

Fort Wayne on the Move

Imagine, if you will, a world where smiling people flock to once inaccessible riverbanks to take in a concert and wander among treetops, where a neighborhood transcends demography to welcome young and old, rich and poor, merchants and residents, and where history meets innovation and local inhabitants rush in to work, play and live.

With apologies to Rod Serling, the scenarios sketched above are not from some utopian *Twilight Zone* episode where things actually turn out good. They are the future reality of downtown Fort Wayne.

Three big projects in downtown Fort Wayne – riverfront development, the Landing redevelopment and the transformation of the former General Electric campus – are moving forward. Though currently in different stages of completion, when realized, the projects will add their own textures to the already improving ambiance of the city.

Riverfront Development

As the centerpiece of the massive Road to One Million drive to increase the population of Northeast Indiana to one million from its current level of some 750,000, the development of Fort Wayne's riverfront is moving ahead apace.

With financing and land acquisition nearly complete, construction of Phase I of the multi-faceted vision for the under-utilized rivers could begin by mid-summer, according to Fort Wayne Parks executive director Al Moll.

"Everything is going as planned," Moll said. "Construction drawings are being put together; we hope to get bids by May and city council approval in June. The earliest we can begin construction would be early July."

Well, almost as planned. Two parcels of land are still in private hands with the owners unwilling to sell their property to the city. But Moll said there is an eminent domain hearing set for February.

Phase I work will include both sides of the St. Marys River between the Wells Street and Harrison Street bridges. The land still not in the city's hands is on the south bank of the river. But Moll said the city should take ownership in coming months as the eminent domain process advances.

The \$20 million project will dramatically reshape the way residents view and access the river. Plans for the north bank include the Tree Canopy Walkway which will allow people to stroll through the trees 20 feet above the river bank. There will be a children's play area, public restrooms and enhanced access to the water for kayakers and canoeists.

The south bank will feature a promenade and pavilion, concession stands, gardens and seating areas, as well as art and education components and public restrooms.

Moll said the pieces of the financing puzzle are falling into place. In December, Fort Wayne City Council approved funding from the city's Legacy Fund to the tune of \$10 million.

"We're raising \$5 million on the private side, and we will appeal



to Regional Cities for 20 percent (an additional \$5 million)," Moll said. "We feel pretty good about getting that since we were the lead project in the regional cities proposal."

The Regional Cities money is part of the \$42 million grant the State of Indiana award in late 2015 to the Northeast Indiana Regional Partnership, which includes 11 counties. Public input from the counties chose Fort Wayne riverfront development as the top priority in helping to achieve the Road to One Million goal.

The Landing

Bad news greeted backers of the plan to redevelop the Landing last November when the U.S. Department of the Treasury denied the City of Fort Wayne access to an important funding source.

The city and Model Group, the Cincinnati-based developer pegged to complete the \$35.7 million overhaul of the Landing, had counted on \$6.7 million in New Market Tax Credits.

The project, as it currently stands, will reinvigorate the historic block of Columbia Street with 72 mixed-income residential units sitting atop 22 spaces of retail and commercial space and restaurants – ideally occupied by local businesses. The total square footage is around 113,000.

Model Group in February of 2016 was chosen to head the project, which includes seven buildings purchased previously by the Downtown Development Trust for \$3 million. The plans call for complete renovation of the existing structures.

But according to Kirk Moriarty, Greater Fort Wayne Inc. director of business development, the denial of the tax credits will not be fatal to the project, which he described as having a green light.

"Probably by the end of this week we'll have a better idea of where we can secure the additional New Market Tax Credits that we need," he said. "We anticipate a review by Model Group on January 17, when they go before the Regional Cities board in the afternoon,



The Grand Master of Mod

----- Feature • Milton Glaser

In the crowded and competitive field of graphic design, there are as many practicioners as there are styles to emulate and brands to plug, but there is only one Milton Glaser.

Known for his work promoting a wide range of artistic endeavors, Glaser, now 87, stands out from the crowd, thanks to his vision, pioneering spirit and steadfast devotion to art over commerce.

Even if you've never heard Glaser's name, you most likely have seen the often beautiful, sometimes political, always original results of his toil. Perhaps his most famous piece is of Bob Dylan in silhouette, the singer-songwriter's hair a riot of color. Glaser also designed the graphic package accompanying the final season of AMC's *Mad Men*, resurrecting the free love aesthetic he'd used in the Bob Dylan poster to hint at the new world awaiting Don Draper and company.

Glaser is likewise famous for co-founding New York Magazine, penning the now iconic I Heart New York logo and becoming the first graphic designer to receive the National Medal of the Arts, which President Barack Obama bestowed on him in 2009. Glaser is a living legend, in other words, and now northeast Indiana art lovers will have a chance to see some of his most celebrated work in person.

To commemorate Glaser's artistic legacy as well as celebrate their own ever-growing graphic design program, the University of St. Francis will be hosting Milton Glaser: Sixty Years of Design in its Weatherhead Gallery from January 21 through February 21. Those hoping to glean even more

insight into Glaser's work and legacy can likewise look forward to a lecture by Sue Walsh, a longtime collaborator of Glaser's, on Thursday, February 2 at 7:30 p.m. In USF's North Campus Auditorium. The talk is free and open to the public.

