A Blues Guitar Seminar

Toronzo Cannon will hold a seminar in Fort Wayne on Saturday, April 28 at C2G Music Hall. But don't start nodding off yet. It's not that kind of seminar. There may be questions at the end of it, however.

Cannon is the left-handed guitar player from Chicago who has taken the blues world

by storm since the release of his 2016 Alligator Records debut *The Chicago Way*.

He's returning to Fort Wayne for the 9th Annual Blues Bash, a benefit concert hosted by The League. Local singer and guitar player Rainee Perdue will open the show.

"This event is always a sellout," Judi Loomis, director of fund development with The League, said. "It's not often that a renowned blues group performs in our area. Toronzo Cannon and his band will be performing, back by popular demand from last year. Toronzo really engages the audience. He is more than a performer, he is an entertainer."

Cannon is definitely a performer and an entertainer. But he likes to refer to his shows as seminars.

"We're going to have fun," Cannon told me in a phone interview. "I'm going to host it like a seminar. We'll be relating. I'm not one of those cats that just plays at the audience. I talk to the audience. You have to let the audience know that they're there. I'm not the type of guitar player that can hold an audience with my playing. I need to talk to the audience. I may even ask a few questions at the end of the show to see if they were listening."

Cannon punctuates his sentences with laughs. You can hear him smiling as he talks. And why shouldn't he be happy? His career is taking off like, well, like a cannonball.

The Chicago Way was named best blues album of 2016 by England's Mojo magazine and Living Blues magazine here in the States. He's been the subject of in-depth features in The Chicago Tribune and Chicago Magazine. CNN tapped him as a guide to lead them on a tour of famous Chicago blues venues. He even got to throw out the first pitch at a Chicago Cubs game last September.

But don't think for a second that his success has gone to his head. Far from it. Cannon still puts in a 40-hour week as a bus driver for the Chicago Transit Authority. He works four 10-hour shifts during the week, plans his active tour schedule around his day job and uses vacation time for his yearly trips to Europe.

"I'm close to retirement at this point," he said. "I'm just going to ride it out. Couple

years and I'll retire. Might as well see what my pension is."

Cannon, who turned 50 on Valentine's Day, came to the guitar and the blues somewhat late in life. He didn't start playing until he was 20, and then it was reggae that interested him. He was familiar with the blues, but to him it was just the music his grandparents played around the house when he was

the Chicago Blues Festival.

For Cannon, his popularity stems not from his guitar playing (though it's hard to believe that after hearing him play) but from his lyrics. He writes about subjects that people connect with.

"I get to talk about things that fit the demographic I play for," he said. "I'm always working on new songs, human songs,

something more than three people in the audience can understand. The longer you live, the more things you go through. I don't just want to sing songs about 'my woman left me.'"

It's that aspect of Cannon's music that grabs audiences. And it's what makes him the perfect match for The League's Blues Bash. Some of the songs Cannon writes reflect what he sees on his bus route, the pain of certain neighborhoods and the struggles of the people who ride his bus.

The League serves some 3,000 people annually from the 11-county area surrounding Fort Wayne. And the impact spreads far beyond that number.

"The immediate impact The League has on the communities we serve is awareness of not only the fact that we serve all people with disabilities, but that we promote events like Blues Bash where the audience is not only getting a wonderful concert, but they are also made aware of our

services during the concert," Loomis

"Each year we designate the profits from this concert to various departments here at The League," Loomis said. "This year's concert will ben-

efit our Home Health Care Plus department. Home Health Care and Home Care provides post-hospital care, wound care, medication management, home health aide care, personal hygiene care, bathing, oral hygiene assistance with mobility, meal prep and light housekeeping."

Cannon sees a lot of everyday life on his bus route. And his songs boil over with reallife concerns.

"Of course I have songs about love gone wrong, but I'm trying to write songs that have air in them," he said. "I don't want to fill in every line. I don't want to preach. In 'The Pain Around Me' I write about one particular neighborhood. I meet people who come up to me and talk about it. They might be in L.A., they might be in Fort Worth, they might be in London. They come up and say I've seen neighborhoods like that."

But when he started hanging around the blues jams at the local clubs, he knew he found his music.

"It was dormant in me," he says in his official bio. "But when I started playing the blues, I found my voice and the blues came pouring out."

He spent several years as a sideman for established players like Tommy McCracken, Wayne Baker Brooks, L.V. Banks and Joanna Connor. But his personality was too big to be a sideman for long.

In 2001 he struck out on his own as a bandleader while still working as a sideman. By 2003 he was a full-time solo act.

After releasing three albums, one self-released and two on the Delmark label, he signed with Alligator. In 2015, after years of playing on the side stages, he headlined at

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Embracing the Twang

Feature • Aaron Lewis

Massachusetts-born singer-songwriter Aaron Lewis might have made a name for

himself as the frontman of alternative metal outfit Staind, but he's always been a country boy at heart, and at 45 he's completely comfortable embracing his twang, his tractor and his diesel truck.

