

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Broadening Their Horizons

----- Feature • The Accidentals-----

Fort Wayne seems to be a good launching pad for musicians of an Americana and progressive bluegrass bent.

The Avett Brothers, who recently were the focal point of a documentary by Judd Apatow, performed on a makeshift stage at a convergence of downtown streets in Fort Wayne in 2006.

The Band Perry performed at a nowdefunct country bar here in 2010 and the Wailin' Jennys, who were a favorite of Gar-

rison Keillor when he hosted A Prairie Home Companion, performed twice in Fort Wayne in 2006: at a fabled (and long shuttered) coffeehouse and at C2G Music Hall.

Now it's The Accidentals turn to make the most of a Summit City boost.

They will perform at C2G on November 5.

When The Accidentals first appeared here in early 2016, only a few local and non-local people knew who they were.

A lot has changed in the last 20 or so months.

The Accidentals came about because two self-described orchestra geeks, Savannah Buist and Katie Larson, were thrown together by happenstance. The Traverse City, Michigan teens volunteered for a high school assignment and a forced collaboration soon became an enthusiastic

They decided to call themselves The Accidentals (a double entendre referencing a musical note and serendipity) and later added drummer Michael Dause.

The Accidentals were "discovered" by rocker Marshall Crenshaw and producer Stewart Lerman in 2015. The gentlemen signed the band to a production deal.

But the band declined to renew that contract in 2016.

"It didn't really work out," Larson said. "We decided to move in a direction that was mutually agreed upon."

The Accidentals subsequently self-produced the 2016 EP Parking Lot and offered it as a free download. In early 2017 the band announced that they had signed with Sony

Their major label debut, Odyssey, released in August, features guest appearances by The Decemberists, Keller Williams and Carbon Leaf, among many illustrious oth-

It is not uncommon to hear horror stories of music ruined by major label imperiousness, but Larson said that was not The Acci-

dentals' experience with Sony Masterworks.
"We were super lucky," she said. "Before we signed the deal, we literally sat down with the head of the label at the time, and he told us he believed in our creativity and our vision and the songs.

"We told him we wanted to capture the energy of our live shows," Larson said, "and broke any rules of any genres. I feel like we had a lot of creative control and the end product is something that we're really proud

The band that Fort Wayne fans saw in 2016 is different from the one they will see

"We've been on the road for three years now, full-time," Buist said. "That's definitely changed our music a lot. When you

Buist said they recently had to improvise a set with a horn-filled Toronto funk band called Turbo Street Funk.

The collaboration was the brainchild of a Canadian event coordinator who has traditionally filled the final night of a music festival with such stunt alliances.

"We actually successfully improvised

a set together but only because, between songs, we would shout the key signatures across the stage to each other," Buist said.

Heavy touring can be a strain on band cohesion. but Buist said the members of The Accidentals remain

"It's actually pretty easy," she said. "In a lot of ways, we're really similar. We're introverted, so we know how to respect each other's space. We all kind of want to do the same things on our days off.'

"Today we're probably

all going to go to a science museum and then eat a lot of food together," Larson said. "It helps that we're all so much alike."

"We bicker like siblings sometimes," Buist said. "But our love for each other is really strong."

Creative collusions with new musicians and unfamiliar genres have made the band bolder and more ambitious artistically,

"I feel more inspired to create," she said. "We have aspirations to tour with horn players and bring out more string players.

Larson said the band will be doing a couple of album release shows in Michigan soon and they plan to add lighting and video components to their live mix.

"The more you see and experience on the road," she said, "the more ideas you get.

Carrying the Beat Forward

When Fort Wayne Taiko hosts Knock on Wood, putting a spotlight on Japanese drumming both locally and nationally, on November 4, it represents not only one of many unique artistic achievements at Fort Wayne Dance Collective but also demonstrates how much one woman on a mission can

The show, just one example of FWDC bringing in high-caliber guest artists from around the world, is just the latest in a line of achievements by Fort Wayne's own Taiko group over the years, but it's also the result of a 20-year odyssey for Allison Ballard.

