


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
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

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Voices As Big As Texas

Don't let the black cowboy hats fool you. The Texas Tenors aren't your typical horseridin', calf-ropin', tobaccy-chawin' type of cowpoke. Far from it. They have the Stetsons and the boots and the vests, all right. And at least one of them has that Texas twang. They might even ride horses and walk funny, like John Wayne. One thing is certain, however: they may look like cowboys, but they sing like angels. Like professional operatic Great White Way angels.

Which is pretty much what they are. Except for the angel part. The Texas Tenors are

very much alive. And for the past eight years, JC Fisher, Marcus Collins and John Hagen have traveled the world bringing their special blend of pop, opera, country and Broadway to thousands of fans. Now, at last, The Texas Tenors are coming to Fort Wayne's **Embassy Theater** on Friday, March 17.

The first glimpse anyone got of The Texas Tenors (And it is The Texas Tenors; other tenors

from Texas likely exist, but they aren't these guys) was in 2009 on the NBC show America's Got Talent. Their take on My Way earned them fourth place in the finals. But fourth was good enough to launch a

But it's not like Fisher, Collins and Hagen were shuffling around, kicking rocks and waiting for someone to discover them. They each had loads of experience. Collins and Fisher were veterans of the cruise ship circuit following stints Off-Broadway and on television (Collins) and in Italy learning opera (Fisher). Hagen, too, was an opera singer who performed with orchestras around the country and in Broadway musicals prior to settling into teaching.

But for Fisher, the success of his solo career wasn't enough. So one day he and Collins found themselves in Galveston, Texas, waiting for a ship when Fisher got an idea.

"Marcus and I were solo entertainers on cruise ships out of Galveston," Fisher said in a phone interview while on tour in Tucson. "We had been friends for a long time before that working as entertainers in the industry. He had his solo show. I had mine. I had sung with John years before. We started doing things together and decided to make a tape and send it into America's Got Talent. That's what started the whole thing. We've toured ever since."

Fisher got his start singing in a less than usual way. He sang in church like everybody else and noticed that he could sing louder than everybody else. Not that he did, but he knew he could. He also played on his high school's basketball team, and one night before a game he got an idea.

"My basketball team was pretty good," Fisher said. "I told the principal that the next Friday night I was going to sing the [national] anthem. People went crazy. I was out there in my uniform. Then the next week, with three teammates who also sang where he landed roles with the cast of Hairspray, in Off-Broadway's Altar Boyz as Matthew, in Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat and as Jinx in Forever Plaid. He also found work in television as an actor. appearing in more than 100 episodes of network television, including recurring roles on One Life to Live and As the World Turns.

While Fisher and Collins found success singing country and pop, Hagen took his skills in a different direction. His is the most operatic of the three voices, and he used his gift to find success in the Big Apple. He made his Lincoln Center debut in Teatro Grattacielo's mounting of Mascagni's Gug-

lielmo Ratcliff and went on to create three tenor roles in the world premier of The Lost Dauphin for Pamiro Opera airing on PBS.

Hagen has also performed roles ranging Alfredo in La Traviata to the title role of Otello for Cleveland Opera on tour. His Broadway roles include Billy Bigelow in Carousel and Che in Evita. Hagen has

performed the Verdi Requiem and Beethoven's Symphony No. 9 with more than a dozen symphonies including the Austin, Corpus Christi, Omaha, Nebraska and Cedar Rapids Symphonies. He has also taught voice and vocal pedagogy at Wartburg College and at his alma mater, the University of

Northern Iowa. But none of The Texas Tenors ever dreamed of the success they've had in the last few years. They've had tours taking them to more than 20 countries. They sell out venues wherever they go. And they have had great success with their albums which include five studio and two live releases.

As a sort of prelude to the March 17 Embassy show, their Emmy Award-winning PBS special will air on WFWA PBS 39, with tickets to the show available for a pledge.

During the conversation with Fisher, Collins came to the phone and summed up the reason for the great appeal of The Texas

"I've never had success like I've had with The Texas Tenors," Collins said. "We bring a spectrum of music with this group. Nice to have that variety. We offer the audience three different voices and three different guys to look at. It's much better than the solo experience. We each bring something different to the show."

in church, we worked up a quartet and we went out there and sang, and then they really went crazy. Never got applause for singing

Then his high school choir director came calling and told him and his friends they should join up. They did. After high school, he was off.

