# Choreography of a Culture

Growing up in Kansas, Gregory Hancock was fascinated by dance and the arts. He liked the visual and emotional inspiration he felt when watching it. But thanks to par-

ents who liked to travel – and took him with them when they did – he also saw a larger picture, a more encompassing context that ultimately inspired his work with the Gregory Hancock Dance Theatre which he founded 20 years ago this season.

"I love to travel, and I was lucky because when I was young my parents exposed me to a lot of travel and therefore a lot of different cultures," he says. "And I like to bring that cultural diversity to dance. I love to experience the social, spiritual, historical and cultural aspects of the places I visit. World music also intrigues me a lot. There's a whole world of music out there that inspires me a lot. Getting out into the world and seeing it and hearing it in a non-didactic way, apart from our judgments and opinions.

Although drawn in by dance, he came to realize he preferred creating dance more than performing, so he opted to focus more on chore-

ography, bringing those international and intercultural lessons into his work.

Through his company, Indianapolis Dance Theatre, Hancock brought a variety of musical and cultural influences into

his productions. Later, when he formed the Gregory Hancock Dance Theatre, he took those approaches still further.

The Gregory Hancock Dance Theatre comes to Fort Wayne after an invitation from Shruti, a group whose mission is "to promote Indian culture and values by providing social, educational, cultural, recreational and community programs." It's a mission which definitely speaks to Hancock, who has spent a significant amount of time in India in recent years.

"I travel to India to teach and love In-

dian culture. There is such a rich history of culture and dance there."

Although Americans often think of other countries having a somewhat monolithic culture, Hancock says nothing could be further from the truth in India.

> "It's a very diverse country, and there's a tremendous history of art in that country. I just have a love affair with India."

> Hancock visits India a couple times a year, staying for five to six weeks at a time. He goes as a teacher and tries to absorb as much of the culture as he can during his stays. The feeling is mutual.

"The people in India are hungry for what we can offer them. They are really wanting to learn from us. But there is so much they have to offer and so many diverse cultures. There are many languages and religions, different kinds of attire and art, and those things are unique to each region of the country."

Although he mostly teaches in Mumbai, he tries to explore a new region each time he visits. It's that culmination of knowledge and experience he puts into the choreography

which Shruti will host at the Auer Performance Hall at IPFW on October 14. With A Night in India, Hancock captures the country he loves in a unique way.

"I had received a grant about eight years ago and visited India to learn more about Indian music and themes. I started researching more and learning more and developed a good connection, which is why I keep going back. I was really embraced by the community, and what I'm doing with A Night in India is authentic and respectful but still a fusion of Indian culture and dance with a more American form."

Bringing together themes and contexts – historical, cultural, social, political, artistic – is what Hancock seems to enjoy the most and succeed at most. The company recently opened its 20th anniversary season with the aptly titled *Celebration!*, a program that included some very diverse pieces which reflect the kind of work Hancock has been doing

that Hancock has been doing for the past 30 years.

"We had 'Bolero,' which was flamenco-inspired, and 'Crop Circles,' which was a more abstract piece. Then we had '1968,' which was about the Prague spring which has some political overtones and that brief period of renewed artistic freedom. There was also a piece which addressed some challenges that I had faced in

the last three years. I dealt with cancer and had some death in my family. It was a time of grief and loss. I'm working on a big variety of things all the time."

A partial list of the 120 pieces he has created for the Gregory Hancock Dance Theatre demonstrates how much his love of travel and diverse cultural experience has informed his work: "The River's Edge," "Stigmata," "1941," "Out of Darkness," "1968," "Dracula," "The Rapture," "Joan of Arc,"

# 'Blue Collar Comedy' on the Rocks

You might think it would be difficult to keep a shtick alive and funny for 30 years, but Ron White will have you thinking again. The Texas-born comedian is rarely seen on stage without his trademark cigar and glass of scotch, and his style of blending confession with raunchy stories about everything from public intoxication to popping a few Viagra before going through airport security (and demanding a pat down) has been earning him fans since he first picked up a mic in the late 80s.

White, who will be at the Embassy Theater Friday, October 13, bounced around a bit before he began pursuing his dream of standup in earnest. He worked as a window salesman in Arlington. He owned a pottery studio in Mexico. He served in the U.S. Navy at the end of the Vietnam War. He always knew he was funny, though, and so he began performing in clubs in the Lone Star State, working and reworking the routine that eventually got him the attention of Jeff Foxworthy who recruited him for the Blue Collar Comedy Tour in the winter of 2000.

