

All that plus reviews and previews of local concerts and stage productions. Whatzup really is everything you need to step out on the town.



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

Intimate performance of a classic

Chorus tackles a busy, condensed schedule for holiday season.

It might surprise casual fans to learn that Handel's *Messiah* was never intended to be a celebration of Christmas. In fact, its world premiere in Dublin took place closer to Easter, in April 1742, which is just as appropriate. But over the years the "Hallelujah Chorus" has become a beloved part of many Christmas performances, including the Fort Wayne Philharmonic's annual Holiday Pops productions.

For the last few years, fans have enjoyed candle-light performances of Handel's complete *Messiah* at First Wayne Street United Methodist Church. Overseeing the performances is Benjamin Rivera, director of the Fort Wayne Philharmonic Chorus.

Rivera is a busy director, working with more than half a dozen choral

groups in Chicago. With only the Fort Wayne Philharmonic Chorus pulling him away from the Windy City, Rivera this year is not only preparing the chorus for their *Messiah* performances, but also is conducting them.

"Last year was the first year that I conducted the *Messiah* in Fort Wayne," Rivera said. "In the five years we've been doing it since I came in 2013, there have been three different conductors. So when I was preparing the chorus in previous years, I had to prepare them for a variety of ways that the conductor might approach the piece. I had to anticipate different styles and rehearse the

chorus for whatever might happen.

That simplified approach is appreciated this year because the chorus is enjoying a busy, condensed schedule of performances, including a particularly difficult one just a few weeks ago.

"This year has been difficult calendar-wise," Rivera said. "This season with the Philharmonic Chorus is particularly front-loaded. Our first performance came around the beginning of November and will be over in mid-March. We have the same number of performances this season, but they're all taking place in a four-month period. So that's been challenging."

FINDING THE RIGHT BALANCE

It has also taken time to find the right balance for the members of the chorus, comprised of volunteers who often have other musical commitments particularly during the busy holiday season. The full performances of *Messiah* and the Holiday Pops performances of "Hallelujah Chorus" put a strain on the ability to present a full chorus for each show.

"We have been doing things a little differently in the last few years," Rivera said. "For the chorus, since they're volunteers, we didn't consider the Holiday Pops performances mandatory because we realized it represented a scheduling problem for many who are also in their church or other community choirs and ensembles.

"But then we started running into problems with presenting a full chorus, so we decided to make it semi-optional, having a smaller choir, and then we thought we'd bring in a professional ensemble for the Holiday Pops shows and now call that the Holiday Pops Chorale.

"I think we've finally struck the right balance. We bring in four professionals to supplement the Philharmonic Chorus and rehearse all of them together."

MESSIAH THE WAY IT WAS INTENDED

The group performing Handel's *Messiah* at the First Wayne Street Methodist Church will be comprised of 65 singers, which Rivera says is just perfect for the church.

"The chorus plus the chamber orchestra is a nice size for the venue," he said. "When the piece was performed 50, 75 years ago, it was a big-boned Baroque-style performance with 250 people in the choir. But performing it as we do is really the way it was originally intended — with a small, manageable group which is really perfect for that room. It'll sound forceful and bold without being oppressively loud."

With performances of Holiday Pops taking place on Dec. 7-8 and Dec. 15, Rivera says the *Messiah* performances are perfectly sandwiched between and provide a nice addition to the Philharmonic's holiday offerings.

He looks forward to his second opportunity to conduct the chorus he's now been working with for over five years.

"In the end we're all servants to the music and the composer, but we all have different ideas of what that might be," Rivera said. "Getting to perform that with this chorus provides a really relaxed atmosphere because many in the chorus have performed the piece before so we all know the music. Knowing I'll be conducting makes it a little more personal for me."

The power of positive music

Award-winning vocalist packs a message of love.

A few years back, Alvin Love III came to his mother, gospel legend CeCe Winans, with an idea for a new album. Winans' response was not detailed, but it was succinct.

"I was just like, 'Huh?'" she said in a phone interview.

Love III reiterated his vision for the project, a project he wanted to steer from start to finish.

"I'm like, 'No," Winans recalled.

"He had never produced a whole record before, and it had been eight years since I had put out new music. So I'm like, 'No, I don't think so."

But her son persisted, and the resulting album, Let Them Fall in Love, went on to win the Grammy Award for Best Gospel Album.

— CeCe Winans When Love III subsequently came to her with an idea for a Christmas album, her attitude about such collaborations was much changed.

