The Brighter Future of EDM

There is no way watching a guy with a laptop on a stage could be exciting, right? Well, at least one band, Boulder, Colorado's Big Gigantic, hopes to change your mind.

Big Gigantic are actually two guys on a huge stage, not just one, but they are often playing in front of hundreds and sometimes thousands of fans. That's a lot of pressure to make something happen when you are armed with just a computer, a saxophone, and a drum kit, but that's Big Gigantic, a duo who have been making their mark in the EDM scene since their formation in 2008.

The band have released six albums in the decade since their birth, but more importantly, they have become a giant on the EDM live circuit, touring incessantly and playing some of the biggest festivals in the

The brainchild of saxophonist/producer Dominic Lalli and drummer Jeremy Salken, Big Gigantic quickly made people stand up and take notice as they combined jazz melodies over pulsating dance beats, creating a niche that delivers an innovative, distinct sound that's truly all their own.

Big G's newest album, Brighter Future, and the subsequent Brighter Future Remixed and Brighter Future Deluxe, showcases their uncanny ability to incorporate vocals and instruments into their mix of pre-recorded music, highlighting the band's ingenuity and creativeness. The album takes the band in a new and more sophisticated direction than their earlier works, a direction that seems to agree with fans as it has been their most successful album to date.

There is a message of hope and unity on Brighter Future that seems to conflict with most of the genre's themes of simply having a good time, which is precisely why the album holds such a special place in the hearts of fans. On their website, Lalli explains that the title and concept popped into his head one day as he was feeling unsure about what he was doing with his life and unsure about humanity and the volatile state of the world we live in today.

"As human beings," he explained, "we all have low points in our lives where we question everything and are truly shown how shocking and just plain difficult the world can be. But at the same time, our high times wouldn't be as extraordinary without the low times giving us a grand perspective on our lives and the world around us.

"So many things in the world as we know it are more beautiful and incredible than we've ever known. At the same time, so many things in the world are worse than we've ever seen in my lifetime. So much fear, anger, hate, insecurity, confusion, and outright evil are at their most boiling points. The list goes on and on. Human beings are fighting each other on so many different fronts, and in so many different ways, it's honestly hard to keep up these days.

It's likely Lalli and Salken are proud of the attention Brighter Future has received, but they know, and fans know, that the live setting is where the duo really excels.

artist create brand new music right in front of you, making each of their performances a once in a lifetime event.

For lack of a better description, a Big Gigantic show is a non-stop party. Stage production and lighting are a frenetic feast for the senses, and Lalli and Salken take turns whipping the crowd into a frenzy.

Sure, there will always be those people with the thought that a band playing a lot of pre-recorded sound in front of a crowd isn't really a band performing a concert, but they'd be missing the point. Even a music purist shouldn't try devaluing the authenticity of what artists in this genre are accomplishing simply by trying to fit these artists into some neat little box, because it doesn't work that way with EDM.

Without a doubt, those in attendance when Big Gigantic visits The Clyde Theatre November 8, with special guests Flamingosis, are going to come away feeling like they've witnessed something special.

------Cover Story • Ricky Skaggs ------**Promoting the Old Traditions**

Ricky Skaggs knows how blessed he is, even when facing a musical injury.

He won't be able to play his mandolin because he tore a bicep tendon in July and his doctors haven't cleared him to play yet. But when his band, Kentucky Thunder, visits the Clyde Theatre on November 9, he knows where he needs to concentrate.

"It's been tough," he said in a phone interview. "It's a hard thing just to stand there and sing. But, I'll tell you, it's given me a fresh new focus on my singing. I thought, 'Man, if this is the only thing I can do, I really want to do this well tonight.'

"I want to listen to every word I am saying," Skaggs said. "I want to sing in tune, I want to sing with emotion, I want to sing with fun and joy.'

Patrons shouldn't notice any deficiency in musicianship. Skaggs always surrounds himself with hot young musicians who play like they've got something to prove.

Anybody who thinks bluegrass is somehing quaint and genteel hasn't heard Ricky Skaggs and Kentucky Thunder play it.

