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A charming fairy tale

Fort Wayne Ballet, the Philharmonic team up

One of the most famous and beloved of all fairy tales, Cinderella, has been charming generations for decades. This year's spring production for Fort Wayne Ballet will be a staging of this fairy tale, the first for the company since 2013. Always a popular offering, Karen Gibbons-Brown said there are a few differences between the ballet and the animated version that many know best.

COLLABORATING WITH THE PHIL

"One of the differences is that the stepsisters are comedic figures," she said. "Many times those roles are performed 'en travesti,' with men playing the roles. But in our production they'll be played by lovely ladies, so they're not ugly stepsisters, but they do provide a comedic element to the story."

Although the Fort Wayne Philharmonic plays with Fort Wayne Ballet at only the first three performances of The Nutcracker, the spring production is their full collaboration.

"It is so lovely to work with a live orchestra, especially with the lovely score by Prokofiey," she said. "Not every community has the luxury of working with an orchestra as we do every year. Andrew Constantine will be conducting this

Also key to the production are the costumes, particularly when they arrive at the ball. One of the most popular elements of both the Cinderella story and of ballet is the beautiful costumes.

"Nan Possemato does such good work with our costumes," Gibbons-Brown said. "She's very creative in making new costumes but also very good at giving new life to our older costumes."

Cinderella also provides a lovely celebration for Fort Wayne Ballet, an homage to their long history, a history almost as long as that of the Cinderella ballet itself.

"People tend to include Cinderella as a classical ballet, but it wasn't staged until the late 1940s so it's actually a fairly new ballet in that sense," she said. "But it was the first full-length ballet that Fort Wayne Ballet staged, and it's a very important part of our history. When you think about it, it was pretty cutting edge that Fort Wayne Ballet was staging the ballet within 10 years or so of its premiere to the world."


The production includes four public performances as well as a school performance on Friday. Thanks to the success of a similar performance of The Nutcracker, a sensory-friendly will be performed on Sunday evening.

TWO CASTS

With that many shows in a short time, there are two casts in place to share roles. The role of

Cinderella will be played by Saki Morimoto and Amanda Eve Carrick.

Morimoto, originally from Osaka, Japan, began dancing when she was three and began her study of ballet seven years later. Having joined the Fort Wayne Ballet professional company in 2017, she has appreciated the experience she's gained so far from home.

"I've had many amazing opportunities I'm grateful for, but performing in China was one of best experiences so far," Morimoto said. "We got to travel to China as part of a cultural exchange trip to sister city Taizhou last fall. It was amazing to be exposed in a different culture, and this trip reminded me how art can bring people together."

The performances look effortless, but there are tremendous challenges to any role, particularly ones which are already so familiar to audiences.

"For me it is bringing the character to life," Morimoto said. "Usually the acting is built into the movement and pantomimes in classical ballet, but there is so much more to pay attention to, like posture, angle of the head, focus of eyes. And it's been a fun challenge to think about what I'm saying with the steps."

HOMEGROWN TALENT

Morimoto comes from another country, but dancers don't get any more homegrown than John Miller, who is sharing the role of Prince Charming with David Claypool. Miller was a student at the Academy of Fort Wayne Ballet from the age of

six and is now a member of the company.

"When we last performed Cinderella, I was a squire," Miller said. "Side note, I had a cast on my arm under the costume for the performance. When I was the squire, one of my favorite dance teachers, David Ingram, was the prince. It was a great experience to dance alongside someone I respected so much. Now that I am performing the prince this year, I can look back on what I learned from the last time we did Cinderella."

Tackling the role of the Prince is allowing Miller to grow not only as a dancer but as a performer.

"The thing I enjoy most about this role is definitely developing the character," he said. "Perfecting the steps themselves is enjoyable, but it pales in comparison to developing the emotion behind a role. The prince in Cinderella is supposed to be young and carefree, but the rest of the character is for me to decide."

As always, there will be Glass Slipper Parties following the matinee performances, a chance for fans of all ages to enjoy some treats and meet the cast for photo opportunities.

While there's definitely magic in meeting a Princess and her Prince, there will be plenty of other treats in the performance itself. Gibbons-Brown promises visually pleasing sets and a beautiful carriage, and she credits the production team with helping to provide all the stage magic that accompanies this magical story.

"Cinderella is escapism at its best," she said. "It has all of the elements of good storytelling."

Dancing to support people with disabilities

Easterseals Arc event raises funds and fun

With its instantly recognizable hook, referencing one of the most popular competitive shows on television, Dancing with the Arc Stars has become a popular event for Easterseals Arc.

Now in its 11th season, the event serves to raise both funds and friends for the organization which serves people with disabilities in northeast Indiana, helping them to remain independent while also offering support for family members. Although Easterseals receives government funding, there is a gap between that funding and what is needed to fully provide their wide range of services.

And that's where Dancing with the Arc Stars has been so valuable.