For the next three years, White joined Foxworthy, Bill Engvall and Larry the Cable Guy in a sort of rednecks-onthe-road revue. With his penchant for donning black and wearing his gray hair in a leonine sweep, White took on the role of the tour's sophisticate, the sarcastic and brainy foil to the unabashedly lowbrow Larry the Cable Guy, whose jokes often involved back hair and other equally icky subjects. The tour was an indisputable success, selling out more than 90 cities and earning White and his mates \$15 million, as was the movie and the television show, *Blue Collar TV*.

It was really just the beginning for White, who followed up the Blue Collar Comedy Tour with the release of his debut solo comedy album, Drunk in Public. That same year, he performed his first one-hour comedy special on Comedy Central. They Call Me Tater Salad was the highest rated Sunday night comedy show in the station's history, and the album of the same name has gone multi-Platinum.

Not too shabby for a window salesman from Texas.

One of the secrets to White's appeal is his cynical take on stupidity. In the Ron White universe, humans are forever do-

ing and saying and falling victim to their own idiocy, and he is more than happy to point that out. In fact, he titled his second solo album You Can't Fix Stupid, guaranteeing him a lifetime's worth of material.

Thanks in part to the 2002 Seinfeld documentary, Comedian, fans of funny men and women were finally given a glimpse into the backstage blood, sweat and tears that go into a winning bit, not to

mention the anxiety and time and sacrifice. White told Guy MacPherson of the Comedy Couch that comedy is a process - jokes must be incubated and perfected, tried out, used if ef-

fective and discarded if not - and that standup is not nearly as easy as it looks.

"But it's also so gratifying, it doesn't matter how hard it is. At the end of

the night, if I'm doing two shows and I'm still on stage at midnight and I've been drinking for a few hours and I come off stage, I've given everything I've got, even though I don't

move around a lot. I come off stage and I'm beat, you know? I'm drained. And I gotta get back on the bus and travel to the next city. It's an easy job compared to hanging drywall or whatever else you might do, but it's still no cakewalk.'

He said in that same interview that he rarely takes a vacation day. Time away from touring is time best spent trying out new material.

'If I have a day off and I'm in a city that has a comedy club, I'm on the stage, and at open mic night here in Atlanta," he said. "I let 'em use my name to support it. I mean, we only do it a couple times a month because I gotta be in town [to be able to do it]. But it's always packed, and all the money that we make at the door goes to the other comedians that I invite to be in that show because I don't need it. So the other comedians that live in Atlanta love me because I give 'em a great place to work out twice a month with a big full crowd. And the crowd's not just waiting to hear me. And everybody understands that we're there to work on new stuff so don't go up there and bury me with your best 15 minutes that you've ever written while I'm trying to work out a new toothache bit. Everybody kinda gets it. It's a great room

Given White's three-decades-long career, it will come as no surprise to many that he is a renaissance man. When he's not on stage, he's doing what he can to raise money for and awareness of issues facing veterans of the U.S. wars in Afghanistan and Iraq, and, in 2016, disgusted with the field of candidates running for the Republican nomination for president, he launched his own campaign for the highest office in the land. He did not triumph, obviously, but he has found ample compensation in comedy and in the world of high-end liquor production. Fans eager to support all things Ron White can now head to their local liquor store to purchase Number Juan, his own brand of tequila.

Weird, some might think, that a man who's made a career of swilling scotch on stage should pour his energies into tequila, but you might think again when you recall that he spent a few years in Mexico in his youth.

White told the Atlanta Journal-Constitution that his Number Juan tequila is far from blue collar.

"This is not the stuff you puke through your nose when you were 18," White said. "We let our plants grow eight years before we harvest them. Then they sit in a bourbon barrel for three, four years. It's clean. You don't get much of a hangover unless you're really stupid."

# Going Back to Old School

Joe Nichols said he's been counted out plenty of times in the country music business, but he always seems to have another comeback in him.

This has conditioned him to roll with the lulls.

Nichols performs October 13 at the Honeywell Center.

Earlier this year Nichols released a studiously traditional record called *Never Gets Old*. It sounds like something Randy Travis might have recorded in his prime.

Here's why that was an edgy thing to do: Despite trend pieces to the contrary, the so-called bro country

subgenre – songs sung (and partly rapped) by white guys about back roads, dirt roads, cheap beer, moonlight, tailgates and women dressed like "Hee Haw Honeys" – is far from dead.

The nonsensically simplistic lyrics have an almost nursery rhyme quality that is calculated to drill songs into skulls.

This is the business climate in which Nichols is trying to survive.

