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Orchestrating Page & Plant

------ • The Music of Led Zeppelin

In the last several years the combination of classic rock and symphony orchestras once an unlikely alliance - has become far more common. Some bands, notably Kansas and the Moody Blues, have toured the country supported by local orchestras and have rejuvenated their popularity by branching

But just as often, it's the orchestras themselves that bring some of the most iconic rock music to life, offering a chance for younger audiences to look at orchestral music in a new way. And as anyone who saw the recent David Bowie and Prince tribute can attest, the Fort Wayne Philharmonic can rock with the best of them.

The music of Led Zeppelin perfectly lends itself to a symphonic interpretation, something Robert

Plant and Jimmy Page themselves realized when they put together their 1994 No Quarter concert, an "Unledded" version of their work which featured both acoustic and symphonic versions of classic Zeppelin songs.

Just two years later, conductor and arranger Brent Havens developed a show, The Music of Led Zeppelin, which combines the rock band sensibility with orchestral arrangements to bring the music of Zeppelin alive in a new and unusual way. Key to the success of that effort has been singer Randy Jackson, whose band, Zebra, came to fame in the 1980s. Jackson's background lends itself to the complexity of the songs he's singing with The Music of Led Zeppelin.

"I grew up in New Orleans, and even though my parents were both lawyers, they also both played music," says Jackson. "My dad played the drums, and my mom was a singer and played the piano. They had a Les Paul and Mary Ford greatest hits album, and my brother and I liked that album a lot. I was little when the Beatles came out in 1964, but my parents took us to see them, which left a big impression on me. I was a big Beatles

He was encouraged to follow his love of music and played the baritone horn in the

school band as well as playing guitar and piano on his own. For a time, his love of music was competing with his love of sports, but fate intervened to help him make a choice.

"I was playing music and playing football, but in high school I had a back problem. It was a congenital problem, and I could either have surgery to fix it or give up playing contact sports. I opted to give up contact been used to being in a three-piece band with Zebra, so the three of us can just look at each other and shift gears if we want to. But with the orchestra, it works as long as everybody listens to everybody else. And it's still possible to jam and stretch something out a bit. even with the orchestra. We all just pay attention to the conductor so it's not restric-

> sports. That's when I really started focusing on music."

> He went to college to study music, in fact, but once Zebra were formed and signed with Atlantic Records, he left school to follow his rock n' roll dreams. Three albums, constant touring and high visibility on MTV followed, and eventually Jackson came to the attention of a promoter who recommended him to Havens. Now, 22 years later, Jackson is able to play music as a solo act, with his band Zebra and as the voice of Robert Plant in The Music of Led Zeppelin.

> "It's been a long time, and I'm really comfortable with the show now," he says. "It was a little strange for me at first because I'm used to playing the guitar and singing, but I got used to it pretty quickly because of the energy of the audience. They still love Zeppelin. It's the last thing I would have thought I'd be doing, but it's a lot of fun. It's been a joy to do.'

> Having been with the show for so long, Jackson has been deeply immersed in the huge Zeppelin catalog, and he's been able to quickly adapt to working in a variety of venues and with orchestras all over the world.

"It's been a different experience, working with a conductor and an orchestra. I'd

Jackson lauds the professionalism of the musicians who have all "done their homework" and are ready to play with even a quick rehearsal. He says they all know to be prepared and know the charts, and the music comes together perfectly from there. Of course, with the song selection of Plant and Page there are a lot of songs from which to choose each night.

"We have enough songs ready to do two full Led Zeppelin concerts, and even then we're not close to using all of the songs they have. And they're all great. We usually do 'Kashmir' and 'Stairway to Heaven' at every show, but we can really change the show a lot around that and the other songs we do."

In addition to the Zeppelin show, Jackson also performs in similar shows featuring the music of Pink Floyd and the Doors. While he also does some computer programming, calling it "something to fall back on," his solo, Zebra and orchestral shows keep him busy. He says at this point in his life. he's grateful for the opportunity to still make his living playing music and living out the dreams of his childhood.

"For me, what's great is that I still get to play this music, that it never gets old. It's still fresh. What I'm doing when I play these Zeppelin shows is great because of the interaction with the audience. I get to share a celebration of this great music with them. I introduce the songs, and they sing along. I try to bring fresh ideas and stories to the shows so if people come back again and again, they're not seeing the same show. It's never boring no matter how many times I do

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

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Rolling Out the Deep Guts

If Billy Joel went out on tour promising not to play any of his hits, he might meet with some resistance.

