You don't expect to find yourself waistdeep in a swamp in the middle of downtown

Kendallville. But on a recent Monday evening that's exactly where I found myself.

To clarify (if it's possible to clarify a swamp) the bog I was standing in wasn't real. It was a creative illusion of murky green light and machine-made fog. And it was in the middle of a former car dealership, on Main Street, in Kendallville.

The aptly-named Nightmare on Main Street is the brainchild of Jamie Collins, an auto mechanicturned-fright master. Aided by his wife Amanda and his youngest son, Jonah, Collins turned the former Bodigon car lot into a haunted house that has something sure to twist the knife into just about everyone's deepest mental wound.

Tight places freak you out? Check. Have a special place in your goosebumps for clowns? You're covered. Creepy young girls singing creepy songs make you cringe? Grab your earplugs.



"We got a whole thing going on outside too. We built a village. We have a graveyard. There's no real theme," Collins said. "That's why we went with Nightmare."

Though only in its second year of existence, Nightmare on Main Street is likely to become an annual stop on the lists of avid haunt-goers. And why not? Collins and his family are avid haunt-goers themselves. They travel to other haunts around the Midwest. Chicago, St. Louis, wherever. Which explains why their entry into the field is so good already.

As a kid growing up in Lexington, Kentucky, Collins loved watching horror films any horror film, as long as it was bad.

"I don't believe in ghosts," Collins said.

"My wife does. I grew up watching horror movies. B-movies.'

Collins said his family has always favored Halloween over other holidays.

"It's our favorite time of year," he said. "It trumps Christmas. We always did a yard-haunt thing. This is something I've always wanted to do."

Collins had a different building in Kendallville where he wanted to build a haunt, but that never materialized. Even after he bought the 10,000 square foot building that houses Nightmare On Main Street, he wasn't sure what he was going to do with it.

He finally figured it out. Once the deci-

sion was made, there was no turning back.
"I always support him," Amanda said. "It's challenging, but it's fun. We've always enjoyed going to places like that. Really didn't know what we were getting into, but once you're there you can't stop. Got to keep going. It's fun, though. We like it."

The haunted house industry is growing with annual conventions and suppliers of

haunt-related goops and gadgets. props and poltergeists, corpses and creatures of all types. Collins attended a convention in St. Louis earlier this year. And while a lot of the features came from haunted house vendors, much of what Nightmare on Main Street has to offer was built by Collins and fam-

"I built two houses in there," he said. "You'll go through a living room, bedroom, closet, and you come out somewhere else. At the other end, there's kind of like a Christmas theme - living room, bathroom, that kind of thing."

Despite his affable personality and the fact that he doesn't believe in spirits, Collins knows a thing or two about freaking people out. But it's not easy. Though Collins seems to revel in thinking up ways to freak out his guests and then doing what it takes to turn a particular vision into reality, the one thing he lacks, the hardest barrier to clear, is one he can't control.

'Time is the most difficult," he said. "I get off work at five, come right over here and work till dark. I procrastinated this year. Waited till the end of July, first of August. I was building the outside area and wasn't going to get intricate. It was supposed to be simple. Then I kept adding on and adding on. Like last Thursday. I was cleaning up and saw some paint on the wall. I was like, that's almost 3-D. We have

any 3-D glasses? Man, that's 3-D. Let's do the whole hallway. So we were here painting till 3 o'clock in the morning. We camp here every weekend."

Despite help from friends and local businesses, the bulk of work has come from Collins and his family. That means daily trips to the hardware store to find the right tool or fitting to complete a task. Weekend camping trips? Not this time of year.

The dedication has paid off. The largest fear organ is the brain and Nightmare on Main Street finds all that fear no matter how hidden within the folds in our gray matter it may be. Within its 21 rooms lie all manner of nightmarish objects: blinding fog. impenetrable darkness, barely detectable annoyances, body parts, dolls, spiders, clowns, tight passageways, spinning 3-D rooms. crashed cars, witches, zombies, family gatherings. If it has the capacity to induce terror. Nightmare on Main Street has it.

There's even a hearse, a 1967 Cadillac Collins found in Cleveland. He had to tow it home but after a bit of work in his shop it runs like a dream, he said.

Or a nightmare.

In mid-April, the Fort Wayne City Council provided the last piece of the Clyde Theatre renovation puzzle.

It approved a \$1 million Legacy Fund loan for the refurbishment of the historic but long-shuttered Fort Wayne entertainment yenue

Even Keel Productions president Rick Kinney, who bought the theater in a tax-delinquent properties sale for \$500 in 2012, said three funding components combined to make his Clyde Theatre dream a reality: the Legacy Fund loan, a sizeable investment from Sweetwater Sound founder and president Chuck Surack and a \$1 million grant from the state's Regional Cities program.

The Regional Cities grant money comes from the Indiana's Regional Cities economic development initiative and the Legacy Fund loan is money from the sale of the city's old power utility.

The Legacy Fund vote was unanimous.

