

The rest of you, please read on, make plans to enjoy what northeast Indiana has to offer and, when you do, remember to tell 'em whatzup sent you.

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
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
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
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Feature • Aretha Franklin -----Rhythm & Blues Royalty

Thanksgiving 2016. I'm the matriarch of a sizable blended family. There are five kids, almost as many in-laws and one perfect grandchild. There's a pretty large turnout for Thanksgiving dinner since I serve mine around 12:30, just in time for football to start and leaving plenty of time for everyone to visit other family gatherings later in the day. Although the family tilts in the

favor of a female demographic, my boys are possibly the chattiest of all of them which means these holiday celebrations can get pretty boisterous.

Just as I was putting the finishing touches on the gravy and putting food onto serving platters, I noticed a rare phenomenon: silence. The living room was eerily quiet, and it was way too early for food coma to be responsible. I had to see what had happened and immediately realized that Aretha

Franklin was singing the national anthem in advance of her hometown Detroit Lions' traditional Thanksgiving game. Three days of food prep and more than four hours of cooking all upstaged by the Queen of Soul.

There are few performers more deserving of such reverence. The country experienced that same breathless awe together in the waning days of 2015 when Franklin performed "(You Make Me Feel Like) A Natural Woman" in front of the audience at the Kennedy Center Honors in tribute to honoree Carole King, the song's co-writer who included the song on her legendary Tapestry album. But of course it's Franklin who first brought the song to the masses, and it was Franklin who brought tears to the eyes of million, including President Obama, when she sang it that December night. She talked about that experience weeks later, as the country was still re-watching videos of her performance, when asked by an interviewer for Vogue why people had responded as they

"I'm not sure why, but I sure enjoyed it. I loved the response from the audience and everyone who has been calling and texting. I'm just very happy about it ... I've been trying to appraise that. Seriously. I've seen it maybe about 12 times. And it was just stunning. I've done the Kennedy Center many times. I've [sung] for Marian Anderson. I've [sung] for Marion Williams. I've [sung] for Lionel Hampton. But never that response."

One year after that memorable performance and that interview, Franklin announced her decision to retire from touring after 2017, a year that will also see the release of a new album produced by Stevie Wonder. In what feels like a miracle, the Queen has included Fort Wayne among those final stops before she puts the brakes on a touring career which has spanned

Clive Davis helped move her into a more contemporary sound. Her 1985 album Who's Zoomin' Who?, which featured the hit "Freeway of Love," was her first Platinum album. and the follow up, Aretha, kept her on the radio and MTV with a cover of the Rolling Stones' "Jumpin' Jack Flash" and the George Michael duet "I Knew You Were Waiting for Me." Also during the 1980s, a brief but memorable appearance in The Blues Broth-

more than 50 years.

"I feel very, very enriched and satisfied with respect to where my career came from and where it is now," she told Rolling Stone in February. "I'll be pretty much satisfied, but I'm not going to go anywhere and just sit down and do nothing. That wouldn't be good either."

If anyone deserves a chance to slow down a bit, it's Franklin. Born in Memphis, her family moved to Buffalo before she was two and then to Detroit by her fifth birthday. It was there her love affair with music began, in the church, as was the case for many sing-

Although she was in the city where Motown was beginning to establish itself, Franklin was gaining enough attention to warrant a contract with the far more powerful Columbia Records. The early 60s saw some initial success for the powerhouse singer, but it was her move to Atlantic Records in 1967 and the recording of I Never Loved a Man the Way I Love You that same year - which launched her career. Working with producer Jerry Wexler, who had a knack for finding the perfect songs for her to record, resulted in a string of hits which will forever be associated with her, including "Think," "Chain of Fools" and "Ain't No Way."

She stayed with Atlantic until 1980 when she moved to Arista Records where ers iced her legend for even the most casual fan.

In 1998, in a moment that foreshadows her astonishing performance at the Kennedy Center Honors, Franklin offered to step in for Luciano Pavarotti who had to cancel his appearance at the Grammys due to a throat issue. With no prepara-

tion and to the amazement of the audience both in the theater and watching at home. Franklin provided a breathtaking rendition of "Nessun Dorma" and drew raves from all corners of the world. Recently she repeated that performance for Pope Francis, switching from Italian to English midway through to thoroughly put her own indelible stamp on the piece.

As she winds down her final tour and prepares to record her new album, a re-imagining of her classic catalog will be available from Rhino in November. With her vocal tracks from songs like "Respect," "Natural Woman," "Son of a Preacher Man," "Let it Be" and many more matched to new arrangements by the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, the collection offers a fitting tribute to the special and beloved talent audiences have had the pleasure to witness for a half

It will be those songs which the Queen of Soul will share when she takes the stage at the Foellinger Theatre next week, and it will be an appreciative Indiana audience which will bid her farewell as she winds down a stellar and memorable career on the stage. While she remains adamant that she will not disappear, her retirement from touring is still cause for bittersweet acknowledgement, and we in Fort Wayne are fortunate to be part of the celebration."