First exposed to Taiko drumming in 1992 when Katari Taiko of Vancouver was guest artist at the Dance Collective, Ballard immediately responded to what she heard.

"I kind of stumbled onto the performance and had no idea what to expect. But I sat with my jaw dropped the entire time. I knew then that I wanted to play Taiko, but it was a formidable thought. I couldn't take classes here, and I couldn't relocate to a place that I could.'

The group was brought back in 1997, and this time Ballard knew she had to find a way to get involved. She was determined to make Taiko part of her life regardless of what that required.

"When they left I was motivated," she says. "I talked to Liz Monnier, who was then the director of Dance Collective, and told her I wanted to start a local Taiko group. I don't think she knew how serious I was, but she said, 'Sure, okay.' So I started the process."

But with no teachers available locally, she decided to start with the most basic element: a drum.

"I got some cheap whiskey barrels and started building drums. They took two years to get made. I'm not sure if that was the best way to start, but I needed to feel like I was moving forward. These drums were in my dining room as I was building them. I'm not a craftswoman, and I'm not good with tools, so it was all kind of humorous. I didn't know any better. I just had to do something. I was just that determined. Looking back it was really pretty brazen, but I just wanted it so badly.

She also began attending conferences and learning from teachers around the country. By 2000 she had enough momentum to begin teaching classes and eventually performing, putting together a group of four for performances. Through both youth and beginning adult students, she began seeing people who were similarly moved by the experience and anxious to continue to learn. For the first few years, her passion was limited to work behind the scenes to get the pro-

gram off the ground. Eventually she had to take that enthusiasm to the stage.

"It's never easy, no matter what I've accomplished or we've accomplished as a group. Not that I'm never satisfied or proud of what we've accomplished, but it's just really, really hard. And when I started this I was in my mid 30s and am now in my mid 50s. Plus, this really is the Taiko Siberia. We had no mentors or teachers to learn from."

What makes it worthwhile is the joy she gets from drumming.

"It's hard, but it's all balanced by how much fun it is. I'm a Taiko drummer; I have no choice anymore. I had some surgery awhile back, and as I came out of the anesthesia I started moving my arms, and the nurses got my mother and showed her what I was doing. She told them, 'Oh, she's just drumming.' No one had seen anyone do that before."

Having now established Taiko drumming in Fort Wayne - and being the only Taiko drumming group in the state - Ballard now spreads the joy around. She says the

drumming and the drummers' wide stance are empowering, and she's happy to share it not only with the group at Fort Wayne Dance Collective but with young students around the city whom they visit through their outreach program.

"I used to go to schools and ask who had heard of Taiko drumming, and no one would raise their hands. Now maybe two-thirds of the kids raise their hands because they've seen us at the Three Rivers Festival or the Cherry Blossom Festival. They know what it is, and the kids we have in our youth group now are rocking these songs.

With the upcoming Knock on Wood performance, Ballard can look back on her 20-year quest to bring Taiko not only to her own life but to her community. And she will be bringing in some of the mentors who have encouraged her over the years. Mas Baba and Shoji Kameda from On Ensemble, a Los Angeles based Taiko group, are bringing their deeply entrenched Taiko skills to our city with a multimedia production

which will be augmented by performances from Ballad's own Taiko group and the students she teaches. Her own training, which has included visits to Japan, has brought her to a point where she's happy to share some of the people who helped bring Taiko to this country.

"Shoji and Mas have been playing since they were children. Mas' parents were actually pioneers in bringing Taiko to this country, so he's been playing since he left the womb. They're fabulous artists and fabulous teachers, so bringing them here is a really great thing.'

Having devoted so many years to Taiko, she's heartened by the joy she sees it bringing others, whether through the performances of national artists or through the classes she teaches.

"Even in the beginning class, when they're just coming in to check it out, I see how Taiko has affected them. The resonance of the drum and the vibration ... you can't spend time playing something that big and not be changed by it."

Even though the band's national profile has been raised considerably in recent months, they are still very much a part of the Traverse City music scene, Larson said.

"We still live there," Buist said. "We are still very much tied in to our Michigan home

"Coming home" after a tour always means returning to Traverse City, she said.

