# The Blues Turn Introspective

It's not often you get to witness a living legend, even before he is actually considered a living legend. However, Joe Bonamassa is well on his way to becoming just that.

The 41-year-old blues guitarist has already had a stellar career having been nominated for two Grammy Awards, selling more than three million albums, seeing 20 of those albums reach No. 1 on the Billboard Blues Chart, and even creating his own music festival, "Keeping the Blues Alive at Sea," a mega-cruise benefiting his charity, the Keeping The Blues Alive Foun-

Bonamassa just released his 13th solo studio album, Redemption, on September 18. As usual with any Bonamassa release, he is going on the road to support it. The tour includes a stop at The Embassy Theatre November 6, where he will bring a whole new life to a show featuring new songs alongside career-spanning favorites.

During this visit, Bonamassa will be backed by a stellar band of legendary musicians including Anton Fig on drums (Letterman, Ace Frehley), Michael Rhodes on bass (Faith Hill, Randy Travis), Rock n' Roll Hall of Famer Reese Wynans on piano/ organ (Stevie Ray Vaughan and Double Trouble), Lee Thornburg on trumpet (Tower of Power), and Paulie Cerra on saxophone.

Redemption sees Bonamassa "at his most ambitious yet as he continues to redefine and push the barriers of blues-rock," according to a press release. "Crafted with longtime producer Kevin Shirley, it features a collection of 12 songs that weave effortlessly through an assortment of genres and reflect the artistic re-birth that he is currently experiencing."

Upon closer inspection, we find Bonamassa getting more personal with his music on Redemption. We've rarely seen the guitarist as introspective as when he powers his way through these 12 meticulously crafted songs. Full of trademark licks and instantly memorable riffs, the songs push the boundaries of blues-rock to areas we've seldom seen explored.

"I'm going through some other stuff in my life I didn't expect to be going through," the guitarist told Parade Magazine. "It's a rising, it's contrition, it's acceptance, it's everything. It's painful, but knowing that there's a rising coming. We made a record called Blues of Desperation and this seemed to be the next logical step. To look inward before looking outward. Sometimes you have to blame yourself before you can blame others. And that's kind of the frame of mind I've been in for the last year or so."

If it seems like Bonamassa is almost always on the road, it's because he is almost always on the road. The guitarist plays 200 or more shows per year at venues all around the world. Fortunately for fans, he never seems to tire of the routine. An enthusiastic performer, his live shows are the main reason Bonamassa has been able to enjoy career longevity. He has risen from

a 12-year-old child star opening for B.B King to a universally admired performer to a "must-see" act over the years. The proof is in the numbers: concert insider Pollstar recently lists him as one of the top 50 highestgrossing live acts in the world for 2018.

Bonamassa isn't just a musical talent; the man has business sense as well. With a foresight in looking at the rapidly changing music industry, Bonamassa six years ago formed J&R Adventures with his manager, Roy Weiss, to preserve his interests.

'Roy and I go back 25 years," he told Classic Rock Revisited. "His business strategy was to build a high-end brand thing. We've been very protective of that. We very rarely do festival dates and very rarely do we play outside of our own sandbox. Over the course of ten years, I am seeing deals done with major labels and major concert promoters that marginalize someone's brand. You're starting to see it now with rumors that all Live Nation concerts will be streamed live on YouTube next year."

"On paper it makes millennials shout from the rooftops about how great they are,"

he continued. "Truth be told, it is like handing an artist a shovel, a plot of land, and a gun. They are not only going to knock you out but they are going to make you dig your own grave first. The article I read showed that the bands are all excited about it. That is some good Kool-Aid."

To his credit, Bonamassa continues to forge ahead and plans to continue the business model that helped him become as successful as he has over the years, and that includes continuing to play live shows whenever he can with as much enthusiasm

"Musically, my theory is that you've always got to go out there and play with fire. Play like it is your last show and make them notice you. That has not changed in my entire career, 27 years on. I have to go out and make an impression. During those lean years in the early 2000s, well, I look back at those times and it was a lot of fun. It was a struggle, but we were working towards something. At that time, our backs were against the wall on every show of every tour. We didn't have enough money to get from Point A to Point B. Now, I have four tour buses and two semi-trucks. That is self-made, you know."