"I really couldn't give him any trouble the second time around," she said, laughing. "I told him: 'Anything you say, I'll do.' I was a pretty submissive mom."

Winans will perform music from that Christmas album, Something's Happening!, at The Clyde on Dec. 15 as the featured performer of the Euell A. Wilson Center 25th Anniversary Celebration Concert. Local artist Christiana Danielle will also perform.

BACKGROUND OF TOUGH LOVE

CeCe Winans was born Priscilla Marie Winans in Detroit on Oct. 8, 1964. She was the eighth of what would amount to 10 children born to David and Delores Winans.

Winans' parents were strict. No secular music was allowed in the house, but singing gospel was considered a compulsory activity.

"Back then, kids didn't have a say so," she said. "My parents would say, 'You're going to sing this song on this program.' You'd say, 'OK, but I don't

want to.' And they'd say, 'Who cares what you want to do?"

Winans loved singing, but didn't love singing lead vocals.

"My brothers, they loved to be out front," she said. "I was definitely not someone who ever wanted to be out front. But they saw something in me that I didn't see in myself."

Winans recalled seeing people crying during her performance and realizing that what she was doing was larger than herself and her fears.

"When I was 17, (brother) BeBe and I started recording and we started getting letters right away from other young people who'd say things like, 'I was contemplating suicide but I heard your music on the radio and I decided to give life another try," Winans said. "I thought I was just out there doing music. But I realized the power of music. If it's positive, it's going to affect people in positive ways. If it's negative? Unfortunately, it's going to be just as powerful."

During their 15-year professional collaboration, Bebe and CeCe Winans won three Grammy Awards, two NAACP Image Awards, nine Dove Awards, and two Soul Train Music Awards. They earned three Gold albums and one Platinum album.

They also generated no small amount of controversy.

THE SACRED-SECULAR DIVIDE

Given how freely musical genres are mashed up these days, it is easy to forgot how protective some people were of the gospel and Christian music genres in the 1980s and early '90s.

Bebe and CeCe Winans were not afraid to make use of what were seen as secular elements in their music. They were heavily criticized for it.


"Whenever you're misunderstood, it hurts," Winans said. "We really got misunderstood, but we also got a lot of credit we didn't deserve. We didn't create contemporary gospel music. We didn't realize the rest of the world really hadn't heard the music we'd grown up listening to. They were just used to hearing a pipe organ.

"We just created music that we loved and music that had a love message," she said. "Sometimes you knew it was a gospel song right away and sometimes you just knew it was a love song. But it was all pure."

The world soon came around.

When Winans visits the Clyde, there will surely be people in the audience who are there more for the music than the message. Even in secular venues, Winans said she is conducting a musical ministry.

"I hope that everybody receives the peace that I know is there for them," she said.






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




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Big Bad Voodoo Daddy pumps big-band jazz into the holidays.

The year is 1996, and there's a dance craze sweeping the nation. All the cool kids want to swing. As dance crazes go, this one is more immersive than most, with dancers donning period clothes when they hit the dance floor and clubs serving up a lot more martinis than they did the vear before.

This dance craze could be traced back to a single cultural moment: the release of the movie Swingers and its retro big-band jazz soundtrack. The hit movie launched the film careers of Jon Favreau and Vince Vaughn, and it fueled, for a glorious year or two, a nationwide swing mania.

And the band featured prominently in the movie, the deliciously named Big Bad Voodoo Daddy, has never stopped swinging.

HUMBLE BEGINNINGS TO THE SUPER BOWL

The band's story doesn't begin with Swingers, though. In the '80s in southern California, Scotty Morris and Kurt Sodergren were doing what a lot of musical kids were doing — playing in alternative and punk bands and trying to figure out what musical direction they wanted to go. When they formed their own band, they started focusing on grungy blues rock.

When guitarist Morris suggested adding a horn section to the band and playing swing music, drummer Sodergren went along, and they

began to develop a sound with a historical bent that combined jazz, swing, and dixieland. This unusual direction demanded an unusual band name. Morris had the perfect inspiration with his memory of meeting legendary blues guitarist Albert Collins and asking for an autograph.

"He signed my poster, 'To Scotty, the big bad voodoo daddy," Morris said. "I thought it was the greatest name I had ever heard on one of the greatest musical nights of my life. So when it came time to name this band, I didn't really have a choice. I felt like it was handed down to me."

