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Christmas Carols & Caring

For six years, Mike Conley has been planning and organizing the annual Christmas show at C2G, a perfect venue to capture the spirit of the holiday and stage an

engaging evening of area talent sure to inspire the cheer of the season. Conley himself was inspired to create the event after his own venture into Christmas music led to more local artists getting exposure for their own contributions to the festivities.

"I had my own Christmas album come out in 2010," says Conley. "Along the way 92.3 the Fort started promoting it for

the holidays. Then other artists started coming along with their own versions of holidays songs, so those were getting played too. There's something special about a Christmas album. Unlike regular releases that come and go in six months and are almost forgotten, a Christmas album comes back again year after year.'

Being both a respected musician and an active community member, Conley decided to gather some local musicians to offer an evening of music - one which

would not only benefit the audience but also the Community Harvest Food Bank, helping to raise money and canned goods during a time when it's particularly urgent.

"It's been a good way to give back to the community. Last year we had 300 to 400 people at the event, and we've donated 4,000 canned foods. It's become a fun tradition, and the artists put their heart into the shows. It's fun to see local bands doing something a little different and putting their own spin on it. Last year the Freak Brothers and Unlikely Alibi were both performing, and it adds a little freshness when they play these songs. It's like a breath of fresh air.

Conley will open the show with a solo acoustic set and will play host for a lineup that includes jazz singer Hannah Bushong and KelsiCote.

'KelsiCote are a husband and wife duo," says Conley. "Every time they play, they level the room. Cote is from ChilE, and they have a lot of worldly sounds to their music. It's awesome, and I'm really excited for the audience to see them."

Also performing will be Alicia Pyle who performs this year with her quartet but who brought a different configuration to last year's show.

"We covered the Trans-Siberian Orchestra with our 12-piece rock orchestra [APQ Harmonic] last year," says Pyle. "This year it's the Alicia Pyle Quartet, and we'll be covering the music from A Charlie Brown Christmas by Vince Guaraldi. We wanted to go with something festive and fun and jazz-based this year."

Rounding out the show will be The

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Bel Airs in a show that Conley knows will put the spirit of Christmas into the audience. Helping out the Community Harvest Food Bank should also put some extra spirit into people, since charity is often on the minds of many during the holiday season. It's a time that organizations like Community Harvest have the greatest needs.

"So many families are in danger of

missing out on meals with loved ones, and during this time of year that includes holiday meals," says Katie Savoie, grant writer

for Community Harvest. "In northeast Indiana, there are more than 85,000 people who can't depend on regular meals. We distribute food directly to individuals and families in our nine-county region of northeast Indiana who are experiencing hunger due to illness and medical burdens, job loss, disability and other challenges. The outpouring of support from the community helps ensure that families can enjoy being together during the holidays instead of struggling to put food on the table."

Tickets for the show are only \$6 or \$12 for a ring-side seat and table. Attendees are also asked to bring non-perishable foods. and Savoie has some suggestions for what might be the most needed at this time.

"Most in demand right now are holiday sides such as green beans, boxed mashed potatoes, stuffing, and other food items. Also in demand are canned soups, fruits, vegetables, boxed meals and canned protein such as peanut butter, chicken and tuna. For anyone who wants to donate during the holiday season. we hope that they will bring a nonperishable food item to the Christmas show. We also

Sculptures of Clay & Glass

Sculpture can be an illusive medium. Sure, clay comes to mind, and, of course, that god-awful scene from the movie *Ghost*, but the great works of sculpture are marble and steel, right?

But primarily, when one thinks of sculpture, Renaissance-era marble statues like

Michelangelo's David and Alexander of Antioch's Venus de Milo, usually come to mind. Or for the less historically minded, perhaps what comes to mind are works like the giant steel pieces of art surrounding the Fort Wayne Museum of Art.

Elizabeth Wamsley believes clay is just as viable as these other sculpture mediums. And why shouldn't it be?

"My goals are to finish a commission for my gallery guy and get it to Los Angeles. [I'd like to] find a big, new studio and to work on some large sculptures. [I want to] get Northern Indiana to see clay sculpture as viable," said Wamsley via

One of Wamsley's most stunning pieces, "My Own Archeology," is a large thrown vessel with layers of ash glaze included. With a bright blue ewer on one side, the vibrant colors of the main section (the olive greens, pale blues and yellows) definitely make the bright blue sea glass-esque side element really stand out and capture the eye. The main vase-like facet is large enough to seize an observer's attention even beyond the colors it projects. The smooth, curved "sides" and tilt cause the eyes to linger beyond the normal length of time. This brings its talent-based creation to the forefront.