The King of 'Happy Music'

When a young C.J. Chenier heard his first zydeco record, he wasn't sure what to make of it

"It was French, and my mom didn't speak French even though she was from Louisiana," he said. "She was from a non-French-speaking part of Louisiana. So, most of the songs were in French and the only one I really understood on there was an instrumental

"I wasn't resistant to it," Chenier said. "I just didn't understand. A lot of it at that time sounded the same to me."

There's nothing unusual about a young person failing initially to fully appreciate a style of music that is new to him.

What makes it sort of intriguing in this case is the identity of the artist who made the record: Chenier's father, Clifton Chenier.

From those exceedingly humble musical beginnings, C.J. Chenier went on to assume his father's King of Zydeco mantle.

C.J. Chenier and the Red Hot Louisiana Band perform on August 11 at the Foellinger Freimann Botanical Conservatory as part of the Botanical Roots series.

C.J. Chenier was a saxophonist in a funk band in Texas when his dad sent a zydeco summons.

"I was 20 years old," he recalled. "I was playing in this funk band, and we were playing at a bazaar at a Catholic

church. A friend of mine's mom lived down the street, and she sent someone to the bazaar to tell me my mom needed me to call her.

"So I went down and called her," Chenier said. "And that's the day she said, 'You've got to come home because your daddy wants you to go on the road with him."

Chenier's initial reaction to this directive from his dad was guarded: "I thought, "Man, I gotta go on the road with all them old dudes?""

But Chenier said his first tour with his dad turned out to be "the best time I ever had in my whole life."

The phrase "trial by fire" was coined to describe extreme tests of mettle and worthiness. As Chenier prepared to meet up with his father's band for the first time, he couldn't have known that what awaited him was something like a trial by zydeco.

"I came from funk," he said, "and all of a sudden I am taking the place of the greatest zydeco saxophonist I had ever heard, John Hart. I thought he was going to be there, but he wasn't. It was just me. I didn't know

songs. I didn't know nothing."

Thankfully, the other band members were patient with Chenier. "They knew I didn't know nothing," he said, laughing.

Chenier assumed he'd feel awkward at first performing with the band, but that proved not to be the case.

"I felt real comfortable up there standing next to my dad," he said. "The way the

crowd acted, I had never seen anything like that before. I had been in gigs where they danced a lot. But when we went to places like California and Oregon, people went crazy. It was a new experience for me."

As Clifton Chenier's health declined, he pressured his son to become proficient on his instrument: the accordion.

"When I got in the band, he kept telling me, 'You know you're going to have to learn that accordion,'" he said. "'You're going to have to take over for me some day.' I kind of started feeling around with it. Let me tell you, that big accordion had way too many buttons on it."

So Chenier, who'd had some piano training, acquired a smaller accordion and slowly worked his way up to the larger model.

Nine years after C.J. Chenier joined the band, his dad passed away. But Chenier had started taking a lead role long before that.

"When he got sick, man, he started letting me open the shows for him," he said. "And sometimes he'd be so ill, I'd have to play almost a whole show. So [when he died] it was just a natural thing for us to continue. There was no other way but to keep going. We were red bot."

Chenier took over officially in 1987 and he said he's been on the road ever since.

Here's something that's interesting to consider: Having grown up in Texas with his mom, Chenier's familiarity with Louisiana, birthplace of zydeco, is fairly limited.

He said he performs there regularly, but

he has never spent a significant amount of time there.

The man that the Boston Globe called "the crown prince of zydeco" is a Texan. Not that there's anything wrong with that. Zydeco long ago expanded well beyond the confines of Louisiana, but it wasn't always thus.

Chenier said that when he first joined his dad's band, zydeco was a household word – just in an extremely limited number of households.

"He had a massive following in California and Oregon and up in Washington," he said. "And nobody else was doing the traveling. He was the only one doing it at that time. But if you told people who were weren't in the mix, 'I play zydeco music,' and they'd be like, 'Zyde-what?'

and they'd be like, 'Zyde-what?'
"Nobody knew," Chenier said. "Now
everybody knows what zydeco is. It's the
happiest music you can find."

Chenier was at the center of some unexpected controversy a few years back when Mike Vital, a distant relative, sued him.

Vital claimed that C.J. Chenier is not Clifton Chenier's biological son and not entitled to use his last name or to benefit from that last name. Vital wanted documentation, which Chenier said he provided.

