





Tribute Bands & Mummy Funk

While the music lineup has always been an important and highly anticipated feature of the Three Rivers Festival, in the last several years it has also served as the official opening act for the week's events. With a performance at Headwaters Park on Friday night before the more traditional opener, the Three Rivers Festival Opening Day Parade, one more day of entertainment has been added to an already packed lineup.

And that opener is pretty impressive. The Purple Xperience, an uncanny tribute to the music of Prince, is serving as that important first act in this year's festival. Hailing from Minneapolis and led by Marshall Charloff, the five-piece group formed in 2011, so it's no knee-jerk response to Prince's unexpected death last April. The act is a remarkable blend of music and Prince's signature dance moves, making the night one to remember.

"We had an opportunity to have a great band that night," said Jack Hammer, executive director of Three Rivers Festival. "I was planning for this show for over a year, and I think that's going to be a great night for us."

As is the case with most of the entertainment at TRF, local acts will open each national show. For Friday's show Good Night Gracie and The Meat Flowers will take the stage in advance of The Purple Xperience.

"A lot of people are familiar with Good Night Gracie, but The Meat Flowers provide a different style of music altogether. I think the lineup will really enrich the audience while providing a couple local acts a chance to appear on a ticket with a worldwide tribute show."

Also highly anticipated is the Rock of the 80s Tour on Saturday night, July 8 when Bow Wow Wow, The Motels, The Smithereens and headliners The Romantics take the Festival stage.

"This is going to be a great package show," says Hammer. "I think the underaddressed audience in this area is the fans of 1980s and 90s music, and that was something I really wanted to address with this show. And a lot of the shows now have gotten real-

ly expensive, but our goal is to make shows affordable and accessible to everyone. Our sponsors make it possible to keep the ticket prices down. The Purple Xperience is only \$12 in advance and \$15 on the day of the show, and the Rock of the 80s Tour is \$15 in advance and only \$20 day of the show."

Sunday's lineup includes Citizen Way with DJ Promote along with Jasmine Murray, Chris August and 7eventh Time Down while Monday, following the Waiter/Waitress Contest, Hell Came Home provides a raucous follow-up. More local bands take the stage during the week, with Trichotomous Hippopotamus and Brother playing on Tuesday and Left Lane Cruiser, U.R.B and Unlikely Alibi taking the stage on Wednes-

day for the Rock N' Reggae show.

Thursday's Heart & Soul Affair features the original Lakeside, the soul stars from the late 70s/early 80s, with regional soul star Ty Causey opening. The show closes with DJ Polaris providing a dance send-off for the night. The second Friday of the festival promises something entirely different when Zoso, a Led Zeppelin tribute, take the stage following openers The Union Project and Fuzzbox Voodoo.

"Zoso [are] one of the great Led Zeppelin acts," says Hammer. "They don't go up there wearing wigs and trying to imitate Zeppelin. They have the hair and the look and really look like Led Zeppelin."

Choosing The Union Project as one of the opening acts is clearly in response to their performance at this year's Down the Line where they covered the music of Deep Purple.

"[The] Union Project [are] one of the great bands coming out of Sweetwater,"

says Hammer. "We really love to highlight some of our younger bands, and we're really happy to have [The] Union Project and Fuzzbox Voodoo with us that night."

Closing out the week are Here Come the Mummies, an act that features local special guest Seth Cook as well as the Sweetwater All-Stars. Hammer expects the Mummies to be a special finale for TRF's music line-up.

"The Sweetwater All-Stars – if they don't make you feel like dancing, then you're not even trying – and Here Come the Mummies have a great following in this area. I first saw them when I was in radio, and I'm really looking forward to that night."

As usual, the music will take a little break while the Fireworks Finale takes center stage before the Mummies resume. It'll likely be the latest night of the festival, and Hammer says that he won't feel the full relief of the end of the week until he checks the papers the next morning.

"I always wait and hold my breath until I see that everyone got home safely the night before. We want everyone to come down here and have fun, but it's very important to us that everyone gets home safely. When I read the papers the next morning and know that, that's when I say 'Whew, it's done."