"When we come home for our (album) release shows, I already know that at least six people are going to make us homemade cookies," Larson said. "So I am really looking forward to that."

Always at the Ready

When it comes to weddings and receptions, one almost universal requirement is music. There are a myriad of options for both, but one local group has carved a niche as a melodic and unique option for either or both. The Jaenicke Consort, first founded by two local college students looking for opportunities to

play, provides a remarkably adaptable and adept alternative to the typical band or DJ.

Offering various musical combinations – five members who can play in a number of configurations – the Jaenicke Consort have been performing in various platforms and venues for more than 25 years.

But the origins of the group pre-date that to a time years earlier when students Sally Hinkle-Teegarden and Nancy Martin were earning their IU degrees in music in Fort Wayne. Looking for opportunities to play together, Hinkle-Teegarden, who plays bassoon, and Martin, who plays flute and piccolo, began putting together duos and

trios to play in a variety of settings. Eventually the group began to get larger, first calling itself the Appleseeds. When Hinkle-Teegarden moved briefly to New York City, the Appleseeds went on without her, so upon her return she began performing with Martin and other musicians under the name the Jaenicke Consort.

Hinkle-Teegarden's interest in the bassoon dates back to her days at North Side High School under the direction of Ed King, a legendary figure in Fort Wayne's high school music scene.

"Chamber music was just starting to become big when I was in high school," she said, "and I decided to switch from trumpet to bassoon because Ed King pointed out that in chamber groups the bassoon really stands out. The bassoon has a really unique sound, and in a quartet you're going to be the only bassoon player, so if you don't play, it doesn't happen. You can really hear me."

Hinkle-Teegarden opted to major in music education, and in the process was required to learn all of the instruments, a talent which has proven invaluable to her work as the primary arranger for the Jaenicke Consort. Finding ways to adapt music to a variety of performances and venues was an asset as the consortium – which includes Hinkle-Teegarden, Martin, Susan Devito (on flute, sax and clarinet), George Donner (oboe, French horn) and Bryan Gibson (French horn) – began finding jobs around the city.

"We started playing at weddings, church services, and some of our early gigs were at the Three Rivers Festival," says Hinkle-Teegarden. "We started to have a lot of arrangements, and now we have over 1,000 pieces in our repertoire. The group says I do a good job with them and like what I do. I can play a piece on the piano and hear how I want the flute line to go.

And I can not only hear the line but add some embellishments. I'm not a composer, but I can take a piece and find a way to make it sound good for a quartet or quintet."

In fact, Hinkle-Teegarden is working with the musicians' union to distribute some of the Jaenicke pieces to other groups to earn royalties. As the reputation of Hinkle-Teegarden's arrangements and the talents of

the consortium become more widely known, the group hopes to continue to find jobs outside the immediate area. Some extra effort Hinkle-Teegarden has taken over the years has made playing in such a variety of situations more comfortable.

"One of our worst events was at a Three Rivers Festival just after Headwaters Park opened. There was no covering for the platform or the stage at that point, and nearby there were monster speakers blaring rock music. On one side was a toilet and on the other was the lemon shake-up truck. That was what was going on the whole time we played, so I said 'Next year we will have a tent.' So now we

have a tent and can use that for all kinds of weather. We once played a wedding at Pokagon in 110 degree weather and were able to stay cool."

Hinkle-Teegarden's arrangements not only bring out the best in the group but also cater to the many moods of those who hire the Jaenicke Consort.

"We've done some pretty unique weddings," she says. "One couple wanted a *Star Wars* wedding, so I had the women come out to the theme for Princess Leia and the men come out to the music of Darth Vader. I did arrangements for a *Godfather*-themed wedding and for one wedding, where the couple were childhood sweethearts and met at Disney World, I did an arrangement of 'Small World.' We had a mixed marriage once – one family was IU, one was Purdue – and played both themes. We try to find a way to tailor a wedding to the couple as much as possible. We never know what we're going to play until we talk to them, but then after we have the arrangement, we just tuck that into our portfolio in case we need it again. We have so much music now that we can easily play for four to five hours and never repeat ourselves."