"I did two summers with a college program in Lucca, Italy," he said. "It was a program between Cincinnati Conservatory and Wichita State, where I went to school. I loved it."

Instead of following the opera route, as much as he may have loved it, Fisher opted for a more commercial approach and developed a country music-based solo act for cruise ships.

Meanwhile, Collins was taking a different approach. As a boy, Collins learned to sing by mimicking Garth Brooks and George Michael. In college he began classical training, then took off for New York ------ Feature • Northeast Indiana Playwright Festival

Bringing Words to the Stage

The Northeast Indiana Playwright Festival, in its eighth year, happens all day Saturday, March 18, at the Civic Theatre.

The festival was established to encourage playwrights with Hoosier ties and to celebrate their efforts.

Here are profiles of this year's first- and second-place winners:

Howard Kingkade's One Foot in the Gravy.

It would be correct to describe Kingkade as a screenwriter, playwright and sometime actor.

It would be also correct to say that this University of South Carolina professor of English and theater suffers no angst over perusing these disciplines as avocations rather than

Asked if he'd ever consider

writingfull-time, he responded, "I don't know if I would or not.

"It would depend on how much it paid, " Kingkade said. "It's hard to find a job writing

for a living. I don't think I could come up with that many ideas."

One of his ideas, One Foot in the Gravy, won first place at the 8th Annual Northeast Indiana Playwright Festival.

One Foot in the Gravy is a comic take on that perennial plot involving a greedy wife, a rich and ailing husband and a dim boyfriend.

The play has been given a staged reading before, but never a full production, he said.

"It went through a number of rewrites," he said, "There's some

stuff in this Civic Theatre script - there's a whole new third act to it, basically. It's kind

Kingkade's Indiana connection is that he grew up in Hammond and attended I.U. Bloomington.

He found out about the contest in driveby fashion - he was passing through Fort Wayne and saw a sign for the festival.

Kingkade said he is an old hat at the contest game. He has accumulated a couple of flashy acting credits (the major Hollywood production, Mr. Destiny, for example) and he had one of his scripts, Hole in the Paper Sky, turned into a short film starring Jessica Biel and Garry Marshall.

Hole in the Paper Sky won the Best Screenplay award at the Beverly Hills Film

Kingkade has been polishing and clarifying aspects of the One Foot in the Gravy script with Civic Theatre Executive Director Phillip Colglazier over the phone and he said he has enjoyed that process.

But when he comes to Fort Wayne to take in the full production, he will be seeing it for the first time along with everyone

Kingkade, who cites restoration comedy as one of his major inspirations, said he wrote One Foot in the Gravy with the inten-



David Rousculp is a funeral home director who writes screenplays in an apartment above a funeral home in Columbia City, and that is a story in it-



But the story we're concerned with at the moment is called My Dead Clown.

It won second place at the Northeast Indiana Playwright Festival, but it started out as a story for the screen.

Rousculp wrote it while he was working as a funeral home director in Cleveland.

It won second place in a screenplay competition and earned the admiration of comic actor Tim Conway.

"He called me and said that he had read it," Rouscoup said. "He said he liked it. He said it was very dark. He said to me, 'Do you know George Clooney?' And I said, 'No.' And he said, 'Neither do I, so I don't know who to tell you to help get this thing produced."

After Rousculp moved to Indiana, he learned about the Civic Theatre competition and decided to refashion My Dead Clown for

The play concerns a funeral home director who is letting grief over his wife's death affect his job performance. His boss gives

him one last chance, and shortly thereafter the dead clown of the title (who is awaiting, in his inanimate way, the customary end-oflife rituals) decides to come back to life.

Later, the Grim Reaper arrives, behaving more like comedian Steven Wright than the super-villain Sauron. The Reaper is surprisingly easily to scare off, which leads to instant regret, as the funeral home director is now stuck with the clown.

There is a method to all this madness, of course: The clown has returned for a rea-

It is never surprising to learn that a funeral home director has a dark sense of humor. It might be surprising to learn that he writes scripts and plays.

But Rousculp said there really isn't that much distance between his day job and his

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tion that it be a crowd-pleasing, summerstock-style show.

"Just something everyone would like and find funny," he said.

Kingkade has written about a dozen plays and screenplays and he said it is especially hard to sell the latter to anyone with the wherewithal to steer it to the cineplex.

"It is very hard to sell a screenplay on spec," he said. "Directors usually know what they want. It's very hard to sell a screenplay that has already been written."