Whether you're a classic rock fan, a blues fan, or just a music fan, if you've never seen Bonamassa live before, you should take the opportunity to experience this guitar great for yourself. After seeing him fly around the fret board for two hours or so, you'll be wondering why you waited so long. Bonamassa is a living guitar hero who loves to play in front of his Fort Wayne fans, who usually help bring out the best in him.

# **Spreading Christmas Cheer**

------ Feature • Elf the Musical

When the Will Ferrell film Elf hit movie screens in 2003, it became an immediate hit and a new traditional film for a younger generation of holiday film fans. The guileless Buddy, who searches for his real father after growing up at the North Pole, was both touching and funny, providing a perfect vehicle for seasonal celebrations. With a big name cast - including Zooey Deschanel, Bob Newhart, Ed Asner, James Caan, and Mary Steenburgen — *Elf* has now become a fixture in homes and on television as people look for a sweet escape from the shopping

As has become the trend in recent years, hit films become fodder for Broadway musicals, and Elf has become one of the latest success stories from that practice and a touring natural for the holiday season. Debuting on Broadway in 2010, the musical version of Elf does differ slightly from the film. Gone is Papa Elf, the Newhart character who narrated the screen version, leaving Santa Claus to provide the narration for the stage production. And of course there's the addition of about a dozen songs courtesy of the team Matthew Sklar and Chad Beguelin. The Civic Theatre, which last year staged the classic White Christmas for their holi-

day show, this year leaps decades forward to offer this still relatively new musical for the commu-

This isn't the first time Elf has been performed in Fort Wayne, with the production visiting last year courtesy of the Broadway at the Embassy series. That proved helpful when a possible collaboration

was proposed in the planning of the Civic's 2018-19 season, as Phillip Colglazier, executive and artistic director of the Civic, contacted Leslie Hormann, then executive and artistic director of Fort Wayne Youtheatre.

"Phillip and I talked before he knew that I was retiring and asked how the Civic and Youtheatre might collaborate," Hormann

Although Hormann's tenure as Youtheatre director ended this past summer, and she now spends part of the year in Florida, she remains active in the local arts community and happily agreed to direct Elf, her first big post-retirement project. Joining her is Heather Clossen, a faculty member of Youtheatre and Hormann's "partner in crime." They are joined by musical director Eunice Wadewitz, making for a formidable team of women at the helm. The first thing they did when agreeing to oversee this production was catch the Embassy performance last year.

We loved it," Hormann said. "It was adorable. Nice story, fast moving, infectious music. Plus it has that glamor of New York with the sensibility of a family story from the Midwest. It's peddled as a children's story, but it's really just great family enter-

> tainment. And it's fast paced. There are a million moving parts, and the choreography is delightful.'

Clossen, who has a large spreadsheet which covers each element of the show, gets to show off her chops with an eclectic array of dance numbers, borrowing some moves she used in her recent stint as choreographer and performer in the Three Rivers Music Theatre production of *Cabaret*.

"There are so many different styles within the show," Clossen said. "A lot of variety, which is nice. We have the 'elf-ography' and some soft shoe, swing, ballroom and the finale. There are eight major dance numbers, but we're also using choreography to move the desks around and there's furniture choreography as we change sets."

The team is also partnering with the University of Saint Francis to create the set through some graphic illustrations, ways to convey not only the holidays but the energy and excitement of New York City in

And of course, the cast brings together some fresh young faces along with seasoned veterans with parts ranging from youngsters to Santa himself.

"We have an old school cast, which I'm

really excited about," Hormann said. "Darren Harrison is back. He did a lot of shows in the '80s but took some time off from doing theater. Jeff Moore is one of the top community actors around. He was recently in Frost/Nixon and is now playing our Santa. And my sister Jan Venderly is in it, and it's been a couple years since she performed on stage. But we also have our Youtheatre kids because Heather and I raised those children!"

Tackling the pivotal role of Buddy is Jordan Gameon in a part that requires comedic timing, innocent charm, and effusive excite-

"Jordan is so energetic in the lead role," Hormann said. "And Buddy is on stage all the live-long day."