The Janenicke Consort have played at some unique events as well, including a butterfly release and a re-internment ceremony at Lindenwood Cem-

"That one was a little weird but also very touching."

With a growing reputation that takes them outside of Fort Wayne for some performances and an astonishing catalog of arrangements at the ready, the Jaenicke Consort are pretty much ready for anything. In fact, if the quintet at hand needs a little something extra, they have an added weapon on the sidelines.

"If we ever need an accordion, George's wife Ann is available to join us, too."

Three Cities Live from Lafayette

Three Cities take having a good time seriously. It shows in their live shows, their videos, and it shows in their recorded output. Fort Wayne's Three Cities play rock n' roll. Like, rock n' roll rooted in the storied history of bands like Led Zeppelin, Queen, The Beatles, Metallica, Iron Maiden, Van Halen, Deep



Purple and pretty much anything that would've been blowing minds between the 1960s thru the 1980s. They take pride in knowing that every man, woman and manchild leaves a Three Cities show completely rocked to their core.

Three Cities have returned with a new album titled *Live From Lafayette*. As you may have guessed, it's a live album recorded at the Lafayette Theater. It's as fun and crazy as you'd hope it would be.

According to the band, "This album is the culmination of years of writing, recording, rehearsing and performing and showcases a local band's attempt to bring rock n' roll back from the dead with rippin' guitar solos, pounding drums, cheesy synths and arena-ready changes."

"Time Will Tell" makes good on that promise with vocals belted out like Bruce Dickinson, guitar shredding like Glen Tipton and drums beaten within an inch of their life. "Anthony's Garage" touts some impressive vocal harmonies, and the song overall sounds like Head East and Mountain on steroids. It's good time rock n' roll with an edge. "Walkin" touts some serious Uriah Heep vibes with that classic 70s rock n' roll march and the Ken Hensley organ sound.

The big takeaway on this live album is just how accomplished these guys are musically, as well as how they own the stage here. They sound like they've been doing this well beyond their relatively few years of doing the rock n' roll thing. I've seen far more aged rock n' roll lifers who have seemingly hit tenure in the school of rock and don't come close to the musicianship these four guys have mastered.

There are some epic jams on here, "Too Far Gone," "Louder and Louder," "Guuurl"), as well as Three Cities' signature tune, "Serious Metal Illness." There's also some great stage banter, a must for every great live album.

Three Cities' Live from Lafayette is a testament to weekend jams, the rock n' roll life, guitar tunings between songs and four dudes laying down some serious jams to ignite your brain. Long live Three Cities, and long live rock n' roll. (John Hubner)

American Dream

The closing song on American Dream is a touching eulogy from LCD Soundsystem frontman James Murphy to his friend, mentor, and peer, David Bowie. As admirers of each others' work, their fruitful friendship yielded a few collaborations and favors, whether it was Bowie singing backup on the



Murphy-produced Arcade Fire album *Reflektor*, or Murphy providing percussion on a few of Bowie's *Blackstar* tracks.

The appropriately titled "Black Screen" is also an apology to Bowie's ghost for not being more involved with his final album. By his own admission, Murphy was slated to co-produce *Blackstar* with Bowie, but "I had fear in the room / So I stopped turning up ... I'm bad with people things / but I should have tried more." However, Bowie also imparted to Murphy the much needed confidence and motivation to rejuvenate LCD, which had been dormant since 2010. After confronting his own self-doubt about doing so, Murphy admitted to Bowie in a moment of wry honesty that he had copped many of his sounds and visions for LCD's own style, to which Bowie assured him, "You can't steal from a thief, darling."

American Dream offers LCD's most concise cultivation of other stolen ideas and meticulously weaves them into something fresh and vibrant. The sounds within the songs trace out a map of various postpunk, new wave, dub and electronic influences from bands and artists primarily from the 70s and 80s. But rather than merely sample these sound bites, the band's heightened care and attention to detail in performing them results in their most accessible album – one

Ram Jam

Ram Jam (1977)

Ram Jam formed in 1977 out of the remnants of several other bands playing the New York/Long Island circuit and are considered one-hit wonders by most. Sure, "Black Betty" was a controversial single, but founder Bill Bartlett's arrangement



of the Leadbelly track is still considered to be one of the last great rock songs from the decade. The rest of the album isn't bad either and has been overlooked by music critics over the last 40 years.

