Some bands are born from a group of friends who are looking to play together in some configuration. Others are formed when someone has an idea, a concept, so compelling that they can't wait to take it to a stage. The latter is decidedly how Gypsy Bandit came to be just about a year ago. Kirk Johnson, a longtime music veteran, started putting together his idea for a new band last April, a fairly ambitious approach he felt he could put into action.

"I put a concept together in April, and it was the original concept for the band," says Johnson. "I grew up going to concerts at the Coliseum, bands like Mötley Crüe, Kiss, Rush. It was a show, it was a performance. I wanted to see if I could take the concert concept of those bands and move it to a smaller venue here in town. Something that would feature great music, great vocals, and a real show. Performance art."

Johnson is now joined by Rob Thunder on bass and vocals, Rich Davis and Steve Kerns on lead and rhythm guitars and Trent Bowers on drums and vocals. It has taken him some time to come to that lineup, but it seems to be a good fit all around.

"I had two original partners when this began, and they aren't there anymore. I was the sole operator when they left, so the lineup has changed, but we've kept that same theme.'

The other band members, like Johnson, have a wealth of experience from various places in northern Indiana, primarily the Fort Wayne and South Bend areas. While they juggle commitments with Gypsy Bandit and other bands, there was precious little time to get their feet wet before the first time they played

"Our first gig was also our third practice, but we started playing a lot right away. Sometimes it can take years to get to the point that we did last year. Between April and December, we played 36 shows, and we have more than 40 already scheduled for this year. And we'll keep adding to that number. In some ways we're the best kept secret in Fort Wayne, but we're also the hardest working band in local show business."

Johnson says that Gypsy Bandit define themselves as a "rock band. Period." They focus on audience-pleasing music performed in an energetic style that exceeds the sometimes tight quarters in which they play. They're serious musicians who don't take themselves too seriously.

"We like to take some songs and personalize them, make them our own," says Johnson. "If we're not enjoying what we're doing, then what's the point of doing it? We're not making a ton of money so we better be having fun.'

The band is quickly establishing itself in a fairly crowded field of local music performers, one which is packed with veteran favorites and new bands which join the fray every day. Johnson thinks it's more important all the time to find a unique way to bring people into the fold.

"I think the local music scene is going through a transitional time, and not just here but all over - and rightly so. The competition for live music is overwhelming because great music is just a click away on your phone or hand-held devices. Shows like The Voice and American Idol have upped the ante too."

Standing out in the crowd is the best way to compete in that environment, and that's where Johnson's original concept for the band comes into play.

"When I pay money to see a band at the Memorial Coliseum, I want to see some action. I want a performance that's a little dangerous. If I go to a local club, I want to see more than four people cemented in place while the front guy is glued to the microphone stand. I want to see a real performance. I want some physicality. You can turn on a radio if you just want to hear a song. If I'm paying a cover charge to see a band, I want to see something inspiring."

In putting together the lineup for Gypsy Bandit. Johnson wanted to see that same energy and enthusiasm from everyone, not just from his performance on lead vocals. He also wanted to put together a setlist that reflected that same energy.

"What we play on any given night is 100 percent audience-driven," says Johnson. "We have about 150 songs that we play right now, and we can do anything from classic rock to country, but if someone says 'I'd really like to hear some blues,' most of us have been playing for 20 or 30 years at this point and can give the audience what they want to hear.'

With options from 80s rock to funk, Johnson says Gypsy Bandit can play Guns N Roses one minute and Tom Jones the next. He expects they'll be adding more songs by Aerosmith, Queen and Sammy Hagar in the months to come as well. But while pleasing their audience is a top priority, Johnson says giving back to the community is also important to the band. In June they'll participate in the Ride for Robbie benefit event at Fort Wayne Harley-Davidson, and Johnson says they've already been involved in other charity endeavors in their short history together. Still shy of their first anniversary, Gypsy Bandit are ready to take on the music scene in northern Indiana and beyond.

