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Musicians Paying it Forward

What does the music of Led Zeppelin have to do with a seventh grader's dream of being the next Miles Davis or Yo Yo Ma? A lot, thanks to an idea hatched by three local music institutions aimed at helping Fort Wayne Community Schools Foundation supply middle school students with instru-

Sweetwater, Wooden Nickel and 96.3

XKE are promoting Covers for a Cause '17 to help the foundation raise money for its "b instrumental" fundraising drive.

Put simply, the Foundation wants every student in the district to have access to a music instrument from seventh grade through graduation. That's a lot of trumpets, cellos and clarinets. That's also a lot of money.

The foundation, a non-profit entity separate from Fort Wayne Community Schools, hopes to raise \$3 million to buy 50 instruments for each of the district's 11 middle schools annually for

the next six years. Chuck and Lisa Surack of Sweetwater chipped in \$500,000 them-

The funds will not only be used to buy and maintain the instruments, they will help support the cost of instruction.

So where does Led Zeppelin fit in? The full title of the Sweetwater/Wooden Nickel/96.3 XKE project is Covers for a Cause '17: A Tribute to Led Zeppelin, and it brings eight local bands together on a double LP of eight Zeppelin covers.

Recorded at Sweetwater and produced by Mark Hornsby, the record includes Unlikely Alibi ("Fool in the Rain"), Moser Woods with Marnée on vocals ("No Quarter"), Kat Bowser ("Since I've Been Loving You"), Nick D'Virgilio ("Moby Dick"), Carolyn Martin ("Gallows Pole"), Brian Lemert ("All My Love"), The Fierce Invalids ("The Lemon Song") and APQ Harmonic featuring Sunny Taylor ("Kashmir").

All of the bands on Covers for a Cause '17 will gather at 2 p.m. on Saturday, October 14 at Sweetwater Pavilion to play the entire album plus an extra Zep cover from each band. The concert also serves as an album release party. The album cost is \$20, but those who pay the \$5 entry for the concert can buy the record for \$15. And all proceeds from the concert and the record sales will go directly to "b instrumental." Everyone involved donated their time and talent.

The album is an offshoot of the Battle

of the Bands collaborations that began in the late 1990s and continued until last year. According to Sweetwater's Thad Tegtmeyer, the most recent Battle of the Bands sponsors got together to find a more lasting project.

"Battle of the Bands is great. It has a great energy around it, but once it's done it's done," Tegtmeyer said. "It doesn't really live

Bob Roets of Wooden Nickel and XKE's Doc West and J.J. Fabini joined Hornsby and wanted an old Chess-style recording. They wanted to do 'Lemon Song' live in the studio and raw, and that's exactly what it is. Moser Woods did a fantastic track with "No Quarter." It's a killer track. It's a little bit closer to the original, but they put their signature on

"Doc West said this and I have to agree," Hornsby added. "There is something appealing in listening to a female vocalist sing Zeppelin. It does put a different spin on it. 'Since

Tegtmeyer at Sweetwater came up with the album idea.

"I think it's a great shift," Tegtmeyer said. "It allows us to do something on a higher level. We had to pick a band, and Led Zeppelin was it. There wasn't anything in particular other than this is the 50th anniversary of the first Led Zeppelin album."

The bands for the project were chosen based on their musicianship and the likelihood that each would put their own spin on classic Zeppelin songs. They didn't disap-

"They all came in with what they wanted to do," Tegtmeyer said. "Fierce Invalids



I've Been Loving You' is pretty true to form in a lot of ways as the original, but when you put a female vocal on it it takes on a different vibe. Same thing with 'No Quarter.' The way Marnée sings that is very, um. creepy. She's naturally, with her vibrato, doing the effect that they put on Plant's voice on the record. It's interesting to hear someone do that."

The album is special in another way, one that vinyl geeks will love: it's a 180-gram vinyl, 12-inch gatefold double LP recorded at 45 RPM instead of the usual 33 1/3. And there's only 1,000 of them.

Though unusual, records like this are not unheard of.

"We do have some like that in the store," Roets said. "On Record Store Day a few labels will release discs like this. The faster speed allows for better sound. That makes this even more collectible. Plus it's a oneshot deal. Once they're gone they're gone."

From Hornsby's perspective, the record is appealing from multiple angles.

"It really is a nice package," Horsnby said. "If you're into vinyl, we checked all the boxes. If you're not into vinyl but you're just into supporting Fort Wayne, Fort Wayne

A Day & Night to Dismember

It's not always easy to predict what new events will catch on and which will not.

But the Downtown Improvement District's Fright Night, which debuted in 2007, seemed like a sure thing from the start.

Fort Wayne has an inordinate love of all holidays, but especially Halloween.

Fright Night, happening in various locales in and near downtown on October 21,

will celebrate its 10th anniversary this year.

Rick Zolman, events and programming manager for the Downtown Improvement District, said the tagline this year is "A Night to Dismember."

"We wanted to have a little fun with it," he said.

Fright Night is generally a family-friendly event, so the DID has to be careful not to push the envelope too much, especially when devising the sort of marketing taglines that might get printed on envelopes.

"We always have to watch that," he said, "We want it to be somewhat scary, but not too scary. It's a fine line."

