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Interpreting Rock's Icons

This just in: Bob Dylan will not be attending Down the Line. Then again, neither will any of the other artists featured in this year's version of the wildly popular event. But that's okay. The bands being covered in the local talent showcase are in good hands.

Now in its 11th year at the Embassy

Theater, Down the Line has returned to its original format: one night, five bands. This incarnation will see the music of Bob Dylan, Chicago, Prince, INXS and Deep Purple interpreted on the stage.

The February 11 shindig will see a diverse range of Fort Wayne musicians tackling an equally varied selection of national acts. And while a majority of the match-ups seem like no-brainers, at least two pairings had Embassy program-

The success of the first year led to subsequent years and eventually to an expansion of the brand that Duymovic eventually came to view somewhat as overkill.

Down the Hard Line was added for headbangers, then Down the Country Line for boot-scooters, and the original Down the Line then needed the tag "classic" to distinguish it from the newcomers.

Which leads back to the 2017 Down the Line. For Soul 35, The Union Project and the Tim Harrington Band, choices of which artist to cover seems natural.

Soul 35 picked Prince. The vocal flexibility, guitar pyrotechnics and rhythmic





ming director Jared Duymovic very nearly scratching his head.

For several years now, Duymovic has had the difficult yet challenge of choosing the lineup for Down the Line. This year, that process led him to invite Phil Schurger and Sun Gate, the Tim

Harrington Band, Soul 35, Sankofa and The Union Project. But who each band picked to cover was out of Duymovic's hands.

"The special sauce of Down the Line has always been the diversity," Duymovic said. "There used to be a fairly prescriptive model. My spiel to the bands is I'm not the artist. I want the bands to pick what they want. Their motivations are their own."

When it debuted in 2006, Down the Line was viewed as sort of a one off event to help raise money for the Embassy. That first year saw loads of enthusiasm, not only from the people who lined up to see the show but from the musicians who had what was likely a once-in-a-lifetime chance to perform in the beautiful atmosphere and acoustically magnificent theater in front of hometown fans.



The problem, Duymovic found, was that the bands for expression of the brand didn't necessarily want to stay within the confines of the

label. Country is not always easy to distinguish from classic rock, which can be hard rock, and the performers may want to stretch out and try something beyond their normal realm, he said.

"I went through the first cycle of three and found that it was hard to categorize genres," he said.

So that model was switched for a twonight, festival-type concept. That, too, despite its success, seemed a bit much. While it worked from a variety standpoint, Duymovic said, it still seemed to spread the brand too

"Building the story arc of the lineup was fun," Duymovic said of the 10-band, twonight version. "Going back to five bands was harder for me to handle a little bit be-

complexity of the late musical genius will fare well in the capable hands of vocalist Jordan Applegate, guitarist Jon Swain and drummer Bryan Nellems. This is a band that grabs your attention without being in your face about it. As Duymovic noted, even when filling the role of background music in the corner of some restaurant, Soul 35 finesse their way to the foreground of your

The Union Project are a collection of young, talented musicians featuring Austin Marsh, who plays guitar and sings, Sam Byus on guitar and vocals, keyboardist Jake Allen, Lance Roberts on bass and Colton Conrad behind the drums. Despite their relative youth, the guys in Union Project have a firm grasp of classic rock, and the choice of Deep Purple fits right in with their tastes. Any band that can tackle "Lazy" credibly has my vote.

If ever there were a band to cover Chicago, the Tim Harrington Band are it. With Harrington on guitar and vocals, Paul Row-

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Putting on Some Romance

For many years Fort Wayne Ballet provided the area with three large scale productions at the Arts United Center, as well as their Family Series which featured their Youth Company dancers in a smaller setting more suited for younger audiences. But in

the last few years their ability to tap into the more adult and intimate space of the Auer Center ArtsLab, the black box theater just downstairs from their studios, has opened up new creative options for the ballet company and its talented roster of dancers and choreographers.

This year's valentine from FWB, Love Notes, takes place the weekend before the holiday and is just one example of how the ballet has made use of that beautiful new space. With three performances (one at 9 p.m. Friday and two at 7:30 and 9 p.m. Saturday), the performance provides a wide variety

of dance allowing the company to display the far-reaching styles at the heart of their training. While most associate the ballet with classical dance - and that will be prominently featured in these performances as well - modern and avant garde will also bring a great deal of emotional depth to this tribute to dance.

"One piece will be the Swan Lake pas de deux, which is a beautiful piece and will be part of our spring production of Swan Lake," says Karen Gibbons-Brown, executive and artistic director of Fort Wayne Ballet. "That piece features a beautiful, melancholy violin solo which is really quite striking. We'll also have the famous pas de deux from Spartacus, which is really a bravura piece. In the mid-20th century, Russian men came to prominence in dance, and they began developing a series of pieces that were really a tour de force for the men, featuring their strength with one-handed lifts and suspended lifts. And the score for that is lovely as well."