"It was all about greed," Chenier said.
"Somebody trying to be greedy. They tried to accuse me of fraud, basically. When I showed them proof of who I am, I haven't heard from them for almost three years. In fact, I haven't heard from them since two months after they filed their suit.

"Some people have ulterior motives," he said. "They think they can get what you got. They're just that type of person."

Chenier said the upcoming concert will be his fourth or fifth performance in Fort Wavne.

"I love coming to Fort Wayne, man," he said. "I love looking out at the people dancing at the Botanical Gardens and thinking about who is discovering zydeco for the first time."

The Wizard of Pith

Emo Philips is what is known as a comic's com-

Regardless of his prominence in American pop culture at any given moment, Philips will always be admired by his fellow comedians.

In 2014, Patton Oswalt tweeted this about Philips: "I will *never*, *ever* write funnier, darker, more disturb-

ing, more inappropriate and 100 percent clean jokes than Emo Philips. Good God."

Philips is the headliner at this year's Let's Fest, a four-day comedy festival happening at seven Fort Wayne venues.

It starts August 3.

Philips was cited on Nerdist founder Chris Hardwick's list of the top 10 living standup comedians and on the CineNation website as one of the top comics of all time.

In 2005, Philips was praised by Shipoffools. com for having created the funniest religious joke of all time (a bit too long to be reproduced here).

Philips arrived on the national comedy scene in the mid 1980s with one of the stronger stage personas: a childlike man with a pageboy hairdo and a singsong voice who didn't seem to be at all aware of how clever he was.

In a 2010 editorial in the British newspaper, The Guardian, Philips was described as a "pith artist."

"He tells semi-surreal jokes so short and sharp that they make the audience jolt as well as laugh," the publication opined. "[In the 1980s] Philips was often dubbed an alternative comedian, but his jokes are much cleverer, cleaner and funnier than that term suggests ... His jokes are often informed by a sense of cosmic injustice that means all people are cursed with rotten luck. Rather than get angry about it, the Philips way is to coin cheery one-liners."

Unlike other comics with strong stage personas (Bobcat Goldthwait, for example), Philips tries never to break character in public.

He agreed to an email interview because he likes to take some time crafting answers to questions.

Asked to cite the first joke he ever wrote, Philips responded: 'I woke up this morning with a bloody nose. I thought, 'How did this get into bed with me?'"

Philips, a Chicago native, said everyone found him funny as a kid. "It was quite upsetting," he said.

He once described his stage character as "the default persona when one has no stage presence."

He said his joke-crafting process was stubbornly old-fashioned for quite some time.

"Up till the 21st century, I wrote on a 1940's castiron Royal typewriter," he said. "It was not in good condition. If you examine my early gags, you'll find that few contain the letter 'j."

When on the hunt for new material, Philips said he basically tries to think of things that make him laugh. "Then, once that's out of the way ..." he wrote.

To young comics seeking advice, Philips recommends a 2009 posting on the Nerdist website by the

aforementioned Hardwick about the late Bill Hicks' Principles of Comedy.

"By referring them to it," he said, "I teach them the most important lesson: to use their time wisely."

A robust four-decade career in comedy means a lot of touring, of course. Philips compares touring to swimming.

"How fraught with worry and bother beforehand! How pleasurable once one is in!" he wrote.

If he has downtime in the cities he visits, Philips seeks out art museums.

"[I] try to guess what each painting or work of sculpture is about," he wrote. "I then try to guess the title of the piece. I then look at the title, and read the description, if there is one, and see how close I came. I'm not great at it; I often guess before I have a right to, and miss a crucial detail, and then

kick myself afterwards, as one kicks oneself for not correctly guessing the murderer in a whodunnit or the winner in an election."

One thing Philips is not is a foodie.

"No offense to foodies, but I am the opposite of one," he wrote. "For me, driving across town to dine at a special restaurant would be like driving across town to wash my hands in a special sink."

When he's not on tour, Philips does voice-over work (He has assayed such animated roles as Shannon the Bully on *Home Movies*, Dooper on *Slacker Cats*. Cuber on *Adventure Time* and Dennis O'Bannon on *Welcome to the Wayne*).

He also pursues one hobby.

"My hobby – which, sadly, I get to indulge only when home in Los Angeles – is leading my own band, Emo & the Emo-Philiacs," he wrote. "We specialize in tunes from the first half of the 20th century. I play the recorder and sing, and am very happy to report that, as of our latest show two weeks ago, I have finally gotten the singing out of my system."

Asked what he thought he'd be doing with his life if he wasn't performing comedy, Philips responded: "That'd be like asking a butterfly what he'd be if he hadn't become a butterfly. My childhood caterpillared me into it."

After a yearlong stage hiatus, Debbie Moore is back in the spotlight.

A lifelong Fort Wayne resident, Moore says her parents, Anthony and Deborah Kirkland, "had their hands full when it came to me as a child."