As for writing for television, Kingkade said a professor at I.U. tried to steer him

"They go through a lot of writers," he said. "They have armies of writers. I took a playwriting course at I.U. years ago, and I remember my writing teacher telling me that TV just eats your ideas. It takes all of your great ideas and just eats them up."

Ballet Tackles a Classic

When planning for their current season, Fort Wayne Ballet wanted to present something very special to honor its 60-year history in our community. Each season there are a couple of absolutes about their performance schedule.

In the fall the ballet demonstrates the eclectic talents of their company dancers, featuring not only classical ballet but other

dance forms as well. And of course in December, their annual contribution to our holiday traditions, The Nutcracker, is set in stone before any other performances are considered. It was with their spring production, in which they feature story ballets, that they were able to do something very special to commemorate their anniversary season. For the first time, Swan Lake will be performed in its entirety in Fort Wayne.

The history of *Swan Lake* is an interesting one, especially given how popular it has become over the years.

"When it first debuted it was not very

successful," says Karen Gibbons-Brown, executive and artistic director for Fort Wayne Ballet. "But when Tchaikovsky passed away, they included Act II of *Swan Lake* at his funeral, and it had been re-choreographed. People decided that it wasn't so bad after all, and it has eventually become iconic."

Much of its popularity can be attributed to the work of Marius Petipa, the Russian dancer and choreographer who provides the choreography which has established it as one of the premier ballets in the world.

"Petipa traveled the world and learned folk dances from all of the countries he visited," says Gibbons-Brown. "That can be seen very clearly in the character dancing in *Swan Lake*. Petipa was very much interested in pieces that were 'of the earth' and gave the ballet its second life."

While she's very excited to finally bring this famous ballet to a Fort Wayne stage, there are some significant challenges. Costumes for the ballet, which are not exactly inexpensive, are always a consideration. With shows which have been performed multiple times over the years – classics like Cinderella and Sleeping Beauty – the ballet has been able to go into the vault and pull out previously worn pieces. For The Nutcracker, casting decisions are often made with available costume sizes in mind. There was no vault from which to borrow for Swan Lake.

"Everything has had to be created since

we have never produced this ballet before. Fortunately, we have two talented people, Nan Possemato and Blaise Moore, who are doing a wonderful job and creating these costumes for us."

There are some new staging issues

which are unique to Swan Lake, and Gibbons-Brown says she has had to rely on her production team to help navigate those technological issues.

they will once again blend their annual Fort Wayne Ballet, Too performance (an outdoor free performance) with their final production in the Auer Center ArtsLab (an indoor ticketed event) in May. But while those are far more intimate performances, *Swan Lake*

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"There's a scene where there is just a heap of smoke, and I've had to explain this to the production crew without actually having seen how it's done. I've always been behind the stage when this is going on, so I don't know how to describe what's going on from the crew's perspective. So I'm very grateful that they've been able to find a way to accomplish these special effects. I can tell you that there is a crumbling castle among the scenery."

There is more to her plan for Swan Lake than just the three performances with the Fort Wayne Philharmonic. There will also be opportunities to celebrate the ballet's history with an adult-themed Black Swan Ball following Friday evening's performance, as well as a White Swan Tea aimed at the younger attendees following the Saturday matinee. Both of those are ticketed events. She also promises a decorated Russian carnival setting as the audiences enter the Arts United Center, before they take their seats. With activities for children and an atmosphere to set the mood for Swan Lake, there will be an especially festive atmosphere for the ballet's main stage finale.

There will be a few more performances for Fort Wayne Ballet before they drop the curtain on their 2016-17 season. The ballet's Youth Theatre will perform *The Lorax* in honor of Dr. Seuss at their last Family Series performance of the year on April 22, and

promises to be the more lavish production which classical dance fans have come to love.

"It is a big ballet with a tremendous number of dancers," says Gibbons-Brown. "There are 50 people performing in this, and it includes our professional dancers, our trainees, our apprentices, along with our upper-level performing students in the Auer Academy. We're happy to be providing our community with

the opportunity to see *Swan Lake*, but we're also happy to provide our dancers with the opportunity to add to their repertoire. Dancers are always training, and this is a wonderful piece to be able to offer to our dancers. There are some very special movements involved in this choreography, and just the way the arms move is very precise. We have arm rehearsals for this because it's tricky."