Through the early '90s, the band built a following at places like The Derby in Los Angeles, but they didn't know they were part of anything more than a local trend. When they encountered other bands playing swing, Sodergren recalls they "definitely knew something was going on," but it wasn't until the little indie film they'd appeared in became a big hit that reality started to sink in. Suddenly, the band was able to book gigs across the country.

It's hard to overstate how big it became from there. The Swingers soundtrack made songs like "You & Me & The Bottle Makes 3 Tonight (Baby)," "I Wanna Be Like You," and "Go Daddy-O" into the most familiar tunes of the exploding swing movement, and BBVD became the de facto face of swing, appearing on every talk show on TV, along with the occasional sitcom, dance competition series, and animated kids' show. The pinnacle,

arguably, was the band's performance in the halftime show of Super Bowl XXXIII in January 1999.

PUTTING THE 'WIN' IN 'SWING'

The pinnacle, maybe, but far from the end. Since 1998, the band has released eight studio albums and a live CD/DVD compilation. In 2009, they released How Big Can You Get? The Music of Cab Calloway, a tribute to the artist who has been perhaps the biggest influence on their music. In 2004, they released their first holiday collection, Everything You Want for Christmas. While other pioneers of the '90s swing revival have come and gone, BBVD has not slowed down, charging through 2018 in celebration of their 25th year as a hard-working band.

One thing that keeps them going is their Christmas tours, which they've turned into something of a tradition over the past several years. Their holiday shows, including the Dec. 16 show at the Clyde Theatre, find the natural connection between big-band jazz and the Christmas season. This year's edition of the Christmas tour, the Wild and Swingin' Holiday Party, will include a set list of favorites from BBVD's two Christmas albums, 2004's Everything You Want for Christmas and 2013's It Feels Like Christmas Time.

The show will also feature another of the band's favorite parts of touring: a generous meetand-greet with fans after the show. Since the early days of swing mania, when BBVD was learning that they were drawing fans from coast to coast, they've made a point to say hello after the show to anyone who wants to stick around and "hang out until they kick us out."

"It's a great way to stay connected to our fans and form a sort of patchwork family across the country," Sodergren said.

Courthouse rings with choral song

Heartland Sings sustain their new holiday tradition.

Whether it's walking through a Winter Wonderland or ringing Jingle Bells, it's easy to celebrate the most wonderful time of the year through music.

Heartland Sings honor those holiday traditions by performing at the Allen County Courthouse each season for the group's Spirit of Christmas concert. It has become a Fort

Wayne favorite, not just because of the harmonies, but because of the unique venue.

Ashlee Bickley, an alto who's been with Heartland Sings for about six years, says it provides a completely original sound.

"The acoustics in the courthouse are very 'live.' There's all that marble and a lot of limestone and the sound just bounces off of it and rings through the whole venue," Bickley explained. "With the dome overhead, that also creates an interesting acoustic space, so the sound kind of shoots up and bounces back down. The sound rings for several seconds after we're done singing, so it kind of envelopes the audience. It's just beautiful music in a beautiful space."

"The music is truly all about the space, about the architecture there," echoes Director of Marketing David Bobay. "It's a lot of a cappella music done to exemplify all the cool acoustics that the space can provide, specifically what voices and vocal music

can do in a place like that."

REGIONAL REACH

For nearly two dozen years, Heartland Sings have been an outlet for talented musicians and a source of entertainment for audiences of all ages in about a 225-mile radius of Fort Wavne.

The ensemble is made up of near-

ly 30 vocal artists and a number of volunteers who come together to perform songs

from all genres.

"We have people who are current students at Purdue Fort Wayne all the way up to school teachers and retirees in their 70s and beyond," Bobay said.

This season's shows are as varied as the artists who perform them. The first took place in November and was a nod to The Carpenters.

Upcoming shows include Karaoke Classic Live: Endless Love, Celtic Landscapes, and Karaoke Classic Live: The Beatles. The other two, Jingle Bell Jazz and The Spirit of Christmas, are designed to get audience members into the holiday spirit.

"It includes classics like 'Silent Night' and 'Oh Holy Night,' but also includes songs that aren't quite as traditional," Bobay said. "We like to throw in a few foreign language songs and even an original or two since we always have the artistry and

the caliber to do something like that. We try to throw in a bit of unique music as well."