"Its pretty noteworthy that we got a nine to zero vote from the city council of support on the Legacy dollars for this," Kinney said. "That, in itself, was really the best feeling. City council members are voted in by the people on a local level.

"Local politics are pretty powerful," he added. "If people want to change something, they can vote for people and campaign for people. These people are our reps in Fort Wayne and they voted in favor of this public spending measure."

Kinney's plan is to turn the Clyde into a multi-use entertainment facility specializing in live music that can't be enjoyed elsewhere in Fort Wayne.

He said it will be the largest standing room concert hall in Indiana. The roughly 10,500-square-foot lobby will double as an art gallery, Kinney said.

A long and arduous journey was required to get to this point, he said.

"Imagine being on shark tank every day for five years," Kinney said. "That is basically what I did, and I got run through the meat grinder until I refined my plan enough to get to the right people. It was a great experience, and I gained a ton of knowledge



along with a few grey hairs."

Built in 1950, the 23,000-square-foot theater at 1808 Bluffton Road was one of the nation's first movie houses to be based in a shopping center. It was widely praised for the beauty of its design.

It closed in 1994 and it has remained closed to this day despite numerous attempts to resurrect it in various guises.

Now, actual work on its rejuvenation has indisputably begun.

"Hagerman (Construction) has just completed all the demolition," Kinney said. "And the local plumbers and carpenters are in there working on framing all of the offices out.

"A local sheet metal company is in there laying out all of the HVAC," he said.

While this structural and infrastructural work is going on, Kinney said he is talking to bands and performers and finalizing details of the sound and lighting systems.

Kinney said the sound system is being designed and constructed by Even Keel Productions and All Pro Sound, a Pensacola, Florida-based company that Surack acquired in 2011

The Clyde will employ four full-time staffers and "well over" 20 part timers, he said.

It is on track to reopen mid-to-late summer 2018, Kinney said.

Surack said he has fond memories of frequenting the Clyde and was intrigued at the prospect of helping revive it.

"When Rick Kinney approached [my wife] Lisa and me," he said, "we were immediately attracted by both his passion and his vision for the theater. He's a great guy and extremely knowledgeable, so we decided to help him get to the finish line and make the project the best it can be."

A venue gap has existed in Fort Wayne, Surack said, and the Clyde will close that gap by hosting shows designed to accommodate audiences in the 1,000 to 2,000 patron range.

"Most cities have something like this, but there's no space like it in northeast Indiana, so performers just pass Fort Wayne by," he said

There's a time for a venue like this, Surack said, and that time is now.

"The recent overwhelming success of other entrepreneurial live-music endeavors such as the Fort Wayne Music Fest and the Middle Waves Festival has demonstrated that the region is thirsty for live music."

Dan Swartz, director of the Wunderkammer Gallery on Fairfield Avenue, said it is always exciting to see new projects popping up on the city's South side.

"As they build momentum and attract audiences, our region begins to see more of the historic beauty and impeccable design which these parts of Fort Wayne contain," he said. "My hope is that, ultimately, we see more projects on the southeast side to compliment the developments in the 46807 and Quimby Village areas."

Kinney will be programming entertain-

In this life, there are constants and there are variables. As for the latter, weather comes to mind, as does the stock market, a child's mood and plane travel. When it comes to constants, you got your death, your taxes and Savoy Brown's touring schedule. If it is a day ending in "y," chances are very good the members

of one of Britain's longest-standing blues rock outfits are on the road, headed toward their next

That road and relentless touring schedule will bring them to C2G Music Hall Saturday October 7 for an 8 p.m. show. The tour is the band's way of celebrating the 50th anniversary of its debut album, 1967's Shake Down, which included covers of Willie Dixon's "I Ain't Superstitious," "Let Me Love You, Baby" and "Little Girl," as well as other blues standards like "I Smell Trouble" and "Oh! Pretty Woman."

Savoy Brown were forged in the hot fire of the British blues rock resurgence of the mid 60s. They came together in 1965, the result of a random meeting between guitarist Kim Šimmonds and and harmonica player John O'Leary in a Soho record shop. The original lineup was made up of singer Bryce Portius, keyboardist Trevor Jeavons, bassist Ray Chappell, and drummer Leo Manning, with Simmonds on guitar and O'Leary on the mouth organ.

So many lineup changes would follow that it's impossible and fruitless to list them here. Simmonds's brother and the band's manager, Harry, was in charge of staffing in the early years, and he could be a ruthless force when it came time to kick someone off the team. Former members have played for a veritable who's who of the 60s, 70s and 80s rock universe; Black Sabbath, Jethro Tull, Fleetwood Mac, you name it, past Savoy Brown dudes have been there. Suffice it to say, Savoy Brown have gone through more than 30 different incarnations since their propitious beginnings, but Kim Simmonds has always been there, through thick and thin, through richer and poorer and radio play and the DIY days. And he'll helm the band, now a trio of Simmonds on guitar, Pat De'Salvo on bass and Garnet Grimm on drums, when they come to Fort Wayne next

Fortunately for fans, Savoy Brown have nearly as

In. All the while they were garnering fans, many of them stateside. American audiences particularly responded to the driving slow burner, "I'm Tired," off of A Step Further. In total, Savoy Brown's discography is 39 albums strong, counting live and greatest hits releases.