"Since we formed in April, we've played every weekend, and many weekends we're double booked. If you want to know where to catch us, just check out our website. We'll have plenty of shows coming up this year."

Since singer-songwriter and Americana enthusiast Matthew Szlachetka wants to be known professionally as "Szlachetka" (sans the Matthew), we should probably get a handle on how it's pronounced.

One of his goals for his career in-

volves a certain kind of souvenir T-shirt. "I have thought about getting to that

point where you have the tour with the name attached to it." he said. "You have the t-shirt that says, 'Endless Summer Tour 2017.' You reminisce about it with your bandmates: "Man, remember that? We toured from June through August.'

"I can't even conceive of that," Szlachetka said. "People ask me, 'Hey, when's your tour?" And I say, 'Well, I am currently on the 2018 tour.'

He said he'll know he's made it when all of his tour dates actually fit on a T-shirt.

Don't get the wrong idea, though: Szlachetka enjoys touring.

He said the collapse of the music business meant that musicians once again had to prove that they could play.

"My opinion of a song is that if you can't play a song on a single instrument and get the main sentiment across and have people be moved by the song," Szlachetka said, "then you haven't written a good song."

Szlachetka spent his teenage years in

Longmeadow, Massachusetts, not far from a "five-college area" that includes Smith College, Mount Holyoke College, Amherst College, Hampshire College and the University of Massachusetts Amherst.

Not surprisingly, this five-college area is a hotbed of creativity and invention. The "hometown" referenced in the title of his

"I didn't want to go into business or marketing or finance or medicine or law or anything like that," he said. "But they were incredibly supportive. Their philosophy was. 'Find out what your passion is and work your ass off at it.

Szlachetka had his eye on Los Angeles, but he started in San Diego where some friends lived.

> "I had a feeling I would end up in L.A., but I just needed a place to get my feet wet first," he said.

> It's probably safe to say that many, if not most, musicians who give L.A. a try end up moving to less competitive, more merciful places.

> But Szlachetka, who spent 12 years in the City of Angels before moving to Nashville, said he tends to thrive in places and situations where the odds are stacked against him.

> "I'll always love L.A.," he said. "It was a formidable part of my life. I think it shaped who I am as an artist and a performer and a writer. I like areas where the competition is super high because I think it pushes you to do the best that you can."

In L.A, Szlachetka had some a success with a band he co-founded called The Northstar Session. The band recorded five albums, was featured on the TV dramedy Parenthood and opened for Matthew Sweet, Chris Isaak, Cracker, John Waite and Brandi Carlile.

But the band ran its course, and so did L.A. Nashville, where Szlachetka had been traveling for session work and songwriting collaborations, began to look

mighty tempting.

"L.A. was getting way too crowded," he said. "With Nashville, it reminds me a lot of growing up in western Massachusetts. It has a really, really cool urban setting. But then within 10 minutes in any direction – you can find yourself on the most gorgeous, back country road where you can clear your head. It's the perfect mix of city and nature."

Musicians are more supportive of each other in Nashville, Szlachetka said.

"The biggest thing I have noticed is like if you're really good, you work really hard and you're a good person, people recognize that and want to help you," he said.

In Nashville, Szlachetka reconnected with a friend, Jamie Kent. Like Szlachetka. Kent had grown up in western Massachusetts, but the men didn't meet until after they'd both moved away from western Massachusetts.

Like most parents, Szlachetka's mom and dad were a little concerned about the precariousness of his aspirations.

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
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
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A Treat for Northsiders

------ Review • Shorty's Steakhouse-------

Just a short 15-minute drive from Dupont in the heart of downtown Garrett lies one of the best-kept dining secrets of northeast Indiana.

Shorty's Steakhouse boasts a menu featuring mouthwatering wet aged steaks, fresh seafood, prime rib (available on Fridays and Saturdays) and a handful of unique main dishes. For northsiders, Shorty's should be added to your regular dining out rotation, especially when you realize you live closer to downtown Garrett than downtown Fort Wayne!

