

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Get to know why musical is so beloved

Popular show dances into Embassy Theatre

When *The King and I* first opened on Broadway in 1951, it quickly became one of the most popular and beloved musicals of all time. The fifth collaboration of Richard Rodgers and Oscar Hammerstein, *The King and I* was a hit from the day it premiered. The musical won Tony Awards for Best Musical and for the two stars, Gertrude Lawrence and Yul Brynner.

Although Lawrence was the star at the time, the show provided an enduring legacy for Brynner who played the role of the King of Siam on and off for the remainder of his life. His portrayal of the role in the 1956 film won him an Academy Award, and he even took the part to television for a series, although it ran only 13 episodes.

STAR TOOK LONG WAY AROUND TO THE STAGE

The popular show visits the historic Embassy Theatre next week, bringing with it a fresh young cast of actors. One of those performers, Deanna Choi, fills the role of Lady Thiang, the chief wife of the King. She took a particularly circuitous route to a career in theater, beginning with an unlikely performance in her home's laundry room.

"I was seven years old when *The Little Mermaid* came out, and I decided to try singing her big song in the laundry room," Choi said in an interview with *Whatzup*. "And it sounded pretty good so I thought maybe I'd like to keep doing that."

She pursued theater in high school in her native Portland, Ore., and moved on to study music at the Berklee College of Music in Boston. But that first effort didn't last long.

"I was having trouble finding my way," Choi said. "So I decided to leave college for about a decade and went into accounting and tax preparation. I didn't go back to college until I was about 27 to finish my music degree. But even then I stayed in accounting, though I did community theater here and there to keep my chops and was able to improve my singing and acting."

Choi finally resolved to take her chance and begin auditioning for shows, and to her surprise and delight, quickly found success with this production of *The King and I*. The show's national tour began in November, and Choi is very much enjoying her first experience on the road.

"It's really great to be part of a national tour," she said. "It's all I ever hoped it would be. You get to see parts of America you might never otherwise see, and we have a cast and crew of 63 people who

are all happy to be working in the theater arts so we all have the same goal. It's a really enriching experience. Everyone is happy to be there so it's a good morale. A good experience."

LIVELY DANCE GOT LIVELY RESPONSE

Audience response to the show has been gratifying as well, and Choi shared a recent experience the cast enjoyed in Pennsylvania.

"Last week we were in Scranton, and when 'Shall We Dance' began, the audience erupted in applause, and the applause continued through the entire song," she said. "We hadn't had a reaction quite like that before, but that audience knew the show so well that they responded very strongly to it. This production is so great, and there's so much talent in the cast. Nobody disappoints. And the dance in 'Shall We Dance' is a polka, so it's a very lively dance, and here Anna is wearing a 40-pound dress with a 21-steel-bone bodice, but it's gorgeous, and she carries it so well. The chemistry between them is amazing."

Choi's opportunity to play Lady Thiang is also much appreciated, and Choi thinks her untraditional career path helped her understand and better portray her character.

"This role means a lot to me, and I think my non-linear route to this really helped me grow. I was also an office manager for a while, and all

of my life experiences brought me to this role as head wife who is in charge of thousands of people at the palace.

"I think you need to bring a certain amount of wisdom and experience to this role. The women in this show are really very strong, and our director Bartlett Sher has really emphasized for us that the women are important because they're shaping these children. They have a quiet voice, but it's set in 1860, and you see what women were able to accomplish in this country where they didn't have much voice but were still able to accomplish so much.

"Rodgers and Hammerstein were really very forward thinking in many ways, but they were never in your face. They approached it from the heart."

MAKING HER FATHER PROUD

Visiting Fort Wayne on a national tour of *The King and I* the same week she used to help clients mail off their tax forms speaks to the new life path Choi has chosen, and it's one she plans to continue.

"I think I have proved to myself that it's time to make my dreams come true," Choi said. "I'm ready to pursue some more female roles and to do more singing, which is what I'm most interested in. But I think my time in accounting was important and helped me to know that I was able to take care of myself and not have to depend on anyone else.

"When my father saw me on stage, I don't think he was ever more happy or proud. I think he knows that it's what makes me happy, and he's glad to know that I'm making my dreams come true. Parents do worry and want their kids to be secure, but I think in the end, they just want them to be happy."

Hitting high marks and surviving low points

Eclectic Room hosts revamped five-piece

A few years back, Buckcherry experienced an upheaval that saw two veteran players depart the band. A revamped version of the band will perform at the Eclectic Room in Angola on April 24.

In a phone interview, longtime guitarist Stevie D. said the split was the result of changes in the music business and the band's misguided-but-understandable response to them.

EASING BACK ON TOURING

"We were relying so heavily on touring," he said. "We made a great business touring, but after 10 years of it, we had burned out most markets. We were victims of diminishing returns. That is really hard on a band. It became not fun anymore."

For example, the band was performing in Rochester, N.Y., three or four times a year.

