miller, along with a strong supporting cast and ensemble.

Set in Italy, 1953, the book by Craig Lucas is an adaptation of an earlier novella and movie. The story is one of romance and the complications that love and passion can stir. Tourists Margaret and Clara Johnson, an American mother and daughter, are marveling at Florence when Clara meets Fabrizio, a handsome young Italian man, and the two fall instantly in love. Margaret is protective of Clara, who chafes at the ongoing maternal attention, which is the first of several oh-so-delicately revealed conflicts among the characters.

From an audience member's viewpoint, it is this delicacy of dealing with the conflicts among the characters that holds this script back. The potential exists for some delicious drama along with love and lightness, but it's as if the playwright ducks and runs for the piazza and another stroll. This reticence may be very true to the denial-drenched 50s, but between that and the substantial amount of Italian dialogue, it opens the audience to having to do a lot of guessing.

That said, however, this production does many, many things right. Leslie Beauchamp as Margaret is stunning. She is by turns coy, clever, tormented, resolute, loving, funny and tragic. It is worth the cost of a ticket to see this local talent in one of her best roles ever. As the young lovers, Billy Dawson and Kia Miller have that unusual quality for a local cast: real chemistry. That they are both tremendous singers and actors able to present subtleties of their characters through gestures as well as the spoken word is wonderful to watch.

The supporting cast includes good performances by Fabrizio's family, including Renee Gonzales as Franca, Nick Abbott as Giuseppe, Justin T. Herber as the papa and Jen Poiry-Prough as Fabrizio's mother. I adored the scene at their home, with momma translating the action for us – the funniest scene of the whole show!

The cast is complete with Greg Stieber (off stage as Mr. Johnson), Mary Alberding, Bobbi Jo Carroll, Isabel Chilian, Nico DiPrimio, Jordan Gameon, Lindsay Hoops, Darby LeClear, Minelli Manoukian and Jimmy Mitchell.

On the production side, I found the profile staging to be a problem. With no curtain, scene changes involved moving one couch multiple times in quick succession, and no full walkway around the stage meaning the many strolls turned into pacing. Lighting Designer Jeff Salisbury did not seize the opportunities to help shape the mood of a show with "light" in its title. Where is the Tuscan sunlight?

In other production comments, Jill Bixler's costumes were terrific and absolutely right. Music Director Tommy Saul and the five-person string orchestra were good, with one area for improvement: the keyboard seemed to play at full volume all night. Because of that volume, it forced the singers to sing over the forte of the piano, at the cost of emotions in a few of the later tunes.

The performances are worthy of this show, and what few areas there are for improvement do not detract from what one earlier reviewer described as "an atmospheric musical."

The director of a children's Christmas play (literally) breaks a leg right before rehearsals begin. Sounds like a far-fetched set-up, right? Life sometimes imitates art, though; and while *Best Christmas Pageant Ever*'s fictitious, wheelchair-bound Mrs. Armstrong turns her pageant over to unsuspecting Grace Bradley, I've limped along on crutches directing Youtheatre's production since breaking my foot in November.

It helps to love your material, and I love this show. *Best Christmas Pageant Ever* has everything a good show (especially a good Christmas show) should have. When Grace Bradley and family take

over their church's Christmas pageant, they're forced to contend with incapacitated but pushy Mrs. Armstrong and the Herdmans – possibly the most inventively awful kids in history! Throw in three reluctant wise men, a group of ragtag shepherds, some adorable baby angels and a surprise visit from the fire department and you've got the recipe for a classic

family comedy. Like all great Christmas shows though, *Christmas Pageant* finds a way to tickle your funny bone and pull your heartstrings in the end. It's that mix of comedy and holiday heart that has made the story an enduring classic since its debut 45 years ago.

For decades, Youtheatre's production was a December tradition alongside *The Nutcracker*, Holiday Pops and 24 hours of *A Christmas Story*. Local audiences flocked year after year as countless

young performers cut their teeth in bathrobes and bed sheets.

I've lost count of how many I directed. Now, after a hiatus, the Herdmans and I are back with a fresh new anniversary production. For me, it feels like a family reunion. Not only are all my favorite characters back, but I'm reunited with a few faces of

Christmas Pageants past. Janet Piercy, mother in all my previous incarnations, returns as Mrs. Armstrong, while an all-grown-up Kimi Holmes-Eckman graduates from playing daughter to mother. They're joined by local stage veterans Jim Matusik, Ellen Akins-Schroeter, Ben Wedler and a talented Youtheatre cast of thousands (or so it

seems).

