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The Cool in Country

It would be difficult to over-sell the amount of cool Dwight Yoakam has brought to country. Born in Pikeville, Kentucky and raised in Columbus, Ohio, Yoakam launched his now three-decades long career in the rock clubs of Los Angeles where he fearlessly performed honky-tonk for audiences much more used to three-chord punk and heavy metal than twang. The result? A star was born, and a bunch of punk rock and hair band fans suddenly found themselves drawn to a genre they might otherwise have written off.

Since then, Yoakam, who will take the stage of Wabash's Honeywell Center Saturday, May 5 at 7:30 p.m., has worked with the likes of The Blasters, Los

Lobos, X and Beck, not to mention the Plugs and the Dils. Not exactly your traditional country music resumé, but Yoakam, who also acts, writes and bakes biscuits, is not your traditional country music performer.

He is, instead, a rebel in the truest sense of the word. First drawn to country thanks to his grandparents' record col-

lection, he dared to be hillbilly when what everyone seemed to want was urban cowboy. As a young singer-songwriter, he discovered that his style (shaped by greats like Buck Owens, Merle Haggard and Johnny Cash) was distinctly out of vogue in the country hotbed of Nashville, so he moved to California where

listeners embraced his steadfast and bracingly honest authenticity.

In a 2013 interview, he told Vice that he was still a teenager when he began dreaming California dreams. This was during his high school years in Columbus. Even before that, though, he wrote music, and before he wrote music he played it and before he played it he listened to it and before he listened to it, he knew it. He could recognize it, somehow. Music, and, specifically, hillbilly country, is in his DNA.

I was playing guitar from the time I can remember. There's shots of me at 18 months old with a guitar that was bigger than me that I dragged around. I fell over an old Kay guitar that my father had brought home. Kay was the name of the company that made these median-price instruments that a lot of people played. I tripped and fell on a guitar and broke it, and at eight I go and get another real guitar, at eight years old, and began writing songs even, at that age-trying to, at least.

"And then by high school I had a rockabilly band put together and then really started dreaming big."

It's one thing to dream big; it's another to do, and

Yoakam is a doer. It took nine years of performing in clubs all over town and working his calloused fingers to the bone before he finally snagged his first record contract. In that same Vice interview, Yoakam credits good timing and even better luck with helping him get his big break, a recording contract with Reprise Records for his debut, Guitars, Cadillacs, Etc., Etc., but it was also a matter of determination and drive.

"You have to possess violent perseverance. Or you have to engage in violent persevering. I arrived in L.A. at 20 years old, and I was 29 when I signed my record deal. I drove air freight trucks, I drove delivery trucks, I worked on loading docks at department stores, a little bit of everything."

It's been 32 years since Guitars, Cadillacs,

Etc., Etc. hit the shelves, and, just as it's difficult exaggerate Yoakam's influence on the country genre, it's not going far enough to call the album "seminal." What before comes that? The chicken or the egg?

Anyway. Yoakam's future as a country heavyweight was secured with that record. which featured such hits as his remake of Johnny Horton's "Honky Tonk

Man" (incidentally, the first ever country music video to be aired on MTV), "Guitars, Cadillacs," "It Won't Hurt" and "Bury Me."

Hillbilly Deluxe and Buenos Noches from a Lonely Room followed, and the latter included Yoakam's first No. 1 single, "Streets of Bakersfield," a duet with his country music

idol, Buck Owens.

In the 90s Yoakam put out four albums – If There was a Way, This Time, Gone and A Long Way Home - and he found time to devote to acting as well, appearing in a number of television shows and movies. including Roswell, King of the Hill, Sling Blade and The Newton Boys. The 00s saw him starting his own label and releasing the critically acclaimed album of originals, Blame the Vain, as well as a record of Owens covers, Dwight Sings Buck.

The thing about the cool kids is you just can't slow them down. In July 2011, Yoakam signed with Warner Bros. to record 3 Pears which earned him mentions on countless "best of lists" and sent him to the top of both the Billboard 200 and Billboard Country Album charts. Three years later, he recorded Second Hand Heart, and, a year after that, he penned his latest album, a blue grass-influenced 12-tracker, Swimming Pools, Movie Stars.

Johnny Cash called Yoakam his favorite country music artist. Chris Isaak has said he's the best song-

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

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Bringing Out The Vault

Actor. Entrepreneur. Multi-millionaire. Rock and Roll Hall Of Famer and self-described God of Thunder (and less printable names). KISS bassist Gene Simmons is all of these things and more. He does what he wants when he wants and pretty much always has.

Given the success and notoriety Simmons has achieved over the course of his 40-plus years in the entertainment business, there seems to be no reason why he should ever change.