"I love the Spirit of Christmas concert," Bickley said, "because we sing beautiful arrangements of both common hymns that everyone knows like 'Silent Night' and 'The First Noel,' but also really nice choral pieces that are Christmas-oriented but you don't hear all the time. It's not a concert full of songs that are overplayed."

There are three performances of The Spirit of Christmas that take place in the beautiful rotunda inside the Allen County Courthouse. Tickets are \$30 in advance and \$35 at the door.

ENGAGING THE LISTENER

"For this show, it's just being able to share what we do with our community in such a unique way," Bobay said. "Not just sit down and listen to the music, but to engage with something that's really a local landmark.

"It's designed to bring people to a place like that for a new reason. People don't necessarily go to the courthouse for pleasant things, but to open up a landmark like that for something musical and affirming is exciting."

This is the fifth year for the Christmas concerts, which have become somewhat of a tradition.

"We do see a lot of the same audiences year after year," Bobay said. "They make it their holiday tradition. They can't call it Christmas

"We do get our tried-and-true donors and fans who come to this concert," Bickley said, "but we also attract various people in the community who just want an event to go to. People love it, so they return, but we also see a lot of new people."

During this time of family gatherings, gift giving, and Christmas cheer, it is easy to forget where we come from and what our ancestors sacrificed in order for us to enjoy the world we live in now.

With All Is Calm, a play presented Dec. 16 at the Niswonger Performing Arts Center in Van Wert, we have a chance to catch a glimpse of what it may have been like a hundred years ago on Christmas Eve 1914 when World War I was just a little over five months old.


The play details the night when gunfire suddenly went quiet along long stretches of the Western Front as British and German troops spontaneously observed an informal holiday truce. During a stoppage in war, the troops climbed out of their trenches and met each other halfway across No Man's Land to bury their dead and exchange small gifts.

Told mostly from the British point of view, the doc-

umentary-style play is a musical tribute to that brief time when Peace On Earth was not just some idealistic dream, but an actual, albeit brief, event. The show is told in the words and songs of the men who lived it as it incorporates spoken excerpts from period letters, autobiographies, poetry, and military documents with more than 30 songs from the era. — *Chris Hupe*

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
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

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

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Rhett Miller

The Messenger

For his eighth solo album, Old 97's frontman Rhett Miller dials back the tempo and fire that's typical of his work with his band. But his



brutally honest introspection remains the same whether he's in front of the band or going it alone.

The Messenger leans more on '60s rock for influence than on the country and honky tonk preferred by Old 97's, but the existential angst of Miller's work transcends genres, making an album that will feel cozily familiar to his long-

At times on The Messenger, Miller invokes The Byrds ("You Were a Stranger"). At other times, the tremolo guitar of surf rock is pushed to the front ("Total Disaster," "Close Most of the Time"). The consistent vibe, though, is one of nostalgia and songs that are disconcertingly out of time.

That vibe fits well with lyrics that are often about looking back at the way things used to be. The theme takes on its most literal form in "I Used to Write in Notebooks," which juxtaposes mundane observations ("I used to call the bank up for the temperature and time") with middle-age anxiety ("I lay awake and worry / Wonder when I'm gonna die"). That anxiety spills over into a song like "Wheels," which wants to celebrate a "marvelous night" but can't help noting that "the stars have all died."

Unlike his Old 97's songs, in which Miller's darker musings tend to hide behind energetic arrangements, The Messenger lays the darkness unadorned on the table. The album can be a rough listen as a result, but the sincerity of Miller's self-assessment makes it appealing nonetheless. — Evan Gillespie

For all of Billy Corgan's disparaging talk of other '90s rock bands riding a lucrative wave of nostalgia by reuniting and playing their classic records live in their entirety, he sure seems to be making the most out of

The newly reunited SP have made good on a celebratory tour for their 30th anniversary, and probably most intriguing of all: news of a new record that features guitarist James Iha and drummer Jimmy Chamberlin together with Corgan for the first time since the Machina albums of the

the partial Smashing Pumpkins reunion.

The Rick Rubin-produced, preposterously titled, tenth album, Shiny and Oh So Bright, Vol. 1/ LP: No Past. No Future. No Sun, keeps one eye on their illustrious past while another looks more towards what the future could hold for the group.

What we're getting in Shiny and Oh So Bright

is a better, more rock-oriented version of 2014's Monuments to an Elegy, where Corgan keeps the run time brief but still occasionally employs questionable artistic choices. Album opener "Knights of Malta" begins in earnest with feelings of optimism and a gospel choir chanting, "We're gonna make this happen/ I'm gonna fly forever." But it still falls prey to Corgan doing his best Millennial whooping impersonation in an attempt to make SP sound more contemporary.