Although tickets for shows at Three Rivers Festival are already the best priced in town, Hammer says there are even more ways to save some money.

"There's a two-dollar discount for anyone with a Three Rivers Festival button," he reminds us. "But there's also the Admiral's Access membership which can be purchased at our offices or at the Embassy box office just as our tickets are. The individual membership is only \$45 [and] provides access to all shows plus 16 free drink tickets. The family pass allows for access to shows for four people as well as 24 drink tickets. And there's a corporate pass available as well.

"The other great thing about the Admiral Access passes is that you can be allowed into the venue 15 minutes before anyone else. So you can take your pick of seats before the crowd comes in. It's just a great package, and one more way we're trying to make the shows more affordable for people to enjoy."

In what is arguably one of the top 10 skits in *Saturday Night Live* history, actor Christopher Walken plays a fictional music producer giving advice to a fictional version of the rock band Blue Oyster Cult.

Walken's demand in the skit for "more cowbell" slipped the surly bonds of sketch comedy and became both a durable internet meme and a durable American idiom.

Eric Bloom, Blue Oyster Cult's lead singer, recounted the day that he realized how deeply "more cowbell" had permeated the culture.

"I was reading a car magazine," Bloom told the Port Washington Patch, "and it said 'This car needs more cowbell.' And right away you know what this means."

The "more

cowbell" skit brought fresh attention to Blue Oyster Cult, but it also brought 17 years' worth of "more cowbell" questions.

The band's members have answered them all, graciously, even though the skit has about as much to do with Blue Oyster Cult as Spam has to do with steak.

In truth, Walken's character wasn't entirely fictional. It is widely assumed that he was meant to evoke Sandy Pearlman.

Pearlman, who died in 2016, was the architect of Blue Oyster Cult – the band's Svengali

"Sandy created the band," Bloom told Vintagerock.com. "There would not have been any BOC without Sandy Pearlman. He saw Donald (Roeser aka "Buck Dharma") and a few others jamming one night. I think he was out of graduate school already. He was a very bright guy with a Woodrow Wilson Fellowship. He was the editor of 'Crawdaddy!' at the time, one of the first rock n' roll magazines.

"[Pearlman] saw Buck jamming with

some people," he recalled, "and thought he was great, and said he had an idea for a band called Soft White Underbelly. The band was sort of a collective for a while, people in and out ... Sandy put it all together. He was the mentor and the guiding force."

Bloom told Classic Rock magazine that Pearlman had a "platonic idea of what Blue Oyster Cult should be.

"He had his own vision: 'the American Black Sabbath' or 'the thinking man's rock band," he said. "It certainly got us off the ground, his push."

Pearlman had some unique promotional strategies, Bloom said – like writing articles

about the band filled with absurdly false details.

"He wrote that we played at the Mount Rushmore rock festival," he said. "Of course, there was no such thing, but he said that the

highlight of the show was when 'Eric Bloom jumped off of George Washington's nose.'

A few years later, Bloom recalled, the band had a hilariously fateful encounter with a hitchhiker.

"'Are you guys a band?' he asks us. 'Yeah', we tell him: 'We're Blue Oyster Cult'. The guy says: 'No kidding! I was at the Mount Rushmore festival!' He said he saw me jump off the nose."

Pearlman enlisted the talents of some illustrious scribes to write lyrics for Blue Oyster Cult, including singer-songwriter Patti Smith and authors Michael Moorcock, Eric Van Lustbader, Jim Carroll and John Shirley.

Pearlman produced eight of Blue Oyster Cult's albums before parting ways with the band in the late 1980s.

Despite his lack of intimate involvement with the band after 1990, Pearlman wasn't exempt from being asked about the "more cowbell" sketch.