With multiple firings, "My Own Archeology" is assembled on a base of clay with pools of molten "trash" glass. It stands about 22 inches tall and 14 wide, making it big enough to be the focus of any room, but small enough so as not to overwhelm.

A similar piece, "Underwater," evokes the same tone and feeling, but with an entirely different shape. This piece demonstrates a small vessel, a tiny urn really, caught between another vase-like element and shards of clay, layered on top of one another.

"I made [these] by layering clay slabs, and then cutting them up. The stoneware and ash [elements] are glazed and there's some molten glass [included]," said Wamsley of this smaller piece.

Standing at just eight inches tall, "Underwater" could fit on a shelf, though it



deserves its own display and lighting and wouldn't be out of place sitting right next to "My Own Archaeology." The colors are similar, though there are just hints of blue. It has mostly an earthy color scheme, including browns, oranges and greens, but the bits of blue and aqua tend to knock it out of the typical autumnal color spectrum and add to its uniqueness.

The colors mentioned are mostly obtained through glazing, which is a sealed layering or coating of a glass-like substance

that has been fused to the ceramic through firing. The glaze can serve as a color, to decorate or to waterproof a piece. It's important to get these terms down, as they are essential to Wamsley's methods.

"I use clay mainly as a starting point in my artwork," she says. "Clay has been integral for a very long time, so it is hard not to start with it. Sometimes I will mix my own

> clay formula or use clay from Laguna Clay or Continental Clay. I do use a potter's wheel and elements from thrown vessels to shape some of my sculptures. I use the wheel when I'm making my more 'functional' forms.

"There is a lot of prep getting tools and clay prepared. I do sometimes use paper clay, to make my sculpture less weighty. That is a whole [different] process to mix up. I do some sketches, but the end results do change. I spend some days throwing forms and then assemble the parts. The forms must be dried carefully and slowly.

"Generally I do two or more firings depending on my ideas," she adds. "Glazing the forms takes time, and I do mix up most of my glazes. Sometimes I will soak my pieces in a soda ash solution, let them dry and then glaze. Once my sculptural pieces are fired I will begin to assemble them, if necessary. I save shards from previously destroyed work and will use these in my work [see 'Underwater']. I have used firebrick and broken kiln shelves, wire and fencing wire."

You can find Wamsley's art, which is highly varied and shouldn't be defined simply by the pieces described here, at Crestwoods Gallery in Roanoke, Carmel Art on Main Gallery in Carmel and, through December 24, at the Art Studio Holiday Gallery at Jefferson Pointe.

The two aforementioned pieces sit definitively in the fine art realm, and could really have no other function, though their worth as art pieces is entirely enough.


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Left to right: "My Own Archaeology," "Underwater," "Oceanic Vessels"





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
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Rockin' On After After School

It's not unusual for a band to change its name. It happens a lot for a variety of reasons. A name change is often part of the normal series transitions bands face. What is unusual is for a band to change names when its first CD is in the can.

That's what happened to the Fort Wayne band Horizon Arcs. Formerly known as After School Special, the four-man group had struck a chord with area music fans and had developed a following. The name was spot on, ironic in a way befitting a 1980s cover band, and the gigs were high-energy, edgy and fun. But when it came time to release their album, they learned doing so under their then current name might cause a problem.

"We looked at trademarking and there was an issue with After School Special," said bassist Aaron Steele.

Their CD Anybody Listening was ready to drop, but as a band they were spinning nameless in the ether.

Coming up with a new name isn't always easy. Just ask Sean Combs.

"We started going through all the names we could think of," Steele said. "We had gone through about 400 names and finally came up with Horizon Arcs. We settled on that about a year ago."

The name change was the first of several transitions Horizon Arcs have faced. A shift in live performances, loftier ambitions and the departure of a key member would soon follow.

Steele was a Navy brat, and while growing up moved around a lot with his parents, Fort Wayne natives. When he was 16, in 1989, he got a guitar and started getting together with friends to play.

"I had a large room and my friends came over with their guitars and we just jammed around," Steele said. "My parents were good with that."

Steele moved to Fort Wayne in 2001, but it wasn't until he bought a bass a few years ago that he thought seriously about joining a band.