After "Black Betty" opens the release, "Let it All Out" carries a BTO/Grand Funk hard rock sound with stiff guitars and husky vocals. "Keep Your Hands on the Wheel" reminds me of the New York Dolls or Mott the Hoople with the tight solos and piano arrangements behind the harmonies from Bartlett and bassist Howie Blauvelt. "404" is a fantastic rock song about a dude driving around in his car (a French Peugot), listening to music, picking up chicks and living the dream. Great guitars in this one as well. "High Steppin" is a Southern-fried boogie number with some great percussion from drummer Peter Charles.

"Overloaded" carries a chubby bass and has an almost pop sound to it, but still had the layers of guitars to qualify as late 70s rock n' roll. "Hey Boogie Woman" reminds me of a cross between Frank Zappa and Steppenwolf and fits on a record that "celebrates" women and rock n' roll. "Too Bad on Your Birthday" closes out an album that is part Southern blues and part glam rock but all 70s rock n' roll.

Ram Jam release another record in 1978 but were unable to capture a fan base, as punk and new-wave infiltrated New York City. Blauvelt passed away in 1993 and Charles in 2002. Bartlett continues to write and still plays occasionally in his native England. (*Dennis Donahue*)

ready, willing and fully capable of welcoming a lot more fans.

"Oh Baby" sets the tone for the album by paying tribute to the late Alan Vega of Suicide fame, and uses a similar framework to their best-known song, "Dream Baby Dream," as a pleasant façade to lyrics that document a romantic breakup. Similarly, the album's midpoint, "How Do You Sleep?," is a sprawling 9-minute industrial epic about the personal and professional dissolution and lawsuit between Murphy and Tim Goldsworthy who co-founded DFA Records with Murphy. So much of *American Dream* plays out like Murphy's diary of events following LCD's own dissolution, and it is largely preoccupied with the end of things, be it friendships, relationships, partnerships and even the end of life itself, considering the liner notes which dedicate the album to "the growing list of our dead."

But damn it all if *American Dream* isn't possessed by some infectious energy that makes the whole album completely and compulsively listenable. The singles "Call the Police," "American Dream" and "Tonite" stand on their own as great songs and work even better in the context of the album's tracklist. They also represent different modes of the album between the rock songs, dreamy soundscapes and hard-hitting electronica, respectively. "Emotional Haircut" also deserves mention for best exemplifying LCD's dance-punk roots with energy that builds to an ecstatic peak before the comedown of "Black Screen."

As the reintroduction to LCD Soundsystem, *American Dream* picks up the best aspects of all their previous albums and takes off running for a satisfying 70 minutes. Though some may be intimidated by 6- to 7-minute average length per song, LCD have long since prided themselves on the ability to keep an idea fresh for minute after minute. Thieves though they may be (most obvious example being the Talking Heads influence on "Change Yr Mind"), Murphy and Bowie are genre-benders working outside the frames of convention and formula.

As an album crafted by music lovers for music lovers, *American Dream* is a definitive statement that proves imitation isn't enough to make something this lasting. (*Colin McCallister*)

Corgan himself is the same arcane poet he's always been, however, and this new album stands as merely the next chapter in his unpredictable career. 





Country giant **Kenny Chesney** recently announced dates for his Trip Around the Sun Tour in 2018. The stadium tour kicks off in April in Florida and makes its way to Columbus, Ohio on June 16. Other regional dates include Soldier Field in Chicago on



July 28 and Ford Field in Detroit on August 4. **Thomas Rhett**, **Old Dominion** and **Brandon Lay** are set to open the shows.