The ambiance is cozy and reminds me of Henry's or Calhoun Street Soups Salads & Spirts in Fort Wayne. Shorty's small space features an ornate antique bar and a tin ceiling, providing a sort of time warp to earlier days. We occupied a corner booth near the back and enjoyed a quiet and romantic dinner. We are looking forward to our return visit when we will likely belly up to the bar - it simply looked like a fun and relaxing place to enjoy a cocktail and dinner.

Here are some highlights from the menu.

Crab Mac 'n Cheese, \$16 – My favorite from the appetizers menu, this dish is large enough to share at the table and rich enough that you'll want to. It is made with Monterey cheddar, Parmesan crust, green chili salsa and crab. It has a bit of a kick, making it unique and interesting. I will definitely get it again.

6 oz. Filet Mignon, \$24 – I typically don't order steaks when I am dining out because we have perfected the craft of grilling the perfect steak at home and I am often disappointed at restaurants. Not so with this fi-

let. I ordered mine medium rare, and it was cooked just right. I opted for the garlic mashed potatoes as my side, which turned out to be the perfect complement to the steak. I savored each bite of the wet-aged, delicious filet and can't wait to go back for another.

Shrimp 'N Grits, \$20 – I love shrimp 'n grits.

There's a place in Florida that I visit with my parents several times a year, and they have the best shrimp 'n grits I've ever had – until now. Shorty's dish is delectable and is made with creamy Cajun shrimp and sau-

sage, roasted red pepper and asiago grits. Like the Crab Mac 'n Cheese, there is a kick to this dish, but it is complemented well by the savory, cheesy grits and roasted red pepper flavor.

Shorty's also features daily specials. When we visited, it was a pepper-crusted porterhouse, which we ordered and enjoyed immensely. The pepper wasn't too overpowering, but rather added a nice flavor to the meat. It was also cooked to our specific temperature.

The dessert menu changes frequently, as well. We ordered a lovely chocolate torte on our visit and loved every bite. It was served with some crystallized sugar and fresh strawberries, making it a decadent end to a fantastic meal.

Be sure to check out the drink menu too. There is a

nice selection of specialty drinks and cocktails, including Shorty's Old Fashioned, which rates very high in my book. It is made with Old 55 Bourbon. Aperol, Luxardo & bitters barrel

If you're in the area during lunch time, Shorty's has a tasty burger menu with some interest-

ing options like the Jalapeno Bacon Stuffed Burger and the Jamaican Me Crazy, made with jalapenos, Jamaican relish and pepperjack. The lunch menu also features a large selection of wraps and sandwiches.

Szlachetka and Kent knew they were great friends, but they would come to understand is that they are great collaborators as well.

"We noticed that on a writing level, we clicked," he said. "We can get down a song in, like, an hour or two max"

In June of 2017, the performance by the duo caught the notice of Rolling Stone magazine.

Kent and Szlachetka were cited as one of the best things the magazine's writers saw at the CMA Music Festival that year.

Kent and Szlachetka co-wrote four songs that ap-

pear on Heart of My Hometown.

Szlachetka said he has been touring long enough now that he has made friends in many places, including Fort Wayne.

The heart of a hometown can be anywhere a person wants it to be, he said.

"It's nice to have a sense of home in the places I visit," Szlachetka said. "There are people in Fort Wayne who have become family to me. As hard as touring can be, what makes it easier and more rewarding is that I get to reconnect with these people and places."

Jeff Rosenstock Post-

Jeff Rosenstock's new album, Post-, starts out with an uncharacteristic seven-and-a-half minute song entitled "USA" that lets the audience know his political nature has not gone by the wayside.