There are plenty of new facets to the event this year, Zolman said.

In and around the University of Saint Francis Performing Arts Center, patrons will find DIA Fort Wayne, a multifaceted tribute to the Día de los Muertos, aka the Day of the Dead.

There will be live music, multiple taco vendors, a beer garden, face painting, even lucha libre wrestlers.

Lucha libre wrestling is a Mexican tradition even older than comparable wrestling traditions in the states. And its mythology is deeper and more culturally pervasive.

At DIA Fort Wayne you can present offerings (ofrendas) to the spirits of the departed and you can be transformed (temporarily, to be sure) into a skeleton (calaca).

Prizes will be awarded for the best cala-

The Dead Comics Comedy Battle at O'Reilly's will have local comics impersonating deceased comics, although the meaning of the phrase "I'm dying up here" will probably remain unchanged.

Zolman said the downtown YMCA will be doing a "trunk or treat," The Yummi Bunni will host an ice cream social, Parkview Field will be the scene of a scavenger hunt and the Foellinger-Freimann Botanical Conservatory will have all sorts of pumpkin and Rocky Horror Picture Show will unspool once more on the terrace of the Botanical Conservatory, where fans will try to use the original film to heal wounds incurred while watching the TV reboot.

Cinema Center will host a showing of the silent film, *The Cabinet of Dr. Caligari*, with live accompaniment from a group of Fort Wayne Philharmonic musicians known as String Shift.

Zolman said the Brain Eating Contest is

scheduled to return this year (the "brains" will be cakes confected by Sweets So Geek).

Fright Night has so many components that it's impossible to list them all here. Zolman said Fright Night technically starts at 10 a.m. and goes past midnight.

There really isn't a main event per se, but if there were one, it would be the Zombie Walk.

Zombie Walk (living citizens dressed as undead citizens shuffling through downtown) had grown

considerably since it debuted in 2008.

Around 2,000 people showed up for the first Zombie Walk. Now it draws

more than 10,000, Zolman said.

Ten years ago, Fright Night unfolded in a downtown area that looked very different from what it is today. It's

as if downtown has grown up around the

"It's hard to describe the excitement that we have about this," Zolman said. "For me this is my favorite event that we do."

Zolman said Fright Night has always brought people downtown who don't have a reason to visit regularly, and now they're seeing the major changes that have happened and are in the process of happening.

"If they haven't read a newspaper or watched the TV, they're coming down and seeing the momentum." he said.

Zolman said the DID's goal is to "activate space," to get people downtown and get them enjoying the amenities.

charities and the Fort Wayne music scene, it's a nice gift. It's going to be at Wooden Nickel. Let's say you're not into any of that, you just like Led Zeppelin. When you put all that together there's a lot of different angles for a fan of music. It really is a good album."

Doc West said the project is good in an-

"This is a step forward for Sweetwater and local artists creating together," he said. "Which means that you have guys like drummer Nick D'Virgilio, who's new to the Fort Wayne area and lives in Roanoke now (formerly with Cirque du Soleil, he was a touring member of Genesis at the end of their career) and some other heavyweights who have moved to Fort Wayne getting a little bit closer to the Fort Wayne musical community. They're on this record with bands that play at the Latch String. That's what really turns me on about this project. And it shows what Sweetwater can accomplish as well. And it's for a good cause. I think it's a huge step forward for Fort Wayne."

J.J. Fabini said 96.3 XKE plans to play the entire record on the air the weekend of the release along with spiking tracks in the regular rotation.

"Anytime you can get a spotlight on local Fort Wayne talent, we're going to support it," he said. "We want to get as many ears on this as we possibly can. Covers are a good way to do that. People are more accepting of cover songs from local artists.

"It's not original music; they already know it. It's just more accessible, and it's a good way for some of these people to show how talented they are. The cause of the project is fantastic: making sure kids have access to instruments. As far as I'm concerned it's just fantastic."

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
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Fake Town, Real Talent

Good old-fashioned rock 'n roll is hard to come by in the local music scene sometimes. It's usually being deluged with a variety of sounds like pop, punk, metal, etc. Nowadays it's almost impossible to go the straightforward rock route without something extra popping in. Omaha, Alaska get as close to it as possible though; if anything they are enough of an indierock band, and therefore get away with the moniker of rock. Think Twin Peaks (the band from Chicago, not the newly-rebirthed Showtime television show) meets Bob Seger.

The band labels itself as an "alternative" band on their Bandcamp page. This category has become a kind of catchall for bands who don't want to pigeonhole themselves into any one bracket. And that's pretty smart nowadays. With everyone's Attention Deficit Disorder at an all-time high, a band has to dip their toes in the water of several pools just to be relevant. Fort Wayne is no different. So Omaha, Alaska are alternative, but you can definitely define them other ways, especially since there are ex-members of Fort Wayne heavy-hitting groups like Heaven's Gateway Drugs, Church Shoes, Looking for Astronauts and The Snarks.

Often O,A's music is pushed into the alternative country realm which is anchored in the reality of decent music with that "alternative" signifier. The violin in "The Load" off their newest release Visitor Center & Gift Shop is enough to unite fans of both Charlie Daniels and Yellowcard. But neither of these are *real* influences of the band.