It was two years into their career when Savoy

Brown added boogie to their repertoire and Chris Youlden as lead singer. Youlden took to the stage in a top-hat, cigar in hand, and helped the band build a following. thanks to his charisma and idiosyncratic way

One of the band's most notable lineup changes came in 1970 when three members -Roger Earl, Dave Peverett and Tony Stevens left to form Foghat. It could have been the end. but Simmonds, used to adversity and making lemonade from lemons. recruited four new dudes. all from the British blues outfit Chicken Shack, to keep the Savoy Brown name alive.

Simmonds told the San Diego Union Tribune this year that he'd thought before the founding of Savoy Brown that his career was over. What

was a 20-something blues guitarist going to do with himself in the era of Brit pop? But before he knew it, he and his Savoy Brown mates were touring with the likes of John Lee Hooker and Champion Jack Dupree

and critics were thanking them for helping bring the blues back from the dead.

"[Hooker and Dupree] were both icons from another world," Simmonds said. "It was fantastic, just incredible, to play with both of them. There were big lessons to learn, and I don't think we could take it all in. Wherever we played — clubs, theaters, ballrooms, colleges — people loved John. It was a real eye-opener to see how he connected with any audience, in any setting. And Jack could make any piano, no matter how out of tune or broke down, sound great."

So Savoy Brown made remaining humble and aware of their roots one of their trademarks, along with blistering guitars and a lowdown, funky aesthetic. To Simmonds in particular it was important to always remain true to the music. Fame and publicity took a back seat to the blues, which might have resulted in the band's not becoming a household name but more a long lasting act with a loyal following. In an interview with Rock Music Star, Simmonds said that trade off is something he is happy to live with.

"I think, at this point, the 'integrity' thing seems to

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many albums to their credit as they do lineup changes. A year after the release of Shake Down, they put out Getting to the Point. Next came two albums in as many years – Blue Matter and A Step Further – a pace that became somewhat of a pattern for the band. In 1970,

An Apparition on Main Street

Prepare for creaking floorboards, clanking chains and a haunted castle in the Fort Wayne Youtheatre's performance of The Canterville

Ghost, a production based on the novella by Oscar Wilde.

In this play, the American minister to Great Britain, Mr. Otis, and his family move into Canterville Chase, a castle haunted by Sir Simon of Canterville, a nobleman who died under suspicious conditions. The ghost is overwhelmed by the spirited family in hilarious fashion.

The cast of 28 has actors ranging from age nine to adult. Local community actor and Youtheatre teacher, Christopher Murphy, plays the ghost.

The show is an interactive theater performance, which differs from the traditional actor/audience experience by removing the "wall" between the two.

The Canterville Ghost begins in the ballroom (the PPG ArtsLab Black Box Theatre), and then the audience moves to different rooms throughout the Auer Building to interact with different cast members and ghosts. The cast visits the dining room, the parlor, the staircase and the all haunted corridors of Canterville

This is the second year Youtheatre has done an audience

immersive show. The basic plot of The Canterville Ghost remains the same, staying true to Wilde's novella. But in adapting this story, Leslie Hormann, Youtheatre's executive and artistic director, decided to create more characters for the play in order to cast more young people.

The play is very *Downton Abbey*, she says, as the audience meets the downstairs staff at Canterville Chase. This production also has a tea party for the teenaged Otis girl, Miss Virginia, where she has members bring up people from the audience to dance.

As the fifth oldest children's theater in the


nation, Fort Wayne Youtheatre was created in 1934 when the Fort Wayne Players (now the Civic Theatre) wanted more theater opportunities for children. Hormann says working with children is the best way to make a positive impact on our commu-

Youtheatre is committed to producing literature-based theatre, making The Canterville Ghost a perfect choice.

"We like to do the classics," says Hormann. "It doesn't get any more literary than Oscar Wilde, and it's a title that students read in school."

Youtheatre normally tries to include a spooky tale in their fall slot, fitting for the weeks leading up to Halloween, although The Canterville Ghost is actually more funny than scary, making it great for younger audiences. There is also a good deal of physical comedy, which is usually a hit with kids and helps keep them engaged. Stories like this lend themselves well to experiential theater when the audience interacts with the actors and actually become part of the show.

The Canterville Ghost promises to be an entertaining theatre experience that brings a haunting story to life with a comedic

ment at two Fort Wayne venues in 2018: The Clyde and the Sweetwater Pavilion, a 3,700capacity outdoor concert venue.

In 2016, Sweetwater Sound announced its intention to construct a 200-foot-by-40-foot pavilion on its property at 5501 U.S. 30 West.

The finished pavilion was the location this summer for numerous events associated with Sweetwater's Gearfest and for additional concerts brought in by Kinney.