"I was always more of a rhythm guitar player," he said. "About four years ago I bought a bass and put a profile on Band-Mix saying that I played bass, even though I didn't. A couple weeks later these guys

called and said they needed a bass player. I was still playing with a pick. Then I went to see the Gin Blossoms live. Their bass player was all over the stage and really good. All of a sudden it just clicked. Now it's really hard for me to play guitar. Should have done it years ago. I'm 10 times better on bass than I ever was on guitar."



The guys who called were Brody Eastep and Tim Tilbury. Eastep and Tilbury, both guitarists, had met through an ad. Drummer Austin Snyder entered the mix via an ad too.

Eastep, an Ohio native who started playing the guitar at 16 with the self-proclaimed finesse of a gorilla, discovered in college that he had a talent for songwriting.

"College was a weird time," Eastep said. "You get put into a different situation and you begin to see things from a different perspective."

Snyder, whose dad Kenton played bass with local favorites Not My Kids, played French horn in high school. Despite paternal pressure to play bass, Snyder said he ended up gravitating to the drums, which he learned on his own by mimicking what he heard on CDs.

"The first band I played with was Les Nester in 2010," Snyder said. "Then I found these guys on Craigslist. I saw their videos and thought they were pretty good."

After School Special formed in 2014 and soon found regular gigs around Fort Wayne. Their style, influenced by alternative and grunge bands such as Nirvana, Weezer, Sublime and the Foo Fighters, was a natural fit.

But the band wanted to play their own stuff. That's when Eastep brought a cache of his songs to the group.

"What happened was our singer, Brody, already had a bunch of originals that he had written," Steele said. "He came to us with a demo CD. We listened, and we liked everything he brought to us. We started working on those."

The work took a nearly two years, but in the end they wound up with *Anybody Listening*, an 11-track CD of well-crafted, well-recorded songs. The CD, under the Horizon Arcs moniker, came out last April.

Having proved they could write their own songs, the next challenge was to find a place to play them. Bar owners can be skeptical of bands who want to play their own tunes, and rightly so. Steele said they understood this and they devised a plan to deal with it. But first, there was another hurdle to clear.

Tilbury, the band's original lead guitarist, decided to quit the band. Steele said when it came time to ramp up the promotion of the al-

bum by playing more gigs in a wider radius. Tilbury had other priorities.

"Tim wanted to focus more on his family," Steele said. "And he didn't want to hold us back. So he stepped aside."

With Tilbury out of the picture and a new CD to promote, Horizon Arcs had to find a new lead guitarist. Enter Alex Fernandez.

Fernandez is a Florida native who came to Fort Wayne to work at Sweetwater. On a lark he decided to follow up on an ad the band placed looking for a new guitar player.

"I wasn't even looking to get into a band," Fernandez said. "But they had well-written flyers and had a really good website. I thought I'd listen to their songs, figuring they'd probably suck. I didn't hear a single song I didn't like. I got a hold of them, we hung out and played and I really liked it."

Steele said the CD is getting airplay in places like Greece, where it was featured in a blog, and online on Boston Rock Radio and on the UK radio show "I Don't Hear a Single"

"The goal is to keep playing, to get the CD out there and to make it as far as we can," Steele said. "We're starting to feel some momentum. We just want to see where we can take it."

accept monetary donations securely through PayPal on our website, www.CHFB.org. Every dollar raised feeds a meal to a family of four, and food items collected directly benefit families through distribution.

Conley agrees that the purpose of the evening is only partially about the Christmas songs, which will no doubt raise the roof, but the sense of community is at the heart of the

"The event is bigger than the music because of the need out there," he says. "It's

such a rewarding evening for everybody. It's a magical night, and I'm really proud that so many people come out when there are so many options out there at this time of the year. There are so many special events for the holidays, but people in the community and all of these artistic talents have made this a special night every year."

March On, Comrade Our Peaceful Atoms

March On, Comrade began as a completely different band called Ordinary Van. But when singer and main songwriter Paul Bates quit to move to California, the guys decided they wanted to continue. So Ryan Holquist, Charlie Davis and Chris Leonard got together with John Ptak and Ben

Robinson and began March On, Comrade.

Intentions were the same as before – to make great music – but they went down a different sonic road to get there. The pop inflections of Ordinary Van were still there knocking around in Comrade's songs, but there were loftier ambitions for these five Fort Wayne guys. Longer songs, varied instrumentation and post-rock vastness emerged from the band's rehearsals and writing process. Last year saw the release of their first, self-titled EP, and 2017 saw those lofty ambitions come to fruition with the band's *Sums & Differences* show where the guys played live at the Arts Lab accompanied by a 12-piece chamber orchestra. The results were stunning.