Gibbons-Brown says that there have been enough variations on Tchaikovsky's score that the Philharmonic has worked carefully to create the exact score that Fort Wayne Ballet is using. Being able to experience classical ballet with a professional company and live performance from an orchestra is an especially gratifying part of the spring ballet, one which Gibbons-Brown is enthusiastic about sharing with Fort Wayne. She says that despite – or perhaps because of – the inherent challenges of presenting such a beloved ballet has been worth it and has made this anniversary season that much more special.

"It's thrilling to be doing this for our community and to have been part of the community in such a viable way for all these years. When we started planning our 60th season, we started researching to see what businesses and organizations stood alongside of us 60 years ago, and there aren't many. It's just very special to have had that kind of presence in this area for so long."

When Charles "Chase" Keen and Brett Welch first crossed paths years ago, they couldn't have had any inkling that down the road they'd be in a band making waves in the Fort Wayne scene and beyond. At the time, the two were studying in the music school at Indiana State University in Terre Haute. Welch would only stay a year before

transferring another program in Fort Wayne. Keen would stay another couple years.

However, Keen is a Fort Wayne native who. upon leaving ISU, decided to move back to his hometown where he and Welch decided form a band. They took

their time looking for the right people to fill out the lineup. Eventually lead vocalist and rhythm guitarist Keen and lead guitarist Welch found bassist Blake Jones and drummer Ben Schnitz and OLC (which stands for Overseas Love Crisis) was born. The four began practicing together as a unit in the latter part of 2015, with their first live gigs in November of that year. They've progressed quickly ever since.

Judging by the opening strains of "Wanna Be," the first track on their debut EP Letters Lost (released independently last October) it would be easy to tag OLC as a guitar-based rock/pop punk band in the vein of Green Day or even Jimmy Eat World. The band quickly confounds expectations, though, shifting mood and tempo throughout the track. The song's lyrics are intriguing: while the title "Wanna Be" suggests people who want to be something they're not, it's really a statement of romantic intent, once again defying expectations. It seems there's more going on here than what's apparent at

"I just like to have music that has a message behind it, no matter what you're playing," says Keen. "If you happen to be feeling a little punk rock and stuff, the lyrics should still be good; they don't have to be cheesy and superficial just because it's a light and upbeat song. I like to take [lyrics] seriously and make sure our message is get-

The rest of the EP shifts style and mood from track to track quickly and with ease. Along with the fast and catchy "Wanna Be," there's a tortured ballad ("Dangerous") and a blues-rock romp ("Neon Churches"). OLC are not a band to get stuck in one place for

"Diverse, I think, is a really big word for us," says Keen. "We're a lot of fun; we play a lot of different kinds of music. We break out instrumental stuff, we'll play punk rock, we'll play ballads, we'll play blues; things like that definitely make us fun to check

Their live performances confirm the impression that they can be hard to pin down.



Their music available online may be limited to the scant five songs on their EP, but their repertoire, be they covers or originals, is much broader. When playing live they focus on their originals, but for longer sets they'll tend to throw in a few more covers than they might otherwise. But even when playing covers, OLC don't rest on their laurels and deliver a carbon copy of the original. Their take on Johnny Cash's "Folsom Prison Blues," for example, ditching the original's stylistic leanings almost entirely.

"Instead of it being the kind of rockabilly country acoustic that everyone always hears, we play the first half of it kind of funky ... and we kind of kick it up in the second half and it's kind of a speed punk hard rock song," says Keen. "And we have a little bit of acting we do on stage while we're playing too. I kill my guitar player on stage. and the solo brings him back to life and the speed punk brings him back to life."

OLC are shifting gears yet again for their next recorded project. Expected out in the coming months, there new release will be an acoustic project.

As OLC continue to expand their musical boundaries, so are they expanding their geographic boundaries. Having recently finished a short jaunt to northwest Indiana. where Welch hails from originally, they've had a taste of what touring is like and they plan to ramp up their out-of-town gigs

"In the next few months here, we're booking shows in Fort Wayne with bands from [places] like New Jersey and Illinois," says Keen. "Over the summer, we are looking to hit Michigan and Ohio as well. In the next six to eight months, we're going to be all over the tri-state area."



Son Volt

Notes of Blue

It's true that the late and much-missed Uncle Tupelo birthed two great bands: Wilco and Son Volt. And out of the gate, it was arguably the latter that looked as if it was the better of the two. Son Volt principal Jay Farrar, after all, had led Uncle Tupelo from the begin-



ning – until upstart bass player Jeff Tweedy began to display his own formidable songwriting chops.