Not only was she energetic and inquisitive, she says, "I came into this world ready to be heard. I wanted to be the spotlight everywhere I went.'

To give her a more formal outlet for her energies as well as her musical interest, her mother signed her up for piano and voice lessons when she was five years old. She soon was on to the Fort Wayne Children's Choir with whom she performed for several

She was raised in a family of musicians, in fact, and they all enjoyed performing together at her grandfather Hobart Gregg's church. "I used to sit in the pew and mimic

the beautiful voices I heard," Moore says. "I sang at the Christmas program with my grandfather, and I felt like nothing else mattered because I was doing something that was fun with people I loved.'

As much experience as she was gaining through performance, she didn't pursue it seriously until adulthood.

"I always just auditioned to be in the ensemble," Moore says. "There was safety for me there. I got numerous call backs for lead roles but never felt confident enough in my acting ability to go for

She attended Northrop High School where she only knew five other students, all of them from Memorial Park. She sang in the school choir her freshman and sophomore years, but she was the

only one in her circle of friends who sang, so it began to lose its appeal. She focused more on sports and academics, although she still performed with the Fort Wayne Children's Choir and with her church.

She even auditioned for the Fort Wayne Civic Theatre a few times, but

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Making Right Choices

-----Feature • Rain Kings-----

Many musicians will tell you that choosing a band name is hard. Among them would be Jerry Albright, singer and leader of Rain Kings. So did they choose their name from the Counting Crows song or from the Saul Bellow novel, *Henderson the Rain King*, which inspired the song?

"Both really," says Albright.

Choosing a name may have been tricky, but by the time the Rain Kings reached that point, they had already spent a fair amount of time figuring out what

they wanted to play and why. In fact, choosing a set of songs was their focus for the first year or so they played together.

"We have been very conscientious about song selection, so we've taken a year to get it dialed in," says Albright. "When we first played out this past April, it

was at a charity thing at Moose's Lodge in Auburn, [and] everybody said, 'Wow.' Even though it was our first time playing out, we just got such a great response and started getting interest from other places about playing there."

The approach they took comes from years of experience. Albright and guitarist Jeff Rapp have been playing together for almost 30 years since they met in the late 1980s.

"We were just young career professionals in Fort Wayne and had some mutual friends and a mutual love of rock n' roll. We were in a group with my brother and some other people, and it was just one of those things."

Together now again in Rain Kings – along with guitarist Ken Nelson, bass player John Steibeling and drummer "Motor City" Vinnie from (surprise!) Detroit – Albright says that there are a lot of differences between now and previous incarnations of bands with Rapp.

"Now we're all in our 50s," he says. "It's funny because I used to see bands that I thought were old, bands like REO Speedwagon or Thin Lizzy, and I'd say, 'Those guys are still out there? They're too old to still be doing this.' But now I know I rock better now than I did in my 20s. My voice is more mature, and I think we pick songs that are more appropriate for us. Instead of us trying to do whatever the big hit that week is, we're picking songs that work for us. Our biggest thing in choosing songs is whether we can play the song or not. We know what our range of songs is."

And when they choose the songs, they make sure they do the original justice.

"We try to play each song like it was recorded," says Albright. "We do every harmony, every solo the way it was in the original. Some bands, and some very good bands, will be okay if the song is just in the right key. But if one of our guys is going to do a guitar solo,

it's going to be as close as the one on the record."

That careful attention to their setlist is what kept the Rain Kings busy for almost a year or rehearsals before they took the step to play. It was time they enjoyed since they just like making music together.

"The drive to get out to make 50, 80 dollars to play wasn't what motivated us," says Albright. "We enjoy practicing. We enjoy getting together every week just to have fun. But at some point we had to say, 'We can sit here and play like this for the next 20 years, but we really need to get out there and play."

After their initial success at the charity event in

Auburn, the Rain Kings quickly earned a slot at the recent Rib Fest. just the kind of place Albright hopes they begin playing regularly.

"Rib Fest was great. The sound guy told us after we were done playing. 'I've been doing this a long time, and I see people come in and check out

the music and then leave to get a beer and some ribs. But people tonight were staying to hear you play. And we've been getting a great response. If you don't like what we're playing, stick around because you'll probably like what we play next. Even a song like the Counting Crows 'Rain King' – not a lot of bands do songs like that, I don't think."

Their ability to branch out to less obvious songs has been made much easier thanks to modern technology. Sharing music via Spotify has been a game changer.

"Spotify is one of the reasons I'm in a band now," says Albright. "It used to be if you wanted the band to play something, someone would have to get a recording of the song and then make a recording for everyone so they could learn to play it. Now if one of us hears a song that we like, we add it to the 'maybes' list that we share on Spotify. Now we're playing songs from bands that I've never heard of, like Alternate Routes and Delamere."