According to USF Gallery Director Justin Johnson, Glaser's work aligns well with the mission of the university's graphic design program.

"Milton Glaser is the perfect example of a designer who also has a distinct interest in all of the creative arts," Johnson said in a recent phone interview. "He has an interest in the visual arts, obviously, and this shows not only in the projects he's undertaken during his career but in his work as an illustrator and draftsman. He is a fine artist in his own right. He loves music, performance-based art and the culinary arts as well, and it's very clear that his passion for art in all its forms is integral to the way he approaches design."

Glaser's star-studded client list includes Juilliard, DC Comics, Brooklyn Brewery, Harry Chapin, Philip Roth, Esquire Magazine, the Holocaust Museum, Indiana School of Music, The Newport Jazz Festival, the

"Because his interests are so wide-ranging, his work appeals to a very broad audience," Johnson said. "I'm thinking specifically of two posters he designed for Juilliard which will be on display at the exhibit. His whimsical approach in these posters is guaranteed to reach a diverse group of people, including children. It's quite remarkable. The variety he employs in his illustrative styles, design treatments and even font usage shows how significant a designer he is and highlights his strengths as an artist."

Born to Hungarian Jewish immigrants

in New York City in 1929, Glaser's success story rivals anything you might see on AMC. As a young man, he graduated from the East Village's Cooper Union School of Art and went on to study graphic design at the Academy of Fine Arts in Bologna, Italy, courtesy of a Fullbright scholarship. In 1954, along with several classmates from his Cooper Union days, he helped found Pushpin Studios which became, in the ensuing decades, one of the most sought-after graphic design firms in the United States.

Johnson said Glaser's reputation as an innovator is well earned. Consider, for instance, the Dylan and *Mad Men* posters.

"I find it fascinating and very telling that the Dylan silhouette is as contemporary as anything he's doing now – the *Mad Men* package, in particular – but he was working on that half a century ago," Johnson said. "Obviously his style is timeless, and the fact that he can manipulate that very timelessness into something that still speaks to us today is evidence



of his talent and his reach."

Speaking of reach, Glaser's designs can be found in galleries all over the world, including the Museum of Modern Art in New York, the Israel Museum in Jeru-

salem, the National Archive at the Smithsonian Institute in Washington, D.C. And the Cooper Hewitt National Design Museum in New York.

All very impressive, of course, but perhaps even more so is the fact that Glaser has found the time, between founding firms and magazines and designing more than 300 posters, to teach, to pass on to the next generation of designers his love of the graphic

"That is another reason Alan Nauts, our program director in our graphic design department, and I thought Milton Glaser's work would be a wonderful fit for us," Johnson said. "Because he's worked on the academic side of things, he's more than willing to share his work with universities like ours

A Fairy Tale Update

In this instant gratification world, it's hard to explain the joyful, painful anticipation of waiting for your very favorite shows to air on television. Holiday shows were a one-shot deal, not to be repeated until the following year. Old movies were aired at the whim of local channels (and they were almost all local channels back then). If you wanted to see a particular show or film, it was necessary to scour the television

guides scrupulously to see when you might be able to see it.

The generation that grew up in the 1960s and 70s understands this process well, and many particularly remember two shows that made annual appearances and were eagerly anticipated weeks in advance. One was The Wizard of Oz which became a staple of that gleeful anticipation, commercials touting its yearly outing enough in advance to whip youngsters into fits of excitement.

The other was a musical version of *Cinderella* which enchanted fans for more than a decade.

The musical – with memorable songs by Rodgers and Hammerstein – has a long history of its own, and it's one that un-

til recently has played out entirely on television. Originally broadcast live in 1957, the show was a coming out party for a young performer still unknown to most audiences, someone named Julie Andrews, who managed to carve out a nice little career for herself in the years that followed, earning an Oscar just seven years later for *Mary Poppins*. While that version still exists and is now available on DVD (instant gratification at last!) the version better known to audiences years later was the 1965 version with Lesley Ann Warren. Warren herself had quite a career, and in fact both Andrews and Warren earned Oscar nominations for the 1982 Blake Edwards comedy, *Victor/Victoria*.

It was Warren's performance that came to represent Cinderella for millions, as it was at that time way more accessible than the animated Disney version from 1950. Eventually, another filming for television of Rodgers and Hammerstein's *Cinderella* hit televisions in 1997, this time with singer Brandy in the lead, exposing the show to another generation. These three versions are all still available, but it's also possible to see this magical musical live on stage, and the touring show visits the Embassy Theatre January 17.

The stage version of this classic first opened on Broadway in 2013, and while it promises some new twists on the iconic television versions, fans can still expect the lovely Rodgers and Hammerstein songs to be prominently featured, including "Ten Minutes Ago," "Impossible/It's Possible" and "In My Own Little Corner." While some adaptations of the Cinderella

fairy tale (not to mention the very original story) can take dark turns, the musical is far more spirited and less mean. Although the stepmother and stepsisters are unkind to Cinderella, they're far less menacing, providing comic foil more than malevolent threat.