"It was ridiculous," he said. "You really only need to go there once. Maybe twice."

Keith Nelson and Xavier Muriel left Buckcherry and the band went on hiatus for a while. Eventually, Nelson and Muriel were replaced with Kevin Roentgen and Sean Winchester.

The new members were not chosen solely for their musical acumen, Stevie D. said.

"We could have called anybody because we had to know that the hang was going to be

good," he said, referring to the smooth meshing of personalities. "Because we were going to do a lot of miles with these guys."

The new Buckcherry is now touring on a new record (Warpaint) and under new management.

"We had to let (the new management) know that we just couldn't burn out the United States," Stevie D. said. "We were burning out the A markets, B markets, C markets. We were driving it all into the ground.

"What we're doing now is hitting an area and then we're waiting six months to a year to go back," he said.

EXPANDING THEIR REACH

Buckcherry is also trying to expand its global reach as a way of diversifying its audience and cultivating new prospects.

"We're building the presence of the band in Europe, the UK, Asia, and the Eastern block," Stevie D. said. "Also South America."

Building an audience in Europe is not just about addressing current challenges. It's about anticipating the future.

"We can go back to these other places like Europe and have a career there," Stevie D. said. "There are a lot of bands that play there that don't play in the states anymore because they have built a nice career over there. The audiences over there aren't quite so single driven. They are more about the body of work."

WEATHERING THE STORM

Sustaining a career in rock music is not easy, as this article had made abundantly clear. Sometimes success is defined less by what you have achieved than what you have

"One thing you learn is that it really does ebb and flow," Stevie D. said. "If you can survive those low points - because it gets dark and it gets desperate — and you still get to do what you love after those hard times...If you can weather those storms, there's not a better feeling in the world.

"Selling a million albums — that's great. But weathering that storm? It's 10 times (expletive) harder," he said. "When the hit parade goes away and album sales drop and the fanfare is all done, you find out who your friends

"Weathering the storm is a personal accomplishment that's a high water mark. Now I feel like I can do anything."


Stevie. D said he believes the band is "bulletproof" now.

"There's nobody that can tell me differently," he said. "This line-up, where the head space is, where the heart space is, our management and our label...we're all running on 11."

Get cultural enrichment at these **PFW camps**

Week-long summer camps spread arts to the community

Having a large university in any city is a plus, but that advantage goes well beyond providing educational opportunities for future high school graduates.

There is tremendous cultural enrichment provided by those universities, whether it's through visiting lectures or educational programs for those who are not attending the university in a conventional

The Purdue Fort Wayne College of Visual and Performing Arts is one part of the overall university outreach to those interested in pursuing a variety of arts programming, and this summer's busy summer camps and Community Arts Academy courses provides a wide variety of programming for young students of all backgrounds.

ADDING NEW CAMPS

Melinda Haines, who serves as Director of the Community Arts Academy and Assistant to the Dean for Community Engagement for Purdue Fort Wayne's College of Visual and Performing Arts, began her tenure with the university in 2012, at which point the Summer String Camp was well established. Now in its 24th year, this year's String Camp will take place June 17-21, but it is now in good company with many other one-week camps offered by PFW.

"The first new camp after I arrived was the Gene Marcus Piano Camp which has been directed by Hamilton Tescarollo," Haines said. "Then every year after that, we added something else. The Wind Camp has been around for three years, and the Choir Camp has been around for three years, too. The Lighting Technology Intensive is in its second year, and this year we

have two new ones, Summer Arts Camp and Virtual Reality Camp, that are just beginning."

Launching new camps often comes down to a dedicated faculty member who wants to broaden the offerings of PFW's summer camp schedule. Once they express an interest, Haines works to make it happen, providing them now with a hefty selection for young arts students to pursue.

String Camp, Piano Camp (June 9-14), Wind Camp (June 17-21), and Choir Camp (June 10-14) are now well established.

LIGHTING TECHNOLOGY

The still-young Lighting Technology Intensive (June 10-14) is led by Mark Ridgeway, Purdue University Fort Wayne Associate Professor of Scenic/Lighting Design.

The camp description explains that the "week-long training intensive will cover how moving lights and LEDs work and how they can be programmed. Also covered will be using intelligent lights in the design process. Open to high school students, high school teachers, church lighting technicians, and other individuals who use this type of technology and want to learn more about how to use it effectively."

As with many of these educational opportunity, there's a win-win for the university which can provide a strong asset to the community while bringing young students onto

the campus.

"There's always a recruitment aspect to these things," Haines said. "It's a good chance for students to feel more comfortable in a university setting and to work with our faculty. Since I've been here, I've seen students who came to Piano Camp when they were 12 or 13 and now they're freshmen in one of our music programs here. It's just such a positive experience for them and helps them transition into college

In addition to the one-week camp experiences, by mid-April the Community Arts Academy schedule for this summer will be posted (pfw. edu/caa), which will include longer term arts offerings at PFW such as Dramagination (Grades K-3), Youth Drama (Grades 4-8), a variety of dance classes, new art classes (including drawing, sculpture and other fine arts), and private music instruction.