We now have the band's first full-length, the masterful, *Our Peaceful Atoms*. The self-produced, six-track album showcases all that came before it with a newfound tightness and attention to detail. With more instrumentation, brighter hooks and an airiness that gives the album a timeless quality, this could be one of the best releases to come out of the Fort in years.

I know that a lot of bands that fall under the post-rock moniker tend to cringe when put into that category, but if it fits it fits. I don't see it as a knock in any sense. When you say post-rock, it evokes a big sky openness; vast spaces filled with shimmering guitars, tasteful keys, ethereal vocals; and orchestral-like drums that build to dramatic, crashing conclusions. The music evokes bigger questions, existential pondering and symphonic aspirations within the rock n' roll world. March On, Comrade hit all the above while adding their own Midwest magic into the mix. That magic is pop hooks, ear worms that grab you and linger in your brain.


Our Peaceful Atoms revisits a few of the tracks the band debuted at their Sums & Differences show, but their studio curiosity has turned them into something newer and grander. "Terra" has the spatial beauty of Sigur Ros, while "Rodina" wavers on some ethereal plane like a sonic mashing of Explosions in the Sky and Auburn Lull. There's a mechanical feel to this track as well, a meshing of both the organic and the man-made. "Path" continues those human vs. electronic elements to stunning effects. "Westlake" uses those pop hooks beautifully with Ptak creating near perfect melodic diversions in his vocals. The accompaniment of synths and strings only adds to the loftiness. "Lost" adds accordion courtesy of The Snarks' Bart Helms, while last track, "Golden," ends the album on a melancholy note with lilting strings and strummed acoustic.

March On, Comrade wanted to expand their sonic palate this time around, and I believe they succeeded. Tasteful orchestral accompaniments fit in perfectly with the chiming guitars, Ptak's vocals and big rock drums which all go to make one of the best local releases of the year.

March On, Comrade will release *Our Peaceful Atoms* at their December 8 CD release show at the Brass Rail. Grab a copy at the show or head to marchoncomrade.bandcamp.com to grab a digital copy. (*John Hubner*)

Primus *The Desaturating Seven*

When Primus put out their musical tribute to the Gene Wilder classic Willy Wonka and the Chocolate Factory (the aptly-titled Primus & The Chocolate Factory with the Fungi Ensemble) back in 2014, everything about the Bay area prog/funk/freak trio seemed to make perfect sense. Les Claypool, the elastic bass genius and




singer for the band has secretly wanted to be Willy Wonka all these years. Even from the beginning Claypool has given off a vibe of playfulness mixed with something slightly sinister. It came out in the narratives of his songs, most of which were told in the voice of some

The Kentucky Headhunters

Pickin' on Nashville (1989)

Country or Southern rock – there is a difference from an audience standpoint, but there's also a casual crossover appeal. This band handled both genres with reverence and grace and released this debut record after several years (and lineups) of playing the honky-tonk circuit along the Kentucky-Tennessee border. This al-



lowed them to form a sound that was attractive not merely in the region, but also in geographic areas where you wouldn't expect it to flourish.

The opener is a cover of the Bill Monroe classic "Walk Softly on This Heart of Mine," and the Phelps/Young brothers do it justice. "Dumas Walker," with its clever hooks and the foot-stompin' video that followed, is the primer for what today's country artists are producing. "Rock 'n' Roll Angel" is a cross between Dwight Yoakam and mid 80s Alabama, but it carries an almost pop-country impression.

They also covered Glenn Tubb's "Skip a Rope" (recorded in '67 by Henson Cargill). This song, while somewhat upbeat in its tempo, deals with some very dark societal issues: the values children learn from their parents. And yes, great guitars in this as well

"Some Folks Like to Steal" has a great blues-country feel to it, and you can hear a touch of jazz coming from Greg Martin's Gibson Les Paul. The Headhunters also do a very good cover of Don Gibson's "Oh Lonesome Me" and produced a pretty fun video to go along with it.

They were an 80s country band in every sense, but were actually worthy musicians, and they do have a loyal following even today. They continue to release albums and tour to support them. The last one, *On Safari*, was released in 2016, may be their finest work yet. Check these cats out! (*Dennis Donahue*)

bizarro character, while the band made music that was part Parliament, part King Crimson and part Looney Toons. You couldn't help but be in awe listening to songs like "John The Fisherman," "Those Damned Blue Collar Tweakers," "Tommy The Cat," "My Name Is Mud," "Mr. Krinkle" and "Shake Hands With Beef," while at the same time feeling slightly queasy over how unsettling the people in Claypool's world were.