Many of the audience favorites will be featured, Hormann promised, including the revolving door, the perfume spray, and the department store scene, with Macy's now taking the place of Gimbels. (Although Gimbels went out of business in 1987, Eld paid a bit of homage 16 years later by in-

But there is one scene which didn't make the transition to the musical.

cluding it in the plot.)

"We don't have the mailroom scene," Clossen said. "But there will be a tribute to the mailroom scene.'

Hormann is enjoying the collaborative energy of working on Elf and encourages families to include it in their plans, made easier since the show runs before Thanksgiving kicks off the most wonderful - and busiest — time of the year.

"There really is something for everyone in this show," she said. "It's just a great evening of entertainment."

# Packing a Soul-Filled Sound

In the 1970s, the Allman Brothers were on the forefront of the Southern Rock movement in the U.S. Twenty-four years later, Gov't Mule sprouted from the same bluesy seed as lead singer and guitarist Warren Haynes and bass player Allen Woody put their own spin on the genre.

What started as a casual side project in 1994 turned into a wildly popular Southern Rock band that today has millions of fans worldwide.

"We had no idea that it was going to turn into something beyond that," Haynes said. "We initially thought we were going to make a really low-budget experimental record and do one tour and then go back to our day jobs, but it just kind of grew its own steam and became more than that and we were faced with the decision of how and whether to move forward."

Starting with just three members, Haynes told whatzup that the trio's first album was inspired by the more classic rock bands. Gradually, their individual influences began to expand the group sound.

"We remained a trio for our first two records, but then by our third record about half the material felt like it needed a larger ensemble, so we brought in keyboards for about half of those songs."

Gov't Mule, or just "Mule" to their fans, developed a unique style that combined rock, blues, and jazz in a revolutionary way.

When their bassist Allen Woody passed away, the group dynamic shifted and they questioned whether they should even continue making music.

"We were faced with the decision of whether to keep going or

not, and it took a long time to realize that we could and should keep going," Haynes said. "In the beginning, it was not something we felt like we were up to.'

Once the group decided to press on and continue Gov't Mule without their bassist and friend, they substituted other legendary bass players in Allen Woody's place.

Haynes said he wrote new material that complimented the style of each of these musicians. This added a new dimension to their already soul-filled sound.

"So by the time we made our next official studio record, the band was kind of pursuing these natural directions. And I felt like if you could follow it from the beginning, you could see with each record we were keeping one foot where we started but the other one kind of moving forward."

Gov't Mule's latest album, Revolution Come...Revolution Go, is an example of this. While the album certainly sounds in-

> line with Mule's style, it is woven with a message about the country's current politi-

> While this is not meant to be a political album, Haynes said it does have some political connotations.

> "[The album is] mostly from an observer's standpoint of how divided our nation is at the moment," he said. "I wouldn't look at it as per se a political record .... We've had political connotations from the very beginning, I mean our band is called Gov't Mule .... Most of the songs are about reflection and personal relationships and looking back from the perspective that we have now."

Haynes said he hopes their music inspires people to overcome their differences and work together.

"We're all in this together, it's up to us to fix it. If we're depending on politicians to

fix it, it's not going to get done.' But at the end of the day, Haynes said, "it's always about the music first."

Long-time Mule fans know this to be true. Whether you are Democrat or Republican, there is just no denying that smooth and somewhat rugged musicality.

While crowds can always count on an energetic and compelling performance, the band likes to keep their fans on their toes.


'We play a different setlist every night," Haynes said. "So every night is different."

Their choice of tunes is based on what was played at their last performance in a location and influenced by the energy of the audience.

Gov't Mule is bringing their production to the Clyde Theatre on October 31. The performance begins at 8 p.m. and doors open at 7 p.m. General admission tickets are available, or you can enjoy the show in VIP style with upscale ambience, balcony seating, and an exclusive VIP bar.

Haynes said they haven't played in Northeast Indiana for a while, so Fort Wayne should expect a performance with a wide range of diverse music from across their 24-year career.

"I think hardcore Mule fans know to expect the unexpected, and new fans or music lovers who are just now discovering us and are feeling out what our hardcore fans know, which is it is really hard to pigeonhole what we are because we include so many different influences into our music," Haynes said. "It is hard to use words to explain our music anyway. It is best to experience it."