Among the changes made to the story when the show moved to the stage are some significant nods to contemporary culture. Tatyana Lubov, who steps into some pretty big glass slippers as Cinderella, told Broadway World that she thinks the changes are im-

"It's very contemporary how it's written," she said. "It's very witty and fun. Something that's important for me is that Ella has been created into a much stronger character and is even politically in-

volved with Prince Topher. She's been created as an equal with the prince, and that's so important for little girls to see nowadays, and I think it will be very inspiring."

Tweaks made were done so with the full cooperation of the Rodgers & Hammerstein Organization which oversees the astonishing legacy of the masters of musical theater. In order to make the stage show long enough to sustain two acts (the television versions were well under two hours of actual running time minus commercials), additional songs from the vast Rodgers and Hammerstein catalog were added and more attention is paid to the political volatility of the kingdom at the center of the story.

Although the show's Broadway run was cut short, falling short of what is considered a hit on the Great White Way, the touring production which soon visits Fort Wayne has become a hit with audiences and critics alike. A review in Madison Magazine, from Lubov's home state of Wisconsin, includes reference to Lubov's own assessment to the show's updates.

"It was no surprise that Lubov received the most boisterous ovation at curtain call time, but rest assured that the production is full of highlights from the other principal roles, much engaging choreography, a little has-to-be-seen-to-be-believed visual transformations and a great deal of humor. [Douglas Carter] Beane's version of the story sets much of it in the woods where



Back for Another Round

It usually takes new music festivals at least three years to break even.

But Middle Waves, which debuted last September in Headwaters Park, did it in one.

"We're a not-for-profit festival," said festival co-organizer Matt Kelley, "so our goal the entire time was to end at zero. And we were able to do so, which meant that we were able to pay all of our bills – a pretty important thing."

Middle Waves was a gamble. It had, and has, higher and broader aspirations than most Fort Wayne music festivals. It aims to be a destination festival, the sort of event that draws people from miles around with its cachet, not its lineup, necessarily.

Kelley said he and other organizers and sponsors were hoping the inaugural edition of the festival would succeed, of course, but they were prepared for signs of seeming failure as well.

"When you do something for the first time, you want its merit judged on the

quality of the event and not some other factor," he said. "If it failed, we wanted it to fail because it was a bad idea, not for some other reason. Our wild card was the weather."

If it had failed and the prevalent weather during the festival had been the sort that tends to drive people from open spaces, no one would have known if the whole thing had been a good idea or not, Kelley said.

As it turned out, the first Middle Waves festival did get a little rain, but it wasn't enough to dampen spirits or drain coffers.

Kelley said marketing the first one was like selling a unicorn. Some people who hadn't been to established destination festivals like Pitchfork, Lollapalooza and Bonnaroo didn't understand the concept.

"We were trying to describe it and we'd hear 'Why are two acts performing at the same time?" he said. "And I'd say, 'Well, that's the festival experience. It's a choose-your-own-adventure. That's the built-in thrill. That you can't see everything."

Thanks to social media exposure and strong word of mouth, those people have since seen the unicorn, Kelley said.

"I really felt like we could have done it the following weekend again," he said. "I don't know that we would have doubled the crowd, but there was this sense of, 'Boy, I would have gone if I'd known it was going to be like that."

The success of the first installment has greased the gears for the next installment.

Kelley said Middle Waves staffers were invited to participate in XLIVE 2017, an an-

nual conference for a consortium of festival organizers across the country.

It is a small conference that features a lot of bigwigs, Kelley said, and the Middle Waves folks were able to pick a lot of brains.

"We really got to network and hear best practices," he said. "And we really heard horror stories about first years that made us think, 'Boy, we're really ahead of where most first year festivals are."

The folks who did most of the heavy lifting for the first festival (Kelley calls them asking price is another potential snafu with which all festival organizers must contend. Kelley said.

"It's very Tetris-like, the booking," he said.

The first acts will be announced sometime in the spring, as was the case last year. Kelley said. Festival dates have been confirmed, he said: September 15 and 16.

One of the biggest complaints about last year's festival, he said, was something that was out of organizers' control and will continue to be out of organizers' control.

"The excise prevents you from crossing the street with a beer in your hand," Kelley said. "And far and away the biggest criticism in our survey and even on site was: Because we're on both sides of Headwaters, somebody would buy a beer on one side and want to go to the other side to see an act. They'd either have to chug that beer or dump it which was a sore point for a lot of people."

There's really no solution for the problem, he said, beyond a more lenient interpretation of the excise laws.

Seeing as selling "a unicorn" has given way to selling assets. Kelley said, marketing efforts on behalf of the festival have become smarter and more expansive.

Kelley said he anticipates reaching out to potential festival-goers in Indianapolis, where an inaugural music festival scheduled for late last year failed badly.

One thing that makes it challenging for organizers of new festivals in Indy is Live Nation, he said. Live Nation's Klipsch Music Center has a radius clause.

"Everyone's scared of it," Kelley said.
"Unless Live Nation does the festival – and they do many of these; they go around and buy them up – there will likely not be one in

One of the more rewarding aspects of helping put this festival together, Kelley said, has been the general air of cooperation and collaboration in the city.

"(People who have produced other events in the city) – we can email them and say, 'How did you get this permit?' and they ask us the same," he said. "Everything has felt very collaborative in a way – formerly, it felt to me like it would be like, 'I don't want to tell you how that happened."

Kelley said festival organizers outside of Fort Wayne have been equally generous with information.