Lewis, who will take the stage at the Honeywell Center Wednesday, April 18 at 7:30 p.m., divided his youth between Massachusetts, Vermont and New Hampshire. He grew up hunting, fishing, dirt bike racing and, thanks to his hard-drinking, war veteran grandfather, listening to country legends like Johnny and June Carter Cash, Merle Haggard, Hank Williams, Charlie Daniels, George Jones and David Allen Coe. He also vented his emotions in song, performing solo acoustic sets in bars, restaurants and coffeehouses in and around Springfield, Massachusetts.

Despite being born far above the Mason-Dixon Line, it would seem that Lewis's future as a country musician was set, but then, at a 1993 Christmas party, fate intervened. He met guitarist Mike Mushok, who then introduced him to drummer Jon Wysocki. Two years later, Lewis brought in bassist Johnny April, and soon the newly formed Staind began touring New England, hitting the road for weeks and months at a time.

The Staind signature sound is often cited as dark and brooding, making the title of their self-released debut all the more fitting. Tormented came out in 1996 and made quite an impression on Limp Bizkit's Fred Durst, who was horrified by the album's cover, which shows a gory crucifix resting just below a mud-covered face pierced by what appears to be a rosary. Staind were all set to perform alongside Limp Bizkit when Durst saw a copy of Tormented and sought to have Lewis and company removed from the bill. Then Durst heard Staind perform and his misgivings melted away. Impressed by the band's introspective and unique songs, as well as Lewis's soulful vocals (often compared to those of Eddie Vedder), he signed Staind to Flip Records in 1998.

In 1999, Lewis and his mates put out the Durst-produced *Dysfunction*, and slowly but surely their reputation in the heavy metal world was established, propelled by the success of singles "Just Go," "Mudshovel" and "Home." Next up came 2001's *Break the Cycle*, which would go on to become Staind best-selling album to date. Soon, Lewis's often scruffy face was a staple on the Fam-

ily Values Tour and on heavy metal festival stages across the U.S. and Europe.

Fame and fortune are not without their down sides, however. Lewis found himself

the confidant of thousands of fans, who, responding to his confessional style, often unloaded their problems on him, hoping to benefit from the wisdom of his experience with the darker sides of life. He told Masslive.com that he eventually had to flee such an emotionally demanding scene.

"There was a point during the *Break the Cycle* record where I lost it," he said. "I sat at the table on the bus and cried for hours. I couldn't handle it anymore. I couldn't deal with all of the letters and the constant barrage of horror stories that these fans had been through in their lives, and they all feel the need to tell me their story when they write me a letter. It got to a point where I couldn't read the letters anymore, I couldn't go outside and sign autographs anymore. I couldn't talk to anybody anymore. I really had to introvert and just kind of escape it all for a while."

The kind of success Staind experienced in the late 90s and early 00s would be enough to make any man abandon his roots, but Lewis never forgot his love of classic coun-

try, and in 2010, after a seminal tour with Kid Rock, he recorded a country-infused LP, *Town Line*, which featured the talents of two of his heroes, George Jones and Charlie Daniels.

In that same Masslive.com interview he said that the opportunity to record with the two legends was a dream come true.

"Those are two of the giants in the country business," he said. "That's two country artists that as a young kid I heard a lot of coming out of my grandfather's radio. That music was the soundtrack to my adolescence."

In 2012, having released their seventh album in fourteen years, Staind went on indefinite hiatus so Lewis could pursue a solo career. In November of that year he put out his full-length country debut, *The Road*, which featured the hit single "Endless Summer." Lewis penned all but one of the album's 10 tracks and *The Road* quickly climbed to No. 7 on the country charts.

In addition to "Endless Summer," *The Road* includes "Country Boy," a tune Lewis claims is his most autobiographical to date. The song chronicles Lewis's interactions with a Hollywood producer who suggests he remake his image in order to up his chances at fame. Not only does the pro-

ducer advise that Lewis whiten his teeth and lose a few pounds, but he also tells him to dump his wife and find new, more powerful friends.

Lewis, the rebel, the family man and father of three girls, the stubbornly individualistic artist, eschews the man's advice, declaring, "I love my country, I love my guns, I love my family, I love the way it is now, and anybody that tries to change it has to come through me. That should be all of our attitudes, 'cause this is America, and a country boy is good enough for me, son."

In September of 2016, Lewis released his second solo effort, *Sinner*. The lead single off the album, "That Ain't Country," is Lewis' thesis on what country music should sound like and, more importantly, what it should say about the world we live and die in. In the song, Lewis laments country music's slide toward poppy optimism.