The iHeart Radio Jingle Ball Tour hits several larger cities across the U.S. in November and December, spreading Christmas cheer along the way. It's not enough that you're also likely to stay the night in one of his city's hotels, paying 12 percent tax on your room; the Windy City mayor wants to milk you of more of your hard earned cash just for attending a show. If you want to take an Uber instead of driving to the show and paying that parking money at the venue, then Emanuel has you covered. He is also proposing a tax rate hike for Uber rides. Sounds like a great dude.

Lollapalooza is certainly an amazing event to have so close to our area. The concert annually brings some of the best musicians together for a three-day party in Chicago's Grant Park. The amount of mess that tens of thousands of people can make over a three-day period is almost unfathomable, but we now know about how much it costs to clean up that mess. According to a report published by the Chicago Park District, the cost to repair and clean up Grant Park after this year's festival was more than \$500,000. Rain played a part in the process, as sod had to be replaced after a big rainstorm rendered the park a mud pit on the first day. No one seems discouraged by this price tag though, as next year's event has already been announced for August 2-5 and tickets are already on sale. Get 'em before the tax goes up.

Marshall Gets the Period Right

Within the first few lines of dialogue of *Marshall*, a movie about an interesting but less famous chapter in the life of Thurgood Marshall who was a celebrated attorney, a dedicated civil rights advocate and the first African-American to serve on the United States Supreme Court, Marshall boldly spits out the "N" word. I wasn't shocked. I was relieved.

Marshall is an American hero, a figure whose life and career could be at the center of several films depicting the 20th century American experience. When Hollywood takes on stories of the troubled times in our past, there is always a chance that, pardon the expression, the topic will be whitewashed.

Without a commitment to expressing the many forms of violence and abuse a civil rights leader like Marshall endured, any movie about him that didn't include the ubiquitous inequities of life as a black person would ring hollow and exhibit the kind of dishonesty he did not abide. Knowing the filmmakers weren't going to shy away from words gave me confidence they would get the story right.

They do, for the most part, but *Marshall* isn't really a bio-pic. It represents only a chapter in Justice Marshall's evolution as the champion of civil rights he becomes. We see him gain confidence, direction and purpose.

Chadwick Boseman takes on the titular role with

flair and charisma. Like a warrior putting on his armor, getting dressed is a transformational ritual (though he puts his pants on one leg at a time, like everyone else, and irons his own shirts). This relatable process (who doesn't gird their loins in the morning?) gives us the information we need. He is a man on a mission facing formidable foes. Boseman makes it clear that he is able to face any situation.

The situation is the case of Connecticut vs. Joseph Spell. Spell, a butler/chauffeur, is accused of rape by the wife of his employer. She (a fine Kate Hudson) claims he raped her repeatedly, took her for a ride in her car and tried to murder her by throwing her off a bridge to drown. That is in the movie. The real story is even stranger.

Marshall is a courtroom procedural, and a very good one. Societal norms are as much on trial as is Spell. Communicating the racist cultural climate is essential to how the supposed crime will be interpreted.

Tyler Perry and the Demise of Film

Tops at the Box: Eww, yuck. Tyler Perry's Boo 2! A Madea Halloween topped last weekend's box office, selling \$21.6 million over its first three days of release. C'mon, America, we're better than this, aren't we? We're better than supporting a guy who puts his name in every title of every movie he makes, aren't we? I get it. It's the fall and Halloween is coming up and people, in general, seem to have terrible taste. But dang, I didn't think this Tyler Perry thing would still be happening all these years later. What if Perry ends up directing 50 hit movies? Then what will his place in film history be? What will that conversation look like? I get that we're living during a period of transition in the film industry, but how is this Tyler Perry era happening? And how long will it last? And how will we look back on these films?

Also at the Box: Geostorm took the No. 2 spot at the U.S. box office over its first three days of release, selling \$13.3 million against a \$120 million budget. A lot of people are writing this up as the year's worst movie, but I think it looks fun. I'll watch this movie. I won't pay to watch this movie, but at some point, likely out of boredom, I'll check it out. Horror flick Happy Death Day took the No. 3 spot at the box last weekend, selling another \$9.4 million, crossing the \$40 million mark in just 10 days. Tis the season to watch mediocre horror flicks.