The song starts off fast and abrasive, definitely in keeping with Rosenstock's style. Soon a spacey,



organ-driven dream-pop bridge leads the listener out among the stars and away from the country, but also away from Rosenstock's musical tendencies. After a crowd's repetition of "We're tired. We're bored. We're tired and bored," rises out of the atmosphere and builds alongside the drumming it's laid out upon, the chunky guitars and other rhythm-driven parts are realigned and hit heavier upon the build.

"Yr Throat" gives us what we expect from Rosenstock and gang: an under-three-minute song that relies on repetition and a catchy chorus with an even catchier bridge that is self-reflective and intro-spective. "All This Useless Energy" is only slightly slower, but the additions of falsetto and pushed higher notes paired with wavy, despondent lead guitar ramblings let it fit right in and add an even more emotional backbone that the album has been building on with each

Halfway through Post-, "Powerlessness" sounds like one of Rosenstock's first hits; it has the feel of that one song most local acts end with that's really fast and has just enough catchiness for fans to hold onto. In this case, however, Rosenstock's matured songwriting packs a ton of self-analyzing content into its short length.

The slowest song on the record, "TV Stars," runs longer than four minutes soley because of its slower tempo, but it has just as much punch as the faster songs. "Melba," the seventh song on the album is almost a throwaway; it's slightly less catchy than the rest, and at just over three minutes it's barely worth the effort of skipping, so just accept the filler and let the rest of the songs speak for the

"9/10" is the best song you're likely to hear this early in the year. It's the same level of self-examination as the rest of Rosenstock's catalog, but the longing that accompanies the lyrics, paired with the slowed tempo, trippy guitar solo and synthesizers, make it a standout on a record with some fairly loud noises and perspectives.

Post- ends with a song over 11 minutes, which is fairly preposterous, even for an album with six songs clocking in under three minutes. The message, "We're not going to let them win / They're not going to win again" is repeated fairly constantly through the first four minutes and keeps the lofty song mostly afloat. If the album had ended with "9/10" fading into the instrumental part of "Let Them Win," which makes up the rest of the song, it probably would've left a deeper message with the listeners. But, the message does linger on, and with the accompaniment of the guitar solo and strings fading out over many minutes, it helps to end this mature, worthy, fast and brooding album on a strong note. The Soft Moon

Criminal

Luis Vasquez seems like a guy with a lot of existential turmoil to unpack. His work as The Soft Moon is a discography of pain, anger and dark thoughts wrapped in a tattered post-punk bow. The music is always based in rhythm and percussive sway, followed by industrial-grade Goth – tribal,



echoed rhythms backing flanged bass lines and nightmare melodies that would sound at home in some underground S&M club in gritty nightlife Berlin in the late 70s/early 80s.

His first two records fronting The Soft Moon were mostly instrumental affairs with Vasquez' heavily effected voice occasionally peaking out from behind the shadows. But on 2015s excellent Deeper, The Soft Moon emerged as more of a singer-songwriter project than it ever had before. Vasquez seemed to be trying to exorcise some ancient demons that he'd been carrying his whole life.

Now, The Soft Moon return with a new album called Criminal on Sacred Bones Records (the first for the New York label). Criminal continues Vasquez' exorcising of past demons. The album is dark,

UFO

Force It (1975)

UFO had been flying around Europe for a while - and pretty much everywhere except the United States - until this album finally charted in 1975. With Phil Moog on the mic and guitars from Michael Schenker, UFO bridged the gap between heavy metal and hard rock during the



middle of the decade. Force It opens with Schenker shredding it on "Let It Roll," a hard number with shades of Black Sabbath and The Scorpions. It takes a turn midway for a moment but finishes strong.

"Shoot Shoot" follows and fills the speakers with some British hard rock. Nothing fancy here, just a thick dose of Pete Way on the bass and some practical percussion from Andy Parker.

Side one closes with "Out in the Street," a track that has a nice keyboard arrangement from Chick Churchill (Ten Years After). It has a romantic feel to it, but its grinding tempo fits the sound that the band was looking for.