"That ain't country, that's a natural fact," Lewis sings. "It's full of tales of good times and happy endings. My life ain't like that, so I'll keep listenin' to the old songs that my grandad used to play, full of pain and heartache and desperation and the ones that got away."

Fostering Local Dance

The Fort Wayne Dance Collective (FWDC) will once again demonstrate their cutting-edge artistic innovation in this year's collaboration focused Choreog-

rapher's Lab, a program in which the area's emerging and experienced choreographers have the chance to create collaborative performing art masterpieces.

FWDC Artistic Director Mandie Kolkman said providing opportunity for local talent and growing the region's art scene is what the Choreographer's Lab is all about.

Hosting this program allows FWDC to spread education and appreciation of dance and other visual arts in northeast In-

"We provide opportunities for not only performing artists but other types of artists to get experience and continuing education," Kolkman said, "so when we look at our Choreographer's Lab we look at that as well, [asking] 'how many artists can we give an opportunity to?"

The Choreographer's Lab is just one FWDC program designed to encourage local performing artists to seek career opportunities here in northeast Indiana.

"When arts and events come to Fort Wayne versus going to Chicago, what that means for us is more hotels being booked, more restaurant reservations, more shop-

ping being done locally," Kolkman said. "For some of our younger students who want to pursue a career in the arts, I would hate for them to go to Chicago thinking that there are no opportunities here in Fort

Specifically, the Choreographer's Lab aims to develop and retain experienced and emerging artists by giving them a platform to practice their craft and receive feedback.

Becoming both a creator and a critic, artists gain well-rounded and applicable training and can experience what it is like to be a professional performing artist in northeast Indiana.

"Our idea is that we will include as many artists as we possibly can and use this guided lab-based, feedback-based educational program to help them get the most out of it," Kolkman said. "I'm not really sure where this opportunity would come from if Fort Wayne Dance Collective wasn't doing it.'

When the Choreographer's Lab first began about

10 years ago, feedback came from audience members. Now, however, the choreographers critique one another before their final live performance. This way the artists are able to sharpen each other's skills and viewers can simply enjoy.

The 2018 Choreographer's Lab has more than enough for the audience to savor. Kolkman tells whatzup that FWDC has plenty of new and exciting collaborations they are excited to share.

"We love the idea of integrated art and allinclusive art," Kolkman said. "Performing arts requires an audience member to be so focused and so tuned in, but to be able to collaborate with many different art forms just gives it a little bit more dimension and a little bit more to it for the audience to engage in."

One of FWDC's new and innovative projects is custom light-up shoes, created in partnership with Artlink, for the dancers.

"We're using these shoes that are light-responsive to movement. So every time we move the lights light up in the shoes. They also interact with a mobile app to produce movement-based sound,"

Kolkman said.

Other ting-edge collaborations this year include photo, video and lighting effects from local visual artists. The audience can also expect to see performances from Project Ballet, Fort Wayne Ballet and Fort Wayne Philhar-

"We really want to be cultivating all artists in Fort Wayne through our programming," Kolkman said.

In addition to partnerships with other local artists, another key component FWDC believes will strengthen the local art scene is diversity.

Audience members will not only see diversity in artistic presentation through the collaborations, but diverse dance genres, stories and people will also be included in the performances.

'You'll see hip-hop, you'll see contemporary, in years past you've seen salsa, and you'll also see ballet or neo-classical ballet," Kolkman said, "you will also see students and dancers of all abilities and all ages."

While there certainly is opportunity for everyone wanting to participate in this event, there is also guaranteed entertainment for all attending.

With such a variety of performance styles and per-

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MUSIC HALL Managing the Momentum

----- Feature • Tom Henry

When Tom Henry won his first mayoral election in 2007, changes were already underway for downtown Fort Wayne. But he inherited a few problems that would take time to unravel, including some reluctance

- even bitterness - over the construction of what was to become Parkview Field. Not everyone thought there was a need for a new ballpark, and many of those opposed were not shy about sharing their opinions. But a year after he took office, he joined the city in celebrating opening day at the new home for the Fort Wayne TinCaps, and that was when the tide of public perception began to change.

"When people came for Opening Day that year, they saw that Parkview Field was a beautiful facility," says Henry. "That really impressed a lot of people. It was totally different from what they were expecting. A lot of the objection came from the idea of a new ballpark, but once they saw it, they realized it was so much more. It quickly became such a presence in

Parkview Field was just one piece of the plan for downtown, a plan originally conceived during Graham Richard's tenure as mayor. For the rest of the plan to move forward, Henry had to address another obstacle beyond public approval.

To move forward with the hotel and the other parts of Harrison Square, it took quite a bit of work. This was 2008 and 2009 when we were right in the middle of a recession. It was going to be difficult to pull it off. So it was a tense time between public attitude and the economy," Henry recalled.

