


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

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
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The World to Our Doorstep

Feature • Anoushka Shankar ------

Sitar player Anoushka Shankar has spent her life immersed in three cultures. Born in England, she spent her childhood shuttling between London and Delhi with mother and father, renowned sitar player Ravi Shankar. She began taking sitar lessons from her father at age seven and at 10 began accompanying

him on the tanpura, an Indian drone instrument, during his performances. When she was 11, she moved with her parents to San Diego where she attended high school, was crowned homecoming queen and graduated with honors. In 2009 she returned to London to raise her own family.

Shankar's travels have taken her around the world. Now, after much effort, she is coming to Fort Wayne. And that has made Dr. Vijay Chilakamarri very happy.

Chilakamarri is the president of Shruti Fort Wayne Indian Cultural Society and a cardiologist with Lutheran Medical Group. For the past four years, Shruti has brought a variety of Indian artists to perform at IPFW in an effort to broaden cultural connections. But Shankar had always declined.

"Anoushka Shankar is probably one of the most sought-after sitar players in the world today, especially in India and the U.S. too," Chilakamarri said. "Took almost three years to convince her to come to Fort Wayne. First time I called her was like three or four years ago when we were not really doing this program. We had just begun. And she said, 'Where's Fort Wayne?' I tried to tell her it's not a very small town. She didn't come because she really didn't think this was going to be a big deal or a viable one.'

Then word got out. Players like tabla master Zakir Hussein, flutists Shashank Subramanyam and Rakesh Charasia, sarod master Amjad Ali Khan, and santoor player Shivkumar Sharma each had concerts here. And dance troupes Natya Dance Theater and Ragamala Dance have performed as well.

"Finally last year we called her again," Chilakamarri said. "And this time I think, having done these programs for a while, some of the guys came here and the message got to them that this is the place you want to go. Zakir Hussein told me that anytime we want he will make sure that he comes to Fort Wayne. And I think having talked to some of these people that we are getting a little better

Shankar inhabits a rarefied world of talented and successful artists. First there's her father, Ravi, who died in late 2012. Ravi Shankar popularized the sitar, played with

the Beatles and, with George Harrison, put on the first and arguably most famous benefit concert, the Concert for Bangladesh. Singer Norah Jones is her half-sister. And she is married to the director Joe Wright whose films include Pride & Prejudice, Atonement and the recent adaptation of Anna Karenina.

On her latest album, 2016's Land of Gold, Shankar collaborated with rapper

reed instrument; jazz bassist Larry Grenadier; cellist Caroline Dale; and the all-girl children's choir Girls for Equality. The album also includes the recorded footwork of dancer Akram Khan.

Earlier CDs found Shankar performing classical Indian sitar on 2015's Home and delving into world and electronic music on 2013's Traces of You, which featured older

sister Jones.

Shankar's openness to different cultures and styles of music is a goal shared by Shruti. Chilakamarri said bringing Indian music and dance to IPFW is a great way to spread such diversity.

"Two years ago we did a survey," Chilakamarri said. "We had responses from Indian community saying what they wanted. But the local non-Indian community is what we focus more on to make this enjoyable for the local community. Especially for the students from this region, not just Fort Wayne.

"Because of the language barrier, we have had to exclude the vocal artists just because if you don't understand the language you may not really appreciate what it is. And so we kind of focus on instrumental music and

dance. We don't need to explain. With the dance, we're thinking next time of having a workshop to help people understand what it is.'

One of the best parts of the concerts is the price. Through donations, Shruti is able to keep the cost at a low \$10 per


"A lot of local businesses have begun to support," he said. "They donate to both IPFW and our group. I get emails asking how people can help. It keeps the cost really down, and I want to keep it that way as long as possible. So far I think we have been really fortunate."

That good fortune extends to everyone in the region. While members of the Indian community travel from Detroit, Chicago, Dayton and Indianapolis to attend Shrutisponsored events, Chilakamarri thinks it would be a stretch to entice non-Indians.

"If we charge a really high dollar amount for something and they know nothing about it, that's probably not going to happen."