Outside of the College of Visual and Performing Arts, camps in


HUNDREDS SERVED EVERY YEAR

Haines said their programming typically serves 600-650 annually with about 150 participating in the summer camps. Camps are typically one week long and held only in the summer. The Community Arts Academy has three terms fall, spring, and summer — and addresses the broad range of the

While Haines focuses on the camps offered by the College of Visual and Performing Arts, she said the success of all the university camps allows "all ships to rise."

As Haines works throughout the year to continue to develop their programs, she said she's found it most satisfying to grow the list of camps from one to now seven. She hopes to see it grow even more in the future.

"I get a lot of satisfaction out of making something work that's valuable to the community," she said. "I can administrate the heck out of it, market it, and get people interested. But if it doesn't have a great director, it's not going to work. Our faculty members who direct the camps have a great enthusiasm for what they do, and they want to share that with the kids in these camps. It's great when I can work with that person to make it happen."







Growing up and throwing the spotlight on others

Corwin brings a mature outlook to PFW lecture

I interviewed Jeff Corwin in 2001 when he was experiencing his first wave of fame, thanks to the Animal Planet program, The Jeff Corwin Experience. In those days, Animal Planet was all about cultivating slightly irreverent hosts who bucked the sober tradition of Mutual of Omaha's Wild Kingdom, Corwin and Steve Irwin among them.

Corwin's nature show reflected his personality. It was filled with impromptu skits and pop cultural references. But almost two decades later, the TV presenter and conservationist seems like a more serious guy than he was back then.

Corwin will give an Omnibus Lecture titled "Tales from the Field with Jeff Corwin" at Purdue Fort Wayne on April 17.

BUILDING A BRIDGE

While walking in a Massachusetts forest with his dogs, Corwin told me by phone that he has matured a lot in that time.

"What hasn't changed is my enthusiasm for adventure, my love of exploration, and my passion for wildlife," he said. "What has changed is that I am probably a little bit more patient. I am more mature in how I look at the world."

Corwin said his job has always been to "build a bridge from the natural world to the human world" and that mission is more critical than ever.

"Since I began, I have observed profoundly negative changes when it comes to habitat and wildlife," he said. "But I've also evolved because I am a dad to two daughters. As a conservationist and a naturalist, I have morphed from one who has a concern for the future of life on earth to one who has a concern for his children and who wonders if they will have a future with life on their earth."

Corwin said we live in a world now where each of us is encouraged to stay inside boxes of our own making. We obsess over minutia while catastrophes loom outside our narrow field of vision.

"We are so distracted by these blips on our radar screen," he said, "that we don't see the bigger picture, that by not securing a healthier and more vibrant planet — that could be the nail in our extinction coffin."

SAVING THE PLANET

One of the chief crises on Corwin's mind these



"We dump 10 billion pounds of plastic into our oceans every year," he said. "I think about the 3,000 acres of rainforest that are removed from our planet every hour. I think about the unique species that go extinct every half-hour."

Prominent scientists agree that roughly half the Earth's animals have been lost in the last 50 vears, Corwin said.

Until recently, our nation has been a leader in sustainability, conservation, and science and technology, he said.

"If you would have told me that in a five-year window we would step backwards from the light and into the dark ages of wildlife conservation and management, I would have been shocked," Corwin said. "But we have done that as a nation."


Ignoring the expert advice of scientists about the health of our natural world is like ignoring the advice of an oncology doctor, he said.

"The way we're reacting to this news is like a lung cancer patient saying to his doctor, 'OK, so what you're saying is that I can cut back to a half a pack a day?"

CONSERVATION KEEPS GOING

Corwin doesn't like to get political. He said both political parties have championed significant conservation legislation over the years.

Though the current administration doesn't share the urgency that he feels about many of these predicaments, Corwin said non-governmental scientists continue to do amazing work.

"Despite all of this stuff, I am walking in the woods right now surrounded by deer and turkeys," he said. "There were not deer and turkeys here a century ago. There are so many positive things to look upon. My mission in my shows has always been to inspire people to connect to the outdoors, to connect to nature, and to think about how stewardship fits into their lives."

Corwin has been a wildlife educator and televised conservationist for roughly 25 years. Every day, he said, "a young woman or a young man comes up to me and says 'I became a veterinarian,' or, 'I am a wildlife biologist because I was inspired by your work."

In his younger days, Corwin was not at all reluctant to place himself in physical danger if it would make for compelling television.

His reluctance has since increased.

"I am less eager in doing something that's going to put me in a spinal injury ward in a hospital," he

These days, he said he prefers to take the focus off himself and put it on people "who are on the frontline of conservation."