"I think we found that, just like with festivals here – I mean, (Three Rivers Festival executive director) Jack Hammer answers every text immediately with insight – the same has been true of other festivals."



red shirts for their official festival attire) gathered recently for a retreat at Kelley's One Lucky Guitar.

Everyone, he said, committed to the extra work that will be necessary to put together and put on the second installment.

"To do it the first year, it took a year and a half from the first meeting to the event," Kelley said. "But it is something you work on all year long, it feels like. And we all just really had to say, 'Are we interested in doing that?"

"We'd go around the table and there was a lot of, 'Yes, but I haven't talked to my spouse yet," he said, laughing. "But with a larger leadership team, we are all back, committed to it and excited about it."

The festival is in fundraising mode now, Kelley said, while simultaneously negotiating with bands. It's a balancing act.

"We broke even, which means we don't have any cash," he said. "And with most of the things we want to do, whether it's booking a band or figuring out the stage, it's 'Money down."

Artists must be courted carefully at this stage, Kelley said.

"We hope the interest isn't, 'Well, tell us by Friday,' because we don't have the money" he said

Scoring the Flaming Lips as a headliner last year was a coup that has created high expectations for the next installment, he said.

"They certainly set the bar," he said. "So I think our sights are set a little bit higher."

J. Hubner Sidewalks

The multi-instrumental force of nature known as J. Hubner has been at the music-making game for nearly 15 years now. Goodbyewave's beautiful indie pop first hit ears in 2002, and the more brash, edgy and improvisational Cambodia Highball project came along in 2014, as did the



instrumental improv of Dream District. Meanwhile, the Warsawnaut has also been creating satisfying and emotionally forthright tunes under his own moniker.

As the new year swims into focus, Hubner greets it with a return to instrumental music, this one entitled *Sidewalks*. According to the man himself, the project first took root as "an audio/visual collaboration" between Hubner and a graphic designer/musician friend. The work stalled, but Hubner eventually revived the musical side of the project upon discovering what would be its new central sonic focus: an analog synthesizer.

Each of the pieces on *Sidewalks* pulses and buzzes in its own way, with synth figures ringed by looped guitars—sometimes identifiable as such, often rendered by effects into something resembling synths themselves. You can all but see opening credits in a film popping up as the looping "sidewalks (Main Theme)" unfolds. "Complex Distraction" follows, full of strident, layered synths. You don't need to be aware of the genesis of this album to appreciate Hubner's use of repetitive, simple instrumental figures on sidewalks. And fans of composers like Cliff Martinez, Mac Quayle and, yes, John Carpenter will appreciate the starkness, tension and old-school vibe evident in these songs. If you're a newbie and you can't get enough of the sinister throb that introduced the *Stranger Things* title card on Netflix, then you're in luck.

But *Sidewalks* doesn't strive to simply ape these styles; at most, it's homage. And if you're at all familiar with Hubner's other work, you'll recognize his musical detail work nestled within the cracks of these moody movements.

"Past the Present (Into the Past)," but for its thrumming synth bass, could have been a long intro on one of Hubner's past releases. Other highlights include the airy and majestic "Particles (Blown Away)," the dark, cycling "Desolation" and "Blacklight," which ever-so-slightly recalls Radiohead's *Kid A* ventures.

It's worth following Hubner as he follows his inspiration because sometimes he arrives at places you wouldn't expect. And here we are. The best way to listen to *Sidewalks* is to simply give it time and let it pull you in. It will. Let it be your personal soundtrack for a while. (*D.M. Jones*)

Drive-By Truckers

American Band

The Drive-By Truckers, by now an American rock institution and always a sturdy source for great recordings, have never backed away from pointed social commentary in their music. Their lucid observations of what it means to be Southern in a modern world have always drawn deserved atten-



tion for their intelligence and sensitivity. And now, with American Band, the Truckers have put themselves on the line and made a record that's going to be relevant well into the incoming presidential administration's tenure.

American Band is political. It's divisive. In the two decades this combo has existed, they've never shied away from taking a position; principals Patterson Hood and Mike Cooley have always offered a window into the trials and tribulations and aspirations of the white Southern man, crafting romping rock and keen insight into something of a new Southern Gothic figure. Call it unsentimental romanticism. This time out, race comes to the fore straight out of the chute, with the tough "Ramon Casiano" addressing the killing of a Mexican teenager by a white one – who later became a border agent and eventually went on to lead the National Rifle Association. The subdued "What It Means" tackles another thorny, race-charged issue: the deaths of young black men at the hands of police and would-be citizen sentinels.

The Truckers are unapologetic about taking sides here. In fact,

Wally Badarou *Echoes* (1984)

Wally Badarou was a Frenchborn musician who was an informal member of the band Level 42. A utilitarian sessions player, he appeared on albums from Mick Jagger, Talking Heads and Robert Palmer, among others. His solo career was



established in the late 70s, and this album was one of his instrumental works. Even though synthesizers thrived in the 80s, the record still has a very fresh sound 30 years later is one of the cooler synth-records of the decade.

Opening with the upbeat and warm "Keys," Badarou taps the synth reminiscent of German new-wave artists Tangerine Dream. "Hi-Life" follows and has an jazzy Afro/calypso beat to it. The sound of children on a playground is also heard, giving it even more shine. The theme of the release, as stated by Badarou, was to be "a soundtrack for an imaginary trip of a little boy throughout the world."