With Anoushka Shankar's performance. Chilakamarri hopes the reputation Fort Wayne is getting will spread to other artists

"We have people who want to come back again and again, and to be honest, that has become a little bit of an issue," he said. "They like the auditorium and the audience, but we don't want the same artists every

Alev Lenz to produce a record that draws its inspiration from the humanitarian plight of the world's refugees.

In an April 2016 interview with the San Diego Union-Tribune, Shankar explained the seeds of Land of Gold.

"The idea of millions of people being driven out of their homes, of children not having safe shelter or passage, is not a political issue, it's a humanitarian issue," Shankar told the Union-Tribune. "I'm not pretending I can change the world, or to be an expert on social and political affairs. But I certainly have a right to say when something is wrong. It's important to be a part of a culture and community and to be a positive influence in every aspect of my life that I can."

Land of Gold is a stunning example not only of Shankar's virtuosity on the sitar, but of the vast sweep of her influences. Also working with Shankar on the CD is Björk producer Matt Robertson; hang (steelpan) virtuoso and co-writer of many of the album's 10 pieces Manu Delago; Sanjeev Shankar, a master of the shehnai, an Indian

Ask guitarist Marcus King about where he got his love of music and you will hear a story that sounds like it came out of an anthology of Southern literature.

"Music was always a really big part of my life from a very young age," he said via phone. "Ever since I can remember, I was hanging out on my great-grandfather's porch up in Blue Ridge, and everybody was making music with each other, playing guitars and banjos and fiddles and singing old gospel tunes. And everybody was really happy.

'No matter what was going on at that time," King said, "everybody kind of es-

caped. I think it was very inadvertent to everybody. It was (inadvertent) to me for a very long time until I became aware that I was releasing my emotions through a musical context.

These days, this Greenville, South Carolina native releases his emotions in a musical context for a living.

His band performs March 23 at C2G Music Hall.

If you knew no more about him than that he's a Southern guitarist who grew up listening to Lynyrd Skynyrd and the Allman Brothers, you might draw certain conclu-

You might decide that he must be a blues shredder. Or an heir to the swamp boogie stylings of Gary Rossington.

But you'd be wrong. King is his own man. His horn-infused band is eclectic. Sometimes it sounds like Chicago, pre-Cetera. Sometimes it sounds like it came out of cities where it's harder to find grits, like Memphis or Detroit.

King said he loves and is heavily influenced by Rossington, Duane Allman and those unrelated, but like-minded Kings: B.B., Albert and Freddie.

But eventually he started reaching out for other influences.

"I was taking stuff from these guitar players like Stevie Ray Vaughan and Hendrix ... Robin Trower," he said. "And then my ear really started getting more drawn to the singers like Robert Johnson and Hank Williams Sr. - emotions in the voice - and B.B., Albert and Freddie as well.'

King said he made an effort to emulate the techniques of great singers in his guitar playing. He did the same with the organ playing of Jimmy Smith and the pedal steel playing of Buddy Emmons.

He ultimately came to the realization that he couldn't fully express himself through guitar playing alone, so he decided to teach himself to sing. Otis Redding and

James Brown were huge influences here.

He later studied Aretha Franklin and Janis Joplin.

Given the breadth of these influences. it is not surprising to learn that King shies away from describing the band's "style" in sound bite form.

& www.c2gmusichall.com "I want to avoid branding ourselves," he said. "We made a decision early on to remain ambiguous. Throw people off the trail. I mean, they say what they want to say anyway. I have always thought it doesn't do music any good to put it in a box or in a category. You don't need any chains holding it back.'

King is an exceedingly self-assured guy. He seems driven by an unpretentious search for artistic purity, a quest to fully manifest the music he hears in his head and the music that he will one day hear in his head.

He quit school after his junior year in high school with the full support of his parents. They knew how ambitious and motivated he was, King said.

'It wasn't like I was quitting school so I could be a drain on society for a while," he said. "I had gigs lined up. I was ready to go. [School] was only going to be in my way."

He later earned his GED.

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

Making New Memories

There's plenty of respect for the art community in Fort Wayne now, and plenty of attention to the number of talented musicians who call this city home, but it didn't just happen in the last couple of decades.

While the focus and appreciation may be somewhat new, Fort Wayne was always home to some great bands who played around town.