Rusted Root and Adrian Belew performed in the pavilion, thanks to Kinney, and Carl Palmer's ELP Legacy performs September 28.

"That's just laying the groundwork for what we're going to do in 2018 at the pavilion, and also it's setting the stage for what we're going to do at the Clyde Theatre," Kinney said. "We're getting a little bit ahead of the game and staying ahead of the curve for all the talent we're going to bring to the Clyde."

Kinney said Even Keel Productions will manage both the Clyde Theatre and the Sweetwater Pavilion in 2018.

Even Keel has partnered with Etix.com to handle ticketing for Clyde Theatre events, he said. Tickets will also be available at all Wooden Nickel Music locations and Neat Neat Neat Records and Music.

Plans for the rest of Quimby Village, the shopping center anchored by the Clyde, are more amorphous, but they are hopeful.

Kinney said Even Keel and its partners currently control 75 percent of the complex.

The entire six-acre parking lot, in an extreme state of disrepair at present, will be resurfaced, Kinney said.

Kinney said he would love to see a restaurant or two come into the complex that use locally sourced ingredients a la The Golden and

He also hopes the Hall family one day considers constructing a riverside deck near its Bluffton Road restaurants like the one it built

In July, the Hall family announced that it would be adding carhops back to its Hall's Original Drive-In eatery at 1502 Bluffton Road.

Kinney thinks the return of carhops is a direct result of the commencement of the Clyde Theatre renovation.

"They made that announcement a couple of days after the groundbreaking," he said. "So it's definitely tied into that."

Ideally, Quimby Village will one day be a one-stop source of "really good food, entertainment, recreation and art," Kinney said.

"That's the direction I'd like to see the shopping center take," he said.

Surack said he believes the new Clyde will spur a lot of change.

"There is no question that Quimby Village needs new investment and the renovation of the Clyde will have a transformative effect on the area," he said.

None of this would be happening were it not for Chuck and Lisa Surack, Kinney said.

One would be hard pressed to find a band that's as solid as Fort Wayne garage rock quartet Slug Love.

They've got the typical line-up – guitarist and main singer Alex DeNicolo, guitarist/vocals David Yanes, bassist/vocals Josh Wenning and drummer Derek Schweizer but some characteristics about them say a lot more than your typical band. Their sound, for one, is solid yet hard to pin down. The widest blanket you can cast is good ol' rock

n' roll, and maybe that's

enough.
"We want you to know you're listening to rock n' roll of some sort, but we sort of like the idea of you not being sure exactly what kind," said DeNicolo via email.

And that's basically what you get: pretty straightforward rock with psych, pop, punk and garage elements that just fuel

DeNicolo plays a customized Gibson SG with one hard-hitting humbucker while Yanes entrusts his sound to a Fender Telecaster, a guitar invented

for country music but adopted by the rock world. Together with Wenning's Thunderbird bass, the sound almost has to include power chords and guitar solos. Presumably, these guys drive sensible cars like Honda Accords or something, but their sound implies they're either in a hop-boy motorcycle club or tearing down the road in at least one

"As a group with diverse tastes, we have a hard time narrowing down a specific direction or genre. Because of this, we tend to relate well with genres like proto-punk and garage rock because they are so broad in terms of influences," said DeNicolo.

Like many bands, input comes with from the group effort. This, of course, shapes the style of each song and can lead to an output with an array of style.

'Since becoming more of a collaborative effort, we've transitioned from songs that are less one style each and more influenced by multiple styles with a more consistent sound with each song. Having more diverse input has helped us to focus into a

hybrid of these influences as opposed to attempting a singular stab in one direction. We hope to be increasingly collaborative," said DeNicolo.

Some Kind of Rock n' Roll

There are definitely influences present that shape the sound. Many of Slug Love's tunes have upbeat, 50s surf rock hooks, but guitar riffs out the wazoo keep the music well away from the cheese that makes vintage rock or 80s power pop what it is. The music stays familiar and makes for easy listening and even easier watching; their live set is tight, to say the least, and it's apparent



the guys have put in the time to practice.

Slug Love seem like they could play an endless set. From one strong-armed song to the next, there's no feigning in their abilities. In this way, they've outgrown and are still growing into the "bar band" category.

A lot of musicians would scoff at the idea of being a bar band, a term which connotes bad 80s covers and less-than-ideal ambition. But Slug Love give off the vibe that they'd rather be in a bar than somewhere with more lights or more seats.

"As a band, we hope to keep having a superb time making music we're proud of and performing with friends we're even more proud of," said DeNicolo.

Different members of the band reside in Fort Wayne, Muncie and Indianapolis, and like any long-distance venture the geographic distance puts a strain on the band. But you'd never know it watching them play at the Brass Rail, a regular spot where the guys feel at home.

"We currently are divided among three cities, causing progress to be slow, but it also creates a sense of excitement and urgency the few times we are able to practice.

"We typically try to stick pretty close to our live performance in our recordings. In both, we try and balance the energy of a live performance with the reliability of a studio recording," said DeNicolo.