Comedian lets his nerd flag fly high

Posehn's stand-up act to brighten Welch's

Brian Posehn is a nerd. He's a book nerd. He's a Phantom Menace-hating Star Wars Nerd. He's a horror movie nerd, a comic book and toy collecting nerd, and a music nerd.

But he's also a film and television star, an accomplished writer, and a highly sought after stand-up comedian. For a nerd, that's pretty cool.

Posehn brings his stand-up routine back to Fort Wayne on April 19 for two shows at Welch's Ale House.


A MEANS TO SURVIVAL

Readily admitting to being a nerd and proud of the distinction, Posehn said he wasn't actually born a nerd, and isn't sure if that is even possible. He became a nerd, rather, as a means of survival.

Coming from a broken home, Posehn was raised by his mom and escaped into books, movies, and music as a means of self-preservation, shielding himself from bullies at school, a parent that didn't seem to like him too much, and a world in general that makes fun of anything it finds "different."

In his recently released book, Forever Nerdy, Posehn says his first general obsession, after reading, was music, even before he collected toys and comics. Elvis was his first favorite artist, but he credits KISS for helping form him into a "full-blown nerd.

"Until KISS, I was just a kid drinking the

homogenized milk that is pop music," he said. And KISS found him in, of all places, the library, where he was feeding his reading

"I don't remember what I was reading that day, but it was then that I heard it, the greatest hard rock song of all time, 'Detroit Rock City.' I was ten and at the end of the song the car crashes and the narrator dies. Do you know how cool that was to me at that time? I know for a fact I had never heard anything that hard or aggressive before that, certainly not the Bay City Rollers. Mac Davis didn't rock like this. So

As it turns out, KISS was the gateway drug Posehn needed to get into other bands like UFO, AC/DC, and Van Halen, a beginning to a lifetime obsession of hard rock and heavy metal. But there was still one more band that would have a huge impression on him, the nerdiest of all nerd bands: Rush.

"It was love at first listen," Posehn said. "I was moved by Geddy's voice, the words and, of course, their insane instrumental acrobatics."

Posehn said that many of the lyrics from Rush's 1982 album Signals helped him get through tough times.

"It was like my awesome Canadian uncles came into my room and opened my cone of sadness and sat down on my bed and dangled off and talked to me about growing up and life in a way that my mom, grandparents, therapists, and members of the Big Brother agency couldn't," he said. "Indirectly, they helped me with my loneliness and teen depression."

TRUTH, BUT NOT CHEESY

Posehn says he never had a big epiphany that he had to be a performer, but there were hints along the way. He started stand-up in 1987, at an open mic night, developing his routine on a nightly basis until he got his first paying gig.

"My comedy is so much about truth," he said, "but not in a cheesy way. I just mean

that all my stories are true, they all actually happened. I started comedy by lying, lying to my mom to make a story better or to make her laugh, and I lied to everybody at my new jobs, rewriting history like a sociopath. I got onstage as much as I could and took any road gig that came up."

One time he even did a show in a bar where if you cursed you had to contribute money to

"I didn't make any money that night."

IMPRESSIVE LIST OF TV AND FILM ROLES

It'd be pretty time consuming to list all of Posehn's TV and film roles over the years, but he's had roles on shows that you might know like Everybody Loves Raymond and Just Shoot Me and some you might not know, like when he played Eddie on The Army Show. No matter the role, Posehn always gives it his all.

"I can do dumb guy or smart guy, sweet guy and, best of all, a weird guy," he said. "Of all the dumb, smart, or sweet guys I've played, almost all of them have been weird."

This brings us to the present. Posehn's regular recurring role on Big Bang Theory has brought him more recognition than his previously most famous part as Jimmy in Rob Zombie's The Devil's Rejects. But don't worry; he's not going "all Hollywood" on us.

"Stand up is still the focus now," he said. "I act and write to stay busy, but I travel yearround performing in the best comedy clubs and just-OK rock venues. And mostly I play cities I actually want to be in, which is nice."

Posehn's advice for all of the nerds out there that might feel like they'll never fit in is to "just be yourself." It's worked out pretty well for him. He has several jobs he loves, is considered a spokesperson for the heavy metal community, has met most of his childhood heroes including Mark Hamill, Carrie Fisher, three quarters of the original members of KISS, and all three members of Rush, and has a wife and son that he loves with his whole heart. How does a nerd find the perfect woman?

"Well, luck mostly, he said. "She was super out of my league, but I was just myself and she liked me for me. I got my dream girl and I get to nerd out every day and get paid for it. I couldn't feel luckier."

Sometimes life has a way of working itself



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

You can save the drive and take in the Trombone Shorty & Orleans Avenue set June 28 when they play The Clyde in Fort Wayne.



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Take a stroll downtown for public art

Larger-than-life murals add color and light to walkways

Take a stroll through downtown Fort Wayne and you might see a panda with an ice cream cone on its head, a gigantic bison, or a wild boar. They're larger than life and a sight to behold.