Take, for instance, the FBC Band which reached considerable success locally and regionally in the late 1970s and early 1980s. The band mixed high-energy covers with original music, releasing an album (*Worth a Fortune*) in 1981. Taking the stage at a couple of then-popular nightclubs – Zachary's and the Cat's Meow – located across the corner from each other on Main and Harrison, the FBC Band drew big crowds right up until they folded up their tent in 1982 following an eight-week tour.

The band members haven't been strangers since that time, but each has gone his own way, with a couple remaining in the area and others going as far away as Florida and California. With occasional reunions (most recently in 2014), the members of FBC have maintained contact in spite of the miles that separate

It was an unfortunate reunion for a less joyous reason that led to their upcoming performance at C2G, one which will benefit the Music & Memory organization. When long-time friend of the band, Connie Grinols, lost her mother in the fall of 2015, people came together for the funeral and began to realize how many friends and family members were suffering from and had died from Alzheimer's Disease.

"My mother didn't have it," says Grinols. "But we started talking and realizing how many people we knew had parents who were suffering from it, and I had seen it in my own extended family."

Grinols says the spirit of paying it forward led FBC lead vocalist Brian McCarron to suggest a fundraiser for Music & Memories which works with nursing homes to provide iPods and other digital devices

to reconnect patients to the world through music. Music & Memory is responding to research which has shown that personalized playlists can help reach Alzheimer's patients who may otherwise have difficulty socializing and engaging with others and connecting to their own life and memories.

The decision to bring FBC back to Fort Wayne for this fundraiser is both charitable and nostalgic. Guitarist Gary McMeekin realized the importance of keeping the band together, if only occasionally, before their last appearance together in 2014.

"I was the one who said 'We really need to do this again before someone dies," says McMeekin. "But I was the one who dropped

dead a few days after that. I was gone and had to be revived. I still have some health issues, but I'm glad to be able to do this again. I'm not saying it's the last time we'll do it, but we'll have to see what happens."

Joining McCarron and McMeekin will be original drummer Randy Scarbeary along with Michael Monroe on keyboards and Monroe's son Darren joining the band, taking the place of Wayne Neukom on bass.

McCarron, who has a design company in Florida, is looking forward to getting together with his old bandmates again.

"Falling back into that very comfortable space of music and friendship," he says, "it is hard to separate one from the other. There is a lot to be said for an old pair of shoes. We've certainly earned that 'old' moniker.

to make this happen might be considered the biggest challenge. Thus, the stress and excitement are both generated concurrently. The yin and yang of it all."

Michael Monroe is also looking forward to the nostalgia and is also grateful that it can take a meaningful turn with the fundraiser for Music & Memory.

"Continued camaraderie between the musicians and fans from 30-plus years ago – hoping the message of memories is applauded," he says. "We will be reliving our memories of entertaining. Connie has been an integral part of the coalition having been a major part of the FBC family, giving her time and energy which is greatly appreciated. Regular work schedules takes a back seat, and family support is praised.

"The theme Music & Memories, referencing Alzheimer's and dementia, has touched someone's life on both sides of the aisle."

For those unfamiliar with the music. Grinols says that the audience can expect FBC to play everything from Tom Petty to Jethro Tull, the Rolling Stones to AC/DC. Opening act Sheba will play arena rock favorites like Journey and Kansas. A dance floor will be available because that's what comes of great rock 'n roll in the perfect venue.

While longtime fans of FBC hope, as do the members themselves, that this is not the FBC's last hurrah, McMeekin says he's grateful for another chance to reclaim his dreams 35 years later, and McCarron looks ahead with both hope and pragmatism.

"Only time can answer that question," he says of future reunions. "It takes desire, financial resources, good health and hope for things of value to do with the short amount of time we've been blessed to share with each other and our musical friends and families. Cherish the gift we call 'living.' Not always easy or fun, but hopefully worth a fortune."


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NINE POUND SHADOW

Nine Pound Shadow Nine Pound Shadow

It's not a novel concept, siblings forming bands. The Carpenters, Haim, The Proclaimers, Hanson, the Jackson 5 – the list of successful family groups is a mile long.