So not only is the sound constant and rhythmic enough to get your hips shaking just the right amount, but they're putting it all together during sparse practice times and bringing that energy to their recorded material. It's remarkable that they're able

> to put together such a tight set while living miles apart from each other.

The distance doesn't stop collaborative efforts between the band, however. Songs will start in one place; the idea will get bounced around and finally get workshopped when the boys are all in one place. Each song usually starts with a passage or a lick from DeNicolo.

"It usually starts as a loose song idea from Alex. Maybe just a guitar part or maybe a guitar part with a few lyrics. We'll try it out as a group, if we like it and feel like it has potential we'll sometimes finish it on

the spot or maybe bounce it around over a few weeks or months until it feels ready to play it live," said DeNicolo.

Despite the distance, Slug Love have managed to put together their first full-length album Underside which will feature art from Jared Andrews (see April 6, 2017 whatzup). The album was self-recorded and mixed by

A sneak peek of Underside reveals exactly what you'd expect after seeing Slug Love live: lots of back and forth power chords, droning vocals which secure the band in the garage rock category at least for specific moments, and songwriting that seems a lot more focused and put-together than a debut release usually entails. Keep an ear out for the new album later this fall.

Do yourself a favor and take a moment when you're walking by and let Slug Love pull you in. The new tunes will hopefully help keep Slug Love rooted in the Fort Wayne rock scene where they can keep audiences coming back for their approachable. consistent and tuned-in music.

He's also stood on many stages, including that of Carnegie Hall,

Royal Albert Hall, Madison Square Garden and the world-famous

Simmonds and company have a new album out, Witchy Feelin'. which, according to American Blues Scene, is proof Savoy Brown haven't lost a beat since they first made their mark on the blues rock scene of south London.

"With over five decades in the game, there's a reason Savoy Brown has stood the test of time. Witchy Feelin' is it."

Life of Agony

A Place Where There's No More Pain

It's been 12 years since Life of Agony last released a studio album. The band never officially broke up, but they have only played together sporadically during the last decade or so. Members of the band have stayed in the public eye by working on various other projects throughout the years, but there was little talk of new LOA music ever being made, leaving fans to wonder when, or if, they would ever hear



from this Brooklyn-based rock band again.

One of the difficult issues Life of Agony have always faced is the fact that they are hard to categorize. They aren't hardcore enough for the hardcore kids, they aren't metal enough for the metalheads and they aren't punk enough for the punk rockers. What LOA do is successfully mix the New York hardcore sound with groove, big hooks and hard hitting, honest lyrics that can chill you to the bone, creating a unique sound that leaves them in a category of their very own. While their last album, Broken Valley, was a bit of a departure from this formula and a disappointment to longtime fans, A Place Where There's No More Pain sees LOA getting back to what they do best and finally creating a proper follow-up to their iconic debut album, 1993's River Runs Red.

The album kicks off with the grim "Meet My Maker" and doesn't get much cheerier from there. But that's part of the Life of Agony listening experience, isn't it? The song sets the tone for the album as a whole, as it features the band's trademark sound and singer Mina Caputo's signature gut-wrenching lyrics and passionate perfor-

"Right This Wrong" and the title track are up next and are two of the stronger songs on the album; they're sure to please longtime fans and may help create new fans that are willing to give the band a chance. "Right This Wrong" ventures a little out of the band's comfort zone and into the 90s grunge arena, but the album's best song, "A New Low," brings the focus back.

The haunting closer "Little Spots of You," while seemingly out of the realm of the usual Life of Agony fare, is a fitting end to the opus, as it features just Caputo, a piano and an abrupt ending that leaves you feeling both uncomfortable and satisfied at the same

While A Place Where There's No More Pain is clearly better on the front half as opposed to the back half, where some of the songs feel a little unmodulated, the combination of aggression and hooks is prevalent throughout the album and should leave listeners with a good overall impression. Clearly, even after more than a decade away from the studio, Life of Agony still have something to say and continue to be uncompromising in their approach. Whether this proves to be the final piece of the Life of Agony story or a new chapter in the band's history, A Place Where There's No More Pain is worth checking out. (Chris Hupe)

Iron & Wine Beast Epic

With all the veteran acts returning to their roots and pop stars turning to retro sounds from decades before they were born, it's clear that there's not much room these days for a musician to evolve and explore something entirely new. In that context, it makes sense that Sam Beam has decided, on his sixth album under



the nom-de-song Iron & Wine, to go back to the style of music that characterized his first two albums instead of that of the next three. Beast Epic is a deliberate revisitation of the simpler arrangements of Beam's early music, although, fortunately, there are also some fresh notes on the album.

After albums on which Beam has brought in a full band and experimented with complex arrangements, Beast Epic is decidedly simple. At heart of all the songs are Beam, a basic melody and an acoustic guitar. That's not to say the arrangements don't get more

Pylon Chomp (1983)

Athens, Georgia became the center of the new wave, college rock sound in the late 70s and gave us R.E.M., The B-52's and many more great bands. Randy Bewley and Pylon, "discovered" by The B-52's at a house party, released an EP with some singles and then this hip record in 1983.