On tour to promote The Vault, a collection of unreleased songs, Simmons will make his very first solo appearance in Fort Wayne with an appearance at the Foellinger Theatre May 4. For those who are hoping for the same theatrics of a full-blown KISS show, be warned that this will likely be more of a casual, laid back kind of show. There will be no makeup, no pyro, no fire-breathing, no platform heels and no elaborate stage design. But what you will get is a night chock full of great musicianship, songs you probably know by heart and maybe a few that you haven't heard in a while.

Without his longtime KISS partners by his side, Simmons will focus

largely on KISS material that featured him as the primary vocalist and songwriter as well as some select songs from The Vault. And it just so happens that 2018 marks the 40th anniversary of the original four KISS solo albums, so it's likely we'll get to hear a song or two off of that first Simmons album as well while cover songs are also on play. Simmons and his accomplished band have been known to suddenly break into songs ranging from John Lee Hooker to The Beatles and The Who, so you never quite know what is going to pop up on the setlist. Suffice it to say, the night will be full of surprises.

"It's no-rules," Simmons said in a recent interview on Kissonline. "It's a chance for me to roll up my sleeves. And you should see my arms. I've got very pretty arms."

With KISS off the road for the most part of 2018, Simmons said he wanted to continue to stay busy, so this seemed like the perfect time to launch his first solo tour.

"I've never toured or ever did anything outside of KISS before," Simmons said. "And I'm having a great time. These shows allow me to dig deep and perform obscure material. Of course, you're going to hear 'Rock and Roll All Nite,' but this gives me

a chance to perform things like "She's So European" (from Unmasked) and "Almost Human" (from Love Gun). So anything is possible. But the idea is to do stuff that you would not only get from KISS, but stuff you would never get from KISS."

The Vault is a culmination of 50 years of recording for Simmons. It boasts 10 CDs life what it is.

"Well, this is the Godzilla of all box sets," Simmons told ForBassPlayersOnly. com in a rare instance of public vulnerability. "Because of the enormity of it, I didn't know how I would get this to fans. It's going to get damaged in shipping, I mean, it's 40 pounds. Then I thought, you know, I've had

a really good life, and the only reason I have this life is because of fans, not because of critics, or people in the peanut gallery, but those loyal fans that have been with us for 44 years. There are only a few thousand of these that are being made available around the world, so why not deliver it personally, from my hand into theirs?"

Besides being an iconic rock star, the 68-year-old Simmons is also known as something of a business tycoon, never missing out on a chance to make a dollar or two off his image, the KISS name or just about any other idea that enters his mind. KISS logos have appeared on everything from caskets and urns to pinball machines, comic books and trading cards.

some backlash over his attempt to trademark the "Metal Horns" or "Devil Horns" hand sign. The gesture, most commonly credited to having been invented by Ronnie James Dio, has remained a bit of a sacred gesticulation among musicians and fans of hard rock and heavy metal and, as such, is fiercely protected by the same. Simmons gave up the patent bid shortly after the filing was made public, but he doesn't seem to care that many fans condemned his attempt to cash in on the symbol. "I regret nothing," Simmons told AltPress. "People said, 'You can't do that.' Actually, I can. I can do anything I want to do. Wake up every morning and let your conscience be your guide."

"Did you know I own the money bag logo?" Simmons continued. "The dollar sign with the bag of money. I own all kinds of things. I own 'motion pictures' as a trademark. Anyone who thinks that's silly — the silliest thing I've ever done is wear more makeup and higher heels than your mom-



containing 150 previously unreleased songs, an exclusive action figure,

a photo book and a "very special surprise." The box set itself stands three feet high and weighs 38 pounds. It includes the first song Simmons ever wrote ("My Uncle Is a Raft"), three songs written with Bob Dylan, some stuff written with Eddie and Alex Van Halen, alternate versions and demos of KISS hits and several other songs performed with all of his other KISS bandmates, both past and present.

"It's literally and figuratively the biggest box set ever made," Simmons told Rhinocast. "You can call it a labor of love, but really these songs have just been up in the attic and I didn't want to let them die. It's like your children. You want to bring them out in the fresh air and let people see how beautiful they are."

Simmons has spent the last couple of months hand delivering The Vault to those who have been able to meet the \$2,000 price tag. The decision to deliver rather than ship was one of practicality as well as a chance to meet the people who have helped make his

Back Home & Onstage

Few people can strike the perfect balance between their passion and their career. Brian Ernsberger is the exception.

Ås a child, Ernsberger was "painfully shy" but an avid reader with a strong imagination. He credits his love of books for paying his way into theater.