Gibbons-Brown also touts the work of her dancers, including Jordan Stevens, Jenna Bruin and Tracy Tritz, all of whom provided works for the performance. She speaks respectfully of how Bruin's piece, which honors the love of a mother, reflects the feelings Bruin dealt with when her mother was diagnosed with breast cancer. Although her mother's health crisis is now over, Bruin admits that the piece still touches very deep emotions for her.

"This experience has been unique for sure," says Bruin. "I can tell already that I have grown from this experience in my life, but it is something that will always be a painful memory. I still have very strong emotions when explaining parts of the piece. In order to get a semblance of what I originally had, I have to go back to those feelings and back to the dark place or the piece won't read the same. Movement is movement. The reason

dancers place behind the movement, and they have to learn what the choreographer's intention is and then interpret it to what they think it means to them. If I don't show rawness and open up to them, how will they feel comfortable in doing so?"

This is not the first performance of Bruin's choreography, and for this production Bruin is restaging it to include a male dancer, not originally part of the first staging. This time there are a few significant differences from her first experience with putting the choreography on stage.

"It would even be different if it was the same cast as before," says Bruin. "People change and grow over time, and three years does a lot to a person. But this cast I have chosen is really different, only because of the two new people who have not done this piece before. However, it may be more to what I originally intended it to be, a symbolic representation of my mother's three children and how each dealt with the situation: Me fighting the truth of what was really happening; my brother being strong on the outside, yet ready to break down at any moment; and my sister courageous for all of us. At least this is how I saw them.

"Adding a male dancer will definitely give a very different quality to the piece, but you also have to remember that men are affected by breast cancer too. They are somebody's husband, brother, son and father. Majority of the time they are the caretakers of these women battling cancer, and that can

break down any person. Yet to do something like that day in and day out must come from great love.'

With romantic love and maternal love already demonstrated. Tritz's piece provides insight into all levels of love, from family to community, emphasizing how all-encompassing love can be.

"I'm trying to portray all the different ways we can impact each other's lives," says Tritz. "People come and go. Sometimes we flirt. Sometimes we ignore. Sometimes friendship, romance and/or passion blossom. Other times anger, betrayal and jeal-

ousy surface. All of those interactions have an impact on us and change us whether we realize it or not. In turn we impact others. It's all about how intertwined we all are."

Tritz says the inspiration comes from relationships she's witnessed in her own life and her own interest in observing her fellow human beings.

"I'm fascinated by human relationships: the interaction and reaction. It's a constant inspiration for me. The anger pas [dancing step] is actually straight from a chapter of my life. At one point in Chicago I lived below a couple that was the tiniest girl you could imagine and a very, very big guy. They would fight constantly, and it was very easy to tell that she was the tiger and he the teddy bear. Complete juxtaposition to the surface appearance. So that part is a small homage to my past."

Tritz also appreciates the atmosphere afforded Fort Wayne Ballet in the ArtsLab.

"I love for pieces like this to be in the black box. This piece centers around intimacy and connectedness. The black box is a naturally intimate space that allows the dancers to bring the audience into the choreography. It allows them to be part of the experience and connect with us. It's an ideal representation of the work itself."

Gibbons-Brown also appreciates the black box and how the closeness to the audience allows the dancers to really shine. Her respect for their efforts is evident when she speaks about both them and the upcoming performance of Love Notes.

"I love watching them develop. I just love watching the process."

Ivory-Colored Valentines

Valentine's Day is clearly coming up. We know this from the heart-shaped boxes of chocolate and huge, fluffy bears that have replaced the candy canes and Santa hats in the holiday aisles of our local grocery stores. Another sure sign? White Castle has started taking reservations for its coveted corner booth, Cupid-themed service. If your idea of romance - not to mention your beloved's is a bit more on the sophisticated side, you might consider foregoing the chocolates and

bears and burgers and fries in favor of a performance by pianist and songwriter Brickman who will take the stage at Wabash's Honeywell Center Sunday, February 12 at 7:30 p.m.

Known as one of the most successful adult contemporary musicians performing today, Brickman grew up in Shaker Heights, where he began playing piano at age four. Well, not technically a piano. His parents, not sure his youthful passion for the instru-

ment would stick, had him start on a piece of green felt. The keys were drawn in with marker. Brickman practiced religiously on the makeshift keyboard, and his parents decided it was time to purchase a beat-up piano (which they kept in the basement) and enroll him in lessons.