Although some public money was earmarked for the overall project, to finance the completion, it was neces-

sary for Henry to bring in developers and private investors, no easy feat in the middle of economic woes. But bit by bit, that buy-in began to take root.

"Parkview was a big piece of the puzzle, but we also had the expansion of the Grand Wayne Center, the expansion of the library. It was a difficult time in the city, and it's hard to get investors and banks to provide money when the city's unemployment is high. But as people saw the changes, developers began seeing what was happening and began to work with us on the Harrison Square project. Restaurants began opening up, and investments in downtown started taking off. Soon we had the Ash project and the Randall Lofts and the Landing, and things really began to move forward. There's a momentum that hasn't been seen in a long time.'

Building on that momentum is the Riverfront project which will take place in phases as Harrison Square was. The lesson learned from the development of downtown is that if you begin slowly and responsibly, people

will see the results and will be anxious to see the progress continue.

"Phase I will be completed in the next 18 months to two years," says Henry. "That will give us that public park atmosphere and show what Riverfront can be so that we can begin to entice private developers.



Continental Developers in Minneapolis are coming in and starting to bring some office, retail, housing and public space. As work on Phase I wraps up, we'll move on to Phase II which should take an estimated two to three years. Then Phase III will be another couple of years. So we're looking at maybe a total of six to seven years for it all to come together. But it was designed to be that way.

"We did that on purpose because each phase is going to cost around \$30 million, and we've already paid for Phase I. Now we have time to raise capital for Phase II and III which is better than asking the public for \$90 million at one time. This way we're phasing it in, which makes it more palatable and allows us to see what it does.

Henry is also excited about breaking ground on the new Landing which will see the end of Columbia Street along that block. Once a great spot for downtown activities, particularly during Three Rivers Festival, the Landing had become just another block for awhile. But with new businesses and a

different attitude, the Landing is on the verge of returning to its former glory.

"We want it to be a gathering place," says Henry. "We have about 2,500 people living downtown right now, and half of them are millennials. They have really said that they want the Landing to be a gathering

place, so there are going to be coffee shops, restaurants, bars and other offerings like music to bring people down there. And with no vehicular traffic, people can just walk along and cross without any worries about

Also recently announced is the intention to begin a commission to encourage more public art in downtown, thanks in no small part to the popularity of the beautiful mural along the Columbia Street Bridge. In order to make more public art possible, there needed to be a source of funding to sustain such projects.

"When businesses come to downtown, they pay a property taxes, and to make that more palatable we can put some of that money back into making their property more attractive, with new sidewalks and things like that. So if we take 1 percent of that, it would give the arts commission up to \$100,000 per year which would be enough capital for public art, things like statues, sculptures and other public art.

'The commission will consist of people from City Council and some of my appointees, and they will decide what pieces of art would add something to the city of Fort Wayne. Public art not only improves the quality of life, but it helps bring more businesses to the area.'

With all of that, along with Skyline Tower and a couple more new hotels, the mayor has had his hands full for the past 10 years. And with

next year's local elections, the question is will Henry run for a fourth term in office? He's not ready to make any announcements

'My wife and I are talking about it, and people are definitely wanting to know. It's not just out of curiosity, but there are plans to be made whether I decide to run or not. I've been honored to be the mayor of Fort Wayne. and at the end of this term it will have been 12 years, which is not very common. If I decided to run for a fourth term, that would be almost unheard of in Fort Wayne, especially for a Democrat. If I were to decide not to run, I'd want some assurance that the plans we made will be continued. I'm the mayor. but I've had the support of a great staff and many other people, and I want that work to continue when I'm gone.

"My wife and I are struggling with the decision because she'd like to see me home more often because I'm not home very much. She figures 12 years is enough, but she also understands my passion for this city."

Japanese Roses

There I was, trying to find someone on Craigslist willing to lower their standards enough to play music with me, when I clicked on a link to a local music video. I know it was local because I had to double check it a couple of times.

This great music (and the equally

impressive video) came out of the wee little burg of Fort Wayne?

Girl Colors are three gents who focus heavily on the song, with melodies and catchy, hummable parts that are equally nostalgic and modern. "Saint Anthony's Fire," the first song that I heard, is sparse, with clean guitars playing a 50s guitar-style accompaniment to mournful lyrics. Like most of the songs on Japanese Roses, this one is brief, about three minutes. But during that time Girl Colors reel in your heart but turn wicked at the end, changing this charming tune into a psychedelic fuzzed up dream sequence.

The title song utilizes glockenspiel, tastefully over-driven guitars and solid drumming by Kyle Smith. The laconic "Impossible Days' has the great rhyme, "This old town has driven me to madness / Oh, how she moves / She hypnotizes with sadness," backed with an early Beatles rock vibe.