"[I loved] imagining myself in someone else's life or situation," he says. "Onstage, you get to be a part of a more fully realized and immersive version than what you can picture in your mind's eye, and it helps [you] develop a sense of empathy."

It wasn't until middle school that Ernsberger took his first step onto the stage, led by Jo Drudge at Rome City Middle School.

His first role was in middle school in the ensemble of a musical called *Little Miss Christie*. He really had the chance to shine, however, in his next production, a school variety show.

"I did a vaudeville act

"I did a vaudeville act with my best friend Nik," he says. "We played two German guys. The jokes were all based on misunderstandings created by the pronunciation of words in

the thick German accents we used. The two of us used to do a lot of dialects for fun, most of which I am sure were awful, but that in-

spired Jo Drudge to have us do this bit for the variety show. I later got to repay Jo for casting me in my first role when I cast her in my first directing gig."

He went on to do theater at East Noble High School under the tutelage of Craig Munk and Bob Avery. The theater program was very active, producing four to six shows each year. While a student, Ernsberger appeared in about half of them, including his first Shakespeare play.

After high school, he earned an English degree from Ball State. He went on to gain business experience as a program manager at a non-profit educational organization, as a brand marketing manager for a luxury consumer goods company and as a retail manager. Theater was still in his heart, however, so he enrolled at IPFW and earned a second bachelor's in theater with an emphasis on directing. While at IPFW he worked as the scenic/lighting designer and technical director at both North Side and Homestead high schools as well as performing in community theater.

All told, he has been involved in over 50 productions in Fort Wayne – both onstage and off. "I found myself fascinated with all of the aspects of theater," he says, "so I did a little bit of everything."

In 2011 Ernsberger left Fort Wayne again to attend graduate school in arts administration at the University of Alabama.

"I always joke that I decided my English degree was too marketable," he says, "so I needed to add a couple theater degrees to balance it out."

In truth, he says, "I wanted to take my 'day job' business experience and apply it to my love of the arts. Many arts organizations fail because the artists who

found them do not understand that, [even though a theater may be] a non-profit, there is still a business to be run. I thought that my experience in theater would help bridge the gap between art and economic viability."

After he earned his master's degree, he took a job as the event operations manager for the Leslie S. Wright Center at Birmingham's Samford University. The concert hall seats nearly 2,600.

"I did a little bit of everything, from moving tables as we set up for events to writing a safety and security plan for the venue," he says. "The biggest drawback was the sheer number of hours I had to work. It never

allowed me the time to express myself creatively in theater."

Then an opportunity opened up at Arts United in Fort Wayne. He accepted the position of events operations manager where he works with clients who rent the spaces at the Arts United Center and the PPG Artslab. This change opened up the opportunity to get back onstage after several years away from it.

"I am happy to be with an employer who values participation of its staff in the local arts scene," he says.

He's only been back a short time, but has jumped back into acting. Although he's played a wide variety of roles over his career, he

says he's fallen into a comfortable niche playing "neurotics or pretentious Brits." In this go-around, he's playing the latter: Charles Dickens in the First Presbyterian Theater production of *The Gospel According to Thomas Jefferson, Charles Dickens, and Count Leo Tolstoy: Discord*.

Written by Scott Carter, the executive producer of *Real Time with Bill Maher*, the play is a contemporary comedy that premiered in 2014 in Los Angeles.

"The title is a bit long," Ernsberger says, "but it gives you an idea of what the play concerns."

In the show, the founding father, the Victorian novelist and the Russian revolutionary find themselves trapped in a room somewhere in the afterlife.

"They set about trying to figure out why they were brought together and what they need to do to get out of the room and move on," Ernsberger explains.

The thread that ties all three together is a historically accurate one: each of them had written his own "Gospel" of Jesus in his own style and according to his own experience and philosophy and viewpoint.

Ernsberger calls the play "thought-provoking and fun," and says it addresses the very contemporary issues of faith and hypocrisy. "These historic figures are often held up as paragons, but they're really just the same flawed humans who fell short of their ideals. Dickens, for example, presents himself as a model husband and father, but he treated his family, and his wife especially, pretty horribly. He wrote about the trials of the working class of England, but once he broke out of the cycle of poverty in his family, he lived a life

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Stone Temple Pilots *Stone Temple Pilots*

You probably don't remember now, but Stone Temple Pilots didn't get much respect when they came on the scene in the 90s. Widely regarded by critics as a lightweight version of real grunge bands like Nirvana or Soundgarden, STP were tailor-made for alternative radio rather

than artistic ambition. That history lesson might help to explain how this new version of STP manages to be so bland.