When asked about his return this year to a more traditional sound, Nichols doesn't sound defiant.

He doesn't thumb his nose at anything or anyone.

He said a musician who wants to thrive would be foolish not to pay close attention to whatever is popular at any given moment.

"It's like the stock market," he said. "No one is going to question you when you invest in Netflix instead of Blockbuster."

Nichols said he went old school after recent attempts to tap that still-rich bro country vein weren't as successful as he'd hoped.

He consulted the people that he trusts the most, and they all recommended that he take a break from chasing trends.

Songwriters aren't to blame for the homogeneity of the songs on the charts at any given moment, Nichols said. Executives are.

"It's corporate guys who want to turn \$1 into \$1.25," he said.

Nichols said the corporate plan is working very well, which is why songwriters who want to write out of feeling rather than obligation have to work extra hard.

Social media has helped immensely, he said.

"A person can put out something independently and it can catch on fire," he said.

Things were different when Nichols moved to Nashville from Rogers, Arkansas in his late teens. The music industry as it had been known for more than a century had not yet collapsed by the mid 1990s, so getting signed to a label was the only way for an artist to excel.

Nichols said he was "scared to death" in Nashville

"I only knew one person there," he said. "I crashed at his house for the first couple of weeks until I found

a little, bitty, terrible apartment.

"It was intimidating, to say the least," Nichols said. "That was 1997. The city was big; the music industry was daunting. It was full of people who were celebrities behind the curtain. The guys who pulled the strings. I was like, 'How am I going to put myself in front of these guys?""

Nichols had a couple of promising early encounters with labels small and big, but they went nowhere. He ended up having to take on a succession of odd jobs, including selling steaks door to door out of a freezer truck.

It may be that a man who can successfully sell meat door to door out of a freezer truck can sell any-

thing to anybody, but Nichols was not that man.

He was fired after the first day.

When Nichols finally found success with the 2002 release of *Man with a Memory*, it wasn't his salesmanship that people were responding to. It was his earnestness.

Nichols also had to wrestle with an unintended but common consequence of the pressures of mainstream success: a substance abuse problem.

"After 2004 or 2005. I don't know if I thought I was bigger than I was or if I started hanging around with the wrong crowd," he said. "I started getting sideways with everything. Not showing up for meetings. Doing

things I shouldn't have been doing. I just kind of felt like everything was out of control."

Nichols said the death of his dad, a sometimes abusive, long haul trucker with whom he

had a complicated relationship, accelerated the downward slide.

This all came to a head after Nichols had reunited with his high school sweetheart, Heather Singleton, and the thought of losing her gave him the resolve he needed to kick his habits.

"It was clear that there was only room for one of them, my party life or Heather," he said. "So I had to change it and think about Heather."

Ironically, one of Nichols' biggest eventual hits was "Tequila Makes Her Clothes Fall Off," a song written from the perspective of a rueful yet amused husband.

It's not a party anthem, but it doesn't exactly condemn the drinking of mezcal either.

Nichols said the original version of the song, by Gary Hannan and John Wiggins, was sort of slow and sad, so he punched it up (the country music equivalent of investing in Netflix, maybe).

The reason mainstream country adopted rock, pop and soul to the extent it has is because it was "always the red-headed stepchild of the music business," Nichols said

We have come a long way from the days when Garth Brooks was condemned by some country music

One of the great challenges for not-forprofit organizations is finding interesting and creative ways to raise money and interest. Fundraising and friend-raising. No matter what it's called, it is an ongoing need for arts groups who look to stage professional productions while often operating on slim budgets. Grants from various foundations help, but no organization can make it without support from the community.

The Civic Theatre – enjoying its 90th anniversary season and fresh off its magnificent staging of Jekyll & Hyde - has found a fun and appealing way to hold an annual fundraiser which not only brings in audi-

ences but also delightfully engages local "celebrities" for an evening of entertainment and frivolity. Now in its eighth season, Celebrities Act Up has become a welcome change of pace for the theater company, one spearheaded by executive and artistic director Phillip Colglazier.

"The first year I wrote a script, and we featured Julia Barr who was from Fort Wayne and starred on All My Children," says Colglazier. "It also fea-

tured Jane Lanier who is very popular here and some CEOs from local businesses. But the second year we started doing something thematic each year under [the title] Celebrities Act Up with a script that had a

theme and plugs for local businesses woven into the story.

Those plugs – the number, how often – are paid for by the companies, a pretty slick way to bring in funds while supporting those who support the Civic. Corporate buy-in provides a means for fundraising and bringing in people from those companies and organizations to get a taste of what life for Civic actors is like.