But the two brothers who make up Berkeley, Californiabased Nine Pound Shadow dis-



Nine Pound Shadow's eponymous debut release puts their ethereal vocals up front, with tastefully minimal instrumentation framing them. Like the Everly Brothers before them, Breandain and Christopher Langlois place a premium on gorgeous, close harmonies. There are no sharp edges here, no avant garde gimmickry or self-conscious indie grit. These guys sing like angels, and they know it.

The Langois brothers also make no bones about their love of late 60s/early 70s pop, which is clearly evident on the bittersweet "Bridges." Put alongside "Seasons in the Sun" on a summer playlist, this tune would fit right in.

At the same time, Nine Pound Shadow sound utterly contemporary. "Tell Me Why" combines an intimate confessional with enough energy to fill a room – without ever shaking its composure. The dropdead beautiful "Tiger Smile" showcases the brothers' higher-register vocal harmonies in a flowing musical stream that's rewarding from the drop of the needle on. Had the Wilson brothers collaborated with Death Cab for Cutie, the result may have sounded something in the neighborhood of this song.

There's a ghostly quality that permeates the record; it's as if the present is overlaid with a shadow (no pun intended) of the past and can never quite shake it. That seems to suit the brothers just fine – and occasionally, they downright bask in it. Case in point: "Melody" reverberates with a throwback vibe as it roils with a "House of the Rising Sun" rhythm and arpeggiated clean guitars. Danger Mouse knew he was onto something when he signed Nine Pound Shadow to his 30th Century Records imprint. Is this band in for a Shins-style trajectory into the mainstream? Only time will tell. But this assured, accomplished debut marks a fine start. (D.M. Jones)

Peter Silberman

Impermanence

Peter Silberman has never been shy about laying his heart out for all to see on his albums with The Antlers. From *Hospice* to *Burst Apart* to *Familiars*, his ethereal vocals and dramatic musical arrangements show a musician not satisfied with the simple.



Silberman wants to make his mark with each song. Scorched tales of loss, love and getting on with life even when you don't think that's possible – these are the trademarks of a Peter Silberman record. On Silberman's debut solo record, inspiration came from a different kind of loss: hearing loss.

A few years ago Silberman suffered from total temporary hearing loss in one ear and extreme sensitivity to everyday sounds. This led to Silberman leaving his home in Brooklyn to upstate New York where things were quieter. The hearing impairment led to painful tinnitus. He gradually regained hearing, as well as the desire to write music, and began composing songs on a nylon stringed guitar and whispering vocals to himself. The result of these toned-down writing sessions are on *Impermanence*. It' a six song collection of hushed tracks that sound like Iullabies to pained ears and psyche. Gone are the big and blustery songs of Antlers past. Here, Silberman writes songs that seem to be soothing him back to health.

"Karuna" opens the album and seems to be the blueprint we follow throughout. It opens with quietly strummed electric guitar and Silberman's mere whisper of a vocal and stays this way for the songs nearly nine-minute run. There's simple percussion added to help accent a rhythm, but for the most part it's Silberman and his guitar. "New York" continues this sparse orchestration with some tasteful keys thrown in. "Gone Beyond" spans through another contempla-

Stiff Little Fingers Nobody's Heroes (1980)

While the Sex Pistols remain the definitive punk band, I think Stiff Little Fingers were better. Growing up in Northern Ireland, these guys saw some really ugly scenes during the terror years of the Irish Republican Army. So yeah, they had tougher childhoods than the



they had tougher childhoods than the Pistols and wrote more from the heart rather than merely being anti-establishment. They were also better musicians – which isn't saying much.

Nobody's Heroes, their second release, opens with "Gotta Getaway," a jumpy number that has some traits of both The Clash and the New York late-70s punk scene. "Wait and See," their self-tribute to their hard work and subsequent success, dances around for over four minutes with poppy hooks and raucous drumming.

"Fly the Flag" speaks of nationalism, but it was sort of difficult to discover what side they were on. The band had both Catholics and Protestants, so I think they were mostly speaking out against the violence from both sides. Either way, this track was about how ridiculous the conflict was.