Albright hopes that the Rib Fest and a few other gigs which have been booked since – like New Haven Canal Days and Pierceton Days – are just the start of something bigger for the Rain Kings.

"We would love to play more festivals and events like that than bars. Not that I have anything against bars, because bar crowds are cool, but when you play at a festival there's more interest in listening to what you're playing. And weddings. People are there to party and get together with family. It's like a kegger and I love a good kegger."


Another plus to festivals and large scale events like that: built-in sound engineers who can make all the difference in a live performance.

"The last piece to our puzzle is that we have no sound man yet, so we have to hope the venue has one. The sound guy is just as important as the five people who are playing on the stage. So if you know any good sound guy, give me a call."

Calvin Harris Funk Wav Bounces Vol. 1

Summer is nearly half over, but the competition for official song of the summer is still on. You can be sure that Calvin Harris wants to be in on it, having perfected the art of self-conscious summer anthems with 2014's slyly titled "Summer." On that song the DJ/producer took a chance on his own vocals and won big,



but with his new album he's going the less risky route of assembling a roster of proven names to drop out in front of each song. Still, the album is likely to put at least one song on the list of tunes that the kids will be partying to throughout the summer of 2017.


The good money is on "Slide," a dreamy musical road trip that calls on Frank Ocean and Migos to crank out the smooth, sunny vibe. Don't count out "Holiday," though, a nearly identical groove that teams up Snoop Dogg and John Legend to plead, "Let's make every day a holiday." For sheer star power, that song is formidably countered by "Feels" which mobilizes Pharrell Williams (whose own summer anthem, "Happy," seems like it was a lot more than four years ago) and Katy Perry (whose own new album is struggling to dominate the summer); the song can't decide if it's funk, reggae or 80s R&B, so it's at a disadvantage.

Funk Wav Bounces Vol. 1 plays it safe and checks all the right boxes. It enlists A-list celebs to actually sing the songs, and it props them up with plenty of Auto-Tune and bland beats that are equally at home by the pool, in the car or in your summer camp cabin. If the attempt to evoke an 80s atmosphere seems a little thin, it's probably because Harris was born in 1984 and likely doesn't remember first-hand that "Purple Rain" was the song of that summer.

No matter. Harris' target audience is younger than he is, and they're ready to use his beats to party like it's 2017. (Evan Gillespie)

Violent Femmes *2 Mics and the Truth*

Back in 1997 the Violent Femmes played the Memorial Coliseum as part of a radio-festival lineup, and it did not go well. The audience, eager to get on with the show so that headliners Better Than Ezra could take the stage, started booing and throwing things. Eventually, the band's frontman, Gordon Gano, gave up



trying to win over the crowd and walked off stage.

Twenty years later, the Violent Femmes have released a collection of low-key versions of their biggest hits (and some other stuff) that they've played at radio stations during their 2016 tour. 2 *Mics & The Truth* is a tight, exuberant collection that helps explain how the Femmes first built their unique folk-punk style and then crafted songs that have the stamina to stand strong for decades.

The album includes versions of staples from the band's 1983 debut album, including "Gone Daddy Gone," "Add It Up," "Ugly," "Kiss Off" and, of course, the immortal party anthem "Blister in the Sun." There's no reason to think that the band would ever want to play these songs again, but that sentiment doesn't show in these renditions; when Gano jokes that people often have a revelatory moment when they realize the Femmes are the guys who play "that song," his good humor outweighs any bitterness he might feel about it

The album includes songs from all the band's albums, and the songs from last year's We Can Do Anything easily hold their own with the older tunes.

Many of us who were at that show 20 years ago have harbored hope that the people who booed the Femmes off stage are now embarrassed by what they did, but 2 *Mics* shows that it really doesn't matter

The Femmes are, and always have been, bigger than one unappreciative audience, and this collection is a fantastic display of their resilience and power. (Evan Gillespie)

Soul Finger (1967)
The Memphis s

The Memphis sound was, and still is, one of the most revered periods of rock n' roll (and also my favorite). Sure, Motown was bigger, but these cats started a groovy vibe that went on for another decade and changed the way folks listened to rhythm and blues.



These musicians were basically the house band at Stax Records and ended up as Otis Redding's band.

This was their debut – and was house music in its purest form. "Soul Finger" opens it up with heavy organ and horns in front of a tight, late 60s guitar. "Knucklehead," written by Steve Cropper and Booker T. Jones, follows with an even brighter sound and has a little bit of the West Coast chill from the same period.

"With a Child's Heart" brings the vibe down and lets the soul wrap its arms around you for a silky, slow dance. Side one closes with "Theme from Hell's Angels," a song that was a little dark and jazzy and has an unknown author.