AN ELEGANT EVENING

Although it began a decade ago, the last few Dancing events have been overseen by Sheri Ward, director of development for Easterseals Arc. Under her watch, the event moved to the Grand Wayne Center, and it is there that this year's event will take place on March 21.

The evening features 10 couples — 10 community volunteers and 10 Easterseals Arc clients — competing through dance and

fundraising.

"Ballroom dancing is one of our therapies so we have volunteer instructors work with the couples for about 10 weeks," Ward said. "The event at the Grand Wayne is semi-formal, so it's an elegant evening, and dinner is provided. We have about 600 guests who watch 10 dances, and along the way we can share our mission and learn about the participants and their stories. I never leave that evening with dry eyes. There are so many emotions

that night as you see the progress that they're making. It really helps raise awareness for our programs."

Donations can be made online or by phone, and last year the event raised \$130,000 toward Arc's programming.

STAYING GRAND

Now in its third year at the venue, the Grand Wayne has allowed all of the supporting elements, such as lighting and sound, to improve, and a DVD is now being made of the evening and is available to participants soon after the event.

Aside from the financial benefits of the night, Ward said that the familiarity with the name, Dancing with the Arc Stars, helps them find new areas for sponsors, donations and volunteers.

"I can advertise all day long, but if people aren't connecting, then they aren't going

to be interested," she said. "These dancers are coming out of their comfort zones, and they're bringing in family and friends to support them. Following up after the event also helps keep people connected, and the more support Easterseals Arc receives, the better they can fulfill their promise to the disabled community of northeast Indiana.

"We follow up with a story or two and show how that money is being utilized and how it helped someone," Ward said. "Once people see what we're doing, they want to come back. Maybe they'll look into an employment opportunity or volunteer. Some prefer to work directly with the people we serve, but others can help just through our events. We have a carnival this summer and need volunteers to help with that. So there are many ways to support us."

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Musical lovingly skewers The Bard

Farsical comedy also pokes fun at Broadway tropes

The works of Shakespeare — be it the comedies, the tragedies, or the histories - are revered and untouchable.

Unless, of course, you're the musical comedy Something Rotten! which not only skewers the legend of the Bard but also tackles the holy tropes of musical theater and Broadway hits in general while simultaneously paying homage.

With its story of two brothers who are trying to make it in theater against the juggernaut of Shakespeare, Something Rotten!'s farcical romp was so strong that its pre-Broadway run in Seattle was canceled, allowing the show to go straight to the Great White Way.

Opening in spring 2015, the show hit the road just two years later and visits the Embassy Theatre next week.

SHOULD HAVE SEEN THIS COMING

Among those tackling some wellknown characters is Greg Kalafatas, whose Thomas Nostradamus is the purported nephew of the wellknown seer.

"This show is really appealing to me," Kalafatas said. "It's really a love letter to Shakespeare and to musicals and comedy. But if you hate Shakespeare, there is literally a song in the show called, 'God, I Hate Shakespeare,' so that song is for you. If you're a fan of musicals, there are a lot of inside references and jokes that you'll enjoy, but even if you don't know anything about them, they're still funny. The show is really well structured so that there are references that everybody

will get."

Kalafatas's road to stage glory is slightly different than some. He was recruited in middle school for a high school performance of Kiss Me, Kate and enjoyed theater throughout high school, but he was in college before deciding that theater was the direction his life would take.

"I went to the University of New Hampshire as an undeclared liberal arts major," he said. "I knew in high school that I still wanted to keep performing even if it was casually, so I applied to schools that had open theater auditions for non-majors.

"In my sophomore year, one of my professors was new, and since she didn't know anyone in the department yet, it was great auditioning for her because everyone was pretty equal to her. I was cast in her show, and one day I was waiting for my Subway sandwich for lunch, and she came by and sat down and told me she thought I had what it took to make it. I declared theater as my major and have never looked back. I think I knew all along that's what I wanted, but I just didn't have the confidence. I just needed someone to believe in me."

TAKING IN THE COUNTRYSIDE

Something Rotten! is a show that Kalafatas was familiar with before he first auditioned for the tour last spring.

"I actually saw the second preview on Broadway, and I was in the very front row," he said. "I got into the digital lottery for tickets, and I don't think anyone knew about it yet, so I got the tickets right away. I loved the show. It was totally my type of humor."

And the Nostradamus character is also well suited to his talents.

"This role really allows me to do what I do best. I'm kind of a crazy character actor, and this guy is slightly unhinged. But he means really well."

Kalafatas is no novice to touring productions, having also hit the road with The Drowsy Chaperone and The Buddy Holly Story where he played the Big Bopper. One of the things he most enjoys about the experience is seeing the country up close.

"I really enjoy seeing cities that you wouldn't necessarily go to otherwise," he said. "One of the first places we went was Madison, Wis., and there was so much going on. It has the state capital, and it's a college town. It's really a great city. It's fun to have some pretty new stops along the way and be surprised by cities like that.