It's hard to imagine a musician of any caliber who could pull that sort of thing off.

Well, there's one guy who is pulling that sort of thing off as I type this

His name is Weird Al Yank-

Yankovic's Ridiculously Self-Indulgent, Ill-Advised Vanity Tour will pay a visit to the Honeywell Center in Wabash on April 12.

Per the title, the tour eschews the songs that made Yankovic famous (the pop song parodies) in favor of the songs he wrote from scratch.

It also forgoes the costume changes and elaborate trappings that have come to be associated with a Weird Al tour.

"This is certainly not something I could have done early on in my career," Yankovic said in a phone interview. "No one would have stood for that. This is something I have the luxury of doing now that I have a 35-year career and 14 studio albums behind me."

Of course, Yankovic's originals aren't exactly emo laments. With titles like "I'll Sue Ya," "Mr. Frump in the Iron Lung," "Nature Trail to Hell" and "The Biggest Ball of Twine in Minnesota," they're clearly parody-adjacent. They're parodies that serve as their own source material.

The improbability of Yankovic's place in music history and prominence in the current music climate cannot be overstated.

Yankovic had his first hit in 1984. Other artists who charted that year include Twisted Sister, The Smiths, The Style Council, Billy Idol, Pat Benatar, Kenny Loggins, Culture Club, Duran Duran and Sade.

If one were to travel back in time to the mid 1980s and ask a room full of people which of those artists would still be generating headlines in 2018, none of them surely would pick Weird Al Yankovic.

That's no knock on Yankovic. It's just that the occupation of musical parodist has not traditionally paved a sure path to fame and fortune.

Yankovic doesn't offer any explanation for his success. He just says he is grateful for it.

"Every single day, I wake up and I can't believe I still get to do this for a living," he said. "I don't ever get jaded by it. The novelty never wears off."

The not-so-secret truth about Yankovic is that underneath his goofy exterior is a savvy businessman and a sharp reader of the cultural zeitgeist.

Yankovic doesn't come right out and say it, but it sounds like he feels that he has earned this tour.

"I just felt like I needed a change," he said, "and I thought it would be good for the band to kind of mix things up a bit and really

challenge ourselves as musicians.

"So instead of doing yet another iteration of the big, multimedia extravaganza, I thought, 'Well, the next time, let's go in the whole other direction,'" Yankovic said. "Let's have us just walk out on stage as musicians and play."

Given Yankovic's professional persona as a comedian, his longtime band doesn't often get enough credit for being as excellent as it is.

"I think on this tour particularly, the musicianship really shines through," he said. "It's really on full display. It's not about the theatrics. It's not about production. It's 100 percent about the music.

"If people weren't sold on my band before, I think this will do the trick for them," Yankovic said.

When he speaks of the tour, Yankovic

uses phrases like "deep cuts" which are almost never uttered by anyone who is actually trying to make a living in the music industry these days.

This tour is for diehard fans, he said which means it may alienate some people.

"This tour is not really designed for a mass audience," he said. "But the people who it does appeal to are going to go crazy for it."

Last year, Yankovic got a chance to do something more ostentatious for diehard fans.

He released a career-spanning boxed set called *Squeeze Box*.

Squeeze Box collects 14 studio albums and one album of rarities into an accordion-shaped case. It comes in two versions: CD and 150-gram vinyl.

Again, if you were to travel back in time about 30 years or so and tell people that Yankovic's parodies would one day be lovingly remastered for a collection retailing for \$500 or more dollars, they might call you crazy.

Well, some of them might call you crazy. One person who doubtlessly would not call you crazy in 1988 is 8-year-old Lin-Manuel Miranda.

Miranda, now a celebrated 38year-old Broadway composer, recently fulfilled a lifelong dream by having his work parodied by Yankovic.

"The Hamilton Polka," a fiveminute spoof of the entire score of Miranda's hit musical *Hamilton*, was released by the composer and Yankovic in early March.

"Lin actually asked me to do it about a year ago," Yankovic said. "It kind of got put on hold, and then in January, he said, 'Okay, we're doing this. We need it next month."

While he worked on it, Yankovic said he purposefully didn't share any demos or excerpts with Miranda.