Side two brings the house party back on the dance floor with "You Can't Sit Down." One of the longer tracks on the release (just 3:05), it fuses soul with blues and swing and has a sound that showcases the Memphis ambiance. "Hole in The Wall" has a jazzy bossa nova beat and is one of my favorite tracks on the album.

For a record full of instrumentals, only Jones (also from the Stax label) did it as well. Grab this record. At 50 years old, it still sounds fantastic

Sadly, just six months after *Soul Finger* was released, a plane carrying Otis Redding and five members of the original band crashed in Minnesota, killing everyone on board except for trumpet player Ben Causey. Redding, the oldest, was just 26 years-old. (*Dennis Donahue*)

ZZ Ward *The Storm*

ZZ Ward makes much of her mixed-up pedigree, both musically and personally. Personally, she identifies as a southern Californian, but she was born in Pennsylvania and raised in Oregon. Her nomde-stage is a shortening of the Hungarian version of her given name, Susanna, a reminder that it's not going to be easy



to pin down who she is. Musically, she pulls together the time-tested influences of the blues, R&B, gospel, folk and pop, and she inserts some contemporary hip-hop and electronic influences, too.

In truth, she's part of an even more contemporary tradition of vocalists who leverage old styles to complement their strong voices. She's not as shockingly original as some might have you believe, but that doesn't mean she's not good at what she does.

The Storm, the sophomore album that comes five years after her debut dropped, is a mélange of styles, some of which work more to Ward's advantage than others. On the gospel-tinged title track, she channels Adele, and on "If U Stayed" she fully puts on the Adele mask; these are the tracks that do Ward's voice the least justice. When she shoots for Amy Winehouse instead, as on "Cannonball" or "Ghost," she's more at home, and the songs' bluesy burn is a better fit.

Ward is at her best, however, when she truly mixes things up. "Let It Burn" kicks off with a slide guitar moan and then lurches into an acoustic blues verse, during which Ward's voice slides all over the place, before dropping a rattling dance club bass beat on the chorus. Similarly rich moments crop up throughout *The Storm*, and it's these occasional flashes of surprise that make the album. (*Evan Gillespie*)

Everyone knows that you can't go wrong with a good blues show, and trust me, we've been blessed with some great ones over the years. Whether it was shows at the old Hot Spot, C2G, RibFest or catching guys like Joe Bonamassa on the Piere's stage years back, we've been very fortunate. I went to Kehoe Park a couple of years ago to see Reverend Peyton's Big Damn Band and was very impressed; I can only imagine how awesome a Davy Knowles performance would be like there. There will also be beer and wine available for purchase at the show, so get your blues on!

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

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



Dream Theater have announced the third and final leg of their Images and Words and Beyond Tour, celebrating the 25th anniversary of their iconic album *Images and Words*. The band is, of course, playing the album in its entirety, but also promises to

There's no release date yet for the album, but the tour is set to hit North America in late October with an October 27 date at Chicago booked as well as October 29 in Cleveland and Halloween night in Ann Arbor.

As I've been pumping myself up for the upcoming **Steve Miller Band** show taking place September 20 at Foellinger Theatre, I have been doing some research. I've never been more than a casual fan until recently, when I bought a used copy of *Fly Like an Eagle*. That album has it all and turned me on to some of the other albums in their catalog including, of course, *Greatest Hits 74-78* and *The Joker*. I knew Miller from his few radio hits but was surprised to find out he started out as a blues artist and has actually sold over 60 million albums over the years. Several rappers have sampled Miller's music over the years, and hey, *Joey* from Friends had an imaginary friend named Maurice who apparently worked as a Space Cowboy." That's pretty cool. I'll tell you, the more I learn about this band the more I regret not seeing them the last time Pacific Coast Concerts brought them here. I'm not gonna miss them this time.



her nerves got in the way and she grew discouraged when she wasn't cast after several attempts.

After high school, she attended IPFW, studying biology and pre-med. Interestingly, it was then that she rekindled her love of theater. She would watch the theater students rehearse or perform and she longed to be a part of that. She attended all the theater she could – at IPFW, all around Fort Wayne and even in Chicago and Indianapolis.

"I just wished I could be half as talented as these people," she says.

The highlight of her four years at IPFW was taking two theater courses: Theater Appreciation and Acting.

Nevertheless, it was several years before she ventured into the audition room again. Her good friend and local actor Lovey Marshall encouraged her to try out for the Fort Wayne Civic Theatre production of *Dreamgirls* in 2012. She used every excuse she could think of. She was a newly-divorced mother of two young girls. She hadn't done theater since she was a kid. The auditions were held on Mother's Day.

But her family convinced her that it was time to do something for herself and promised to support her decision by taking care of her children if she made the show. So she went to the audition.