The album's singles, "Silvery Sometimes (Ghosts)" and "Solara," also do their best to recapture the vibe of their best-known albums and songs. But they are weighed down by lyrics that come across as pretentious or just plain confusing: "Rule like a tyrant/ Make like a valentine/ Tear like a siren/ Sulk like a sunken mine."

The back half of the eight-track, 32-minute record is where the band sounds like it's getting itself out of warm-up mode, with songs like "Marchin' On" and "Seek and You Shall Destroy" being some of the heavier, more worthwhile cuts.

While the *Vol.* 1 portion of the album's title alludes to more new material with this lineup, what we have been given with this first installment feels like a missed opportunity. It also doesn't help this album's cause to follow its immediate predecessors in how they rely on production crutches and heady, pseudo-medieval lyrics to make an impression.

Having Iha and Chamberlin back is a step in the right direction for a proper SP renaissance, but *Shiny and Oh So Bright* offers only a tentative answer for why music fans should care about the Smashing Pumpkins in 2018. — Colin McCallister

Earthless From the West

Earlier this year, California power trio Earthless released their fourth full-length album, Black Heaven. It was a tighter, more



compact album than 2013's epic From the Ages, showing Earthless can make bite-size jams for mix tapes and when you want to just rock out for three minues, as opposed to 30.

There aren't many live albums I tend to get into. One of the few is Earthless' Live at Roadburn. It's a massive set that shows just how tight a band Earthless is. Their strength shines through on stage, so whenever there's a chance to hear these guys do their thing in front of an audience, I jump.

That chance has popped back up in the form of From the West, another immense live album from Earthless. The set, recorded on the eve of the release of *Black Heaven*, shows the trio laying down some new jams, as well as some classics. The results are as good as you'd hope.

From The West gives us four of tightest tracks on Black Heaven, an Earthless classic, and an incredible Led Zeppelin cover.

From the get-go, the album blows up with the opening "Black Heaven." The mix and production of this live set is pristine that shines with this massive opening song. Earthless veers between classic rock and heavy metal live. Their sound

Hydra

Rock the World (1977)

Hydra were formed in the early '70s when rock n' roll was entering a decade of exploration. As the



psychedelic genre softened, southern rock slowly came around — thanks to the Allman Brothers — and this Atlanta-based trio brought the goods.

The title track starts off the release with Wayne Bruce on vocals in front of Spencer Kirkpatrick's straightforward blues-rock guitars. Think Bad Company with a southern vibe and you have Hydra. "Wasting Time" is also a guitar-based number that is heavier than The Allman Brothers and is the mandatory song about being in a band. A little guitar boogie in this one makes you wonder how you've never heard of Hydra. "Can You Believe" is more southern blues and has ingredients of ZZ Top, Foghat, and early REO Speedwagon. The roadhouse jam "Your Love Gets Around" almost sounds like some of the early stuff from Jeff Beck during the late '60s.

"To The Willowed" slows down the tempo significantly. Although it may be considered a ballad, the song has some progressive traits of both Kansas and even Styx. It doesn't take anything away from their sound and fits perfectly on an album that is mainly guitar-driven rock. "Feel Like Running" is perfect as it takes southern rock to the radio-friendly audience, since this was the last album they produced.

"Diamond in the Rough" closes the record and has an almost '80s feel about it. Think April Wine or Molly Hatchet or even KISS.

This is a solid record from some guys that may have gotten lost in the shuffle. It's worth a listen if you have a strong interest in the foundations of southern rock.

Fun Fact: Kirkpatrick's first band won a contest and opened for The Beatles in 1965, their only Georgia appearance. — Dennis Donahue

feels three-dimensional, and "Black Heaven" spotlights the living, breathing quality of their songs. "Electric Flame" follows "Black Heaven" with an almost NWOBHM vigor: part UFO, part Judas Priest, all blistering California sun.

Besides four of Black Heaven's scorchers, this set includes From the Ages epic "Uluru Rock." It's nearly 20 minutes of mind-melting space jams and Mitchell's fretboard mastery. If Pink Floyd and Robin Trower were somehow morphed into a space rock behemoth, they might sound like this epic song. And to end things, Earthless treat us to a mountainous rendition of Led Zeppelin's "Communication Breakdown."