"I wanted him to hear it for the first time as a finished product," he said. "When he did, I think it blew his mind. There's actually a video of him on YouTube listening to 'The Hamilton Polka' for the first time."

Unlike many music careers, Yankovic's seems to have moved inexorably in the direction of greater and greater artistic freedom

Mandatory Fun, the 2014 album that was in several respects the biggest of his career, was his last release for RCA. Yankovic departed the label under his own steam.

"Which means I am basically a free agent," he said. "I don't have to get anyone's permission to do anything. I can literally do anything I want. I don't need to do whatever's the most commercial thing. I've done okay. My family's always going to have something to eat.

"So now I am just driven by what sounds like the most fun," he said.

Considering his age at the time of his death, Buddy Holly made a remarkable imprint on music and left a surprising legacy. Influencing the Beatles and many other performers since, Holly's death in a plane crash at the tender age of 22 has left generations to wonder what he might have accomplished if given the years which were ahead of him. But even in that relatively short time on earth, Holly left some incredibly memorable and timeless hits, among them "That'll Be the Day," "Oh Boy," "Peggy Sue" and "It's So Easy."

Born in Baltimore more than three decades after Holly's death, Michael Perrie Jr. has been told by his family that he began performing by the time he was

three. But his interest in pursuing theatre came at the age of eight, when he went to see his uncle and cousin in a local production of *The* Buddy Holly Story. It was then, seeing people he knew playing characters he didn't, that he

decided he wanted to try it himself.

Perrie continued to perform throughout his high school years and studied acting at Towson University before moving to New York to launch his career. In 2015, he saw that auditions were being held for a touring production of Buddy.

"I had fond memories about seeing the show about Buddy as a kid, and the first song I learned to play on the guitar was 'That'll Be the Day.' But I had kind of put it aside and had been doing other things. When I saw they were looking for people for *Buddy*, I sent an email and told the story about seeing that show and how it had inspired me.

Perrie not only got the role three years ago, he has been asked back, and it will be Perrie who will inhabit the Holly persona when Buddy visits the Embassy Theatre next week in what will be one of the final performances of this run.

Having played Holly this long, Perrie says he thinks there's something special about the musician which has made him resonate with audiences so long.

"He was this lanky white guy from the middle of nowhere in Texas, and he was saying 'I want to do this, I can do this' about how the music should be played or how he should sing it. Nobody was really doing those things back then. They thought it was the producer's job or the arranger's job to do those things, but he wanted to do things his own way. He knew what he was hearing in his head and wanted it to sound like that. He was so dedicated to what he was doing and showed so much perseverance. He was always just 'go, go, go. We'll do it my way. Let's go.'

"I know I, as a musician and actor and playwright, have that same drive to get things done."

Perrie's portrayal taps into Holly's perfectionism

and drive to be creative while also capturing Holly as a person, someone Perrie describes as a "funny guy. Just a laughable, affable person."

Finding connections between his own personality and abilities

and Holly's has helped Perrie capture the spirit for hundreds of performances.

"It's not that difficult for me to sound like him, since the tone of my voice is similar to his. I'm trying to do a good version of him as an artist and as a person, so I'm not just up there doing an impression of him. I'm really trying to bring him to life, and if for one second someone forgets that it's not Buddy Holly standing up there, then I've done a good job.'

While their voices are similar when singing, Baltimore isn't Lubbock so finding Holly's speaking voice took some effort.

It is a challenge because he was from Lubbock, but he was also very soft-spoken and theatrically that's not very interesting. I really try not to think about it as playing somebody who exists and try to approach it like I would any other character, as if it's a role from Shakespeare or Wicked."

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
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Little Dark Age

Do you remember when *Oracular Spectacular* dropped in 2007?

I don't. I was too busy in my own crowded little universe to notice a couple college kids from Connecticut leaving one of the most impressive debut records of the naughts at the doorstep of world

By 2010 I was on top of things, and when *Congratulations* hit I was in awe of how these two young dudes took that near perfect formula they'd put together with Dave Fridmann and completely blew it to bits. That album was this erudite, melancholy affair that seemed to be channeling The Zombies' *Odessey and Oracle* and something not of this earth. I don't feel weird in saying it's become a modern classic.