Through a star-crossed history that has seen the deaths of two of its former lead singers – Scott Weiland and Chester Bennington – STP have always been more trend followers than innovators. Now, without the example of 90s grunge or early 2000s heavy rock to follow and fronted by former *X-Factor* contestant Jeff Gutt, STP feel essentially aimless.

The album kicks off with the straightforward pop rock of "Middle of Nowhere" which sounds unoffensively like Cheap Trick. Elsewhere, the songs bracket generic pop-rock choruses with only slightly edgier verses, all punctuated standard guitar solos. On "Guilty," Gutt turns in a fair impression of Weiland, while on "Meadow" he sounds a little more like Axl Rose. On "Just a Little Lie" the inspiration seems to be Chris Cornell. "The Art of Letting Go" is a power ballad that could fit on practically any album, from a 25-year-old Poison record to a current pop country album or an Ed Sheeranesque troubadour's project.

In other words, this latest version of STP isn't terrible. It's simply indistinguishable from most undistinguished pop made in the last several decades. Oddly out of sync with the present day, it doesn't bear much resemblance to the STP of old (*Evan Gillespie*)

Preoccupations

New Material

I've been known to have a down day now and again, but Preoccupations' Matt Flegel is on a whole other level when it comes to self-doubt, anxiety and swimming in the deep, dark, desperate waters known as depression.



Daniel Christiansen and Mike Wallace have been churning out jagged post-punk since 2013. They formed after the breakup of the indie band Women, of which singer/bassist Flegel and drummer Wallace were members. The surprise success of their *Cassette* cassette led to the early 2015 release of their self-titled debut, *Viet Cong*. That led to cancelled shows, broken arms, playing to crowds of 10 across the U.S. and an eventual name change to Preoccupations. Their followup, another self-titled, showed all the drama and angst had worn on them, in-particular in Flegel's lyrics. Despite the dread conveyed through words, the music lightened up from Viet Cong debut. At times there was even a progressive quality that brought the songs up from the doldrums of self-loathing.

This leads us to *New Material*, the band's third full-length in three years. This Canadian post-punk outfit keeps dialing up the light musically and dialing it down lyrically. The juxtaposition between the light and dark is what makes *New Material* so engaging and fascinating. You'll either buy the ticket and take the ride or you won't. I've purchased a year-round pass.

"It's an ode to depression,' singer Flegel says. "To depression and self-sabotage and looking inward at yourself with extreme hatred." There is no assuming here. There's no theorizing where the band is going with these songs. It's a concept record about falling apart with no needle and thread to sew yourself back together. But where lesser bands would romanticize being depressed and dealing with darkness and turn it into nothing more than some teen's high school diary, Preoccupations make it into a masterful, quite beautiful spiritual reckoning.

"Espionage" beautifully captures the band's love for Bauhaus, Joy Division and even hints of Gary Numan, but adds a more muscular fist punching the air. Flegel's vocals have historically been slathered in studio grit and layers of grey, but here those effects have been stripped away. This makes songs like "Decompose" and "Disarray" all the more engaging. There's a real vulnerability that comes through, especially in the latter track. The desperation of "Disarray" is disarming and pulls you in. The lilting guitar and steady heartbeat of a bass line works to drive the emotion along. "Manipulation"

Kangaroo

Kangaroo (1968)

The late 60s music scene is still my favorite period for music. It had everything you wanted in popular music and had an underground scene that flourished through-



out the United States. Like all of the other bands from the era, Kangaroo had one shot at it, and they produced something from each genre on this, their only release in 1968.

It begins with "Such a Long Long Time," a guitar-based track reminiscent of Jefferson Airplane and The Byrds. It's uncomplicated and feels like it belongs, as does "You're Trying to Be a Woman" which has a psych-folk feel about it. And the backing vocals from Barbara Keith are reminiscent of Grace Slick.

Keith takes over the lead vocals on "Daydream Stallion," one of the album's more familiar tracks. It showcases the band's musical talent with great guitars, bass, keyboards and drumming.

The single "Frog Giggin" is peculiar and brings out the country side of the band (who hailed from New York City and D.C.). The band channels The Mamas and Papas in "If You Got Some Love in Mind" which is actually more garage rock than folk. "I Never Tell Me Twice" has a handsome guitar as it opens, and Keith scats around for the first minute before the band turns it on for late 60s classic psychedelic-pop. The alt-country then shows up in "Tweeds Chicken Inn," but it's more Moby Grape/Arlo Guthrie than Nashville. As the record draws to a close, Keith grabs the mic for "The Only Thing I Had." It sort of takes folk, pop, psych and bluegrass and threads them all together without focusing on a specific sound.