On stage at times, the band comes across as the Metallica of country music. Its members can play with a speed and ferocity that should please even the most jaded head-

While it is true that Skaggs has become one of bluegrass's grand old men and has earned the right to rule his band with an iron fist, he says he doesn't place "a restraining

bar" on his young players.

"I let 'em play," he said. "And their interpretations and their read on these old songs is just fresh again to me. It's as fresh as when Benny Martin played with Lester Flatt and Earl Scruggs. I love hearing these young guys play."

Old guys giving young guys a chance to olay is a tradition in bluegrass and Skaggs was once on the callow end of that tradition.

Before he'd turned 8 years old, Skaggs had already performed on stage with Bill Monroe and with Flatt & Scruggs. He joined Ralph Stanley's band, the Clinch Mountain Boys, when he was still in his teens.

Recently, Skaggs was inducted into the International Bluegrass Music Hall of Fame and the Country Music Hall of Fame.

These honors stirred mixed emotions in

He said he couldn't help but think of about how much easier he had it than those guys who had inspired him.

"Most of my touring life, I got to ride around on a touring bus," he said, "and rest and let a driver take me from one show to the next. Those fathers — that first generation of guys - paid such a price.'

When Skaggs learned that he would be inducted into the Country Music Hall of Fame, it bothered him that Ralph and Carter Stanley still hadn't been inducted.

"That was a little bit of a ... almost of an embarrassment," he said. "I thought, 'I'm going in and they're not?'"

But he eventually made peace with it.

"Their name and their plaque might not be in there," he said, "but they're going in as I go in.'

Skaggs, who had not yet gone through they induction ceremony when I spoke with him, said he would acknowledge the StanCOURTESY PHOTO

ley Brothers from the stage.

"They will be very much mentioned and there will be a real grateful heart in me," he said.

Bluegrass has had its ups and downs in recent years. A resurgence happened in the first part of the 21st century, thanks to O Brother, Where Art Thou? That movie was good for many years of bluegrass package tours, some of which Skaggs participated in.

Progressive bluegrass — a combination of bluegrass, rock, alternative country, and indie folk - was all the

rage for a while. One of its chief practitioners, mandolinist Chris Thile, is currently the host of Live From Here, the weekly public radio show formerly known as A Prairie Home Companion.

Skaggs has come to see himself as a protector and promotor of bluegrass traditions.

"The older I get, the more I realize that it's part of my calling," he said. "There's a lot of tradition that's not worth keeping, but bluegrass is definitely worth keeping. The foundation stones are so strong that there's so much to be built on."

Skaggs said he isn't as familiar with newer bluegrass acts as he probably should be, but he wants to be an encourager.

He saw Paul McCartney cheer on younger acts at the Grammies a few years back, and it made a big impression on him.

"I thought, 'Wait. That's Paul McCartney. He doesn't have to do that.' And then I realized, 'Oh, he does have to do that.' We need to encourage the younger ones.'

Bill Monroe invited a 6-year-old Skaggs up on stage to play with him and such encouragement is one of the reasons Skaggs persevered to become the award-winning artist he is today.

"He let me come up and play his mandolin," Skaggs said. "I could have dropped it and stepped on it. The kindness that he showed me ... it was just a beautiful thing."



Authenticity Key to Success

----- Feature • Brothers Osborne

Country music stars love to cast themselves as rebels, but if we're honest, we know that most of them are anything but rebellious. Conventional wisdom says that there are lines you have to toe if you want to have a successful career, especially when it comes to politics and social issues, and you cross any one of those lines at your peril.

TJ and John Osborne seem not to have any use for conventional wisdom. If they want to present themselves as rebels, they've made a pretty good case for themselves

At the same time that they embrace their working-class upbringing, they've been exceptionally willing to step into America's political fray on the side of the line that is traditionally not the country-music norm. And, so far, the apparent contradiction appears to be working for them.

The Brothers Osborne grew up with a genuine working-class pedigree. Raised in the small town of Deale, Maryland, they lived in a blue-collar household saturated with the music of classic rockers and traditional country musicians, Bob Seger and George Jones. The inspiration of their father's music collection led them to develop their own musical talents in time-tested directions.