Those first set of lessons did not bode well. The teacher was quick to inform Brickman's mother that he had no talent. Such an edict delivered when Brickman was young and uncommitted could have signalled the end of his love affair with the piano. Instead, his mother opted to take him to the prestigious Cleveland Institute of Music where, luckily for his loyal fans, he flourished under the tutelage of more insightful teachers.

A practical Midwesterner by birth and temperament, Brickman began his life as a pianist by writing jingles. As a college student at Cleveland's Case Western Reserve University, he launched his own jingle business, going door-to-door in an attempt to convince local businesses to hire him to shill for whatever it was they were selling. Young and hungry, he was no snob when it came to his clients, and he composed jingles for kitty litter, bug spray, lotteries, fast food and cars. He understood that hard work was nothing to be ashamed of, and besides, how does that saying go? You have to start somewhere?

After graduation he moved to Los Angeles and began composing songs for his first solo instrumental album. Again, he refused to be shy when it came to self-promotion, sending demos to labels and local radio stations. It took some time, but eventually his tireless strategy worked, and in 1994 he signed with Windham Hill Records. That same year he released his debut, No Words, which featured "Rocket to the Moon," one of his most loved songs to date. It was also a surprise Billboard hit. Surprising because instrumental piano tunes rarely get radio play.

was emotional, that people could use for stress relief, or for a massage, or for a dinner party, or for trimming the tree. I just felt like there was something missing when it came to that category."

His body of work, which includes several Christmas albums - The Gift, Grace, Christmas Romance, The Hymns and Carols of Christmas, Joy, All is Calm: Peaceful Christmas Hymns and The Magic of Christmas, to name a few – is an attempt to fill that void with calming, carefully crafted music that is, at its core, emotionally moving and

unapologetically authentic.

Influenced by the likes of Jim Henson, Walt Disney, Joni Mitchell, Carole King, Carpenters The and Burt Bacharach, Brickman writes songs that reach a diverse audience. He's admitted that, at first, his fans were mostly women, but over the years more men have begun filling the seats too, drawn Brickman's easy-going entertainer persona and the variety that characterizes his shows.

What can a new Brickman fan expect from one of his concerts?

"They'll get a little of everything," he promises. "Beautiful solo piano music, romantic and relaxing

songs, stories, and even some laughs. No flashy special effects - just pure music! It's a great escape for a couple of hours, to hold hands, close your eyes and exhale."

At this point, having worked not only with McBride, but Michael W. Smith, Lady Antebellum, Jane Krakowski and Johnny Mathis, and having performed in the storied spaces of the Grand Old Opry, Carnegie Hall, Disney World and the White House, Brickman is an established musician awash in Grammy and Dove award nominations. He's even written four books, and hosts his own weekly radio show, the Jim Brickman Show, now in its 20th year on air.

The little boy from Shaker Heights who was once told he didn't have what it took to become a pianist has grown up to be a top draw in the concert world and the single best selling adult contemporary pianist in history. Hmm. There just might be a song in there somewhere. But it would take a Jim Brickman-level talent to write it



Brickman's followup to No Words, 1995's By Heart, likewise stunned the industry when singles "Angel Eyes" and "If You Believe" landed coveted spots


on the adult contemporary chart. It became clear to DJs, critics and, of course, fans, that Brickman had something special to offer audiences. On his website, Brickman describes his music this way: "The industry experts tell me that Jim Brickman is New Age, but I consider my sound 'pop instrumental.' My melodies are simple, inviting and real with a touch of hope and romance.

Who can resist such a winning combination? Very few, it turns out. Two years after releasing By Heart, Brickman was back with Picture This, his first album to feature a guest vocalist, country star Martina McBride. The two artists collaborated on the song "Valentine" which helped Picture This go Platinum.

Brickman told Parade Magazine's Dr. Nancy Birk in 2013 that he aims for his music to soothe and comfort listeners.

"I always felt like there was a place in the world for music that was non-intrusive, that was melodic, that was beautiful, that

Straight Outta Defiance

Now in their tenth year, Flat Tire Ambulance have been bringing their brand of straight-ahead riffheavy rock to the Summit City from their hometown of Defiance, Ohio since early on in their existence. As a band, they're adept at writing originals (they have released three full albums so far, along with the occa-

sional music video available on You-Tube) though their live set nowadays is often heavy on crowd-pleasing covers. They are in the process of writing and recording another new album, which they intend to release this year.