Two decades later, Wilco have become a respected and successful combo playing to worldwide acclaim and constantly reinventing themselves. And while Farrar and Son Volt aren't exactly hanging around in the shadows of obscurity, they've never outpaced their initial success - or deviated very far from the sound and character of their debut release, Trace.

But in interviews for the band's latest album, Notes of Blue, Farrar has talked about a heavy blues influence this time around. You'll need to be patient; it's not until the third song that the band's embrace of the blues becomes apparent. In a big way. Though its title is vintage Son Volt, "Static" is heavy, stomping and grimy, laden with fully cranked electric guitars. And it's very bluesy, as is the pumping following cut, "Cherokee St."

But this still sounds like Son Volt. I think Farrar could put out a disc of Tibetan throat singing and it would still somehow sound like Son Volt. The opening cut ("Promise the World") exhibits a delicate Tim Buckley vibe. It's followed by "Back Against the Wall," an anthemic slice of Americana that's signature Son Volt. This tune would have fit perfectly on the band's early releases; it's stirring and straightforward – and utterly conventional.

But the blues indeed dominate this record. "Lost Souls" and "Midnight" display different facets of it and how it sounds when put through Farrar's particular filter, as do "Sinking Down" and the swampy "Threads of Steel." Interspersed are folkier, quieter numbers. "Been in the storm so long," he sings in a keening, vulnerable voice on "The Storm." It's easy to picture him singing out through the open door of a moving boxcar, maybe with a young Woody Guthrie looking on. This tune and the similarly low-boil "Cairo and Southern" allow Farrar to deliver home a point: Before there was contemporary Americana, there was country. And before country came the blues. And the blues is, ultimately, at its heart.



Simple: find a groove and stick to it.



want you to shake it while you're getting weird. Over the course of three LPs, EPs, live albums and remix affairs, Johnson and Yamada have stuck to the formula religiously. No real straying from the sound. This isn't necessarily a bad thing; it just is. On their fourth full-length, the two part Occult Architecture, Moon Duo have given in to the darkness. The first part of this opus, Occult Architecture Vol.1, lays down serious grooves like we've come to expect from the band, but there's a darker tone here. This is tweaker death cult groove music. It's an ode to the dark side of the moon and all those things you fear are in those shadowy hills in the distance. But instead of painting fearful, Fangoria-ready pictures, Moon Duo bow in honor of dark nature and embrace the power that lives within the action of giving in to the Yin.

Occult Architecture Vol. 1 is seven tracks that add up to nearly 50

Y&T Earthshaker (1981)

Oakland, California gave the world Yesterday & Tomorrow (Y&T) in the mid 70s when Lenny Hayes and Dave Meniketti decided to form a cover band. After several line-up changes, they released a few albums before Earthshaker thrust them into the arena spotlight. This re-



cord went unnoticed by most, but it's considered by both fans and critics to be their best work.

It opens with "Hungry for Rock," a track that blends the common-sense hard rock of early Whitesnake with the thicker riffs from UFO. Hardly heavy metal, it does feature the genre's power

"Dirty Girl" has an AC/DC vibe but is inventive enough to still sound like Y&T. "Shake It Loose" has some great guitars and resembles a hard-blues Foghat with less power. "Squeeze" reminds me of the decade's L.A. scene and contains a substantial solo, but lacks much originality. "Rescue Me" opens with an acoustic guitar that has you thinking "power ballad," but it ends up being one of the heavier tracks on the record.

There's more of the same in "Young and Tough" which sounds like some of the stuff Sammy Hagar was producing during the same era. It gets better with "Hurricane," a track that I'd describe as heavy-metal with a lot of guitar layers and heavy percussion. It's very 80s and sounds a little dated when I listen to it now.

The record closes with the epic metal super ballad "I Believe in You." This is one of those songs that took it to the next level by starting slow and methodical and finishing strong. I'll always give this band a pass because, after all, it was the 80s and everything was over the top.

Y&T'slast record was 2010's Facemelter, and Meniketti is the only remaining original member. They'll be in Cleveland May

minutes of driving, late night grooves. "The Death Set" starts things out right with a Moon Duo-approved chugging rhythm. Johnson lays down some space-y guitar over a driving tempo and Yamada's dreamy synth work. The chorus even sports an almost 80s vibe complete with hand claps. "Cold Fear" sounds like early Depeche Mode breaking things down with Bauhaus. Synsonic drums, wavering synthesizer, and ominous fuzzed-out guitar worm their way into your head like some spectral being. We've heard moments like this before on past Moon Duo albums, but they were fleeting. It's nice to hear Johnson and Yamada going head first into their darker tendencies.