"We also drove from Tucson to Utah, and that drive from Arizona to north of Salt Lake was great with all of the mountains. It's just fun to see how big the country is. And the theaters are all so different. Some places have older, historic theaters and some have really modern ones. So that's a lot of fun to experience."

FINDING THE FRESH TWIST

What remains the same every night is the text and the songs and the actors who take the stage. But Kalafatas said that even that is fresh thanks to the changes around them.

"When you're touring, every performance is different," he said. "You have a different audience, a different theater, a different city. And we as a cast find little spots to make it new every time.

"We might add a little beat or do something different when we're in the background of a scene, and that helps keep things fresh. Sometimes you just discover things in a scene you might not have before, and you say a line a little differently, and you'll get a new laugh.

"It can be hard to balance keeping it fresh with doing it the same because it's my job to do it the same. But when you've done something 160 times, you just look for those little moments."

'Under the Big Top' fundraiser aids hunger relief

After years of black-tie fundraisers, the Community Harvest Food Bank decided to try something different in 2018.

The organization hosted "Boots and Bling," a cowboy-themed event.

This year, it's "Under the Big Top" with circus accents, carnival games, auctions, raffles, and the sort of performers who are usually introduced by a ringmaster. It happens March 21 at Ceruti's Banquet and Event Center.

"Our goal is to raise \$100,000 for hunger relief," said Katie Savoie, a marketing specialist for the food bank. "Mayor Henry and his wife will be there so we're pretty excited to see them."

Admission includes two drink tickets, "heavy appetizers," and a door prize ticket earning a chance to win a dinner at Ruth's Chris Steak House with NBC33 news anchor Linda Jackson.

ALLEVIATING HUNGER

The food bank's mission is to alleviate hunger in the region with donated food and other resources.

The Community Harvest Food Bank distributes more than 13 million pounds of food in a fiscal year, Savoie said.

"We distribute to all nine counties in northeast Indiana and we partner with about 400 nonprofit pantries and different agencies that get food from our warehouse," she

said.

Roughly 85,000 people a year are fed by the food bank, Savoie said.

The money raised during the most recent of these annual fundraising events has been earmarked for fresh produce, she said.

"Our agencies are really focused on trying to provide healthy foods to the families that we serve," she

Savoie said money is more valuable to the organization than food because more can be done with money.

"For every dollar we receive in donations, we're able to distribute \$9 worth of groceries," she said.

The Broadway production of the musical opened in November 2000 and ran for less than six months, but it has found immense popularity in school and community performances.

FAMILY-FRIENDLY SHOW

It's fitting that they are working together since this production is a family affair in many

"I think we really need something like this right now," he said. "There's so much political angst and upheaval everywhere, and this show is the antithesis of all of that. A lot of theater and art in general are the antithesis of that, and it's something you can take the whole family to."

With many favorite Seuss characters featured (and still others referenced along the way), and the town of Whoville prominently featured, the cast includes more than 40 actors of a wide range of ages, preschool through college and up. The youngest, Henry Wedler, is only five.

"You do not want to share the stage with Henry Wedler," Brad said. "He is so good. All the kids are really great in this show."

"All four of the Wee Whos are delightful," Leslie agreed. "The whole cast is great, from the Wee Whos to the Wickersham Brothers who will try about anything. They just throw themselves around on the set, and it becomes infectious. Everyone around them has to step up their game."

UNIVERSITY-LEVEL DESIGN

Seussical the Musical is not just a great piece of community theater. It's a university production, and that means bringing in multiple



aspects of the campus and student community to help create the look of the production, something vital to any telling of a Seuss story. The joint effort provides the show with what it needs while providing students valuable experience.

"When you open up a Dr. Seuss book, the colors and the art are such a big part of it," Brad said. "That's what we want you to see on stage. We want to replicate those colors on the set and in the costumes. That's challenging, but it's going to be neat for the audience to

"The set alone is amazing," said Leslie. "It's been so great working with the Saint Francis School of the Creative Arts, and we're blessed to have so many amazing artists contributing to the show. It's like a Seussian wonderland, and they've used a lot of interesting products to create the look on the set."

Students have also provided video and animation sequences which will complement what fills the stage. Even the retired dean of the School of Creative Arts, Rick Cartwright, pitched in making the clover, using skills he acquired as a kid helping to make floats for

May Day celebrations.

SPECIAL CONNECTION

Lending more USF power to the production is a supportive alum with a special connection to the world of Dr. Seuss.

"Toni Murray is the sponsor for the show," Brad said. "She has played the Cat in the Hat for years in elementary schools. She has so much knowledge about all of the books he's written so that fount of knowledge has been helpful when she comes to rehearsals."

The Beauchamps are quick to credit those who created the village of Whoville, and they look forward to sharing it with audiences.

"When the cast appears on stage, it's jaw-dropping," Brad said. "Young and old will be smiling from the beginning to the end of the show. We're throwing everything at them - animation, lights, haze, fog. It's a huge technical achievement and has been very collaborative.