"The main thing is to have fun while we're supporting the organization," he says. "It's a fun and creative way to fundraise as well as highlight the businesses and causes that support us. But it's also a way for our community leaders to experience the process that our actors have when we're staging a production. When they perform, they have the script in front of them, but they experience the rehearsals and the butterflies that come before a performance. They get to hear the laughter and applause but also experience the nervousness while learning about our organization and meeting our donors. It's become a broad development tool."

As with any organization, the Civic also

has a board of directors, and Celebrities Act Up has become a vital recruiting tool by introducing community leaders to what the Civic does. Among the cast will be a few of those former board presidents and members who continue to support the Civic's mis-

But while Celebrities Act Up addresses a serious need, the evening is really about having a good time. Colglazier once again is writing the script which will delight those in attendance. He's covered some pretty fertile ground in the past.

'Over the years the themes have included superhero adventures with Keith Busse [chairman and CEO of Steel Dynamics] playing Superman, the Man of Steel.

That also featured Jessica Henry from the ASPCA. We had a clueless adventure, "Fractured Fairy Tales." This year I came up with a different approach, "TV Land Live," which is going to be set on Gilligan's Island with characters from other sitcoms – All in the Family, The Jeffersons and The Golden Girls - joining the character's from Gilligan's Island. It's going to be like one big Carol Burnett skit."


> Not all of the hilarity is written into Colglazier's script. Much of the fun comes when non-actors try their hand at something outside their comfort zones. In other words, mistakes are not only welcome,

they're preferred. At the time of this interview, Colglazier was still working on the script which reveals one of his creative challenges: working on the script as donors are being tallied and working those paid plugs into the show. But that uncertainty seems to be one of the happy challenges for him.

"I've never known in all eight years how the script is going to come out," he admits. "I come up with the general concept, try to get it cast and incorporate what their business or cause is. I do try to think outside the box. Who would be good in certain roles? What is their tie to the story? There are a list of aspects that have to go into the story as well as the paid mentions."

Among those in the cast this year is actor/director Becky Niccum as the Golden Girl Sophia, while both Kris Snepp and Avery Dennison tackle the role of Sophia's daughter Dorothy (played by Bea Arthur on the original series). Tom Powell from Fort Wayne's NBC is typecast as the Announcer. While the show is not fully costumed, Col-

"The Trojan Women," "The Birth of the Gods," "Lagaan," "Hooray for Tollywood," "The Hunchback of Notre Dame," "SU-PERHERO; the story of a man called Jesus" and "Pinocchio." It's an international perspective in tandem with a unique American voice, a good description of his full body of work and of his *A Night of India* which will be performed in Fort Wayne. He hopes and plans to continue broadening that scope in the years to come.

"I was to be always changing, always evolving. I love to listen to new music, and I love to listen to all kinds of music – Polish gypsy music to Irish music to Indonesian music. I want to bring all kinds of cultures to the work."

fans for making too many concessions to the pop charts in his music.

"In the old days, you were taking a big risk if you put out a record that was perceived as an attempt to cross over," Nichols said. "Nowadays the biggest risk is putting out something that is traditional."

A guy who wants to make traditional music has to ask himself a hard question about how those songs will sound when played before and after what is currently popular, he said.

"That's neither good or bad," Nichols said. "It just is."

Sometimes an "investment in Blockbuster" turns into a blockbuster.

But a guy has to be careful.

The show itself, which takes place on the Arts United Center stage, is just one piece of the evening's itinerary. Appetizers will be served in the front lobby while silent auction items will fill the hallways. A live auction will also take place in the auditorium, and while the show is taking place on the stage, the busy Civic staff and volunteers will be tallying the winners and organizing the items for winners to take home with them. There will also be a bar with wine, beer and specialty drinks. But that's not the end of it. After all of those activities are done, DeBrand will have a special dessert bar open for those who have just enough room left for some fine chocolate.

This is the Civic Theatre's one fundraiser for the year, and it comes early in what is a very busy 90th anniversary celebration. With White Christmas just around the corner (November 4-19) and their efforts to raise money for their 100th anniversary endowment underway, the Civic is busy not only securing its present but ensuring its future. #### Addison Agen New Places

Youth can afford a level of optimism that sometimes age and experience sadly don't allow. There's an abandon and sheer will that accompanies us when we're younger. It pushes us to succeed. Succeed at what? Sports, academics and the arts come to mind. Within those realms, being young



and open-hearted to new possibilities allows a level of "try" that is hard to come by once you've got a mortgage and bank payment book. When you're young and talented, with the right support group, possibilities are endless.