"Creepin" is a hard-driving, pedal-to-the-metal rocker. You can imagine going 120 mph down open road as this blasts in your ear holes. "Cross-Town Fade" is a wonky, jittery jam that sports big rhythms, fuzzy bass, and wonky keys. Johnson sounds ghostly as he sings like Alan Vega strutting on some spectral plane. This is an absolute killer tune, and it descends into a barrage of noise and beau-

"Cult Of Moloch" is an ode to a Canaanite god associated with child sacrifice, and it lives up to that concept. It's one of the heavier tracks Moon Duo have recorded, but still sports Johnson's wiggly, bluesy guitar noodles as the song embraces the chaos. "Will Of The Devil" has a dark 80s vibe while the epic album closer, "White Rose," shimmies and shakes for over 10 minutes. A motorik beat carries the song along for the duration, and it's glorious. It's classic Moon Duo. It's classic death cult moto-psych rock.

Those who felt the groove machine known as Moon Duo had been played out after Shadows of the Sun are in for a surprise. Johnson and Yamada have tweaked the formula a bit, and Occult Architecture Vol.1 sounds like a band re-vitalized and focused - focused on bringing the darkness into the light. (John Hubner)

A funeral home director has to work the crowd in a way and work each "crowd" in a different way.

Everyone processes the death of a loved one differently. Some mourners crave a little levity and some want none. "You have to feel out each family," Rousculp said. "You have [to determine] what bal-

ance between comedy and professionalism you have to strike. You have to feel them out and decide what you need to do for them."

The festival will feature a fully staged production of One Foot in the Gravy and stage readings of My Dead Clown and third-place winner The Unpredictability of Fire by Rebecca Cameron. There will also be a discussion with Janet Allen, executive artistic director of Indiana Repertory Theatre, followed by a reception for playwrights and attendees.

Slow Pace Serves *Paterson*

Paterson is a movie about a bus driver named Paterson who drives his bus in Paterson, New Jersey. This sounds like an absurd premise for a film, but for those who know the work of filmmaker Jim Jarmusch, the idea makes sense, even if doesn't sound any more appealing. For those who enjoy the strange and leisurely voice of Jarmuschian filmmaking, Paterson will be a soothing, restorative experience.

Divided into seven chapters corresponding to the days of the week, *Paterson* is an exercise in mindfulness and observation. On "Monday," Paterson wakes, kisses his lovely love, listens to her describe the dream she was having, looks at his watch, gets up, makes coffee, eats Cheerios, walks to work, chats with a dispatcher, and gets on with his day.

On screen, these activities are as just as routine as they sound. That is part of the point, although there is a reassuring coziness that surrounds them (and a lingering loveliness to the cinematography of daily things).

But Paterson isn't just a bus driver. He is also a poet. Before his shift begins he is working in a notebook. At lunch he sits opposite the waterfall of the Passaic River that flows through the town and works on his poetry.

Jarmusch is famous for his contemplative style and attention to detail. As Paterson, Adam Driver uses

his lanky self to slip into the proper attitude with ease. Driver's attitude throughout the film is deadpan as needed, which is most of the time. He registers the little dramas and pleasures he encounters with sly expression and alert watchfulness.

Paterson's poetry, as he writes and corrects, floats across the screen, voiced by Driver, in a pleasing depth and cadence, a little more than the just living voice he uses on the job and at the bar and a little less of the pillow talk voice he uses with his sweetie. This serves his poetry well.

After work, Paterson walks home and has dinner with his girlfriend, Laura (Golshifteh Farahani). She shares her names with Petrarch's muse. She spends her days at home making art, mostly geometric patterns in black and white on any available surface. She has ambitions to become the queen of cupcakes and a country Western singing star.

After dinner, Paterson walks their bulldog Marvin

Jackman Delivers a Monster Hit

Tops at the Box: Huge Jacked Man has played Wolverine so many times now, and for so many years, that I think I take the performance for granted. No, it's probably not what Hugh Jackman should be doing with his career – especially not for almost two decades – but along the way we've had some nice moments. Reportedly, Logan, his latest (and supposedly final) effort as Wolverine, is the best yet. I can believe it. The cast is very strong, the synopsis is promising (if a little Star Wars-y) and the director, James Mangold (Copland; Girl, Interrupted; Walk the Life, etc.), is capable of great-ish things. I've not yet seen the film that came out last week and killed at the box office, selling over \$85 million in tickets in the U.S. alone. Reviews are mostly strong and let's face it, there's not really any great competition at the moment. So look for Logan, which has already sold \$238 million worldwide, to continue going strong for a few weeks.