"We would visualize what we wanted and toss around some different ideas. Then we'd throw them against the wall to see what would stick. It's just such a fun show."

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LCD Soundsystem

Electric Lady Sessions

There are two different versions of LCD Soundsystem.



Then there's the other LCD Soundsystem, which consists of an amazing group of musicians that come together and help James Murphy bring these odes to getting old and insignificant into life on a stage. That version gave us *London Sessions* and the retirement record *The Long Goodbye*, which was recorded at Madison Square Garden as a farewell to James Murphy's long-running creative outlet.

The newest LCD Soundsystem album, *Electric Lady Sessions*, features the live musical family version of James Murphy's songwriting outlet. As with the previous live records, *Electric Lady Sessions* shows a band in their best form and a music project that has no business retiring.


Electric Lady Sessions is a mixture of LCD Soundsystem's music stretching from their 2005 self-titled debut to their comeback record American Dream in 2017. There's also a mixture of covers that range from album opener "Seconds" by the Human League to Chic's "I Want Your Love" to Heaven 17's political disco track "(We Don't Need This) Fascist Groove Thang." Some of the LCD-written highlights include "Get Innocuous" from 2007's Sound of Silver.

The *American Dream* track "Tonight" is put through the motions as well as the band burns it to the ground and builds it right back up.

The beauty of this "live" greatest hits of sorts is that Murphy and his musical crew hold nothing back. Where 2010's live-in-the-studio London Sessions felt a little small and compressed, Electric Lady Sessions feels like it's going to burst at the seams. This is a record showing a band as hot, primal, and as relevant as they've ever been. Here's to coming out of retirement, James. — John Hubner



Why Hasn't Everything Already Disappeared?



far brighter territory with the majestic pop of 2015's Fading Frontier. That album was a result of Bradford Cox being struck by a car near his home while walking his dog. Months of rehabilitation calmed the singer/songwriter and resulted in the brightest sounding Deerhunter record yet.

That pop-centric writing continues with their newest LP, Why Hasn't Everything Already



"Death in Midsummer" opens the album with bright harpsichord, piano, and boxy drums that gives the whole thing an almost Kinks feel. Lyrically, it's more morose as Cox sings about people wasting away in dead-end lives. "No One's Sleeping" warbles with synths and ghostly noises as crisp acoustic guitars carry us through the song.

Throughout Why Hasn't Everything Already Disappeared? Deerhunter swing and sway through pastoral pop that veers at times to almost folksy rock n' roll. One of the brightest moments is "What Happens To People?" It's the culmination of a sound that Bradford Cox has been working towards for nearly 15 years. It's a mixture of whimsical indie rock, AM radio of the early 70s, and art rock experimentation that the band has been toying with since the beginning.

Deerhunter continue to evolve into something new with each record. Bradford Cox proved himself to be one of the most intriguing and exciting performers and songwriters of his generation nearly a decade ago who continues to push himself as an artist.

Why Hasn't Everything Already Disappeared? shows even more growth, while never sacrificing those elements of danger that pulled us in from the beginning. — John Hubner

Bobbie Gentry's The Delta Sweete Revisited

Bobbie Gentry's *The Delta Sweete* was a commercial flop when it was released in 1968.



Since its release, the album has become the focal point of Gentry's under-appreciated career. Now, the New York-born indie band Mercury Rev has remade the album with the help of a dozen guest vocalists. It's an ambitious plan that faces formidable obstacles.

First of all, there's the difficulty of reproducing a cohesive concept album while using a broad stable of singers. The original *Delta Sweete* had Gentry herself to hold it all together, but *Revisited* is all over the vocal map, from the sultry jazz of Norah Jones to the dreamy mope of Hope Sandoval. Few of the singers bring Gentry's edgy sexiness to the songs, leaving the band's neo-psychedelia as the album's only consistency.

That psychedelia brings up another problem. While there are psychedelic elements on the original album, they were hardly the focus. More often

Stephen Malkmus and his band were on the verge of completing a decade of music when they released



this, their fifth and final album. Although it wasn't their best work, it wrapped up a long journey of great indie music from a band that fought the grunge scene, and stayed true to their sound.

Produced by Nigel Godrich, the band took a mellow-indie ride like some of their contemporaries of the same period (Radiohead, Oasis). But they continued the essential guitars from Malkmus and his childhood friend/bandmate Scott Kannberg.

Opening with the warm "Spit on a Stranger," the album rivals Wilco in its handsome arrangement, as does the toe-tapping "Folk Jam." "You Are Light" brings it down a notch and has a Radiohead-meets-Beck feel about it (Godrich produced some of their work). Lyrically, it's the best song on the release, and the guitars in the bridge are vintage Pavement.