"Actually, I needed less cowbell," he

Steeped in the Blues

Tinsley Ellis' career as a bluesman started in a hotel lobby. A fan of British invasion acts like the Beatles, Cream, the Rolling Stones and the Yardbirds, Ellis was told by the older brother of a friend that he needed

to hear B.B. King play. King, the older brother said, was the reason the British invasion rockers knew their way around a guitar.

It just so happened that King was going to be playing a series of six shows in a nearby hotel, so Ellis asked his dad to take him and some friends to see the legend. It turned out to be the pivotal moment in his young life as a musician.

"I remember that it was Saturday afternoon," Ellis told me in a recent phone interview. "B.B. King was playing a teen show that day. They shut the bar down and sold soda pop to the kids. I sat right up in the front row, and B.B. King just blew me away. He showed me where people like Duane Allman, Jimi Hendrix and Eric Clapton came from. After that, I was a huge fan. I was bitten by the blues bug, and I went to see as many blues shows as I could."

Ellis, who performs July 7 in Glover Pavilion in Warsaw's Central Park as part of the city's free Blues and BBQ Concert, always knew he wanted to be a

guitar player. It was all he ever wanted to do, but after high school his parents insisted he attend college, so he enrolled at Emory University in Atlanta where he studied history, minoring in late nights and blues clubs.

"I'm very grateful to my parents for sending me to college," he said. "It's paid off in lots of ways, of course, although sometimes I'll admit I feel a bit like an educated fool, someone who thinks he knows a lot but really knows nothing." He laughed and continued, "Let's just say I got out of there by the skin of my teeth. I was no honors student, because I was playing so much and spending lots of my nights in clubs instead of studying."

The playing out paid off. As part of the Haygood Band, he cut his teeth and found his sound. It wasn't easy, though. He struggled just like any young musician trying to make his way.

"I started on the road almost 40 years ago," he said. "It was hard at the beginning. There was a lot of sleeping on people's

floors, making nothing, not knowing where my next gig would be.

In the late 80s, his career really took off. That's when he signed with Chicago's Alligator Records and put out the first of many critically acclaimed albums, 1986's *Cool on It*, with the Heartfixers, his band at the time.

Tours of the U.S., Canada and Europe followed. Also, believe it or not, a chance to open for his hero and idol, B.B. King.

"I toured with him several times," Ellis said. "He was always very nice to me.

We would sit and talk for long periods of time, and he gave me advice. He was like a grandfather to me. I know the blues will survive and blues-influenced music will always be good, but we really lost something when we lost B.B. King."

Ellis, now 60, is doing his part to keep the blues alive. Over the years, he has served as a mentor to a number of performers, including Derek Trucks and Jonny Lang. In the case of Trucks, that story unfolded a little like Ellis's encounter with King. Trucks' father brought him backstage at one of Ellis' shows, and Ellis talked with the boy, encouraging him to keep playing, to keep honing his craft. When Trucks was a young teen, Ellis brought him up on stage to play with the band. And Ellis wrote a song for Lang. who recorded it in his teens. Ellis has a good relationship with both men, who've made names for themselves as the next generation of blues aficionados.

Consummate Showmen

When he was just a young boy, Tony Butala moved from his home in Sharon, Pennsylvania to California, primarily to pursue a career in performing. Now, more than 60 years later, he remains the only original member of the Lettermen and the only one to never leave the fold. But before he was the lead singer of one of the most popular trios in the last half century, he was part of the fabled Robert Mitchell's Boys Choir and gained experience with some of Hollywood's biggest names.

"The choir boys were known to be so disciplined and so good that producers would hire us to be in motion pictures," says Butala. "They knew we'd come in and be prepared so we all got parts in over 200 motion pictures."

Among Butala's roles was a voice part in Walt Disney's *Peter Pan* where he played one of the Lost Boys.

"We sang the song 'Following the Leader," he recalls, breaking into song as he does. "I can still hear it in my head today."