Also at the Box: Jordan Peele's Get Out once again sold strong at the U.S. box office, bringing in another \$26 million last weekend and upping the horror film's 10-day sales total to just over \$76 million in the U.S. Whoa, Jordan Peele! Did anyone see that coming? It's a great flick, for sure, and only cost \$4.5 million to produce. I'd say it's safe to suggest that this is the beginning of a new career for Mr. Peele.

Newbie drama/fantasy epic *The Shack*, starring Sam Worthington, Octavia Spencer and Tim McGraw, took the No. 3 spot at the U.S. box last weekend, selling a solid \$16 million over its first three days of release. Not bad, considering the lack of press attention the film saw. Reviews have been across-the-board negative for this one, through it appears to be very well produced.

Taking the No. 4 spot at last weekend's U.S. box office was *The LEGO Batman Movie*, a film with a title so bad I dread typing it out over and over again. *LEGO* sold another \$11.6 million last weekend, officially pushing it into Blockbuster status with sales of \$148 million in the U.S. and \$256 million worldwide

in just 24 days. I guess we're going to see more LEGO adaptations.

Rounding out last weekend's Top 5 at the U.S. box office was, in my opinion, the weekend's most promising release, *Before I Fall*, starring future star Zoey Deutch (*Everybody Wants Some!* and the underrated *Good Kids*) and directed by indie sorta star Ry Russo-Young (*Nobody Walks, You Won't Miss Me*). It's a *Groundhog Day*-like mystery drama with a strong cast. The reviews were so-so, but regardless, it feels like a breakout moment for both Deutch and Russo-Young.

Also of note: Best Picture winner *Moonlight* saw a slight spike in sales, selling another \$2.5 million, upping the flick's U.S. sales total to just over \$25 million. Not great. The film has only been released in the U.S. so far. Look for it to sell big overseas, thus making the American public look silly.

New This Week: Several films will see limited release this coming weekend, with only one getting the wide treatment. That film is Kong: Skull Island, a certain blockbuster. This is the very rare instance of a great young director who has never succeeded at the box office (Jordan Vogt-Roberts) actually getting to make a huge film the "right" way. The cast for the movie alone (Tom Hiddleston, Brie Larson, Samuel L. Jackson, John Goodman, John C. Reilly, Thomas Mann and Shea Whigham) makes it a must-see. The poster is cool, the trailer is beautiful, Goodman is skinny and Larson looks like the most beautiful thing on earth not named Hiddleston. I'm excited for this one. I think it's gonna be a keeper, and I think we're going to see a lot more from Vogt-Roberts.

Hellman's Classic Especially Timely Today

What happens when lies are embraced as truth? When "fake news" is believed? And when actual facts are buried by falsehoods and equivocation? I picked *The Children's Hour*, this 83-year-old show, at least six months before our 2016 presidential candidates were chosen. I had no idea how timely it would become again. Timely because although the show is about human rights for all, particularly the LGBT community, and deals with "good people" destroying lives when they are manipulated with lies.

Hellman wrote The Children's Hour as an exercise, to teach herself how to write a play. Believing that she would do better to find a subject based in fact, she adapted a book, Bad Companions (1930), a true-crime anthology that related an 1810 incident at a school in Edinburgh, Scotland. A student accused two of her schoolmistresses, in the presence of their pupils, of having an affair. The accuser's influential grandmother, advised her friends to remove their daughters from the boarding school. Within days the school was deserted and the women had lost their livelihood. The teachers sued and eventually won, both in court and on appeal, but given the damage done to their lives, their victory was hollow.

So Hellman adapted this story as an exercise. In May of 1934, she worked as a play reader in the office of theatrical producer Herman Shumlin whom she asked to read her sixth draft of *The Children's Hour*. He read it as she waited. After he read the first act, he said, "Swell."

After reading the second act, he said, "I hope it keeps up." After reading the third act, he said, "I'll produce it."