"Cream of Gold" swirls around for four minutes and has a hint of psychedelia but is effective in the order it was placed on the album. "Platform Blues" takes it down to a hum but picks it up a minute in and includes some nice harmonica from Radiohead's Johnny Greenwood. "Ann Don't Cry" is one of my favorites from the record, if only because it reminds me of the Velvet Underground. And "Speak, See, Remember" has a nice little alt-country-blues feel about it. Again, you hear some Wilco in this track. The closer, "Carrot Rope," was their last single to hit the charts.

The band promoted this release with a tour, and things went bad at the 1999 Coachella Festival when Malkmus refused to appear. They broke up soon thereafter, but played again in 2010. — *Dennis Donahue*

than not, Mercury Rev seems to have missed the point, as on "Reunion." Gentry's original is an off-the-wall strange illustration of her memories of a Mississippi Delta childhood, but the Mercury Rev version inexplicably deletes everything remotely Southern from the song.

And that's the album's biggest challenge. Can an indie band from the Northeast reproduce an album that was entirely about the South? Perhaps the decision to erase the Delta from the album was better than ineptly trying to emulate it. But if *The Delta Sweete* was too Southern for 1968, this album is not nearly Southern enough for 2019. — *Evan Gillespie*

Slipknot have announced a return to the road, unveiling the Knotfest Roadshow that also features Volbeat, Gojira, and Behemoth. The 29-city tour kicks off at the end of July and works its way into our area Aug. 11 in Chicago. Other area stops are in Detroit on Aug. 12 and Indianapolis on Aug. 16.

Slipknot have also announced that they will have new music available for most of the tour as their long-awaited new album, still untitled, will drop Aug. 9.



Preserving the center of our arts

The Arts United Center is a treasure of architecture

Local historic preservation organization ARCH is shining its spotlight on the Arts United Center, a building that many people do not realize is historic and architecturally signifi-


As part of ARCH's Fun & Free lecture series, Miriam Morgan, chief operating officer of Arts United, will speak on the "Preservation and Activation of the Arts United Center." The lecture, which will take place at the downtown Allen County Public Library on Saturday, March 23, at 11 a.m., puts the spotlight on not only the history of the building but its future as well.

"Every year we leave one slot open in our five-lecture series to address something that isn't necessarily about ARCH," said Connie Haas Zuber, executive director of ARCH. "Last vear we had a lecture about the Riverfront development, and this year it's the Arts United Center.

"This is one of the most important historic preservation projects right now because the building is a city treasure. It's a world renowned treasure. It's part of our brand in the world, and we need to get the word out about it. That's why we invited Arts United to take part in the series."

WORKING IN AN ARCHITECTURAL JEWEL

For Morgan, learning about the Arts United Center's history has been a labor of love but one which she came to almost accidentally.



"When I first came to Arts United, I was a technical director," Morgan said. "I was working in this building every single day. I've always thought lobbies have a particular poetry especially when you're by yourself, and it's quiet. Because of my theatrical lighting background, I'm used to thinking about how an experience is affected by the use of light. The same is true of this lobby and the way the natural light affects the way you experience it.

"I was also having monthly experiences where someone would come to the door, desperate to come in to see the building. People who spoke multiple languages. People who said, 'I was in Chicago and rented a car to drive here just to see this building.' It was so cool so I had to know why so many people wanted to see it. I headed down to the archives in the basement to see what I could find, but there had been some water damage to a lot of the records and not everything could be saved."

That led Morgan to do some outside research on the building and its architect Louis Kahn. She found a documentary online — "My Architect" by Kahn's son Nathaniel - and enough other information to realize why the world so valued this building in which she spent her days.

"I knew we had something super unique here," Morgan said. "We have the only performing arts theater designed by Kahn in the entire world. He had five major masterpieces in 11 years. Some were completed before his death, some after he had passed. All of those projects influenced this building."

Her research has taken her to visit other Kahn structures and included a trip to Philadelphia where Kahn's alma mater, the University of Pennsylvania, houses his archives. Along the way, Morgan learned not only how Kahn designed his buildings, but why.

"Learning about how Kahn thought about civic spaces has been the most fun part for me," she said. "Going through the archives and seeing other buildings he designed — they all have a similar aesthetic to this building. He didn't find his language until the later part of his career, but now he's known for these different pieces that you find here."

SELECTING KAHN

Originally the Arts United Center was to be part of a larger cultural campus through downtown. The vision of some of Fort Wayne's

finest minds and philanthropic natures, the quest for an architect who could realize such a project was undertaken in the 1950s, which put Fort Wayne on the cutting edge of the era.

"At that time, New York City's Mayor Moses was working with people like John D. Rockefeller to build Lincoln Center," said Susan Mendenhall, president of Arts United. "In Atlanta, Robert Woodruff, the CEO of Coca-Cola, was working to build the Woodruff Art Center.

"Think about that. While these larger cities are building downtown art centers, Fort

In 1955 the Fine Arts Foundation (now Arts United) was formed. Three years later, fundraising for the project began.