Addison Agen is still in high school, yet she's already released her debut album on Neat Neat Neat Records. It's called *New Places*, and it would be a fantastic debut for musicians in their 20s who've spent a few years carving out a name for themselves. For a young woman still balancing history papers, awkward high school hallway politics and the eco-system known as the high school cafeteria, it's an astounding achievement.

Agen possesses both an incredible knack for pop hook songwriting and a voice that seems to carry years of life she has yet to live. Album opener "Start Over" is a bouncy, upbeat track that has a heavy vibe lyrically, like someone who's gone through the rough stuff asking for a chance to do it again. Heavy sentiment for such a young

"All They Really Need" glides along a Hammond organ and Agen's dark, soulful vocals. "But all they really need is a little help from God," Agen sings with beautifully built harmonies and a heavy-hearted vibe.

"Look" is an emotional fireball of a track. It's a song that you could easily hear on the radio or as the credits roll at the end of some film at the Carmike. What gets me about this song is the subtlety and sparse instrumentation. You're left to concentrate on the emotion conveyed in the vocals.

A secret weapon here is Jason Davis of Off The Cuff Sound. His production and studio add a depth and age to Agen's songs that might otherwise had been lost in another studio scenario. Instead of adding some kind of shiny radio-ready sheen, he allows these songs to live and breathe. They grow organically from the heart and soul Agen brings to the tunes.

From "Both Of Us," "On Your Own" and "Play It By Ear" to "Show Me A New Way" and album closer "Sugarcoat," Agen brings a depth and soulful confidence to her songs. There's a maturity here that, at least in my experience, seems remarkably uncommon coming from someone barely old enough to drive. If this is what she's doing now, I can't imagine what she'll be writing once she's got a couple years past 18 under her belt. (John Hubner)

#### The War on Drugs A Deeper Understanding

I don't think a songwriter has excited me more about the future of music in the last few years than The War on Drugs' Adam Granduciel. It's ironic, too, given that his music feels more like looking back into the past than forward into some unknown future. I guess I've been known to wallow in nostalgia from time to time, so this really shouldn't be surprising.



The thing with The War on Drugs is that Granduciel takes pop radio elements from the 80s and churns them into something new. Yes, there's some Tom Petty and Bruce Springsteen and Dire Straits and some Bob Dylan and even some Grateful Dead living and breathing within albums like *Slave Ambient*, *Lost in the Dream* and even his newest record, *A Deeper Understanding*.

A Deeper Understanding is The War on Drugs' debut for Atlantic Records, but that doesn't change a thing. This album is as lush and dense as its predecessor, and its just as earnest and open-hearted, too. Granduciel and friends have made yet another masterpiece.

"Up All Night" is the opening salvo, and it's a glorious one at that. There's an air of fragility in Granduciel's Dylan-esque voice as piano, synth and percussion accompany him. Pretty soon, 80s syn-

### Raging Slab Raging Slab (1989)

Raging Slab formed in the early 1980s in New York City with guitarist Greg Strzempka and a few of his friends emulating their contemporaries' Southern hard-rock. Dubbed "Skynyrd meets Metallica" by Guitar Magazine, this was their first release



on a major label (RCA). Though a little rough around the edges, it fit 1989 very well.

It opens with "Don't Dog Me," a heavy rocker that took hair bands to a different level. These guys were bluesier, like a Foghat, and even appeared on MTV's *Headbanger's Ball*.

"Joy Ride" has a Sammy Hagar vibe from the 80s, and "Sorry's All I Got" brings to mind Whitesnake from the same decade. "Get Off My Jollies" is more metal than Southern blues (think Jackyl). "Shiny Mama" continues the hard rock and is heavy on twin lead guitars in front of substantial harmonies and crashing percussion. "Geronimo" showcases the bottleneck guitar (from Elyse Steinman) and blends blues with Southern rock. It's one of those ballads with obligatory lyrics about the state of society, but it really is pretty good rock n' roll song – and that chick played a mean guitar. "Bent for Silver" has a harder rock pace and again could have been Montrose, or UFO, but still has a hint of Southern boogie to it. "Dig a Hole" comes at you like a runaway train and is one of the best three minutes on a record that I feel is above average-and comfortably consistent.

The album closes with the bluesy hard rocker "San Loco" and proves that bands from New York didn't have to go through CBGB's to be understood or respected.