The three-act drama ran until July of 1936, closing after 691 performances. The financial and critical success of the New York production encouraged Shumlin to present *The Children's Hour* in other cities. In December 1935, authorities in Boston declared that the play did not meet the community's moral standards and that it could not be performed there as scheduled. In January 1936, a municipal censorship ordinance was used to decline granting a perfor-

(a scene stealer). Marvin gets tied to a post while Paterson slips into his local bar and shares a beer with proprietor Doc (a nod to his inspiration, William Carlos Williams, I am guessing) and other regulars.

When Tuesday passes with mostly the same details, we start to pay closer attention to details, to get some sense of who these characters are.

There is plenty of time to speculate on what we don't know about Paterson and Laura. Often in movies, having too much time to think is annoying; in *Paterson*, the lingering of time is an echo of the more thoughtful world imagined on screen.

Usual questions like "how did these two meet?" or "what kind of families are they from?" are not answered. We get mere clues. On the dresser is a picture of Paterson in full military uniform, a chest full of decorations. It seems a very different version of the man we see.

There is so much attention to twins and pairs in *Paterson*. I started to wonder if the man in uniform is an earlier, different self or perhaps a twin brother. But when Paterson's bus breaks down, we get a glimpse of what might be a touch of PTSD. Later, in the bar, Paterson disarms a man with a smooth move that suggests military training, but nothing concrete is mentioned.

There is little technology in *Paterson*. Paterson doesn't carry a phone. There is no television in his home or in the bar he frequents. People talk about device-free dinners, and there is something deeply nostalgic about how Paterson lives. He has time for poetry. His life is free from the clutter of so many dopey banal omnipresent distractions.

I've already spoiled much of what passes for plot in *Paterson*. Overheard conversations and small encounters are the sustaining inspiration for Paterson the character and *Paterson* the film. My favorite ends with a young female poet who has read Paterson a beautiful poem of hers ("Water Falls," written by Jarmusch himself) and is pleased to have met a bus driver who likes Emily Dickinson.

We learn a lot about celebrities native to Paterson. We see the old streets of Paterson framed by bus windows. We learn about the persistence art requires and the sustenance it gives artists.

Paterson will drive the impatient out of the theater. It isn't for everyone, but for anyone with even a touch of the poet it will be a balm. Paterson lets you "carry moonbeams home in a jar and be better off than you are."

Minnich Conducts CAA Spring Classes

The IPFW Community Arts Academy is taking registrations for spring classes on a variety of subjects. Classes include two one-day workshops led by Gloria Minnich for students in grades 6 through 12

The first is an improv workshop (Saturday, April 15) which focuses on the "rules" of improv. Students will depict a variety of characters and scenes and even perform songs using their imagination and playing off their fellow actors. The second workshop, Ultimate Shakespeare-ience (April 22), uses the same acting games used by the Royal Shakespeare Company to physically connect with the language and characters of the plays. Both workshops meet from 1-4 p.m. and cost \$49.

This workshop meets from 6-7 p.m. on Mondays from March 13 through April 17. The cost is \$49 for six one-hour sessions, and scholarships have been made possible by AWS Foundation. Sara Hastings is single and focused on her career as an attorney. Her crazy Aunt Martha (though she prefers the term "eccentric") is concerned about her niece being single and not having anyone to care for her, so she decides to play matchmaker. She even knows the perfect guy for Sara: Brandon Cates. The problem is that Brandon is engaged to a wonderful girl named Heather. This does not deter Aunt Martha. She arranges to have Brandon delivered to Sara via a somewhat questionable delivery man. From there,

hilarity ensues.

When I first read the synopsis for *Getting Sara Married*, it sounded like the type of play I thoroughly enjoy watching; a group of (mostly) normal people with just a little lunacy thrown in as a catalyst for laughter. Playwright Sam Bobrick has had a long career writing plays (he has

more than 30 to his credit) and quite a bit of television, including episodes of *The Andy Griffith Show*, *Bewitched* and, most recently, *Saved by the Bell*. This show was the perfect fit for a first-time director like me. It's filled with great characters, great writing and a novel twist thrown into the plot to keep it humming

Though I have acted in several shows at Arena,



this was my first at the helm of a production. The experience has been both wonderful and challenging. Perhaps the most challenging for me was giving the actors time to find their own piece of the characters

they portray. As a director, I had some specific thoughts about how key points should play out, but left room for the actors to bring their own ideas about their characters into the mix. Those creative interactions have been some of the best moments for me.


To deliver this bit of entertainment I have as-