The Redevelopment Commission was involved as the area needed to remove 180 buildings which stood on the tract of land where the Arts United Center, the Rosseau Center, the Fort Wayne Museum of Art, Three Rivers Apartments, and the city parking garage now stand.

While there was some controversy when Parkview Field led to the razing of several establishments, that was not the case in the 1950s.

"There was actually a great deal of support for it because most of those buildings were blighted," Haas Zuber said.

A search began for the best architect to put the plan into action, one that led to the decision to hire Kahn, regarded as one of the best architects in America. During a particularly fruitful phase of his later career, Kahn created his five masterpieces: Kimbell Art Museum, Phillips Exeter Academy Library, Salk Institute for Biological Studies, Indian Institute of Management, and the National Assembly Building of Bangladesh.

He also designed the Yale Center for British Art which provided inspiration for

his work on Fort Wayne's performing arts center. Given that broader understanding of the Arts United Center's importance to the history of architecture, it puts more emphasis on the importance of both maintaining the structure and continuing the original plan for the area.

DOWNTOWN ARTS CAMPUS

"This building was just one part of a comprehensive plan that included an entire downtown arts campus," Mendenhall said. "Even though we don't have all of those Kahn buildings here, his vision has guided our plans for developing this area. The organizations who have offices here in this arts campus served 527,000 people last year. Parkview Field had 420,000 and the zoo somewhere just over 600,000. And those numbers don't include events like Three Rivers Festival, Taste of the Arts, and the many dance competitions that have events here.

"For a lot of people, it's hard for them to think of the Arts United Center as a historic building because they remember when it was built," Mendenhall continued. "But this building is very important, and we want the community to see that a cultural district becomes a destination. What we have here is unique in the nation."

There are many needs which will be addressed in the upcoming renovation plans. Replacing an old, manual rigging system would provide greater efficiency and safety particularly since those who use the system are often volunteers instead of professionals.

Accessibility issues are also a concern and for the audience as well as for other visitors, including Youtheatre students and performers who have no easy means of reaching the upstairs at this time. Energy-efficient windows, which are currently putting a strain on the structure, should be replaced with lighter (yet still efficient) options.

Morgan also noted that the building is more than an auditorium and home to organizations like the Civic Theatre and Youtheatre. The Rolland Gallery, on the floor above the auditorium, hosts everything from weddings to city announcements like the unveiling of plans for the Riverfront development.

Providing that for Fort Wayne was at the heart of Louis Kahn's plans for the building, and as Arts United begins its campaign to properly maintain that vision, Mendenhall encourages residents to be part of that mission.

"Right now I would ask people to be an advocate," she said. "Come to arts and cultural events. Become a partner. Check out new and different things you didn't expect to find here. Come to Taste of the Arts in August and see what we have going on down here. I really see this as a call to action." "For a lot of people, it's hard for them to think of the **Arts United Center** as a historic building because they remember when it was built," Mendenhall continued. "But this building is very important, and we want the community to see that a cultural district becomes a destination. What we have here is unique in the nation."

If you read about them on their Facebook account it becomes immediately clear that The Cocaine Wolves are not Nickelback fans, so if that is your idea of great music, this show is not for you. However, if you like your music a bit edgier, The Cocaine Wolves might be what you are looking to hear.

The band's first album, Royal Feast, is an amalgam of everything they loved about hard rock and metal while growing up in a town full of characters that provided inspiration for the nine-track opus. Raised on Japanese Shinto beliefs, Ganz was taught that all objects and organisms have spirits, and objects that are discarded before their time weep at night inside the trash bin. This imagery became very prominent in her growth. The constant need to adjust to a new

environment as she moved from Japan to Brazil to Hong Kong during her formative years gave Ganz a strong desire to fit in and to create harmony in her life.

She describes her style as "3D impressionism," creating an illusion of solid form using plastic objects as brush strokes that become visible upon observation from close proximity.

Ganz taught design and drawing courses at IPFW between 2002 and 2012 and currently has work collected and exhibited in London, Tokyo, Takaoka, Isle of Man, New York, San Francisco, Monterey, Toledo, and the Fort Wayne Museum of Art.

Some of her recent exhibitions include Danze Della Natura at the Hermann Geiger Foundation in Cecina, Italy, and Metamorphosis, a temporary installation at the Lauritzen Gardens in Omaha, Neb. She also has a permanent installation in the lobby of Cimer Spa at the Paradise Resort in Incheon, Korea. — Chris Hupe

Guided History Tour Allen County Courthouse and **Historic Swinney Homestead**

March 21 offers a unique opportunity to take part in a guided tour of the downtown Allen County Court-

house and the historic Thomas & Lucy Swinney House on West Jefferson Boulevard.

Settlers Inc. hosts the event that begins at the Swinney House where you will find a 11/2-story brick and limestone structure that was later enlarged to 21/2 stories. Built in 1844 by Thomas J. Swinney, a pioneer settler of Allen County and a prominent Fort Wayne businessman of the time, the house features an Eastlake Movement front porch and was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1981. The house and land for Swinney Park were passed to the city of Fort Wayne in 1922.