All three are part of a recent movement that's shining a spotlight on public art.

Art This Way is just one group that's responsible for many of the murals scattered on the sides of buildings and other highly visible places. The projects have become a conversation starter all around the city.

"It's so exciting because it adds so much color and light to just a standard street stroll," said Kristen Guthrie of Visit Fort Wayne. "We're really finding that visitors are so intrigued. It's a surprise and delight. You don't expect it. You come across it and it just brings a smile to your face and brings some joy to your day."

DOWNTOWN IMPROVEMENT

Local artist Alexandra Hall leads Art This Way, a volunteer-run organization that operates under the umbrella of the Downtown Improvement District. Last year, the group installed four murals in alleys in a two-block area bordered by Washington Boulevard and Berry Street and Harrison and Calhoun Streets.


"My job is getting to know the property owners, getting permission to paint on the side of their building, putting together the prospectus with all the right signatures and all the right agreements, and then putting out the call for artists to apply," Hall said.

Hall was inspired to launch the mural projects by artwork she's seen in other places.

"I travel a lot, and in a lot of places they have these really well-known murals like in Brazil, Berlin, London," she said. "We're starting to see more of these fine art mural scenes. They've been evolving since the late '80s and '90s to now. I wanted to bring that to my hometown. So I thought, 'Let's do something that big cities are doing and give Fort Wayne its own little spin."

For the murals done through Art This Way, applications have come in from all across the country. The artist is selected by a jury.

"We have interest from everywhere, really," Hall explained. "We had an applicant from Atlanta, one from Kentucky, someone from Pittsburgh, but it just so happened that in our blind jury process they were all local or people who were originally from somewhere else but now live and work in Fort Wayne."

MONTHS-LONG PROJECTS

Jerrod Tobias is one of the local artists whose work can be found all over the city. He's partnered with Arts United and the North Anthony Corridor as well as the Free Art Collective and Artlink to create his masterpieces. His largest piece, the 300-foot-long mural on the elevated railroad tracks across from Three Rivers Apartments, was commissioned by the City of Fort Wayne. He said a lot of thought goes into each project.

"I'm trying to be mindful of reflecting our own culture and not just painting whatever comes to mind," Tobias said. "I want to connect it to all the things that are going on in our town, where we're having this sort of renaissance in the arts culture. It's a great time to be an artist in this community. I don't want the artwork to be an imposition on a building but to be accenting the property or the neighborhood. So you're enhancing an experience."

After he's been chosen for a specific project, Tobias gets to work in his art studio, coming up with the design and making a scale painting of it. He said that can often take longer than the actual mural itself.

"A 100-foot-long wall will take a month for two or three people," Tobias said. "My wife Kara and I were the only two who



worked on the 300-foot piece on Columbia Street. That one took us two months to paint and a really long time to prepare."

ADDING TO THE BEAUTY

There are now 18 murals located around town, and they've







become a tourist attraction not just for those visiting Fort Wayne for the first time, but for those who live here and simply enjoy the beauty the murals have brought to the community.

"People do their senior pictures in front of them, their wedding pictures, lots of selfies. They make gorgeous backdrops. They're great photo spots," said Guthrie from the Visitors

"We have a print out of the public art map and it's one of the top things people pick up because it's such a great addition to their time downtown. You can also find it at visitfortwayne.

The murals are definitely a labor of love for Tobias, who's

incredibly passionate about the role he's playing in the public art scene.

"It really is surreal," Tobias said. "When you sit at home and you design and paint things by yourself in your studio, you don't really take into consideration the lasting impact pieces like these can have on people in their day-to-day lives. It's really special and I feel really lucky to have work that is engrained in people's daily lives.

"People tell me all the time, 'I see this piece every day and it makes me feel so good.' People thank us for doing these projects. It's priceless, really. For me, it makes being an artist even more special."

Monkey Business: The Adventures of Curious George's Creators

We all think we know Curious George, the rambunctious primate who's been entertaining children since his first book was published in 1941. He's been in television shows, blockbuster movies, and video games, shaping the lives of countless children.

Sunday, April 14, brings an opportunity to view the documentary *Monkey Business: The Adventures of Curious George's Creators*. The minds behind the iconic children's character have a very interesting and unexpected story, documented here for the first time on film. Without giving too much away, the film tells the story of H.A. (Hans) and Margret Rey and their fantastical life filled with "adventure."

They both grew up as Jews in early 20th century Germany, eventually parting ways before meeting again and marrying in Brazil in 1935. They lived their first four years together in Paris, only to escape the Nazi invasion by days, thanks to Hans' ingenuity and makeshift bicycles. They rode those bikes many miles to the South of

France, where they took a train to Portugal and then a boat to Brazil. From there, they managed to secure visas and make it to the United States, where they finally sold the original Curious George manuscript, along with three other stories, for \$1,000.