"It's like an old-school rock approach," John said of the combination of his guitar playing and TJ's singing. "Groups like [Aerosmith and the Allman Brothers] always had the lead singer as well as the sideman guitar player. That's what we're going for, too. We're carving our own path in country music."

That aesthetic was predominant on the duo's first recordings, and the mix of TJ's deep, drawling vocals and John's hard-charging guitar was classic Southern rock all the way. The authenticity of their sound was impossible to overlook, and a series of singles made their way onto the charts before the brothers had even released their debut major-label album, *Pawn Shop*, in 2016. That album hit number three on the country charts, and it was clear that the country music establishment loved them.

Yet there was always something a little off-kilter about the brothers' approach to country traditions. Take, for example, the single "Rum," in which TJ sings of the simple pleasures of dipping one's toes in the water and imbibing an alcoholic beverage. It's not exactly a trope that's unfamiliar in pop country music, but while most country singers are wading in the warm waters of the Gulf of Mexico or a Mexican resort, the Brothers Osborne stick closer to home.

"Most people we grew up with don't go to these beautiful beaches," TJ said. "They can't afford to do it. They don't have the time for it. What we're most familiar with is people going to the local bars and hanging out with each other."

The bottom line for the brothers is that their upbringing taught them to look out for the underdog, to do what's right, and to be unafraid to speak up about it, even when

speaking up risks offending.

"We all end up in echo chambers, and we're constantly agreeing with the people that we're nearest, and we push away the people that we have different opinions with," John said at this year's ACM Awards. "We all need to come together and have some hard conversations, but be respectful to one another."

The hard conversations that John's talking about involve issues such as gun law reform and racial injustice. On both of these topics, the brothers have been outspoken in a way that most country music artists would hesitate to be. Taking a political stance can be career suicide — remember the Dixie Chicks? — and most musicians stay within the safe confines of silence.

But not the Brothers Osborne.

"At the end of the day, we all have each other's backs," John told CMT recently. "That all goes back to authenticity. And yeah, we're all very vocal and honest people, and we want to stick up for the people who are bullied, or don't have a voice in this crazy world that we live in."

Fortunately, their fans seem to be responding to their authenticity, and their forthrightness is not hurting their careers. Their second album, *Port Saint Joe*, hit number two when it was released back in April, and the brothers won the ACM Vocal Duo of the Year award for the second year in a row.

They're also in the middle of a sprawling tour that illustrates just how far-reaching their appeal is. Their show at the Clyde Theatre in Fort Wayne comes in the middle of a month that begins with a swing through Canada and culminates with a string of shows in the United Kingdom.

The shows present the duo's new music in all its gritty glory and with a heaping helping of working-class humility. In the making of *Port Saint Joe*, the brothers only wanted to be real, regardless of whether the music was popular or critically acclaimed.

"We weren't trying to be anything or anyone that wasn't truly us," TJ said of the album. "Imperfections and all."

And, in the end, being true to yourself is the ultimate act of rebellion.

New Twist on an Old Favorite

Whether it's the Alastair Sims classic from 1951, the more recent Disney animated version from 2009, or even the quirky Muppet adaptation from 1992, there's a version of A Christmas Carol for every possible audience. Finding something that adds to that catalog rather than just repeats it was the happy challenge for Lauren Nichols, artistic director for all for One.

"A few years ago I started looking for Christmas pieces," she said. "I'm not sure if I found it or if (retired executive director) Sharon Henderson found it. I chose to put it on our schedule then, but when the Civic Theatre announced their next season later, I saw they were going to do a musical version of A Christmas Carol, and I put it aside. So I've been sitting on it for three years.

"I love the story of A Christmas Carol and especially loved this adaptation and loved that it has something new to say. This version really has something fresh to offer.'