Butala also played alongside Doris Day and Gordon MacRae in On Moonlight Bay and had an uncredited role in War of the Worlds. These experiences continued for several years until Butala faced the inevitable evidence of adolescence: his voice dropped and his time with the choir came to an end. For a time Butala continued as assistant director of the choir, but he soon put together a quartet called the Fourmost which featured Butala, two other male singers and a female singer named Concetta Ingolia. The Fourmost began having some success, enough that an en-

terprising agent suggested Ingolia leave the group for a solo career. After changing her name to Connie Stevens, she went on to even greater success herself, leaving just the three men behind to go forward.

"We decided to keep go-

ing, and I didn't really want to bring in another singer, so we continued as a trio. By this time it was 1955 or 56, so rock music was just starting to come into play. We continued doing jazz and big band music, playing at Vegas showrooms, and [we] recorded four songs to shop around."

Signed by Capitol Records, The Lettermen were on their way, leaving in their wake many other similar vocal groups who weren't able to make their brief successes last.

"You get some of these groups right out of college or high school, kids that have been singing together and decide to start a group but don't have much experience. They might have a hit record, but that doesn't make them performers."

The Lettermen have defined the word "performers" over the years, with Butala savvy enough to know that it's not just music that draws the crowds. They also incorporate comedy and showmanship, and the result has kept the trio busy through many changing musical styles.

"Over the years we'd get chances to play with a lot of big names, some of them past their prime a bit, so they'd bring us in in the 60s and 70s to attract some of the younger audiences. We opened for George Burns and Jack Benny, Red Skelton, Jackie Gleason. We'd go out there and sing a few songs and get the audience primed for them."

As the only original left, Butala has seen his share of change, with many fellow Lettermen coming and going over the years. He says he understands that "show business is two words: show and business" and has asked members to provide a year's notice so a replacement can be found. The current lineup, which in-

pat or resting on its laurels.

which is why Butala is surprised when he's asked how the group keeps it fresh after all these years.

"When I'm asked that question, it always astounds me because we're about to record our 75th album playing songs from groups like Journey and Styx that haven't been 'Letterman-ized' yet. There's still a lot of magic in our shows, and different arrangements keep the juices flowing and the adrenaline up. Some nights we play for 5,000 people, other nights 500, and there are grandchildren of our fans from the 50s and 60s who are coming to our shows. In fact, we recently had a woman who was a fan of ours as a teenager and is a great-grandmother now, so we had four generations of her family at the show."

Although kept busy with The Lettermen, Butala also spends time with his children and grandchildren and has a long-time hobby, winemaking, which he's been pursuing since he was three years old. Really.

"All four of my grandparents came to Pennsylvania from Croatia, and when I was three, my mom would go to work and I'd stay with my grandparents.

Lady Antebellum Heart Break

In late 2015 Lady Antebellum announced that they'd be taking a break from recording and performing together. The announcement worried fans, but the break turned out to be not much of a break at all. After some solo projects, the trio was soon back together, and their new album, *Heart Break*, dropped only a bit more than a



year and a half after the start of the hiatus. Many artists take longer than that to record new albums even without taking a break. If Lady A needed a vacation in order to recharge their batteries, they didn't get one.

The concern is that the group might be pushing too hard, and their seventh studio album might suffer for it. Fortunately, that doesn't seem to be the case. *Heart Break*, though uneven and occasionally uninspired, delivers enough successful tracks to be a net win for fans.

There are some definite misses on the record. The title track is a run-of-the-mill, mid-tempo pop tune about self-empowerment. "Army" is a ho-hum love song built on a silly, misguided metaphor. "Home" is so predictable, you could probably sing its cliched "you feel like home" lyrics having just read the song's title.

Still, the album's bright spots are just enough to pull it out of the dirt. "You Look Good" is a bluesy good-time song that's solid overall, but the nice touch of adding brass to the arrangement puts it over the top. "Hurt" is nothing special in its subject matter – another song about bad relationship choices – but its mature self-awareness makes it an effective tearjerker. "Big Love in a Small Town" likewise uses a reined-in tempo and a minor key to elevate itself above the typical song about romantic nostalgia.