Fittingly, the story is told using animation, photographs, and interviews with the people who knew the Reys. A special added part of the event occurs after the film when there will be a live Q&A session via Skype with the film's director Ema Ryan Yamazaki. This event is free and open to the public. — *Chris Hupe*

She has a Performance Certificate and a Master's Degree in Performance from DePaul University.

Sharing the program with the Symphonic Wind Ensemble is Fort Wayne's Old Crown Brass Band, a British-style brass brand that excludes clarinets and saxophones but includes other instruments like flugel-horns, the baritone, and tenor horns that are seldom seen in other bands. Members of the Old Crown Brass Band come from three states and include professional musicians from two major symphony orchestras, music educators, and music-industry professionals and a few amateurs. — *Chris Hupe*

One regional theater, the Wagon Wheel Center for the Arts, gets a jump on everyone as it once again hosts its annual summer theater schedule which this year includes a

great combination of classic musicals as well as popular Matilda (June 5-15) leads things off, bringing Roald

Dahl's plucky little heroine to the Warsaw venue. That's followed in short order by two all-time classics from both stage and screen, Singin' in the Rain (June 19-29) and Oklahoma (July 3-13). The ABBA jukebox musical Mamma Mia! (July 17-27)

is a sure fire hit, while Peter Pan prequel Peter and the Starcatcher (July 31-August 10) and the musical based on the documentary of the same name, Hands on a Hardbody (August 14-24), provide something a bit different and less frequently performed in our area. 

Patty Griffin

The fact that Patty Griffin's tenth album is self-titled suggests that the record might be an exhibitionistic revelation of her true self, a stylistic reinvention, or both.



It turns out that neither is really true. If you dig, you can find the influence of Griffin's autobiography, and the album certainly bounces around from genre to genre. But the songs are mostly walled off behind a folk singer's storytelling. The album's style is more what you'd expect from a late-career folk singer than it is a transformation.


On the album-opening "Mama's Worried," Griffin sets the typical folk poverty song against a classical guitar and jazz vocal. The ballad "Bluebeard" is understated blues, while "The Boys from Tralee" gives a Celtic tune a resounding American twist. Robert Plant sneaks in background vocals on the haunting "What Now," but his contribution doesn't do much to set the song apart from the rest.

Griffin finds time on the album to confront the contentious social issues of the day. "Coins" addresses inequality and sexism ("Now history is on your side/who am I to deny it?/a fiefdom for your fragile pride/and who would dare defy it?") and "The Wheel" sees Griffin considering her reaction to a case of police brutality.

If there's anything revolutionary about this latest album, it's in how Griffin, at this stage, seems ready to retreat into traditionalism. The fierceness that characterized, say, 1998's Flaming Red is missing, and much of this new album relies on other people's genres and other people's stories. That's not a bad thing, necessarily, but don't expect this album named for its artist to be introspective. — Evan Gillespie

prog-rock concept album based on the classic Christian book A Pilgrim's Progress. It seems like an odd pairing, but it turned out to be a timeless and amazing album with solid songwriting and flawless playing throughout.

As a follow-up to this pinnacle of their career the band decided to record yet another double album based on A Pilgrim's Progress. Yes, they must be insane.

Like the first album, there are multitudes of sly winks to classic prog rock bands like Kansas, Yes, Queen, Pink Floyd, Zeppelin, and others while also keeping things modern, thanks in large part to guitar wunderkind Eric Gillette whose youthful vocals and astounding technique continue to amaze my ears. And like the bands listed above, the emphasis is on the songs with the "prog" in

there to keep things interesting. "Welcome to the World" is a prime example, opening up with a gusty riff in 3/4 before settling into 4/4 for much of the song as gritty organs join in the aggressive romp. Halfway through, the tone lightens, becoming almost carnival-like, as the four vocalists (drummer maestro Mike Portnoy also sings) trade off until they build a thick stack of harmonies that dive back into the harsh opening riff which is explored and expanded.

The breadth of musical variety found on these 22 tracks cannot be captured in this brief review, but it should be noted that the emphasis is always on the melody and frequently on injecting as much pathos as possible into the mix. This is not a sterile prog-rock album just for your head.

The Great Adventure is packed with new and recurring themes, creating a tapestry that is more than just a collection of fantastic songs.

Is it as good as The Similitude of a Dream? Sadly, no. You can't create The Dark Side of the Moon or Tommy every time, but The Great Adventure is yet another outstanding flower in the lapel of this talented band. — Jason Hoffman

Amanda Palmer

There Will Be No Intermission

You'd be right to be skeptical of Amanda Palmer's There Will Be No Intermission. The co-founder of The Dres-



den Dolls has always delivered the most shocking melodrama possible in her music, and this crowdfunded opus looks like melodrama indulged to the ultimate degree, from Palmer's portrait on the cover (stark naked and brandishing a sword) to the album's 78-minute run time.

But as with most of Palmer's music, the album offers a decent payoff if you're willing to put your skepticism aside for an hour or so.