Side two blasts off with "Mother Mary," a guitar-frenzied rock song that, again, has a bridge that takes the tempo down, though not enough to diminish the grungy feel of the band's sound. And Schenker reminds you that this was indeed a rock band. "Too Much of Nothing" has a darker sound lyrically and is one of the riskier arrangements on the record, but this was a guitar band, and the pedals were used with a lot of inventive styles and sounds.

The album closes with "This Kid's," a track that has the bawdy Thin Lizzy feel, but also a Southern California-L.A. sound feel.

UFO have released over 20 records, and their latest, titled Salentino Cuts (2017), covers Mellencamp, The Doors, The Animals and Tom Petty and includes some other nice surprises. (Dennis Donahue)

heavy and uninhibited and recalls Trent Reznor's most jagged and personal watershedding in NIN as well as Robert Smith's antagonizing of death and despair on albums like Faith and Pornography. Criminal is The Soft Moon's heaviest and most earnest album yet.

When asked about his new album, Vasquez said, "Guilt is my biggest demon and has been following me since childhood. Everything I do strengthens the narrative that I am guilty. The concept of Criminal is a desperate attempt to find relief by both confessing to my wrongdoings and by blaming others for their wrongdoings that have affected me."

With guilt as a jumping off point, "Burn" opens The Soft Moon's new album with a healthy dose of industrial techno and self-hatred as Vasquez repeats the line "I can't control myself" over and over again until he leads us into a soaring (at least for The Soft Moon) chorus. The song is constructed with precision and steely perfection, building into a Wax Trax-like jubilation. "Choke" is slow and menacing. Vasquez covers his vocals in effects, like someone wearing a mask to cover their shame. This might be more for show, The Soft Moon's own morality play covered in Latin rhythms, nightlife hedonism and electronic provocation. "Give Something" wavers in the air like a thick smoke. It brings to mind early Cure and darker Depeche Mode. "I don't wanna lose my mind/that's why I keep you so close" Vasquez sings over prickly synth lines and a melancholy bass line.

Elsewhere, "Like A Father" is an all-out techno fever dream. "Something's got to give" and "You're the ghost of my problem" are sung by a disjointed voice over a dance floor-ready club beat. "It Kills" brings to mind The Soft Moon's fever dream of an album, Zeros, with its mix of mournful longing and syncopated desperation. "ILL" captures the claustrophobic doom of Aphex Twin while peppering the proceedings with Afro-Cuban rhythmic flair. Vasquez is a master builder of electronic walls of sound, as this track proves heartily. "Born Into This" is pushed along with industrial heft as machine gun blasts of percussion push the track into Suicide territory. 'Criminal" pulls you into a cycle of regret and need for forgiveness.

There isn't anybody making confessional music like The Soft Moon. Vasquez makes musical art that is immediate and all-encompassing. He creates a multi-emotional experience every time he puts





out an album. A record from The Soft Moon wants to engage all the senses. You not only hear The Soft Moon's music, you can feel it. It's a textural experience. *Criminal* is an album that wades in guilt; both deserved and self-inflicted. Whether or not Luis Vasquez finds some kind of closure remains to be seen. Either way, it's an engaging and visceral experience. (*John Hubner*)

Sons of Apollo Psychotic Symphony

When an album begins with a song that lasts longer than 10 minutes, you know you're in for a long journey that's going to take more than a few listens to fully digest. *Psychotic Symphony*, the debut from Sons of Apollo – an all-star band made up of Mike Portnoy and Derek Sherinian, both formerly of Dream Theater, former Guns N Roses guitarist Ron "Bumblefoot" Thal, Billy Sheehan of Mr. Big fame and singer extraordinaire Jeff Scott Soto – is just that



sort of album. It's more of a marathon than a sprint, but it is well worth the time for those willing to put in the work.