Saxophonist David Sanborn is sometimes described as one of the most successful crossover artists in popular music history.

It may be that the phrase "crossover artist" has lost all meaning in

Forty or so years ago, it had strong positive and negative connotations.

In 1975, Sanborn released his debut album of jazz fusion and appeared on David Bowie's *Young Americans* album.

Previously, Sanborn had performed with blues harpist Paul Butterfield, blues guitarist Albert King, and jazz pianist Gil Evans.

Achieving musical immortality by performing an indelible sax

solo on David Bowie's second-biggest single up to that point couldn't possibly be seen as a bad thing, could it?

Yes, it could be seen that way and it was seen that way by some.

In those days, jazz artists who crossed over to pop were often criticized by certain critics and music aficionados.

For example, jazz saxophonist Branford Marsalis was widely criticized in 1985 for joining Sting's first post-Police band.

"I never understood that," Sanborn said in a phone interview. "Is that, like, slumming? That's just useless. Why not just leave it as, 'I like this kind of music and I don't like that.' Someone's a traitor to the cause? What the (expletive) are they talking about?

"Branford Marsalis isn't entitled to like what he likes?" he said. "Can't he do what he does without there being some ulterior motive?"

Even if Sanborn's name doesn't ring a bell for you, there's a good chance that you have appreciated his playing on dozens of songs.

To maintain one's disdain for Sanborn's crossovers, a person would have to pretend not to be impressed by this partial list of artists with whom he has collaborated: Bryan Ferry, James Brown, Eric Clapton, Roger Daltrey, Jaco Pastorius, Stevie Wonder, Kenny Loggins, Paul Simon, Jaco Pastorius, Todd Rundgren, James Taylor, Billy Joel, George Benson, Bruce Springsteen, Elton John, Little Feat, Roger Waters,

Pure Prairie League, Al Jarreau, Loudon Wainwright III, George Benson, Carly Simon, Linda Ronstadt, Steely Dan, Ween, the Rolling Stones, the Grateful Dead, Toto, and the Eagles.

Sanborn has stories about all of them, stories he has told many times. One thing they all had in common, Sanborn said, was work othic.

"They worked really hard," he said. "Paul Simon worked hard. James Taylor worked hard."

Sanborn performed for Stevie Wonder on Wonder's album, *Talking Book*, and the saxophonist said the R&B legend would come in with a new song every morning.

"You can't sit on the couch and wait for the muse to visit you," Sanborn said. "You've got to get

in there and slug it out every day."

For all his accomplishments and accolades (eight gold albums, one platinum album, six Grammy awards), Sanborn remains a humble guy. Stubbornly humble in a way. In conversation, he seems ever eager to abolish B.S. and dig for the truth.

For example, he describes saxophone playing as less of a calling than a last resort.

"I had a passion for it and I didn't have a passion for much else," he said. "It's either this or, 'Do you want fries with that?""

In truth, saxophone playing was prescribed to Sanborn initially. He contracted polio as a child, then spent a year in an iron lung and two years confined to his bed. A physician subsequently told him to take up a wind instrument to strengthen his lungs.

Sanborn chose the saxophone and inadvertently launched what would become a remarkable career.

Asked if he ever takes stock of his accomplishments, Sanborn replied, "If you're asking me if I bask in former glory, the answer is "No.""

"Some of the things I have done in

my past, I am very pleased with," he said. "But I don't spend a lot of time doing a 'Get a load of me' kind of thing. I am thinking about what I am doing. What I am doing now. It's the process that interests me."

In life and in art, Sanborn just tries to stay as awake as possible. What this means when he is composing music is that he is not afraid to make bad art.

"I just try to stay open," he said. "And pay attention. And try not to edit myself too quickly. You know: start to write something and say, 'Ahhh. That's no good.' See it through. It's easy to be prematurely frustrated.

"I find that a lot of times, I'll write a song. And I'll get to the end of it and say, 'Well, that wasn't very good,'" Sanborn said. "But it will end up being spare parts for another tune. I'll take it apart and I'll take some idea from that song and put it into another context."