"Mambo" is a percussion heavy number (and a little darker in texture) and floats around for almost five minutes. "Voices" has a more ambient feel about it and has layers of feelings in its arrangement and structure. "Chief Inspector" has a Herbie Hancock feel to it and is almost danceable while "Waltz" dances around in the middle of side two with a sunny disposition about it. If you remember Spyro Gyro, this will sound very familiar. "Jungle" has darker atmosphere, but it eventually crawls out of its brooding feel to practically smile at you in all of its African-roots quality. It's probably the best track on the release.

Badarou continues to produce music (for himself and others), and also works on film scores. (*Dennis Donahue*)

Cooley has pointed out in press materials that "I wanted this to be a no-bones-about-it, in-your-face political album." That it is.

American Band goes on to address domestic terrorism and gun violence (Hood's "Guns of Umpqua"), as well as certain unnamed "headline grabbing ring masters" on "Kinky Hypocrite." But when the big, angry Statements fade out and the songwriters focus on dimly lit interiors, you really get a feel for the depth of their artistry.

"I like it better when the sun don't shine / Clouds are forming in this state of mind / Always storming in this state of mine," Hood sings on the delicate, melancholy "Sun Don't Shine." On "Baggage," he continues the theme of dealing with depression, this time within a subtly rocking, soulful arrangement.

Throughout American Band, the Truckers' sumptuous, interweaving guitars never fail to bolster the material, and as always, the songwriting chops are unbeatable. You may not agree with everything you hear on this sometimes outraged, often prickly album. But you can't deny it's honest music directly from the heart. That's the only way they know how to do it. (D.M. Jones)

John Legend

Darkness and Light

When John Legend draws criticism – and that's not often – the complaints usually come from critics who have no patience for the sentimentality of his pop ballads. On *Darkness and Light*, Legend tries to answer those critics by wrapping his trademark sentimentality, along with



his gospel and R&B roots, in something a bit more palatable to hipsters and indie-rock lovers. It works well enough, but unsurprisingly, the album is strongest when Legend sticks to sincerity.

Legend shakes things up by bringing in Nashville-based producer Blake Mills, who worked with Alabama Shakes on *Sound & Color*. Mills pushed Legend toward political songs, and he weirded up the arrangements to create tunes that would be at home in a Brooklyn kombucha brewery. The Shakes' Brittany Howard even came on board for the title track, which would be a fairly straightforward Marvin Gaye-esque tune if not for the distortion that kicks in



and in the evening present before city council for the legacy funds."

Moriarty said the public-private partnership originally planned to request a \$2.5 million loan from the Legacy Fund and \$7.1 million from Regional Cities, but those figures could change slightly. Other funding sources include \$3.94 million in first mortgage equity from the Illinois Finance Fund, \$2.5 million in city tax increment financing, \$3.25 million from individual investors, nearly \$4 million in historic tax credit equity from the Ohio Capital Corporation for Housing and a \$1.2 million loan from the Downtown Development

It's not unusual for the treasury department to deny NMTC to applicants. In the 2016 application round, \$18 billion dollars were requested by cities around the country with only \$7 billion being awarded, according to Mary Tyndall, public information officer for the City of Fort Wayne's Community Development Divi-

The city has received these credits in the past, in 2008 and 2014, Tyndall said, with the allocations used to close financing gaps for projects such as The Harrison, Turnstone Plassman Center and Skyline Tower.

Despite the denial of the NMTC, Moriarty said the track record of Model Group, which the city chose in part because of its success with similar projects such as the Over the Rhine neighborhood in Cincinnati, increases the chance that financing will be secured.

"Model Group comes with a great deal of credibility," Moriarty said. "We can't wait to get this thing

General Electric Campus

When it comes to sheer size, the revitalization of the GE campus on Broadway is beyond compare. With 17 buildings totaling 1.2 million square feet and more than 31 acres of land, the sprawling complex has so much potential it is hard to fathom.

At least potential developers and GE appear to be flummoxed thus far, despite support for doing something from the city and the state. In May, General Electric retained CBRE in Indianapolis to list the property and seek development proposals. The July deadline produced four proposals, but a September deadline for selecting one has come and gone.

"We are making progress," said GE spokesman Matt Cronkite, "but there is nothing significant to report. I think we're still interacting with the people who have submitted the proposals. It has taken us a little bit longer. Not really sure why. With a big project like this, there are a lot of little things to sew up.'

One item that was sewn up was the iconic sign that for decades loomed over the area like a full moon. The sign was turned off for good in 2015, shortly after GE shuttered the factory that had employed thousands of workers since the late 1800s. With no human presence on the campus, vandals soon took advantage and began to damage the sign. GE sent crews to remove it

"Despite our efforts to seal the site," Conkrite said in a statement at the time of the removal, "intruders are entering GE's Broadway campus, climbing onto the building in the East Broadway campus and vandalizing the GE sign atop the building. The lights had been shut off since last year as a result."

The abandoned site soon began to deteriorate. In May of 2015, another of the buildings was razed. The loss prompted 5th District Councilman Geoff Paddock to take action.