Kicking off with "God of the Sun," Sons of Apollo quickly serve notice that if the rest of the songs are as good as this one, then this is going to be one hell of an album. Leaning heavily toward the progressive metal that Dream Theater helped bring to mainstream audiences, the talents of the individual members of the band are on full display here. While each musician adds something unique to the mix, they manage to come together to form a cohesive unit that sounds like they have been playing together for years.

"Coming Home" is a bit more of a straight-forward rocker that shows off Soto's talents as well as Thal's ability to adapt his playing to the fit of the song. "Signs of the Time" features impressive guitar fireworks from Thal and sucks the listener in as the journey through the album continues. The seemingly purposeful linearity of the second and third songs is abandoned as we move forward with "Labyrinth." As the title suggests, this song is a maze of musical directions coming together in a satisfying treat for the auditory senses. "Alive" is dark and heavy and the only thing close to a ballad the album has to offer. Lest you forget you are listening to some extremely talented musicians, "Lost In Oblivion" and "Figaro's Whore" bring you back to reality with some amazing showmanship and individual performances. "Opus Maximus" wraps up the disc in a blazing finale by incorporating the best prog chops everyone has to offer.

The album is packed from front to back with impressive performances, but it relies heavily on the chemistry between Sherinian and Portnoy to drive most of the tunes. While not known as progressive musicians, Sheehan and Thal sound right at home playing the music of this genre and Soto slays every chance he gets to interject some lyrics into the mix. *Psychotic Symphony* is most assuredly a progressive metal album, but it's more accessible than is experimental, so even a novice listener of the genre should be able to enjoy it. Montgomery Gentry

Here's to You

It's tempting – no, it's downright irresistible – to read all kinds of big picture themes into *Here's to You*, the final album from the country-rock duo Montgomery Gentry. Not long after the album's tracks were recorded, Troy Gentry died in a helicopter crash, virtually guaranteeing that the album, when released, would be seen as a reflection on the loss of half the duo. The truth is, though, that *Here's to You* is almost certainly no different than it would



have been, even without the tragedy: a solid, if predictable, collection of the kinds of songs you'd expect from a country act that cut its teeth in the 90s.


Gentry strikes a poignant chord with "Better Me," a song about a guy thinking about improving himself as he approaches middle age. There might be some sense that he was reflecting deeply on mortality if it weren't the same song that virtually every pop country singer has sung as he approached 50 years of age.

And that's true of the rest of *Here's to You*, too. All the usual suspects are here. There's a drawling ode to Southern down-home living (and it includes the same illadvised country-boy rap that has been unfortunately ubiquitous in pop country over the past couple of decades). There are at least two songs about the wonders of booze and two songs that praise the heck out of the American working man.

The album serves up a couple of ballads, some rollicking Southern rock, some twangy pop country, a tune or two that could be a barroom anthem. In short, it's a Montgomery Gentry album in the old tradition, and it doesn't suggest that the duo ever planned to change very much, no matter what. In that sense, it's a fitting memorial and something fans can be thankful for. (*Evan Gillespie*)

Oscar Talk Begins for *Black Panther*

Tops at the Box: For the fourth consecutive week Ryan Coogler's *Black Panther* took the No. 1 spot at the U.S. box, selling another \$65 million, bringing the flick's so-far total to \$501 million in the U.S. and just under \$900 million worldwide. The 2019 Oscar talk has already started for this one, with a lot of people suggesting that *Black Panther* could get both Best Picture and Best Director nominations as well as some technical nominations. But does it even really matter? Do Oscars matter when your films make a a billion dollars at the box office? Is further validation necessary? I suppose such attention would be great for Coogler, who almost certainly has a huge, important career ahead of him.