"Reservoir" sports a refreshingly gritty, lo-fi guitar tone similar to The Replacements. Halfway through, soft organs break through the din while guitarist Nick Walmer leads us through a charmingly ratty guitar solo. It's bassist Kyle Spears' turn to add hair to his tone on "No Sleep," a song of puzzling lyrics and jangly guitars that culminates in a pleading chorus of "Pressure pushing down on you / No sleep." Also enjoyable is "Way Out" which pairs light organs with a 70s light rock chorus and more playfully depressing lyrics ("I saw a plane crash today / No one died so it's okay.")

The last time my neurons got this excited over a local band was when I heard one of the many bands of the late great Mark Hutchins. In fact, there are many similarities between Girl Colors and Hutchins, including an amazing way of making their delightfully desolate songs sound so polished and complete despite having only minimal parts. The sound palate is very clean and concise, with no unnecessary extras to clutter up the sonic landscape, a kind of light and airy touch that shows great restraint and even greater songwriting skill.

You can hear this amazing new band for yourself on April 13 for their album release show at Neat Neat Neat Records. You won't be disappointed. (Jason Hoffman)

Los Angeles-based The Neighbourhood deliver their third album with what might look, at first glance, like confidence. The album is self-titled, a statement that encourages you to think of this as the definitive Neighbourhood collection, the group of songs that



shows you exactly who the band is at this moment. But the confidence evaporates as the album plays, coming off instead as an unfocused and maybe slightly desperate attempt to hang on to success.

The lightweight pop that took the band high up on the charts back in 2013 now seems as dated as the British spelling of their name, which was no doubt at one point meant to make you think of

The ultra-smooth electro-R&B of a song like "Scary Love" is not trancey enough to evoke a real club mood, but it's not nearly soulful enough to be emotive either. "Nervous" starts out with labored earnestness that maybe shoots for Ed Sheerhan, but then it shifts to the swaggering slur of a rapper-crooner. It's all confusing, and none of it works very well.

The Neighbourhood sounds as if it's trying to be everything to everyone (or at least everyone under 18), but it doesn't seem to be sure what everyone really wants. Do they need club music? Rap? Bieber-like baby swagger? Boy-band harmonies? Sanitized R&B? There's a lot of all of that on the album, and there's generally a lot of all of it in each individual song.

The truth is, 2013 was a long time ago, and a pop band like The Neighbourhood can't just rest on what it did half a decade ago. Their fans back then have reached the age of majority and moved on to more grown-up things. The band should probably think about doing that, too. (Evan Gillespie)

Neutral Milk Hotel

In an Aeroplane over the Sea (1998)

The band with a funny name shaped a sound many have tried to copy and is responsible for most of the indie-pop that you hear today. This was Neutral Milk Hotel's second release, and I still think it's one of the coolest records of the last 20 years.

It opens with a two-part suite in "The King of Carrot Flowers," a track that has the late 90s vibe of folksy, low-fi, shoe-gazing-art-rock with horns and other obscure instruments. But it grabs you and doesn't insist on being too artsy. The title track has an early R.E.M. vibe, but

carries an opulent, almost ominous droning throughout it. Two-Headed Boy" strums around for over four minutes and can be described as a cross between the Violent Femmes and the Smashing Pumpkins (and maybe even Ween). "Holland, 1945" has a harder, post-punk (think Hüsker Dü) sound and references Anne Frank (songwriter Jeff Mangum had just finished reading her diary). The eight-minute "Oh Comely" has shades of Beck and Wilco, but there is some Built to Spill and Pavement buried in the vibe that these guys produced for a short period at the end of the decade. The album closes with "Two-Headed Boy, Pt. Two," a melancholy track that crawls around in the dark for a few seconds, before the folksy lo-fi that had you in the beginning comes back to embrace you.

Critics weren't too high on this release, but more recently it has come to be appreciated by the music media.

Neutral Milk Hotel had a fleeting tenure in indie rock and have reunited several times over the last dozen years. They stopped touring as a band for good in 2015, but Mangum still creates music and continues to have a positive influence on bands still playing in basements and garages all over the world. Steve Greene

Electronic Dreams for a Holographic Existence

Steve Greene is the synth wizard in the progressive heavy synth rock band Voyag3r. Within Voyag3r, Greene is one third of a power trio that mixes elements of John Carpenter scores, Goblin, Zombi and even hints of progressive rock from the 70s. They world build on releases like Doom Fortress and Are You Synthetic? Within the world of synth, guitar, and drums (both acoustic and electronic) this Detroit band takes



horror and sci-fi themes to new blistering heights. A smorgasbord of rock-inflected science fiction jams.