"When I started the band, I was listening to a lot of Magnolia Electric Company. The first [self-titled] record doesn't really reflect that because a lot of those songs were songs I had lying around that I worked out with bandmates as they joined up. Once we finished that record, I decided to really go for that American rock 'n roll sound and started going deep on Jackson Browne, The Eagles and Neil Young. Everything still comes out a little more 90s indie-rock than I mean for it to. I think Kenny Taylor put it best after he saw us, "You guys sound like John Prine and Kurt Cobain had a baby." After that, I started listening to John Prine," said C. Ray Harvey via email.

The handsome four-piece consists of Harvey, the main songwriter, guitarist, keyboard player and vocalist, Nate Richman who plays bass, Ben Hoepner the drummer and Mitch Frazier the lead guitarist. Fra-

zier's exemplary string work really helps flesh out the sound of Omaha, Alaska. Where the band started as a folksy singer-songwriter venture, the addition of the varied talent really brought the project alive, along with toeing the line between fun and heart.

"I just want to nail that perfect blend of realism and exhaustion with a tint of hope that I feel the best and most worthy songwriters expose. I don't want to write "Yeah, let's party!" music, but I also don't want to bum people out. I like both Jason Molina and Will Oldham as songwriters and they both occupy a similar musical space, but I think there's a fundamental difference. Molina has a much harder time remembering that the sun is still shining above the clouds [and] Oldham always keeps that childlike playfulness close at hand," said Harvey.

The style of the music has been a main focus from the beginning. Mixing classic rock and a more modern tradition, the band was able to churn out the ageless tunes you can hear them play at The Brass Rail, a favorite venue of O,A.

"I always wanted to do something more traditional after the last few bands I was in, something that was about good songwriting and wide-appeal American rock. When we first started, I had a tough time capturing that, but I feel like it's hit its stride. We've been doing this pseudo-country rock-ish thing, which probably comes off more alt-rock than I mean it to. I don't like anything right now except 70s rock 'n roll like Sweet, Electric Light Orchestra and Cheap Trick," said Harvey.

You can check out John Hubner's review of Omaha, Alaska's latest release Visitor Center & Gift Shop at whatzup.com/article/1050. He eloquently describes it as "a looser, more rollicking version of the [band's debut]. There are equal parts beer-soaked jangle and singer/songwriter fare." Just three songs in and anyone with a beer or two in 'em will want to dip their queen down mid-dance and kiss them, letting their youth glass over their eyes and light a renewed fire in their hearts.

Overall Omaha, Alaska measures up as a rock band with a lot of mellow artistry on paper and a lot of spunk on stage. Their song "Hope" is rightly named and about three-fourths of the way through you feel like hope is something you can reach out and grab. Harvey's short falsetto part really brings feelings of joyful expectation to your doorstep and even further

Dancers Balance Fun, Fear

Each year Fort Wayne's Fright Night, the big downtown celebration of Halloween and all of its various excesses, seems to get just a little bit bigger. In addition to the venues which are open and ready for some fun trickery, many of the downtown arts organizations also contribute some creative excitement for the evening. One of those

arts organizations, Fort Wayne Dance Collective, stretches the fun over two nights and is upping the ante by making things interactive.

One reason for some new twists comes along with a new venue. Having previously hosted their Halloween program in their own cozy studios, they branch out this year to the ArtsLab black box, an increasingly popular place for a variety of arts performances. In making that change, Fort Wayne Dance

Collective's artistic director Mandie Kolkman wanted to tweak the show to balance the change in space.

"I thought we should do something more immersive," she says. "I was excited to use the ArtsLab but was afraid we'd lose some intimacy that we've had in our Elliott Studio where we usually hold the performances. The black box is intimate, but there's still a bit more distance between the audience and the performers. So we're making it more immersive to engage the audience as m

immersive to engage the audience as much as possible."

The theme for the performances is Hotel

Hysteria, and as guests of the creepy hotel audience members can expect the unexpect-

"Guests will have to 'check-in," says Kolkman. "And from that point on they're treated as guests of the hotel. We'll try to take good care of them, but they may be asked to participate in the antics throughout the evening. We want the audience to be as close as possible to where we are."

Although hosted by Fort Wayne Dance Collective, Hotel Hysteria wouldn't be complete without some help from their friends.

"Any time we do something like this we like to engage the community and our arts partners," says Kolkman. "We'll have

a guest performance by Mikautadze Dance Theatre, and Fort Wayne Ballet and Project Ballet have choreographed pieces that will be part of the performance as well. We'll also have students from the area – Northeast School of Dance and our South Side High School outreach program – taking part. Our touring company is contributing choreography and will be dancing, as will our Pineapple Dance Project youth company."

being an afterthought."

That effort has not only made them a favorite in Fort Wayne but has put the Collective's Halloween show on the radar of arts organizations around the country.

"Over the summer, we were contacted by a magazine called Studio Dance Life which goes out to dance schools throughout the country," says Kolkman. "They contacted us to specifically ask us about our Halloween

Also taking part will be John O'Connell, a friend of Dance Collective and dean of the College of Visual and Performing Arts at IPFW. While he won't be there in person to perform, he'll be contributing as narrator of the nefarious events at Hotel Hysteria. The balance of fun and fright is as key to the FWDC performance as it is throughout Fright Night's other activities.