Upon first listen, FTA hit you over the head with some ously heavy guitar crunch, but don't mistake them for a purely aggro band. There are always hefty doses of melody in the mix, and the basic mood and

tempo of their music ranges from fast and aggressive to moderate and fun-filled to slow and moody. That variety is reflected in their lyrical mix, too, which can range from the more serious (the death of a loved one) to the lighthearted (humorous takes on love and relationships) to pop culture (the history of the Etch-A-

In fact, while the band can blow the roof off musically, there is a consistently wry sense of humor that makes its way into the band's lyrics, attitude and even its name. The name Flat Tire Ambulance - which in real life would be your worst nightmare but kind of funny as well - comes from a mix of real life and witty fiction. Founding member, singer/guitarist and chief lyricist Skip Skeens was indeed in a serious vehicular crash (he was struck by a drunk driver) and his wife always made fun of the way he said the word "ambulance," which has an unusual emphasis on the last syllable - "ambulance." He figured he had come up with a memorable band name he could use to rib his

"I always would make up a different story every time I'd tell it. I had people believing I was in a bad accident and we had a flat tire on the way to the hospital," says Skeens. "And there can be so many different meanings that you put to it, like life's little unexpected things that happen all the time, and what could be worse than being in an ambulance and getting a flat

Despite their Murphy's law-like name, Flat Tire Ambulance haven't experienced much in the way of transportation difficulties, enabling them to take their music into a number of nearby markets. While Defiance - population 16,000 - has a solid local music scene, it's also located within a reasonable driving distance to several other cities with significant music scenes. Fort Wayne is about an hour's drive for them ("I would say outside our hometown of Defiance, we probably play Fort Wayne most frequently," Skeens says), but they are also close to Toledo, Bowling Green and several other smaller cities.

The band may have formed ten years ago, in 2007. but their history goes back even farther. Founding members Skeens and drummer Joe Robles had known each other for years, having played in previous bands like Grace Engine and Delphi. Starting out as a threepiece, FTA eventually expanded by adding a second



guitarist. Current members are Skeens and Dan Hamminga on guitar, Chuck Mast on bass and drummer Matt Egler. Robles left last year due to health issues and was replaced by Egler, who was already familiar to band members. Hamminga attended school with him, and Skeens knew him from the local scene.

Despite their talent, hard work and strong body of work, the band have no plans on straying far from home anytime soon. They all have domestic responsibilities - both familial and professional - but that doesn't stop them from playing some high-profile regional gigs. They have been on the stage at the Hub (when it was Piere's) and at C2G Music Hall, and they still have dreams of being able to play even larger venues like the Coliseum. They have also been able to open up for some of their heroes, including guitarist George Lynch.

"I was always a huge George Lynch fanatic," Skeens says. "I would sit in my room and read about him in Guitar Player magazine ,and I never thought I'd meet the guy, much less share the same stage as him. But we opened up for him twice, got to met him afterwards, got pictures and stuff ... I was on cloud

Making connections can be a powerful part of being in FTA, but its their personal connection with fans that keeps them going.

Skeens points to one of his songs, "I Wish I Knew," which was written after a nephew of his committed suicide, and the effect it had on someone that attended one of their shows.

"There was a person that came to a show that said how much that song really touched them because they lost someone to suicide," says Skeens. "That connection of knowing how that song touched somebody, that was just a good feeling. So, to keep doing stuff like that and even if somebody comes up after a show and says hey that's an awesome show, that really keeps us

Fort Wayne Funk Orchestra

Funk Band for the Common Man

If you want to celebrate some achievement in your life or curse some setback in Irish wake fashion, your best bet would be to get a bunch of friends together and go see the Fort Wayne Funk Orchestra.

Calling them one of Fort Wayne's best party bands doesn't really do justice to the excellence of their playing and the synergy among players.



But the band sure does know how to throw a party.

The Fort Wayne Funk Orchestra are releasing their first CD, Funk Band for the Common Man, and are commemorating this occasion with a party on February 4 at Columbia Street West.

Funk Band for the Common Man is a good CD to put on if you want to combat the winter blues. In six months' time it will also be a good CD to put on if you want to celebrate having forgotten winter ever happened.

At one level, *Funk Band for the Common Man* is a historical tour. I hesitate to use the phrase "historical tour" because it might put people in mind of artifacts in glass cases and educational spiels delivered in low tones. This CD is not that kind of historical tour.

Instead, it pays lively homage to every epoch of funk music: the James Brown era; the Earth, Wind and Fire era; the Minneapolis sound; Rick James' punk funk; and the dawn of hip-hop.

Anchoring most of the songs is the excellent rapping of bandleader Aaron King. I am the last person anyone seeking hip-hop expertise would want to go to, but King's writing and performing work here transcends the ignorance of people like me. He is unquestionably dazzling.

Other members are Tony Didier, Jason Westerman, Drake Bates, Miguel Burney, Jamont Simmons and Dave Latchaw.