After the Swinney tour, lunch will be served by Settler members before departing for the Allen County Courthouse on Calhoun Street. Built from Bedford Limestone





and Vermont granite with Italian marble details, the Beaux-Arts architecture-style structure, designed by Brentwood S. Tolan, began construction in 1897 with the dedication taking place September 23, 1902.

It includes such features as four 25 by 45-foot murals by Charles Holloway, 28 different kinds of scagliola covering 15,000 square feet, bas-reliefs, and art glass. Atop the building is a 255-foot high copper-clad domed rotunda topped by a 14-foot statue wind vane of Lady Liberty. The Courthouse also houses a fallout shelter underground. It was restored over a seven-year period from 1995-2002 at a cost of \$8.6 million.

Transportation for the tour is not included. Deadline for reservations is Thursday, March 14. — Chris Hupe





Terrific cast can't lift middling Marvel movie

The Marvel Cinematic Universe makes room for yet another superhero in *Captain Marvel*, an action-packed addition to the gargantuan series which is noteworthy for its female lead but not for much else.

It's a perfectly acceptable product from Marvel Studios, which has produced an average of two comic book movies a year for the past 10 years. But it rarely distinguishes itself enough to transcend that dubious designation. For a film that revolves

around its superheroine searching for her true identity, it's painfully ironic that the film itself doesn't break with the "Marvel formula" long enough to establish an identity of its own.

Set in the mid-1990s, the story centers around Vers (Brie Larson), a member of the alien race known as Kree who trains under the mentorship of the revered warrior Yon-Rogg (Jude Law). During a battle against their shapeshifting foes known as Skrulls, Vers escapes to Earth and is discovered by SHIELD agent Nick Fury (Samuel L. Jackson) after she crash lands inside a Los Angeles Blockbuster store. On the run from Skrull soldiers led by the treacherous Talos (Ben Mendelsohn), the two follow clues that point towards a hidden past that Vers had on Earth and advanced technology that may end the intergalactic alien feud once and for all.

The best elements of *Captain Marvel* revolve around the chemistry between Larson and Jackson in a storyline that feels like it's ripped straight from a '90s buddy-cop movie like *Die Hard with a Vengeance*. Thanks to some utterly convincing digital de-aging in post-production, Jackson looks like they pulled him right off the set from one of those films and placed him in this fish-out-of-water tale.

The banter and comedic timing between the determined Vers and the incredulous Fury lead to the biggest delights of the film and offer respite from the tiresome space conflict that drives the majority of the narrative.

Directors Anna Boden and Ryan Fleck, known for crafting intimate character studies like *Half Nelson* and

Sugar, would seem to be a great fit to tell an origin story with an amnesiac at its center. Sadly, the investigation of Vers and her backstory is relatively shallow and lacks the type of nuance that we've come to expect based on the directors' previous work. Their lack of experience in the action genre is apparent from the numerous setpieces that are somewhat enjoyable but lack the visual flair of other entries in the Marvel canon. There's also no doubt that some of the more rambunctious musical cues are incongruous with the rest of the film's general tone.

The cast certainly does the best that they can with the material and most of the actors and actresses are given at least one scene in which they really shine. Despite portraying a woefully underwritten central character, Larson is able to balance snark and stoicism to mostly make up for the script's deficiencies.

Newcomer Lashana Lynch is terrific in her limited role and her scenes with Larson are hands-down the most human moments in the entire film. There just aren't enough of them to give *Captain Marvel* the kind of emotional heft that it needed to stand out from the increasingly homogeneous superhero landscape.

COMING TO THEATERS THIS WEEKEND

Wonder Park, starring Kenan Thompson and Ken Jeong, is the latest from Nickelodeon Movies about an imaginative young girl who creates an amusement park filled with talking animals and fantastical rides.

Captive State, starring John Goodman and Ashton Sanders, depicts a world in which an uncompromising extraterrestrial force has fractured humanity into two opposing sides.

Five Feet Apart, starring Haley Lu Richardson and Cole Sprouse, adapts the young adult novel about pair of teenagers with life-threatening illnesses who fall in love after meeting in the hospital.

\$455 million worldwide over its first three days of release, making it the 18th most successful opening of all-time (despite mostly ho-hum reviews from critics).

It looks really bad to me, but I love seeing Boden, Fleck, Larson, Mendelsohn, and Jackson get the rock star treatment worldwide, as I know these are all people who will leverage the exposure this silly film offers them into more interesting work. The film holds a score of 64/100 on Metacritic, with an equal amount of glowing and negative reviews. Ultimately I think this will probably go down as yet another superhero film in a decade of way-too-many superhero films. The question remains: is the MCU killing or sustaining the film industry?

ALSO AT THE BOX

How to Train Your Dragon: The Hidden World continued to roll, taking the No. 2 spot at the domestic box office with another \$15 million in sales, bringing the film's 17-day sales total to just under \$120 million (\$435 million worldwide).