Two hours of lights, sound, and rock n' roll: If you can't buy that ticket, then From the West is the next best thing. — John Hubner

Serviceable sequel hits familiar notes

ichael B. Jordan steps into the ring once again as heavyweight boxer Adonis Creed in Creed II, a sequel to the 2015 film that was itself a reboot of a franchise that seemed to be down for the count but still had some fight left in it.

While there are few fresh concepts or challenging ideas in this new entry, it willingly serves up the familiar pleasures and tropes that we commonly associate with boxing movies and specifically with the Rocky films of the

past. Taking over for Ryan Coogler after his success with Marvel's *Black Panther*, director Steven Caple Jr. isn't able to match the rich emotional depths found in *Creed*, although the fight scenes are often just as thrilling.

We're re-introduced to Creed as he's in the middle of a hot streak, on the precipice of becoming the world heavyweight champion with his mentor Rocky Balboa (Sylvester Stallone) and his fiancé Bianca (Tessa Thompson) in his corner. We soon learn there's trouble brewing in Ukraine as Ivan Drago (Dolph Lundgren), the boxer who killed Creed's father Apollo in the ring during the events of *Rocky IV*, has been relentlessly training his son Viktor (Florian Munteanu) to overtake Creed on the world boxing stage. With the legacies of their fathers inextricably linking the two boxers together, Creed and Drago take to the ring in an all-or-nothing brawl.

As is to be expected, there are plenty of callbacks to past Rocky films and particularly to *Rocky IV*, although the tone of *Creed II* is thankfully much more grounded in reality than most of its predecessors.

The chief issue this time around is that the overall narrative arc is painfully predictable from the first frame and, save for a few notable character moments, Caple Jr. does little to stray from the formula that has worked quite well in the past. Still, he hits most of the familiar story beats with gusto and by the time we're in the ring for the big fight, the groundwork that has been laid out is sufficient enough to root for our protagonist.

The script, co-written by Stallone along with Juel Taylor, spends plenty of time fleshing out the relation-

ship between Creed and Bianca, which is a smart move given how much chemistry Jordan and Thompson have on-screen. However, I wish there had been more time dedicated to the Drago family and the tragic backstory that contributes to their presence in this film. A pivotal scene in Russia between Ivan and Viktor is a poignant reminder of just how separated they feel, not only from one another, but also from their own country as well. I wish Caple Jr. had taken more opportunities like this to balance the struggles of the hero with the villain.

Still, fans of boxing movies will find plenty to enjoy in both the training montages (including a sequence in the desert with some memorable imagery) and the pair of electrifying fight scenes between the two heavyweights. Caple Jr. shoots these scenes with an appropriate level of visual verve and stages the action in a way that nicely juxtaposes Creed's quickness against Drago's seemingly insurmountable strength.

Creed II is a serviceable entry in the Rocky franchise that doesn't do as much as it could have done to distinguish itself from the pack, but also isn't the total letdown that it could have been either.

popular songs and stories. While Saul remains fixed at the keyboard, Didier and Hofrichter perform solos and duets with engaging renditions of classics such as "Chestnuts Roasting on an Open Fire" and "Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer." On his own, Didier stretches from crooner to rocker with exuberant versions of tunes such as "It's the Most Wonderful Time of the Year" and "Santa Claus is Coming to Town."

Hofrichter intersperses the tunes with dramatic readings from classic Christmas tales by Charles Dickens and Clement Clarke Moore, the author of "The Night Before Christmas." One of the most stirring portions of the opening act is a mixed-genre interpretation of "I'll Be Home for Christmas" which features Didier and Hofricter offering character-driven vignettes that connect with the theme of the classic song. This was a lovely segue into the second act due to its personal approach.

Hofrichter also said that the second act is devoted to the heralded "true meaning of Christmas." Through poignant slivers of significant verses from the Bible, Hofrichter and Didier bookend the stage with spoken-word and musical companionship to the story of the birth of Christ.

Magically woven into the original script is a connectivity of this beautiful theme to all viewers, regardless of their individual religious foundation. There is a distinct sense of humanity embedded in the second act.

Throughout the performance, viewers are likely to recall personal memories of the holiday season and reflect on the significance of those memories. The value of attending a review such as this has the same majestic power as all theater has: the opportunity to connect the performance to our own lives.

With a balanced series of playful, heartbreaking, and spiritual songs and stories, this show is the perfect holiday season experience for audiences of all ages.