Highlights of the CD are "Ain't Nobody Funking Around," which evokes (for me) Kool & the Gang, and the title track, which seems reminiscent of the atmospheric seventies soundtrack work of Herbie Hancock or Lalo Schifrin.

This is a muscular and meaty release performed impeccably. Hopefully, it's the first of many to come. (Steve Penhollow)

No Waves

I remember being pretty floored by *Coming Apart*, the first record by the Kim Gordon/Bill Nace avant noise band Body/Head. In fact, I can remember thinking how on the edge that album was. Piercing, jagged guitar squalls mixed with Gordon's improvised vocal belting made for a



compelling listen back in 2013. The record felt downright revelatory in comparison to what her ex-husband Thurston Moore was doing in *Chelsea Light Moving* that same year.

Looking back, I think it was a combination of the free-form and improvisational vibe of that album and the fact that Gordon seemed to have moved on from Moore's infidelities and create beautifully antagonistic art that made me love that album so much. I don't often revisit *Coming Apart*, but I feel it's an important LP to have in the collection.

Their new live record, *No Waves*, was recorded at the Big Ears Festival in Knoxville, Tennessee and contains three tracks that have been previously released, but are being used only as a rough outline for Gordon and Nace's free form noisemaking. There's nothing new here, but for the adventurous souls there's something to get lost in.


Body/Head feel less like a musical group and more like performance art. There's definitely echoes of Gordon's previous band, Sonic Youth, but she's pulling more from the earlier days of that band when it was more noise and confrontation than actual songs. It seems that for live presentation, the band can probably travel in

Foo Fighters

The Colour and the Shape (1997)

Although technically this is the second album from Foo Fighters, this is the first one where former Nirvana drummer Dave Grohl hired other musicians to help create a sound that can only be described as "post-post-grunge-alt-rock."



Musically, the late 90s postpunk scene wandered around with some dreadful all-purpose bands like Blink 182, Green Day and Yellowcard. Grohl changed

the scene by not worrying about trying to sell records to teenagers and created a sound that adults could appreciate too.

It opens with "Doll," a Nirvanaish number that also borrowed

from the mid 70s SoCal sound, followed by the smash hit "Monkey Wrench." Still one of my favorite FF songs,

"Monkey Wranch" blew away mainstream radio and had a

"Monkey Wrench" blew away mainstream radio and had a video that sold the power that this band generated. "My Poor Brain" has a pop sensibility, but doesn't sell out as a pop song. With a strong bridge, it still has some elements of grunge and hard rock

Another one of their classic tracks is "My Hero," a song rumored to be about Kurt Cobain. Grohl stated it was about everyday heroes, and their companion video for this tune explains it all. "See You" is also a great track and is considered the only pop song the Foo Fighters ever wrote. "Enough Space," with its trippy beat, is one of the heavier tracks on the album and is probably one of the last remnants from Grohl's Nirvana years. "February Stars" brings down the tempo a bit, but still has the substantial vocals that we have become accustomed to from a Foo Fighters record. It's probably the most underrated song they ever produced, in my opinion.

The Foo Fighters have released six albums since 1997, each one progressively better than the previous. But if you want to join the FF bandwagon, get this one first. (*Dennis Donahue*)

nothing more than a hatchback, as all is needed for their brand of art exhibition is two amps, two guitars and a vocal mic. The rest is up to attitude and wherever the emotions take them.

On *No Waves* the duo play to an entranced crowd (you can hear but one "woo!" before they jump into "Sugar Water"). Gordon and Nace's guitars intermingle and weave into each other like vines on a cobblestone wall. Gordon's pained blues howls join the noise before things quiet down and give her the space to take front and center. Her voice is reminiscent of the late and great Alan Vega. It's an aloofness that has a tendency to fall into insanity. "Frankie Teardrop" comes to mind.)The song feels like it could explode into a cacophony of noise at any moment and distorted guitar at times takes over but never totally takes over.)


The Show Is Over" is more noise vs. space as competing single coil growls escalate into a sonic argument with the universe. It's compelling, but also anxiety-inducing. Gordon seems to allow the music to take her vocally to other spatial realms. They say in space nobody can hear you scream, but I think they might be able to hear Kim Gordon.

The album finishes up with the 23-minute mash up of *Coming Apart* tracks "Abtract" and "Actress." "Abstract/Actress" is a musical painting with circuitry, magnets and string as the color palate and amplifiers as the canvas. Gordon and Nace contort guitars and feedback into this black hole of noise and negative space that you either will find compelling or will want to run as far away from it as possible.