"At the Edge" is pure punk rock in every way. It's basically a song about being told what to do, and the anti-authority retort (behind the excessive guitars) gives it a gritty feel.

One of my favorites from this release is "Bloody Dub," a mellow, yet flashy track with a fat bass and some good distortion that trips around some reggae percussion and laid back, pedal-driven guitars.

The record closes with "Tin Soldiers," a track that I consider to be one of the best things they ever did. A great band at the time, Stiff Little Fingers really were a major player in the punk scene and have influenced many groups since. The band (with one original member) released *No Going Back* in 2014.

tive eight minutes and some change. It's yet another fragile guitar and vocal number that has the feeling of Silberman reaching out and trying to find his footing after months of silence.

Elsewhere, "Maya" has an island feel complete with the sound of an ocean breeze in the background as Silberman plucks a ukulele and harmonizes nicely with himself. "Ahimsa" buzzes with amplifier noise as Silberman sings "time is all we have," giving way to a quieted desperation to make the most of what we are allotted on this earth. "Impermanence" hums with organ, piano, and guitar like something off of Grizzly Bear's *Yellow House*. It's also reminiscent of Antlers' *Hospice* and that record's beautifully somber tone.

Silberman seems to have found his way back from the pain of sound and is once again rejoicing in the noise of melody and the refrains of musical joy. *Impermanence* is a subtle musical journey, but a most pleasant one. (*John Hubner*)

In 2015, the band collaborated with Gov't Mule guitarist Warren Hayes on the album *Soul Insight*.

Young bands often tell horror stories about their first encounters with seasoned industry professionals, but King said his band's artistic partnership with Hayes was a meeting of the minds.

"We were nervous," he said. "We'd never done anything on that scale for a major label. We were as green as can be. But Warren made us feel really at home. He was easy to get along with and not pushy in any way. He was very patient with us."

Going forward, King said the only constants in the band will be a Hammond B3 organ and its accompanying Leslie speaker.

King said he adheres to a definition of success articulated in the mid-1990s by Lauren Hill.

"I always thought success was like 'Beauty's in the eye of the beholder," he said. "[Hill] was talking about how she was successful because she had a happy marriage and a happy son. Her success was not defined by money."

"As long as we're able to create music every night and keep the lights on in the house," King said, "we'll feel successful."

The addition of Stacy Harden in 2016 and the contributions of producer John Vanderslice (Spoon, Grandaddy) and original guitarist Bryan Rahija have led to the band's sixth full-length album, Fences. 



Chuck Prophet's

latest album, Bobby Fuller Died for Your Sins, is a rock album about rock music. Or at least the title track is. The mysterious story of Fuller, who died in an unex-

CHUCK PROPHET plained manner in 1966 right after scoring a big hit with "I Fought the Law," is the underpinning of Prophet's jangly road anthem, a song that acknowledges the weird juxtaposition of joy and danger that is the spirit of rock music.

That uneasy, often contradictory, spirit permeates the album. "Bad Year for Rock and Roll" growls about the difficulties of 2016 but still expresses hope that "you don't have to die to reach a better place," ultimately admitting that the emotional balancing act is tough by saying "I wanna go out, but I'll probably stay home."

The 53-year-old Prophet, who made his mark with the band Green on Red in the 80s and has continued on his own since 1990, calls this new album "California Noir." That's as fitting a description as any for a collection of songs that draws on the brightness of surf-side guitars and melodic hooks while simultaneously meditating on the inevitability of death and the crumbling of the American dream.

When Prophet cruises into Fort Wayne, he'll be in the middle of one of those classic rock road trips, one that began in Austin and grinds through the Americana of the Upper Midwest, hitting St. Paul, Milwaukee and Chicago before stopping in Indiana. Prophet has been living the dark underside of American rock on the road, not just singing about it, for decades, and he's not about to stop now.

There might never again be a musical era like the 70s, an era in which a select group of rock bands figured out how to pair stagecraft with their music to produce rock n' roll theater the likes of which hadn't been seen before. It's not surprising then that many of the bands who ruled the 70s have spent the decades since trying to recapture the magic of the old days. Perhaps no band has been more successful at that than Styx, a big-arena rock band of the 70s and 80s that continues with its line-up largely intact and its music as pure as ever. Their Foellinger Theatre show last summer proved that the band can rock the house as hard as ever.