When Greene isn't one third of Voyag3r, he tends to take a darker tone in his songs. On his own, composing late at night in his home studio, he channels the darker aspects of Tangerine Dream, 80s television synth themes (think Knight Rider or Street Hawk) and Carpenter, most definitely. Greene recently released his solo album debut, Electronic Dreams for a Holographic Existence. It's a menacing heavy synth album that follows themes of what we think we know in this universe and that great unknown that we unknowingly pull inspiration from. It's an intense and beguiling record that pulls you into its electronic world.

When someone opens an album with a track like "Triad of the Dark," you know they mean business. It blows in over you like some ominous haze. Like the best horror themes, it has the intensity of a great Carpenter theme, but Greene builds his own personal vibe here. He manages to stand with contemporaries like Slasher Film Festival Strategy, Antoni Maiovvi and Umberto while adding a toughness here that makes it unique. There's a street-level feel, as if he's scoring some neo-futuristic anti-hero's story. It's a heady musical trip.

"Machines, Schemes, and Manipulations" has a real robo-strut to it, once again capturing some early 80s magic. It wouldn't have



We believe in their happily ever after as soon as they are shown in close-up staring longingly at each other because these two characters are played by Jason Bateman and Rachel McAdams, two actors with substantial comic abilities. They will need the chemistry they demonstrate because the story of their ultimate game night gets so wacky and improbable that it takes their talent to keep us hanging on every crazy plot twist.

When we drop back in to their story, they are living in a state of wedded bliss, mostly. Once a week in their house they host game night, a gathering of their friends including Michelle (Kylie Bunbury) and Kevin (Lamorne Morris). These two are bickering about a bump in their otherwise very loving relationship that brings comic payoff at several points, including Morris' exquisite Denzel impression.

And then there is Gary, the divorced,



depressed next door neighbor. He's a cop in mourning for his ex and has only his adorable dog for company. He is a downer, and Max and Annie go to great lengths to hide game night from him. Annie describes him as the creepy husband they had to put up with until their friend left him. But don't discount old Gary, nor the amazing deadpan comic performance of Jesse Plemons.

Max's brother is the real problem. There has always been a rivalry between Brooke (Kyle Chandler) and Max. Everybody loves him, and he is very successful, but his trip home to visit Max and Annie is causing stress in their marriage.

Knowing how they love game night, Brooke, always game to one-up his brother, stages a game night where a kidnapping mystery will be the game. But guys who bust into Brooke's house seem awfully real. The fight is way too dangerous for play acting.

The writing, directing and performances blend well, and Game Night is full of surprises and laughs. At several points the movie goes from funny to crazy with what feels like real jeopardy for the characters, though you know this crew is going to come out fine. Co-directed by John Francis Daley and Jonathan Goldstein and written by Mark Perez, this is a team effort. The plot twists and turns, and we stay right with the charac-

Once the game gets started, the characters discover in some shocking ways that they are not dealing with the game that Brooke has promised. Max and Annie figure this out in the most amusing way - by wandering in to a dive bar. They rescue the truly kidnapped Brooke while thinking they are still playing the game. This involves guns that are not fake and Annie doing her best *Pulp Fiction* routine. It is quite funny.

McAdams is the brightest light in Game Day. She manages to be very funny, very sincere and completely over the top as required. She is just impossible to resist with her bright eyes and endless spunk and sharp questioning of what is going on with her beloved husband. Bateman is also wonderful, very generous in playing the straight man and the bedraggled husband.

Game Day is full of some genuine surprises, even as you begin to wonder how long they can keep the premise running. Most of this is only believable in the context of a crazy screwball comedy. But just when you think they won't be able to keep us rooting for the characters, they put in some bit of business that seems plausible, at least in the context of the movie.

Rated R for some violence (nothing too gross, just a few twists that will make you jump in your seat), Game Day isn't as good as old school screwball, but I think McAdams and Bateman could match the performances of the classics. I hope they pair again in material they deserve.

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The Krasinskis Have a Hit on Their Hands

Tops at the Box: John Krasinski's new horror film, A Quiet Place, opened stronger than expected, taking the No. 1 spot at the U.S. box office over its first three days of release while selling \$50 million. Krasinski and his wife, Emily Blunt, star in the film and are getting strong reviews for their work on the piece. Looks interesting. Also, horror films sell tickets, especially ones that have a device that hasn't already been done to death, and A Quiet Place has just that. Mostly, I'm just happy that Blunt, who is fantastic, is getting some love. And Krasinski, too. He seems like a decent guy worthy of opportunities. I have to wonder if he'll get stuck in the horror genre for a while.

Also at the Box: Steven Spielberg's Ready Player One had a nice second weekend, taking the No. 2 spot at the box office with another \$25 million in sales, upping the flick's 10-day U.S. sales total to \$97 million. Add to that about \$300 million in abroad sales and, hey look, Spielberg has another hit. Sure, The Post, which came out just three months ago, did reasonably well, but Spiels hasn't had a legit hit since Lincoln in 2012, and even that flick was a soft hit by Spielberg standards.