"We hear from the community that our show is a Fort Wayne favorite," says Kolkman. "It's a fun way to celebrate and get into the mood for Halloween. It's not too creepy, but we definitely pull out all the stops. Besides the artists who are dancing and choreographing, there's a lot of emphasis on lighting technology which is an art in itself. And we create the performances with that lighting in mind rather than having the lighting show on Fright Night. We knew we were doing something right if a national magazine is aware of it, and they featured us in an issue that came out this summer."

Aside from the change of venue, which allows more people to see each performance, there will be two shows instead of four (at 8 p.m. on Friday, October 20 and Saturday, October 21. Kolkman says that's helpful for the performers who now have only two shows instead of four in about 24 hours.

"It definitely helps the dancers a lot. Now they can give their all in one performance a night instead of having to pace themselves over two each night."

As Kolkman settles into her still relatively new role as artistic director at the Dance Collective, she's proud of the performances the company shares with the community and the reception they receive in whatever context and venue they inhabit.

"I love being part of Fright Night and love this show. I think it truly showcases the creativity of Fort Wayne Dance Collective and engages everyone in the community. I appreciate that we're given these opportunities that aren't just part of the regular schedule for our dance troupe. I think a lot of what we do and are able to do really comes through in this show."

inside sitting right next to you on the couch.



in the same room, strip them down to their bare bones instrument-wise, and you might end up with something like Omaha, Alaska. Though it would sound a little more rougharound-the-edges than either of those acts, you would likely feel the same way; you'd want to slow dance with your sweet thing, giving them a peck on the cheek during one of the sweet, smooth guitar solos or perhaps one of the bouncing piano interludes.

Feel-good music doesn't always come in the same form. Sometimes nostalgia takes over and some really awful mid-2000s emo is the soundtrack. Other times it's a little more modern, but with an old school feel. Something about Omaha, Alaska gives off a Blues Traveler vibe, though it rocks more and has way less (if any?) harmonica for sure. There's no 90s cheese present either; the sound is pretty timeless which works for

the band in a pretty fantastic way. They're able to blend familiar and classic elements with a modern, light-hearted way of delivering their own brand of feel-good music through alternative, guitar-driven songwriting. Through, and because of, this, the fellas have a new EP coming out.

"It's really just classic rock. [We're] planning to put that out by the end of the year. More than six months between releases, and it just starts getting stale," said Harvey



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

Covers for a Cause '17

Everyone should have a chance to learn an instrument, right? But with school budget cuts often targeting arts programs, it's not as easy as it used to be for young students to get their hands on, say, a flugelhorn. That's where "b instrumental" comes in. "b instrumental" is a local initiative that pays



instrument costs for seventh graders and keeps on paying through high school. But these instruments don't pay for themselves, which is why Wooden Nickel, 96.3XKE and Sweetwater have teamed up to create *Covers For A Cause '17*, the proceeds of which will go to "b instrumental." With the 50th anniversary of the release of Led Zeppelin's debut album just a couple of years away, *Covers '17* features local artists' takes on some of Zeppelin's most iconic songs.

The opening track is "Since I've Been Loving You" by a group I call The Sweetwater Superstars. I won't mention any names because I don't want them to get big heads. Plus they play all over the rest of the album, so they'll get their due. This rendition is very close to the original, although it sounds much more immediate and intense, possibly due to advances made in recording technology over the last half century. The drums are massive (as you would hope from a Zeppelin album), the bass is huge and clear and the guitars seem on the verge of bursting into flames.

Now I'll admit that I probably don't give singers enough respect. I mean, compared to a guitarist who has spent thousands of hours in practice, they're just, well, singing. Or so I thought. In the middle of this song when Kat Bowser pushes her voice to break at just the right moment, well, she's definitely playing an instrument, and it sends chills down your spine. My apologies go out to all the singers of the world.

Normally "All My Love" has this eerie (and slightly dated) keyboard sound, but here Brian Lemert plays the part on guitar and you won't miss it a bit. Crazy though I may be, I think I actually prefer this version to the original. Also from their final album is "Fool in the Rain" which has always been a personal favorite. Unlikely Alibi turns in an excellent performance, adding horns and a bit of a reggae feel to the already light and bouncy song.

It's almost a given that drummer extraordinaire Nick D'Virgilio would pick the Bonham-penned "Moby Dick," adding his own powerful drumming to this classic instrumental. Joining him is the impeccably toned bassist Dave Martin and Don Carr, whose guitar is just a touch more metal than the original. In a very, very good way.

Despite the original being populated with banjo and mandolin, somehow the *Covers '17* version of "Gallows Pole" seems more folksy. For one thing it never switches to rock, instead keeping the tension up with an increasing tempo. Carolyn Martin's vocals are impressive, both earthy and soulful, and the cello at the end is a nice touch

Zeppelin are notorious for stealing material from the great blues masters without giving credit, "The Lemon Song" by Chester "Howlin' Wolf" Burnett being one such song. The Fierce Invalids decided to steal it back. Gone are the ragged electric guitars and Page's screaming vocals, replaced instead with a more traditional old-school blues sound, complete with a wailing harmonica and rich baritone vocals.