The album opens with "K," a modern rock number that is heavy on simple guitars. The ominous vocals from lead singer Vanessa Briscoe resembled a combination of Deborah Harry and Susan (Siouxsie Sioux) Ballion.

'Beep" is another track from side one that has an early 80s vibe eerily close to some of stuff that Talking Heads were producing at the same time. Grabbing the pop sensibility and blending it with darker lyrics made "Crazy" one of the album's better tracks, as it was almost danceable amongst the shoe-gazer scene.

"Buzz" kicks off side two and, like the Throwing Muses or R.E.M., carried on the hip, alt-rock vein while defying easy categorizing. "No Clocks" has a happier melody and bounces around for almost three minutes.

But the grungy Goth side is revealed once again in "Reptiles." If there was one ding against this release, it was in the production. Briscoe's vocals are drowned out for most of the record, and I remember she could really handle the mic when I saw them live.

"Spider" has an earthy new-wave feel about it and gives you a hint at their influence from Joy Division. The album closes with 'Altitude," a pleasing track that captures the bass, drums and guitars actually behind the cooing vocals of Briscoe.

The band released just three records through 1990, and occasionally played some reunion gigs through 2008. Sadly, Bewley suffered a heart attack and died in a car crash in 2009. (Dennis

complicated than that (Beam pulls in backing musicians, and his voice is consistently augmented with a soft, warm echo) but there's little effort made to cloak the songs' kernel of melody in anything

That's really the best thing for Beam's music, which is unassumingly earnest. "Claim Your Ghost," the album's opening track, rests on the somber refrain "killers let go" and admits that "our hope is the desperate die wise," an attempt to find optimism in a difficult world.


The song is the most unabashedly folk-y on the album. Everywhere else, Beam strays toward 60s folk-pop, but the melodic priority and semi-dark poetry create a reliable through line. That makes Beast Epic, if not exactly a real evolution, at least a compromise that stays true to Beam's musical roots. (Evan Gillespie)

"come to Jesus" moment. After a huge health scare and too many years ingesting various chemicals, the guy realized he wasn't some desert rock god. He was just a mere mortal like you and me, and it was time to reel it all in or burn out much too early. That album was dark, sobering, and a slate cleaner in terms of music.

Where do you go once you've bared your soul and gone to war with your own mortality on an album? You go to Mark Ronson, that's where.

Queens of the Stone Age have returned after four years of side projects, shows, and wood shedding with the Ronson-produced *Villains*. The results are both what you'd expect and also not what you'd expect. That's neither good nor bad. It just is.

Nobody gets the scuzzy boogie going like Queens of the Stone Age. It seems to be in their DNA, or something they acquired near Joshua Tree National Park amidst the burning sun and fuzzy head space. They've patented their own groove, and only they know how to control the machine.

Opening track "Feet Don't Fail Me" ominously opens like a Pandora's box and breaks into some patented Queens scuzz rock. We're nearly in robot disco territory here, and Homme sounds man enough to own it.

Next up is the greasy boogie of "The Way You Used To Do." This is like some bizarre party song from some other dimension where tattoos, leather, and fuzzy bass are requirements. Homme has never hidden his love of Billy Gibbons' guitar pyrotechnics, and here he lets that love show proudly. It's a hell of a track, really.

"Head Like A Haunted House" sounds like the Queens on a Germs bender – pure adrenaline and all the weird stuff we've come to expect and love from QOTSA. "Un-Reborn Again" touts wonky synths and a Georgia Satellites lyric drop. It's part glam and part middle finger (with a painted fingernail, of course). The last track, "Villains of Circumstance," is also great, pulling in some of that drama and desolation that made ... Like Clockwork feel so present and engaged.

Here's the thing: there are just too many moments of dead air. Ronson was either not used enough or used too much. All the danger and friction that made past records resonate seems to be muted down. The greasy guitar tones, junkyard drums and overdriven bass sound just seem contrived here. Ronson makes good on his reputation in certain aspects; Homme sounds as good as he's ever sounded, and when tracks swing, they really swing. But the consistency of greatness just isn't here like you think it should be.

Villains is a step out of the Queens' comfort zone. They seem to have wanted to make a fun, accessible rock album, and for the most part I think they have. It doesn't bite as hard as it used to, but the bark is still there. (John Hubner)





Ninjago offers some laughs and plot and characters so generic that Meowthra, a cutey pie real cat, is the character you'd most like to have as a friend. (IMDB lists no credit name for the actual cat. Unfair!)

I am not a devotee of the auteur theory of filmmaking. I admire the fact that the best filmmaking is a collaborative enterprise, but moviemaking by committee is a different notion. Counting up all the writers, directors, editors and producers, *Ninjago* is moviemaking by committee, and it shows, painfully.