Heart Break is not a groundbreaking album, and it's nothing like a reinvention born out of off-the-clock soul-searching on the part of the trio. It is, however, a respectable pop country album that will make plenty of people happy. (Evan Gillespie)

Katy Perry Witness

Katy Perry is under no obligation to reinvent herself. Arguably the most well-established of the pop divas of the past decade (and there's one pop diva in particular who would undoubtedly argue), Perry could seemingly keep pumping out the quirky-funny self-empowerment anthems until the end of time and do



just fine. But instead of sticking to what she knows on *Witness*, Perry follows the cool kids to the night club and loses herself in the crowd.

Perry still occasionally relies on millennial whoops ("Hey Hey Hey") and sassy irreverence (as when she tag-teams Taylor with fellow Swift adversary Nicki Minaj on the catty "Swish Swish"), but Witness opts to go the synth-pop route throughout. It borrows from every electronic music movement imaginable, from 90s trance and watered-down R&B to 2000's auto-tune overkill.

Every beat sinks into a mushy club fuzz, and Perry's vocals are covered with reverb. Perry is, again arguably, the weakest singer among today's pop superstars, and her vocals are better suited to the non-tune-dependent anthemic shouts than the nuances of a dance-club moan; in club territory, she doesn't measure up very well against the competition

What's missing from *Witness* is anything resembling a summer party anthem (e.g. "California Gurls," "Teenage Dream," "Firework," "Roar," et al) amid all the house beats. One suspects that the bigly-titled "Tsunami" is the album's anthem wannabe (and it includes such Perry-esque lyrical gems as "Make me ripple 'til I'm wavy"), but its general lack of energy removes it from contention.

The core of Perry's fan base will, no doubt, follow her to the club, but it's hard to imagine that 2017's mainstream song of the summer is going to come from *Witness*. (Evan Gillespie)

Sparks hit in the scene in the early 70s during the art/glam rock movement in Los Angeles. Brothers Russell and Ron Mael produced some of the quirkiest pop-rock since The Mothers of Invention and are still considered to have influenced dozens of bands,



including Sonic Youth, Pixies and Depeche Mode.

This record features crafty guitar work from Adrian Fisher (resembling Queen's Brian May in its range). Behind the keyboards was sibling Ron, and the high-pitched vocals were cleverly delivered by Russ.

The album opens with "This Town Ain't Big Enough for Both of Us," a funky, almost disco number that has elements of hard rock and pop and slides perfectly into the power-poppy "Amateur Hour." "Here in Heaven" continues the pre-new wave vibe, but like most of the release, it has inspired drumming from the underappreciated Norman Diamond. Side one closes with "Thank God It's Not Christmas" (think T. Rex meet The Darkness).

Side two starts with "Hasta Mañana Monsieur," a bright song heavy on keys, percussion and screaming guitar. "Complaints" also carries the pop flag but was very inventive for the early 70s. The album closes with "Equator," a track that sort of wraps up the sound they were trying to achieve throughout: idiosyncratic power art-pop.

The duo has enlisted many great musicians over the years and has produced over 20 records in the last 40 years. Although Sparks have flown under the FM radio radar, some of their work appears on satellite radio, and you can catch them on Pandora.

They will tour Europe in the fall to support their newest release, *Hippopotamus* (September 2017), and are near the top of my bucket list of bands to see. (*Dennis Donahue*)

told Reality Check TV in 2010.

These days, the current line-up of the band (featuring two original members, Bloom and Roeser) tours incessantly.

Bloom told the Aurora Beacon News that he loves the performing a lot more than he does the travel.

"If we could advance 500 years into the future, when they have matter transmission like in *Star Trek*, it would be a wonderful thing," he said. "Go to concert venue, play a show then go home to sleep in your own bed and not have to go through TSA, check bags, fly all day and change planes and get picked up and go to a hotel, etc. That's the downside of the day. The playing of the show is really the best part"

Blue Oyster Cult change their setlist every night, Bloom said.