When it came to "Kashmir," APQ Harmonic decided not to mess with a classic and delivered a straightforward rendition, complete with a real string quartet and Sunny Taylor effortlessly handling vocals. The final song is "No Quarter" by Moser Woods. The overall tone of the song is the same, aside from using a regular piano instead of quivering electric piano of the original, and I love the heavier guitars when the full band kicks in. They also extended the instrumental section, making it trippy and psychedelic, building to a frenzied guitar solo before backing off into the familiar closing melody.

Producer Mark Hornsby has done a fantastic job in bringing out amazing performances from everyone involved, making *Covers For A Cause '17* an album you'll want to listen to over and over. It's available on premium vinyl from Wooden Nickel stores and at Sweetwater and no other format. That's right. No CDs, no cassettes. Well, your purchase gives you the ability to download the album for all your digital needs but that's it. Don't even ask for an 8-track. (*Jason Hoffman*)

AC/DC T.N.T. (1975)

The second release from the Aussie-based rockers is still one of my favorite things they ever produced. Scottish-born Angus Young was only 20 years old but could create sounds from his Gibson that were, and still are, some of the hottest blues-rock riffs ever created.



This one opens with "It's a Long Way to the Top (If You Wanna Rock 'n' Roll)," still the anthem for rock star wannabees everywhere and one of few songs that is actually improved by bagpipes (played by lead singer Bon Scott).

"Rock 'n' Roll Singer" follows and is five minutes of dirty, hard rock blues. Even though most AC/DC songs have the same roots, they are still unique to the industry. At least that is my argument for their records through 1981. "The Jack" is pure blues with a nod to some of the bawdier lyrics that suggested sexual rawness. This was what Scott wanted to convey. It was almost perverse but was still just a blues song.

Side two featured a couple of familiar tracks still popular on global radio: "T.N.T. and "High Voltage." The title track is an orgy of guitars and percussion, and Scott's vocals could have peeled paint. "High Voltage" is a thorny song that had a lighter tempo, yet still rocks your socks off as it struts around for about four minutes. The album closes with a gritty version of Chuck Berry's "School Days."

This album put AC/DC on the international stage, and although Scott would pass away just five years later (replaced by Brian Johnson), their legacy of hard rock blues in the late 70s is still considered to be a foundation for rock bands even through today's artists.

Back in Black (1980) would be their last great record, and the last 25 years were mostly overproduced clones of their early stuff. (Dennis Donahue)

Tori Amos *Native Invader*

For her 15th album, Tori Amos inevitably is inspired by America's current political climate, but she also draws upon other, more personal experiences in songs that are not as entirely consumed by a sense of planetary dread. It's the more personal songs that are, ultimately, more successful than the overtly political



ones, which tend toward the obvious and unsatisfying.

Arguably the most obvious of these political laments is "Up the Creek" in which Amos takes on climate change deniers (which she refers to as the "climate blind") by hoping that they can be overcome by a "militia of the mind." The metaphors here are clumsy, but the song itself is not as clumsy as the nuance-free explicitness of "Russia" (included on the deluxe version of the album).

Musically, *Native Invader* ranges all over the map. Amos throws everything at her arrangements, from strings and reverb-y guitar to vintage electronic flourishes. Nothing on the album sounds like a product of the 21st century, exactly, but it's not for want of experimentation.

The album is strongest, however, when Amos stays well within her comfort zone. On the ethereal "Reindeer King" and the devastating "Mary's Eyes," she relies almost entirely on her voice and her piano, inarguably her most potent tools. These songs are intensely personal ruminations on grief and loss, and if they are not uplifting they are at least comforting in their beauty.

This is the space in which Amos shines, and *Native Invader* is saved by the fact that she visits it instead of remaining in the realm of politics. (*Evan Gillespie*)



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

Swaddled in gauze with painted faces underneath, it is hard to move past the illusion and guess who these musicians really are. While the band is rumored to consist of several Grammy Award winners, each member's identity is kept "under wraps."




tour, is an active philanthropist, a television star and a prolific songwriter in addition to being, according to Hit Parader, one of the top heavy metal singers of all time

Their hopes were realized in 1987 when the video for "Talk Dirty to Me" debuted on MTV and fans began buying up every copy of *Look What the Cat Dragged In* they could find.

Thanks to Michaels-penned hits like "Every Rose Has Its Thorn" and "Nothin' but a Good Time," Poison became the go-to glam metal band of a generation. After they broke up, Michaels pursued a solo career, pumping out album after album and appearing on a series of reality TV shows, including Bret Michaels: Life as I Know It and Rock My RV.


With each passing decade, Michaels continues to reinvent himself. The question is, who will he be next? (*Deborah Kennedy*)

Robert Plant and his band The Sensational Shape Shifters are dropping an album, Bluebirds over the Mountain, on October 13. The former **Led Zeppelin** singer and his band plan to tour next year to support the album with a February 20 show at the Rivi-



era Theatre in Chicago on the docket. Plant hasn't been willing to play a "whole lotta" Led Zeppelin over the years, and I would expect this show to be no different, so don't go expecting to hear Led Zeppelin side two in its entirety or anything like that. Since Zeppelin ceased to exist, Plant has mostly chosen to concentrate on material from a solo career that has lasted much longer than Zeppelin did. I've seen him, and I can say that despite the likely lack of Zeppelin material it's going to be a show worth seeing.