The album's title promises a theatrical experience, and the brief instrumental overture kicks things off in a stagy way. But then Palmer relaxes into "The Ride," a 10-plus-minute acknowledgment that life is hard for all of us, built around a classical piano that is surprisingly without emotional crescendos.

Fortunately, the peaks and valleys come later, as the album alternates between short instrumental interludes and lengthy songs that oscillate up and down in terms of dynamics and emotional punch. For example, "The Thing About Things" spends most of its time in near-spokenword, ukelele-backed monologue that eventually breaks into a thunderous wail.

Although Palmer finds moments of joy in the album's stories, they are always in contrast to darkness. She unremittingly looks at grief, disappointment, abortion, miscarriage, death, and the horrors of social media, and she does so explicitly, daring us to look away.

Yes, the album is astonishingly self-indulgent, and its bleakness is tough to get through. But if you're up to it, there's something exhilarating in the way Palmer doesn't hesitate to get in your face with the things that trouble her. — Evan Gillespie

Adventure (1978)

Television is still one of my favorite bands. I consider their first two albums to be my biggest entrance into



the world of post-punk, alternative rock. Tom Verlaine and his crew were fixtures in the NYC underground scene and stood tall in inspiring a range of bands, including Talking Heads, Pavement, and Sonic Youth. Adventure was their second album, after which they broke up. Although it is not as popular as their debut, it's still a great, guitar-driven work of art.

It opens with "Glory," a fuzzy, uptempo number that sounds like the Velvet Underground if they were covering The Beatles. "Days" strums around and reminds me musically of early R.E.M. It's really the beginning of alt-rock with an easy arrangement that sounds like something from the late '90s. "Foxhole" clocks in at just under five minutes and has a harder edge. It has remnants of the punk sound but could have been written by The Smithereens ten years later. "Carried Away" closes side one and is one of the sweeter tracks from their small catalogue of music.

Side two has just three songs and opens with "The Fire," which has a trippy guitar arrangement. It is darker than anything from side one but has a nice ballad-like quality. Again, the guitars made this band and compliment Verlaine's crisp vocals very well. "Ain't That Nothin" is very similar to the harder alt-sound from their first record with guitarist Richard Lloyd jamming away on his Stratocaster. The final track, "The Dream's Dream," is the primer for some of the bands I mentioned earlier.

After a 14-year break, the band's original members recorded another album in 1992, but the first two albums capture the enticing sound of one of the first alt-rock bands who helped create a new genre. — Dennis Donahue

Pond Tasmania


Pond are the frazzled, sunburnt sibling to Kevin Parker's Tame Impala, sort of the weirder, more farout version of Parker's




majestic and pristine psych pop behemoths. Each band has been around the same time, with members sharing spots within each band.

Up to this point, Pond has always been a little wilder and more woolly than Tame Impala. Their albums were more all over the place, bringing to mind what would happen if Frank Zappa had decided to write an acid-burnt record of

bubblegum pop bathed in the seedier aspects of late-'60s underground music.

But now with Pond's newest record Tasmania, lead singer Nic Holbrook and company, along with Tame Impala wunderkind Kevin Parker producing, have stepped into the light of modern sounds and slick production. The results are a band stepping up to their full potential without giving up any of the weirdness that made them stand out.

Think of this album as Pond's Currents. Kevin Parker helps Pond produce a super slick studio album with Tasmania, mixing psych pop, '80s production, and R&B funk into the Perth collective's usual far-out sound. Parker stepped up his own sonic game on Tame Impala's 2015 masterpiece Currents, and he wants to share those production wealths.


Title track "Tasmania" shows the most when it comes to Kevin Parker's deft touches. Huge rhythm section, subtle '80s synth vibes, and Holbrook's white boy soul comes through huge here. If it was 1987, this would be a radio hit.

"Hand Mouth Dancer" is a club banger. Techno synths, four-on-the-floor percussion, and as far away from burnt psych pop as it gets, In fact, it's about as far away from earlier albums Hobo Rocket and Man It Feels Like Space Again as it could get. Lead single "Daisy" is pure majestic pop in the vein of Spiritualized mixing it up with The Fixx.

I'd compare the sonic and sound changes on Tasmania to what happened to the Flaming Lips on The Soft Bulletin. They still remain true to themselves, but are conveying their music with new sounds and bigger production. It's a music journey began on 2017's The Weather. Tasmania is Pond truly stepping out. — John Hubner

Kane Roberts The New Normal

In 1991, Roberts released a solo album, Saints and Sinners, which included the hit, "Does Anybody Really Fall in Love Anymore," gaining him notoriety as a solo artist. Roberts left Cooper's band in 1989 and basically vanished from the public eye, choosing to stay busy penning songs for other artists instead of remaining in the spotlight himself.