This was Kangaroo's only release. The band members all went on to solo careers, or other bands. Check out this underrated album from an extremely talented group of musicians. (*Dennis Donahue*)

moves along like a broken-down machine attempting to start itself back up, while "Antidote" almost comes across as some 80s deep club remix. Flegel nearly comes across as upbeat in his delivery here as the drums beckon the dance floor ghosts.

New Material is the best thing Preoccupations have done. They've given in to the darkness, and instead of masking it, they are fully embracing it. It seems there was no work-around for Flegel this time. He committed to the doubt and anxiety he was working through and let his bandmates inside. The result is the most upbeat form of self-therapy you'll hear all year. (John Hubner)

Kacey Musgraves Golden Hour

You could smell the anticipation back in 2013 when Kacey Musgraves first surfaced. Country radio thought it had a new artist to plug into its latest pigeonhole for female singers; Musgraves looked like the kind of feisty rebel, a la Miranda Lambert, a counter-



part to pickup-truck-lovin' bro country artists. But Musgraves, even more than Lambert herself, turned out to be a real rebel, not just a conformist masquerading as a rebel. She refused to sing just about getting revenge on a cheating boyfriend, and that was problematic.

Golden Hour is Musgraves' most blatant nose-thumbing at the establishment to date. It's hard to imagine a collection of songs sung with a twang that's less suited to country radio. Musgraves is following her arrow, and it's pointing well away from the mainstream.

Songs like "Butterflies" are poppy and accessible enough, but they replace steel guitars with disco synths. "Oh, What a World" is so audacious that it kicks off with a vocoder intro that would sound at home on a Daft Punk album. Even "Velvet Elvis," which seems on paper to be extremely country-radio-friendly, still insists on being a little trippy.

The result of the album's lack of creative constraints is an irresistible authenticity. Whether it's the heart-laid-bare "Mother" or the stubbornly laid-back "Slow Burn," there's no doubt that we're hearing how Musgraves really feels. That makes for less commercially friendly music, but it's undeniably an artistic win. (Evan Gillespie)

writer he's ever had the pleasure of knowing, and, according to Vanity Fair, he "strides the divide between rock's lust and country's la-

Despite such praise, Yoakam is as modest as he is unflaggingly cool. He told the Aquarium Drunkard that he makes the kind of music he's capable of making. That is how he explains his style. There's no magic bullet or snobbery at work. He's a country musician because that is where his talents lie. And as for the key to his lasting appeal, that's something he doesn't think of often. He'd rather just write the next song, and the next, and the next, etc., etc.

"I'm not proficient enough as an instrumentalist or musician to do anything that's too outside the parameters of whatever it is I'm doing," he said. "I'm just fortunate I'm able to keep doing the music that inspires me to make more music.'

of excess and was pretty egomaniacal. You get to see that aspect of him in the show."

He says he and his cast mates (Scott McMeen as Jefferson and Thom Hofrichter as Tolstoy) have enjoyed "exploring the historical aspects of the characters and finding the humor in the piece. The larger-than-life personalities of these historic figures makes them fun to play, and I think the three of us have developed a great chemistry.

Ernsberger has also embraced the challenge of memorizing his character's uniquely written dialogue.

"Dickens' speaking style is very specific," he says. "I have not had this level of memorization in about seven years, and if you don't use that muscle, especially as you age, it takes a while to get it back to form."

Hofrichter, the artistic director at First Pres, handed the directing reins over to Chance Parker so that he himself could perform in the piece.

"Thom is great to work with," says Ernsberger. "The last major role I had in Fort Wayne before I left for graduate school was playing the Fool to his King Lear at IPFW. so we already have an established rapport onstage and understand how each other works. Our characters have an exchange about Lear - Tolstoy was not a fan - so that's kind of a fun moment considering our

Ernsberger is proud of Fort Wayne and its continuing growth and evolution.

"Part of the reason I came back was the tremendous energy I am seeing here with all of the major projects that the community is backing to improve the quality of life here,' he says. "I see the arts as a vital part of that community-building, and I think Arts United is a leader in ensuring that the arts claim a place at the table as we move forward."

Initiatives like the Public Arts Commission "moves Fort Wayne in the right direction," he says.

"Arts United's longtime mission of providing both financial and administrative support for local arts organizations is just one aspect of the things I get to be a part of

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





The lineup we will see in Wabash will not be that lineup, however, as **Don Dokken** and **"Wild" Mick Brown** are the only originals that still tour as Dokken. Jack Russell's Great White released *He Saw It Comin*' last year. Russell is the only original member of Great White in this band, but longtime multi-instrumentalist **Tony Montana** is also in the band.