Years ago when I was single I would regularly post reviews of out-of-town venues in this column to try and help readers know what to expect when going to these places to see their favorite bands. I don't travel as much these days, but I still occasionally find a show I can't miss and, luckily, I have a wife who has figured out that these types of shows are the fuel that feeds me. I had the opportunity to see a band at The Music Factory in Battle Creek a couple of weeks ago. I had been there before, but the last time I was there it was called Planet Rock and was kind of a dive, so I was excited to see what, if any, changes had been made to the place over the years. First and foremost is the parking situation. There are less than a dozen on site spaces to park, I believe, so that leaves the majority of concertgoers the option of parking on the street or ... parking on the street. There are no other options. Unfortunately, even the street parking is limited. Cars are lined up on all streets leading to the venue, and as you get farther away, the neighborhood gets a little seedy.

If that's not a problem, then you're probably going to have a good time, as the venue itself is pretty great. The types of bands the venue books are mid-level types that usually draw a couple hundred or so folks, which suit the venues size just right. Even with that size crowd, the venue felt comfortably full enough to create a good vibe, but not so crowded that it ruined the vibe. Upcoming shows include familiar names we used to see booked at Piere's in their heyday, including former Guns N' Roses guitarist Bumblefoot on October 13, Soil October 14, Smile Empty Soul November 10, former Hinder singer Austin John Winkler November 11 and Chris Taylor Brown from Trapt doing a solo show December 2.

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

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An Homage to Billie Jean King

Were it not for Billie Jean King, women participating in all sports, not just tennis, wouldn't be nearly as widespread and celebrated as it is today. *The Battle of the Sexes*, the telling of the 1973 tennis match between King and Bobby Riggs, does a great job of conveying the tone of the times. The difference between then and now is enormous, freakishly so.

Emma Stone and Steve Carell take on the roles of King and Riggs, the combatants in this war. The instigator was Riggs. A champion who had his tennis career derailed by World War II, Riggs had become a tennis hustler and gambler looking for a fresh shot at the limelight.

Part of his schtick was to become a professional chauvinist. He was aided and abetted by former competitor and tennis impresario, chairman of the Association of Tennis Professionals, Jack Kramer (a smooth Bill Pullman). Kramer wanted to keep the ladies in their place, a place of much less money and little respect. Riggs pursued a match with Billie Jean, who declined repeatedly.

Riggs did persuade Margaret Court, the topranked female player at the time, to agree to a match, and he trounced her. After that event, Riggs continued to brag and demean the abilities of women. Yes, it was obviously more showmanship than commitment, but it became too much for Billie Jean King.

Despite the fact that her loss would be a huge setback for all women and a devastating blow to her career, she was interested in bigger issues. She has said all she really wanted from the contest was greater recognition for women's tennis and equality issues. She wanted the \$100,000 winner-take-all prize for what it would represent.

All of this is laid out with precision, wit, laughs (both sexist and feminist) and style. The media circus is handled with flair. The political dynamics are

handled with subtlety. The personal issues are handled with, at times, tender attention.

If anything the guiding principle of the filmmakers seems almost too filled with consideration for the characters. Tennis and publicity are just the surface of the story. Carell is wonderful mugging to the cameras with bravado and showing a much more vulnerable complicated persona when the cameras aren't rolling.

Stone has been styled to look as much like Billie Jean as possible. So public as she champions her causes, her private life is in turmoil. She loves her husband Larry, but the film shows her falling in love with a woman, a hairdresser who is willing to stand by her woman, silently. They both know that any whisper of their relationship would end Billie Jean's career faster than a defeat.

Tension builds effectively. We know the match's outcome, so portraying it is the key test of the film, and it passes with gusto. Directors Valerie Faris and Jonathan Dayton film it the way sports used to be presented on television, cut with more movie like angles. Footage of Howard Cosell adds to a sense of authenticity.

The match accurately portrays how she won. She runs him ragged. Theirs is a match of strategy and psychology as well as skills. Her skills drain his confidence. It really isn't a pretty sight.

The match, held in the Houston Astrodome, was a huge event. The worldwide television audience es-

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Blade Runner 2049 Opens on Top

Tops at the Box: It's official. Denis Villeneuve is the new most-talked-about director. He's entered his period of Christopher Nolan- and David Fincher-level status where he's loved by studios, film snobs, average filmgoers, kids and critics alike. That's tough. You have to do everything right to get to that level, and with Blade Runner 2049, it appears that Villeneuve (who has made a whole lot of great films in the last few years) is there. Blade Runner 2049, starring Ryan Gosling, Harrison Ford, Jared Leto and of course Edward James Olmos, took the No. 1 spot at last weekend's weak box office, selling \$31.5 million in the U.S. over its first three days of release. The film sold another \$50 million abroad. Okay, maybe not a The Dark Knight-like start, but 2049 is going to do just fine. It'll win most of the technical Oscars in 2018, and Villeneuve will be competing against Nolan and a few others (hopefully Todd Haynes) for the Best Director honors.