We're also excited to invite previous *Pageant* casts, friends and audiences who grew up on this story to a special free reunion party. So if you were ever the angel in the balloon sheet or remember when the Herdmans set fire to Fred Shoemaker's old broken down tool shed, join us before the Dec. 10 matinee to reconnect, reminisce and celebrate 45 years of the Fort Wayne favorite. original.

In fact, in Hofrichter's Director's Notes, he says that this production – the fifth for FPT – is staged as a radio drama to allow the script to follow the film more accurately. No longer required to cut scenes or characters due to staging concerns, Hofrichter's adaptation allows for the entire tale of George Bailey to shine. And shining along with the story are the actors who very capably handle their roles.

In fact, other than Kevin Torwelle and Catherine Harber who play George and Mary Bailey respectively, every other performer is left to tackle multiple roles, each demonstrating tremendous range. Watching Austin Berger move seamlessly between Mr. Martini, Pa Bailey, Gower and a hilariously understated bank examiner is a delight. But perhaps no one showed more ability to channel different characters than David Sorg who managed to perfectly portray both the guileless Clarence and the dastardly Potter, managing voices completely unique to each character.

While Torwelle and Harber aren't required to

switch from character to character as their costars do their challenge was still significant. So iconic are the film portrayals of Jimmy Stewart and Donna Reed that it would be easy for them to underwhelm. But Harber sweetly captured Mary Hatch Bailey, showing a lightness and loyalty that we've come to expect from the character. And Torwelle brilliantly resisted any attempt to impersonate or invoke Stewart's distinctive delivery, portraying the beleaguered George as less world weary and more earnest than what we've seen in other performances. If he drops the ball, the entire show collapses, but he was clearly up to the challenge.

An added bonus was the delightful contributions of Duke Roth, who capably handled duties as Sam Wainright and more significantly provided sound effects as Foley artist for the "radio" production. Those added touches, and the classic radio organ music provided by Jeanette Walsh, were the icing on the cake of an exceptional production.

a staging of their sad story. As one of the Characters explains, "the instrument of the creation will die, but his creation does not die," and they are desperate to be given a chance to live, if only momentarily.

As the Father tells us, "Ours is an immutable reality which should make you shudder when you approach us if you are really conscious of the fact that your reality is a mere transitory and fleeting illusion, taking this form today and that tomorrow." Their constant state of sameness leads the Characters to some-

times seem almost cartoonish, which is made completely understandable by the script and actors.

The decisions of the production team work brilliantly. The student actors of both parts of the cast give fine performances and the black box theater is used exceptionally well as the play within the play is built, allowing the characters their chance to live, if only for a moment, as Pirandello's Characters suggest, in IPFW's young cast.

'What would Clara think about this?' I needed to think as Clara. I'm doing my best to be in the moment, listen to my cast mates, and be as honest in situations as I

Clara is a sweet girl who comes of age in Florence, Italy, during the early 1950s. "She's sweet and she's funny, without trying to be. She wants so badly for there to be good in her world and she's willing to fight for it," says Miller.

She has also had to rely on nonverbal communication in this role.

'Clara's not great with words," she explains. "I feel like I developed many of the relationships I have with other characters in the moments

when Clara isn't saying anything at all, when she's reacting to something, or waiting, or observing, or listening. Those moments are just as telling to me as the moments when she's speaking.

Musical theater is filled with young, naïve ingenues. What makes Clara different, Miller says, is that "she grows in a way that those charac-

ters did not. They may come to a realization, but Clara gains control of her decisions in a way that's different from other characters I've played."

Part of what makes Piazza so special, Miller believes, is its balance between humor and depth.

"This show is funny," she says. "Really funny. It's also tragically realistic. The show is an experience. You'll leave the theater thinking, 'Life is beautiful. Love is real.' We've been working on this show for weeks and we're still laughing and crying happy tears at every rehearsal. It hits home every time.'

Director Andy Planck loves the musical as much

as Miller does. "His heart is in this show," she says. "and I can't wait for people to see his work."

She also has accolades for the rest of the cast and crew. "I think what makes Three Rivers Music Theatre different from other companies is that everyone came into this process on their A game," she says. "This show is hard but everyone was willing to work to conquer it from day one. I have never worked with a comparable group of prepared actors, musicians, and technicians in Fort Wayne."

She also admires the company's dedication to "not just doing shows that will draw a crowd. They're about creating art with a purpose, bringing something