This particular version is a play within a play, the story of a struggling theater company staging a production of A Christmas Carol. This show focuses on a cantankerous stage manager and a young prop boy who ascend into the roles of Scrooge and Tiny Tim. In addition to 10 other actors, many of whom play multiple roles, the stage manager/Scrooge will be played by Peter Meyer while the role of prop boy/Tiny Tim will be handled by Jack Hanson, who up until now has had very little theatre ex-

"Our Scrooge is 6'4", so he's a big man," Nichols said. "And our Tiny Tim is eight but looks about five and is so sweet. I'm so lucky

we found him because I think if we'd had a bigger Tiny Tim they wouldn't have been able to carry him like Tiny Tim is carried in the story."

In addition to picking the right actors, Nichols says that there were some tricks in determining how to stage the show.

"In the original there was a magical trunk that everything came out of. Obviously we weren't going to be able to pull that off so it was a matter of finding different ways,

some seamless clever way, of doing all of that, but I think we finally figured that out."

Nichols began casting and staging the show last summer, even before their fall production, Bentley, began in September. While not a musical production, there is music included in the performance, and Nichols wanted to begin working on those aspects with her cast.

"I started working with the casts of Bentley and A Christmas Carol last May. A Christmas Carol has some bell pieces, and I wanted new arrangements. I didn't like the music they provided. The piece for the scene where Scrooge and Belle dance was part of it, and I didn't care for it. So I thought 'Carol of the Bells' would work since it's a waltz, and the character is named Belle anyway.'

There are still other reasons Nichols thinks

> this new twist on a Victorian holiday classic will appeal to theatergoers.

> "The show is very minimalist and simple, and it also breaks the fourth wall and engages the audience. The actors from the stage will invite everyone to sing the Christmas carols. This isn't a musical, but there is a lot of music in it. So we'll have a guitarist, a violinist, and four actors playing hand bells. It's been interesting to teach a couple of the actors who are not musicians how to play the hand bells."

> This version of the story, written by Doris Baizley and published in 1991, leaves director Nichols with some very interesting options, and she was pleasantly surprised how quickly it all came together in their first rehearsals after the staging of Bentley.

"The show is so quintessentially Victorian,

but I didn't want to necessarily set it in the Victorian era, so we're making it around 1900, the end of the Victorian era and beginning of Edwardian era.

"We're doing all the sound effects live to create the flavor of this play about a down-onits-luck theater company. It doesn't make sense for them to have the sound effects recorded because they wouldn't have the budget for that. So let's just say from the get-go, 'This is a company that can't do it big so they have to keep things very simple.""

That simplicity perfectly coincides with the all for One home at the ArtsLab in the Auer Center for Arts and Culture. The minimalistic venue allows all who direct there a variety of options for staging and audience seating, providing a welcome versatility.

Nichols plans to use a commedia dell'arte approach even though, as she points out, that was gone long before the setting of this play. But she's found a way to make it work for this production.

She also hopes that this adaptation of A Christmas Carol will prove popular enough to bring back on a recurring basis.

"I really want to start doing a holiday show in this slot every season," she said. "Christmas shows are super well attended, and I can see us maybe finding a five- or six-year cycle where we rotate shows over the years, though I'd be open to something new if it came along."

Antigone, determined to bury her brother who has died in a contentious civil war, now has to battle their uncle Creon, the new king. Believing her duty to her brother and the gods is greater than her duty to her king, she disobeys the order to leave her brother unburied, knowing full well that challenging authority and fighting for justice will bring about her eventual demise.

Bold, Simple, and Vibrant Art

Colorful yet simple landscapes featuring bold, black lines make up En Hughey's ink and paper illustrations.

"I find inspiration while walking my dog, biking, taking road trips and in video games," Hughey said. "This current series began in a state park. I've found that anytime I've needed a new start, or a jolt of inspiration, the outdoors can only help."

But this inspiration started long before Hughey was taking walks with the dog and soaking in the support from the Fort Wayne art community, both audience and creators

"I can't really remember not being interested in art," Hughey said. "My mom, my aunt, and I have been going to art museums since I was a kid. I was constantly drawing on everything, too. My mom still talks about how many times she had to repaint walls. I feel like it dawned on me when I recognized a specific print that my mother had hung up. She's always been in love with impressionism, Claude Monet specifically. It seemed like we would stay for hours at the Chicago Art Institute, in the room of his work. It bothered me that he was on the wall there and at home, while I was only on the refrigerator. I wanted to be on the wall and had no grasp that there was any difference between us."