Also at the Box: Festival hit *The Mountain Between Us* opened stronger than expected, taking the No. 2 spot at last weekend's box office with just over \$10 million in sales. The film stars Idris Elba, Kate Winslet and Beau Bridges. Looks good. *It* continued to make those dollars, selling another \$9.7 million over the weekend, upping the film's five-week worldwide total to a whopping \$603 million. This from a movie that a lot of people thought would be a flop. From a movie that only cost \$35 million to produce. Director Andres Muschietti is now a name to know,

Something called My Little Pony: The Movie took the No. 4 spot at last weekend's box office, selling \$8.8 million over its first weekend of release. Kingsman: The Golden Circle rounded out last weekend's U.S. top five at the box, selling another \$8.1 million, bringing the flick's 17-day worldwide sales total to a surprising \$253 million. FPT Drama Asks Tough Questions

For decades Hollywood movies and romance novels have leaned on consumers' unwavering desire to be entertained without the nuisance of actually thinking. They apply formulaic plot lines and rarely add little more than a short-term distraction with no real substance. Conversely, live theater audiences flock to their seats because they expect to be entertained while also gaining perspective. If you prefer the latter of these two groups, you will not be disappointed if you see Faith Healer, currently running in the lower-level theater of First Presbyterian Church.

At some point in life, many people may internally or externally debate whether or not faith ever really means anything or actually has any real impact. These

and other questions of the soul and of our existence - and more directly how our faith in others affects each of us - are presented in this performance, which runs until October 21.

In a drama that also deeply explores issues such as truth and shame, Thom Hofrichter's 2017-2018 season directorial debut at the historic First

Presbyterian Theater shifts internally and examines many of life's toughest questions. Hofrichter chose this drama rather selfishly, he admits in his director's notes, because he has been a long-time admirer of the language and themes of Irish playwright Brien Friel's introspective, soul-examining play. Theatergoers are in for a monologue-driven wallop starring three seasoned First Prez veterans.

The three main characters each recall multiple events they experienced together while travelling through Wales, Scotland and Ireland from the late 1950s to the late 1970s.

FPT mainstay Austin Berger leads off this performance as Francis Hardy, a likeable but heavily flawed man who has spent his adult life examining his own existence and abilities through decades of performing a one-man travelling exhibition as a self-described "faith healer." Because there is nary a scene where multiple characters interact, Francis ("Frank") begins



this tale by revealing what could very well be his truest self more to a non-existent listener than he apparently ever did to the two people who devoted their lives to him. It is only when the other two characters later present their stories that the audience begins to question if anything he's said so far is true.

Nancy Kartholl, whose FPT resume includes highly esteemed roles such as Vivian Bearing from

> WIT and Iago from Shakespeare's Othello, exquisitely performs the rather tainted and unrefined Grace Hardy. Going against the wishes of her father, she chose a life with Frank who, when they met, seemed to be her life's missing puzzle piece. Ironically, Grace, clearly jarred by the events recalled during

her lengthy monologue, exhibits anything but what her name might indicate. Kartholl arrests the stage as she achingly describes events that Frank either conveniently omitted or forgot, or perhaps did not actually occur whatsoever. Enter the audience's aforementioned role in deciphering the truth.

The third member of this tragic-laden threesome is Teddy, Frank's manager, played by a visibly (intentionally) shaken Daniel Bulau. Previous audiences of FPT might recall his stirring performance as the lovable Herman in On Golden Pond. In this role, Bulau's Teddy, the lone American character of the trio, appears at first to offer an air of authority, but his entertainment manager's talent for raking in naive customers through fast talk and quirky witticisms becomes more and more obvious, forcing the audience to sort out whose character's descriptions of the same events

IPFW Theatre Dept's Stunning Act of Creation

It's not often I use the word "stunning," but a good many elements of IPFW Department of Theatre's Frankenstein: An Act of Creation are completely stunning. New is good, and this piece of devised theater, which allows experimentation with not only form and structure but narrative strategies as well, feels unlike anything we have seen before in Fort Wayne.

The inspiration for the play is, as the title implies, Mary Shelley's famous 1816 tale of Viktor Frankenstein and his creature. With the familiar story, many liberties are taken to provide an in-depth examination of the roles of creator, inspiration and creation.

From opening scene until the curtain closes, there is surprise after surprise. Most work exceptionally well, though some are much more effective than others. The cast and production team's biggest chances pay off most fully. A few scenes that feel slow or less inspired likely do so because of the frenetic and dazzling pace of so many scenes that came before them.

As the program tells us, the production, conceived and directed by IPFW Department of **Curtain Call KEVIN SMITH**

Theatre's Jeff Casazza, was completely devised by Casazza and the entire company. For any theater, this would be pretty cool. For a university theater department, it is dead impressive, to say the least.

As the countless elements come together through 17 scenes, it is possible to imagine the ideas and inspirations of various cast and crew

members coming forth and melding to form what comes together on the stage to form a totally new experience for the audience.

Occasionally, an IPFW production seems to make use of too few student actors. This is most definitely not the case for An Act of Creation. With the exception of one actor who graduated from the department last spring, all members of the cast are current students. Many members of the production team and staff are also students.