Blade Runner 2049, probably the year's most interesting film, continued to flop at the U.S. box office, selling just \$7 million and bringing the flick's 17-day U.S. total to \$74 million. With a \$150 million budget, it's hard to call this flick a success. Just kidding. This film is big and beautiful and brilliant, and it's already sold about \$200 million worldwide. And it'll sell online for years to come. That said, it's disappointing that 2049 has sold so poorly in the U.S. while trash like Boo 2! will be considered a major financial success.

Rounding out last weekend's Top 5 at the U.S. box was *Only the Brave*, an ensemble action flick about firefighters that is supposedly very satisfying



and well acted. The movie, which stars Josh Brolin. Miles Teller, Jennifer Connelly, Jeff Bridges and Tim Riggins (hubba), sold a disappointing \$6 million over its first three days of release. Boo. I'll be watching this flick at some point. Not at the theater, but on Hulu or Amazon or Netflix or Sling or iTunes or whatever other kind of streaming service is invented between now and when I finally decide that the time is right to watch Brolin, Teller, Bridges and Riggins acting manly. Also of note, *The Snowman* sold just \$3.4 million over its first three days of release. Ha. That's funny. Great director, terrible film.

New This Week: First up is the heavily promoted horror flick Jigsaw, directed by the Spierig brothers. Looks like a hit film to me, but I hope to never see it because it looks like mediocre mainstream horror trash. And that's not for me. Also out everywhere is a wartime drama called Thank You for Your Service. starring Miles Teller, Amy Schumer and Haley Bennett. I think this was supposed to be an Oscar season release, but hey, it doesn't seem like that's in the cards for Teller and the gang. Rounding out this weekend's menu of releases is the George Clooney-directed crime thriller Suburbicon, written by the wonderful Coen Brothers and starring Matt Damon, Oscar Isaac, Josh Brolin and Julianne Moore. On paper, this one looks promising. It looks like a sure thing. I'm not buying it. Sorry, Cloon. Outside the realm of wide releases. we've made it to the time of the year when smaller indie flicks really start to get good, despite their limited release. This week will see the test release of comedy The Square; dramedy The Heyday of the Insensitive Bastards, starring James Franco, Kate Mara, Natalie

The NAACP is called in not only to defend Spell but also to prevent white people from dismissing all their black employees. Marshall is dispatched to represent the defendant. He needs a local partner because Connecticut did not allow African American lawyers in the bar association.

Josh Gad takes on the role of Sam Friedman, Marshall's co-counsel. The actor seems a bit uncomfortable in the role, though that suits the extreme discomfort of the character.

Screenwriters Michael and Jacob Koskoff, a father-and-son team, and director Reginald Hudlin are very respectful of the subject. The film is measured, trying to give equal play to all.

Marshall offers nuance on several fronts. During jury selection, Marshall insists Friedman accept a white Southern woman for the jury. "The only thing white Southerner's hate more than a [black man]," he says, "is the condescension of Northern white folks towards Southern white folks." Plus, Marshall smirks to Friedman, "She likes you.'

Sexual attraction is alive in Marshall. Today's culture in the United States is a volatile mix, with racial strife and sexual misconduct constantly in the news. Marshall is a timely film on many counts.

"Men are men, and women are women," says one character, which helps explain to Marshall why a white woman would lie about being

Marshall does not ignore the anti-Semitism rampant in the United States at the time. The year is 1940, and Friedman's extended family faces hatred at home and Nazi persecution abroad. Friedman's wife is given a lovely transformation from a woman afraid for her family and social standing to a woman proud of her husband's courage.

Marshall is a portrait of a time and place, a specific stab at the assumed privilege of white people in mid 20th century America. But given what we are facing in terms of racism and sexism today, we need a lot more Thurgood Marshalls and Sam Friedmans.

The story of Marshall should be part of many curricula. History, anthropology, sexuality, sociology, communication, political science, art, music – is there any aspect of human experience Marshall doesn't touch? I am not sure how this film received a PG-13 rating, but I am grateful that it did. It is compelling and should be viewed by all students of history, young and old.