"Obviously people want to hear the hits, so we play them," he said. "But I do try to keep it fresh and change it up a little bit on a regular basis. Once in a while we'll dig deep. There are the very, very hardcore fans that would like to hear certain songs, and I'll pay attention to that."

The band has a nightly pre-show ritual and it involves the Fab Four.

"We have a routine," Bloom told the Lodi News. "We get to the dressing room a half an hour or 45 minutes before we play [and warm up]. We play Beatles songs, I'd say, nightly. The Beatles lend itself to a vocal workout because their songs have so many elements. We're all big Beatles fans."

Bloom said the band constantly writes new material, but there isn't much incentive to release it.

"These days the music business is in disarray for bands like us," he said. "There's no label interest for bands of our ilk. The only thing that could possibly happen would be a self-done internet kind of thing.

"If you look at the trades these days, there's no bands like us on the charts," Bloom said. "And it would be very unusual for classic rock acts like us to get any traction. So, if you want to take three, four months to just go off the road to make a record, it's very difficult to think that you might get some commercial success with it."



Look for a full-length later this year.



"Derek always invites me to sit in and play with him, and he tells people I gave him his start, which is great. And Jonny is always kind and appreciative," Ellis

"I really feel like there is a certain amount of apprenticeship in the blues. The older guys have an obligation to counsel the younger ones, and the younger ones often surpass us. Us older guys, of course, hope they don't forget us."

Ellis put out 12 albums on the Alligator label before breaking with them in 2013. The split was an amicable one. Ellis wanted to record an instrumental album, but Alligator wasn't biting, so he produced Get It! under his own label, Heartfixer Records, and he's been an independent artist ever since. His most recent effort, 2016's Red Clay Soul, is a thematic tribute to the state of Georgia, where, Ellis said, "the blues got

"In Red Clay Soul I'm exploring the roots of me and my band. We're doing more of the music of the region where a long time ago Ray Charles and Otis Redding and James Brown got their start, spilling over to the more contemporary rock backs like the Allman Brothers and Stevie Ray Vaughan.'

In his four-decade-long career, Ellis has had a chance to play with a veritable who's who of the blues and rock world, including the Allman Brothers, Vaughan, Buddy Guy, Otis Rush and Albert Collins. He tours constantly to keep his fan base strong and his skills sharp, and he's also no stranger to the studio. He already has a new album in the works that should drop in January. He said it's a bit of a throwback to his days at Alligator. More rocking, a bit of a scorcher.

'We're still throwing around titles at the moment. One thing I know for sure. It won't be called An Educated Fool. I'll save that one for later."

My grandfather made wine, and this was during the Prohibition when you could make the wine but not sell it. So he'd make some and then trade it for milk from the dairy farmer or eggs from a woman who had them. And I'd help with the pruning and the crushing. All my friends were at school, and I was helping my grandfather make wine. I thought everyone did it."

When he came into some money as The Lettermen took off, he immediately bought some land and rediscovered that connection to his grandfather. These days he mostly provides grapes for other wineries, saving some to make a few cases for himself.

Maintaining connections to family also extends to his life as a member of The Lettermen, where he says the group has always seen its fans as friends. In

fact, each year they have a convention in a different city, and this year's is here in Fort Wayne the weekend of their performance at the Foellinger Theatre. Butala says their mutual devotion to their loyal audience is why they've been around so long.

We don't have a Lettermen Fan Club, we have a Lettermen Friend Club, and after every single show we go to the lobby and sign autographs and take pictures and talk to everyone.

We're the last people to leave every night - us and the janitor. So many people duck out the back and maybe sign an autograph or two and get into the limousine to go back to the hotel to party. But we want to spend time with our fans who have made our careers

Fort faves **Halestorm** are mostly playing festivals this summer as they write and record new music for the follow-up to 2015's *The Wild Life*. The band apparently plans to be done with the task by fall, as they have booked the Hallowen Scream Tour with



openers **Starset** and **New Year's Day**. Unfortunately for our readers, there is currently only one area date scheduled for the tour: October 4 at the Morris Center in South Bend. You can also catch all three bands at the Louder Than Life Festival in Louisville in September 30.