Strangely enough, the other **Great White**, simply called Great White, will make an appearance with the original Dokken guitarist **George Lynch** as part of **Lynch Mob** on September 29 at BMI Speedway in Versailles, Ohio. This Great White, featuring original guitarist **Mark Kendal**l, long-time drummer **Audie Desbrow** and long-time multiinstrumentalist **Michael Lardie**, released an album last year as well. Called *Full Circle*, it leans much more toward the blues rock feel of older Great White releases than the Jack Russell's Great White album does. Kendall and company will headline the night with Lynch Mob serving as the opening act. The 80s bands have spun such a strange web over the years, haven't they?

Schumer Keeps *I Feel Pretty* Afloat

Amy Schumer stands in front of a mirror at the beginning of I Feel Pretty. She smiles. She vamps. She fluffs her hair. Slowly, her enthusiasm and confidence sinks, and she gets the look of hurt of someone not happy with what she sees staring back at her. Women – and plenty of men, too, I suspect – do battle with the mirror in the same way.

In this brief encounter with the mirror – and the camera – Schumer proves she has what it takes. She registers a range of emotions without saying a thing. For most of the raucous duration of I Feel Pretty, Schumer throws much more than her face into the fray, and the force of her personality keeps us on her side, even when the material makes us swoon with discomfort not infatuation.

Renee, Schumer's character, sporting a retro Sex and the City necklace with her name in gold, works a thankless internet job in a hovel in Chinatown. The company, Lily LeClaire, is headquartered in a much fancier location and sports a staff of model wannabes, all very attractive, all very snobbish. Well, mostly snobbish.

Renee's dream, her wish, is to be "undeniable pretty" just to see what it feels like. Then she could snag a job in the main office in the exalted position of receptionist. If this sounds very The Devil Wears Prada, it is. But Renee's transformation doesn't come through hard work and a fairy godfather, it comes from a serious bump on the head which leaves her with the delusion that she is what she has always wanted to be.



Schumer continues to look like Schumer, fleshy and fetching, but her attitude is through the roof. She doesn't notice that her friends, two loyal buddies, Jane and Vivian, played by Busy Philipps and Aidy Bryant, don't quite see what she sees.

And the man she flirts with, Ethan (Rory Scovel), doesn't get it either, but he is a guy struggling with his own aspirations and self image issues. He's captivated by her confidence and her sweetness.

Michele Williams is Avery LeClaire, the head of Lily LeClaire. She is the flip side of Renee, a privileged beautiful woman with a squeaky voice and a case of insecurity. Avery sees the spark in Renee, and she needs guidance while the company launches a budget cosmetics line targeted for Target customers.

Under the voice and insecurity, Avery does know what she is doing. She isn't a dummy, just a scared rabbit. But she champions Renee. And Renee responds. Seduced by thinking she is so beautiful that her appearance is what people are responding to, she loses some of her humanity, but she doesn't really lose her core self.

The supporting cast, all folks on some part of the spectrum of attractiveness and

talent and judgment, fill their roles nicely, including Emily Ratajkowski, Sasheer Zamata, and Adrian Martinez, Tom Hopper and Lauren Hutton.

Abby Kohn and Marc Silverstein are writer/directors here. The pair wrote the screenplays for How To Be Single and He's Just Not That into You. Without Schumer and their great supporting cast, the holes in the story would feel more naked than Schumer seducing Ethan.

A second bump on her head brings her back to herself, somewhat. My only quarrel with I Feel Pretty is that she doesn't realize sooner that she has been delusional. The picture could have done a lot more to deepen Renee's realizations of what she has experi-

Her friends, her colleagues and her new sweetie were always on her side, even when she barely knew who she was. Schumer could have made a different set of realizations even more poignant. Still, I Feel Pretty is a healthy reminder for all of us to be our best selves.

A couple of bumps on the head is a small price to pay for the reward. They allow Renee to step outside of her comfort zone and grow. At the movies, that may require a concussion. I hope that the lesson of the movie, which I translate into "be your best most confident self," can just involve watching movies and listening to good mentors, friends and family.

Marvel Aims To Destroy the Movie Industry

Tops at the Box: John Krasinski's A Quiet Place is officially the first big horror breakout film of the year. In its third week A Quiet Place took the No. 1 spot at the U.S. box office, selling another \$22 million while upping the flick's 17-day U.S. sales total to \$132 million. Usually these director's notes tell you briefly a little of the plot of the show we're doing, then explain a bit about why we decided to put it on this season and how the production will inform you or how it speaks to a larger issue, etc. With this production I'm at a bit of a loss as to how to approach the usual formula.

The show is Arena Dinner Theatre's production of Tim Firth's *Calendar Girls*. Many readers may be familiar with the movie, again written by Firth, on which the play is based.