From this point things seemed to stall for Ben Goldwasser and Andrew VanWyngarden. Maybe they bit off more than they could chew? Following up such an ambitious sophomore album proved too daunting? Whatever it was, their 2013 album, *MGMT*, felt pretty uninspired. Two guys who hit earth hard like a blazing meteor but seemed to have used up all the tricks up their Day Glo® sleeves.

Goldwasser and VanWyngarden have returned from a nearly five-year hiatus with *Little Dark Age*. MGMT have seemed to have mined what made them so engaging, catchy and enjoyable on those first two records and have given us a tight, fun, extremely re-listenable album.

Since the beginning there's been a quirkiness to MGMT. No matter how cool or however much these two East Coast dudes have seemed to have had their fingers on the pulse of what was cool (or what they knew would be cool in a few months), Goldwasser and VanWyngarden have always come across as quirky: messy hair, distant look in their eyes, probably listening to some weird Euro pop from the 60s that you've never heard of in their Wesleyan dorm rooms. I think that's what gives them the upper hand in the indie music world. They do what feels right and don't care what anyone (including you and I) thinks.

"She Works Out Too Much" opens the album sounding like Mac Demarco on a Buggles kick while attempting to make an album in the vein of ELOs *Time*. It's a little goofy, a little catchy and slightly off kilter. "Little Dark Age" has all the 80s Gothic dance moves of The Human League and Depeche Mode, with just a hint of tongue planted in cheek. You could never accuse MGMT of taking themselves too seriously, and this great song is proof of that.

If Rod Argent had been 20 in the early 80s, I think he would've been writing songs like "When You Die." It has just the right amount of whimsy and melancholy. Here is where MGMT shine. These dreamy, eclectic kinds of tracks are ones you'd definitely include on a mix tape for that girl (or guy) you really want to impress. "Me and Michael" has the big 80s production and vibe to go along with it. As quirky as these guys are they can write a great pop song.

Elsewhere, "James" sounds like solo Peter Murphy mixed with a touch of 70s AM gold. "One Thing Left To Try" has the swagger of Dead Or Alive with an "everything but the kitchen sink" vibe. "Hand It Over" is a melancholy ending, sounding like Ween covering Gilbert O'Sullivan with nothing but a Casio synth and a beat up 808.

Little Dark Age is a catchy album that shows MGMT easing into a comfortable place musically. No obvious attempts at trying to recapture past magic or any grandiose over-reaching. It's just a really fun record that seems to encapsulate everything that made these Day Glo® kids so captivating in the first place. These kids are now middle-aged dudes, and it seems to fit them pretty well. (John Hubner)

John Mellencamp The Lonsesome Jubilee (1987)

John Mellencamp was fresh off the universal success of his No. 2 Billboard album *Scarecrow*, but he went back to the heartland-roots sound with *Jubilee*, his ninth studio album. With four Top



100 hits, the record featured folk, pop, and rock intertwined with Midwestern passion and nostalgia.

"Paper in Fire" kicks it off with a fire and brimstone narrative and the whimsical fiddle from another musical Hoosier in Lisa Germano. The songs speaks of the social inequality in America, and the accompanied video was shot on the poor back roads of Georgia. "Down and Out in Paradise" has an almost soulful Appalachian sound, but still has the roadhouse feel due to the great guitars from Larry Crane.

"Check it Out," still one of my favorites from Mellencamp, describes the working class and how quickly life can move; it is still one of those songs that always reminds me of my proud Hoosier roots. And "Cherry Bomb" takes you back to the old days as well when life appeared to be simpler if you just had some good friends and little to do.

"We Are the People" also deals with some social injustice, including racism and homelessness. It's a little downbeat, but it takes the topic seriously with a heavy country sound. "Hard Times for an Honest Man" is also a poignant alt-country track about blue-collar living and was featured on both Top 40 and country stations throughout the middle of the United States.

The album closes with two great tracks in "Hotdogs and Hamburgers" and the poppy "Rooty Toot." Both songs are a throwback to the "Jack & Diane" days and remind you that he was indeed the "Springsteen of the Midwest."

Mellencamp has over 20 studio records, and the 66-year-old continues to perform live.

myself, all of us wearing the same *Mork and Mindy* pajamas. There was something both exhilarating and frightening about the prospect that I was located in all of those mirrored versions of my current reality.

This was probably the start of all my problems.