But man, they could play (and no, they really didn't suck.)
As Claypool has gotten older, he's become more comfortable as a storyteller. With Larry LaLonde, Claypool has created a library of musical oddities spanning over 30 years. Pulling inspiration from his childhood was something of a eureka moment for Primus, so much so that they've based their newest record on a children's book that Claypool himself read to his own kids. The Desaturating Seven is a concept record based on the Italian children's book The Rainbow Goblins by Ul de Rico. This album continues the grand return of one of the most unique and uniquely strange American bands in the last three decades.

Like *Primus & The Chocolate Factory with the Fungi Orchestra*, *The Desaturating Seven* is the primo-era Primus, with Les, Ler, and Tim "Herb" Alexander (along with Justin Chancellor as the Goblin Master). There's just something magical about these three when they're together (nothing against Jay Lane or Bryan "Brain" Mantia). The ideas of the book and the colorful artwork seem to flow through beautifully on this record. There's something heavier and darker here as well.

"The Seven" is probably the most Crimson-sounding track Primus have ever committed to an album – like 80s King Crimson. Those interlocking bass and guitar parts are magnificent, and Alexander has a young man's power behind those beats. "The Trek" has the jauntiness we've come to love about Primus. Claypool delivers the story meticulously as the band kick into old school mode with LaLonde's quirky guitar lines and Alexander's tom abuse. "The Scheme" sports a drum and bass part that is both acrobatic and animated like some late night Bakshi find.

As a fan for the last 30 years, my biggest issue with Primus was





Two other pieces, both entitled "Oceanic Vessel," could easily stabilize giant sunflower stalks or a bouquet of roses, though they might look a little antique while supporting new, fresh flowers.

This appearance of antiquity is a testament to Wamsley's skill. These two pieces would appear to have been created a century or two ago rather than something created this century. The two urn-like vases combine both clean, smooth elements and textured, gnarled segments which keep the viewer's visual sense and attention piqued.

Where these two pieces really shine is the textured, rough handles that adorn each side and the painted decorations inscribed around the widths.

The shorter of the two features rudimentary yet somehow emotional fish on top of a graveyard of vas-

es and urns. The taller, more dominant of the two has vases and urns painted on, making the piece existential and meta which is not something you usually hear in regards to "sculpture." This again is a testament to Wamsley's talent and the way she works through clay and glass to create her art.

Sculptors and those who work with more abstract themes cannot always convey exactly what they want through their art. It requires the observer's interpretation to flesh out meaning and purpose.

Wamsley understands this, and urges people to support original art by visiting galleries and attending art receptions.

"Sometimes art is difficult to understand," she says. "Educate yourself and begin to question why some artwork bothers you."

that there never seemed to be enough low end. The songs and musicianship were always there, but on album the songs almost seemed transparent, they were so thin. Claypool has become a rather deft engineer behind the board in the studio. He's given their songs the meat and potatoes they've always deserved. When the stereo is cranked there is proper wall shaking going on.

Both "The Dream" and "The Storm" are a mix of art rock grandiosity and pure prog heaven, as nods to Genesis, Rush and even more Crimson make their presence known. It's a fine way to end the journey.

The Desaturating Seven is a psychedelic musical trip that is heavy at sometimes, funky most of the time and always Primus in top form. The Bay Area trio has never followed trends or attempted to mollycoddle its fans. Primus make the music that they're inspired to create, and that's the best kind of art there is. The Desaturating Seven is inspired weirdness of the highest order. (John Hubner)

Tim McGraw and Faith Hill The Rest of Our Life

If there's a pair of country music artists who are perfectly suited to making an album about cruising gracefully into middle age, it's Faith Hill and Tim McGraw.

After playing a crucial role in the creation of



pop country in the 90s, the married couple largely stepped aside as country turned mean after 2001. Hill has been away from the spotlight for nearly a decade, and McGraw has been busy making music that's far too good-natured to capture the spirit of the times. *The Rest of Our Life* is, surprisingly, the first collection of duets from a couple who have been virtually inseparable for decades.