Sanborn always tries commit to the moment — not just in writing, but on stage and elsewhere.

"We're up there (on stage), a group of five of us, and we're having a conversation," he said. "You want to be with interesting people on stage when you're having that conversation and you want to be able to invite the audience in to participate in some way in that conversation."

The stigma of crossing over no longer exists. Today's listeners generally don't bat an eye (or plug their ears) when an established artist experiments with a new genre or collaborates with a seemingly incompatible peer.

There are different challenges now to being an musician like David Sanborn. Many artists of Sanborn's caliber complain about income lost through changes in how recorded music is consumed.

Sanborn isn't complaining.

"Again, it brings into question: Why do you do what you do?" Sanborn said. "I'm at an age now where I just don't have the same passion for recording new material as I used to have. I'm more into living my life, playing music, and seeing what comes next.

"This is going to sound kind of corny," he said. "I just enjoy waking up in the morning and experiencing the day. My day is my instrument and sitting at the piano and doing stuff without any particular purpose in mind."

### **Sad Gravity**

**Sad Gravity** 

Local live juggernauts Sad Gravity finally release their debut recording in the form of a selftitled album of eight songs. The release launches with raw guitar and deep, thumping bass compiled with thorough, sometimes flashy drum work with plenty of vocal breaks for the instruments to shine



through. The vocals often sway between straightforward singing and a falsetto that rotates the songs in and out of the "catchy without blatantly trying" category.

Connor Corwin and James Valdez switch off singing (and quite possibly guitar and bass, which they can be seen doing at their numerous live shows) keeping the songs fresh from tune to tune. The self-titled debut really hits stride during the fourth song, "Superlative." The opening riff is biting while the bass and drums string it along. When the bridge/guitar solo hits, the effects-heavy stuttering of the guitar draws all the attention. This fades into the simple thumping of the bass and the return of the chorus, giving you all you need to know about the band's capabilities and style.

The transition to "Dirt Squire" via a thick, melodic bass riff shows the band's writing ability and their musicianship. The song slows way down towards the bridge but builds back up with yearning and honest singing pushed forth through vocal chords and falsettos. This is another example of how the band stays fresh even within the same four minutes of music.

Near the end of the album, "Garbage Day" finds the band in Franz Ferdinand territory, though more psychedelia is involved. It's a standout on the album for its hooks and also its briefer heavy parts. If the band doesn't either open or close with it live, they should consider it, as it's got the listener's attention in the palm of its hand.

One way to describe *Sad Gravity* would be diverse and effect-heavy while remaining consistent. The guitars range from clean to reverb-laden or fuzzed out, while the bass either mixes in with the background or stands out on purpose, creating both rhythm and melody. Nolan Dye's drumming ranges from necessarily simplistic to flashy. The vocals are all over the place, but their ownership remains apparently clear in sound and style.

The album ends on some of the same notes it began with; uncomplicated singing to start and breaks for the instruments/riffs to come through, but with some added "ba ba bas" and muted riffing. The last two minutes of the record are some of the finest sounds you'll find on the record, and it leaves the listener with a good understanding of the talent and diversity the band possesses. #### When Haro Met Sally

Deadly Avenger and Luke Insect, or D.A.L.I., two Brits who grew up admiring the BMX scene at a distance, have come together to give us an imagined soundtrack to the BMX '80s we may or may not have had. When Haro Met Sally is the album you wish told the story of your misspent youth.



It doesn't matter if this is Overland Park, California, or Leicester, England. The music and the visuals created by D.A.L.I. will transport you to a time when BMX was life and an afternoon of crash and burn kept things in perspective. Where BMX and skate culture seems to have always gone hand in hand with punk rock, here it's soundtracked by electro synth and early hip-hop beats.


When Haro Met Sally plays like an '80s mixtape played in a massive boombox just on the edge of a jump. Tracks like "Chrome," "Too Tuff To Bluff," and "Goodtimes in Badlands" capture the essence of summer days and freedom of youth. There's both chunky, beat-street funk and ethereal melancholy, displayed here beautifully. There's something lilting about the title track, "When Haro Met Sally." ### **Roy Orbison**

Roy Orbison Sings (1972)

This was Orbison's sixteenth record, and is considered to be his comeback album by most critics. I think his style didn't change, but the music around him did. Still, it's a delightful record from one of the great artists with a creamy smooth voice that spanned four generations.