Also at the Box: Francis Lawrence's sexy spy film, Red Sparrow, took the No. 2 spot at the U.S. box over its first weekend of release, selling a disappointing \$17 million while playing on over 3,000 screens. Is the Jennifer Lawrence era over already? I don't think so, but she's definitely going through a post-Hunger Games transitional period. I like her; she takes risks and chooses projects with interesting filmmakers. Eli Roth's Death Wish took the No. 3 spot over its first weekend, selling just over \$13 million. That's about what everyone expected from a remake from sortahack Roth while doing a remake starring the old man version of Bruce Willis. Looks fun to me. Game Night continued to surprise, selling another \$10.7 million over its second weekend, bringing the flick's 10-day worldwide sales total to just under \$50 million. Sure, the cast is solid, but I don't think anyone expected a John Francis Daley film to sell big. Rounding out last



weekend's Top5 was *Peter Rabbit* which sold another \$10 million, bringing the movie's four-week total to \$84 million. Looked like a flop to me, but the children's movie options are extra weak right now.

New This Week: With the Oscar season over and Black Panther likely to start slowing down, four studios are putting out wide releases this weekend. starting with Gringo, a stylized action comedy staring David Oyelowo, Joel Edgerton, Amanda Seyfried and Charlize Theron. Looks like the kind of movie 20something white guys from Middle America liked in the early 2000s. Pretty sure I'll skip this one, and I'm pretty sure most everyone else will, too. Also out everywhere is action thriller *The Hurricane Heist*, horror flick Strangers: Prey at Night and, most importantly, Ava DuVernay's adaptation of A Wrinkle in Time. DuVernay's latest stars Oprah Winfrey, Reese Witherspoon, Mindy Kaling, Chris Pine, Zach Galifianakis and ScreenTime favorites Michael Pena and Gugu Mbatha-Raw (who has already been in three films this year). And, finally, we have Armando Iannucci's new flick The Death of Stalin, starring Olga Kurylenko. Steve Buscemi, Paddy Considine, Rubert Friend and Jaffrey Tambor. Should be both funny and smart.

Will "time's up" have a lasting effect? Only when inclusion riders are normal and when offenders do time. Focusing on the future by championing inclusion riders is the long term solution.

ScreenRant: That was a strange Oscar ceremony in my book. I filled out a ballot before the show and ultimately got nine of the top 10 categories right, but, still, it felt weird. There was no one movie that felt like a sure-thing Best Picture bet. The narrative changed from *Three Billboards* to *The Shape of Water* to *Get Out* over the last month, with Guillermo del Toro's *The Shape of Water* ultimately winning the night's two big awards, Best Picture and Best Director. My favorite moment of the night was finally seeing cinematographer Roger Deakins (known for such films as *Sid and Nancy*, *The Shawshank Redemption*, *Fargo* and so many other great flicks) win the Best Cinematography award (for *Blade Runner 2049*) after losing 13 times.

A Perfect *Hamlet* for Our Times

This year's Shakespearean installment at First Presbyterian Theater in downtown Fort Wayne features an all-female cast that presents The Bard's famous vengeful son in a truly refreshing manner. Readers are probably familiar with the highly publicized footnote that men and boys were the only performers before-, during- and shortly after Shakespeareanera theater. Thus, what can any cast, 500 years after Shakespeare's death, do to breathe new life into this story of vengeance?

While this highly talented troupe of *Hamlet* remains true to the Elizabethan era language, the performance simultaneously serves as an appealing alternative to those familiar with the tragedy and as a

progressive introduction to Shakespeare for any young audience member.

I'll spare you the synopsis for two clear reasons: You either know the play (probably from high school or college) or you don't know the play. Members from both of these camps should catch

this two-week running because Shakespeare's words and plotlines have a proclivity to offer more to an audience each and every time. This performance can be a fantastic opportunity to ease the uninitiated into the pinnacle of the classic tragedies.

For those who know the text but have yet to see it performed live, there may not be a better opportunity to have "See a Shakespearean play" struck from a bucket list. Lastly, for those who have seen a film version, read the play or viewed a mixed-gender live performance, please note that it is likely that this female cast will still impress and provide something different than ever before.