Ninjago will satisfy little kids. It taps into their secret world, away from their parents' intrusions. The film is based on a triumph of capitalism. The Lego company has constructed Ninjago, a world that exists on television. Lego sets that allow kids to build parts of Ninjango at home are available wherever toys are sold. Now comes a movie to further push the desirability of the Lego junior brand.

The movie comes to us as a product of the wonderful world of Disney, so to get the sales pitch off to a really good start, Robin Roberts and Michael Strahan, hosts of ABC's *Good Morning America*, another product of the Disney dynasty, are part of the movie's opening act. Plastic toys voiced by the two actual hosts warn us of the dangers facing the island of Ninjago.

Kids aren't aware of all the corporate collusion. They just want stories and toys. And the story begins with a live action intro. A young boy is being bullied

and takes refuge in a shop that seems to have a bit of everything. This shop is run by a kindly proprietor, played endearingly by Jackie Chan, who schools his young friend in the ways of the ninja.

The "toy" story begins with an alarmed warning from plastic Robin and Michael about the escapades of the evil genius Lord Garmadon who routinely extracts a terrible toll on the inhabitants of Ninjago.

The story shifts to the bullying and neglect Lord Garmadon's son Lloyd suffers at school as a result of his trouble-making father. The bullying Lloyd endures is especially cruel since Garmadon is estranged from the family and can't even be bothered to pronounce Lloyd's name properly.

The voice work of Justin Theroux as Garmadon and Dave Franco as Lloyd is the best chemistry in the picture. Garmadon is a hilariously ineffectual villain and a lousy father. No matter how many times he calls Lloyd L-loyd, I giggle. Except for Meowthra, Theroux's is the voice to hear.

Lloyd is a school kid, but when needed, he and

Box Office Heavies Lift Circle

Tops at the Box: Kick-Ass director Matthew Vaughn's second Kingsman film, The Golden Circle, took the No. 1 spot at a weak U.S. box office last weekend, selling a decent \$39 million over its first three days of release. Looks good. Reviews have been very mixed, mostly negative, but with a cast like the one Circle boasts (Channing Tatum, Halle Berry, Colin Firth, Julianne Moore and Jeff Bridges, to name just a few), it's not surprising that the film took over the U.S. box office. Costing \$104 million to produce and promote, the film is already closing in on being profitable, having sold \$61 million in foreign markets. Not a bad first three days. Look for Vaughn's star power to continue to rise. I see this guy making a Star Wars film at some point. Because everyone will make a Star Wars film at some point. Or at least get fired

Also at the Box: Horror remake/reboot *It* continued to scare, selling another \$30 million at the U.S. box office last weekend, good enough for a No. 2 spot. So far *It*, directed by Andrew Muschietti and starring a cast of future star talent, has sold \$266 million in the U.S. and \$478 million worldwide, making it the top selling R-rated horror film, the highest grossing Stephen King adaptation and the best-selling fall release of all-time. Pretty big deal. I think a lot of factors come into play, but I won't spoil the clown fun with further analysis. Looks like a fun horror film.

The LEGO Ninjago Movie under-performed during its first weekend of release, selling just \$21 million while receiving not-great reviews. Maybe this means that the LEGO film trend is on the way out? Ensemble action flick American Assassin keeps chugging along, selling another \$6.2 million at the weak box office, good enough for the No. 4 spot. So far, Assassin has sold \$26 million in the U.S. and \$6 million abroad. Assassin frontman Michael Keaton

had been on such a roll since *Birdman*; here's hoping this flick doesn't direct him back towards the D-list. Rounding out last weekend's Top 5 was lame rom-com *Home Again* which sold another \$3 million, bringing the flick's total to just over \$20 million. Also of Note: David Gordon Green's new film, *Stronger*, sold almost \$2 million while playing on just 574 screens. This one, which stars Jake Gyllenhaal and Tatiana Maslany, looks really promising. DGG's films tend to be just a little too artsy for the studios to get all the way behind.

New This Week: Doug Liman's new Tom Cruise film, *American Made*, opens this weekend. The guy behind the first Bourne film made a stylish action film with Tom Cruise. It will do well and is, in fact, already selling well overseas, bringing in just under \$60 million last weekend. Looks really entertaining to me.

Also out this week is a totally unnecessary remake of *Flatliners*. The original, shot by Jan de Bont and released in 1990, was, in my opinion, one of the best-looking studio films of that era. It's gorgeous. This new version is good on paper, having been directed by Niels Arden Oplev and starring ScreenTime favorite Diego Luna, Ellen Page and Kiefer Sutherland.

A new Christian film titled A Question of Faith will be released everywhere, as will Chris Stokes' new thriller, Til Death Do Us Part, starring Taye Diggs and Marques Houston. I imagine these last two films are about as interesting as their titles. Boo, lame populist cinema!

Murder is a tightly written play that borrows its theme and style from Shakespeare's *Hamlet*.

In this play, Alex is driven by his obsession to find the truth about Monica's death. This obsession threatens to ruin all of his relationships and his ability to move on with his life. His obsession is much like that of Hamlet, who struggles to find out the truth and ultimately seeks revenge on his father's killer, but not until he has destroyed his relationships and himself. Unlike Hamlet, Alex has friends to help to pull him back before it is too late.