The Toadies haven't made a lot of waves since their song "Possum Kingdom" was a radio hit back in 1994. The band is still together though and getting ready to release its seventh studio album, titled *The Lower Side of Uptown*. The new album is due out September 9, and, of course, a tour is already set up to support it. The Fort Worth, Texas-based band will visit Chicago October 10, Indy October 12, Detroit October 13 and Cleveland October 14. **Local H**, a 90s favorite as well, will open the shows.

Another band that has been missing in action for some time is **Queens of the Stone Age**. They are getting ready to drop their seventh studio album on August 25 and will tour for the first time since 2014. A September 10 gig in Grand Rapids is on the touring itinerary, as is September 12 in Columbus, Ohio, September 15 in Cleveland and September 19 at Riot Fest in Chicago. **Royal Blood** will open the shows.

The Northwest Ohio Rib Off is not just one of the bigger rib fests in the area, it also offers a nice helping of music to go along with those tasty ribs. Former **Styx** vocalist **Dennis DeYoung** takes the stage at Toledo's Lucas County Fairgrounds on August 17, **Lee Brice** brings the country August 18 and **Grand Funk Railroad** continues their seemingly never ending trek on the festival circuit with an appearance August 19. The DeYoung and Grand Funk Railroad shows are only \$7 each; Brice will cost you just \$12. And don't forget about those tasty ribs.



A Quiet Passion Falls Short

Emily Dickinson spent so much of her life living very privately that she can be interpreted in many ways. Her reputation rises and changes on a steady arc. When I heard that her life had been made into a film, *A Quiet Passion*, I was excited to see how she would be treated on film. And I had hope that Terence Davies, a filmmaker with the kind of sensibilities that seem a good match to the subject, would do her justice.

While there are some fine qualities in his film, *A Quiet Passion* does not do its subject justice.

No biopic is easy. How do you tell the story of a life without being too literal or too fanciful?

A Quiet Passion begins with Emily as a young woman suffering at Mount Holyoke for her unconventional sentiments about God, belief and sin.

She is rescued from school by her family, who brings her home to Amherst, bringing her great joy.

The first scenes of the film introduce us to the very different world of mid-19th century America. There is plenty of wit and humor in the early scenes, as we see Emily chafe at some of the conventions of the time.

She comes from a prominent family. Her family founded Amherst College, and her father, though in many ways a typical man of his time, insisted that his children receive extensive education. Girls weren't studying science and math in those days, but Emily and her sister Lavinia ("Vinnie") did.

To send us into the adult lives of Emily and her siblings, portraits mutate, a lovely effect. In adult life Emily is played by Cynthia Nixon who looks surprisingly like Dickinson. Vinnie is played by Jennifer Ehle whose warmth and luscious voice temper Emily's harsher attitudes.

Brother Austin (Duncan Duff), mother (Joanna Bacon) and father (Keith Carradine) round out the household. Mother is chronically ill and melancholy and needs much caretaking.

Emily's desire to read and write poetry fits in with

her mother's quiet needs. Emily is both conventional and unusual. She frequently stops attending church, not because she doesn't believe in God, but because she feels "He doesn't need my presence in a pew as proof."

When she wants to spend more time writing, she asks permission from her father to write from 3 a.m. to sunrise, "when things are quiet."

Nixon reads Dickinson's poetry, as voice-over, throughout the film, and these are some of the best moments in the film.

A Quiet Passion looks beautiful. The beauty of the outdoors, the perfect detailing of the house and costuming makes the world seem quiet indeed and very orderly, a veneer that covers over many layers of relationships and spiritual questioning and frustrations.

Emily begins her famous retreat from the world and grows increasingly bitter, plagued with doubt and preoccupied with mortality, immortality and death. Davies paints a portrait of a family growing ever more grim. And this is where I grew increasingly frustrated.

Yes, she was a strange person, wearing white almost exclusively, conducting visits from behind closed doors, barely leaving the house. But she lived so much more vividly than shown here.