John Cena comedy Blockers took the No. 3 spot at the U.S. box, selling a decent

\$21 million over its first three days of release. Black Panther kept rolling during its eighth weekend with another \$8.5 million, bringing the flick's so-far worldwide sales

total to a whopping \$1.3 billion and placing it in the all-time Top 10 grossing films of all time. Respect, Coogler.

Christian flick I Can Only Imagine rounded out last weekend's Top 5 with another \$8.4 million in sales, bringing the movie's four-week total to just under \$70

Also of note, the movie that I think could very likely go down as my favorite film of 2018, Lynne Ramsay's You Were Never Really Here, starring my guy Joaquin Phoenix, opened strong, selling \$129,911 in tickets while playing on just three screens around the country. Look for this one to hopefully expand and make some decent money.

New This Week: Four films will open wide this weekend, starting with the new sports drama Borg vs. McEnroe, starring Shia LaBeouf as John McEnroe and Stellan Skarsgard as Bjorn Borg. If you're familiar with the source material (I am), then I'd have to guess that this is a film you'll want to see at some point. Next up is action adventure flick Rampage, starring The Rock, directed by Brad Peyton and based on the 1986 arcade game of the same name. Not exactly rich source material for this one, so it will be interesting to see how Peyton approached the film. I suspect it will do well because. well, people like dumb stuff. And this certainly looks dumb.

Also out everywhere is a very bad looking animated film called Sgt. Stubby: An American Hero. Looks like a real special one, guys. And, finally, we have Universal's new thriller Truth or Dare, directed by Jeff Wadlow and produced by hit-maker Jason Blum. Yeah, sure, looks fine. These sorts of films tend to, at the very least, make their money back.

And, finally, Wes Anderson's Isle of Dogs will open wide after a few weeks of test screenings in Los Angeles and New York City. I saw this one in New York and whoa, is it a doozy. This may sound hyperbolic, but I won't be surprised if, in 20 years. we're talking about Isle of Dogs as one of the best composed films ever made.





The 05 Gets Some Seoul

For many years, Seoul Garden on Coliseum Boulevard was this city's only Korean cuisine option. It provided me with my first taste of bulgogi, bibimbap, and kimchi, and I fell in love. I was delighted when a new Korean restaurant opened its doors a few months ago. Now another area of our city can enjoy some of my favorite dishes - and one of my favorite zip codes (the 05) can add Korean food to its growing list of diverse culinary offerings.

Ryu's Kitchen, located on Hobson Road near State

Boulevard, is a bright, open (albeit small) space, with cheerful décor and uplifting messages adorning the walls. I am hopeful that it will find more success in this location than previous inhabitants. (A bakery, a BBQ place and a gourmet market/sandwich have all come and gone in the past 10 years.)

Ryu's has staying power - I can feel it. The menu offers traditional Korean dishes as well as Asian fusion dishes, with a well-priced lunch menu, available Tuesday through Saturday from 11:30 am to 2:30 pm.

Here are some highlights from the menu.

Pork, Chicken or

Beef Bulgogi (Lunch

prices: \$7.50-\$8.50; Dinner prices: \$10.50-\$11.50): Stir-fried chicken or beef and various vegetables in bulgogi sauce. Bulgogi sauce is made with soy sauce, sugar, sesame oil, garlic and black pepper. Ryu's not-sosecret ingredient is beer, which adds a unique element to this dish. I ordered beef bulgogi because it is my favorite Korean dish, and Ryu's version is bold, clean and delicious. It is a heaping portion, large enough for leftovers, and packed with flavor. The vegetables were fresh and the meat was prepared just

Spicy Kimchi Pork (\$7.99): Stir-fried sliced pork and kimchi with savory and spicy pepper sauce. Kimchi is Korean style matured spicy cabbage salad. When stir fried with the pork shoulder, it creates a near-perDining Out **AMBER BOUTHOT**

fect dish. It is a bit too spicy for me, but the flavor is so good, I enjoyed it despite the heat. It is topped with fresh green onions and cabbage and served with a side

> Sam Gyeop Gui/Grilled Pork Belly (\$11.99): Available only at dinner, this dish is made with savory stir-fried sliced bacon and vegetables and served with chili bean sauce (Sam Jang) and Korean style sweet and sour pepper sauce. I am a big fan of pork belly, and unlike some foodies, I am not at all tired of it infiltrating everything. This traditional Korean dish is outstanding. Yes, it has some heat, but the pork belly is the shining star. It is sliced very thin and seasoned lightly,

Have and Have Not Millennials

BROKE

STOP SCRAPING BY AND GET

YOUR FINANCIAL LIFE TOGETHER

ERIN LOWRY

Broke Millennial by Erin Lowry, TarcherPerigree, 2017

Not long ago, a wealthy Australian developer caused a ruckus when he said that Millennials wouldn't have trouble getting by financially if they'd stop spending so much money on avocado toast. His implication was that the only thing holding back whiny young people is their own financial irresponsibility. Not surprisingly, young people didn't take kindly to the comments, arguing that what's really holding them back is a world where the financial deck is stacked against them.