"People were concerned about rotting neighborhoods, and that GE could go the way of Lutheran Hospital," Paddock said, referring to the demolishing of the hospital on Fairfield. "That was torn down and it became a park. It's a nice park, but it took the property values away."



So Paddock formed a task to seek options. The task force sparked interest from Mayor Tom Henry and Greater Fort Wayne Inc., and the decision was made to help market the property.

Paddock pointed to the success of South Bend's effort to convert its former Studebaker plant into a technology hub. Some 220,000 square feet of the plant are being renovated at the cost of \$22.9 million, \$18.6 million of which was secured using New Market Tax Credits and some of Northwest Indiana's share of the Regional Cities windfall.

Paddock hopes such innovation will take hold at the much larger GE campus.

"As we get into 2017, Greater Fort Wayne Inc is working with GE to find a buyer or buyers to renovate a portion of the campus with the help of tax incentives, Paddock said. "And the state is interested. I think we're heading in a real positive direction. There may be something to show the public in 2017."

The topic of princesses (particularly Disney princesses) is often fraught with some anxiety, as society has moved away from telling little girls to aspire only to marriage. But in recent years there's been a move - from both audiences and ultimately Disney and other entities - to expand upon those possibilities, blending the magical world of castles and pretty dresses with something more substantial. The updated Cinderella provides both the traditional story - and those gorgeous songs - and a heroine in keeping with today's values. There could be no better version of this classic tale than the one currently touring the country. But if you have a chance to check out Lesley Ann Warren as Cinderella, you should probably do that too.

A Perfect Kick-Off to 2017

For this first column of 2017, instead of a critical review, I will offer an exuberant appreciation of a movie that continues to be a movie-going experience that means so much to multiple generations. If you remember the thrill of the Millennium Falcon jumping to light speed, *Rogue One: A Star Wars Story* is not to be missed. You've probably already seen it. If you haven't, this a stern warning that this appreciation will be rife with spoilers.

The original *Star Wars* turned me from a teenager who already loved all kinds of movies to a lifelong, passionate fan of all things cinematic. I think it is hard to underestimate the positive effects that one film had on the movie-making industry and the landscape of contemporary entertainment and storytelling.

The title and marketing of the film suggest that Rogue One: A Star Wars Story is a stand-alone. Technically, that's true, but it's also a gross understatement of what it means to the universe of Star Wars. Courtesy of Rogue One we know how the blueprint plans of the Death Star came in to the hands of the Rebel Alliance. Even better, we know why the Death Star had a flaw that could be exploited to destroy it. And it is a reasonable explanation that makes the feat of a small

fighter's ability to annihilate such a huge weapon be lievable.

Rogue One is a story probably most appealing to those of us who grew up on Star Wars, not just because it answers questions, but also because it connects so directly to the original film. Present in the new film is Governor Tarkin, a combination of the actor Guy Henry who wore motion capture sensors through the filming so that his visage could be transformed in to the image of Peter Cushing who died in 1994. (To recreate his likeness the filmmakers requested and received permission from Cushing's estate.) With a little footage leftover from the original and some digital magic, Red leader and Gold leader from the first film are leading the crucial attack.

The Expanding *Star Wars* Universe

Tops at the Box: For the fourth consecutive weekend Rogue One has taken the top spot at the U.S. box office, this week selling another \$22 million while bringing the film's four-week total to \$914 million worldwide and \$477 million in the U.S. You know what this means, right? This means that we are going to see a lot of spin-offs. Not just Star Wars spin-offs, but all kinds of big franchise spin-offs. I start making suggestions because that sounds like a fun game and it's an inevitable truth, but I don't think I'm ready to be involved in that reality just yet. And no, I'm definitely not anticipating these supposed Avatar sequels and likely spin-offs that await us. But, anyhow, like I was saying: Star Wars. Rogue One. It's a big deal. Quietly, at least as far as the Star Wars universe is concerned, it's a big deal.

Also at the Box: Theodore Melfi's newly expanded Hidden Figures, starring Taraji P. Henson, Octavia Spencer, Kirsten Dunst, Jim Parsons and Kevin Costner, took the No. 2 spot at the U.S. box office last weekend, selling \$21.8 million and upping the flick's 17-day total to \$24 million. Almost \$25 million. Nabbing the No. 3 spot at last weekend's box office was animated hit Sing which sold another \$19.7 million, bringing the very good movie's 17-day U.S. total to \$213 million. Add in abroad sales and Sing has already sold \$356 million. Not bad for a December release. Underworld: Blood Wars took the No. 4 spot at the U.S. box, selling \$13 million over its first weekend of sales. How many of these films exist now? How many will exist before it's all said and done? Is Kate Beckinsale right for these movies? And, one more question: are there people who hotly anticipate new Underworld movies? Rounding out last weekend's Top 5 at the U.S. box office was Damien Chazelle's hit art house musical, La La Land, which sold another \$10 million, bringing the film's five-week sales total to \$52 million in the U.S. and about \$86 million worldwide. Looks good. Also of note, Kenneth Lonergan's Manchester by the Sea has now sold \$33 million in the U.S. That's over three times the sales total of Lonergan's other two wonderful films' worldwide sales total combined. I saw the film this past week and enjoyed it quite a

bit. I think it's the kind of film I'll need to see a few times to fully appreciate, but living with it for a few days has made me appreciate it much more. It feels so unassuming and subtle when you're watching it, but feels very grand in retrospect.