Tyler Perry's A Madea Family Funeral continues Perry's tour through all of the most common

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tropes in cinema history, taking the No. 3 spot at the U.S. box office over its second weekend of release, bringing the film's 10-day sales total to \$46 million. As usual for Perry's films, Family Funeral isn't selling any tickets outside of the U.S.

The LEGO Movie 2: The Second Part sold another \$3.8 million over the weekend, taking the No. 4 spot, upping the flick's total to just under \$100 million in domestic sales.

Robert Rodriguez's Alita: Battle Angel rounded out last weekend's domestic Top 5 with \$3.2 million in sales, bringing the film's four-week sales total to just \$78 million in the U.S. Oof. Alita has fared well in foreign markets, however, selling a solid \$383 million worldwide since its release.

Also of note: Vincent D'Onofrio's The Kid, a western starring Ethan Hawke, Dane DeHaan, and Chris Pratt, tested well, selling over a half million in tickets while playing on fewer than 300 screens.

NEW THIS WEEK

For adults and teens at least, this weekend will continued to be about Captain Marvel. Regardless, there are three films opening wide, starting with animated flick Wonder Park, voiced by Matthew Broderick, Jennifer Garner, Jeffrey Tambor, Kenan Thompson, Ken Jeong, Mila Kunis, and John Oliver. Looks fun.

Next up is Justin Baldoni's romantic drama Five Feet Apart, starring Haley Lu Richardson, Cole Sprouse, Claire Forlani, and ScreenTime favorite Moises Arias. Looks incredibly forgettable.

Finally we have Focus Features' new sci-fi flick, Captive State, directed by Rupert Wyatt and starring John Goodman, Vera Farmiga, Kiki Layne, and (gulp) Machine Gun Kelly. This one actually looks promising, mostly because it was written and directed by Rupert Wyatt, best known for his work on the excellent Rise of the Planet of the Apes.

Also be on the lookout for another new Focus Features release called The Mustang from director Laure de Clermont-Tonnerre. The flick stars ScreenTime favorites Connie Britton, Matthias Schoenaerts, and Bruce Dern, and looks pretty damn good. Clermont-Tonnerre appears to be a promising new voice behind the camera.

Civic Theatre hosts modern adaptation of Chekhov's classic, gentle comedy

h e n Christopher Durang's Vanya and Sonia and Masha and Spike opened on Broadway in 2013 — a run, by the way, that won the Tony Award for Best Play that year theater goers and

critics alike hailed the comedy as a brilliant new adaptation of Anton Chekhov's The Cherry Orchard.

But Durang was quick to respond, "My play is not a Chekhov parody.... I take scenes and characters and put them in a blender!"

And, indeed, this reiteration of the Russian playwright's characters and situations follows a pattern of disagreements and challenges that have haunted the history of *The* Cherry Orchard since its premier at the Moscow Art Theatre in January

That production was directed by the famous theatrical director and educator, Konstantin Stanislavski. Stanislavski appreciated the pathos and tragedy of the family losing their home and estate as the forces of cultural change swept across Russia: the rise of the middle class, the loss of power and wealth by the aristocracy, and the fate of individuals caught in social evolution larger than any one man, woman, or family. Those were the themes he emphasized in that first production, but the performance enraged the playwright, Chekhov, who understood his script as a gentle comedy poking fun at human foibles.

So out of Durang's blender comes a story with familiar characters and places, such as the cherry orchard resplendent in spring, returning to the original intention of its early 20th century creator: comedy.

And what is it about this comedy that resonates so well with audiences now in the 21st century? I'm thinking that it is these amazing characters — Vanya, Sonia, Masha, Spike, Cassandra, and Nina — that remind us of the people that bring color into each of our lives.

I had an aunt who was the essence

of Masha, and a great aunt who was the complaining Sonia. My own grandmother was a bit of a Cassandra and my father, the sweet, even-tempered Vanya. I also had a roommate in college who had trouble keeping his clothes on! Do you see some of these folk in the chapters of your life?

Or perhaps we understand each of these characters as the emotions, tempers, intellects, and foibles in our own, individual makeup. As a young college student I was, in many ways, a starry-eyed Nina; I keep a sharp watch on my emotions so I don't turn into a whining Sonia; and I confess, I have enjoyed skinny dipping on more than one occasion in my rich life. Whom do you see in this cast that in some ways reminds you of yourself?

Words fail me when I attempt to write what a delight it has been to work with this amazing talent to create this performance for you. Each one of these actors is a powerhouse of creativity and our time together has been enriching and great fun.

In addition, the designers and production crew are some of the finest you will find anywhere, and every time I receive an invitation to return to the Civic Theatre and direct, I jump at the chance because I know the quality of the artists with whom I will be working.

I thank them all from the bottom of my heart, and thank each one of you for coming to see the fruits of our labors. Welcome to Bucks County, Pennsylvania!