Since 1975, guitarist Tommy Shaw has stayed at the front of the stage along with fellow guitarist James "JY" Young, and both of them are still there. Bassist Chuck Panozzo, who is one of the band's original members along with Young, is still on board as well, and the old-school trio are backed up by drummer Todd Sucherman, keyboardist Lawrence Gowan and guitarist/bassist Ricky Phillips.

With Shaw and Young eager to continue belting out "Too Much Time on My Hands," "Renegade" and the rest of a classic set list night after night, Styx are keeping their share of the 70s magic alive.

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Kong Stomps the Competition

Tops at the Box: Jordan Vogt-Roberts' Kong: Skull Island took the No. 1 spot at the U.S. box office, as expected, selling a solid but disappointing \$61 million domestically over its first three days of release. Thus far the film, which has been getting mixed reviews, has sold \$142 million worldwide. I can't wait to see this one. Also at the Box: Logan, the latest (and perhaps last) Wolverine film, continued to sell well over its second weekend of release, bringing in another \$38 million over the chilly weekend and upping the flick's 10days worldwide sales mark to \$438 million. Sure, James Mangold is a talented director and Wolverine is a fun character, but it's actor Hugh Jackman as Wolverine, specifically, that seems to draw in the crowds, and he says this is his last time playing the character. Can't blame him, as he has now played the character in nine films over the last 17 years. That's probably the most we've seen one actor play a superhero on the big screen.

Taking the No. 3 spot at the U.S. box last weekend was surprise hit Get Out which sold another \$21 million, bringing the film's 17-day domestic sales total to an impressive \$111 million. Looks like director Jordan



Peele, whom many of us already knew to be a great talent, definitely has some clout in Hollywood now. Great little flick, this one.

Fantasy/drama The Shack continued to sell, bringing in another \$10 million over the weekend, good enough for the No. 4 spot at the box office. Meanwhile, The LEGO Batman Movie finally saw its sales numbers trail off, bringing in just \$7.8 million.

Also of note: People never really went out to see Moonlight, despite it being one of the most discussed films of recent memory. The film is about to leave theaters after selling just \$27 million domestically. I'm excited to see how the film, about the social struggles of a young gay black man, does in foreign markets. To say that I'm disappointed in American audiences would be a pretty big understatement.

New This Week: This weekend will finally see the release of the much discussed live action version of Disney's Beauty and the Beast, starring Emma Watson, Luke Evans, Emma Thompson, Kevin Kline, Ewan McGregor, Stanley Tucci, Josh Gad, Ian McKellen and Gugu Mbatha-Raw. Emma's bud Stephen Chbosky (The Perks of Being a Wallflower) wrote the screenplay and Bill

Condon (Twilight: Breaking Dawn, Kinsey and, hilariously, Candyman: Farewell to the Flesh) directs. Looks to be incredibly well made, and word is that Chbosky's screenplay is about as good as a Beauty and the Beast screenplay could get.

Also out, if on far fewer screens, is horror flick The Belko Experiment, starring John Gallagher, Jr., Tony Goldwyn and John C. McGinley. Industry folks seem to believe that this one might have legs. Looks promising, no doubt. Perhaps most exciting to ScreenTime readers will be the NYC and L.A. screenings of Danny Boyle's T2: Trainspotting, starring the whole gang, basically. It'll be fun to see how people react to this film. If it sells well, look for this one to get a wide release (the movie is already making decent bank in foreign markets).



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A Deadly Serious *Hour*

The Children's Hour by Lillian Hellman is currently running at First Presbyterian Theater through March 25. This classic play, inspired by an older true story Hellman had read, shows the damage that can be caused by lies.

As the play opens, we meet the teachers and several students at a small boarding school in the 1930s. Karen Wright and Martha Dobie have worked and sacrificed for eight years to bring the school to a successful point, and

Wright is about to be married. This is all jeopardized by a troubled student named Mary who tells fibs and outright lies from the moment she appears on stage. Her biggest and most destructive lie centers around her completely unfounded assertion that Wright and Dobie have an "unnatural" relationship, after she hears a secondhand report of a conversation between Dobie and her aunt.