Strzempka still fronts the band, but sadly, Steinman lost her battle with cancer at the age of 56. (*Dennis Donahue*)

sonic-style drums come in to give the song a stadium fist-pumping bravado. If 80s Springsteen collaborated with Dream Academy, I think they would probably sound like this. This band perfectly melds Top 40 panache with early 80s alternative that would satisfy both the inner Goth and mainstream kid in all of us.

"Pain" is one of those songs that rolls over you on first listen. Nothing necessarily sticks, really, but after each listen the small details make themselves known; subtle acoustic guitar, layered melodies, and Mr. Granduciel's delicate vocal structures all come together over time to reveal a master stroke of songwriting. "Holding On" has the drive and forward motion of *Lost in the Dream*'s "Red Eyes". It's a song that pushes you along, like that friend that tells you, "You're not getting out of this this time!" as he inches you towards the haunted house entrance. It's a glorious track that will never cease putting a smile on my face.

The middle section has a more existential heft to it, with "Strangest Thing" bringing the album into a melancholy haze. Granduciel's use of electric piano on this album really puts the record in a contemplative head space. It's not sad or maudlin, just a bit longing. "Strangest Thing" captures sunset contemplation quite perfectly. "Knocked Down" pushes the idea of not wanting to get too close to someone for fear of being rejected. "I wanna love you but I get knocked down," Granduciel sings over 60s-style electric piano and an almost Steely Dan-tight rhythm section and phaser-infused electric guitar. "Thinking Of A Place," released as a single back in April and as a 12" on Record Store Day, is a glimpse into the headspace of The War on Drugs. At over 11 minutes, it's the longest track and it makes its way through a breezy vibe. It feels much like Granduciel's hazy Polaroid photos. It's inviting, yet feels like a place you'll never quite reach.

"In Chains" drives along on a rolling piano line and chugging drums. It's like Simple Minds and The Hooters recorded together some drunken night in 1985. "Clean Living" is just an unabashed piano ballad. It's simple and lovely. "You Don't Have To Go" closes the album out beautifully. The band sounds their most Dylan-esque here, which isn't a bad thing.

A move to a major record label hasn't seemed to affect The War on Drugs one bit. In fact, I think its emboldened them to make the most of the opportunities it's allowed them. A Deeper Understanding is an album that lays it all on the line and the results are a lush, beautiful record that feels timeless. (John Hubner)





When you read about the life of a career bluesman, you're usually treated to said bluesman's pedigree. Who he played with when he was cutting his



teeth, in other words. Pedigrees are rarely as impressive as that of Coco Montoya, who got his start as drummer for Albert Collins and singer and guitarist for John Mayall's Bluesbreakers.

In 1993, Montoya, a native of Santa Monica, California, went solo and put out his debut album, *Gotta Mind to Travel*, two years later. Eight records followed, including his most recent release, this year's *Hard Truth*.

Montoya has had a successful solo career, but he gives much of the credit for that to Collins, who took him under his wing and taught him the guitar. Collins also schooled the young Montoya on keeping perspective and his temper when what he wanted to do was fight. He told Shawn Hammond of Guitar Player that his songs often find the positive in the negative, thanks to Collins.

"I guess that also goes back to working with Albert in the early 70s and watching him deal with things that were really cruel— you know, being a black man trying to make it in that era. He took me places where it was painful to watch how he was treated. I was a young man, and a lot of times I'd be to the point of tears. I loved this man so much that if anybody said anything negative about him or to him, I was young and stupid and ready to try and shut them

up. He would grab my collar and say, 'It's not all about being a bad ass. You've got to know when and where to pick your fights."

And a little bit of trivia for you: Montonya is left-handed, but plays a guitar with a right-handed neck.

Montoya will take the C2G Music Hall stage Friday, October 13 at 8 p.m.





## Liman, Cruise Deliver in *Made*

American Made is a movie that sneaks up on you, in the best way a movie can. It starts out with a bored fly boy looking for risks and thrills and ends with a real example of "the wages of sin is death." Tom Cruise, taking on a role tailor made for him, shines and reminds us of his best movie star qualities.

Director Doug Liman describes American Made as "a fun lie based on a true story." He delivers on this description. American Made is funny, often very funny, at least at first. The screenplay by Gary Spinelli shifts from adventure and humor to the genuine cynicism and ugliness of the behavior of the United States, foreign and domestic, from the mid 70s until the mid

With the bribe of the fastest two engine plane on the planet, Barry signs up to cruise central America taking pictures of rebel encampments. Cruise is again a top gun, and his success for our government piques the curiosity of some South American capitalists.