New This Week: Three new films open this weekend – horror flick *The Bye Bye Man*, action comedy *Monster Trucks* and crime drama *Sleepless*. Peter Berg's Boston Marathon Bombing film, *Patriot's Day*, starring Mark Wahlberg, will see an expanded release, as will Ben Affleck's *Live by Night* and Martin Scorsese's *Silence*. I get the feeling that both Affleck and Scorsese's flicks are going to bomb. People are all about the awards season films right now, and neither of these are seeming to be a part of that conversation. I'm not sure I'd call *Silence* a Dump Season film just yet, but it seems like, as far as Scorsese films go, it's more Dump Season than not. I'm guessing it's more artful and cinematic than, say, *Shutter Island*.

ScreenRant: Speaking of awards season, the Golden Globes took place last weekend, and Damien Chazelle's La La Land cleaned up, winning Best Musical or Comedy, both Best Actor categories, Best Director, Best Screenplay and a few other smaller awards. Whoa. I figured La La would take home some paper weights, but I didn't think it'd clean up to the degree that it did. My favorite film of the year, Moonlight, won the night's biggest award, Best Drama, while Casey Affleck won Best Actor and Isabelle Huppert won Best Actress. That pretty much sums it up. Oh, and somehow Aaron Taylor-Johnson beat out supposed sure-thing Mahershala Ali for Best Supporting Actor while Viola Davis stole (my opinion) the Best Supporting Actress award from Moonlight actress Naomie Harris who gave (again, my opinion), a classic performance.

Dubious Rock n' Roll Choices

Anatomy of a Song by Marc Myers, Grove Press, 2016

Marc Myers' collection of essays about several dozen popular songs has historical merit, that's for sure. Anatomy of a Song sets down on paper (or the digital equivalent) the stories of some of the most well known songs of the past half century or so, and in doing so it creates a valuable record of some valuable records (sorry, it was impossible to resist). Whether or not the book provides much unexpected insight into the historical significance of the songs is a more open question

In the book, Myers collects interviews with the writers of 45 popular songs, beginning with 1952's "Lawdy Miss Clawdy" by Lloyd Price and ending with 1991's "Losing My Religion" by R.E.M. The interviews were originally published in Myers' "Anatomy of a Song" column in The Wall Street Journal, and for the book he has added an introductory essay to each interview that explains the song's context.

In an introduction, Myers explains that he made the decision to publish the interviews as text uninterrupted by interjections from himself. This choice, he says, is to make the interviews into an "oral history" of the songs, told only in the voice of the songwriters, unfiltered by the observations of a journalist.

To some degree, the approach works well. The songwriters tell their own stories and in some cases reveal interesting tidbits about the origins of the songs. We find out, for example, that the Isley Brothers' "Shout" began as an impromptu riff on a different song during the group's live performances, and that "Runaround Sue" was an attempt by Dion DiMucci to call out a specific girl from his neighborhood in the

In other ways, though, Anatomy of a Song feels flat, beginning with the decision to let the interviewees' words stand entirely on their own. Myers claims to want the songwriters' voices to come through in the pieces, but the interviews seem to have been edited in a way that drains them of vitality.

Consider what Ray Davies supposedly said about the origin of the Kinks' "You Really Got Me":



"Shortly after I formed the Ravens in 1963 with my brother Dave and bassist Peter Quaife, we began wearing colorful outfits we had bought on London's Carnaby Street. Dressed in these flamboyant clothes at a pub with our manager, Larry Page, I loudly insisted we needed an edgier name than the Ravens."

It's almost impossible to believe that Davies actually said these exact words in this particular order. He's unlikely to have referred to "bassist Peter Quaife" or "our manager, Larry Page," or to have begun a sentence with a clause like "Dressed in these flamboyant clothes at a pub..." Nor is it likely that R.E.M.'s Peter Buck recalled being "at home on my sofa in Athens, Georgia." People just don't talk that way, and these interviews don't feel as if they present authentic voices.

Then there's the songs themselves. Myers laid down a rule for the song selection process, asserting that none of the songs could be less than 25 years old. It takes at least a quarter

century, he says, for a song's influence and importance to be fully understood. That's why the book ends with "Losing My Religion"; anything fresher would be too young to have adequately proven itself.

It's easy to argue that Myers could have chosen newer songs that were more influential than "Losing My Religion," which he claims paved the way for the advent of grunge, a dubious claim at best. And what about the fact that grunge was a short-lived phenomenon and that pop music of the last 25 years has gone predominantly in a direction unrelated to both it and R.E.M.? Or what about Myers' choice of Cyndi Lauper's "Time After Time" as a representative of the MTV era? Even with the aid of 25 years' worth of intervening history, he's not all that great at spotting iconic songs.

Anatomy of Song is fine as entertaining reading for the casual music fan. As a serious document of popular music history, however, it's not terribly satisfying.

lovers and also an army of enthusiasts who have made improving movie technology their life's work. Countless innovations, across genres and styles, have come from innovators originally inspired by *Star Wars*.

Rogue One is also a movie for adults because it involves sacrifice and death. Many of the characters in Rogue One perish while protecting the ideals of a representational alliance over the bullying and tyranny of the Empire.