The release opens with "God Love You," a beautiful song arranged by Joe Tanner. It's pop-gospel but still has the classic Orbison vocals that had matured throughout the decade and into the '70s. "Beaujolais" follows and has soft organs behind a tight guitar and an Elvis-country feel about it. And "Rings of Gold" takes you back to his days in the early '60s. Mellow enough, it is also arranged by Tanner and has a bigger sound than it needs to have. "Plain Jane Country" penned by Eddy Raven continues the country vibe, and is one of the few tracks that you can really hear Orbison's range.

Side two opens with the soulful "Harlem Woman." It's a superballad about a prostitute, and reminds you again of some of the stuff Elvis was producing during the same time, complete with the string arrangements. "Cheyenne" appears on this record, and is still one of my favorite songs from his catalog. It has a pop sensibility about it, and is reminiscent of a Neil Diamond number with big arrangements as well with a wall of backing vocals. "It Takes All Kinds of People" is folk, but again showcases his writing skills. It has a simple moral to it, and is one of the better tracks on the release. Orbison made a comeback of sorts with The Traveling Wilburys (as did Tom Petty and Bob Dylan), but passed away six months after the release of the supergroup's first album in December 1988. If you're a fan of Le Matos' *Turbo Kid* score, you will find much to dig into here. Much like Le Matos, D.A.L.I. lock into the '80s and pull us into them. Deadly Avenger and Luke Insect have built a world of nostalgia that even those that don't know the BMX world of the '80s can fall into and get lost in. It's an imagined soundtrack to California dreams of inverts, turndowns, and alleyoops. (*John Hubner*)

### Loretta Lynn Wouldn't It Be Great

Loretta Lynn's Wouldn't It Be Great is a testament to how some things will never change. When it comes to Lynn's ability to still deliver feisty traditional country romps at nearly 90 years of age, that's a very good thing. But when it's applied to the stories in her songs, that immovable sameness conjures a broad sadness.



This album includes new tunes and fresh versions of Lynn's most enduring classics, but the tone is vintage Loretta Lynn from beginning to end. "Don't Come Home a Drinkin" takes us back to the years when it was refreshing to hear a mountain woman who refuses to be meek, while "Ruby's Stool" is a new song that proves that she's still able to stir things up at the bar on Saturday night.

Lynn's feistiness has always stemmed from her willingness to speak up in the face of the sexism of her native culture. But it's stopped at speaking up and well short of actually trying to change things. It means threatening your alcoholic man and the woman he's cheating on you with, but it doesn't mean you expect anything to ever be any different. The wistfulness of the title track ("Wouldn't it be fine if you could say you love me just one time, with a sober mind?") underscores that fatalism; you're not going to find any empowerment anthems on this album.

The album concludes with a new version of "Coal Miner's Daughter," a reminder that Lynn is a proud product of the holler. That's the way it always has been and always will be. (Evan Gillespie)

### Slasher Is Trick and Trite

Michael Myers is back to his murderous ways again with this latest installment in the *Halloween* franchise that forgoes all of its previous movies with the exception of the 1978 slasher classic. The idea of positioning *Halloween* (confusingly, the third film in the series with that title) as a direct sequel set 40 years after the original is one of several potentially rewarding concepts that went into the development of this newest entry. Unfortunately, these decisions are overridden by the same trite storytelling techniques that we've seen countless times both in this series and in other slasher films for the past four decades.

We're re-introduced to Laurie Strode (Jamie Lee Curtis) as a grandmother who is still traumatized from her initial run-in with Michael Myers but who has also been actively preparing for what she sees as his inevitable return. We learn that this fixation with the masked killer cost her two marriages and the relationships with her daughter Karen (Judy Greer) and her granddaughter Allyson (Andi Matichak). When the prison bus that's transporting Myers (played by both Nick Castle and James Jude Courtney) crashes, Laurie seeks to protect her family at all costs as the seemingly unstoppable evil descends upon Haddonfield once again.