"I was so nervous because I was in a room full of people I'd been watching perform for years," she says. "I hadn't auditioned for anything in almost 10 years, so it was overwhelming. When I was called back, I was elated."

She was cast in the ensemble and the experience rekindled her love for theater. But it did more than that.

"The show reconnected me with one of my favorite actors, Prentis Moore," she says. "Three years later, he asked me to marry him."

But it still wasn't quite enough to get her onstage on a regular basis. She let acting take a back seat to raising her family, letting Prentis take the spotlight. Four years later, Andy Planck and Billy Dawson convinced her to audition for *Hair*, the summer show of the inaugural season at Three Rivers Music Theatre. "They even went as far as ensuring we had a sitter for the entire process."

She was cast in the ensemble and as the understudy for the role of Dionne. She was enjoying a relaxing return to the boards when the actor playing Dionne left the show, and Moore was asked to step into the role. She still needed some reassurance that she could deliver, but her performance was a memorable highlight of the production.

Moore recently left full-time employment with Fort Wayne Community Schools and is now a stay-at-home mom with a new baby and her older daughters. Although it's been a year since *Hair*, she's quietly working on her craft by carefully selecting the roles she auditions for.

"I make sure to do things that are relatable in some way – I'm very quirky and nurturing – so it's not hard to get into character," she says. "As I allow myself to let loose and have fun, I would love to venture into straight theatre."

Her current role should give her a good boost. She's making her Arena Dinner Theatre debut playing Mrs. Johnston in *Blood Brothers*. The show is directed by Jake Wilhelm whose previous directing jobs at Arena include the award-winning musicals *Bat Boy* and *Violet*.

Although Moore finds her character easy to relate to, it's not without its challenges. The entire cast has been tasked with the challenge of learning to speak with Liverpudlian accents. Additionally, this is only Moore's second production in the past six years, and she's been working hard to trust in her own talents and instincts.

"Jake has helped keep me motivated during this entire process," she says.

She likewise has nothing but praise for her cast mates and she feels that working alongside them has helped make her a stronger performer.

"They're all stellar both musically and dramatically," she says. "The positivity from everyone has been such a blessing during this show."

The experience has also reinforced her childhood realization that theater can bring a cast together more closely than many other experiences.

"The most fun about this show is how we have connected over such a short time frame," she says. "One of the reasons I gravitated to doing theater was the camaraderie that happens during shows."

She describes *Blood Brothers* as an action-packed emotional roller-coaster ride.

"I am beyond humbled to be a part of this production and truly appreciate Jake for trusting me with this role," she says. "All I can say is bring some tissues."

Ghost Worth Sticking With

"Can I have a minute?" asks a young woman to a hospital attendant after identifying her boyfriend who has unexpectedly been killed. The attendant steps away, and we witness her silent minute of mourning. In A Ghost Story time is a commodity writer/director David Lowery manipulates to alarming and wondrous effect.

A Ghost Story is a sad and scary film, but not in any conventional "ghost story" way. On screen, nothing particularly scary happens. Often very little happens at all. Watching the movie compares, at moments, to watching (very pretty composed) paint dry. (A few people walked out of the screening I attended.)

But if you stick with A Ghost Story, it will haunt you. The film explores love and loss and a host of philosophical musings about humans' place in universe. questions are answered, but the experience gives you plenty to think about.

The young couple at the center of the story are never named. We see them at home, a ramshackle place with a few neighbors but also lots of empty land stretching away. Rooney Mara and Casey Affleck are the young couple. We see them in affectionate loving moments, happily canoodling. There is also some mild tension, which seems to stem from a difference of opinion on where to live and whether or not to

We don't really get much information about what



might be simmering under the surface. We do get a glimpse of why they might want to move. Light shimmers on the wall from no apparent source. Things go bump in the night. One night a loud chord sounds on the piano with no piano player in sight. He is a musician. His music and the soundtrack adds considerably to the atmosphere.

She is packing up their belongings when she is suddenly left alone, sort of. After saying good-bye to her deceased sweetie, goes home. He rises up off the table and follows her. Just like the simplest of Hallow-

this ghost is just a big draped sheet with two eyeholes. You don't see any eyes, but the drape of sheet changes enough to register some changes in mood.

He watches, trailing her around the house, waiting for her to come home. She tries to adjust to her loss, mostly very much alone. There are long stretches of silence in A Ghost Story. This chapter of grief is especially quiet and daunting. It is just a sheet I kept telling myself, but you feel for him. She is just going

He Just Wanted to be Alone

The Stranger in the Woods: The Extraordinary Story of the Last True Hermit by Michael Finkel, Alfred A. Knopf, 2017

It's easy to see why Michael Finkel thought there was a book in the story of Christopher Knight. Knight had been apprehended by law enforcement after 27 years of hiding out in the Maine woods, surviving by burglarizing the cabins of local residents. It is astounding that Knight managed to live without contact with other people for nearly three decades, and there would seem to be a fascinating tale to tell about the situation. Unfortunately, there turns out not to be, or at least Finkel is unable to find a compelling narrative even in Knight's extraordinary circumstances.