Produced in 2003 and starring Helen Mirren and Julie Walters, the film tells the true story of six middleaged women, all members of a chapter of the Women's Institute in England, who pose nude for an "alternative" calendar in order to raise money for a new settee for a hospital

waiting room in memory of one of their husbands who has died from leukemia.

The news of the women's charitable venture spreads like wildfire, and hordes of press soon descend on the small village of Knapeley in the Yorkshire Dales. The calendar is a success, but two char-

acters' friendship is put to the test under the strain of their newfound fame.

Since the play's premier, it has become the fastest selling play in British theater history.

Gloria Minnich, who plays Annie in our production, brought the script to my attention well over a year ago and thought it might be something Arena would be interested in producing. Already familiar with the movie, I read the script of the stage version and fell in love with the story all over again.

At face value, the show doesn't have a lot of over-arching themes that speak to the human condition. But in the hands of my brilliant cast, the show makes me smile and laugh and cry, and sometimes

A Journey of the Mind

A growing amount of modern entertainment lacks what art and theater typically target and thrive upon: the demand for mental interaction and the inherent intuition on the part of the viewer or reader.

When Scott Carter was penning this impossible interaction between three of the world's most famous and influential thinkers. he must have remembered that greatness comes from loss and mistakes; that it is also born out of perseverance and drive; and, perhaps most significantly, greatness stems from an absolute addiction to seeking and examining potential answers to the most cryptic questions of this

world, regardless of the era in which one lives.

Luckily for theatergoers of First Presbyterian Theater's final show of the 2017-18 season, these cryptic questions are the crux of the exchange between Thomas Jefferson (d. 1826), Charles Dickens (d. 1870) and Count Leo Tolstoy (d. 1910). Each man enters a solemn room with his most recent memory being the moment he died. Once they learn one another's identity and general attitude toward religion and philosophy, the story shoots off in a flurry of intellectual perspectives mixed with light-hearted humor.

Scott McMeen returns to this stage as Jefferson and provides an optimistic performance as the former president and framer of the Constitution. Earlier this season he warmed our souls as Ebenezer Scrooge in the modern take on *A Christmas Carol*. Here McMeen rations the widely accepted and respectable historic view of Jefferson with an introspective glance at a man whose morals on paper were, perhaps, not as sound in reality.

Brian Ernsberger treats us to a confident and quite humorously pompous version of Charles Dickens. While Ernsberger has performed with FPT and other Fort Wayne theaters in the past, his return to the Summit City stage fills a six-year void. With occasional quips to "his" own works throughout the discourse among all three men, Ernsberger successfully captures the often-exaggerated aloofness of the British author.

Rounding out this tremendous trio, Thom Hofrichter enters as Count (but don't call him that!) Leo Tolstoy. With his convincing Russian accent, Hofichter exhibits his passion for language, philosophy and religion in convincing fashion. This play winds up Hofrichter's 21st year with the theater as its managing artistic director.

The story examines some of the most controversial issues of mankind, but the title is indicative of the premise of how each man had at one point in his life rewritten the opening four books of the New Testament. The arc of this after-life summit of great thinkers examines how each man from his generation and region contemplated the biblical text and specific passages. Citations to exact verses are identified, but when some disparity and disagreement evolves, the action of the play ignites. These men are humans after all, so even in death they find themselves desiring to be heard, wanting to be right and verbally sparring over their points of view.

Director Chance Parker suggests that the play takes each character "on a journey through essential questions pertaining to life, truth and faith in every meaning of the word." Parker, a recent graduate from IPFW, codirected this season's *Red* with Hofrichter.

Jeannie Pendleton's resumé in costume design is deep and respectable, and she brought her talents to this cast and performance. Each character is not only distinctive in reputation and language, but each man's clothing represents another facet of his personality and perspective.

Rae Surface and Austin Berger return to FPT for this performance with positions as technical director/set designer and light board operator, respectively. Surface's simplistic set is suggestive of a cleared mind in the after-life. Though the props are minimal, they function appropriately throughout this dialogue-heavy performance.

In the canon of children's literature there are a few particularly deft writers who can command the attentions of the very young while still writing intelligently enough to capture the delight of an older audience. Among those writers is Frances Hodgson Burnett whose classics A Little Princess and The Secret Garden are timeless treasures which work regardless of what age the reader may be when they first experience them.