Director David Gordon Green has helmed both independent dramas and mainstream comedies in his
prolific career, but his inexperience with horror is
evident early on in *Halloween*. Whereas John Carpenter sets things up brilliantly with an unforgettable
opening in the 1978 original, Green isn't as successful
in creating the same kind of chilly atmosphere that's
integral for scary movies to function. To his credit,
he does cleverly invert some key moments from its
predecessor for the sake of juxtaposition, but there
aren't enough new ideas that stand independent from

with Jeff Fradley and comedic actor Danny McBride, relies so heavily on the kinds of well-worn cliches that they'd probably be better off skewering instead of embracing. Any of the comedy that does turn up, like two cops bickering about banh mi sandwiches as they wait for Myers to appear, feels forced and completely inorganic to the scenarios that arise from the plot. There is a meta moment, when a hapless teen unwittingly asks Michael, "Have you ever really liked a girl and you just couldn't have her?" that hints at a much more selfaware and potentially fun film that could have been.

Instead, we're treated to the same setups and slayings that I suppose are integral to this genre, but each death seems to have less meaning as the runtime moves along. In the 1978 original, Michael kills five people; here, I lost count about 30 minutes in. It doesn't help that the editing is particularly slap-dash and unexpectedly sloppy in places; I counted multiple instances in which the lines that an actor was speaking didn't match with the movement of their mouth. Fans of this series may respond positively to this newest entry that also could reboot the franchise, but for more casual moviegoers, *Halloween* is likely to come across as a rather hollow experience.

### **Art House Director Hits It Big**

Tops at the Box: Ever since his masterful debut film, 2000's George Washington (which was actually a student film that got legs in the festival circuit), David Gordon Green's name has never been synonymous with blockbusters. He has spent his career taking risks, but hearing that Green was going to cowrite and direct a new Halloween film was shocking. Now the film, with the blessing of John Carpenter, hit screens across the country, taking the No. 1 spot at last weekend's box office with \$77 million in sales. For perspective: Green has directed 13 films, only four of which have sold more than \$10 million in tickets. Seven of Green's films never hit the \$1 million mark and just one (Pineapple Express) broke the \$80 million mark. By the time you read this, Halloween will be Green's highest grossing film ever, and might even be on its way to becoming a horror blockbuster. And guess what? It's actually really, really good, too!

Also at the Box: Bradley Cooper's directorial debut, A Star Is Born, continues to surprise, taking the No. 2 spot at last weekend's box office with another \$19.3 million in domestic sales. The film has already sold \$126 million in the U.S. and over \$200 million worldwide. It's hard to hit those numbers in 2018 unless you're making a comic book film, an animated film, a horror film, or a sequel — so props, Bradley. Look for this one to be in the awards season conversation and maybe even get a re-release in January. Ruben Fleischer's Venom took the No. 3 spot at last weekend's box office with \$18 million in sales, bringing the film's three-week domestic sales total to \$171 million (\$461 million worldwide). 2: Haunted Halloween took the No. 4 spot at the box office, selling a decent \$9.7 million over its second weekend of release, upping the childrens' film's 10-day sales total to just under \$30 million in the U.S. Damien Chazelle's new classic, First Man, rounded out the weekend's Top 5 with a disappointing \$8.6 million in sales, bringing the flick's 10-day U.S. sales total to just \$30 million. Oof. This one was supposed to do much, much better. I saw it. It's big, beautiful, loud, and smart, and highly recommended.

New This Week: The first of this weekend's two big releases is a film about a submarine and a team of U.S. Navy Seals who rescue the Russian President. Huh? The film, directed by Donovan Marsh and starring Gerard Butler, Common, Michael Nyqvist, and Gary Oldman, is said to be reminiscent of action-thrillers from the mid-to-late '90s. Also out everywhere is a new Christian film from writer/director David G. Evans titled *Indivisible*. The film stars Justin Bruening, Sarah Drew, and Jason George. Also of note: a promising remake of *Suspiria* will start to test screen in major markets, as will *Monrovia*, *Indiana*, *Johnny English Strikes Again*, and a film called *Border*. Also be on the lookout for reissues from Rialto; this week sees the rerelease of two classics, *The Fog* and *Senso*.