Drug dealers are just as adept at recognizing talent as any greedy American opportunist. When money comes calling in the form of cocaine drops in Lousiana, Barry is not only in, he is an innovator on how to make the trafficking efficient and safe.

At home, Barry loves his wife Lucy (a pitchperfect Sarah Wright Olsen), but he needs money. His family is growing. He wants to be rich. He likes that his nefarious counterparts in Central America seem much more interested in money than in guns.

Tops at the Box: With the fall season settling in and no strong releases this past weekend, It returned to the No. 1 spot at the U.S. box office, selling another \$17.3 million, upping the flick's four-weekend total to just under \$300 million in domestic sales. With \$553 million now in worldwide sales, the It sequel is now easily one of the most anticipated current films. Here's hoping Cary Fukunaga works on the script again. That's why it was good. Also at the Box: Doug Liman's new Tom Cruise action flick, American Made, took the No. 2 spot at the box, selling a disappointing \$17.016 million over its first three days of release. Somewhere Cruise is mad. Somewhere Cruise is wondering if maybe everyone else on earth is right in their belief that Tom can't just do action films. Every now and again he needs to really, really act. Like he used to. So that we can connect to him and root for him again. ## Navigating Urban Landscapes

Dark Cities, edited by Christopher Golden, Titan Books, 2017

In the introduction to the Dark Cities anthology of horror stories, editor Christopher Golden confesses to being more afraid of urban landscapes than of rural ones. True, he says, there's something scary about the lonely forest, because it's inhabited by "wolves or mountain lions that must be following your every step," but it's the lonely streets and alleys of cities that really terrify him. In the wee hours of the city's morning, "everyone with good intentions is either fast asleep or working the third shift." The distinction here, which Golden leaves mostly unspoken, is that rural horror is based in a fear of nature, and urban horror is based in a fear of humanity. It's a distinction sidestepped even by many of the stories in Dark

Cities, an uneven but definitely creepy

The book's opening story, Scott Smith's "The Dogs," gets right to the heart the menace of the city. In it, a young woman from a New Jersey town ventures into New York City where she uses Craigslist to pursue excitement by working as a pseudo-escort. She finds herself in a horrific situation, though, when she encounters a pack of threatening talking dogs who use their wiles and their savagery to bend her to their will. It's a disturbing (and often distasteful) metaphor for the city as an alien place that spells doom for the naive small-towners who venture into it.

Tim Lebbon's "In Stone" is even more literal. Here, the city is a mysterious entity in its own right, an invisible creature whose buildings, dark spaces, pavement and metal are part of its ravenous body. Those who are not able to cope with living within this dangerous beast are devoured, destined to be consumed with barely a trace left behind.

Sometimes the city is just a particularly suitable backdrop. M.R. Carey's "We'll Always Have Paris" is a neo-noir set in an every-city during a post-postapocalyptic period after mankind has successfully



fended off a zombie outbreak. Now a different killer is on the loose, dispatching its victims in an especially gruesome manner and reminding the detectives on the case of the time when the dead walked the streets.

With all the emphasis on metaphor and the idea that the city is some kind of deadly menace all by itself, not many of the stories focus on the reality of the urban world: a city is just a place where lots of peo-

ple live close together, and people are the real monsters. Sometimes, however, the stories' humanity is the real horror. Golden's own contribution to the collection, "The Revelers," is a tale of a debauched and ultimately disastrous night out with friends; the city changes people, Golden says, but in the end it's the people that are the scary part of the city.

> Amber Benson says it even more succinctly in "What I've Always Done," a brief story about a man who, no matter what good things cross his path, will always return to violence. "There's only so much suffering you can endure before you break,'

he says in the story's very first sentence, with the implication that the city will always deliver more than enough suffering to break you.

Golden says he understands the real wolves that inspire fear in the natural landscape, but he sees wolves in the city, too, "even if those wolves are only shadows." But even as he contemplates the nature of the city's shadows, he acknowledges that the shadows the book's authors explore can be "in the lonely corners of an uncaring city or inside their own hearts." Cities can be scary, but in the end, the city is only what we make of it.

counts and so much money laundering, local people had to know. But to them the prosperity is so seductive their verdict is that "he's good people."

Known as the "crazy gringo who always delivers," the stakes and profit for Barry keep growing. He is a real American cowboy, an outlaw. He protects his family. He games the system. But it becomes clear he knows he is a dead man walking. American Made is punctuated, narrated from tapes Barry filmed of himself when he knew he was going to die.

He is doomed to die, and die horribly, but like our favorite American criminals, we root for him.