Occasionally, when I write a review, I find that much of what I found significant was also discussed by the play's director in the director's notes. That is, of course, both good and a little challenging. It's good in that it provides a match of directorial intention with audience reaction, even if only on the part of one member of the that audience. It's only bad in that it may mean a few points repeated from the director.

One beautiful thing about theater, like most other forms of art, is that it allows us to make connections between what we are shown and our own lives within our own cultures. As director Thom Hofrichter points out in his notes, we are living in a time when facts are disputable and claims need not be supported by evidence, regardless of the damage the

They have entrusted us, the Civic Theatre staff and volunteer actors, with a part of themselves in hopes of breathing life into their

work. We respect the working relationship with all our playwrights, and it is our hope to showcase their art with dignity and utmost attention to detail. All three of the playwrights, directors and actors have been wonderful partners on this journey.

If you are able to join us for the festival, you'll have the opportunity to hear three new plays, each followed by discussions led by Janet Allen, executive artistic director of Indiana Repertory Theatre. Allen will also lead the festival workshop, discussing topics pertinent to being a playwright today. The festival reception, held prior to the 8 p.m. performance of *One Foot in the Gravy*, provides the opportunity for sharing of ideas among festival actors, directors, playwrights and our audience.

I'd like to share a bit about the winning plays:

One Foot in the Gravy by Howard Kingkade (first place): Fergy, a cultured but jaded middle-aged woman, talks her lover, Ned, into disguising himself as a female nurse in order to care for her wealthy skinflint husband, Frank, who is reportedly on death's doorstep. Tired of waiting for Frank to die, Ned steps into action, which sets off a series of madcap events

My Dead Clown by David Rousculp (second place): The most admired funeral director in town, Bill is at the top of his game. This perfect world comes to a screeching halt when Bill's wife tragically dies. Bill loses his faith and his will to live. With no hope in sight and struggling to keep his job, a bizarre turn of events happen that brings a dead professional clown to life. Ironically it's this crazy clown that has to save the day and Bill.

The Unpredictability of Fire by Rebecca Cameron (third place): Allie Chapman, a firefighter/paramedic, is seeing to wounded Police Officer Jake Brecker. A spark between the couple grows and flares up as a conflict of interest when Officer Brecker applies for a position at the Fire Academy. A deadly fire leads to an investigation that consumes all invested.

It is an honor to have the opportunity to delve deep within our playwrights' words, creative plots, subtext and imagination. It is an honor not taken lightly due to the all the time, energy and love these playwrights have poured into their scripts – their heart and soul, their "baby." It is not easy to hear others analyze your work, read and interpret what you imagined, what you see and how you see your own script in your head. This is one of the most painstaking, yet rewarding, parts of developing a script for performance; it's the refining of the sculpture, the smoothing out the

Bits of wisdom are offered by this play. Most come from Karen Wright as she examines her possibilities for the future after the fallout from the claims made against her by a spiteful little girl who gains the support of her powerful grandmother. When talking with Dr. Joe Cardin, her fiancée, about where she can possibly go after her reputation is destroyed, Wright shows solid understanding of human weakness and reality.

As Wright, Taryn Wieland is well cast.

Though she could certainly show a bit more range of emotion considering the intensity of her part in the plot, Marissa Stieber is generally fine as Dobie, too. Joel Thomas Miller as Dr. Cardin, a character who does his utmost best to bring peace, is very good indeed and quite charming as he navigates between his aunt (Mary's grandmother) and the teachers. Janeen Kooi is fun to watch as Dobie's theatrical aunt, Mrs. Lily Mortar.

Cassandra Smith, a sixth-grade student, has the very difficult role of the seemingly wicked Mary and is able to pull it off pretty well. The other young ladies playing the parts of other students are also impressive, especially Emily Marshall as Rosalie Wells.

The sets serve the production more than adequately, and other elements of the production particularly costumes, are solid.

Like so many plays that offer truths, this classic isn't really fun to watch, but it is well worth seeing since it inspires thought and understanding of the risks brought about by believing in things we shouldn't.