No Waves didn't grab me like Coming Apart did, but I don't think it was supposed to. It's merely a musical document that shows as a live entity, Body/Head can be as visceral in front of your face as they can in your head through headphones. I still find this band revelatory, and I'd love to see where they could take it in the studio once more.. (John Hubner)



In the 23 years since they formed in Huntington Beach, California, Hed PE have been through a lot of stuff: a couple of record labels, more than a dozen albums, lots of anger and controversy and, most recently a line-up change. The constant through it all has been a flavor of music that the band calls "G-punk," an in-your-face fusion of punk rock and gangsta rap. That hasn't changed in 23 years, and it's almost certainly not going to change in the future.

Formed in 1994 when vocalist Jared Gomes connected with guitarist Wes Geer, the band grew out of the conservative environment of Orange County, bringing with it an aggressive disdain for the status quo that fueled its energetic stew of punk, metal and hip hop. A record deal came fairly quickly, but as often happens, the relationship between the band and the label soured over record sales and finances.

After that came some independently produced recordings and a 2006 contract with Suburban Noize. In its 21st-century albums, the band has never been afraid to court controversy; they seem to crave it, in fact, and the albums dive unhesitatingly into non-mainstream politics. The band is critical of fiscal



conservatism and organized religion, they're outspoken in their support of the 9/11 Truth movement and they're not fans of the criminalization of marijuana. Most significantly, their trademark is an unwillingness to hide any of those political stances.

In 2015, guitarist Jaxon Benge, who had been with the band for 12 years, left and was replaced by Greg Harrison, and bassist Kurt Blankenship replaced Mark Young. Young had been with the band from the beginning, and his departure left Gomes as the only original member.

That was enough to keep the unrest alive, though, and 2016's *Forever!* became the band's 10th studio album. With it came a renewed dedication to bringing down the New World Order, uncovering Secret World History, and just generally making a lot of noise.

an on trumpet, trombonist Patrick Dennis, sax players Matt Baker and Ben Essick, keyboard player Jeff Gastineau, drummer Wayne Davis and bass player Alan Carter, the band has the muscle to match Chicago in their heyday. Chicago have played the Embassy a few times, and it's only fitting that a band as good as the Tim Harrington Band should cover them for Down the Line.

The next two bands are where things at first glance might seem a bit askew. Anyone who knows Phil Schurger and his band Sun Gate knows that Schurger is a guitar player's guitar player. So when Schurger decided to play Dylan – not exactly a gunslinger – it surely must have been for some other reason.

"That's not even my concern," Schurger said. "What people don't know about me is I was an English major. My degree was creative writing. My first five years in music were as a singer-songwriter. I didn't really work on soloing that much. I didn't start playing jazz till I was 21. I was more interested in lyrical depth. At that point in my life, I was really into Dylan and the Dead. For me, Dylan touched on all these mystical depths. There's such a depth of mysticism in his writing."

With a career spanning half a century, Dylan is a difficult choice, and not just because his songs are famously long and verbose. He also had buckets of styles. But the period that really grabs Schurger is the era of the Rolling Thunder Review in the mid-1970s.

"The first Dylan album I got was *Hard Rain*. It was a live recording of the Rolling

Thunder Review. It was a cassette. That's the sound I hear in my head when I think of Bob Dylan's band."

In addition to the normal Sun Gate lineup of Colin Boyd on drums and Casey Stansifer on bass, the multi-talented guitar guru Kenny Taylor will be sitting in on lap steel. Taylor was Schurger's first guitar instructor and, according to Schurger, the main reason he's playing today. "He's the person responsible for starting me gigging," he said. "He's a really important figure for me in my life."


Then there's Sankofa. Sankofa made his mark locally as a rapper. So when he approached Duymovic with the idea of covering INXS at Down the Line, it took a bit for the notion to sink in.

"INXS's *Kick* was an album that my mom played a lot when I was growing up," said Sankofa, whose off-stage name is Stephen Bryden. "I realized Michael Hutchins vocal range was pretty similar to mine, so I thought I could pull it off. I mentioned it as a possibility. He (Duymovic) was intrigued."

The thing is Sankofa is going to sing the songs straight, not as a rap. It's something he's never done in public before outside of an occasional karaoke outing. Jared Andrews of Elephants in Mud will handle the synthesizer and drum machine portions of the set.

For Duymovic, Down the Line 11 is a return to form.

"It's kind of unfathomable that it's lasted this long," he said. "But it's a testament to the music community in Fort Wayne. Down the Line is this very specific thing. It can grow now on its original parameters."

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

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Oscar Night Gets Diversified

The Oscar nominations are out, and I wish I could vote. This has been a great year for movies. The nominations are a testament to how strong the industry is.