I don't think Graham Reznick had a similar existential crisis in his parents' bathroom, but his new album, *Glass Angles*, is inspired by that feeling of not knowing your surroundings. It's about seeing what's there, and maybe what's hidden in just a slightly angled reflection. His vision is less about fear of the unknown than finding a spot to exist in it.

When Reznick first moved to Los Angeles after being a New Yorker for 14 years, he experienced a bit of culture shock. He began learning Ableton software and using soft synths and would record during the day. At night he'd drive around L.A. and listen back to his music creations. This was the beginning of *Glass Angles*. He said he'd look in the rearview mirror of his car and see Los Angeles – not the one he was getting to know and live in, but another Los Angeles.

"Holly Ridge" starts out on a decidedly upbeat vibe. It's not the darker feel you'd think it would be coming from someone kind of rattled by the fish out of water scenario Reznick was going through. It's all very 80s, but sort an alternate universe 80s. "Highland Steel" has a menacing lean to it, sort of like a cross between Herbie Hancock's *Future Shock* and Harold Falertmeyer's *Fletch* score mixed with something slightly sinister. Reznick has also created a feast for the ears here, with the stereo field being filled with wavering synths that run back and forth, left to right, trampling on your brain in the process.

"Beverly's Crop" is another dizzying affair. It has a late night drive kind of sound. I could imagine being slightly disheveled with the flickering lights of late night L.A. lighting my peripheral as I listen to this song. All the senses coming together giving the feeling of pseudo-enlightenment.

Glass Angles, more than any record I've heard in quite some



He has figured out the key to making people accept him as Buddy Holly, however.

"I was just talking to my understudy about this the other day. I told him that whenever you sing one of the songs – say 'Peggy Sue' – you have to nail that first line of the song. If that first line doesn't sound like Buddy Holly, then you've lost them. Every other line could be perfect, but it won't matter. But if you get that first line right, then it won't matter what happens with the rest of the song because they already believe it

"You can't doubt yourself or they won't buy it. I think about that at every show and am very conscious of that. You really have to use your voice because he had a crazy range. I enjoy it, but it's very challenging."

With his latest tour as Buddy winding up, Perrie is setting up auditions to see what he'll be doing next. He says that process is what provides the highs and lows of his profession.

"There is absolutely no job security in this business, which is both the great thing and the horror of it. But it's also always interesting."

Can he imagine continuing as Holly in the future, making it a role he revisits from time to time?

"I can imagine it, and if someone wanted to put *Buddy* on Broadway tomorrow, I'd definitely be interested because this show means a lot to me. But I'd also like a different challenge. Part of what appeals to me about acting is being able to do a lot of different things, and I'm looking forward to seeing what other cool characters there are for me to play."

time, works on many different tiers. The sound of it is one thing. There's a nostalgia to the beats and synths that gives the songs a feeling that you've heard them before. But the mixing and production is like another instrument in itself. The songs seem to entirely encompass you as you listen. You fall into this alternate L.A. that Reznick has soundtracked for us. It's almost like this psychedelic noir score, a musical landscape filled with tracing lights, bent constructions, and neon ghosts.

It's not all alternate universes and mirrored worlds. "Onion Canyon" sounds like distant dreams and ocean sunsets while "Mulwray Drive" has a hazy, half-awake feel. You can almost see clouds settling in over the boulevard of broken dreams as this plays on.

Or maybe it's just smog. "Whittier" is another track that distances itself from the record's harder electronic vibes. I could hear this in some earlier Michael Mann work. "Sunset Lane", "New Crescent", and "Palm Freeze" bring the album to a close with an 80s pop lean while still retaining a feeling that we're not quite in Kansas, or New York, anymore.

Glass Angles shows Reznick's skills at sound design, but also as a unique voice in electronic music. He takes his skills in film and adapts them beautifully to this record. Reznick has built this alternate Los Angeles through 10 tracks of wavering synths, psychedelic sound production and a mood of dark noir. Glass Angles is deceptively unique and quietly brilliant. Robert Smith, aka Bigg Robb, began his career in soul behind the mic, but not in the way you might imagine. He spent the 70s and 80s as a disc jockey at a radio station in Cincinnati, spinning the tunes of his funk superstars like Bootsy Collins and Midnight Star. Often,

he had the pleasure of interviewing his heroes at the station.