In her new book, financial advice-giver Erin Lowry takes a gentler approach; she's saying essentially the same thing that the rich Australian guy did, but she's saying it in language that she hopes Millennials will understand – and that they won't be offended by. A Millennial herself, Lowry is leading by exam-

ple, illustrating how she's managed to be successful and financially independent simply by being aware and sensible about money. In Millennial terms, she's made a habit of adulting, and she thinks anyone in her genera-

tion can do it.

Millennial Lowry tries hard to make her book of financial advice not seem like a book of financial advice. Millennials, apparently, don't have patience for anything that feels too grown-up, and Lowry takes great pains to frame her advice in language that she thinks will resonate with the young people. She encourages readers, for example, to think of their money as "marriage material" rather than as a Tinder date. It's a metaphor that's not easy for us older folks to understand, but basically she means that you have to take your financial situation seriously and not try to ignore it. All right; that seems like good advice.

She fills out the book with more advice about saving, budgeting, investing and preparing for the future. It's basic stuff, really, but it's aimed toward people who have made it to their late 20s or 30s without admitting that it might be time to take responsibility for

For her part, Lowry blames the parents for the problem of financially immature Millennials. If young people haven't grown up in families with healthy at-



titudes about money, they're unlikely to have the right attitude about their own finances. She begins with a story about how her dad taught her a lesson when she was young by taking his own cut of her garage-sale profits. He gave her a realistic sense of what it means to be smart about money, she says, and the lesson

Lowry's advice might be valuable to a particular kind of Millennial, the Millennial who already has money. Young people who have enough money to

live, but who spend their cash on expensive trips and nights out with friends instead of on rent or their 401ks, could benefit from her guidance. The advice is less valuable for Millennials who are truly struggling to get by, who are genuinely broke.

Lowry herself boasts about graduating from college with no student loan debt, even though her parents insisted that she pay half her tuition. But it's important to notice that she's debt-free because she got scholarships (one of which came from her status as a legacy admission) that covered half her tuition, and her parents paid the other half. In other words, she dodged

student-loan debt because she enjoyed a privileged financial situation that the majority of young Americans do not enjoy.

Bottom line: Lowry has solid advice for young people, and she presents it in a way that is not condescending or outdated. If you've got a good job but can't understand why you don't have any money left over at the end of the month, her book could help you. If, however, you're underemployed and simply unable to afford the kinds of frivolous expenditures that Lowry warns against (in other words, if you're the average Millennial) the book isn't going to turn things around for you.

sounded out of place on some early 80s Roger Cormanproduced, dystopian B-flick. Greene even adds some organic soul with some very tasteful saxophone.

"Aerial Maneuvers" buzzes and beeps with analog life. Greene is a hardware kind of player, using old school synths to make his musical magic, and "Aerial Maneuvers" benefits greatly from the warmth of real synths. There's a lot to be said for tactile instrumentation, and Greene weaves square waves and circuit-fed melodies expertly and effectively.

Electronic Dreams for a Holographic Existence never falters throughout its 37 minutes. It flows effortlessly from one track to the next. Though it may not be a concept album per se, Existence flows with a very distinct musical narrative that gives the impression of a story being told. Tracks like "Gravitationally Bound," "The Hoax" and "The Great Barrier" feel like electro micro movements that carry you from one theme to the next. At times they remind me of some of the great 8-bit themes you'd hear in old NES games. You never realized just how much of an impact those little themes had on you until years later when they were isolated and you could hear the intricacies and detailed melodies that went into what was in essence "background noise" to your RPG action.


Greene makes truly effective compositions here.

These middle tracks lead us to the hypnotic and noisy "Revel in Your Time." Imagine Disasterpeace trying to capture the magic of Brad Fiedel's Terminator score and you'll have an idea of the power of this song. With slight jazz inflections courtesy of electric piano this song seems to just soar. "Expanding Symmetry" has an almost baroque quality - chamber music for outer space, if you will. It's a melancholy close to a heady space trip. Beautiful galactic gloom.

Greene seems to excel at working in both a band and on his own. Electronic Dreams for a Holographic Existence feels decidedly personal. It pulls together eight tracks that, when played consecutively, lay out this sci-fi music journey. It's a warm, buzzing piece of heavy synth work that begs repeated listens. (John