The album, unfortunately, doesn't kick off well. While it makes perfect commercial success to use a title track written by the insanely popular Ed Sheeran, it makes much less sense to force the 50-year-old McGraw and Hill to sing a song about a golden-year relationship written by a 26-year-old unmarried pop star. The tune consists of Sheeran's typical schmaltzy cliches, and it opens the album up to accusations of empty commercialism.

From there, things get more mature. "The Bed We Made" will probably make younger listeners groan as it evokes visions of their parents' sex lives, but it rings true. "Telluride" is a rollicking tune that shows how Hill and McGraw can still have fun together,

but "Break Easy" admits that grown-up relationships aren't always fun.

There's probably no place for the relatively progressive McGraw and Hill in today's pop country world. McGraw doesn't sing about guns, booze and pickup trucks, and today's country landscape is not hospitable to female vocalists like Hill. But *The Rest of Our Lives* is a solid product created by two singers who are still master of their craft. (*Evan GillespieO*

Bob Seger

I Knew You When

Nostalgia is a surprisingly complicated thing when it comes to Bob Seger's music. He and his fans have always been boosters for the good of days of music, but now Seger's own ode to old-school tunes, "Old Time Rock and Roll," is



legitimately an old-school tune in its own right. So when it's time for Seger to look backward, where does he look? Does he gaze all the way back to the dawn of rock n' roll, or does he content himself with contemplating the half-century of his own career? On *I Knew You When*, he does both, but mostly the latter.

For the most part, Seger's new album stays safely in the wheelhouse he's built for his music over the decades. Songs like "The Highway" and "Runaway Train," as you might guess from their titles, are the kind of propulsive blues-tinged rock that Seger fans have always loved, and "Something More" is a mournful ballad that turns up the volume on rueful memory.

At the heart of the album is Seger's tribute to his friend, late Eagles guitarist Glenn Frey. Both the album's title track and the deluxe-version-ending "Glenn Song" explicitly refer to Frey, a memorial marker that kicks off the era in which Frey's music, which has long been reviled by critics, will now be rehabilitated. It is, in fact, an eerie look forward to what will no doubt happen with Seger's own legacy in the years to come.

A couple of the album's songs touch upon current politics and make clear that the usually reliably conservative Seger has little love for what the Trump era is doing to America. Overall, however, *I Knew You When* is much more a product of the late 20th century than the early 21st. (*Evan Gillespie*)

University in Angola on March 4. The band just started recording sessions for its next album, Living the Dream, tentatively set for a fall 2018 release. Maybe we'll get to hear some of those new songs, but I'm definitely looking forward to hearing just about anything off of Demons and Wizards. That album may be 45 years old, but it still rocks.

Doyle Von Frankenstein of the Misfits has announced more dates for his Abominate the World Tour. Doyle is supporting the release of his second solo album Doyle II: As We Die, released in early 2017. Check out the punk legend, along with opening band Davey Suicide, March 20 at Frankie's in Toledo.

Eighties new wave icon Howard Jones has been busy touring lately, most recently headlining last summer's Retro Futura Tour. Jones just dropped a "Best of" album and will continue to tour next year with a stripped down version of his show that stops at the Center for the Performing Arts in Carmel on March 9. In checking out that venue, I noticed a few other shows of interest: Art Garfunkel visits the venue January 25, Richard Marx stops by January 25 and Weird Al Yankovic performs March 29.

Sons of Apollo might not be a group name you are familiar with, but you probably know most of the individual members. The band includes former Journey and current Trans-Siberian Orchestra singer Jeff Scott Soto along with former Guns N Roses guitarist Bumblefoot, Mr. Big bassist Billy Sheehan and Derek Sherinian and Mike Portnoy, both formerly of Dream Theater. Their music is very progressive, similar to Dream Theater but with modern rock touches. Just a few dates have been announced for the band, as its members are continually busy with the many projects they are all involved in. Check them out February 17 at The Music Factory in Battle Creek.

I'm surprised I haven't heard of this before. Everytime I Die guitarist Jordan Buckley is being sued by a fan who allegedly suffered injuries after Buckley stage-dived onto her during a recent show in Detroit. The fan says she "suffered catastrophic injuries from the incident," including a neck fracture and a concussion and was not warned of Buckley's "intent to jump into the audience, catching her off guard," according to her lawsuit. Forgive me for being a pessimist, but if you are a fan of Everytime I Die or have ever been to a rock concert, you know the chances of getting injured increase the closer you get to the stage. If she was close enough to get jumped on, then she likely should have known that there was a possibility that could happen. But that's just logic. I'm not sure that has any bearing on a legal outcome, and, to be honest, it probably doesn't.