Allowing so many the opportunity to participate in any production is of benefit to students, the university and the community since it builds talent and offers exposure. Giving so many a chance to actually play a role in the design of something like this is really a gift from Casazza and the department to students and the audiences. What IPFW offers up with this production is no small contribution to the area



timate is 90 million viewers. I was just a kid. I didn't care much for Margaret Court - something about her ridiculously collared tennis togs - but I never doubted that a young Billie Jean could beat a man almost twice her age. I didn't understand the symbolic importance

Surrounding the main event are wonderful atmospherics. Elizabeth Shue as Riggs' long suffering wife, Austin Stowall as (a very pretty) husband Larry, Alan Cumming as a designer of tennis fashions, Fred Armisen as a doctor who gives "vitamins" and other health elixirs to Riggs, all give excellent supporting performances. Music, fashion and all surroundings put us right back in the 1970s.

My guess is that Blade Runner 2049 continues to dominate for another week or two. Then we'll start getting into the real fall releases. More on that next week.

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have been the most truthful.

In the final scene, Frank returns to the stage as the final witness in this case where the audience is judge and jury. Though omitted here for obvious reasons, trust that some surprises and key insights are in store for the audience who should by now be thirsty for a satisfying explanation.

As for the additional production team, it is of note that Jeanette Walsh's costume designs subtly and cleverly depict what each character has come to be at given points in time. Coupled with the costume choices, the simple set functions quite nicely for such a series of four dense soliloquies. According to the production

notes, Rae Surface (technical director) is no stranger to Fort Wayne theater but is fairly new to First Prez, and the light and sound operator-slash-stage manager is Associate Pastor for Children Bill Lane.

This play demands your attention and patience. Audiences are bound to have varying opinions of what really happened among these three characters. but that's among the powerful effects of live theater. In two two-scene acts, this performance lasts a little more than two hours, including one 10-minute intermission.

or like bits of self-indulgence resulting from trying too hard. This is not the case here. For the narrative, the more conventionally staged scenes are necessary, though they do not provide the rewards like the ones where huge chances were taken do. Not to spoil anything, but the final scene, beautiful in its way that it was, went on just a smidge too long, though the concept of it was right on for those that preceded it and to offer a sense of closure. Because of just how unusual so many scenes, particularly the initial ones, were, the final few may have been least awe-inspiring.

Props are chosen brilliantly here. They were used repeatedly to help choreograph scenes and to convey the tale and the intended messages about creative impulses, inspirations and regrets. Glowing balls, lanterns and huge swaths of fabric made major and lovely impacts. Total darkness in the theater was also used innovatively, as were sound effects. Each of these had the audience in their control. The stage itself, with its many entrances and exits, was used fully and insight-

Some of the quotes from creative minds through-

out the ages were very well chosen to match obvious intentions of message and devices. A couple of them seemed unnecessary and a bit too much. The effect of them as a whole, though, was unique.

The entire cast met the challenge of this experiment and its sub-experiments well, especially considering that all are student actors in the early stages of developing their craft. Not a one missed a beat. As Mary Shelley, Gabey Walburn was fun to watch from beginning until the end. Zach Hunnicutt did well as Viktor. Brittney Bressler brought a range of emotions and a freshness to the Creature.

Because this production offers a chance to see something highly unusual and entertaining, it warrants attention. It also showcases innovation, which we sometimes see too little of. The chances taken for this new take on the old story of man and creation are inspired and pay off beautifully.



Chinese Opera Overcomes Hurdles

Dorothy Kittaka has dedicated years of her life to promoting the Sister Cities in Fort Wayne, and the latest result of those efforts will (hopefully) result in an upcoming visit by China's Taizhou Luantan Opera at the Arts United Center on October 15. Why hopefully? Because the journey so far has been a rollercoaster ride, and that has nothing to do with the company's transportation. Originally scheduled to visit last spring, Kittaka faced unexpected obstacles which upended her months of planning.

"We found out two or three weeks before they came that we'd gotten the wrong visa. We'd gotten a B when we should have gotten a P for professional performers. We finally hired an immigration lawyer to help out and put together five-and-a-half inches of documentation - weighing five pounds - that included contracts for every one of the performers. I signed 75 contracts and oversaw all of it because I wanted to make sure this time it went through.'

Kittaka's dedication and diligence reflects how important she thinks the Sister Cities program is.

"We're doing as much as we can to share the cultures in this nation and around the world. That's how we stay strong, and it's an important part of our economic development. We want children especially to have a feeling for what other cultures are like and how they express themselves."

To that end there are two performances on October 15. The evening one (at 7 p.m.) is the main performance which shows the full range of Taizhou Luantan Opera's talents while the 2 p.m. show is aimed

at children, who will be admitted for free with a paying adult. Kittaka says that audience members of all ages should be prepared to experience something very different from what opera has come to mean in Western culture.

"This is something we have never had in Fort Wayne," she says. "It will be a very special and unique performance. There are acrobats, and the musicians are very different from what we've come to expect. The singing is also very different. They don't sing with the same rounded tones that we think of when we think about opera. I've been working on this for three years because this is a cultural experience that we've never been able to bring to Fort Wayne before. I want to share these cultural experiences from all of our Sister Cities.'

The time and effort expended to bring this performance to Fort Wayne will be well-rewarded for Kittaka if many take advantage of the opportunity to see this live performance.