The gardens around her house are beautiful, but we never see her working in them. In life, she was much more famous as a gardener than as a poet, creating enormous gardens and cultivating a wide variety of exotic flowers. (The gardens are now being

Back Home Again in Indiana

Tornado Weather by Deborah E. Kennedy, Flatiron Books, 2017

Colliersville, Indiana is desperately in need of a renaissance. The small town at the heart of Deborah Kennedy's debut novel has seen better - albeit not much better - days, and its residents would appreciate some improvements in their lives. Unfortunately, none of them is really sure of the true cause of the town's decline, making their stabs at fixing things generally ineffective; if rebirth comes, it's going to come by chance and at a substantial cost.

Kennedy explores the town resident by resident, devoting a chapter to each member of a broad cast of characters, all of whom are linked to-

gether by a web of sticky smalltown threads. The most overt of those threads is Daisy Gonzalez, a young girl who goes missing one May day after she gets off the school bus. Few of the residents of Colliersville spend much time worrying about poor Daisy's fate as the spring wears on, but her disappearance is always lurking in the background as a symbol of the town's unease.

The characters have more in common than just Daisy, though. Helman Yoder's large dairy farm is Colliersville's main employer, and when his operation is raided for filling its staff with undocumented immigrant workers, the bust sends shock waves through the town and through the Yoder family, including his medicationaddicted wife Birdie and his transgender child Wally/Willa. For some in Colliersville, the Mexican immigrants who worked at the farm and live in the impoverished Bottoms are the reason that things are so bad, although they'd be hard pressed to explain exactly how.

There's also the Seaver clan who live in the Bottoms, too, and are looked down upon by the rest of the town. They make up most of the town's racist "militia" movement, and their mean spiritedness makes life difficult for those around them.

Kennedy hops from house to house and business to business in Colliersville, and she even makes a brief journey to Iraq. Gradually, she uncovers the links between the many characters, their past loves and conflicts, their hopes that have faded, their grudges that have festered. She builds the town's complex history, the interlaced interactions that have made Colliersville into what it is today: an economically downtrod-



den town whose institutions (the laundromat, the little grocery store, the abandoned amusement park outside of town) have not met well with the demands of the

There is hope for redemption here, however. In one particularly moving vignette, a group of women who have been pulled apart by circumstances outside their friendship are drawn back together by some of those same circumstances. In an extraordinary scene of grief and forgiveness, we're given a glimpse of the strength that could hold the town together if only it were allowed to come to the surface.

Few in the town see the Mexicans in the Bottoms as the only source of all the town's problems. They're much more likely to ignore the exploited foreign workers than to insist that they be forced to leave. Instead, the residents seem to see the town's decline as a simple fact of life, an inevitable consequence of the way the world

> Kennedy finds the roots of America's current agitation in Colliersville, however. restored. Amherst now owns the family home which houses a museum.)

She was famous for sending notes and poems and nosegay bouquets to events she chose not to attend. We see nothing of her large collection of pressed flowers and plants.

In one scene she bakes a loaf of bread and seems disappointed it wins only second prize at the fair. In life she was a talented and avid baker.

We see nothing of the frequent abundant correspondence she carried on with a wide variety of family, friends and acquaintances. We don't see her ever with the beloved children in her life. We see her lose many loved ones, but not her close companion, her

I couldn't reconcile the passion, love of nature, vibrancy and joy found in her letters with the deadly

serious and depressed character on screen. In life, part of her retreat from the world was a conscious decision to recopy, rework and organize hundreds of poems. In the film, she just drifts. We get no sense of how much

We can never really know, maybe about anyone, but certainly not about someone who didn't want to be known too well. Her sister diligently burned all her correspondence as requested upon her death, but she didn't burn the poems she found. Thank goodness! Dickinson's correspondents kept her letters, so there is a wealth of her insights, beyond her poetry, still in

A Quiet Passion is interesting, but Dickinson's own words do her better justice.