All this time, he was making his own music, and



when he got a job as a driver for the funk legend Roger Troutman, his behind-the-scenes life was over. Troutman recruited Smith to join his funk outfit, Zapp. Then, when Troutman died in 1999, Smith adopted the moniker Bigg Robb and pursued a successful solo career. Since then, the flamboyant performer has put out a number of steamy and soulful R&B-infused albums, including Jerry Curl Muzic, Juke Joint Music and Showtime

Bigg Robb will be bringing the funk to C2G Music Hall on

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RP1 Is Classic Spielberg Cinema

Ready Player One is the film Steven Spielberg was making when the opportunity and timing to make The Post became irresistible. The Post garnered numerous Oscar nominations and restored my appreciation for Mr. Spielberg's work. That renewed appreciation takes a big leap forward with Ready Player One, a movie that combines all of Spielberg's (and our) affection for movies, technology and old-fashioned corniness.

Based on the novel by Ernest Cline, who is one of the writers credited with the screenplay, *Ready Player One* is the story of, well, so many things that listing them all might take up all the space I have here. This film has layers, endless layers. I am confident that I missed more references and nods than I understood (I've never played a video game in my life) but I laughed out loud on several occasions at the movie references.

From It's a Wonderful Life to The Iron Giant to Back to the Future, Ready Player One includes dozens of references both subtle and prominent. Spielberg doesn't directly nod to himself, but fans of his early playful films will feel comfortable.

The world of *Ready Player One* – the real world – is Columbus, Ohio in 2045. The country has been through wars and tumult, and the landscape is desperately bleak. Mobile homes are stacked on rickety looking structures. Garbage piles up everywhere, but you can get a pizza delivered by drone.

Many people spend their time escaping into another world, a virtual world, a game called Oasis. In the world of the game, players have avatars and can earn coin that allows them to buy all kinds of virtual toys.

Some are engaged in a quest. They are searching for three keys to find a kind of grail. The game within the game was embedded by its revered creator, now deceased. Halliday, or Anorak as he is known in the game, is the ultimate nerd. He recorded every aspect of his life to assist his players to find his secrets. Mark Rylance plays the retiring, world weary Halliday.

Navigating this world for us is a gang of gamers led by Wade Watts, known in the game as Parzival (Tye Sheridan). He lost his parents in the troubles and lives for the game. He has several "friends" in the game who he knows only by their avatars. But they share genuine friendship and help each other in the game.

The bad guys in *Ready Player One* are the executives of a company, IOI, who want to win the game to gain control of its enormous profit potential. Through predatory credit practices, they already make unsuccessful gamer's lives miserable. If they controlled Oasis, their power would be nearly unlimited. Ben Mendelsohn delivers a wry performance as Sorrento, the chief executive bad guy.

Parzival's merry band includes a motley assortment of avatars: one, of course, is a seductive, talented and playful competitor. At least her avatar is female, though she warns Parzival that he really has no idea who she is. This is true of his other buddies in Oasis.

Part of the fun of *Ready Player One* is waiting to see the humans behind the avatars.

The revelations don't disappoint. Art3-mis, the cute avatar, explains to Parzival that IOI is ruining lives, like her father, who fell into debt and disease by agreeing to a back breaking contract with IOI.

Parzival does a lot of growing up, combining maturity with passion and skill. I guess we know who will win the game, but his road is paved with tests and plenty of life lessons pleasing to audiences.

Ready Player One has a lot more humor than most Spielberg films and other action films. Since most of the mayhem takes place in a virtual world, fewer people are killed. Death in Oasis is not death in the real world.

I saw *Ready Player One* in IMAX 3D, and it is well worth the extra price of admission for this technology. Adjustments to the visual landscape went on during the time it took to make *The Post*, and I wonder if that split allowed Spielberg's army of technical artists to meticulously refine the effects. I can just say they have created a visual palate that is overwhelming at first, but makes you eager to accept and enjoy. (Also, unlike some 3D effects, it didn't give me the vague feeling of nausea that 3D sometimes produces.)

An old school Spielberg message carries the day. It builds throughout the film. And the film links the nerds of the world with this message. I hope all who see the film take it to heart. It's a real message, one I think anyone who sees *Ready Player One* will embrace with joy and a warm surge of the heart.