This month's production of *The Secret Garden*, brought to life at the PPG ArtsLab stage courtesy of all for One, is as captivating as the novel itself, and it is quite possibly one of the best Fort Wayne productions in recent years. The venue is ideal, with an intimacy which doesn't require microphones and amplification while allowing the audience to feel close to the per-

formers. The stage is equally intimate which could be an obstacle to adequately conveying the scope of the story, but here is where this production truly shines. The set is remarkable as well, allowing for three rooms inside the household and both sides of the garden itself. The simple but effective

means of moving inside the "secret garden" is nearly magical, perfectly conveying the excitement the reader feels when reading the book – just enough detail to invoke the garden but enough ambiguity to allow the audience's imagination to fill in the rest. The set and lighting are truly genius components to a flawless presentation.

The cast is also remarkable with several standout performances, but it is the astonishing talents of three young actors who deserve recognition. Micah Gilliom brings depth to the role of Colin Craven, making the boy both tragic and hilariously bratty, while Tori Beth

Bowman tackles the role of Martha Sowerby with a maturity that belies her tender age. But of course, no production of *The Secret Garden* can succeed without the right young actress in the role of Mary Lennox. Sullen and peevish at the outset – and capable of a decent tantrum at any moment throughout – Mary must transform gradually and believably to make the story work, and Violet Park nails it on every level. The subtle evolution of Mary as the story unfolds is beautifully portrayed, and Park is an actress to watch in the

years ahead.

Another young talent who deserves attention is Torilinn Cwanek who provided the incidental music for the production. This marks the second time this 9th grader's music has been used in an all for One performance (the other being *A Little Princess* in 2014).

Of course, these young people do not accomplish all of this without the support and direction of two special adults. Lauren Nichols, artistic director for all for One, is on stage for several scenes as the story's one maternal figure, Mrs. Sowerby, and served not only as dialect coach but is also Cwanek's piano teacher. And director Lorraine Knox tapped a lot of raw and fresh talent for all it was worth in this magical presentation.

The Secret Garden is a winning outcome to a perfect ensemble of talent.

Tragedy in Blue & Red

Romeo and Juliet is a play pretty much everyone knows, whether they remember the specific details beyond that it is the love story of two kids whose families are enemies or not. For that reason, adding anything really new to it is tough. IPFW's Department of Theatre's Beverly Redman manages to do just that in subtle

ways in its current production.

One of the most striking elements of this staging is the red and blue color theme which dominates the stage through lighting and costume choices for the Montague and Capulet families and secondary characters. This choice is effective and makes the "sides" of family war constantly apparent.

I will not waste anyone's time with the summary of the well-known plot but instead consider how the unexplained battle between the families transcends time and still has much to say in a time when we all are, unfortunately, seeming to pick sides. The theme that hate has to be taught is especially apparent in Redman's direction and production choices here. That and a reminder that no one really wins through hate make it worth seeing.

As the staging is, if my memory serves correctly, faithful to the original script (with the likely exception of some edits for timing), the obvious political themes may not be explored as fully as taking more liberties might allow.

Valleri Bowman plays Juliet and in early scenes fills the young character with exuberance and charm. This sophomore grows stronger with each performance. As Romeo, Daniel Moser is well cast. He has a great look for the character. Freshman Moser is an extremely welcome addition to the IPFW group of young actors. As he demonstrated in *I Love You*, *You're Perfect*, *Now Change*, he has an incredibly strong singing voice that should lead him to many a starring role. What is unfortunate is that between *I Love You* and *Romeo and Juliet*, he must have gotten braces and not grown used to them quite yet.

Roles in Shakespearean plays, of course, can bring massive challenges, but a standout in rising to those challenges is Casey Stombaugh, who plays Mercutio. He projects and enunciates each word brilliantly as he struts and jokes throughout his performance.

The interesting combination of elements comes together. The choices merge most effectively in the party scene for which perfect musical choices leads to dances that serve to lighten the tone, if only briefly. The other members of the cast turn in good performances, as well. The current group of actors in the department is surely one of the strongest I can remember.

My only real complaint with the production is that it was a struggle throughout to hear many of the actors, which is even more problematic when the dialogue is coming from Shakespeare. I'm not sure what led to the issues with projection of voices.

Although it sometimes seems as if we might move on and divert resources from re-tellings of the tales of Shakespeare, retellings such as this one always offer insights into humanity, with all its defects and beauty.

Bill Lane is the projection designer and operator, and Sara Ihrie, a Snider High School freshman, returns to the sound board after a successful stint in the same position for the theater's previous play, *Hamlet*.

One does not need to have a deep understanding or experience with each of these men's accomplishments or publications for the story and its themes to resonate. The universality of the themes shines through in each scene. Upon its conclusion, audiences are all but forced to contemplate the same issues for themselves and how the shared points of view apply to their surroundings. This serves as a formidable end to another outstanding season from the the First Presbyterian Theater.