A Strange Year for the Globes

This will be a very strange awards season, unlike any I can remember. The times are tumultuous and downright angry, and how Hollywood will handle the seismic waves washing over the industry seems a daunting task, to say the least. For the first time in probably 25 years, Harvey Weinstein will not attend or spend the tons of money promoting his films or pull the kind of bullying marketing tactics he has become famous for. He will not be missed.

The Golden Globe nominations have been announced, and as usual there are some surprising nominations and some disappointments. The Globes manage to be both eclectic and predictable.

With fewer than 100 members, the Hollywood Foreign Press Association is an odd group, but they put on a great party. They include television categories which is fun. They divide best picture into a comedy/ musical category and a best picture drama category. They do the same for the acting categories, so there are 10 pictures showcased and 30 acting nomina-

Many of the pictures aren't in local theaters yet, but the nominations will give the smaller pictures a boost. Three pictures that are in town now that received multiple nominations are Lady Bird, Three Billboards Outside of Ebbing, Missouri and The Disaster Artist. I highly recommend the first two, and The Disaster Artist is on my must see list.

I, Tonya, the story of Tonya Harding isn't here yet, but its stars Margot Robbie and Alison Janney were nominated, as was the picture. All the Money in the World isn't here yet either, but Chistopher Plummer is nominated for best supporting actor as J. Paul Getty. The Greatest Showman isn't here yet either, but with Hugh Jackman singing and dancing and plenty of nominations, it will probably have a nice long run. The Post isn't here either, but with nominations for Meryl Streep, Tom Hanks, Steven Spielberg and best picture, well, I'm not worried that I won't have plenty of time to see it.

Call Me By Your Name, a gay romance, has been getting glowing reviews and nominations for best picture and Timothee Chalamet as best actor. It will get a wider release and hopefully soon.

Several nominations made me cheer: In the best supporting actress category, Laurie Metcalf for Lady Bird, Alison Janney for I, Tonya and Mary J. Blige for Mudbound. This is a tough category.

A Lighter Shade of Dawkins

Science in the Soul by Richard Dawkins, Random House, 2017

If there's one thing that Twitter has taught us, it's that angry old men are better off not using it. The social media platform is designed to let users pump out short, quick, unfiltered thoughts and reactions, which unfortunately encourages the dissemination of opinions that are often shockingly lacking in nuance, context or grace. When your opinions tend to be controversial, Twitter is a dangerous place to express them, and when your communication style already tends to be abrasive, Twitter can turn your thoughts into 140 characters of coarse-grit sandpaper. In other words, Donald Trump shouldn't be using Twitter if he wants to change anyone's mind about anything, and neither should evolutionary biologist Richard Dawkins.

Science in the Soul, a new collection of writings by Dawkins, attempts to construct a hagiography of the infamously combative atheist activist, and in order to do so it must, out of necessity, avoid his most problematic writings and statements. That means none of his tweets are included in the book, and he's cast by the book's editor as a polemicist rather than a dismissive and often insulting provocateur.

This approach delivers a collection that shows Dawkins at his best, as he argues in support of the scientific method and against the prevalence of uncritical, irrational thinking. It includes speeches, lectures and essays. In these writings, he posits that the scientific method is the only truly reliable way to discover objective truth – a goal that he is sure is obtainable – and he criticizes vehemently those who do not apply rigorously rational thought processes to their quest for answers.

Dawkins doesn't think that science is only useful for helping us to understand the physical world, however. He also thinks we could be better off if we applied the scientific method in all areas of our lives, including in the social realm. For example, he suggests bringing the method to jury trials, using multiple verdicts to try to get to the truth of the matter through experimentation.

It's Dawkins' attempt to fit the square peg of human behavior into the round hole of experimental science that most often exposes the limits in his thinking. He may be right that if we understood every last detail of the physics of human behavior, we might be able



to use physics to find social truth, but we don't. Until we do, Dawkins' proposals are as useless to us as the religion he despises.

You'd be most able to spot Dawkins' missteps in his more informal remarks, but you won't find those here. One of his most controversial stances, for example, is his dismissal of the impact of child sexual abuse. He argued that religious indoctrination is much

more harmful to children than sexual molestation. His argument? Dawkins himself was molested as a child, he explained, and he turned out just fine, so his conclusion is that sexual abuse is not that big a deal. Religious belief, on the other hand, makes people into monsters. The argument is not only disturbing and perplexing in its lack of empathy, it also displays some extremely shaky logic.