Finkel was first attracted to Knight when the would-be hermit's story went viral after his cap-

ture in 2013. Knight had disappeared THE STRANGER way back in the 1980s, but his fam-IN THE WOODS ily never reported him missing. He had, apparently on a whim, simply walked into the woods in Maine and set up camp there. For 27 years, he lived without ever talking to another human being. He made a tent from tarps and garbage bags and constructed a world for himself by stealing from cabins, summer homes and a summer camp for disabled children. He got away with it until a determined game warden caught him in the act of burglarizing the camp.

MICHAEL FINKEL Upon reading about Knight in the newspaper at his home in Montana, journalist Finkel struck up a correspondence with Knight and eventually went to visit him in jail. Finkel thought he could empathize with Knight, but he wanted to understand how and why a man could live in total isolation for so long. Which category of hermit did Knight fit into? Was he a protestor who fled a society he hated? Was he a spiritual man who was looking for enlightenment in solitude? Was he an artist looking for inspiration in nature?

Finkel quickly realizes that Knight is none of the above. He has no real beef with society and no desire for spiritual revelation. He has disdain for faux hermits like Henry David Thoreau who want to tell the world about their solitary endeavors. Knight is just a



man who doesn't like being around other people. He doesn't like talking to them or interacting with them in any way, and his only explanation for why he wandered off alone is that he wanted to.

Finkel also doesn't have any luck turning Knight into a romantic character. Far from being a self-sufficient loner, Knight instead lived parasitically, staying close to civilization so that he could steal what he

needed. He claims to feel bad about his thievery, but his conscience didn't stop him from stealing food from disabled kids. As much as he wants to be unburdened by interactions with other people, he was dependent upon the people who inadvertently supported him for 27

With Knight not giving him anything to go on, Finkel fills out his book with musings about other hermits and philosophers. When it becomes clear that none of the background information that Finkel dredges up applies to Knight, it all begins to feel like filler.

Absent any noble or philosophical underpinnings for Knight's story, Finkel takes a stab at making the situation

seem logistically amazing. He plays up the remoteness of Knight's camp, wanting us to think that Knight is a backwoods genius who escaped detection thanks to his amazing skills. However, Knight was actually living in a well-populated area, and the truth seems to be that no one found him for 27 years because no one was looking very hard for him.

Even with a generous amount of padding, The Stranger in the Woods stretches only to a couple hundred pages. Going into the project, Finkel probably thought Knight had a broader story to tell. In the end, if Knight has an interesting story inside him, Finkel fails to draw it out.

through the motions, heading out to work every day, clearly miserable and numb.

In one especially excruciating sequence, she devours a pie left by a concerned friend. She is slumped on the kitchen floor, greedily and methodically attacking a dessert. Light dances all around her as she sits in semi-darkness. No family or friends (his or hers)

A blessing of A Ghost Story is the care taken by cinematographer Andrew Droz Palermo. In the early loss sequences, the house looks like a Vermeer painting. The objects are everyday objects, but light pours in windows, illuminating and caressing them. Light reflects off surfaces and refracts through glasses. It shifts, but is often Vermeer's soft palate of yellows, browns and blues with shadows and patches of bright-

Characters gaze out windows poetically framed. Leaves shift in the breeze. Seasons change. The various lighting on the sheet helps tell the story, and the movie is visually arresting throughout. Like moving still life paintings, A Ghost Story is a celebration of making the mundane aesthetically pleasing.

In the world of A Ghost Story, ghosts (our ghost

has company) can move throughout time but are anchored in place. The girl moves out. Our ghost terrifies future inhabitants, breaking pictures, throwing dishes. People don't stay long.

Time weighs on our ghost. The loneliness and isolation and longing evoked by this soul under a sheet sinks your heart. He waits, generation after generation, to find the answer he is looking for. Time is condensed for us, but we are aware what passes in two minutes for us he experiences as a century or more. He seems to be losing it over time. Who can blame him?

Humor in A Ghost Story is sparse and ranges from mordant to morbid. The best show of humor is in the opening credits: the movie is "A Scared Sheetless Production.'

I don't want to spoil what happens in A Ghost Story. I jumped in my seat a few times – again, nothing really scary - and I grew increasingly anxious. I wanted to know what was going to happen.

Lowery has created his own world, a strangely convincing and wonderful imagining of how we function and fit in to the cosmos. He leaves it to us to speculate as to the why.