So from a young age, Hughey was creating art, but also comparing it to the works of the greats like Monet. But when a young person decides to become an artist — as if it is a decision and not a driving hunger that must be satisted — all bets are off.

"I started exploring children's books, animated films and comics. Bill Watterson's *Calvin and Hobbes* has been a constant influence aesthetically and philosophically in my work. In 1994, a copy of Hayao Miyazaki's *My Neighbor Totoro* came into my home and I was hooked. The way that this world was so unlike anything I had seen or read before opened doors in my imagination.

"I started calling myself an artist in high school originally, but drifted once I moved to Fort Wayne for college. After three years I happened to walk into the



art building for the first time, changed my major, and have been back in the habit ever since. I feel like I really found my voice about a year ago though.

"When I was a teenager, I was afraid that pursuing art professionally might jeopardize what I love most: creating work. I moved here after a difficult period in my life, and was taking some time to heal. Once I was in college though, it became more of a question of, 'Do I want to be happy?' The answer was a resounding yes, so I took the leap.

I feel like half of being an artist is deciding to make art every day, to keep investing and exposing yourself, even if you've already had a full day."

With influences like Frida Kahlo, Winsor McCay, and Käthe Kollwitz, you might expect



Hughey's work to be a little different than it is. But, so many artists are inspired and influenced by their heroes, and those styles never make it into their own output. Hughey's style is pretty instantly recognizable.

Pieces like "Margarite" and

"Sun Please" show Hughey's encompassing style: bold, black, segmenting lines and vibrant, varied colors that typically create beautifully complete landscapes. Where detail like shading or dimension is lacking, bravado and accessibility soar.

"In my ink and paper work, I'll often go to a coffee shop before work and make the outline," Hughey said. "I begin with ink and outline the inner frame. From there

Inner frame. From there I'll pen the scene I have in mind. The next step is to draw the outer frame, make the lines within the frame, and then sign in the corner. I like to let the drawing rest for several hours to ensure that the ink won't bleed. The coloring stage consists of deciding on

a color palette, putting it on a test paper, altering the colors as needed, then diving right in. Once the inking has begun, it must be done quickly so the shade stays even."

A bonus about Hughey's style is that it translates flawlessly as a digital medium. The creations are easily rendered via software. However, the physical, original copies offer more detail and are more desirable for purchase and collection. Hughey can stay consistent with this style, even migrating back and forth from digital to physical. This style, though cohesive, is ever-expanding. Two examples of this are "Sky 2" and "HCS." They've left the straightforward landscape behind to focus on more precise subjects with more mood and artistically-imprecise intentions.

'It's easy to stay within my style as long as I give myself permission to keep expanding it," Hughey said. "It's refreshing to wander away from what's familiar periodically and experiment with a different medium or line technique. Not only does it give me a broader range of work, but I can bring the successes into my current series. I feel like the personal style that I've been exploring has a lot of the tools I need to convey the world I dream and wander in. There are times I feel like I'm interpreting the impressionism I grew up around. I want a moment and a maze, all at the same time.

"My ultimate goal is to live in a vehicle, keep traveling, and draw what I see. I want to illustrate children's books and continue illustrating video games. A bonus would be to give someone a moment of peace, a small space in time to wander through a land-scape and be reminded that the world is wide and full of possibility. I want to keep getting on the



A Bowie Celebration: The David Bowie Alumni Tour returns to the road in 2019 to celebrate the music of the legendary performer. The trek will feature Bowie's longest tenured band member Mike Garson, who played over one thousand shows with



Bowie. Other key musicians who played with Bowie will be included on the tour including Earl Slick, Gerry Leonard, and Carmine Rojas along with vocalists like Bernard Fowler and Corey Glover. The tour stops by in Chicago on Feb. 22, Detroit on Feb. 23, and Cleveland on Feb. 24.