Halee Bandt exhibits great range in emotion and presence as young Prince Hamlet from the opening sequence to the final critical moments. Her master-

ful handling of multiple dense monologues establishes her among the elite performers to grace this historic stage. Fort Wayne theater veteran Kate Black excels as Claudius, whose staunchy presence builds the required, obvious tension throughout each scene. Nancy Kartholl, who recently appeared as Grace in Faith Healer, thrives as Polonius, whose protection of his daughter and whose loyalty to the king serves

as a recurring battle with the title character. Returning to the stage after a decade-long hiatus is June Rambo, whose performance of right-handman Horatio was among the most noteworthy of this large cast. Additionally, newcomer Izzy Chilian proves she belongs in

the theater with her impressive secondary role as the prince's love interest, Ophelia. Kira Downey, an admitted fan of Shakespeare, astounds as the Ghost. Her passion for Shakespeare's language is apparent and her performance arrests the audience in each of her scenes. Finally of note, the roles of Rosencrantz and Guildenstern are executed quite well by Tala Munsterman and Marissa Steiber, respectively. The remaining actors of this outstanding 20-member cast all serve as worthwhile catalysts throughout the play.

Directed by Thom Hofrichter, *Hamlet* might be just what American society needs in 2018. While it may be too soon to state that the play is experiencing a coast-to-coast resurgence, the themes within it could

The Conflict of the Real and Unreal

It has been a 23-year long journey that has led me to this production. *The Glass Menagerie* was the first play I did in college. It began a relationship with the director that would transform from teacher, to mentor, to family. It is the knowledge he bestowed upon me that guides my purpose in directing this piece.

As a director, you always approach a play with an idea of "What can I do that is new with this production."

My concept is a derivative of what I have seen, heard and envisioned over many years remembering *The Glass Menagerie*.

"The play is memory. Being a memory play, it is dimly lit, it is not realistic."

This line from the opening of the play was the springboard of my interpretation. The emo-

tions and words of these characters are more important than the walls, paint, or props.

A term I have learned during the decades of reflection on this play is cognitive dissonance.

Cognitive dissonance is the mental conflict that occurs when beliefs or assumptions are contradicted by new information. The unease or tension that the

conflict arouses in people is relieved by one of several defensive maneuvers: they reject, explain away, or avoid the new information; they persuade themselves

that no conflict really exists; they reconcile the differences; or they resort to any other defensive means of preserving stability or order in their conceptions of the world and of themselves.

The concept was developed in the 1950s, years after *The Glass Menagerie* was produced in New York. I

believe there are two parts to the play.

One is the memories, not realistic. The other, is the very real conflict of three individuals. The conflict is not always between themselves, but sometimes between them and a world of reality that they were somehow set apart from.





not be more relevant. In his director's notes, Hofrichter suggests there may be more to the opening line "Who's there?" than just the curiosity of a soldier who is not sure if he's just seen the spirit of a recently deceased king. The play has existential undertones and guides audiences to find a part of themselves in Hamlet. The oft-quoted reflection monologue ("To be or not to be ...") potentially encapsulates a second level of self-identity and self-worth when performed by a female.

Not to be overlooked with this performance is the costume design of Jeanette Walsh. Through an atypical, erratic pattern, each character's clothes work well to suggest a profound sense of individuality, a theme that has always been apparent in this play but is even more so in this production. IPFW theater professor John O'Connell lends his deep resumé as fight director. Additionally, Rae Surface returns as the technical director and appears as two separate characters.

This sturdy ensemble cast carries with it the shadows of generations of women who, it stands to reason, were unsung heroes on some level in society. This direct challenge of theater traditions, especially with the expectations that accompany any of Shakespeare's titles, sends a clear message that those traditions must stay in the past. It further serves as a vivid reminder of what had to happen over the past several centuries for the public to have access to Shakespeare's work performed by a cast of females who range from middle-school aged young ladies to seasoned stage veteran performers.