The nine Best Picture nominees are Arrival, Fences, Hacksaw Ridge, Hell or High Water, Hidden Figures, La La Land, Lion, Manchester by the Sea and Moonlight. Science fiction, a play about African Americans adapted for the screen, a war picture, a contemporary Western, the true story of African American women mathematicians that were integral to the success of our space program, a good old-fashioned (yet wonderfully modern) musical, an international true story of a boy finding his family after years of searching, a heartbreaking story of loss and a coming of age tale of a gay African American man – this is diverse storytelling.

After two years and 20 acting nominations for only white people, "Oscars So White" will not be an issue this year. Seven actors and one director of color were nominated. Other categories are also more diverse this year, and films expressing diversity have nominations in multiple categories.

In the Best Supporting Actress category, three of the nominees are African American; Naomie Harris (Moonlight), Octavia Spencer (Hidden Figures) and Viola Davis (Fences). This is the third nomination for Davis, and if I had a vote it would go to her.

Someday nominee Michelle Williams will get a turn. Her brief scene trying to comfort ex-husband Casey Affleck in *Manchester by the Sea* is the most memorable screen time by any actress this year.

Mahershala Ali is the frontrunner for the Best Supporting Actor Oscar for his role in *Moonlight*.

He's also wonderful in *Hidden Figures*. Appearing in two nominated films gives him an edge.

Jeff Bridges has his Oscar, but it would be hard, if I had a vote, not to vote for his role as a crusty and crafty detective in *Hell or High Water*. Not a politically correct film about diversity, *Hell or High Water* is a film that addresses class, race and justice in our country with humor and honesty.

With 14 nominations (tying *Titanic* and *All About Eve*) La La Land is a frontrunner. Titanic and Ben-Hur each won 11 Oscars. I don't know if La La Land will come close, but it is the film I would vote for as Best Picture. Yes, there is already a mild backlash against this romantic, frothy confection, but I reject that thinking. I am part of the backlash against the backlash. (If you haven't seen the SNL skit of detectives harassing perps lukewarm about the movie, find it online. It is funny.)

La La Land is a contemporary musical with an old Hollywood charm and rhythm. It has many nominations in technical categories that I am not qualified to weigh in on. I would need to see the film again. I was so transported by the joy and romance that I could barely see the technical side of things.

A Good M. Night and Oscar Picks

Tops at the Box: I'm not really sure what's happening. Apparently M. Night Shyamalan is having a second act in his career. I can recall sitting in a theater not so long ago and hearing what seemed to be the entire auditorium laughing together as the speakers told us that the trailer we were viewing was "from the mind of M. Night Shyamalan." But now, for the second consecutive weekend, Shyamalan's *Split* is the biggest selling film in America. The movie sold another \$26 million this year, upping its 10-day total to \$78 million in the U.S. and \$102 million worldwide. So I guess M. Night is back, and he's now saying that he's going to make a proper sequel to his best film, *Unbreakable*.

Also at the Box: A Dog's Purpose took the No. 2 spot at last weekend's U.S. box office, selling \$18 million over the film's first three days of release. Hidden Figures considered to sell well, bringing in another \$14 million over its sixth weekend, bringing the surprise hit's so-far total to \$104 million in the U.S. Yeah, sure, it looks good, but also a little Hallmark-y. Resident Evil: The Final Chapter did its usual numbers, selling another \$13.9 million over its first three days of release. Big deal. La La Land just keeps on selling, bringing in another \$12 million last weekend, making it a bona fide hit with \$106 million in sales in the U.S. and \$223 million worldwide.

New This Week: Two films will open wide this Oscar weekend, starting with franchise horror flick Rings which, I'm sorry, just doesn't look so great to me. The first film was fine, though, as I recall. Also out everywhere is sci-fi adventure flick The Space Between Us, starring Asa Butterfield, Carla Gugino and Gary Oldman. Mostly, I think people will be going to



La La Land, Manchester by the Sea and Moonlight.

ScreenRant: Speaking of those three films, well, here come the Oscars you guys. They're here. Last weekend saw the mostly predictable SAG awards offering what appears to be more clarity for those still trying to predict who will take home Oscars this year. Mahershala Ali (Moonlight) and Viola Davis (Fences) both seem like locks, as does Casey Affleck (Manchester by the Sea).

Here are my predictions for the major categories (not my picks, but who I think should win or wish would win):

Best Adapted Screenplay, Moonlight; Best Original Screenplay, Manchester by the Sea; Best Animated Feature, Kubo and the Two Strings; Best Documentary Feature, O.J.: Made in America; Best Cinematography, James Laxton (Moonlight); Best Foreign Film, Toni Erdmann; Best Supporting Actress, Viola Davis (Fences); Best Supporting Actor, Mahershala Ali (Moonlight); Best Lead Actress, Emma Stone (La La Land); Best Lead Actor, Casey Affleck (Manchester by the Sea); Best Director, Damien Chazelle (La La Land); Best Motion Picture, La La Land.