The bigger problem, though, is that Dawkins is not very nice. In his informal remarks and, of course, on Twitter, he is regularly pedantic and insulting. He often calls people who disagree with him idiots, and he revels in mocking their intelli-

gence and beliefs. Like Trump, he is drawn to a platform that allows him to effortlessly hurl invective, and when he is caught being wrong-headed, he doesn't admit that he might be wrong. Instead, he expresses regret at not explaining himself well enough so that intellectually inferior readers could understand what he really meant.

The result? Dawkins consistently undermines his best objective arguments (which are typically difficult to refute) by belittling the people who most need to be convinced. He's great at rallying the people who share his beliefs and astoundingly effective at turning away those who are skeptical.

If Dawkins were a pure champion of objectivity, he would present his thoughts in total – warts and all – and allow us to judge for ourselves whether we think he's an intellectual leader worth following. As *Science in the Soul* illustrates, he doesn't trust us to do that, and that makes him a spectacularly ineffective agent of change.

If you haven't seen *Dunkirk*, try to see it when it cycles back in to town for awards season. It should be seen on a big screen and is a wonderful World War II drama nominated for best picture and best director.

Get Out, the record breaking horror/satire scored nominations for best picture and best actor for Daniel Kaluuya, but no consideration for writer/director Jordan Peele.

The directing category is a big let down. Five guys, and only del Toro adds a bit of spice. There's no nomination for Greta Gerwig, though her screenplay is nominated. And no Patty Jenkins. How many awards does Steven Spielberg need? Meryl Streep has occasionally taken herself out of consideration to give fellow actors a chance; maybe Spielberg should consider following her lead. There are no *Wonder Woman* nominations in any major category.

But at least the actresses nominated in the drama

category are a formidable collection of women, each of them with a fight on her hands. I am really looking forward to seeing Jessica Chastain in *Molly's Story*, based on the true story of the runner of high stakes poker who fell afoul of the authorities.

I can't find any documentary nominations. I was hoping *Bombshell: The Hedy Lamar Story* would get a nomination that would bring it to town. I want to see that pretty face getting her due for her contributions to GPS and Bluetooth technology.

The 75th Golden Globes will be presented on Sunday January 7. Seth Myers is hosting, and the show is on NBC. Myers can be very political, but NBC has had its own share of turmoil, so hopefully the evening won't get too serious. After all, the 800 lb. gorilla won't actually be in the room.



Peanuts Kids Deliver Spirit of Christmas

Each year one of the highlights of the holiday season is the influx of special programming, many of our favorites being shows we've been watching for nearly a half century. Or, in the case of *A Charlie Brown Christmas*, more than that. It's notable that even as network programming has changed and access to these shows can be immediate, there's still something to be said for watching it aired when we can share the experience with others we don't even know. Or ever see.

Still better than that is watching the show with a theater audience, an experience not to be missed. Fort Wayne Youtheatre is providing that very experience this season, and it is a wonder to behold. Sharing the pleasure of Charlie Brown's yuletide ups and downs makes the experience funnier and more touching. Lines we can all recite by heart, moments we have watched time and time again, still get laughs and sighs of appreciation from gathering of hundreds. Familiarity, in this case, clearly breeds contentment.

But not all of it was completely familiar or expected. For a television show which runs less than 30 minutes, there are additional scenes and



exchanges which make the show a more fully rounded theatrical experience, and those all add delightfully to the staging. The young cast – and

they're all young, since no adults appear in the Peanuts stories – is exceptional. Of particular note is Harley Babbitt who accomplishes the difficult task of bringing Charlie Brown to life. The other characters are equally believable in

their roles, particularly impressive since we've all "known" these iconic figures for years and have expectations for how they should sound move and behave.

While each moment is touching (the very familiar ending even manages to produce a tear or two if you let it), the standout component for the live staging of *A Charlie Brown Christmas* is the music. With a live jazz trio representing the only adults on stage (and they are definitely present, though not intrusively so), the show's

only adults on stage (and they are definitely present, though not intrusively so), the show's amazing soundtrack, which has become some of the season's most enduring melodies, fills the theater with a gentle force which brings Christmas to life. The moment the cast begins singing "Christmastime Is Here" may be one of the sweetest sounds of the theater year, so perfectly do they capture the sounds we've

come to love.