By the time he is murdered, adrenaline-infused action has been turned in to nauseous shame.

Is there anything more immoral than giving weap-

ons to both sides of a war? That is what we did. The war on drugs begets the treason of Iran Contra. When Schafer pops up in bed with the brilliant idea of selling arms to Iran to continue to fund the illegal support of "rebels" in Central America, it is scary how real the scene feels. Real, immoral, deadly, ineffectual and stupid. I hope damnation awaits anyone who helped with Iran Contra, pretending that fighting legally elected Communists is a justification for supplying both sides of the war between Iraq and Iran.

But don't let any of that get in the way of enjoying American Made. Full of the cowboy impulses of our nation, the movie is fun and telling.



## **Creation: Now & Then**

18th century author Mary Shelley described dreams being more fantastic and agreeable than her writing. She managed, however, work those dreams into a book that has stood the test of time, engaging the reader

in a fantasy that has fostered more movies, poems, songs and subsequent writings than can be easily counted.

Her book, Frankenstein, looks at the act of creation and examines the creator's responsibility to what he has created. With such rich and complex subject matter, Frankenstein became the skeletal building block around which IPFW Associate Professor Jeff Casazza wanted to "create" a performance piece. Frankenstein: An Act of Creation opens at Williams Theatre on Friday, Oct. 6. The 90-minute performance runs through Oct. 14.

Several key components need to come together to create a devised theater piece, and, thankfully, those avenues of creativity flourish at IPFW in the Department of Theatre. The recipe consists of a theme that can be expressed from multiple viewpoints; a director who has worked on other devised theater pieces in their career; trained student actors who have experience writing and creating in an improvisational format; and a group of flexible faculty designers who can design lights, sounds, costumes and set pieces as the performance takes shape during the rehearsal process.

Creation stories are part of every culture and religion, but what

## **Actors Acting at Acting**

Based on the 1982 TV movie, Arena Dinner theatre's Rehearsal for Murder is a funny, entertaining murder mystery.

A year after his fiancé's apparent suicide on opening night of their failed play, playwright Alex Dennison assembles the cast and producer together for a play reading. It soon becomes clear that the script he has written is designed to incriminate

one of them as his fiancé's murderer - a la Hamlet. It's difficult to write a synopsis of a mystery like this without giving

too much away. But there's something inordinately fun about watching a stage full of actors acting like actors acting. As the plot unravels, the layers are peeled away and the mystery is revealed. And it may or may not be who you thought dunnit.

Each of the characters is written broadly and performed in true 1980s TV schlock-style. Duke Roth as arrogant leading man David Matthews and Sean Arata as boneheaded comedic actor Leo Gibbs generate the show's biggest laughs. Kathy Pelter is very natural onstage as Broadway producer Bella Lamb, and theater newcomer Erin Smith brings a sly, subtle naivety to the role of Sally Bean, Alex's secretary.

Joel Grillo and Gloria Minnich are polished and comfortable in their roles as the playwright and Monica Welles, the movie star-turned-Broadway-star. Under Reuben Albaugh's expert direction, their portrayals are down to earth, providing a nice counterbalance to the more over-the-top supporting cast (including Sloan Amburgey-Thomas, Tyler Hanford, Rich Heiser, Tim Miles, Elliott Mitchell, and Jennifer Rothenbush.

The costumes, designed by Teresa Dodson, are also evocative of the 80s and at times even get laughs. The lighting design by Brock Eastom helps create the feel of movie-of-the-week special effect transitions between reality and the memory of the late actress as she fades into and out of the scenes the others are re-enacting.

other avenues of creation exist in our world? That is exactly what this troupe of actors set out to explore. In reality, humans are creating things every day – from a child being created by two individuals, to writers creating novels, to paintings created by artists, to an exquisite meal created by a chef. When Victor Frankenstein creates his Creature, it is not much different from what is happening today with cloning, gene splicing, in vitro fertilization or defibrillators that use electricity to bring an inanimate body back to life.

Devised pieces work to ask questions that are essential to the investigation on stage. For example, what is the responsibility of the creator to the created? Is there any responsibility at all? Or with that great power is there also great responsibility?

And what about the reverse? Does the created have any responsibility to its creator, whatever that might be? The investigations of, rather than the answers to these questions have become the production *Frankenstein:* An Act of Creation.

Urban centers tend to foster theater of this type on a regular basis, so it is with great enthusiasm that the students and designers of the IPFW Department of Theatre open their 2017-18 season with *Frankenstein: An Act of Creation*, one of the most unique offerings of the theatrical season in Fort Wayne.