Spielberg Does Spielberg ... Plus an RT Rant

Tops at the Box: Steven Spielberg's latest film, Ready Player One, took the No. 1 spot at the U.S. box office, selling a decent \$41 million domestically and \$181 million worldwide. Spielberg numbers. Several friends saw the flick and really liked it. All of said friends are video game people, so I can't say for sure if Ready Player One is great or not, but I did listen to an interview with Steven on The Ringer, and, yeah, the flick sounds pretty solid. The source material is strong, and the cast (Tye Sheridan, Screen-Time hero Ben Mendelsohn and Simon Pegg) is promising. The flick has a 64/100 on Metacritic (see the below ScreenRant for more on that), with no perfect scores and some concerning reviews from some of the more reliable critics out there.

Also at the Box: Tyler Perry's new film, *Acrimony*, took the No. 2 spot at the U.S. box office over its second weekend of release, selling \$17 million. Next up at No. 3 is Ryan Coogler's blockbuster, *Black Panther*, which sold another \$11 million, bringing the flick's seven-week worldwide total to \$1.273 billion. That's the money right there.

I Can Only Imagine took the weekend's No. 4 spot with another \$10.7 million, bring-



ing the surprise hit's 17-day sales total to \$55 million in the U.S. Foreign markets don't seem to have any interest in these Christian flicks, if you can believe it.

And, finally, action flick *Pacific Rim Uprising* saw a big drop-off over its second week of release, taking the No. 5 spot at the U.S. box office with just \$9.2 million in sales, bring the \$150 million movie's 10-day sales total to just \$45 million. Oof. Lucky for Universal, foreign markets tend to love monsters, big loud noises and, in general, big budget American action films, and so *Uprising* has already sold \$230 million worldwide. I predict that the third film in this series, if there is one, is straight-to-Netflix and costs \$40 million to produce. Charlie Day will not be involved, and very few people will care about the movie in the U.S.

New This Week: Four movies open wide this weekend starting with John Cena comedy *Blockers*, which supposedly tested

incredibly strongly. The film was produced by the Seth Rogen gang, so it's probably pretty funny. Cena as a leading man seems odd to me, but I'm not super familiar with the guy. Next up is John Curran's Chappaquiddick which was shot by the great Maryse Alberti and stars Jason Clarke, Kate Mara, Ed Helms, Bruce Dern, Jim Gaffigan and Taylor Nichols. The buzz is strong for this one. Next up is volleyball drama The Miracle Season, a sports film that looks to be about as interesting as its title would suggest. The weekend's final wide release is the John Krasinski-directed thriller A Quiet Place, starring Krasinski and his wife, the great Emily Blunt. I'm not convinced that Krasinski should be writing, directing or producing films, but here we are: Krasinski flicks are getting wide releases.

Also out in very limited release is the movie that I predict will be my favorite of 2018, Lynne Ramsay's You Were Never Really Here, starring the most exciting working American actor, Joaquin Phoenix. Watch the trailer. Watch Ramsay's past films. Watch Phoenix's recent performances. Then tell me

that this isn't going to be one of the year's great films. Phoneix won Best Actor at last year's Cannes Film Festival for his performance in the film and so far the reviews have been incredibly strong. Can't. Hardly.

ScreenRant: Let's not talk about Rotten Tomatoes anymore. It's no longer a source that needs to be considered. Look: it's a yes/no, good/bad approach to aggregating opinions about films. Did the film get more good reviews or more bad reviews? According to Rotten Tomatoes, *Ready Player One* received 76 percent favorable reviews and 24 percent negative reviews. There's a better way, and it's called Metacritic, and it's been around for a long time. I bring this up because Rotten Tomatoes is still the standard despite Metacritic becoming an increasingly popular site that has always had a better algorithm. The difference is simple: when a publication submits a review to Metacritic, they also submit a grade for the film. All

of those grades are then averaged out into a score. A really negative review could be a 20, 30, 0, 50, etc. A positive review could be a 70, 80, 90, etc. It's easy to figure out from here, right?

Metacritic's approach gives you a much more precise idea of what critics thought of the film. For example, *Ready Player One* has a 64 on Metacritic. So a 76 percent on Rotten Tomatoes seems like a decent bet, but a 64 (aggregated from the same crop of reviews) is, well, maybe a little more accurate right?

Here's the catch: Rotten Tomatoes scores are always higher, so the "industry" prefers Rotten Tomatoes. But you're a smart person, you require a better algorithm. So go ahead and delete that Rotten Tomatoes app from your phone. You're too smart for the good/bad approach, dear readers. You require more and Metacritic is here for you. End rant.