If you're a boy band fan, and I know you are, you're going to be excited about last week's announcement of a New Kids on the Block tour in 2019. Donnie Wahlburg and company are hitting the road to celebrate the 30th anniversary of their breakout album Hangin's Tough. 

Kurt Vile

Bottle It In

Kurt Vile pulls influence and inspiration from Jimi Hendrix and Tom Petty to John Fahey and Mississippi John Hurt to Pavement and the Drag City crew. His last two albums were double LP behemoths filled with a mixture of Vile's eccentric rock stylings and guitar noodlings that added up to what I



thought sounded like an alien's take on classic rock.

Now we have the 80-minute-long *Bottle It In*. The album spans folksy guitar picking to zoned-out meditative 10-minute numbers to Tom Petty-ish classic rock n' roll bangers. *Bottle It In* feels like the closest we've gotten to stepping inside Vile's head and seeing what makes him work.

Vile opens with the excellent "Loading Zones," a song that sounds like something that could've sat proudly on *Full Moon Fever*, but with more of a stream-of-consciousness lyrical flow. With each successive album, Vile has pushed his vocals further up into the mix, which to my ears says he's getting more comfortable with what he has to say and how he's saying it. This song feels like he's come full circle in his songwriting.

"Hysteria" shows Vile's ability to build engaging songs through percussion layering and chiming acoustics. The song pulls you into its maze-like sonics.

Bottle It In showcases three amazing epic tracks as well. The first is the over nine-minute "Bassackwards," a meditative track that rolls in like waves on the beach Kurt Vile sings about. With the reversed guitars, comfortable acoustic picking, and the loping rhythm, you're lulled into a quiet state of reflection. "Bottle It In" is ten minutes of looping drum beats, distant keys, and Vile at his most impressionistic. "Skinny Mini" closes the album on another 10-minute note, but noisier and more experimental.

In between these epic tracks are some amazing pop songs. *Bottle It In* lets go of any artistic inhibitions and gets down to freeform rambling, musical meditations, and quirky pop sensibilities. *Bottle It In* pops the cork on Kurt Vile and lets him breathe. (*John Hubner*)

Leones

Lovetrip

Leones' latest recording is a slight departure from their regular output. *Holy*, the band's 2016 EP, was saturated in distortion and heavier-hitting riffs. But *Lovetrip* keeps it cleaner until the bridges or the occasional heavy outro. The title track features reverb-laden deep vocals and clean guitars.



Only at the end of the song is there any distortion, but it's in the form of a sludgy, dissonant riff that still remains catchy.

"Underwater" starts off faster, though the vocals are still as subdued. Toward the end, there is some distortion featured in the background, but the song, as a whole, is fairly mild. This makes the transition to the next song and the other songs on the EP work well.

"Everyday" starts out with a heavy and almost bro-rock riff that is anchored into the alternative realm thanks to the shoegazey vocals and chunky bass. These riffs and occasional clean(er) guitar strumming make it the best song on the EP that sits at five songs long.

"Bad Man" starts somewhat like the opening song, with chorusy guitar and lots of reverb on the vocals. Its lightness is juxtaposed with the heaviness on "Everyday" and "Ojos," the last song on the EP. Halfway through "Ojos," the thickness of the guitar and the yearning of the vocals, paired with one of the few lead/melody guitar parts present, leaves the album fading out on one of the best parts.

The songs are a bit slower than on *Holy* and every song is under four minutes. While the band is churning out EPs annually, the change-up in style is encouraged and expected. Playing live gives the band many options; play everything in the newer style for a consistent vibe or throw in some older songs to keep the audience on their feet (though they likely are already).

With the help of the songs on *Lovetrip*, the trio is able to fill performance spaces with spacey ambiance and heavy, chunky headbanging all in the same performance. (*Benjamin Dehr*)

It opens with the "Time Has Told Me," a comforting blend of Van Morrison and Donovan (with Richard Thompson featured on the electric guitar). "River Man" follows. Drake's vocals are stunning enough, but the strings in this track are perfect for the arrangement. Everything about this song is beautiful, and it still sounds great 50 years later.

"Three Hours" is a six-minute number that features master sessions player Rocky Dzidzornu on the congas. This is another graceful track that, as modest as it appears, covers the sprawling landscape of modern folk.