Rehearsal for Murder also borrows from Hamlet, as well as many other plays, the device of a play within a play. Alex is a playwright, after all, and it seems only fitting that he would use all of his talents to capture the killer and bring them to justice. His carefully crafted scenes are presented almost as "flashbacks" to try to shed light on the motives of his suspect. Alex hopes that this will be just the thing to "catch the conscience of the king.

Rehearsal for Murder was originally written as a made for TV movie in 1982. It featured Robert Preston and Lynn Redgrave in leading roles and was directed by David Greene. The script, written by Richard Levinson and William Link, won a 1983 Edgar Award from the Mystery Writers of America. In 1983 it was adapted for the stage by D. D. Brooke and has been a mainstay of the community theater stage.

It has been a great deal of fun to create this show with this dedicated group of artists, and I hope that audiences enjoy our efforts.

his friends turn into Ninjas to fight the various destructions facing their homeland. There isn't much to say about them except one is a girl and one is a robot. Oh, and they fight crime.

First they must capture the Ultimate Weapon. This turns out badly for Lloyd and his buddies, and the weapon is pretty funny. More chaos ensues as the result of the aforementioned Meowthra. But as there must be, there is an Ultimate, Ultimate Weapon that must be captured and con-

While all this is happening, there are many long loud animated battle sequences that aren't very much fun to see or hear. The kids will be entertained (I guess). For grown-ups they are a hot colored cartoon mess.

Ninjago is rife with movie references. Most are thrown out so mindlessly they don't really qualify as "homage" or straight up rip-offs. They exist to remind audiences of things they have seen before and so will be comfortable seeing again. Some are funny, but during the loud pointless nonsense I tended to look away to avoid the cacophony, so the cheeky references had less comic impact than they might have had in a film less worried about keeping the audience distracted.

Also inevitable in the world of *Ninjago* is a reconciliation between father and son. Nothing wrong with that, but here it is pretty clunky. And in a world where the world is vaguely Asian but all the voicing is white. the one group it still seems okay to ridicule is fathers.

Need conflict? How about a clueless, incompetent father? Nothing in Ninjago has any real thought behind it. No real fathers were harmed in the making of the movie or in the effect it will produce.

Ninjago doesn't have enough jokes to keep adults amused. It is blatantly an enabling format for Lego lust among young children, so I wouldn't rush to theaters. This feature-length advertisement will make the rounds in every format, and the money you save buying movie tickets and snacks can be saved for the extra Lego kits the kiddies will want.

I picked this play for purely selfish reasons. I read it several times and was intrigued and puzzled by it, so I put it on the season so I could really dig into the text. To get a play to the stage you generally hear it out loud 50-100 times over the course of the rehearsal period. That's one of the things I love about directing.

For me, this piece is a wonderful exploration of two things: the intersection between miracles and faith, and the fluidity of memory. Let's start with the miracles and faith. Frank, the title character, doesn't know or seem to understand where his power comes

Was it all chance? Or skill? Or illusion? Or delusion? Precisely what power did I possess? Could I summon it? When and how? Was I its servant? Did

it reside in my ability to invest someone with faith in me, or did I evoke from him a healing faith in himself? Could my healing be affected without faith? But faith in what? In me? In the possibility? Faith in faith? And so it went on and on and on. Silly, wasn't it? Considering that

nine times out of 10 nothing at all happened.

How much of a miracle is in the actual occurrence itself, and how much is brought to the event by the participants in the unexplainable phenomena? Are miracles happening all around us, and we are just too thick to notice them? "There are more things in heaven and earth, Horatio, than are dreamt of in your philosophy." (Whoops, *Hamlet* is later in our season.) Or, is every miracle the result of individuals acting in concert to create an outcome that is driven by their participation? I'm like Frank in a way, when he says he is tormented by, "those nagging, tormenting, maddening questions.'

The other fascinating aspect of this play is its examination of memory. The older I get, the more I realize that who I am can be traced back to four or

five life-shaping events. And as I weave them into the narrative of my life, sometimes I am confronted by friends and family who lived through them with me. And sometimes they say, "I don't remember it happening that way."


Aside from Frank, the Faith Healer, two other characters are in this play: Grace his wife (or is she?) and Teddy, his manager (they all seem to agree on that). Each character takes turns telling the audience

the story of their 20 years together, and yet the stories do not always match up. The stories contain inconsistencies, and part of the fun of this play is listening very closely to decide who is telling the truth and which of the three have refashioned events in their memory to fit in with their

view of "the truth about their lives."

This is a fascinating play by one of the greatest Irish playwright from the late 20th century, and it features tour de force performances by Austin Berger as the Faith Healer, Daniel Bulau as his manager Teddy and Nancy Kartholl as his wife Grace. Costumes are by Jeanette Walsh, stage management by Bill Lane, technical direction by Rae Surface and the direction, as well as set, sound and light designs are by Thom