For the record, I think *Moonlight* and *Manchester* by the Sea were by far the best two films I saw in 2016.

Yarn Bombing Away the Blahs

Every year following the holiday season, there's a bit of a lull that feels a bit lethargic. After weeks of high-energy schedules and constant activity, things come to a stop as people find their enthusiasm and money supply waning. And certainly the gloomy weather doesn't help. The good folks in Auburn decided a couple of years ago that something needed to be done to shake away those winter blues, and they came up with a pretty ingenious way to do it - yarn bombing.

For those unfamiliar with yarn bombing, it's actually more artistic and structured than it may sound. Not at all like tossing bathroom tissue on the nearest tree, yarn bombing is a great way to re-purpose and recycle old crochet and knitting projects and bring color and life to the trees, light poles and other wrappable structures in any area. Auburn began doing this to draw people back to downtown, and We Love Auburn month was born.

Beginning the last weekend of January, yarn bombing is already brightening up the winter streets of Auburn, and this year not only have Auburn's events continued to grow, as more and more people and businesses have taken part in the now annual tradition, but adjacent communities have also gotten involved – which means if people from nearby towns want to check out all the fuss, they can do so in more than one community without spending the whole day

The event is planned each year by the Auburn Development Advisory Committee (ADAC), an allvolunteer organization which works to bring more business and foot traffic to the city. Sarah Payne, who serves on the committee, says the growth in the



No, She's Not Your Role Model

The Girl with the Lower Back Tattoo by Amy Schumer, Gallery Books, 2016

At the beginning of her memoir-ish *The Girl with* the Lower Back Tattoo, comedian Amy Schumer insists (in all caps) that the book does not offer "self-help info or advice." She says so because she knows, thanks to the nature of her celebrity, that the book is going to be pushed as an inspirational tome for young women, just like many other similar books by female comics have been over the past few years. Throughout the book, Schumer tries to be honest rather than inspirational, but she does occasionally fall into self-help lockstep. The result, unfortunately, is

a roller coaster of mixed messages that's likely to be confusing to readers who, against the advice of the author, look for guidance in the book's pages.

Schumer's claim to fame as a comedian has been the shock value of being a young woman who talks graphically about sex and bodily functions, and that's what makes up the bulk of the book. Most of the essays document Schumer's sex life, and jokes about excrement are plentiful. She makes much of being an unabashed lover of sex and having a total acceptance of her body, with all its quirks and imperfections. A great deal of the material is drawn directly from Schumer's stand-up routines, and it will be familiar to fans.

However, there's quite a bit of seriousness in the book, as well. Schumer writes about how her mother's narcissistic behavior tore her family apart and how her father's social eccentricity, alcoholism and multiple sclerosis all were dark spots in her upbringing. She writes somberly about her own experiences with domestic violence and nonconsensual sex.

It's in her addressing issues of sexual identity and body image, though, that she's most likely to be presented as a role model, and it's in those areas where her position is disorientingly unclear. She presents her pursuit of casual sex as empowering, but she also repeatedly writes about having (usually unsatisfy-



ing) sex with attractive men in an attempt to convince herself that she is, herself, attractive – a situation that seems far from empowered. She writes, too, about being entirely comfortable with her imperfect body.

but she also writes disparagingly about her own appearance and frets constantly over her desirability to men.

All this would be fine, introspective writing from a person who's conflicted in her self-image, if we could take Schumer at her word when she says she doesn't want to offer advice. But she's not totally consistent on this point. She insists, when talking about the press' need to make her a feminist spokesperson, that "I don't even pretend to speak for all women," but she concludes an inspirational chapter about body image with the contradictory line "I am all of you."

It seems in Schumer's nature to be a little self-contradictory. She claims in one story to have had only a single one-night stand in her entire life,

but it becomes clear later on that her definition of what constitutes a one-night stand is very narrow, and that by most people's reckoning the count would be higher. On a more trivial matter, she says in one chapter that she's good with numbers, only to say exactly the opposite just a couple of chapters later.

For fans of Schumer, the book is a depiction of the Amy that they already know and love. If Schumer were able to devote her energy to telling stories about how she managed to rise to the top of her field through perseverance and hard work (something that's unfortunately only really the subject of one chapter) she might even provide some inspiration. For the most part, however, it's best to take Schumer at her word and don't expect her to be a role model.

cinematography sparkle. I would vote for "City of Stars" for best original song. "Audition" is a second best song nominee from La La Land, and the two nominations may cancel each other.