Side two's "Cello Song" is a blueprint for what Jack Johnson or Dave Matthews have been producing over their careers. "The Thoughts of Mary Jane" with its crafty flute behind the acoustic guitar is a song built for cold October afternoons and hot tea. Danny Thompson (playing double bass on the record) strums away on "Man in a Shed," while a jazzy piano tiptoes around in the back behind Drake's vocals. And the piano is featured again in "Saturday Sun" with drumming from future '80s prog-band Sky drummer, Tristan Fry.

Although Drake released only three albums in his career, I still think he was one of the best at what he did. Unfortunately, he took his own life at the age of 26.

This Will Destroy You

New Others Part One

This new record by This Will Destroy You continues their trend of experimentation while staying true to the echoed guitars and big sky pondering they've built art around for 10 years. The results are their most consistent and experimental record yet.



perimental record yet.

There's no mistaking the chiming quitors and avalenting draws the

ing guitars and explosive drums that "Melted Jubilee" offer up when you hit play. There's a familiar uplift and optimism we've come to expect on a This Will Destroy You record. The electric piano leads the way as jangly guitars carry us up. I've always gotten the impression that West Texas offers something that other states can't for instrumental bands: an endless horizon to get lost in and memorialize in composition. This Will Destroy You capture that drive perfectly. "To Win, Somebody's Got To Lose" is a continuation of that drive. Underneath the shimmering guitars, though, is what sounds like an old wind up music box that leads us from West Texas highways to somewhere in the stratosphere.

From here, the band celebrate deconstructing that big sound into something more like buzzing electronics. "Syncage" starts out sounding like deeply compressed electrical charges working their way to the surface. Soon, though, the song explodes in a flurry of deeply affected drums and sustained melodies that hang in the air like discharged energy. "Allegiance" is pure ambient heaven. It puts me in mind of Huerco S and his excellent 2016 record For Those Of You Who Have Never (And Also Those Who Have). It's fragile experimental music that lingers in the air long after it ends. The album closer, "Go Away Closer," feels like coming full circle, though it ends on what sounds like a rusting, dilapidated calliope in the center of an abandoned carnival. This sounds more like the band we began the journey with at the start, so in a way New Others Part One is very much a full circle kind of record. (John Hubner)

Actors Wear Western Well

The Sisters Brothers, the first English-language feature from French director Jacques Audiard, stars John C. Reilly and Joaquin Phoenix as Eli and Charlie Sisters, two guns-for-hire caught in the middle of the California Gold Rush. Their latest mission, handed down from their employer known simply as The Commodore (Rutger Hauer), revolves around a scientist named Hermann Warm (Riz Ahmed), who has allegedly developed a chemical that makes underwater gold much easier to locate. Also hot on Warm's trail is detective John Morris (Jake Gyllenhaal), who hopes to extract the secret formula from the chemist before the Sisters finish the job.

Advertising for this film has pitched it as a kind of buddy comedy between Reilly and Phoenix. With Reilly's work alongside Will Ferrell in *Talladega Nights* and *Step Brothers*, the strategy seems sound.

The truth is that this is much more of a straight-ahead Western. Sure, it has a few quirks here and there, but the general tone is more stoic and somber than the trailer lets on. Having said that, I appreciated that this film stuck to its genre so thoroughly, especially in a time when the closest thing to Westerns that are typically released tend to be action movies that just happen to be set in the Old West.

The central conflict and its embedded themes are tied directly to the film's setting in the mid-19th century, a time when so much of the country ran rampant with law-lessness while beacons of civility could be found in emerging cities. Eli finds himself drawn to these

indicators of a burgeoning modern society; he's taken with curiosity as he's introduced to a toothbrush and giggles with glee as he flushes a toilet for the first time in their San Francisco hotel. Charlie, the younger and more impulsive of the brothers, is more skeptical of the changing times and doesn't see how his violent urges could fit into a more decent and polite community.

Audiard unpacks these themes delicately across the movie's 2-hour runtime. While the first half can feel a bit aimless and slow at times, the film's second half picks up considerably as the four main characters converge in the wilderness.