"We have a problem on the horizon. There is no horizon," says K-2SO (voiced by the wonderful) Alan Tudyk. Early prognosticators downplayed the appeal, beyond diehard *Star Wars* fans, of a stand-alone story with no big stars. After just four weeks in theaters, the film is about to surpass \$1 billion in ticket sales worldwide.

The diverse cast will keep the force strong. The horizon for the franchise isn't in sight yet. With stars from Britain (Felicity Jones), Mexico (Diego Luna), Hong Kong (Donnie Yen), and China (Wen Jian), the movie will travel well. Multiple ethnicities beyond country of origin make the soldiers of the Rebellion

an appealing alliance.

I saw *Rogue One* after the deaths of Carrie and Debbie Fisher. We fans will see Princess Leia one more time, at the end of 2017. Her role in *Episode VIII* has been shot, though some adjusting for the loss of any future appearance of the Princess turned general might be needed. But Carrie Fisher is so much more than the smart mouthed, plucky fearless Princess Leia

She had a saucy mouth and brutally honest attitude and talents as a writer, script doctor, muse and truth teller. Her mother was a consummate trouper, remaining generous and full of gratitude through heartbreaks, divorces and bankruptcies. The two of them are the opposite of the shade thrown at "Hollywood" types.

The last word of *Rogue One* is hope, uttered by the plucky Princess. I can think of no better word to lead us up to *Star Wars Episode IV: A New Hope* and to see us through 2017.





To commemorate the centenary of World War I, First Presbyterian Theater presents the comic (mostly) play Heroes, written by French playwright Gerald Sibleyrus and translated by Tom Stoppard. It was thought the play's original title, The Wind in the Poplars (Le vent des peupliers), would be confused with Kenneth Grahame's popular children's story The Wind in the Willows; hence the name change in Stoppard's transla-

Sibleyrus noted that many French World War I veterans were retired at an early age to military hospitals. So we have Henri who has been at this convent hospital for 25 years, probably entering the "old age" home in his 30s.

Set in 1959, our veterans are occupying an outdoor terrace at the back of the hospital. Along with Henri and his bum leg, we have Philippe, who has a tendency to pass out at frequent intervals due to an embedded hunk of shrapnel, and Gustav who, while physically fit, has serious issues being in locations other than his room or the terrace.

The horror and heroism of the war is deeply entrenched in these three, and the terrace has become the new battlefield.

So how is this play is "mostly comic"?

It is influenced by the styles of Chekhov and Beckett. Sibleyrus and Stoppard understand that life is both a comedy and a tragedy at the same time - comic, if one views the world through your head, or your intellect; tragic, if you view the exact same circumstances through your heart, or your emotions. And so our three "heroes" struggle to retain their humanity by battling against encroaching patients, an overbearing (and offstage) Mother Superior, each other, and over the reality

of a stone statue of a dog.

It becomes clear that in concocting an impossible and faintly ridiculous escape plan, what they are really fighting is the overwhelming and grotesque truth that their sacrifices in the Great War were meaningless. The savage fighting over small patches of territory yielded little save scarred landscapes, bodies and

> minds and led to a second "War to End All Wars."

Yet our undaunted heroes

fight on with humor and fortitude, burdened by advancing senility and decrepitude. The promised land of the poplars and its gentle wind ("the solemn wind that swept the fields of mortality for a hundred centuries, the one sole audible symbol of eternity") awaits.

The play features myself, Daniel Bulau and Thom

Hofrichter as the three old veterans. It is directed by John O'Connell, with stage management by Sharen Gall and Anna Gray.

It previews Thursday, January 12 at 7:30 p.m. (all seats \$12) and runs Fridays and Saturdays, January 13-28 at 7:30 p.m., with one 2 p.m. matinee on Sunday, January 22. Tickets are \$20 general admission. \$18 for patrons age 65-plus and free for full-time students with reservations. so that students and the public alike can benefit from seeing his technique up close."

In addition to Glaser's career highlights, the exhibit will include work by students in USF's graphic design program. They will be showcasing some of their best posters from the previous year, so, in effect, attendees will be treated to a glimpse of where graphic design in America truly began, and where it might be headed in the future.

"It's rare for Fort Wayne to host an exhibit of this caliber by an artist so influential and seminal in his field," Johnson said. "We're excited to have the chance to introduce Glaser's work to a local audience. His is the kind of work that speaks to everyone, and, at the same time, dares to make a statement about the value of art in our modern age."

near the end.

The political overtones on the album sometimes have a bit of disorientation to them, too. "Penthouse Floor" is a suggestion to take the problems of the urban street directly to the skydwelling elites, an idea that could be especially cutting now that a gilded tower is the defacto seat of our government; the problem is that Legend himself is one of the "they" who live up there and not one of "us" down here.

On the album's opening track, "I Know Better," Legend laments that until now he's been singing "what they want" instead of what he knows. Ironically, it's this barebones gospel song about humility that feels like the most authentic thing on the album. Elsewhere, Legend might be singing what he knows, but it seems like he's singing it the way "they" want him to sing it. Absent self-conscious production, "I Know Better" lets Legend's sincerity shine through, just as it does on his best pop ballads. (Evan Gillespie)