The New Normal is Roberts's sixth solo album and the highest profile disc since Saints and Sinners. Released on Rat Pak Records, The New Normal is anything but normal as it explores the many intricacies of the rock genre and features several guest musicians.

Opener "King of the World" is an unbelievable tune, tailor-made for rock radio with its huge hook and anthem-like presence. Featuring Cooper's current guitarist, the amazing Nita Strauss, shredding a very memorable solo mid-song, this track is the perfect choice to help reintroduce us to Roberts. "Wonderful" is unexpectedly heavier than the previous track, sounding a lot like something Breaking Benjamin or Shinedown might have to offer. "Beginning of the End" is co-written by Cooper and features the Godfather of Shock Rock,

Roberts, and Arch Enemy singer, Alissa White-Gluz, sharing vocal duties. A hopelessly infectious track, it has a lot to offer with impressive guitar work from Roberts and an injection of femininity from White-Gluz. "Who We Are" is a haunting tune and a welcome change of pace, showcasing Roberts versatility.

Other standout tracks include the poppy "Forever Out of Place," the straightforward rocker "Leave This World Behind," and album closer "Wrong," but truly, there isn't a bad song on the album.

In a just world, The New Normal would be a multi-platinum album for a guy who has paid his dues. In today's world, however, Roberts will likely have to settle for a few streams on the various digital music platforms instead of performing in front of crowds in sold out arenas. Still, we should be glad Roberts is still perfecting his craft. This is an album worth seeking out if you're a fan of superior songwriting. — Chris Hupe

Stephen Malkmus

Groove Denied

You're either born with the Stephen Malkmus gene or you're not. If you are, then your musical life is that much richer for it. Deep-diving into Pavement and the post-2001



Malkmus solo world can be just short of life-changing for that Malkmus-starved brain discovering the lanky indie-rock pied piper for the first time. But for the rest of us not born with that pre-wired brain, finding an "in" with Stephen Malkmus can prove difficult.

On his second album in less than a year, Stephen Malkmus goes full-on electronic. Groove Denied is the long-gestating electronic album he's been tinkering with since the early 2010s after being inspired by the Berlin club scene. What we get is not club bangers, though. Instead, it's wonky and noisy electro noise bombs sounding more inspired by '70s post-punk like Tubeway Army and German Krautrockers Cluster.

Groove Denied opens with "Belziger Faceplant," a track that sounds like it's imploding into itself. If someone released their first attempt at working in Ableton Live, it might sound like this. After that, things get a little more reasonable. "A Bit Wilder" sounds like Seventeen Seconds-era Cure. "Viktor Borgia" sounds like Malkmus spending a night drinking with James Murphy.

Still, this is a Stephen Malkmus record. Not everything sounds like late-night electronic experimentations. "Come Get Me" sounds like classic Malkmus' jaunty indie rock. Fuzzy guitars and trashcan drums work nicely with the vocal delivery. "Rushing the Acid Frat" sounds like Stephen Malkmus singing over an old '70s funk sample the Beasties might've used on Paul's Boutique. "Love The Door" morphs from Flying Lotus into an electro-Jicks banger. But the true album highlights are the electro-earworm "Forget the Door" and the future classic "Ocean of Revenge."

What Groove Denied proves is that you don't need to be born with the Malkmus gene to dig Stephen Malkmus. This album clicks immediately. Also, this album proves that old dogs can teach themselves new tricks. Groove Denied is an astonishing trick. — John Hubner

As one may expect from her stellar track record, Moore's winning performance as the fun-loving and often impulsive Gloria is the strongest thing that the film has going for it. Whether she's singing along to Olivia Newton-John in the car or dancing her heart out to disco tunes at the club, her joie de vivre is the emotional center point upon which this heartfelt tale finds its pulse. Of course, life isn't always upbeat and neither is Gloria's story, but Moore is more than capable of making the melancholic moments matter just as much as the lighter points in the narrative.

For having a character at its center that isn't afraid

to take chances, it's somewhat disappointing that writer-director Sebastián Lelio seemed to hedge his bets a bit when it comes to the film's storytelling. Gloria Bell is so slavishly dedicated to each story beat of Lelio's previous work Gloria that it makes one wonder why he found it necessary to recreate it in the first place if the final products would be so similar. The story of self-discovery works about as well as it did in the original, but I wish he had found a way to give new life to this material in the process of translating it for American audiences.

The screenplay by Lelio and Alice Johnson Boher has plenty of perceptive and poignant dialogue that clues us into where each character stands without belaboring the point. In an effort to break up an increasingly awkward political conversation between her friends at a dinner party, Gloria chimes in with, "When the world blows up, I hope I go down dancing."

With a buoyant and life-affirming tone that should resonate with people regardless of the stage in life they find themselves in, Gloria Bell rings true with impassioned wisdom and a central performance that captivates from start to finish.



the film has sold only \$3 million. Ouch. I've read some really interesting things about this film, and very much look forward to seeing it.


NEW THIS WEEK