While Reilly and Phoenix aren't always convincing as actual brothers, the two fine actors do turn in reliably great performances as two men whose ideologies seem to be veering in different directions. Ahmed and Gyllenhaal do fine work as well, despite the latter's slightly ponderous accent choice, but the screenplay doesn't quite develop their characters as much as I would have liked.

The script, co-written by Audiard with Thomas Bidegain, not

only provides some contemplative dialogue between the four men, but it also keeps the audience on their toes with some unexpected turns in the story. Aside from a couple comedic moments, the movie largely feels like a traditional Western and is often refreshingly old-fashioned. In its evocation of greed and its focus on camaraderie amongst characters in dire circumstances, I was reminded of the John Huston classic The Treasure of the Sierra Madre. Like that film, The Sisters Brothers finishes strong by building to a final scene that perfectly ties up everything that came before it.



Filmmaker Rakes in the Green

Tops at the Box: I've been singing the praises of filmmaker David Gordon Green since I was in college, back when his student film, George Washington, was first available for rent on DVD. In the years since that remarkable, Terrence Malick-indebted first film, DGG has directed 13 feature

In honor of DGG having his first significant mainstream success with last weekend's No. 1 film, Halloween (already at the \$126 million mark domestically and \$173 million worldwide), I'm now going to rank and rate the David Gordon Green catalog:

Halloween dominated last weekend's lazy fall box office with another \$32 million in sales. I've already been subjected to at least five passionate reviews from friends about this movie, which currently holds a cautious score of 67/100 on Metacritic.

Also at the Box: Bradley Cooper's directorial debut, A Star Is Born, continued to surprise, taking the No. 2 spot over its fourth weekend of release, selling another \$14 million, upping the flick's domestic sales total to \$149 million (\$253 million worldwide). A Star Is Born also has a score of 88/100 on Metacritic and, I think, is a sure-thing Oscar film, with likely nominations for Best Picture, Best Director, Best Actor, Best Actress, Best Cinematography, Best Editing, and Best Song.

I'm not sure what the film will win, but I'd put money on Cooper winning Best Actor and making some more great films.

count Take the Money and Run.) Cuaron is already at work on his next film, a secret, untitled project with Casey Affleck. I'll be looking forward to that.

Venom took the No. 3 spot at last weekend's domestic box office, selling another \$10.8 million, bringing the film's four-week sales totals to \$187 in the U.S. and \$508 million worldwide.

Goosebumps 2: Haunted Halloween took the No. 4 spot with \$7.5 million in sales, bringing the flick's 17-day sales total to just over \$38 million. Oof. Not quite a flop, but definitely a dud.

Hunter Killer, a promising new action-thriller starring Gary Oldman, Gerard Butler and Common, sold \$6.6 million over its first three days of release.

Also of note: Damien Chazelle's very good First Man continued to bomb, selling just \$4.9 million last weekend, bringing the film's three-week total to just \$37 million (against a \$60 million production budget). Ouchie, Damien.

I could go on listing great film directors who started their career making music videos as a way to build up the promise critics are seeing in the new film from music video legend Joseph Kahn.

A modern music video director needs to understand the whole process - the shooting, the writing, the editing, the lighting, the effects. They work fast and they work hard. Each project is much different from the last and, rather than spending two to three years planning and executing an idea. music video directors are often asked to turn a video around in a matter of weeks. Music video direction is essentially years of training, boot camp-style, to do something bigger.

And so when we get someone like Joseph Kahn, he arrives sharp as a tack, with the biggest toolbox on the lot and a history of delivering on the promise of the project he was originally presented.

Kahn's new film, Bodied, features a clean, modern idea that's unique to the big screen - a dark dramedy about a too-smart college student who becomes obsessed with the underground battle rap scene. That's the best elevator pitch I've heard in a long time. It's a film about race, changing cultural standards for sensitivity, class and much more. Bodied opens in New York City and Los Angeles on Friday, Nov. 2, and will continue to spread to smaller markets through the fall. Go see


Cure Your Christmas Cynicism
